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Black History

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Rockets Win

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LTD Used In Joint Tests

Army and Air Force laser equipment is compatible and performed remarkably well in close air support tests recently concluded at Gila Bend, Arizona.

The Army's 14-pound Laser Target Designator (LTD) was used to designate targets for the Air Force's A-10 close support fighter.

The A-10 is equipped with a Pave Penny laser seeker which enables the pilot to detect, identify and engage targets illuminated by laser energy.

During two weeks of joint tests in the Arizona desert, Army and Air Force personnel designated parked aircraft, trucks, anti-aircraft guns, and tanks on a simulated airfield. The A-10s, flying at altitudes from 50 to 5,000 feet, made a variety of runs dropping practice smoke bombs, 500-pound laser guided bombs and strafing runs using the aircraft's 30mm cannon.

"Tests were highly successful," said Colonel John Reeve, Project Manager for Precision Laser Designators in the Army Missile

Research and Development Command at Redstone.

Several night missions were conducted during which the planes engaged and hit targets

invisible to the pilots. Since the LTD did not have a night sight, the A-10s dropped flares, enabling observers to see and designate targets.

"Night missions were just about as successful as day," said Major Ray Benson, R&D coordinator for Precision Laser Designators who (See LTD page 5)

65 and 55

Thermostat settings in Army buildings here are being lowered to 65 degrees as a fuel conservation measure.

President Carter ordered the new thermostat setting for all federal buildings. It is three degrees cooler than the previous temperature standard for heating.

Families living in quarters on post are being urged to maintain 65 degree daytime and 55 degree nighttime temperatures called for in the presidential announcement.

Family housing presently is the only part of the arsenal heated with natural gas. That to all other buildings has been cut off due to the severe shortage, and fuel oil is being burned instead.

Thermostats in warehouse buildings are being cut back to 55 degrees.

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New Aide

Captain Douglas Schultz has been selected as aide-de-camp to MG George Turnmeyer, commander of the Readiness Command. The captain was formerly assigned to MMCS.

Schultz, an ROTC student, graduated from Hofstra University in Hempstead, NY and served as an infantry officer in Europe and Vietnam. Then he attended the Chemical Officer Career Course at Fort McClellan, later served as a chemical officer with NORAD in the U.S. and the 130th Engineer Brigade in Europe. Last year he came to MMCS as a scores analyst.

After two days on his new job, Captain Schultz was not yet sure what to think about it. "Ask me again," he says, "in about a month when I've had a chance to get my feet on the ground."

The captain finds his view from the top to be a startlingly new perspective. He gave a personal example: "While I was in infantry, I fired the old LAW weapon maybe thirty times, mostly in training, several times in anger. Then I was in the

position to just say, 'Hand me one,' and worry about shooting it. Now I'm here watching the development of its successor, Viper. I'm getting a whole new outlook on how a thing like this works, how well, and why that's important."

Schultz spends much of his

spare time "puttering" with a 1963 Volkswagen, trying to "make it go" proudly adds: "It ran all last week." When his duty and his wife's studies permit (she's a full-time accounting student at UAH), they and their two children camp and travel.

The job requires tact. He's

learning fast.

Sample: "I think it's the ladies who really make things run around here. We soldiers come and go, but they're always here to give you the answers and tell you where things are. They're the ones a story should be written about."

research and development programs.



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Soldiers who received a Dislocation Allowance during calendar year 1976 must report it as taxable income on both the long and short form tax returns.

DA legal officials say that if the soldier reports DLA on the short form it increases the total amount of taxable income, meaning more

taxes. If DLA is reported on the short form, moving expenses associated with a PCS should first be subtracted from the taxable income shown on the W-2 form. This would balance the amount of the DLA.

When reporting taxes on the long form, the soldier must list the DLA as taxable income but can itemize

moving expenses as deductions.

Officials went on to say that some soldiers in the past have considered Separation Allowance as taxable income. This is not the case. Separation Allowance is not taxable and need not be reported to the Internal Revenue Service.

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

represented the Army for the tests. "Results were excellent. There was little or no reduction in night accuracy."

On several runs, two designators were used to mark different targets for individual fighters. The equipment, operating on different codes, permitted each aircraft to engage a specific target with maximum effectiveness.

The Army LTD equipment in the tests was developed by the

Electronics Command but subsequently transferred to the Research and Development Command here which has tri service responsibility for development and management of all ground laser equipment. In addition to the LTD, the Laser Designators Office is developing the Ground Laser Locator Designator (GLLD) and unit for the Marines called Modular Universal Laser Equipment (MULE).

Hughes Aircraft Company is prime contractor for the laser designator which provides day or night guidance for missiles, bombs and artillery shells equipped with laser seekers.

Laser Designator Classes

The first of two training classes with Army laser equipment that can guide missiles, bombs and conventional artillery fitted with a laser seeker has begun at Redstone.

Approximately 18 students are currently attending classes here to learn how to operate and maintain the Ground Laser Locator Designator (GLLD) and the AN, TAS-4 night sight that will be used with the system.

The second training session begins April 1.

The Precision Laser Designators Office, under Colonel John Reeve, Project

Manager, has scheduled the training in preparation for operational and development tests with the GLLD.

Training is conducted by instructors from Hughes Aircraft Company, prime contractor for ground laser equipment, under the auspices of the Maintenance Directorate's New Equipment Training Division. The training program is managed by Lt. Col. Fred Maksimowski, Chief of Precision Laser's System Support Division.

Some students subsequently will operate and maintain the equipment, some will become instructors, and a few will collect and analyze test data.

Pocket Size Passports Being Issued

Passports are now being issued in a small size to conform with international standards, according to U.S. Passport Office officials.

The new size 4.92 x 3.47 inches, will fit pockets and purses more easily and will

expedite inspection at ports of entry and border crossings. Other changes include the elimination of data on height, and the color of hair and eyes.

Officials expect the reduction in size to save

taxpayers \$200,000 per year in printing costs.

The new passports will not be issued as replacements for older passports except upon expiration of the older passports. (ARNEWS)

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

Early Trip to Dentist Important

(This is the fourth in a series of five articles on dental health published by the Rocket, in cooperation with the Redstone Dental Activity, in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, this week).

I want to make sure that my two-year-old son has good teeth all his life. When should I take him to the dentist for the first time and how should I prepare him for this first visit?

A child should visit the dentist before all of his

primary teeth have appeared. The average child will have his full set of 20 primary teeth by the age of two or two and a half. Because these are so important to a child's future well-being and appearance, it is important that they be well taken care of.

You can help your child develop a positive attitude about this first trip to the dentist that will influence his feelings about dental care throughout life. You will want to explain in a very general way what the child

can expect. For example, the dentist will examine the child's teeth. He may also clean them and take X-ray pictures to detect any hidden dental problems.

These early examinations are important because surveys show that 50 per cent of two-year-old children have one or more decayed teeth.

During the first visit, the dentist will discuss with you

a program for regular dental care for your child, scheduling future visits to meet individual needs. Twice a year may be sufficient for some children, whereas closer supervision may be necessary for others.

By helping the child establish a friendly relationship with the dentist, you can eliminate fears that could lead to his neglecting needed dental care later on in life.

SP4 Jane Mills, HHC Mircom—"I think the staff could use a lot of improvements. The doctors are good but the nurses have a bad attitude. Very sarcastic."



SP4 Andy Arellanro, HHC Mircom—"I think most of those screeners don't know what they're doing. I think their service could be improved greatly."



SP5 Dennis Dalgill, 8th SC—"If there is something wrong with you they'll take care of it. They sort of run you through like a machine, filling out a program sheet. It's greatly improved over when I was stationed here in '73."



SP5 Joyce Elmore, Company C—"I think they should have a better system for sick call. They shouldn't have a specified time for Army people to go there. If something is wrong with someone, he might not be able to get on sick call early in the morning. I think the hospital has a nice set-up, except if you go there they only take care of certain areas while you have to return to the dispensary for the remainder of them. They need a more centralized system, but on the whole it's fine."



SSG George Murch, Company C—"I think medical care is adequate for just minor ailments or emergencies, but they don't have any facilities for follow-up care and long-range treatment. It doesn't seem these medical people here have any established program with any medical facilities in Huntsville. They have real good facilities downtown and you would think they could work out a reciprocal agreement with the people here on post."



SP4 Gus Jicha, Company C—"The only time I use it is for myself, and the times I've used it everything has gone smoothly."

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Rockets Win

Pouring in 23 points, nine of them in a third-quarter explosion, Terry Adams swept the Redstone Rockets to a 97-65 victory over Lakewood Baptist last Sunday night at the post gym.

The Rockets' first win in almost a month came against the top team in Huntsville's YMCS League and boosted Redstone's record to 2-3. Ft. McClellan fell to Redstone 87-79 in the second game of a double bill Jan. 16.

The Rockets staged a 20-point blitz in the first quarter that limited Lakewood to four field goals. Lewis Lockett led the attack, scoring eight points on three field goals and two free throws.

Recovering in the second, the Baptists managed 16 off C. White (three field goals and a like number of free throws), A. Whitman, Williams and Harris. But the Rockets swept past them all the same. Terry Adams netted eight points and Ernest Hobson got six, pushing the halftime score to 43-24.

Supercharged Redstone sustained the drive in the third as Adams tallied nine

points. John Chandler sunk three field goals, and Archie Carter and Willie Rice posted two each to round out the scoring. A Lakewood steamroller made up of Harris, J. Nelson and E. Newby, tallying six points apiece, failed to crease the Rocket landslide.

The home team's spurt slackened in the final quarter as Lakewood posted 21 points against the Rockets' 25. But by now Redstone could afford to relax and watch Harris score seven and Williams six for a visiting squad doomed to defeat.

Chandler scored six points on field goals and two on free throws to pace the Redstone finish. Marc Hulse netted three field goals.

Trailing Adams in double figures for the Rockets was Rice with 15, Chandler with 14 and Lockett with 11. Heading the losers was Harris with 16.

The Rockets face Ft. Gordon twice this weekend at the post gym. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. Sunday.

Alabama Waterfowl Hunters Benefit from Modification

Waterfowl hunters in the Tennessee Valley of North Alabama will not be compelled to use shot shells loaded with iron rather than lead pellets during the 1977-78 season.

Dr. Robert Smith of the federal bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife confirmed that last week. It may turn out that duck and goose hunters here will never have to convert to shells with non-toxic soft iron shot.

The bureau originally proposed in 1974 to compel waterfowl hunters to adopt the soft iron shot as a substitute for lead loads. Opposition to that stance brought modification last year and the bureau said it would begin in the 1976-77 season to implement the change.

It did, requiring soft iron loads in specified geographic zones on the Atlantic flyway, eastern most of the four main

waterfowl migratory routes within the United States. At the same time, the bureau set 1977-78 as the year to extend the soft iron law to the Mississippi Flyway which includes Alabama.

Dr. Smith said in a telephone interview last week however that the specified zones in the Mississippi flyway will include only counties where the annual duck kill exceeds 20,000 birds. That excludes all of North Alabama.

Smith said individual states have the option of imposing the iron shot rule, but added that Alabama—unlike Michigan, Maryland and some others—has not indicated any desire to impose a state-wide change to the iron shot.

Soft iron vs lead has been a raging controversy among waterfowl hunters, conservationists and game management people for a decade. The spent lead shot

from standard shot shells, settle to the floor of shallow water marshes and other areas used by ducks. Birds feeding on roots, seeds, and grain sometimes ingest the lead pellets. One or two shot in the gizzard of a duck eventually prove fatal.

Convinced that the annual loss caused by lead poisoning amounted to hundreds of thousands of waterfowl, the bureau first proposed a complete ban on lead shells. It settled for zones within flyways as a compromise after opposition developed to the original proposal.

Shot shells loaded with soft iron pellets have been difficult to buy and much more expensive than the standard lead loads.

Dr. Smith said that the bureau might require iron shot in some counties in North Alabama in 1978-79 by reducing the cutoff point from an annual kill of 20,000 ducks to 10,000. That decision will not be made until late 1977.

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Firebee No Puzzle for Patriot

Patriot intercepted a maneuvering Firebee drone flying in a countermeasures environment in the latest and most complex flight test of the Army's new air defense system at White Sands Missile Range, N. M.

Overcoming countermeasures generated by an Air Force jet flying directly in line with the target, Patriot's tactical Firing Platoon No. 1 (FP-1), guided the missile to intercept even though the drone attempted a last second evasive maneuver.

Major General Charles F. Means, Patriot Project Manager said all test objectives were accomplished.

It was only the second Army test utilizing FP-1 (radar, engagement control station, and launcher) but the 16th fully guided Patriot flight thus far in the program.

The drone was flying at medium range and altitude. The missile was fired from a tactical prototype launcher.

Patriot is currently in a 49-

month-long, \$425 million engineering development program that began last August. Under the contract, Raytheon Company, the prime contractor, will design, build and test three additional sets of tactical Patriot equipment for the Army and will provide documentation to support initial production.

Patriot will be the cornerstone of field Army air defense against medium to high altitude targets in the sophisticated, highly technical land warfare environment

predicted for the 1980s and beyond. Being developed to replace both Hawk and Nike Hercules, Patriot features a high skill probability and fast reaction time, and can handle saturation attacks against highly maneuvering targets in an intense countermeasures environment.

Martin Marietta Corporation is principal subcontractor to Raytheon, responsible for the missile, canister and launcher and Thiokol Company is subcontractor for the single stage solid propulsion unit.

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
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First Soldier Fires Patriot

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE — A fire control operator has become the first soldier to fire the Patriot air defense missile.

In a recent development test, Sergeant John Pearce fired the missile and it intercepted a drone within the lethal distance of its warhead.

Sgt. Pearce, assigned to Army Materiel Test and Evaluation directorate is working with Raytheon engineers learning to operate the Patriot system. He said he is happy to have experience.

"I lucked out," Pearce said. "Raytheon picked me to work with them, since I'm qualified to operate the Hawk and Hercules display and control consoles."

A graduate of the air defense artillery operations intelligence school at Ft. Bliss, he also attended fire distribution systems crewman school there.

Pearce looks forward to possibly being an instructor in the new system.

"I like Patriot," Pearce said. "It's a good system; easy to operate and effective."

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
