## Patriot Gets Big Intercept

For the first time ever, the Army's new Patriot air defense system intercepted a jet plane employing electronic countermeasures during a development test last week at White Sands.

Major General Charles F. Means, Patriot Project Manager, said the flight test, the toughest and most complex attempted thus far, was completely successful.

Overcoming jamming generated by the PQM 102 drone, Patriot's Firing Platoon No. 1 (FP-1), (first tactical prototype of the radar, engagement control station, and launcher) guided the missile to intercept against the target which was flying at long range and medium altitude.

For this test, the Army placed a second live missile on the prototype launcher, along with a ballasted missile and one expended canister, to simulate and evaluate typical launch conditions.

It was the fourth test utilizing FP-1 and the 17th fully guided flight thus far in the

## Tate Takes Nuclear Weapons Assignment

WASHINGTON — The Army today named Brigadier General Grayson D. Tate, Jr., now serving at Redstone Arsenal, to manage nuclear weapons research and testing for all the services beginning August 1.

The General will become Commander, Defense Nuclear Agency Field Command with headquarters at Kirtland Air Force Base near Albuquerque, N. M. The organization, a major element of the Defense Nuclear Agency, manages nuclear weapons research and testing for all U. S. forces.

Other elements of the Command are located at Los Alamos Scientific Laboratories, N. M.; Lawrence Livermore Laboratories at Livermore, California; Nevada Test Site at Mercury, Nevada and other test sites in the Pacific.

General Tate is now Commander of the Army Missile Research and Development Command. The Army did not name a successor.

The General has been serving at Redstone Arsenal since April 1974 when he took over direction of the Lance missile program as a Colonel. On October 1, 1975, he became Deputy

Commander of the former Army Missile Command and assumed special responsibilities for planning to set up the Missile Research and Development Command.

He became MIRADCOM's first Commander when it was activated January 31 in a major realignment of Army missile management operations at Redstone which abolished the Missile Command.

The General's present command manages research, development, testing and first procurement of U. S. Army missiles and rockets.

A 1950 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, General Tate's 27 years of

service have included several assignments with field artillery missiles as well as in weapons research and development. He was a Battery Commander in the Army's first missile battalion in the early 50's, commanded a Sergeant missile battalion in 1965 and the U. S. Army 4th Missile Command in Korea in 1971.

He holds a Master's Degree in Aeronautical Engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology and is also a graduate of the Command and General Staff College, Armed Forces Staff College and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

Born in Mickey, Texas, the General attended high school in Denver City, Texas. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Tate, live in Denver City.

General Tate is married to the former Ann Hashagen. They have four children, Debra, Randy, Lauren and Lisa.

## Graduates Get SQT Manuals

Soldiers graduating from certain AIT courses are now receiving Soldier's Manuals before they ship out to their new units, according to TRADOC.

Graduates of such courses as the Maneuver Combat Arms, Military Police, certain Air Defense MOS-producing courses and other specialties within Enlisted Personnel Management Group I are already receiving the manuals. As more of the manuals are completed, the AIT distribution method will be widened, said TRADOC officials.

The manuals are the soldier's personal guidebooks to job proficiency. They describe all the critical skills necessary to perform on the job. Each manual also includes detailed information on standards of performance as well as complete reference data on where more information can be obtained.



**WHY?**  
Why can't I live off-post?

Redstone may be one of the few places in the entire Army where soldiers ask that question. It's not that Army housing here is bad. Compared to other posts, it's good. The reason is that Huntsville is an attractive community and homes and apartments here within the price range of many military families are far beyond their means in towns near many other Army posts.

Many soldiers and their families prefer to live in government quarters for all the traditional reasons: the closeness of the military community, proximity to the job, security, economy, services not available to their civilian neighbors. If those reasons are not for you—and you have no special circumstances such as an unusually large family or upcoming retirement—then the bottom line goes about like so:

The taxpayers built housing for you and your family because the Army told them you need it. Having provided the housing, they expect soldiers to live in it. You can argue the point, but housing on this post is adequate. It meets the standards set in Army regulations.

While government housing stands empty, the public trust cannot be double dipped to allow you to draw BAQ to go downtown and buy or rent.

On the other hand, while government housing is full, you can draw BAQ and do your thing.

Which makes whether you live on post or off a game of more than a little chance. A lot depends on the day and the local circumstances when you show up at the housing office. The staff at the housing office is not there to hassle soldiers and their families. They are there to help you any way they can, just so they do it within Army regulations and uphold the public trust.

They do their job very well, which is why they cannot please all of the people all of the time.

## Port Call via Toll Free Phone

WASHINGTON (AR-NEWS) — A soldier home on emergency leave or TDY no longer has to look for a phone with AUTOVON to get a return port call. The Military Traffic Management Command has set up a toll-free telephone number for quick and easy port call service.

Previously, soldiers had to travel to the nearest military installation to get a port call. They can now call from home, and the Army will pick up the tab.

In addition, the number is used by group movements and recruits when they experience problems while traveling. Recruits will be furnished the telephone number by the Armed Forces Examining and Entrance Station. Group

movement leaders can get the number from the local transportation officer.

Soldiers who need a port call are requested to call during normal duty hours. Staff duty officers and other after-hours officers can only accept the information and pass it on to regular staffers who enter the data into MAC's computer to obtain a port call.

Soldiers are encouraged to get port calls as early as possible. If a soldier requests a port call with less than 48 hours remaining on leave, he is advised to report to the APOE. When he arrives there, his leave is terminated and his status is changed to "duty."

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# Only 'Miracle' Will Stay RIF

RIF-weary Redstone braced for another round this week.

Barring a miracle, reduction in force procedures will be needed to complete the latest round of average grade, high grade and people cuts ordered to meet new ceilings.

With one RIF already behind them in FY 77, Redstone workers were not looking for miracles in this soggy Spring.

Commanders in both MIRCOCM and MIRADCOM have decided they must use RIF procedures to comply with orders to get to new ceilings by September 30.

Managers in both major Army missile management organizations were planning how to handle their share of the command wide cuts ordered by the Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command late last month.

Yet to come is the realignment of position structures, then the use of RIF procedures to move people into new jobs. Indications this week are that a lot of people and a lot of jobs would be involved in downgrades and bumping.

It will be several weeks before the impact can be assessed in terms of total downgrades or worse and months before individual workers will know what will happen to them, but the dimensions of the problem can be seen clearly elsewhere in today's issue in the complete breakout of new ceilings set for MIRCOCM, MIRADCOM, Patriot and other project offices and the reductions required to get there by Sept. 30.

While Redstone tried to live with its share of the cuts ordered last year throughout DOD in a move to reduce steadily rising federal personnel costs, there were a few faint signs of hope on what otherwise is a uniformly gloomy horizon.

Congress last week gave President Carter the authority he wants to reorganize federal agencies. The bill gives him the authority to submit re-organization plans to Congress.

The plans go into effect unless rejected within 60 days by the House or Senate.

Partly because of the President's well known no-one-will-get-hurt-in-the-reorganization statement, and partly because some members of Congress are genuinely concerned that many federal employees are indeed about to get hurt, there are several pieces of proposed legislation being handed about Washington for comment.

All of them are aimed at giving some protection to downgraded federal workers over and above the two years saved pay they now have.

Among the proposals being considered according to Washington reports:

—Rep. Herbert Harris a Virginia Democrat—has a bill in the house that would save both the pay and the grade of individuals whose jobs are downgraded, provided the person in the job had been

there for three years or more.

—Rep. Robert Nix, a Pennsylvania Democrat, is preparing a bill that would allow downgraded employees to keep both grade and pay as long as they continue in the same position. The job would be downgraded when the incumbent leaves.

—The Office of Management and Budget is staffing among federal agencies for comment, a proposed bill that would allow individuals downgraded to keep their current salary. Each time there is a general federal pay raise, the people in downgraded jobs would get on half the raise. Over a period of years, this would eventually bring their pay to the lower grade avoiding any sudden pay cut.

## Flood Alert

The Tennessee Valley Authority alerted Army officials at Redstone shortly after noon Monday to anticipate some local flooding from the Tennessee River by nightfall.

TVA said the river would reach flood stage at the arsenal — level 560 measured at the Water Treatment Plant near the Military Recreation Area — by nightfall Monday.

Assuming Monday's heavy rains end as predicted and no further heavy rains occur in the valley, TVA said the river would crest at level 562.8 — almost three feet above flood stage — at midnight Wednesday and fall gradually through the rest of the week.

The Facility Engineer said the water would compell closing some river front recreation areas but was not expected to interfere with work or close roads.

Redstone's record river crest came four years ago at 569.7, a flood that set a 200 year record in the valley.

# Committee Restores Hawk, Lance Funds

The House Armed Services Committee restored funds for Hawk and Lance but recommended cuts for four missile research and development programs at Redstone in the first crack Friday at President Carter's FY 78 defense budget.

The committee, in a Washington press release, said it restored \$77.7 million for 360 non-nuclear Lance missiles; \$35.3 million for Hawk equipment; and \$5 million to raise the Hawk R&D total to approximately \$17.5 million.

Elsewhere, the committee ordered cuts to the General Support Rocket System from approximately \$30.1 to \$15 million; to the Advanced Forward Area Air Defense System from \$24.2 to \$10 million; Precision Laser Designators from \$5.3 to \$4.1 million; and Hellfire from \$50 to \$25 million.

House recommendations now go to the Senate Armed Services Committee and subsequently to joint House-Senate conference. The appropriations committees of both house and senate have yet to act.

# Schools Merger

WASHINGTON — The Army has gone back to the drawing board for yet another "study and evaluation" of the long-proposed consolidation of the Ordnance Center and School and the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

The school consolidation was one of several proposed actions the Army told members of Congress Monday that had been handed back from DOD for further study.

Text of the Army announcement to Congress follows:

"As Secretary Brown announced February 22, both he and President Carter are convinced that additional opportunities exist for improving the efficiency and effectiveness of the Defense establishment. The goals of the military establishment must be to insure that U. S. military forces are fully adequate but at the same time lean and efficient.

"The new administration intends to take a careful look at the support structure, headquarters and other overhead operations, manpower costs and the base structure in the U. S. and abroad.

"Accordingly the realignment studies on the proposed closures of Ft. Hamilton and Ft. Totten, N.Y., Ft. Story, Va.; the proposed realignment of Ft. Detrick, Md., and the proposed consolidation of the Ordnance Center and School at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and the Missile and Munitions Center and School at Redstone Arsenal, Ala. have been returned to the Army by the Deputy Secretary of Defense for further evaluation and study.

"These evaluations will require a number of months to complete."



Patriot program. The three earlier FP-1 firings were accomplished in a countermeasures environment but against "quiet" targets.



**Patriot roars skyward in successful test at White Sands Missile Range**



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


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
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# Good Ideas Pay Off Big



**FEWER SPECS MEAN SAVINGS** — Reuben L. Dunlap was awarded \$1,270 for suggesting a management action that reduced the requirement to prepare development specifications on the U.S. Roland air defense missile system from 22 each to three each. His suggestion award was based on estimated first year tangible savings of \$166,250. Dunlap is a data management specialist in the U.S. Roland Project Office.



**MONEY SAVER** — Brimage L. (Bud) Smith shows the valve he suggested modifying to expedite surveillance testing of Shillelagh subsystems. His modification allowed continuous assessment of propulsion system components' performance without interrupting the test of vital parameters due to nonavailability of hot gas relief valves. The reuse of the existing valves saves procurement expense and prevents delay in testing. He received an award of \$1,165 based on estimated first year tangible savings of \$92,920. Smith is a mechanical engineer in the MIRADCOM Engineering Laboratory.

## How would you make Redstone a better place to work and live?




**Maj. William Benson, Co. C**—“As an ‘old timer’ here, I like Redstone. However, I feel that many off-duty activities for military personnel are severely underplayed. A new person on post must hunt for activities to see if they exist. Attempts to start new activities seem to be frustrated by people who say ‘Which regulation says we can’t do this,’ instead of, ‘How can we support this program and get it started?’ I’d like to see a more active approach to not only providing troop services, but publicizing what we do have so that everyone new and old knows what is available.”




**Lt. Raymond Montgomery, 5th SC**—“I would try and have a little more coordination between the school end of post and the other organizations. I think if we can make both military personnel and civilians more aware of each others’ problems and needs, things would work out better. Particularly in the student areas there needs to be more flexibility in such places as finance and personnel. As far as facilities on post, there isn’t much we can do. I would implement a platoon leader program for student officers such as they have at Aberdeen Proving Ground. This program would help the young student officers, the platoon sergeants and the AIT’s. It would teach the young officers about the enlisted students, and would assist the platoon sergeants, and company commanders. This is one thing I’m really pushing.”

**Sgt. 1st Class Warren Aspinwall, Company B**—“Personally I like it here. The one major change I would make would be to put more emphasis on the military populace here and less on the civilian. In general, it seems to be a civilian post rather than an Army post. I would change it by giving the military more authority.”



**Sgt. 1st Class Joseph Hardiman, Company C**—“First thing I would do is reduce the civilian work force and return the post to a military installation. That’s all you need. The rest of the problems would solve themselves.”



**Spec. 4 Ronnie Harris, Company B**—“It would take a lot of doing. Get us some better medical facilities, and more activities for the younger soldier. They should move the EM club further away from the barracks because people get drunk and sometimes fights start in the barracks.”



**Sgt. 1st Class William Sharples, 5th SC**—“I don’t know how many civilians work on this post but they do make their living and spend a good deal of their time here, and since they are a part of the community they should get involved with it in their work areas. As far as military people go, try and get the people who live out here on the Arsenal, regardless of marital status, involved to make it a better community. Redstone Arsenal is a good place to live and work, but it could be better.”

The Engineering Technician field appears more challenging for her and Product Assurance is an area that has much to offer.


Porter is presently working in the Quality and RAM Engineering Division. She reviews and records statistical data and other information relating to engineering activities for statisticians and engineers.

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
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


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
# Allen Commands School Brigade

# New Chemical Course

The first class of chemical accident and incident control officers' course, which trains persons to deal with chemical spills, began March 29 at the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

The four-day course is open to officers above the rank of captain civilians GS-11 and above, senior chemical accident and incident control officers, and contingency planning staff members. However this requirement may be waived in some cases.

The course teaches characteristics of chemical agents and

hazardous chemicals, roles of accident control officers and uses of detection and identification equipment.

Students spend one day in field exercises practicing detection, identification and decontamination of toxic chemical agents.

The course capacity is 15 and classes will be taught quarterly, with the next one starting in June. Instructors for the course are from the school's Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Technical Escort divisions.



# BMDSCOM Job Cuts

The Army Friday announced a reduction in the number of jobs at BMDSCOM in Huntsville and several other locations of the U. S. Army Ballistic Missile Defense Organization.

The reductions take effect Sept. 30, with completion of work closing out the Safeguard Ballistic Missile Defense System in North Dakota and transferring operation of its long range Perimeter Acquisition Radar (PAR) to the Air Force, in compliance with congressional guidance.

BMDSCOM's authorized civilian strength in Huntsville will be reduced by 67 jobs, from 342 to 275. Forty-seven of the 67 jobs are occupied now.

However, the number of persons whose jobs will be abolished could be as few as 20 if it is determined that "functional transfer rights" provisions can be applied in transferring the PAR to the Air Force. If so, 27 of the 47, whose jobs have been devoted to managing operation of the PAR, would be

allowed to compete for positions within the Air Force activity to which their functions are transferred. In addition, elimination of a job that is occupied does not necessarily mean loss of work since the occupant may be considered for other positions within the command or other government agencies.

In North Dakota all 20 jobs at BMDSCOM's Safeguard Missile Site Radar facility will be eliminated. Thirteen are occupied. Six Government jobs will remain at the PAR Facility and be transferred to the Air Force. It has been determined that the persons now occupying those jobs will have functional transfer rights.

At the Kwajalein Missile Range operated by BMDSCOM in the Marshall Islands, a minor reorganization will eliminate 7 jobs, 5 of them occupied.

The reductions will be accomplished by attrition to the extent possible and will be conducted in accord with Civil Service procedures.

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# Judo Appeals to All Age Groups

Most people who do it love it. In Japan, they do it into their 70's and 80's. In America they're learning, and they're doing it more and more.

"It" is judo, the ancient Japanese art of self-defense without weapons. Judo, rapidly growing in popularity in this country, is already the favorite of the martial arts in the U.S. People young and old are getting into judo because it's great exercise, it's interesting, and it's fun.

On the Arsenal, the Redstone Judo Club sponsors a weekly judo class free to all military, active or retired, and to their dependents. As long as there are vacancies on the club roster, anyone in these categories can join.

The club, of which 13 military and 45 dependent youths are members, has an experienced instructor in M. Sgt. Mikhail J. Brown, who has earned a second degree black belt rating in the sport. Brown, a translator for MIRADCOM, taught judo at two other Army posts before coming here.

Brown says that while judo is great exercise, it also develops a person in other ways. "It's a sport that will improve your coordination and agility, and it helps to build confidence," he said.

As does training for other sports, the course here starts off with basic calisthenics. Next the student learns falls, important so he won't get hurt from being thrown. The third part of the program deals with mat techniques—hold downs, choke holds, and arm bars.

After these exercises are learned, the student goes into

throwing and counter moves. When the basic skills are learned well enough, students practice all the moves they have learned so they can improve their skills.

"We essentially teach sport judo, with frequent lessons in the self-defense aspect," said Brown. "There are tournaments to compete in, if you want to."

The AAU District Championships, for example, were held in December at the post gym. Participation in tournaments is not mandatory.

Brown teaches classes for all age levels, but the classes are held at two locations. The class for military is held at the gym twice a week. The dependents' class is held three times a week at the old post gas station, Bldg. 3197.

Military people interested in joining the club can sign up with sports director Ralph Santaliz. Children can sign up at the Dependent Youth Activities office, Bldg. 141.

If you want to know if the course is a good one, all you have to do is ask a judo student. Of the 13 soldiers in the program, four of them are junior officer, and three of those junior officers are women. They had nothing but praise for the sport and the instructor here.

"I like it, it's fun, and it's interesting. It's helping me to maintain my physical stamina," said Lt. Marie Martinucci, who has been in the course six weeks.

Lt. Julie Egbert, who has been in the class the same length of time, said, "It's great, it's a good way to keep fit, to let your frustrations out at the end of the


day. It's a great way to meet people also."

Another six-weeker, Lt. Michele Moore, said, "It's a really good course. Sergeant Brown is a really great instructor, and I've learned a lot. I've become more flexible. Actually, it seems like an easy way to exercise."

"It's good for the reflexes, it

builds up your muscles, you're able to react quicker," said Lt. Joseph Mirada, who has been in the course only two weeks. "I've learned a lot. It's not as mysterious as it used to seem."

Learning judo at Redstone won't cost you anything except a little time. No matter how you look at it, it's a good deal.

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# AUSA Has Membership Drive

Twin kickoff rallies spanning the weekend inaugurated an all-out membership drive at Redstone and throughout the Tennessee Valley area by the Association, U. S. Army.

The campaign is being waged over a three-month period with an overall objective of increasing the volume of the Army's voice in the Valley through a more vibrant Association.

Rallies were held in the two major Army commands at Redstone with the Commander of each sounding the keynote for a vigorous solicitation among members and those persons who for some reason or other are not presently supporting the national organization.

Colonel Michael Dooley, general chairman for the drive, said the Chapter is hoping to boost its membership rolls to 3,000 by the end of June.

"This calls for a lot of work, and will necessitate a person-to-person solicitation," the MIRADCOM Chief of Staff said. He noted that the campaign will have to re-enroll all of the 2,400 present members and add 600 more.

General Tate told the unit solicitors take time in explaining the work of AUSA in discussing membership with their fellow workers pointing out the efforts that regularly extended towards protecting their pay and benefits.

MG George E. Turnmeyer kicked off the drive in the Readiness Command on Monday morning indicating MIRCOM hopes to have at least 1,000 members signed up by the end of the drive.

The MIRCOM commander reviewed AUSA accomplishments over the past several years in support of the local mission and explained the organization's present objectives as they apply to the military and civilian population of the Tennessee Valley.

Both commanders told the workers to sell AUSA on its own merits citing the insurance programs and Army magazine as excellent selling points.

The Association makes available to members group health insurance and group life insurance plans that are both convenient and economical.

Army magazine, the monthly AUSA publication, is a leading journal of military thought and opinion and serves as a forum for the exchange of ideas for both the military and the civilian communities.

An AUSA membership includes a free subscription to Army.

Colonel Dooley is heading up a campaign team that includes a unit chairman for each of the Department of Army elements, the Marshall Center and another who will monitor the drive among industrial concerns in the area.



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# Three Way Split

WASHINGTON — The Army said recently that it will form three new commands to run communications and electronics acquisition and readiness.

Latest of the realignments within the Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command, it involves a three way split of the Army Electronics Command, will take three years to complete and eliminate 433 civilian jobs. A total of 22 military and 1,009 civilian jobs will be affected, the majority at Ft. Monmouth where 516 are slated to be transferred elsewhere and 224 eliminated.

The new command lineup will go like this:

Army Electronics R&D Command (ERADCOM) will be set up at Adelphi, Md., where the Harry Diamond Labs are now and will have all non-communications electronics R&D and acquisition functions. Most of the combat surveillance, target acquisition and electronic devices labs will remain at Ft. Monmouth but report to ERADCOM. Laser work and related technology will be

shifted from Monmouth and Adelphi to Ft. Belvoir.

Functions of the Electronics warfare lab now at Monmouth will be consolidated at Vint Hills Farms Station, Va., with R&D elements of the Army Security Agency now based there and others to be shifted there from Arlington Hall Station, Va.

Atmospheric sciences R&D work now done at Monmouth will move to the Atmospheric Science Lab at White Sands.

Army Communications R&D Command (CORADCOM) will be formed in FY 77 at Ft. Monmouth from portions of the Electronics Command and will also pick up functions associated with tactical computer software now with the Army Computer Systems Command at Belvoir.

Army Communications and Electronics Materiel Readiness Command (CERCOM) will handle all readiness functions, also be based at Monmouth, and will include all of the Electronics Command logistics elements there at Sacramento Army Depot and Ft. Huachuca.

# For Women, Too

## SGM ACADEMY

Recreation Services officials take strong issue with any notion that women are kept off unit teams by design because of inability to compete with men. "The intramural programs are open to all soldiers, male or female", stressed Major Jerry Roberts, Morale and Welfare Chief. "There is no 'unwritten policy' intended to keep anyone out of the programs for any reason. In fact, we encourage participation in the programs by women", Roberts said.

Women presently are playing on unit volleyball teams and have participated in intramural flag football and team handball.

Continuing, he said, "There is no reason why all who try out for a sport should not be allowed to play, except in

cases where there is a limitation on the size of the roster."

The reason a second program of womens' sports is maintained along with the other program is to give more women a chance to participate in a sport, and to allow them to participate in TRADOC an all-Army competition which presently is segregated according to sex, said SFC Bennie Hall, Recreation Supervisor.

The maintenance of all-woman teams—based on standards of the National Health Section for Grils' and Womens' Sports, a division of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation—is suggested in AR 28-1, Objectives of Army Sports and Athletic Training.

Women who participate in intramural unit competition try out and

compete on the same basis as men, according to Irv Lyles, Assistant Sports Director. "When we make up a sports S.O.P. we don't specify sex, just that a unit field a team. They hold tryouts, and the unit coach selects those who look best in the tryouts", Lyles said. "And that coach wants a winning team, regardless of what their sex may be," he added.

Those with questions concerning sports programs are invited to call the Recreation Services Officer (876-4050) or Chief, Morale and Welfare (876-5231).

With softball season just eight weeks away, Redstone sports officials are urging women soldiers to try out for unit level intramural teams.

Senior NCOs can receive up to 18 semester hours of college credit when they complete the non-resident course of the Army Sergeants Major Academy. A recent decision by the American Council on Education (ACE) makes it possible.

The ACE recommends that non-resident course graduates receive the credit in the upper division of the Baccalaureate Degree Program. This brings the non-resident course credits to the same level as the resident course. The ACE recommendation is retroactive and affects all graduates after July 1974.

In addition, the Academy is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges. Many colleges and universities recognize the credits in certain degree programs. (ARNEWS)

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





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# New Bloodmobile Program Starts

April will see the start of a new Red Cross Bloodmobile service to Redstone. A self-contained mobile unit will begin monthly visits to strategic locations on post to provide on-the-spot donation service, or "sidewalk service", on an appointment basis.

Says Eileen Hallock, Blood Program Coordinator, "During April the unit will be available for bosses only, Directors, Project Managers, Chiefs, Supervisors, and so on. We know they really do want to give, but can't always find time to wait in line. For this reason

we are making April 'Bosses Month' for the new program."

After April, anyone may make an appointment for sidewalk service on a space-available basis.

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# Army Chief Says Collective Bargaining Not Necessary

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Secretary of Defense Harold Brown testified before the Senate Armed Services Committee March 18 and cautioned against strong anti-union legislation.

In opening his statement before the Committee, Brown acknowledged the place of unions in America, "The union movement in our country has been an important contributor to our national security, vitality and strength," he said.


He went on to point out that the economic growth and stability of the nation is tied to labor and the unions, stating, "In this sense, labor and the Armed Forces share in assuring our national security."

Brown noted that unions and the military do not necessarily go together as a unit. Within the Department of Defense, there are many labor agreements that cover hundreds of thousands of civilian personnel. "However, it does not follow that the civilian process of collective bargaining as we know it can or should be applied to our military forces. I believe, and others including the President share my belief, that it cannot," he said.

Brown stated that the Armed Forces occupy a unique position in society and that they require specialized management as well as a uniquely high degree of discipline and sacrifice to perform properly.

"The relation between a member of the Armed Forces and his superiors, or between the soldier and the government, is not an employee, employer relationship," Brown stated. Getting to the heart of the matter he added that, "The functional role of our Armed Forces demands absolute certainty of immediate and total responsiveness to lawful orders . . . our military must be quickly and completely responsive to external threats."

## BROWN on UNIONS



The fundamentals of unionism cannot assure this type of response. At this point Brown explained why unions wouldn't work: "The collective bargaining process is fundamentally incompatible with this basic requirement (responsiveness). Collective bargaining, with its aspects of shared decision making and forms of consultation prior to action, cannot accord with the basic requirements of the military in the performance of its mission . . ."

Brown said that, as a layman, he needed to comment carefully on purely legal issues but insisted that, "...legislation would have to be examined carefully in light of the First Amendment's protections of speech and association. It may well be that the legal standing of legislative restrictions (on military unions) would vary

according to whether they were addressed to collective bargaining, to membership in a group, to solicitation of membership, or to the location or manner of such solicitation."

Brown said he didn't have the answers but, "Their existence, complexity and sensitivity suggest to me that caution should be exercised in any legislative action in this area." He also told the committee that adverse court decisions could mean greater limitations on the military's ability to deal with unionization than exist now.

Brown went on to say that the soldier has a number of channels to present problems to the chain of command and, "Undoubtedly improvements (of the system) are possible," he added.

The defense chief concluded by telling the Committee, "In this

context it is my view and that of the Department of Defense that a system of collective bargaining is neither necessary nor appropriate for the military."

He then recited the clause in the DoD policy directive on unions: "No member of the armed forces, or civilian employee of the Department of Defense, may negotiate or bargain on behalf of the United States, with respect to terms and conditions of military service of members of the armed forces, with any individual, organization or association which represents or purports to represent members of the armed forces; nor may members of the armed forces, or civilian employee of the Department of Defense, recognize any individual, organization or association for any such purpose."

## Craig Closing Confirmed

The Secretary of the Air Force announced last Wednesday the closing of Craig Air Force Base near Selma within six months as part of an economy move. An annual savings of \$24 million is expected from the closing.

Craig is one of three bases being shut down by the Air Force. The others are Kinchloe near Sault St. Marie, Michigan, and Webb at Big Spring, Texas.

Craig's mission is pilot training, but

enrollment is only a quarter of that five years ago. That, plus necessary upgrading expenses of \$36.5 million, were factors in the decision.

The shutdown will eliminate some 2,000 civilian jobs and depress the Selma economy by an estimated \$55 million, according to Selma officials.

The possible closing of Craig was announced over a year ago and has been under study since.

## Army Accepts TOW-Armed Anti-Armor Helicopter

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The Army has accepted the initial production model of its most modern anti-armor helicopter, the AH-1S Cobra. The aircraft, built by Bell Helicopter Textron, is the first of 148 presently on order.

The AH-1S is very different from the Cobra used by the Army in the Vietnam war. Improvements in the aircraft include arming it with the TOW missile system, an improved engine and power train, a flat canopy, and an improved cockpit.

Next year a new gun and turret will be added. A new fire control system is two years away, according to COL Charles Drenz, the AH-1S Project Manager.

Drenz said the objective of his office is to "modernize this bird so the guy in the field can fly it against the threat, if that threat should materialize on the battlefield. He can fly it against that threat, do his lethal

mission and get back. The next 304 of them (Army plans are for a total purchase of 305) will come off the line in a more modernized version."

The AH-1S is powered by an improved Lycoming T53-L-703 engine rated at 1,825 shaft horsepower. The drive train has a 1,308 horsepower intermediate power transmission and a 260 horsepower tail rotor drive.

The TOW missile system is considered by the Army to be among the most advanced deterrents to an enemy armored vehicle attack.

Bell Helicopter President James F. Atkins said the AH-1S development resulted from an Army decision to change the Cobra from a low intensity to a mid-intensity warfare aircraft. Atkins predicted that the AH-1S will be the Army's number one anti-armor weapon in Europe.

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

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
# Students See Calibration Labs

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
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# 35 Years Enough For Safety Boss

Tom Davidson decided that more than 35 years of government service is enough, and retired April 1.

He was the Safety Officer for MIRCOM.

"I want to do a lot of things and go a lot of places and I want to do them while I'm still in good health and young enough to enjoy my retirement," he said.

Reminiscing about his career, he said he started to work at Indiana Arsenal, Charlestown, Ind. in 1941, then came back there as a veteran after World War II.

"They weren't anxious to re-employ veterans, so gave me some strange jobs. I was told to bring my lunch, and wear old clothes. Each morning I was taken to an area and dropped off, carrying my lunch, a jug of water and a flashlight. I was to inspect gloomy buildings where propellants had been manufactured to determine the degree of contamination, then mark that on the buildings," he recalls.

"Another time I was the assistant supervisor of storage—a big title for a man who had a number of work crews moving cans of propellants—I was a labor boss."

In 1947 the Safety Officer at Indiana Arsenal offered Davidson a job in his office.

"He said he'd been watching me and thought he'd like me to work for him," Davidson said. "By then I was getting pretty disgusted with government service because of what they'd had me doing, and I wasn't sure I wanted to continue. At the time I knew nothing about Safety Offices or what they did—but I took the job."

Davidson says that he was surprised at the wide latitude of subjects Safety covers when he first went into it—accidents, environmental protection, health and medical matters. But he liked the work as he had always been interested in people and it was not routine.

From Indiana Arsenal he went to Jefferson Proving Ground, Ind. where all work was of a hazardous nature. They were testing guns and ammo, most of it new material that had never been tested before.

"I stayed there nine years," he said, "and it was the most interesting time of my career. When I was there we had up to 1800 people and had only one disabling accident from the proof testing."

"We got involved in community relations—it was a small community and there had been a number of young people killed in auto accidents. I helped organize a County Safety Council that developed a safe driving club and sponsored driving rodeos, cross country driving and driver education. We gave trophies for the best driving records in local high schools."

"Indiana required written drivers' tests each time a license was renewed. We put on a training program so people could pass the tests."

Then the Army started closing Jefferson Proving Ground. Chick Allbright, the Safety Officer at Redstone, had asked Davidson to come to the Arsenal several times to advise on tests, and offered him a job.

"So in 1958 I came to Redstone," Davidson said. "I had no idea what I was getting into. My first assignment was to cover safety in the Rohm and Haas and Thiokol areas. I was just one of the boys in the 27-man Safety Office."

When the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency was formed, Davidson became the chief of Safety Office with a staff of three engineers.

"Working with the Safety Office of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, we developed the first system safety program in the Army. We had to start from scratch to do it, but when we had it in shape, it worked well at Redstone. The problem was selling it to the Army. Finally in 1964 I made a presentation on it to DA and they bought it for use Army wide."

"Our first feedback on use of the program came from the Quartermaster. At the time the Quartermaster was buying the Army's field hospitals, and we were told that by use of the program and its systems analysis they were able to save half a million dollars and spot problems they'd never spotted before."

"There has been a lot of satisfaction from what I feel I've accomplished but now it is time to do other things."

## Two Ways to Compute Credit

WASHINGTON (AR-NEWS) — Taxpayers, regardless of income filing status, are allowed a general tax credit on their Federal income tax returns.

The tax credit can be computed two ways and soldiers should check both to see which method allows a greater benefit, according to Internal Revenue Service officials.

Soldiers can figure \$35 for each exemption listed on the tax return, or two percent of the first \$9,000 of taxable income, whichever is larger. Married persons filing separate returns are limited to a max of \$90 each when using the two percent method. Also, both must use

the same method to claim the credit.

For example, a married couple with four children and taxable income of \$12,000 would be entitled to a general tax credit of \$180 using the two percent formula. However, at the rate of \$35 for each exemption, the taxpayer would have a larger credit of \$210 (6 x \$35 equals \$210).

Unmarried soldiers also should compute the general tax credit both ways to see which gives them the greater benefit. Generally the two percent formula is best for them.

## Unauthorized Uniform Wear

Officials at DA say that some commanders and supervisors are allowing unauthorized changes to uniforms and accessories prescribed by Army regs for women.

There have been cases where some women officers have been directed to wear stripes on the pantsuit slacks even though it is unauthorized. In addition some women have been permitted to wear the pantsuit jacket without the

black sleeve band.

Other examples of non-conformity include the unauthorized use of male trousers as part of the women's Army Blue uniform and unrestricted wear of commercial boots with the Army Green pantsuit.

DA officials say any commander with a question should check AR 670-5 and AR 670-30 along with the DA message, Wear Policy for the Army Green Pantsuit, 281933Z June 1976.

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What? No more coffee breaks?  
 The recent disastrous freeze in Brazil, coupled with the desire of various coffee-producing nations to diversify their agricultural economies, has resulted in decreased coffee crops and increased coffee prices.


And all that boils—or perks—down to what many coffee-loving Americans consider the worst "crisis" yet. Use of coffee goes back to the earliest days of our Nation and is linked to a well-known historical event: the Boston Tea Party of 1773. The tax on English teas sparked that gathering as well as making tea drinking very unpopular in the Colonies. As a result, coffee has been increasing in popularity ever since.

A long-time staple of U.S. military messes, coffee replaced whiskey in the U.S. Army during the early part of the 19th century, although the Navy kept its grog until the Civil War. Army records for 1857, for example, listed coffee at nine cents a pound, with the ration per soldier of six pounds of coffee per year.

A Confederate soldier from Texas wrote in 1862, "How much I miss the good coffee I used to get at home. I would cheerfully pay one dollar for as much as I could drink. . . . We got some ground coffee from the Yanks in the seven days fight, but since then the only way to get it is to pay two dollars and a half a pound."

# COFFEE CRISIS

THREATENS MILITARY TRADITION

During World War I, when transportation problems prevented the U.S. from shipping coffee overseas to the American Expeditionary Forces, the U.S. Government bought all of the coffee beans in Europe and built a coffee processing plant, thus assuring the doughboys that they would get their coffee. And during World War II, coffee was rationed at home to insure an adequate supply for America's fighting forces.

A likely substitute for coffee is tea, but the Armed Forces over the years have never taken to that beverage although a surprisingly large number of military-related recipes featured it. The Charleston Light Dragoon Punch, for example, included among other ingredients: Three gallons of rye whiskey, two quarts of rum, three gallons of champagne, one quart of raspberry syrup and one quarter pound of green tea leaves.

Whatever the outcome of the current coffee crisis, America's Servicemembers have always met challenges and overcome them. Moreover, the national office of Consumer Affairs says that anticipated production increases in Africa, India, and Asia should offset critical coffee shortages next year—even with the Brazilian shortfall—unless the stocks on reserve throughout the world are depleted by speculation buying.



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
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
