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Why are we running  
a one step RIF and  
what is that anyway?



There are one step and two step RIF's. We are running a one step RIF in both MIRADCOM and MIRCOCM to make average grade, high grade, and total manning cuts directed by DARCOM by September 30.

In some elements of both commands, project offices for example, internal reorganizations were required to comply with the directed cuts. In a two step RIF, new jobs would be set up, old ones abolished and the people doing the work would be voluntarily reassigned whenever possible into the slots in the new organization. Individuals who could not be placed that way then would be placed using RIF procedures.

In a one step RIF, old jobs are cancelled, new jobs established and everyone is placed at the same time using RIF procedures.

Following the two step process, the jobs are occupied before RIF procedures start and the chance of displacing someone from a job is less. Chances are better in a two step process that the people doing the work before it begins will be doing it afterward.

Two step RIF's are the way you'd like to handle the process but one step is the way you sometimes have to go when time is the controlling factor.

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## Privacy Act

WASHINGTON (AR-NEWS) — The Army handled more than 82,000 requests for information under the Privacy Act in 1976, according to officials at the Adjutant General Center (TAGCEN).

Since the Privacy Act was passed in 1974, Federal agencies have been required to review their files for data on individuals and answer requests from individuals for that information.

In its most recent report to DoD, the Army claims significant progress in efforts to comply with the Act.

Only 60 information requests were denied in full, say the TAGCEN officials. Of these, 50 cases have been appealed the five individuals have filed lawsuits under the Privacy Act.

More than 143,000 soldiers and civilian employees received the training last year. The TAGCEN officials say the training program has helped speed up replies to requests, and has also served as a brake on the creation of any new files containing personal data.

# 202 Years of Service

Their record is there in the multi-colored streamers hanging from their flag . . . many with the names of little known places recalled now because once long ago for a few terrible hours, American soldiers fought there.

Looking back down the years we see them indistinctly remembering more of what they did than who they were. A few great ones stand out in memory . . . Washington . . . Grant . . . Pershing . . . Eisenhower . . . MacArthur . . . but the millions of others, the soldiers themselves, have slipped out of focus.

In retrospect they merge into a composite image, a man with a rifle. He represents them all, all the men and women who have served in the ranks for 202 years. We do them a disservice if we recall them as we see them occasionally now, statues in a city square, paintings on a courthouse wall, a few lines in a history text. There they

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# 16 RIFs In 7 Years, But Few Out The Gate

It's been seven years this month and no one involved then recalls it today with any fondness.

MICOM's RIF of 1970 is still the champ, the bench mark by which all others are measured. There have been many opportunities for such comparisons since. Three more are coming as MIRCOCOM, MIRADCOM, and BMDSCOM each head into another RIF this summer.

The three latest will bring to 16 the number of RIFs in local Army commands within the past seven years; eight in MICOM; four in the ballistic missile defense community; two in the missile school; one each in MIRCOCOM and MIRADCOM.

The final personnel actions of the 13 completed: 482 laid off; 1,278 downgraded; 8,413 reassigned.

If you're keeping score that's an average of two plus RIFs a year among local Army civilian employees since 1970.

An even more remarkable fact that emerges from an analysis of the record of 13 completed RIFs (see accompanying box), however is this:

Since July 1970 when the MICOM RIF wound up, only four Army civilian employees have been laid off in the seven RIFs completed within MICOM. All four worked in the Redstone Arsenal Support Agency.

Whatever else that number may prove, it underlines the determination of a series of commanders and managers to accept personnel turbulence and some short term adverse impact on mission to save people and soften the blow on the communities where civilian employees live.

It says something positive about the skill of the oft-maligned Civilian Personnel Division staff. Through no choice of the men and women in CPD, they have become the most experienced team in government when it comes to handling a reduction in force.

There are some other silent lessons in the

results of previous RIFs, perhaps the most pertinent today is that no RIF yet turned out as bad as it first appeared.

The 1970 MICOM RIF, for example, began with the intent of cutting some 1,100 workers out in four months and it did, but thanks to a good outplacement program, resignations,

retirements, and voluntary transfers only 350 people had to be laid off. Many of them were rehired shortly.

In all the RIFs since, only 132 finally got laid off and some of them have also been rehired since. More than half the 1,278 RIF caused downgrades came in June 1970.

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# Military Collector Bidding For Tank

The lieutenant wants to buy a tank.

Not just any one, either. Only a 1944-model M-4 Sherman medium will satisfy First Lieutenant Randall Withrow.

Withrow, a serious student of World War II, collects items of military equipment of that vintage. He's serious enough to mourn the Messerschmidt fighter he passed up a chance to buy for \$10,000 several years ago.


Not having \$10,000 at the time made his decision easier then, but knowing the same plane is worth at least \$50,000 now hurts.

Withrow says there is particular historical interest in the 1944 M-4 Sherman. "They were shipped to Europe as fast as they came off the assembly lines to counter the heavier German Panzers. Minor alterations were held up for the sake of mass production. That made this particular Sherman a unique


vehicle in a number of ways. Now most of them have been sold for scrap, and this is one of the few left. I think it should be preserved."

Withrow is interested in other military and civilian vehicles. He already has a 1941 Command car, a 1941 Jeep, and a 1934 Ford pickup truck. He is in the process of assembling a fleet of discontinued Corvairs. He owns a total of 22 automobiles, of which 11 are non-running, used as sources for parts.

Another of Withrow's collections is uniforms, and notice of this one is international. In it are the dress uniforms of Air Chief Marshall W. G. S. Mitchell, the supreme commander of British air forces in World War II. Lost for years, Withrow found the uniforms in an old truck in England. The prestigious Imperial War Museum in London has shown interest in the donation of

one of them.

Other uniforms in the collection include several Luftwaffe flight suits complete down to breathing gear, parachutes, and Mae West life jackets. All that is lacking is the period aircraft he missed buying.

Withrow's other collections include military decorations (containing the highest decoration awarded by the German government in World War II, the Knight's Cross with Oak Leaves and Swords), small arms, and antique railroad equipment.

Withrow, assigned to the Chaparral-Faar project says the fact he is in the Army is of no special benefit to his collecting. "Most of the equipment or parts I need are no longer regulation and

have usually been scrapped. Even shades of paint are different. When I wanted to restore my Command car, I had to find someone with the original formula and mix the correct shade myself."

Withrow was drafted in 1970 after graduating from the University of Alabama. Since OCS was being phased down at the time of his application, he spent a tour in Germany as enlisted. After returning to the U.S. and earning a Master's Degree from Jacksonville State University, he reapplied for OCS, was accepted, and received his commission in 1975.

Several weeks ago, he swore in his wife, the first female graduate of Jacksonville State's four-year ROTC program, as a second lieutenant of the Army.


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
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# New Tactic In Bout With Beavers

If you can't whip 'em, join 'em, pretty well sums up the latest tactic in Redstone's long-running bout with the beavers. In an unlikely partnership, post wildlife people are teaming up with the furry rodents in a scheme that hopefully will ease beaver-dam flood damage and at the same time permit using their impoundments to promote the presence of aquatic life and waterfowl on the arsenal.

While flooding caused by the impoundments is a headache, they also play an important ecological role, providing habitat for swamp-dwelling animals, birds, reptiles and fish, and attract migratory waterfowl to the installation.

Striking a balance between the good and bad resulting from the impoundments may be possible with a new technique being tried here.

## Pipe Treatment

Over the weekend Rod and Gun Club volunteers emplaced lengths of 10 inch diameter pipe in a couple of beaver dams. The upstream portion of the pipe, extending out of the dam about seven feet, has been drilled full of one-inch holes. The end is plugged.

Beavers usually are unable to stop the flow through the holes in the pipe, according to a federal fish and wildlife specialist who recommended the technique be tried here.

The water level of the impoundment is controlled by capping or opening the downstream end of the pipe.

The beavers unwittingly will help secure the pipe in the dam as they patch around the gap blasted in the dam to contain it.

"We're told the technique has worked in

85 per cent of the cases where it's been used", says Dave Bryant, Redstone Wildlife Manager.

Bryant says if the technique proves out at the two dams, it will be tried at numerous other problem impoundments on the installation.

There are believed to be as many as 100 beaver colonies here. Most are south of Buxton Road, but several are north on McKinley Range and Test Area I.

"If we can fluctuate the water level in the impoundments", says Bryant, "then we can have water in fall and winter for waterfowl, but can keep it down at other times so trees aren't killed."

## Killing Trees

The impoundments, which inundate about 150 acres, have killed large stands of mature valuable hardwood timber and have flooded roads and cut off access to parts of the arsenal. Additionally, timber damage caused by foraging beavers has been extensive.

The impoundments are less attractive to waterfowl when trees die and stop producing mast the waterfowl feed on.

With installation of pipe in the dams, it is hoped the beavers will leave some of the

impoundments and rebuild in areas where they can be better tolerated, Bryant said. If they do, the abandoned dams still can be used to fluctuate the water level for waterfowl.

## Prolific

As a result of over-trapping when pelts were in high demand, beavers once were all but extinct in the Tennessee Valley. There were estimated to be 250 in Alabama in 1940. Now there are believed to be about 200,000 in the state.

In the absence of trapping, they proliferate unchecked as they have no natural predators in this locale.

Trappers help control the beaver population here, but the animals probably are increasing faster than they are taken out. In recent years the number of animals trapped has dropped from 90 or more to 67 in the past season. This is because trappers concentrate on getting more valuable pelts, Bryant said.

Dams at problem impoundments are blasted periodically, but often are rebuilt within days. With their uncanny building and engineering skills, beavers can turn a torrent into a trickle overnight.

The pipe treatment usually foils them however.

# Oil: Source of Trouble In Waste Water Treatment

Oil speeds up and smooths out most processes, but has the opposite effect on waste water treatment. Almost a month ago a slug of oil moved into one of the treatment plants here, and the plant is just now fully recovering.

Oil can foul up the treatment process for as long as two months when it enters a plant, according to Lewis Lindenmayer, chief of the sewer plants unit here. He is concerned about a recent spate of incidents of oil getting into domestic sewers.

The oil kills bacteria in filters and digesters that are essential to treating the waste water, said Jim Reid, water quality chemist at Facilities Engineer.

Within the past month there have been oil problems at all four treatment plants. The oil often moves in at night when the plants are unattended, and does its damage before being discovered.

Where is it coming from? "We wish we knew", says Lindenmayer. "We try to find out by back-tracking up the line looking in

manholes, but we often lose it before we can pinpoint the source." There are more than 100 miles of sewer lines on the arsenal, making oil sources hard to trace, he noted.

The problem appears to stem mainly from the tendency people have to dump any waste down the drain so long as it's liquid. "It seems to come in cycles", says Jim Reid. "We had it stopped for some time but it's beginning to come back.

"It's mostly a matter of keeping people aware of the problem. We'll track down the sources, get people conscious of the problems oil causes, and we'll stop getting it. But then work assignments change, new people come in, and the problem comes back," he added.

Oil also has been detected recently in storm sewers and in streams that receive untreated waste water discharges. This, as is the case when oil enters a sewer plant and cuts the efficiency of treatment, causes pollution and can put the installation in violation of clean water requirements imposed by Environmental Protection Agency.

Some other liquid substances, for example paint and various chemicals, also hinder waste water treatment.

Solid materials which do not dissolve, such as cloth, plastic and metal, can cause equipment breakdowns. Disposable plastic items that people routinely flush down commodes cause equipment damage, as do the nylon-like reinforcing fibers in some paper towels, Lindenmayer said.

An updated regulation dealing with disposal of oil and other pollutants has just been issued. Meanwhile, a program has begun to inspect, repair and clean grease traps and oil-water separators on a monthly basis. The separators and traps, which prevent oil and other pollutants from entering sewer lines or ditches and streams, are used at vehicle maintenance points and similar areas.

A complete renovation of waste water treatment on the arsenal is being planned. The renovation, costing several million dollars, is expected to be done within four years.

## No Career Fields Closed Completely

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — DA recruiting officials say that some soldiers in the field have been hearing bad rumors about first term reenlistment restrictions.

Some soldiers are not reenlisting in overstrength MOSs because they have heard they can't. "This just isn't true," said one official. "There is no MOS which is completely closed to first term soldiers who want to reenlist in FY 77."

A soldier in an overstrength PMOS is encouraged to apply for reenlistment but should be counseled that he or she may be subject to retraining and reclassification.

"If the PMOS is overstrength, soldiers should list three or more shortage MOSs for which they are qualified and will accept retraining and reclassification. Soldiers should know before reenlisting in their PMOS or one of the other choices," the official stated. Up to this point, soldiers are not bound in any way to accept an MOS other than their PMOS. If they decide not to

accept the MOS at reenlistment, they may ETS from the service.

In another development, DA officials stated that no action will be taken to retrain and reclassify careerists at the time of reenlistment, but that careerists are encouraged to apply for retraining and reclassification from an overstrength MOS to a short MOS.

DA Circular 611-56 lists the status of all MOSs. Soldiers should check out the circular carefully before making any reenlistment plans.

# Host Families Needed For Foreign Soldiers

A prolonged visit to a foreign country, away from family, friends, and familiar customs can be a cold lonely period for young soldiers.

For the foreign soldiers who come to Redstone's Missile and Munitions Center and School for advanced individual training, that forlorn feeling is common. With many of the soldiers from such distant countries as West Germany, Jordan, the National Republic of China, and South Korea taking highly technical training here that can last well over a year, it's not difficult to understand why.

In order to help the non-U.S. soldiers feel more comfortable and at home here, and to allow them a more intimate view of America, the Host Family Program was started. The Host Family Program allows families here who are members of the program to sponsor non-U.S. soldiers and their families while

the soldiers train here.

"This program is really beneficial to both the students and the sponsors," explained James L. Ballinger, education specialist here at the Foreign Student Support Office, and a member of the Host Family Program. "Lifelong friendships can be developed, it promotes international good will, it's an excellent opportunity to practice humanities, and you assist in creating good attitudes that very definitely have an effect on our international policy."

Currently, about 224 families in the Huntsville area sponsor foreign students stationed at Redstone, but many more are needed. "We need at least 125 more host families," said Ballinger. "Right now there are 350 foreign students here, about 100 of them have families here also. In July we'll peak out with over 400 students. We really need more Host Family sponsors."

Families interested in becoming a sponsor can apply for membership either at the Foreign Student Support Office here, or at the courthouse in Huntsville. On the Arsenal, families who want to find out more about the program can call Capt. Gregory, Ms. Sutton, Ms. Moore, MSgt. Brown, or Ballinger at the Foreign Student Support Office at 876-1704, 2407, or 7586. At the courthouse, interested families can contact Bee Albright, chairman of the Council for International Visitors at 536-5911, extension 260.

Families selected as sponsors will be contacted and informed of who they will sponsor, and what country he comes from. The sponsor will also be asked to become familiar with the political, military, and geographic background of the student's country.

To insure that the student and the family have common interests, questionnaires are filled

out by both parties, and the council will try to match them as closely as possible. "We try to match the two (family and student) so the relationship will be mutually beneficial," said Ballinger. Some of the routine questions asked are: what sports do you enjoy, do you play a musical instrument, and what are your hobbies and interests.

Many families here feel enriched by becoming friends with people from other lands, according to Ballinger. Many times, the students will be sent to the U.S. more than once, and will revisit their sponsor, or just keep in touch by mail. Often, the students and families remain very close.

Ballinger perhaps put it best in explaining the reaction most people have after joining the program. He said, "It can change your life when you bring someone into your life. It just gives you a really good feeling."

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


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
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## BMD Radar Test Ahead of Schedule

The Army's second generation ballistic missile defense radar has passed the first full-scale test of its ability to track an intercontinental ballistic missile reentry vehicle nearly a month ahead of schedule.

The radar, part of the Systems Technology Test Facility at the Kwajalein Missile Range, successfully detected, acquired, and tracked a reentry vehicle from a Minuteman ICBM launched from Vandenburg Air Force Base, 5,000 miles away, by an Air Force operational crew.

Other tracking tests on progressively more difficult target complexes will be

accomplished over the next several months.

The Systems Technology Test Facility consists of an integrated radar, data processor and enabling software. It is operated by the McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Company for the Army's BMD Systems Command, as part of the BMD Systems Technology Program.

The Systems Technology Program is designed to investigate and evaluate a variety of potential BMD Systems. It is focussed on solutions to key technical issues that would be involved in developing such systems, and on reducing costs and deployment lead time.

# Team Needs Players, Coaches

In accepting the position, President Carter stated: "My general policy is not to accept honorary chairmanships, but I will make an exception because of the importance of the USO to our Nation's military personnel." The President has undertaken such chairmanships for only three organizations: the USO, American Red Cross and Boy Scouts of America.

**Began in WWII**

Since the USO was established in 1941 during World War II by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the President of the United States has traditionally headed the voluntary organization which represents civilian concern for military personnel away from home. Currently, the USO operates 100 social welfare and recreational centers around the globe to serve the well-being of the 2.1 million members of the Armed Forces and their 3.1 million dependents.

Originally known to men and women in uniform for free coffee, doughnuts and USO shows, the organization also sponsors programs which feature civic, cultural, social welfare and educational activities.

**Community Link**

Program emphases are in assisting transplanted young dependent families and fostering the understanding of racial and minority groups. As the principal link between the military and civilians, USO enables Service personnel to participate in meaningful community projects in their leisure time.

A non-profit organization, USO is supported by contributions from the American public.

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
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


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




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


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
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
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
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
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

# Redstone's A Great Place But Airborne Is Better

How does a captain who's airborne qualified feel about being stationed at Redstone? "It's a great place," Capt. William J. Harp, company commander of the 7th Student Company said, "I enjoy the students."

Harp is a 16-year veteran of the Army. He spent six of those years as an enlisted soldier. After OCS he volunteered for Special Forces. He has been at Redstone about two and a half years.

"I'm kind of a different breed of cat. When I was small my brother was in Special Forces. My dream had always been to be an airborne man and lead a group in combat," he said.

In 1968 while serving a tour of duty in Vietnam, Harp's dream came true. It was just a small strip of Vietnamese real estate, near the Cambodian border that the enemy wanted, but he and his men, along with native troops, fought desperately to hold on to it. It is referred to as the battle of Duc Lap.

The enemy was in need of victories after a series of losses they had suffered. They had plans for making Duc Lap one of these much needed victories.

During the battle the small area of land changed hands twice but the final outcome

was in favor of the 5th Special Forces and native troops.

"Being an airborne man, stationed in an airborne unit and leading a Special Forces troop into combat was everything I expected and a little more," Harp said.

While in airborne training Harp received instruction in communications, weapons, engineering, infantry, medical and intelligence fields. According to him, "Officers receive more detailed training in these areas than the enlisted troops."

He has been stationed at Ft. Bragg, 6th Special Forces unit, Ft. Devens, 5th Special Forces unit and Vietnam with the 5th Special Forces unit.

"Once you're airborne qualified," Harp explained, "You're not required to be stationed with an airborne unit, but you're always airborne qualified."

Harp is a native of North Fork, Calif. and attended Reedly High School in California. He is presently working on a BA in business administration at Athens.

Regarding his future, Harp said, "I'll stick around the Army for 20 years and see if I want to make a career out of it."

When asked if he would like to be stationed with an airborne unit again he replied, "Of course!"





One such proposal resulted in a cash award of \$4,765 for a MICOM employee during the past year. The award was based on estimated first year savings in excess of \$3.5 million.





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

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# Selecting Women For Managers

Some good tips for selecting women to occupy management positions were outlined by Sally Clements in a speech she gave recently to the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Society of Logistics Engineers.

She is the deputy for Materiel Acquisition in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army, (I&L), and is the only female supergrade in the Army.

"First," she said, "Select as initial candidates for development those women perceived by others as having the characteristics considered most important for managers."

A nationwide study, she said, revealed that the four most important characteristics are: decisiveness; consistency and objectivity; emotional stability; and analytical ability.

Her second recommendation is to select and, or develop women who have expertise in their field clearly superior to the great majority of those to be supervised.

Next she said, "I recommend that one

explain to women candidates for management the organization's role requirements for a manager, and let them consider these requirements carefully before beginning development activity.

"The follow-on recommendation is to select, as potential positions for development and placement, positions in areas where the occupations are less sex-typed.

"Occupations can be described as "sex-typed" when a large majority of those in them are of one sex and when there is an associated expectation that this is as it should be. The longer an occupation exists with its sex-typing intact, the stronger the typing becomes. It would follow that occupations developed around newer technological or service developments would be good places for women.

"I strongly recommend to select as potential positions for women managers, those where the majority of the subordinate personnel are experienced.

"If possible select as positions for

development and initial placement for women, those positions where the superior is exceptionally supportive.

"Also, select as potential placements for women managers, positions where expertise is a large and important component of authority.

"Next, make role training a basic and continuing segment of development.

"And last but not least, provide visibility to the program of management development for women."

Clements said she feels that an organization should establish the recognition among employees, managerial and non-managerial alike, that women can be effective managers and that it is an appropriate role for them.

She also brought out in her speech that there are now within DARCOM 38 women in Grade 14 or above. There are 31 GS-14s and 7 GS-15s. Seven of those 14s and one of the 15s are at MIRADCOM and MIRCOM, and 26 women in Grade 13 are in these commands.

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
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
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# Dead Fish Found In Two Streams

With one fish kill already recorded this year, Redstone water quality specialists fear there may be others if a combination of high temperature and little rainfall carries on much longer.

Dead fish were found in two arsenal streams early last week, apparently dying over the weekend.

Numerous large dead carp were found in Huntsville Spring Branch, while some smaller fish were found dead in McDonald Creek near where the two streams intersect.

An investigation into the cause of the fish kill has been inconclusive.



There was some evidence indicating the kill was set off by an unknown stress in McDonald Creek which caused small fish to die. Larger fish apparently were not immediately killed by the stress, but died later in the oxygen-depleted waters in Huntsville Spring Branch after moving into the branch to feed.

The fish kill is the only one known to have occurred here in three years, although in past years they've occurred with frequency in prolonged dry spells when dissolved oxygen levels in Huntsville Spring Branch drop below life-supporting levels.

The dissolved oxygen, or DO, level in the Spring Branch is dropping rapidly. A DO level of 1 milligram per liter of water was recorded two days ago in the area where the fish kill occurred. Carp were observed breathing by coming to the surface and gulping air in the Spring Branch at Patton Road.

In measurements taken after the fish kill the Spring Branch had a 1.6 DO level while McDonald Creek registered a DO level of 4. A level of 5 is considered acceptable.

DO content in the Spring branch normally does not drop to its present low level until well on into the summer. Without rain to increase the oxygen supply, more fish kills may occur.

# CPR Training

Instruction in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) an emergency method of reviving and keeping a person alive until he or she can be taken to a hospital, is to be offered to all Redstone military and civilian personnel in the Recreation Center.

The first session will be from 6 to 9 next Monday evening. Other sessions of the nine-hour course will be at the same time Wednesday and Friday. The second course begins June 27 and will be given at the same times and place. Future courses will be on a similar schedule and in the same location.

The program, administered by the Redstone Army Hospital, is being offered based on a suggestion of MG George E. Turnmeyer, MIRCOCOM Commander, and is in conjunction with the American Red Cross. Hospital personnel will serve as instructors.

LTC Albert D. Reumann, Chief Nurse at the Hospital, said the training will have two elements. During the first element, Commanders of Arsenal troops will be offered the training for their personnel unit by unit over the next year. The second element will be a program offered to all Arsenal personnel in groups of 15 to 20 persons during off-duty hours at night and on weekends. This nine-hour course will be in three sessions.

On completion, persons will be certified by the American Red Cross. LTC Reumann said the objective is to train one person in each family. "It is a technique anyone can learn and use", he said.

"We are looking for volunteers who are qualified and interested in becoming instructors to be placed in special instructors courses. If there is any group of persons who would like to hear about CPR, a hospital representative would be glad to talk to them".

# MIRADCOM Solicits For Antenna Arrays

The Army Missile Research and Development Command has issued requests for proposals to industry soliciting their bids for antenna arrays used by both the Army's Patriot and the Navy's Aegis air defense systems.

Solicitations went to 17 different sources which have until June 20 to respond. From those responses, MIRADCOM will award one or two procurement contracts.

Looking for alternatives to current antenna arrays used by both services, the program will give the Army and Navy prototype phased array antennas featuring the latest technology but are lightweight and low cost.

Ronald Eystone of MIRADCOM's Advanced Systems Concepts Office is program manager for the Antenna Array Program and Don Wilson, Naval Surface Weapons Center, is the Deputy Program Manager.

Program objectives are to coordinate future Army and Navy efforts in surface to air missile defense, promote weapon commonality and exchange of missile components and subsystems, eliminate development redundancy, reduce development time, cost and risk of future programs by using the prototype approach which calls for proof of principle hardware demonstrations rather than strict adherence to military specifications.

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
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
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# Takes Patience To Be A Top Kick

The man must have a wellspring of patience. He responds to the fifth interruption in 45 minutes with the same polite apology as the first. His manner upon returning to the interview indicates that such frequent interruptions are common. For him, they are.

First Sergeant Irvin S. Daniel, recently assigned to Company B, Missile and Munitions Center and School, explained that interruptions go with a first sergeant's job. "I have so many priorities I couldn't pinpoint them all. My major effort is seeing that personnel and administrative problems are handled in the best possible way. After that I stress the educational process."

Naturally the problems, both administrative and personnel, always appear to require immediate attention. Daniel has had experience with both, learning the first sergeant's mystical feat of balancing a constantly shifting load of other peoples' problems, while maintaining the flow of routine business. He has accomplished this with Co. B for more than a month; just a few days after he completed the missile maintenance supervisor course here.

Daniel worked as a radio repairman during his first enlistment 19 years ago. After reenlisting for the first time, he attended a radar repair course. The introduction of the Vulcan anti-aircraft system led to his retraining in their maintenance.

He supervised Vulcan maintenance in the 101st Airborne Division when promoted to master sergeant in the MOS 27Z50. Before receiving orders sending him back to Redstone for training in his new MOS, he was assigned as the first sergeant of Company D, 801st Maintenance Battalion, Ft. Campbell, Ky.

The highlight of his tenure with Co. D was the preparation, participation and return from Reforger '76. In spite of the long hours of demanding work involved, the first sergeant declared, "I enjoyed that. It was a beautiful operation." He noted Co. B is quite a bit different from TO&E outfit, but I'm learning to like it."

Daniel thinks his background will be an important asset in his job at Co. B. He explained, "Most of the people have technical jobs. I understand the problems and requirements of doing technical work in the Army from first-hand experience."

He places little importance on being the only black soldier in the MMCS chain of command. "It has no bearing on the job I try to do." According to Daniel, "You're either a good soldier or you're not. Race has nothing to do with it."

Although he enjoys living in the Huntsville area, the first sergeant finds little time for his favorite hobbies. "I like to golf and I like to bowl, but I spend most of my free time watching my kids. Besides the company team, three of my own kids are on teams." With a look of near total frustration he confirmed, "I spend a lot of time just driving from ballfield to ballfield."

Sometimes he has to leave the game he is watching to pick up players for another team. But then, he is used to interruptions.
