

Summer RIF Gets Personal

Redstone's projected late summer RIF began to get personal this week as individuals learned that jobs they now occupy will be abolished.

In most cases they heard it from supervisors or managers. Many reacted by calling Civilian Personnel Division and asked to be put on the priority placement register.

Those who did were told they were not yet eligible.

The reason for that goes like this.

So far, we're working with the position structure or jobs if you prefer, not people. The position structure is being changed to accommodate all the directed cuts in manning, grade averages and high grade jobs.

Biologist Checks Deer; Said In Good Shape

A State game biologist has recommended substantially increasing the annual harvest of deer at Redstone.

Francis Lueth, District Game Biologist with the Alabama Department of Conservation and National Resources, said here Thursday that the harvest can be increased by approximately 150 animals to a total of 500 deer in the coming season.

The recommendation followed an examination in which the herd was found healthy and fertile.

Lueth estimates conservatively that the herd contains 1600 deer. With that number of animals, and the size and condition of their range, about 500 deer of both sexes should be taken out this season to maintain a balanced population and avoid exceeding carrying capacity of the range, he said.

Lueth said the herd was in overall very good condition.

The biologist examined four doe and one buck, ranging from one to four years of age. They were examined for parasites, skeletal and muscular development, and condition of flesh and internal organs. Kidneys and flesh and bone samples of the animals, and

reproductive tracts of the females, were taken for laboratory analysis.


The lungs, heart, liver, gullet and other organs were examined in the field. They were in good condition and parasite-free in all animals.

The biologist rated each animal with a numerical designation from zero through three, based on its internal and external condition and whether ticks and lice were present. Three of the does received a "3" (excellent) rating while the fourth was rated "2" as it did not appear to be carrying young. The buck was puny and received a "1" rating. All of the animals were free of ticks and lice, and none was found to contain parasites.

Each of the three pregnant does appeared to carry at least two young, the biologist said. More definitive information on the herd's fertility will be available after reproductive tracts are examined.

The does ranged in weight from 90 to 130 pounds. The buck, the youngest, weighed 57 pounds.

Other than taking out more deer, the

Contracting Out Tested at Gordon

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The Army has made the decision to begin "Contracting Out" at Ft. Gordon, Ga. Under this program, outside contractors will bid for performing specific services on post, some of which include laundry and dry cleaning, motor vehicle maintenance, housing operations and troop issue operations (subsistence).

DA officials say that Ft. Gordon was chosen because it is highly representative of the TRADOC mission (both a school and training center are located on the installation). In addition, it is small in size and lends itself to studying contract performance.

The primary consideration of the program is cost savings. Actual savings to the Army will not be known until firm offers

are received from potential contractors and compared with "in-house" costs. Army experts estimate that there will be a \$1.9 million difference between the contractor cost and the in-house cost in the first year.

This saving should reach \$3.7 million as military personnel normally assigned the jobs are reassigned elsewhere.

There are approximately 359 military and 657 civilian personnel who would be affected by the action. Military personnel will be reassigned to other duties at Ft. Gordon. Approximately 66 percent of the civilian workforce is expected to be hired by contractors and 80 percent of the remaining employees would be placed in other government jobs.

If savings are realized, officials stated, there is the possibility that the program would be applied at other Army installations.

If contract costs prove to be higher, the Army intends to return to using its own soldiers or employees for the jobs. The final decision should be made by mid-1977 when firm offers from contractors are received.

Relief Funds

It now appears that the Army Emergency Relief Fund Campaign will exceed its 1976 contribution total before the campaign expires this Friday. Earlier, it had appeared as if the goal would not be met.

As of Monday, the Personnel Services Branch had received \$4565.31 in donations, with several large organizations still to report their collections. The total for last year was approximately \$4700.

Emergency relief funds are used to assist military personnel in the form of both loans and grants during time of unusual need. This includes such situations as loss of pay, excessive medical or travel expense, and initial rent at a new assignment.

Why don't we have early out if there's going to be another RIF?

We may, but it's too soon to tell. Early out retirement options (discontinued service) are available under RIF conditions to individuals adversely impacted and sometimes to everyone employed in a particular command or agency. To get that kind of blanket early out, however, requires certain conditions that have not yet been met in the local situation. Blanket early out decisions are based on the number of people to be laid off under RIF, not the number of downgrades.

It appears now that the total number of people who may be laid off in the RIFs coming up in MIRCOM and MIRADCOM may not be high enough to qualify for a blanket early out.

As of right now, with position structure uncertain and no one yet sure of how their personal situation will work out under RIF procedures, no one is eligible for early out. When the letters come out July 29, people who get adverse actions—provided they otherwise meet age and time in service requirements—will qualify for early out.

Discharge Review

Free Phone Available

WASHINGTON — The Department of Defense has set up a special toll free number for individuals who need information on the special discharge review program for certain former Vietnam era service members.

Persons living in North Alabama and Southern Tennessee should call 800-325-4040.

Individuals living in any foreign country or in Missouri, Alaska, Hawaii or Puerto Rico should call collect, 314-423-9120.

The program provides a means of reviewing and possibly changing discharges for other than honorable conditions. Persons who deserted from the armed services during this period may also be eligible upon return to military control and subsequent discharge.

GSRS Going Out For Bids

The Army Missile Research and Development Command issued requests for proposals to industry here soliciting their bids for development of the Army's new General Support Rocket System.

The Army went out to approximately 31 different sources which have until May 31 to respond. From those sources, the Army plans to award at least two competitive contracts for advanced development of the free flight artillery rocket system, beginning in August.

Following a 29 month competition of fabrication and testing, the Army would select one contractor for final qualifications and initial production.


GSRS is intended to be a low cost, rugged, reliable artillery rocket system that can be deployed quickly and deliver a high volume of fire. Present Army concept envisions a mobile, tracked launcher—a modification of the Army's new Mechanized Infantry Combat Vehicle—carrying 12 rockets which can be fired singly or in rapid ripples.

The Army plans to field GSRS in the early 1980s.

Colonel Barrie P. Masters has been named GSRS Project Manager at Redstone succeeding Colonel Kenneth Heitzke who headed the early GSRS conceptual studies. Heitzke was recently assigned as Chief of MIRADCOM's Advanced Systems Concepts Office.

L. R. Seggel is Masters' deputy project manager.

Major advantages of GSRS are its mobility, manpower savings, and massive firepower. One GSRS launcher is equivalent in fire power to 27 eight-inch howitzers yet requires only a three-man crew.

Range of the rocket will be more than 30 kilometers.

"The Army is looking for a non-nuclear, rapid, indirect fire system," Masters said. "The system will supplement cannon artillery when targets such as artillery, troops and light material appear rapidly and in great quantities. We have nothing in the field like it."

MIRADCOM has conducted extensive research in free flight rockets and last year awarded concept definition studies to Boeing, Emerson Electric, Martin Marietta, Northrop and Vought Corporation

for technical approaches to the GSRS. From those studies, a Special Study Group

representing Army agencies interested in GSRS development selected the current free flight artillery rocket concept as the most cost effective solution for Army counterbattery and air defense suppression roles.

MIRADCOM engineers say the GSRS design will accommodate dual-purpose submunitions warheads but have a growth potential that might even accommodate future terminal homing munitions as technology evolves.

Missile Minder Pact Awarded

The Army Missile Research and Development Command has awarded approximately \$25.6 million to Litton Data Systems of Van Nuys, Calif., for production of a computerized command and fire control system for Hawk and Nike Hercules missile systems.

The AN/TSQ-73, or Missile Minder, is housed in a small shelter that can be moved by truck, plane or helicopter and deployed rapidly.

Missile Minder controls not only Hawk and Hercules batteries, but also coordinates air defense capabilities and communications with the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force.

Colonel Monte J. Hatchett, Director of Army Air Defense Command and Control Systems at MIRADCOM awarded and will administer the contract for the Army. Brig. Gen. William J. Hilsman, Project Manager for Army Tactical Data Systems at Ft.

Dental Clinic Opening in June

Construction and installation of equipment at the new Redstone Dental Clinic, Roadrunner and Hercules Roads, is nearing completion with a projected opening date in early June.

The 12,440 square foot building with installed equipment is valued at more than \$1 million. It replaces the Clinic destroyed in the 1974 tornado, and is of standard Army design.


Col. Allen W. Brown, Jr., Director of Dental Service, said the new clinic will contain 18 chairs for all types of dental treatment, and that there will be five chairs in the new Redstone Hospital when it is completed. "We're planning to keep 10 chairs in the temporary clinic, Bldg. 3615, for limited dependent dental care," he said.

"All the equipment in the new clinic is the latest available on the market, the newest in technical development. In addition, the staff will have plenty of room to work in the new building."

position structure in accord with their retention rights.

"Until we run the RIF, we don't know who will be impacted," Luther F. Adams, civilian personnel officer for both MIRCOM and MIRADCOM, explained. "Even though all the planning information is being given to everyone as soon as it becomes available, it just isn't possible to make instantaneous decisions as they relate to individuals."

"If an individual is sitting on a job that is being abolished, for example, it does not necessarily mean that individual is going out the gate or be downgraded when we work out the personnel placements under RIF conditions."

"When people have RIF notices in hand on July 29 or thereafter that adversely impact them, then they can be registered in the priority placement program. Until that happens, however they are not eligible."

Dress For It

The first real hot weather of 1977 arrived at Redstone in mid-April and the work force began switching from winter wools to light weight wear.

All local commands leave to civilian employees good judgement what they will wear to work. Most add a few words of common sense advice.

All-Army Final in CWF-MARS Playoff

An all-Army duel is on tap at the Evangel School this evening when the 1976-77 basketball season at Redstone draws to a close.

The Civilian Welfare Fund quintets will be battling for the championship of the annual Army-NASA post season playoff series.

The Commissary, the Corps of Engineers and RD&E came out on top of first round games with Marshall Center teams last week. The latter two met on Monday to determine which would challenge the Warehousemen for the title.

Tip off for the championship game is 5:45.

RD&E set the tempo for the first round when they staged a big upset by dumping the NASA Bombers, 63-56. The Bombers captured the regular season MARS crown and figured to battle it out with the Warehousemen in the playoffs.

The lead changed hands eight times through a see-saw first half and the Bombers were out front by a single point at the intermission, 33-32.

RD&E made their move as the second half got underway and outscored their Marshall rivals 18-4 the next six minutes as

Mel Waters constantly penetrated the Bomber defense for easy layups. A mild closing rally was not enough to offset the big Army spree.

Waters closed the contest with 20 points while Don Settle was the leading Marshall point maker with 15.

The Commissary earned a passage into the final game by beating down the stubborn Foul Five, 82-79. After getting off to a fast 12-3 lead, the Warehousemen were only able to account for a three-point advantage at the half, 36-33.

The second half was more of the same. Everytime the Warehousemen appeared to be ready to break the game open, the Marshall team would come roaring back and, although they were never able to grab a lead, did keep the game within reach right to the end.

Roosevelt Williams, top scorer in the CWF league, showed the way for his Commissary mates by scoring 24 points and James Love tossed in 20 more. John Winters topped the Foul Five with 21.

decision over CSC, the Marshall league runner ups.

Jerry Dooley hit six of nine of his jumpers in leading the Corps to a 33-32 half time bulge. CSC caught fire at the start of the second half and outscored the Engineers 20-9 over a five-minute span to move in front.

The Corps regained the lead following a time out and with Claude Steele hitting from outside and Andy Tippins controlling the board at both ends of the court, gradually built up their winning margin.

Dooley was the high man on the Corps scoring column with 22 points and Steele added 19 more. James Larzen was high for CSC with 20 and Thomas Ford hit for 14.

Hawk Readiness Monitor Operating in Korea

The third Improved Hawk Theater Readiness Monitoring Facility, known as TRMF, recently began operation at Camp Humphreys, Korea, to assess the readiness of the missile in that country.

Two other TRMFs, had previously gone into operation, one at Red River Army Depot, Texas, in 1972, and the other in Germany in 1975.

According to Billy A. Brooks of the MIRCOC Facilities Engineer, and Homer Hastings of the Hawk Project Office, sample lots of Improved Hawks are brought into the TRMF, taken out of their

containers, mechanically inspected, disassembled and tested. If a missile fails the test, there is a repair test set to trouble shoot and repair the missile.

"The equipment in a TRMF can detect which components cause problems without testing a missile to death," Brooks said.

The facility in Korea has replaced all the test functions performed on basic Hawk in to one central place with 12 people to operate it taking the place of hundreds of people, according to Hastings. "It releases all battery missile test equipment at Direct Support Units with the personnel

that go with it, and frees about 950 soldiers throughout the Army," he said.

"It eliminates 1540 line items in supply and represents a huge saving toward fielding Improved Hawk."

Brooks was responsible for the renovation of an existing building in Korea to house the TRMF. Hastings of the Product Assurance and Test Division in the Hawk Project Office supervised getting the equipment into operation and accepted the TRMF when it was completed. Hawk funds the facility, then it is operated by personnel from Red River.

During production of the Improved

Hawk, a computerized record is kept on each missile, and data on the history and location of each is stored in a deployment data bank. As missiles are tested by any means, the data is added to the deployment data bank, and automatically correlated with previous records. Thus the test data from a TRMF is fed into the data bank.

"We can detect trends in the status of each missile, whether a lot is degrading due to handling, aging and environment," Hastings said. "This indicates a trend to provide readiness assessment and indicates possible future trouble areas."

Re-enlistment Worries? Ask Career Counselor

In recent years the Army has upgraded re-enlistment standards. Such areas as education, moral standards and job performance weigh more heavily today than in the past.

"The first question a person should ask when he is thinking of re-enlisting is, 'Do I want to be a professional soldier?'" said Staff Sgt. George D. Murch III, a career counselor at the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

"The re-enlisting soldier should feel he is adjusted to the Army way of life and like it on the whole," said Murch. "Then when he makes the decision to re-enlist, he will know he did the right thing."

"We don't talk anyone into re-enlisting," explained Sgt. Maj. Rudolph T. Blackstock, senior MMCS career counselor. "Re-enlistment is a personal decision. We'll give you all the facts and then you decide on your own."

Getting the facts is important. Changes in re-enlistment requirements are frequent. The prerequisites of two months ago may be inapplicable today.

"Our biggest enemy is THEY," said Blackstock. "We have soldiers coming in all the time saying THEY told me this, THEY

told me that. My advice is don't take anything for granted and don't make assumptions on previous re-enlistments. Above all, don't listen to THEY."

Career counselors say the best time to think about re-enlisting is during the last year of your current enlistment. A soldier can re-enlist within the three months prior to his ETS date. Re-enlistment contracts are written for three, four, five or six years.

Re-enlistment options vary. You might receive a guaranteed school or station, or nothing at all. The options depend upon you.

Bonuses are awarded much like options. Each soldier is considered individually. Usually, two factors bear on the decision: the date you entered the service and your MOS.

The Army usually gives bonuses to retain soldiers who received costly training or who hold critical MOS's.

Blackstock and Murch warn soldiers not to confuse bars to red enlistment and ineligibility. Only company commanders can bar a soldier from re-enlisting, and a bar cannot be waived unless the commander himself lifts it.

A soldier can be judged ineligible because of such things

as AWOL's, courts martial or low MOS skill scores. But these can be waived to make a soldier eligible.

Both counselors feel that any time you have a question about re-enlistment you should ask them.


"If a soldier has any doubts at all, whether it is on his qualification for re-enlisting or the options and bonuses, he should go to his unit commander or us, the primary duty counselors," said Blackstock.



Vietnam Era Discharge Review Plan Outlined

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Harold Brown last week announced detailed application procedures for the special Discharge Review Program for certain former Vietnam era (August 4, 1964 to March 28, 1973) service members. Service members presently in a deserter status which commenced during this ear may also be eligible upon return to military control and subsequent discharge.

A Joint Liaison Office has been established in St. Louis, for the purpose of responding to inquiries and processing telephonic and, or written applications. Former service members, other than those in deserter status, may apply for discharge review simply by contacting the JLO at 800-325-4040. Exceptions are those in Missouri, Puerto Rico, Alaska, and Hawaii, who should call 314-428-3500.

Applications received by mail will be treated in a manner identical to telephone applications. Written applications should be sent to: Joint Liaison Office, ATTN: Army, Navy, USMC, Air Force Liaison Team, USARCPAC, St. Louis, Missouri 63132.

The toll-free telephones at the JLO will be capable of receiving 50 calls simultaneously and will be operational from 7:00 a.m. CST to 8:00 p.m. CST, seven days a week for the first 30 days of the program, and Monday through Friday thereafter.

After their initial call, applicants will be advised by letter that they may submit additional data within 30 days for consideration by the board.

Provided there are no compelling reasons to the contrary, individuals who received undesirable discharges for service during the Vietnam era will have their discharges upgraded if they meet any one of these criteria:

- was wounded as a result of military action.
- received a U.S. military decoration, other than a service medal.
- successfully completed an assignment in Southeast Asia or in the Western Pacific in support of operations in Southeast Asia.
- completed alternative service or was excused from completion of alternative service under the clemency program

instituted September 16, 1974.

—received an honorable discharge from a previous tour of military service.

—had a record of satisfactory active military service for 24 months prior to discharge.

Former service members with general discharges also may apply for upgrading and will be considered by the board in the spirit of compassion and forgiveness in which the President has sought to bind up the divisions of the Vietnam War.

Former service members eligible to participate in the program will have six months from April 5, 1977 to make application. Their applications will automatically be considered under this program.

Applicants for the review process who are currently in a deserter status which commenced during the period August 4, 1964, through March 28, 1973, must first return to military control and be processed for discharge. Members whose only alleged misconduct is prolonged absence will be discharged expeditiously by the parent service. It is anticipated that, if the

member does not request a trial or board proceedings, this discharge will take place very soon after the service member arrives at the discharge point.

Applicants not qualified for the special review because of other reasons will be advised that he or she may apply for review under existing procedures and that necessary forms and information will be mailed on request.

Applicants denied upgrading based on a review of the records will be offered an opportunity for a formal board hearing and personal appearance. Applicants whose undesirable discharges are not upgraded will additionally, upon request, be provided free legal counsel by the Department of Defense and a new hearing.







biologist recommended no change in management of the herd. He discouraged all supplemental feeding, even in periods of prolonged severe cold as were experienced last winter. Healthy deer can survive such periods.

The range contains ample forage, said Lueth, pointing out that supplemental feeding is of little benefit because the deer do not derive nutrition from it. He explained that before a deer can utilize food as body nourishment, it must be broken down by bacteria in the stomach. If a food is not normally available to the deer, bacteria necessary to break it down are not present in the stomach. "Deer have starved to death with their stomachs full of corn and alfalfa (both highly nutritious) because the bacteria needed to utilize the food were not present", Lueth said.

When a range doesn't contain sufficient food for all deer at all times of the year, the only practical solution is to remove deer, including the unantlered and does, until the herd is within carrying capacity of the range, he said.

Lueth, with 40 years as a game manager and 25 years as a deer specialist, is considered the most experienced deer biologist in the state. He plans to retire at the end of this week.

"We plan to follow the recommendations

and increase the harvest, which may be difficult because of test areas closed to hunting during most of the deer season," said Dave Bryant, Redstone Wildlife Manager. "With the advice Lueth's given us over the years we've been able to build up one of the best deer herds in North Alabama", Bryant added.

Redstone, according to Bryant, is working closely with the State in experiments to control deer populations by allowing harvest of either sex. In the face of some public sentiment against it, State conservation officials are advocating either-sex hunting in the southern part of Alabama in an effort to head-off disease and starvation in overcrowded herds. Pointing out that healthy herds can double themselves in two years, the officials say even moderate over-hunting in a season is preferable to letting disease or starvation take hold in a herd, which can have an effect for many years.

"Our herd's in good shape, so is the range, but we need to be taking out more deer than we have been taking. We can't allow overcrowding to develop here", said Bryant.

Last season hunters got 314 deer; the season before 375 were killed. Between 150-200 doe and unantlered deer were harvested in each of both seasons.

The decline in harvest last season, Deer Biologist Lueth said, stemmed from no shortage of deer. It appears cold weather kept hunters away, and there were fewer gun hunts held.

Army and Author:

Two Leaders Share Their Views on Race Relations

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — One military program that seems to come under constant scrutiny is the Equal Opportunity, Race Relations Program.

The Army's program is designed to produce a social awareness of minority groups, not only within the Army, but in the American society.

One recent social influence that has brought about increased awareness on the part of both Blacks and Whites is Alex Haley's search for his ancestry.

Haley recently paid a call on the Secretary of the Army, Clifford L. Alexander. During his visit, ARNEWS was able to get an exclusive interview with both Mr. Haley and Secretary Alexander on their perceptions of the situation of racial minorities today as well as the impact of Mr. Haley's book, *Roots*.

ARNEWS: During the past decade there has been an upsurge in individual awareness. This, coupled with a greater perception of the role of minorities in America, has caused an increase in minority pride. Was your book and film *Roots* a natural outgrowth of this awareness?

HALEY: I think so. It was something that was meant to be at this particular time. The 1960s was a much more turbulent time. The book, and particularly the film during the 60s, would have generated a lot of overt

expression—much, much more than it did at this time—which was almost none at all. There were, I believe, six high schools that had fist fights at lunch time between White and Black students, and I heard that there was the same thing at one Army post, between young soldiers. Now these are to me just very natural expressions and very much in the minority. So much so, that one scarcely even mentions them, in view of the positive wave—the galvanic wave—of positiveness that has arisen from the book and film. I couldn't tell you how many Black people—which is really a most moving thing to me, who I never saw before...probably will never see again—just came up to simply say, "Thank you," and go on about their business. I couldn't tell you either, how many letters I get from White readers—the ratio is about nine letters from Whites to one letter from Blacks—which say in effect, "Thank you, I didn't know...I was not aware..." and then they will generally say, "Reading your book has made us (in reference to their families) start talking about our family," and then they write about where they came from, their old country. Collectively, what has been engendered is a tremendous sense of awareness, new awareness, and pride, and I think that it is an outgrowth of what was there earlier.

ALEXANDER: As an observation of the phenomenon of *Roots* the magnificent part of it is that it has helped clarify for this

country what we used to talk about in the 50s and 60s—the melting pot—in the assumption that everybody in America ought to act, look, walk and talk alike. What *Roots* does is engender this pride in this search for one's own heritage. The things that we as Blacks didn't know about, things that we would have very good reason to take pride in. That we were docile at times when we shouldn't have been docile—that we have a variety of skills—just as many White groups in America would and should feel the same thing. It does not mean that those groups because of that different background aren't Americans and good ones and can't work together. They stand on their individuality and their heritage. I think what *Roots* did was place the emphasis on pride and not on arrogance—there is a fine line that one can cross from pride to arrogance. In this city (Washington, D.C.) which happens to be predominately Black and the suburbs which are predominately White—people were finally talking about this, and it was positive.

ARNEWS: After the passing of all the years since the end of the Civil War, do you feel that the American White should have a feeling of guilt about the enslavement of Blacks?

HALEY: Absolutely not. I am asked that from time to time—about guilt. The White person today did not bring one slave from Africa. Nor did any Black today come here in the hold of a slave ship. I think what we

ought to be aware of is that both White and Black are legacies of what happened. Broadly stated, the White society tends to be better off, better accepted as a matter of course because the society in which we operate is a legacy of that same slavery which was a superiority-structured society. The thing we must concentrate on today is correcting those legacies of slavery, not going around feeling guilty about something that happened more than a century ago.

ARNEWS: I would like to address this question to Secretary Alexander. In the first question we discussed the period of turmoil in the 60s. In developing an awareness of minorities, a slow process, do you subscribe to the theory that rebirth comes from turmoil?

ALEXANDER: I don't think that we ought to place turmoil as a part of rebirth. It seems to me that, as illustrated by *Roots*, the rebirth can come from information. If you know more than when you started out, then your own sense of justice and equity come to the forefront. That is perhaps a more constructive way to see progress—to see, if you will, rebirth in the positive sense. The turmoil in the 60s had many positive aspects to it, and some negative ones, but I think that today's world requires different things for a different time. Now that we have had something like *Roots*, it makes sense for people to pay attention to how they can prepare themselves to deal with the society in which they live. Just as White and Black troops prepare themselves for their MOSs and to their jobs, the people in the civilian sector need to prepare themselves and those who run major institutions need to think about whether discrimination is keeping people out of jobs or moving ahead. Those are the kinds of emphasis that need to take place today. I think that our President will help lead some of that and place emphasis on this. You see, we have had in this society a period of time where in the Nixon years there wasn't any thought to the aspirations of minorities, and that was negative. That period reinforced the small, and I think it is only a small minority (of the majority) who don't want anything much to happen in the way of change. The emphasis

is now changing and ought to change and *Roots* had a lot to do with it. The way this President was elected had a lot to do with it and it should become unpopular to discriminate against people.

ARNEWS: Mr. Haley, along that same line, there seems to be a general consensus that our society still has to make great strides in the total acceptance of Blacks. Do you feel that *Roots* is a good way to make this possible?

HALEY: I do. If I might, without anything personal, I think that maybe the biggest thing our society has to do is contained in the phrasing of your question, "Does our society (meaning Whites)..." You see, we are talking about America and the biggest thing that this society has to do is include Blacks in America. When "our society" is referred to, it usually carries the connotation of White society—will it accept Blacks? The fact is, by most of the criteria, Blacks were here before the influx of Whites. Virtually all Blacks were here, obviously, before the Civil War. Most of the Whites came after the Civil War, in the 1880s as immigrants. It is often said that we are a nation of immigrants. We are, with the single exception of the American Indian, ancestrally from somewhere across the ocean. America was considered the country of the people who came here later rather than the ones who were here before. That is the biggest problem that we have, the concept of Blacks as Americans, too. If we can do that, then we can solve the other problems because our attitude will have changed. I think that *Roots* is adding to this because more White people are saying, "I will think differently now that I know more about the past of the Black people."

ARNEWS: This question may seem controversial in light of what we have discussed here. I will address it to Secretary Alexander. The Army's Equal Opportunity and Race Relations program is a program whereby the soldier receives blocks of instruction every year on race relations. Do you feel that this program will count in the success of total acceptance or do you feel that the problem is deeper, more ingrained, something that will take more than 12 hours of instruction every year to do away with?

ALEXANDER: Training has to be a dynamic force within the Army. Some will need more than 12 hours of training and others will need change to keep up with the times. I think we have to start with the basic premise that in the Army, the soldiers, both Black and White soldiers are to be treated, promoted, actively encouraged to proceed ahead the same. If Blacks aren't—for any reason of discrimination—I am going to want to know about it, and there are going to be some people who will find their progress inhibited if they discriminate. So that is going to be the policy in the Army. Now, in order for people to better understand one another, there are lots of techniques. People talking to each other is and should be encouraged. People like Alex Haley, when he has the time to do it, comes and talks to people—to encourage an interchange on the issues of race in America, national origin in America, religion in America—so that there is more understanding of these issues among the people. As we better educate people and make them more aware of the problems it should also be made clear that in terms of performance that in this Army it will not be tolerated, any differential treatment on performance, on promotion, because of anyone's religion, national origin, color or sex.

ARNEWS: One final question, I have a copy here of your record, the story of your search. What did you feel after the search had ended?

HALEY: What I really felt was an increased sense of personal responsibility. By that time, I had begun to realize that what had begun as purely a curiosity on my part had in fact escalated into writing what had become the saga of a people. The reason is that every Black person in this country goes back to somebody who was born and reared in one African country, captured in some way, put into some slave ship and brought across the same ocean to some plantation, through the Civil War, the emancipation and the struggle for freedom—that is the story of every Black, every Black family and the history of the Black people. The responsibility came out of realizing that I had the potential to write a book, and I make the distinction because you asked when my search had ended—that was the search for the facts that would go into the book. Nine years were spent in the search and another three years in the writing, and when I went into the writing, it was with this broadened concept that I was telling a people's history and the concept that I was going to try through this history to offset images that had been put deep into the whole of America and indeed into the whole international psyche. If you talk about Africa, you consider the fact that you talk about the second largest continent on the face of the earth, and the fact that most of us—even those of us who had the fortune to be better educated—most of our impressions of Africa, its history, its culture, its customs of centuries back have been derived from Tarzan, from Jungle Jim—and that was far from the truth. I had the material if I could write it properly to project the new image, the real image, and it would appear that *Roots* has done that. In this country, the picture of the slave has been classically the grinning, shuffling, terribly suffering, terribly downtrodden negative sort of person. In *Roots*, hopefully, I was able to show bravery, courage and the true picture. Really, what *Roots* does is to tell an old familiar story, that of slavery but for the first time it tells it from the slave's point of view.

Flexitime Explained

Flexitime, as it currently operates in the Federal Government, can be divided into two basic types, "flexitour" and "gliding schedules." Under all forms of flexitime, the working day is made up of two kinds of time, flexible time and core time.

Core time consists of those hours each day when all employees are required to be at work.

Flexible time comprises all other hours during which employees begin and end their working day.

In "flexitour" the employee selects a morning starting time from within the flexible time band. This becomes the employees' fixed starting time. The selected starting time may be changed only during specified periods of the year. Opportunities to select a different starting time may be set up by the organization as often as is considered desirable.

In example one (see box) the core time is 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Under this "flexitour" plan, an employee might choose to begin each work day at 8:00 a.m., while a coworker might prefer 7:45 a.m.

Both employees would begin work at their chosen times each day. They could change the starting time only during those periods of the year set aside for selecting new schedules.

A variation of "flexitour" would allow an employee to select a starting time as under the basic "flexitour." However, he or she would also be able to vary that starting time somewhat—usually 5, 10, or 15 minutes on either side of the selected starting time is allowed.

For example, an employee may have selected 7:45 a.m. as a usual starting time. Under the modified "flexitour" plan in this employee's office, 15 minutes is permitted on either side of the usual starting time. Therefore, an employee could arrive at work as early as 7:30 a.m., or as late as

8:00 a.m., and his work day would begin at that time.

This type of program is found in work situations where it is not necessary to ensure an exact time of arrival for each employee.

In the "gliding schedule," employees may vary their starting times each day within the flexible time band if they wish to do so. Under this model, the core time is sometimes split to give employees greater flexibility during the middle of the day. This split, or dual, core time has two periods during which everyone is required to be at work.

For example, a typical split core time would be set from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. (See example two). Under this schedule an employee might choose to come to work at 8:00 a.m. on Monday, 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, and on Wednesday take advantage of an extra hour off at lunch time for personal business.


The "gliding schedule" allows this type of flexibility so long as the employee is at work during the core time and completes an 8-hour day within the flexible time bands.

In a variation of the "gliding schedule," a certain number of hours during the day are designated as customer service hours, for example, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

This variation is used in agencies with a great deal of outside or public contact.

Office coverage during these service hours can be achieved in one of two ways. First, agencies often find that after polling employees as to when they want to begin their working day, the hours employees prefer provide the office with complete coverage during customer service hours.

When complete coverage does not result from employees' preferences, coverage can be attained by rotating employees through customer service hours on a regularly scheduled basis.




"So this is where you've been during the "GLIDING SCHEDULE" of FLEXITIME!"
