

## World Famous Fifers

The world-famed Army ceremonial unit usually seen on television performing for visiting heads of state is scheduled to perform at activation ceremonies for the two new commands.

The Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps of the 3d Infantry will perform at both outdoor ceremonies Monday morning, or, if there is bad weather, between the activation ceremonies in the post gym.

The corps is the only unit of its kind in the armed forces. Its members parade in uniforms similar to those worn by musicians of the Continental Army. In the Revolutionary War,

musicians were used to relay commands to troops in battle.

The corps marches to the old cadence of 90 steps a minute and at the slow, stately "troop" step of 60 steps a minute when trooping the line.

Carrying an espartoon in his right hand to relay silent orders to the musicians, the drum major is the only person in the armed forces authorized to salute with his left hand.

The corps uses six hole wood fifes, hand made rope-tensioned drums and bugles, replicas of the instruments used during the Revolution. It is stationed at Ft. Myer, Va.

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## MICOM Fades Out

Brief ceremonies half a mile apart here will activate two new commands January 31, mark the end of a third and formalize a transfer of responsibility for management of the U.S. Army missile program.

The Army Missile Command (MICOM), an organization of about 8,000 soldiers and civilian government employees which has run the Army missile program here since 1962, will be abolished that day.

Replacing it at Redstone in the same buildings with the same work force will be two new commands, the Army Missile Materiel Readiness Command (MIRCOM) and the Army Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM). Both are elements of the Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command (DARCOM).

The changes are being made to improve Army missile management.

MIRCOM, being activated at 9:30 a.m., will concentrate on missile readiness, essentially all functions including supply and maintenance required to support missile systems operational world-wide with U.S. Army and allied forces. MIRCOM will also manage all aspects of sales of Army missiles to other nations and operate Redstone Arsenal.

A similar ceremony at 10:45 a.m. will activate MIRADCOM, a command dedicated to missile acquisition, essentially all functions of research, development testing and initial procurement.

Job assignments in one or the other of the new commands will become effective the same day for more than 7,300 full time former civilian employees of MICOM. The majority are working at the same locations on the arsenal doing the same things for the same pay. About 1,000 were reassigned to different jobs.

Major missile systems now run by MICOM shift to the new commands for management. MIRCOM will have the Hawk and Chaparral ground to air systems; Dragon and TOW anti-tank weapons; Lance surface to surface missile and target missiles.

MIRADCOM managed weapons will include: Stinger and U.S. Roland, ground to air systems; 2.75 Inch Rocket and Hellfire, both helicopter weapons for ground attack; the new General Support Rocket System and Pershing II, surface to surface weapons; Viper and other small rockets, Precision Laser Designators and High Energy Lasers.

The split in Army missile management responsibility was directed by DARCOM Headquarters and follows in a study made for the Secretary of the Army more than two years ago. Other major DARCOM single commodity management organizations are also being realigned to put direction of readiness and acquisition in separate commands.

## Ceremonies Open

Soldiers and civilians assigned to MIRCOM and MIRADCOM may attend activation ceremonies for the two new commands Monday.

The Missile Materiel Readiness Command (MIRCOM) will be activated in a brief ceremony in front of Bldg 5250 at 9:30 A.M.

Similar ceremonies activating the Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM) will be held in front of Bldg 4505 at 10:45 A.M.

In the event of bad weather, the ceremonies will be in the Post Gym at 9:30.

The Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps of the 3d U.S. Infantry is scheduled to perform at both ceremonies. The ceremonial unit, often seen on television as it performs for visiting heads of state at the White House, wears uniforms of the Revolutionary War.

LTG George Sammet, Deputy Commander for Materiel Acquisition, Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command, will be the ranking officer present for the events.

MG George E. Turnmeyer, Commander of MIRCOM, will make brief remarks during the MIRCOM activation. BG Grayson D. Tate, Jr., Commander of MIRADCOM, will speak at his command's activation.

With their supervisors' permission, individuals may attend the ceremonies without charge to annual leave. No special transportation is planned. Military Police will coordinate parking.

## Dividends Up This Year

(ARNEWS) — The Veterans Administration has indicated it will pay \$403.4 million in GI insurance dividends during 1977.

VA officials said the 1977 payments will represent an increase of \$26.6 million over the dividends paid in 1976. Dividend payments will be made on the anniversary date of the individual

policies. The first checks have already been mailed.

Payments go to holders of three types of government insurance policies: U.S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI), National Service Life Insurance, and Veterans Special Life Insurance.

About \$368.1 million of the total dividend will be paid to 3.5 million World War II vets who have kept their GI insurance policies. The average payment to these veterans will be \$104, an increase from the 1976 average payment of \$95.

Some 114,300 World War I policy-holding veterans will receive \$23.1 million in dividends, an average of \$202, up from \$183 paid last year.

About 550,000 Korean Conflict veterans who kept their GI policies in force will receive \$12.2 million in dividend payments, according to VA officials. This is an average payment of \$22, up from \$18 last year. This is the third annual dividend paid to Korean Conflict veterans.

A VA spokesman pointed out that dividends on GI insurance policies will be

paid automatically. He stressed that there is no need to contact the VA, explaining that an inquiry about a dividend could delay payment.

Dividends represent a return to policy holders of funds not needed to pay the cost of the insurance. This includes both excess interest earned and any savings realized because actual deaths were fewer than projected rates.

Dividends on most VA insurance policies have increased in recent years because the funds have been earning interest at higher rates.

This has operated to the benefit of veterans owning permanent type insurance plans, but has had little or no effect on those with term insurance where the interest element is small.

The VA spokesman also noted that some veterans will receive more than the average dividend payment and others less than the average. Dividends will depend on the policy held, the amount of insurance, the vet's age at issue or renewal and the length of time the policy has been in force.

Eakins was cited for her work in developing a club library, arranging outside speaking engagements for members and providing quality educational features for the meetings.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Redstone Club will convene Wednesday, February 2, at the Officers Club.

Washington — LTG John R. Guthrie will succeed Gen. John R. Deane, Jr. as commander of the U.S. Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command (DARCOM).

Guthrie's new job and his selection for promotion to four star rank were announced Jan. 19. He is Commanding 1X Corps, U.S. Army Japan.

Deane is retiring Jan. 31. No date has been set for Guthrie to take over.

When he does take over command of DARCOM, he will be returning to a place he has been before. In 1968 he was assigned to the Army Materiel Command

(AMC), the predecessor to DARCOM, as Deputy Director, Development and Engineering; later became Director of Research, Development and Engineering, and in 1971, Deputy Commanding General for Materiel Acquisition.

He left AMC in 1973 and served in Hawaii until going to his present assignment in Japan in March 1975.

Earlier in his career he had two tours of duty in the Office, Chief of R&D, Department of the Army. During his first tour there from 1956 to 1958 he was with the Surface-to-Surface Missile Division and later with the Missile and Space Division.

During this period he was the Army Staff project officer for the launching of Explorer I, the U.S. and Free World's first scientific earth satellite.

He returned to the office, Chief of Research and Development in 1966 as Director of Development.

Other key assignments include commanding the 25th Infantry Division Artillery in Hawaii; Staff Officer in the Requirements and Development Division J-5 Directorate of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and assistant Division commander, the 2nd Infantry Division in Korea.

Guthrie graduated from Princeton University in 1942 as an ROTC honor graduate. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Field Artillery Reserve and immediately ordered to active duty. He received his regular Army commission in 1946.

He is a graduate of the Field Artillery School Battery Officers course, the Command and General Staff School, and the National War College.

## Hawk Manager

BG Patrick M. Roddy, Hawk Project Manager at MICOM, was promoted to his new rank last week in Souel, Korea while on a trip to that country. Gen. John W. Vessey, Jr., Commander, U.S. Forces in Korea, pinned the stars on the new general.

Roddy came to Redstone last summer from Europe. He was nominated for promotion, in early December.

Originally from Seattle, Wash., Roddy is a graduate of Seattle University and has an MBA from Syracuse University. He attended the Infantry and Armor Schools and is a graduate of the Army Command and General Staff College and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

His decorations are the Bronze Star Medal, Legion of Merit (1st Oak Leaf Cluster), Meritorious Service Medal (three Oak Leaf Clusters), and the Army Commendation Medal (two Oak Leaf Clusters).

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# "No Hidden Reason for Split" . . . Tate

MICOM is being abolished and two new commands established in its stead to improve missile program management, the man who will head one of those new commands said last week, adding "the time has come . . . to concentrate on how best to do the job once the split becomes fact."

Despite rumors to the contrary, BG Grayson E. Tate told the local chapter of the National Contract Management Assn. Jan. 19, there is no hidden reason, no mystery at all, behind the MICOM split.

"We really are doing it for a very simple reason: to do a better job. Not to save money, although we hope we

will. Not to cut the number of people . . . we did it because we feel eventually, if not immediately, we can do a better job," Tate said.

Tate, named last week to command the Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM) one of two new commands being activated January 31, told the audience of procurement-oriented government and contractor people that although separate, his command would cooperate closely with the Missile Materiel Readiness Command (MIRCOM).

"We may be living in separate houses . . . but we intend to operate as if we work in a duplex, with a big, wide door in between," Tate said, characterizing the relationship between the two new commands.

He said MIRADCOM would encourage innovation in its procurement operations.

"It is not enough, in my judgement, to say the way to do a better job is to do things exactly as we have in the past and do them more intensively. That is not reason enough to abolish MICOM and set up two new commands," Tate said.

"We may begin doing things just as we have in the past and there are many things that do not need to be changed, but we are going to be looking for a better way constantly . . . That's exactly what made MICOM such a special outfit. It always found better ways."

Acknowledging the new organizational structure has had a

"very high price in personnel turbulence," Tate said: "All of us in MIRADCOM are going to do everything we possibly can to stabilize our people situation."

"We, and I mean everyone in the command and I know General Turnmeyer feels just as strongly about this in the Readiness Command, we need time to let the water settle, get folks calmed down and at work . . ."

Tate touched on several procurement related topics. Among them:

—Transplanting European technology that can meet Army missile requirements such as now being done with U.S. Roland, will probably expand to other programs.

—MIRADCOM may attempt Should Cost studies in R&D contracts or something similar to get a better handle on development costs.

—His command will concentrate on doing "a better job of contracting on a relatively limited number of contracts", putting its best talent on potentially long term, high dollar value awards.

—Manufacturing Methods and Technology, an R&D effort on ways to make missiles, will get a lot of attention.

—Industry can expect further efforts to get it involved in the very early stages of missile R&D efforts. Tate cited recent industry participation in the concept phase of GSRS as an example of what he hoped to do more of in the future.

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### Awards Banquet

The Alabama Section of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics will conduct its 25th Annual Awards Banquet, Saturday, January 29 at Michael's Restaurant.

Among those slated to receive recognition are John P. Leonard, Missile Research and Development Command.

Featured speaker for the evening will be Dr. Darell B. Harmon, Jr. discussing "UFO's: What Can We Learn?"

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# Approved for Development

The Missile Command has received Department of Defense approval to develop the General Support Rocket System (GSRs), a new multiple launch field artillery rocket system planned for the 1980's.

Colonel Kenneth Heitzke, GSRs Project Manager Designee, said MICOM is preparing a Request for Proposal to solicit from industry detailed approaches for developing the free flight artillery rocket system for the Army.

"Present planning calls for MICOM to award competitive contracts for the Advanced Development of GSRs in June," Heitzke said.

The Defense Systems Acquisition Review Council authorized GSRs development earlier this month after reviewing a study group's presentation of what the system is, what it will do, why the Army needs it, and what the system will cost.

GSRs is intended to be a simple, rugged, reliable artillery rocket system which can be deployed rapidly and deliver a high volume of fire. Present Army concepts envision a mobile, tracked launcher vehicle carrying several rockets which can be fired in rapid succession.

"We're looking for a system which will provide non-nuclear, rapid, indirect fire support. The system will supplement cannon artillery when targets such as artillery, troops and light material appear rapidly and in

great quantities," Heitzke said. "We have nothing in the field like it."

MICOM, which has conducted extensive research in free flight rocketry in laboratories here, awarded concept definition studies in March in last year to Boeing, Emerson Electric, Martin Marietta, Northrop and Vought Corporation for technical approaches to the GSRs.

MICOM engineers say the GSRs design will accommodate conventional munitions and have a growth potential that might even accommodate future terminal homing as technology evolves.

The GSRs Project Office is located in Bldg. 7120.

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





# Conflict of Interest Restated

WASHINGTON — As one of his last official acts, outgoing Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld announced Jan. 19 that he had signed a complete restatement of DOD Standards of Conduct, the most comprehensive changes since 1967.

Secretary Rumsfeld said changes in DOD Directive 5500.7 seek to eliminate conflicts of interest and ensure that all DOD personnel stick to the legal and ethical standards demanded of those in government service.

His action formalized improvements in policy and procedure which, for the most part, had been implemented piece meal throughout the past year.

Major revisions in DOD Directive 5500.7 include:

## FINANCIAL INTERESTS

The Financial Interests Statement (DOD Form 1555) now requires DOD people to report:

—All relevant transactions during the year between annual reports.

—Continuing interests in previous employers, such as termination payments and re-employment understandings.

—More detailed information as to real estate interests.

—Interests in commodities.

Procedures for reviewing financial interest statements have been tightened. All supervisors throughout the Department of Defense, for example, must review the financial interest statements of their subordinates, something previously required

only in some DOD components. Personnel who file financial interest statements must disqualify themselves from performing duties which might affect contractors in which they have an interest.

Also, all required financial interest statements must be now filed and reviewed prior to hiring civilian personnel, including special government employees.

## GRATUITIES

The prohibition against the acceptance of gratuities and the exceptions to those prohibitions have been clarified and made more restrictive, particularly in the area of associations. Only bona fide official participants in association functions may, for example, now have their travel, accommodations, and subsistence paid for by the association. This does not change the present exception for attendance at local dinners, luncheons, and gatherings sponsored by associations and approved in advance by DOD.

## INFORMATION

The revised directive now requires that all DOD personnel other than some enlisted military members, be briefed on the Standards of Conduct, receive a copy of the Standards of Conduct, and acknowledge their receipt and understanding of the Standards. These requirements are to be performed by DOD personnel prior to hiring or assumption of duty.

Spec. 4 Aaron P. Veltkamp, who teaches Nike missile launcher repair at the Missile and Munitions Center and School, has been selected Post Soldier of the Month for January.

He was selected by a board of command sergeants Major on the basis of appearance, and knowledge of military subjects, current events and world affairs.

Veltkamp was also selected Instructor of the Quarter for Nike Division. The specialist left Redstone Thursday for reassignment in Germany.

"It's important to set continually higher goals for yourself," Veltkamp said before departing. "When I get to Germany my next goal will be to get my degree. I firmly believe in the phrase whatever's worth doing is worth doing right."

Veltkamp, 19, is the son of Robert and Ester Veltkamp of Port Angeles, Wash. He attended Port Angeles Senior High and took courses at Calhoun College here.

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# It Was Cold Outside

As the weather warmed slightly after weeks of record low temperature, cold-caused problems continued unabated for the Plumbing Shop here. "We'll be another month or six weeks getting all the freeze damage fixed", a plumbing supervisor said Monday.

The plumbing problems began over New Years weekend as severe cold moved in, freezing up or bursting many pipes and leaving buildings without water, heat and, in several cases, ceilings, which collapsed after overhead pipes burst. Three plumbers handling the emergencies had to work 17 hours on each of the three days of the holiday weekend.

There was another freeze the following weekend, causing even more damage while plumbers were still trying to thaw pipes, repair leaks and restore water and heat to buildings that had been without it as long as a week in some cases.


But in the second and succeeding freezes damage was held down by keeping heat on in buildings.

At the Motor Pool cold caused hard-starting problems, especially with diesel trucks and buses. In freezing weather it is not unusual for as many as half the school bus fleet to fail to start, said Johnny Qualls, who heads the Motor Pool. But, said Qualls, mechanic John Newby arrives early and gets them started by pushing or boosting in time for them to begin leaving out shortly after 6 a.m.

The classified document

shreader is running a couple of days behind schedule because of the cold. It freezes and a fire truck has to spray it with water until it thaws.

Crews at Roads and Grounds Section logged long hours last week putting down salt and sand on icy roads. "The main thing in trying to keep the roads clear is getting started at the right time. It's like a ball game, you can't wait until you get behind to start playing", says Byrum Collier, section chief. With the first snow fall last week Collier's crew came to work at 4 a.m. Tuesday. At the end of the day Collier went home, ate supper, came back to work at 7 p.m. and stayed on the job until 10 the next morning.

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

Cows pastured off Dodd Road wait around frozen water hole





# EER changes

## Evaluation No Longer Needed

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — MILPERCEN has announced several major changes to the enlisted evaluation reporting system. Some of the changes began January 1, and the rest will become effective when the change to chapter 8, AR 600-200 gets to the field in March.

As of January 1, a DA Form 2166-5, Enlisted Evaluation Report will no longer be submitted for personnel below the grade of E-4.

An initial report is required when a soldier is promoted to E-4, if he or she has not previously had report submitted. If the soldier has received an EER in grade E-3 or below, the individual will receive another EER only after promotion to E-4, on an annual basis, or upon a change of rater.

Rating schemes developed in units or sections are now required to include all

soldiers in the grade of E-3 and above. This is to insure that the rater, indorser and reviewer will have been designated when an E-3 is promoted to E-4, prior to submission of the initial report.

Another major change allows soldier supervisors in the grade of E-5 to rate soldiers in the grades of E-3 and below.

Annual reports will be submitted according to a new schedule: E-4 - September, E-5 - August, E-6 - June, E-7 - April, E-8 - February, E-9 - December. There is the possibility of a change in the reporting month for the E-4 EER, MILPERCEN officials said. This would reduce the number of E-4 and E-5 reports submitted within a 30 to 60 day period.

The printed change to AR 600-200 will outline other changes in the Enlisted Evaluation Reporting System and will be effective upon receipt.

## Theater Prices Up

DALLAS, TEX., (ARNEWS) — Post theaters will be charging more for admission starting January 25, according to AAFES officials.

Adult tickets in AAFES theaters worldwide rose to \$1 or \$1.50. Prices for children under 12 continue at one-half the adult rate. This higher rate will be charged for some of the new releases on the circuit.

I can well imagine that the team caught holy hell from Coach Santaliz, nevertheless some things went wrong Saturday and Sunday that could only have been obvious to those not directly involved with team play.

The first thing is the way the team was utilized. It was an echo of football season, where in far too many cases the same people are used throughout the entire game.

A handful of players were driven almost to the point of collapse, while other players with good potential are left warming their chair. This situation does the team little good.

The few who are played are good, it can't be denied. Yet because they are worked like plowhorses they tired quickly, and many needless errors were made on the court.

Why don't more players get utilized? Could it be the coach is too shaky to use anyone but his stars? The fans hope not.

True, when some players are put in for the first time they make mistakes. This is to be expected. But it will get worse as the season goes on if they are not offered the chance to play with the team under the real pressures of a game.

This situation could easily be taken care of. Just give more team members the opportunity to play.

Using only a handful of players also drags down team morale. Men who are good enough to play post basketball get discouraged when they're used as seat warmers all season.

Santaliz should start using all the players to their full capacity before the team goes to Ft. Knox for the TRADOC games, lest they run the risk of getting blown off the court by other teams with wiser coaches.

The second problem that could easily be resolved is the need for an assistant coach. In the newspaper business all writers are subject to scratch outs and rewrites by an editor who is able to look more objectively at a story. An assistant coach could work much in the same capacity. He would be able to see the team with a viewpoint different from the head coach's and offer suggestions for improving the team's playing ability.

The Rockets have good players. All of them have potential to become some of the finest basketball players this post has seen in a long time. Their desire to win is there, as is the inborn knowledge of what they should do. It is a team that should make the entire post proud. Hopefully minor changes will be instituted that will give them a winning season.
