

Patriot Meets All Planned Objectives



Last Is Best

... Patriot

WSMR, N. M.—Saving the best for last, Patriot climaxed its most recent test series here June 2 with an intercept of a jet fighter while the system's single phased array radar simultaneously supplied acquisition and tracking data for an Improved Hawk missile battery which blasted a second target drone from the sky.

The test in a severe countermeasures environment demonstrated compatibility of Improved Hawk, mainstay of Army's current medium altitude capability, and Patriot, its eventual successor.

The Patriot system acquired the first target at long range and high altitude, fired and controlled an unarmed missile that passed the pilotless jet within the lethal radius of the missile warhead. Simultaneously searching, the Patriot radar fingered the tiny Firebee drone streaking in at low altitude for the Improved Hawk battery which scored a direct hit.

The current series began in December and had been planned for completion in June. It demonstrated Patriot's capabilities to fight successfully in a wide variety of countermeasures. All planned objectives were met.

It Happens Every Summer

He steers a wagon train of piled grocery carts up to the check out counter, smiles while the register rings . . . and rings . . . and rings . . . beams when the total shows more than \$600 and cheerfully pays.

He's still smiling as he heads for the pick up truck in the parking lot with his caravan of groceries.

Not everyone shops like that at the Redstone commissary, but some Army reservists and National Guardsmen did last week.

For them, shopping in the commissary is a rare privilege, something they can do only two weeks a year while on active duty for training. Some of them make the most of it.

It happens every summer and it began to happen last week again which made things even more crowded than usual in the Redstone store, as it reopened on payday after a three day holiday weekend.

It was not a good time in the commissary. A number of the civilian employees had been alerted for a reduction in force directed by the Troop Support Agency, Ft. Lee, Va., which provides central management for all Army commissaries.

Short handed, overcrowded, the situation got worse, made no better by the physical

layout of the old building where narrow aisles make it difficult to accommodate both shoppers and restocking at the same time.

By Saturday, however, things appeared to be better.

MG George E. Turnmeyer, MIRCOCOM Commander, had arranged emergency help to aid the commissary staff and additional equipment to move stock from the warehouse to the store.

Construction will begin on a new commissary next year. It will make for much better shopping and working conditions, but until it comes, the problems caused by overcrowding in the totally inadequate old store will continue.

Among them: a requirement that local suppliers complete deliveries prior to 8 a.m. That has caused some shortages of popular items when deliverymen or suppliers balk at complying. The alternative, however, is a traffic jam outside as well as inside the store, since trucks making late deliveries block vehicle movement through the parking lot.

"I am asking everyone to bear with us until we have the new building. We will do whatever we can to improve the situation in the meantime," General Turnmeyer said.

Time For Rededication

Paying homage to our flag is simply restating a dedication to our heritage and an acknowledgement of our resolve to secure and continue it.

Soldiers are required to pay this tribute. During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag, retreat and reveille, or when a flag passes in review, a salute is rendered both indoors and outdoors.

If the soldier is in civilian clothes, then he stands at attention and places his right hand over his heart. If male military personnel are wearing a hat while in civilian clothes, the hat should be removed and held with the right hand over the heart.

When the flag passes in a parade or review the salute should be rendered when the flag is six paces in front of the soldier and held until the flag is six paces beyond. During the hoisting or lowering of the flag, the salute is always rendered at the first note of the music and held until the last note. If a soldier is in athletic attire he should remove any hat or

head gear he may be wearing and stand at attention.

Retreat and reveille originally started as two of many original formations which in the "old Army" were used to get the companys in formation to assign details and the purpose of head count. It has now become a simple ceremony for the purpose of raising and lowering the flag.

If a soldier is driving or is of such a distance that he can not see the flag being raised or lowered, he should stop his car and get out or stop whatever he or she is doing and come to attention.

Over the country's history we have built up principles of individual freedom, responsible government and human equality. We as soldiers pay tribute to these principles when saluting the flag. It's a matter of honor to all of us.

Flag Day and the Army's birthday are both approaching. June 14 is the time to refresh our dedication to our job as soldiers in the Army. One of these jobs is respect and tribute to this country by saluting the flag.

American As Mom's Apple Pie

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Savings Bonds have been around for a long time. The first federal bonds were issued during the Revolutionary War and were offered by the Continental Congress in October 1776.

The value of the first bonds ranged from \$300 to \$1,000 and collected interest of 4 percent which rose to 6 percent after 90 days.

The value of the bonds decreased during the war when the outcome seemed uncertain. When Alexander Hamilton became the first Secretary of the Treasury in 1787 he insisted that the government pay all obligations in full so the "credit and good faith of the nation could be firmly established."

Less than 20 years later, Napoleon wanted \$15 million for the Louisiana Territory. Bonds amounting to more than half the purchase price were sold in 1803 to finance what is regarded as one of the greatest real estate deals in American history.

The Union Pacific portion of the first transcontinental railroad was partially financed by bonds issued in 1869. Bonds were also used to finance the Central Pacific Railroad.

Series E Bonds, first called Defense Savings Bonds were introduced in May 1941. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, the name was changed to War Savings Bonds and the payroll savings plan was introduced

throughout the country. Once again, in 1945 government bonds underwent a name change; this time they became known as U.S. Savings Bonds.

More than \$54.7 billion was invested in Series E Bonds during World War II. At the end of the war, bond sales decreased but many millions of Americans continued to buy bonds.

The current bonds, Series E Bonds, are available in face amounts of \$25, \$50, \$75, \$100, \$200, \$500, and \$1,000 with an interest rate of 6 percent compounded semi-annually when held to maturity of five years.

Interest from bonds is exempt from state or local income and personal property tax. Federal tax on bond interest can be deferred until the bonds are cashed or reach final maturity.

Special Achievements


Special achievement awards in the amount of \$100 each have been presented to members of the working groups for the establishment of MIRCOCOM and MIRADCOM.

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RSA Dining Facility Seeks Repeat Win

The judging team for the Philip A. Connelly Award for Excellence in Army Food Service was at Redstone this week evaluating Troop Dining Facility 3. Facility 3 won the Connelly Award last year, and with it the rating of the best food service unit in the Army.

This is the second consecutive year that DARCOM has nominated Redstone's Facility 3 as its representative in the Large Dining Facility category. The other category for the Connelly Award is for Small Facilities, those serving less than 200.

The judges this year were William McClure of the South Carolina Department of Health and National Guard, Major Robert Maybury of the Army Troop Support Agency, and First Lieutenant Karen Oxidine, assigned to the Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

The team observed and evaluated the preparation, service, and quality of meals in Facility 3 throughout the day Tuesday. The final decision of the judges and announcement of the winning facility will be made in a few weeks.

As a result of last year's award, the head cook at Facility 3, Sergeant Raymond Machnica, attended a gourmet cookery course on a scholarship from the Food Service Executives Association, the organization which sponsors the Connelly Awards.

Cut in Manpower Part of Analysis

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Defense Harold Brown began a comprehensive analysis of the DoD staff May 27 to improve management and seek manpower reductions of 20 to 25 percent.

The analysis is to include a review of assigned functions and responsibilities, with the aim of reducing the number of military and civilian personnel presently involved, DoD said.

Officials were told to consider reorganizations to improve efficiency, elimination of marginal functions, consolidations of related functions, transfer of functions out of the OSD, and reductions in force in those functions retained.

Officials are to analyze and determine optimum organization and personnel requirements and submit plans by mid-June to the Secretary of Defense.

There are 1488 civilians and 577 military now assigned in the DoD staff.

LG Starry Gets TRADOC Post

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Secretary of Defense Harold Brown announced that the President has named LG Donn A. Starry to command the United States Army Training and Doctrine Command. With this assignment, the President nominated Starry for appointment to the rank of General.

General Starry is presently serving as Commanding General, V. Corps, in Frankfurt, Germany, where he assumed command early last year.

In a related action, the President named LG Sidney B. Berry as Starry's replacement as Command General, V Corps. General Berry is presently serving as Superintendent, United States Military Academy, West Point.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Nancy Coe, two daughters, Taunia Dyane, 8, and Tracy Lynn, 6, of Huntsville, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Coe, Manchester.

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
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Jury Duty No Public Business

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The Army Judge Advocate General has issued an opinion concerning soldiers selected for state jury duty.

Earlier opinions indicated that the Army would generally make soldiers available for jury duty, and that exemption from this duty was left to the court concerned.

One problem encountered by military authorities was the "status" of a soldier when serving the court. AR 630-5 does not contain any specific reference to duty status even though the JAG considered soldiers in duty status for pay purposes. Paragraph 11-1 of the reg states that administrative absence will not be granted by the Army for the performance of "public business."

The recent opinion concluded that since jury duty for soldiers is not part of the activities or functions of the Army but consent to an activity or function of the state, jury duty is not "public business" within the meaning of the regulation.

Therefore, commanders may grant administrative absence for soldiers to perform jury duty.

The shot also marked the last major test for the system under the direction of MG Charles F. Means. Patriot Project Manager for four years, General Means becomes Commander of the Missile Research and Development Command in July.

He said he leaves pleased with the progress of the program and deeply appreciative of the support he and Patriot have received from everyone involved.

"We have come a long way in a truly outstanding manner," he said in a message to the project team, "but much remains to be done. We have been through a great deal. I do not believe any weapons development program can match what we have accomplished together in the past four years.

"The people behind this program, the government-contractor team, are professionals, dedicated to success, people who work hard and love their work. They can complete the task if they get the funding stability and support they deserve in the next two and one half years. I hate to leave them.

"This most recent test series required full support and dedication from hundreds of people. We needed extensive assistance from the people at White Sands Missile Range.

"We needed engineers and test personnel who looked for, found and corrected problems on the ground.

"We needed people in the project office and in contractor plants throughout the country willing to work long hours, seven days a week.

"And we needed families who understood why Patriot people had to be away from home so much.

"Everyone met the challenge."

Patriot began a long string of test successes in 1973 with 9 out of 10 successful shots in a controlled test vehicle missile firing phase that proved design of the missile airframe, control system, autopilot and propulsion system.

Then in 1975, the system was required to prove its unique guidance concept in a series of flights against live targets. It did, meeting all objectives of a planned 16 missile firing series in the first six shots.

The most recent series began in December 1976 and proved the system's capability to successfully perform its mission despite use of a wide variety of countermeasures attempting to degrade the system. There were eight successful flight tests and 24 search-track tests that validated the system's outstanding capabilities to counter the airborne threat of the 1980s and beyond.

Test operations at White Sands have been suspended now pending arrival of Fire Platoon 2, the second set of tactical ground equipment. Firings will resume after checkout.

TRIS Garment Refunds Set

Dallas — In recent days the Consumer Product Safety Commission has identified certain fibers used in the manufacture of children's sleepwear and flannel yard goods as being treated with the flame retardant chemical TRIS.

Accordingly, the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) will refund the full purchase price of TRIS-treated children's sleepwear, robes and Wamsutta Fireguard Flannel yardage. The merchandise formerly sold by AAFES and impregnated with TRIS will be accepted for refund. The flannel, formerly sold in AAFES sewing centers, will be accepted for refund regardless of whether it has been fashioned into garments or is returned as yardage.

CPSA guidelines placed sleepwear made of acetate, acetate blends, triacetate and triacetate blends in the banned category.

AAFES will continue to monitor the TRIS situation and notify customers of any additional changes affecting this category of merchandise.

Sergeant Thinks . . . 'Caring Sums It Up'

Her brown eyes twinkle as she animates her conversation with sweeping hand movements. Speaking quickly, she talks about her job and her life with intonations that clearly show she loves both. She is Sergeant Deanna Glass, a platoon sergeant in the 6th Student Company. She is also the first woman platoon sergeant in the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

Glass took her advanced individual training at Redstone and became an instructor at the Conventional Ammunition Division in the school. She became aware of the need for women platoon sergeants while attending advanced individual training.

"When I went through school, we only had male platoon sergeants, and they didn't know what to do with the women," she said. "They really weren't aware of regulations pertaining to the women, and had a hard time keeping up with them."

After a tour in Korea, Glass returned here, again as instructor. It wasn't long after her return that she took over her new role.

"The adjustment wasn't bad really, going from instructor to platoon sergeant," Glass remarked. "I had experience as a WAC counselor both here and in Korea, and that really helped. The other platoon sergeants, the first sergeant and company commander have really been helpful. If I come across something that I don't know, I just have to ask."

Her personal life has gone through some adjustments also. "I really don't have a personal life. I am getting up earlier, usually about 3 a.m. and I always arrive here at the company about 4:15. Then I usually get home between 6 and 7 p.m."

"My troops keep me going but I really love what I am doing. I have some very good squad leaders and other cadre that I work with, and they are making the adjustments very smooth for me. I won't say that it's easy, because when I get home at night I just die," Glass quipped. "I just want to learn to be a good platoon sergeant."

Glass says that she enjoys working with troops, and feels that a platoon sergeant is there to help, not harrass.

"It's a demanding job, but if you don't have good NCO's the Army is shot. This is the first time a female here has really had the chance to learn what it really means to be an NCO. I'm excited about what I am doing, because it changes day to day. When I go home at night I feel like I have accomplished something."

Glass says she has not faced any animosity from her male counterparts, in fact the reaction has been the opposite. "They're tickled to death!" she exclaimed. "The male platoon sergeants who were formerly in charge of the women were glad to see me. It's easier on the women too, because they will talk to other females about personal things easier than they will a male, especially at the age most of these girls go through here."

Currently, Glass is in charge of three squads of women and one squad of men, a

total of 38 soldiers. Her job includes inspecting, administering physical training and ensuring that her soldiers do not find themselves bogged down with outside difficulties that deter them from their schooling.

Glass feels that to be a good platoon sergeant a person must care. "If you don't care about those young troops, you lose them. Not only when they are wrong do you take the time to correct them, but you have to be big enough to compliment them when they are right," she said quietly. You have to be a combination of mother, father, chaplain, marriage counselor, and friend all rolled into one. I think sometimes platoon sergeants get underrated. I've never seen a platoon sergeant turn away anyone with a problem. They listen and start solving it right away.

"I guess caring sums it all up."

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Retired Volunteers

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Many Army retirees have been working on a voluntary basis illegally. A change to AR 608-25 has made it possible for retirees to now volunteer their time and talents to the military community. Before this change, it had been illegal for former soldiers to work on military installations without pay.

Because there is such a wealth of talent and experience in the retired community, the Adjutant General of the Army began the Retired Volunteer Services Program. The program is designed to let the post or installation commander use the talent available to him through retirees. In addition it gives the retired soldier who wishes to volunteer time and skill a chance to do so . . . legally.

The legal question was solved by including a Waiver of Claims in the AR. This statement, which must be signed annually, waives payment from the Government for volunteer services performed, and waives all claims against the Government for loss or damage to property, or injury or death, that might occur during volunteer service.

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
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

The Army's Ballistic Missile Defense Program Manager, BG John G. Jones, announced last week that the BMD Systems Command has initiated a two-phase competitive procurement for a major new experiment in its Systems Technology Program.

Called the Homing Overlay Experiment, it is aimed at resolving key technical issues that would be involved in developing in-

terceptor missiles to operate above the atmosphere as additions to defensive systems operating at lower altitudes.

Such interceptors could be used as a first tier of defense to reduce the number of attacking missiles the lower altitude systems would have to contend with.

As many as three contractors will be selected to develop competing studies for the Phase I of the effort, the Experiment

Interceptor Definition Study. Its objective is to provide the Army with a proposal for the technical approach, scope, schedule, and cost of the experiment to be conducted in Phase II.

In Phase II, a single contractor will be selected to develop the HOE interceptor and integrate the flight experiment with the Systems Technology radar and data processing test facility already in operation at Kwajalein Missile Range in the Pacific.

Another objective of the HOE is to explore ways to reduce the development and deployment lead times this type of system requires.

The HOE effort will be headed by William C. Loomis, who has been named to direct a special task force by C. D. Richardson, Director of BMDSCOM's Systems Technology Project Office.

The contractors selected in each phase will work with the McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Company, the system engineering and design integration contractor for the Systems Technology Program.

The Systems Technology Program is designed to investigate and evaluate a variety of potential BMD systems which are adaptable to defending a variety of national high value targets.

The program is focused on solutions to key technical issues that would be involved in developing such systems, with major emphasis on reducing deployment lead time.

Aside from attending college and working as Land Combat Support Systems Test Specialists, both soldiers find time to participate in post and company level sports. Ron and Randy played post tackle


football last fall, post baseball, and are now playing for Company A in company level softball.


The present airborne system uses a transmitting and a receiving antenna mounted on the side of a helicopter. Monitoring equipment inside the craft displays and stores terrain





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New Mission

The Army Test and Evaluation Command (TECOM), which works closely with both MIRCOC and MIRADCOM testing Army missiles and equipment, is gaining a new mission.

The command's new role involves evaluating foreign weapons and equipment that might satisfy U.S. requirements.

TECOM's new program will be managed at Aberdeen, Md., by Lt. Col. Anthony Solberg, of the command's Test Operations and Policy Office.

The program will promote NATO standardization and weapon commonality, give the U. S. access to the full range of NATO weaponry, and result in earlier operational availability in some instances and less cost.

Data exchange agreements among U.S. and foreign countries already exist but most of the exchange in test and evaluation of weapons and equipment takes place after each country has spent considerable money on their respective projects. Solberg says the new program will help eliminate duplication in research and development.

Two down . . . Two to Go

Seventh Army soldiers from Europe are two down and two to go.

With two good firings already under their belts, the missilemen will launch two Pershings later this month to complete 1977 service practice with the Army's most powerful battlefield missile.

Firing site this year is from McGregor Range, just northeast of El Paso, to White Sands Missile Range.

U. S. units are testing Pershing IA equipment, similar to that currently operational in Europe. Both firings last week were successful.

Final two rounds will conclude this year's eight round series. Federal

Republic of Germany troops flew here in May for four firings.

A total of 341 Pershings have been fired since the program started in 1960.

Colonel Larry Hunt is Pershing Project Manager and James Conner is on site technical supervisor for firing operations.

C&GS Reduces Length of Course

DA officials have announced a reduction in course length of the Ft. Leavenworth Phase of the Command and General Staff Officers Course.

Beginning in FY 78, the non-resident portion of the

phase will be discontinued and completion will be based on several options. These include: completion of all six phases of the USAR School program and successful completion of the written requirement, completion of all 15 correspondence course subcourses and the written requirement or any appropriate combination of the other two options.

Officers who have completed all six phases, except the Ft. Leavenworth Phase, and are eligible to attend should contact their career division, OPMD, as soon as possible to be scheduled into a final course. (ARNEWS)

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





Brown Sees Energy As Security Threat

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Secretary of Defense Harold Brown told the House Ad Hoc Committee on Energy that "There is no clearer or more serious threat to the long-term security of the United States and to its allies than that which stems from the growing deficiency of secure and assured energy resources."

He pointed out the enormous economic development which the world has seen in the twentieth century and particularly since World War II, including the phenomenal German and Japanese economic resurgence, has been almost entirely based on the fact that unrestricted and inexpensive energy was available from oil and natural gas, with oil by far predominant.

Stating that the world had a brief sample of what an oil shortage could do in 1973-1974, he said, "It follows, therefore, that a cutoff or deep reduction of oil and gas supply would result in the destruction or at least the crippling of the advanced free-market economies within a relatively short span of time."

While the U.S. can reduce its dependence on outside sources, he noted, Japan and Germany are not so fortunate.

PRESIDENTIAL CALL

Secretary Brown said he believes "There is comparatively little time for the United States to respond to the President's call and move towards reducing its dependence on imported oil.

Failure to do so will impose increasing risks to our national security in the next few years and lead inexorably to the collapse of the world oil supply, demand balance in the next decade.

Should that occur the effects on security and economic viability of this nation and the free world will be catastrophic."

DOD POLICY

Secretary of Defense Brown said, "We in Defense believe that:

—"The United States needs to minimize its dependence on Persian Gulf oil and develop alternative sources of supply preferably in the Western Hemisphere.

—"The United States should secure a billion barrel petroleum stockpile as quickly as possible.

—"The United States should develop alternative supplies of energy, both conventional and non-conventional to reduce demand on a depleting world oil resource base."

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The MILITARY DOCTOR SHORTAGE



WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The Army Doctor Shortage is real and the picture for the near future doesn't look very good.

Col. Neil J. McDonald, Director of Personnel, Office of the Surgeon General explained why the Army is short and what can be done in the future, but said, "We anticipate overcoming our shortages in the early eighties."

Explaining the causes for the shortage and plans in effect to improve the situation, McDonald said, "The reason for the acute shortage, presently, is the programs for doctor recruitment had a gap rather than an overlap when one program started and another ended."

He explained how this occurred with the end of the draft in 1973. "The Army relied on the draft for a great many of its doctors. When the draft ended, there were still many doctors who had commitments to the Army under the Berry Plan."

Named for a former Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs, the Berry Plan allowed medical students to finish their specialty schooling before they fulfilled their commitment to the military. In 1976 there were 584 doctors and in 1977

there will be 141 doctors entering the service under this program. McDonald said, "Doctors coming in through this plan are fewer every year with only 59 expected in 1978, 13 in 1979 and 4 in 1980."

Col. McDonald explained the steps taken after the draft ended. "After the draft several programs were set up to bring more doctors into the Army. There are two major programs: Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences and the Health Professions Scholarships. Full output from the Scholarship Program will not be in effect until 1980."

"The years 1977 and 1978 are our major shortfall problems and problems beget problems, but there are several plans to help lessen the shortages," he explained.

"Shortages in one area create problems in support in other areas. There are five areas that are particularly short; Radiology, Pediatrics, Anesthesiology, Internal Medicine and Pathology. And it may take longer than the early 80s to correct our shortages in these areas," he added.

Plans in progress were also explained. "Incentive and Specialty pays expire this year. We (Surgeon General's Office) and the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs are working together to make recommendations to Congress on extensions of these pays for physicians."

"Physician Extender programs using Nurse Clinicians, Physician Assistants and Amosists (Medical Admin Specialists) will continue," he added. "Health Professions Scholarships input will be greater this year. And efforts to increase the number of

volunteer doctors have been stepped up with the opening of twelve new procurement offices in different regions."

Explaining why Army hospitals can expect fewer physicians in the future, Col. McDonald offered, "Graduate Medical Education Programs have requirements to maintain certification. Sometimes doctor, student ratio is one of the set standards and must be fulfilled. Most of the these programs are in our Medical Centers."

"Also Medical Centers are geographically located to give support to outlying areas and must be staffed with specialists who can give that support," he added.

Col. McDonald admitted there was a low retention rate for doctors and he felt there were varied reasons for this. "Most doctors don't want to move as frequently as we have to move them. Many doctors would like to be associated with hospitals that have medical schools. There are also fears about the uncertainties of pay, promotions, continuing medical education and overseas assignments."

Continuing, he added, "And there are the things we can't offer such as a larger salary."

"I don't feel job satisfaction is one of the major areas. There is a great potential for job satisfaction in the Army medical field. I do feel adequate space and equipment is available but it certainly varies from place to place," he commented.

Col. McDonald is confident that the Army will make it through the physician shortage "by careful review of the distribution of specialists and extenders and the types of services offered, closer

management, better clinic operation, and the use of consultants, civilianizing, and contracting where possible."

Physicals

With the approaching doctor shortage at the Army Hospital, it was expected that school and camp physical examinations would have to be curtailed. Arrangements have been made by the hospital for the 109th Evac Hosp, Detach 1, of the Alabama National Guard to provide this service on a limited basis.

Physical examinations for school and camp will be conducted on Sunday, June 19, between 12:30 and 4:30 in Building 116.

There will be some restrictions.

—Physicals will be given only to those who have official forms provided by the schools or camps.

—Parents are asked to insure that all administrative portions of the forms are filled out prior to the physical.

—X-ray facilities will not be available at the above time. If x-ray is required, arrangements should be made with the x-ray department not later than four days prior to the physical.

—Due to limited time, physicals will be by appointment. There will be a limited number of appointments available and appointments will be made on a first call, first serve basis. Appointments for physicals may be made by dialing 876-3247. Appointment books for physicals will be opened on Wednesday, June 15.

At this time the possibility of additional routine physical examinations cannot be programmed and parents are urged to take advantage of this opportunity.

No Change in RSA Outlook

Redstone Army Hospital continues to feel its share of the military doctor shortage. As reported in the May 18 edition of the Rocket, Redstone will continue to provide basic, necessary health services, but will begin to phase out non-essential services or contract them to non-military functions.

Among those services to be at least temporarily suspended or cut back are radiology, internal medicine, and orthopedics. Physical examinations will be temporarily limited to active duty personnel, while the emergency room will have doctor services only during regular duty hours. Most services will gradually be restored toward the end of summer.

Jerry Arszman and Dean Reese each hit safely three times as Ray Whiddon hurled R & D to their win over A & B.


In the battle of unbeaten, Lloyd Brooks and Doug Wise delivered home runs and Arszman turned in another three-hit production as Whiddon picked up another win.

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
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


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Rockets Bombed In Local Tourney

The teams that finished ahead of Redstone were Ft. Stewart, 18-6, Ft. Devens, 16-8, and Ft. Campbell, 14-10.


