

Morale Makes Turn for the Better

Morale in Redstone's major missile management organizations took a turn up last week.

No one said anything at first as though talking might scare it away, but by week's end even confirmed pessimists admitted there was a general feeling that things had begun to get better.

An informal sampling among managers, supervisors and civilian workers in MIRCOM, MIRADCOM and the Patriot Project Office turned up that collective judgement.

It contrasted sharply with a similar sampling early in July by the Public Affairs Office when almost everyone interviewed reported morale low and sinking.

The most obvious reason for change came July 29 when RIF letters went out. People who said last week that their morale was up

often said their spirits lifted when they did not get a letter. Morale among those who did get letters was not exactly soaring, but often those with a letter in hand said they welcomed the opportunity to change jobs. Even some who had been downgraded said they understood and accepted the decisions that might eventually cost them pay. A few expressed confidence that they would have their grades back within two years.

Others, as might be expected, were hurt and angry.

And if morale might be said to be generally on the upturn, there are still places at Redstone where it has all but sunk from public view.

Elsewhere, however, the upturn—any upturn—was a welcome change after the gloom of a two year realignment that ended

MICOM and the doom of reorganization and RIF that got piled on top of it just as the two new commands had begun to sort things out last spring.

Some other general conclusions that emerge from many conversations with men and women at all levels:

—Morale is highest where people have plenty to do. Those who told us they were working hard seldom had adverse things to say about their supervisors, work place or co-workers.

—Above everything else, people at all levels want a chance to settle down, learn their jobs and get on with things, but they are almost unanimous in the belief that nother RIF will be along almost as soon as this one is completed.

—A growing number of people actually like RIFs. Those who do cite different reasons. Many say they are miserable where they are now, and welcome the chance to move.

—There is rising anger among workers over non-producing co-workers and supervisors who tolerate them.

—Some - but not many - have given up,

Closedown for The Holidays?

Plans are being made to close or curtail operations in local Army Commands and activities serviced by the MIRCOM Civilian Personnel Division during the Christmas holidays and on the Friday after Thanksgiving.

According to the MIRCOM Civilian Personnel Division, these local Commanders have examined their operations and determined that from an operational as well as an energy conservation standpoint, it makes sense to close or curtail operations during these periods. Discussions held with officials of AFGE Local 1858 indicate their interest and support in such a plan.


The plan is to close or curtail operations to the extent practicable on Friday, November 25, and from close of business on December 23 to start of business on January 3, 1978.

All employees except those who work on critical operations which must be continued during the close down or curtailment period will be encouraged to take annual leave or leave without pay. The Civilian Personnel Division points out that no employee will be forced to take leave.

Those employees who elect to work will be allowed to do so, however, since part of the plan is to centralize operations to conserve energy, those who elect to work may be assigned to different work locations during this period. Military personnel assigned to these activities are also included in the plan.

Plans will be finalized and an official announcement made in the near future. However, employees who desire to be on leave during these periods should now begin to review and adjust their leave schedules to insure sufficient annual leave is accrued to cover these periods.

Equal Opportunity Program

The policy of the Army is to provide equal opportunity and treatment for its soldiers and their dependents. Equal Opportunity (EO) means equal consideration and treatment based upon merit, fitness, and capability.

A policy such as this fosters teamwork and esprit de corps. To further contribute to this policy, the Army has revised its AR 600-21, "Equal Opportunity Program in the Army."

GENERAL

The revised regulation goes beyond focusing on race relations. It targets good relationships among all soldiers, regardless of race, color, sex, religion, age or national origin.

The changes reflect a continuing interest in upgrading the Equal Opportunity Program.

The regulation requires major commanders to become more involved in developing and carrying out their own EO programs.

Besides active Army troops, the regulation also applies to members of the National Guard when called to active federal service. It also applies to members of the Army Reserve when serving on active duty, on active duty for training, or in an inactive duty training status.

The training portion of the Equal Opportunity Program has been broadened to make it more adaptable to local situations and to strengthen relations among all groups.

Commanders must tailor the training to their units' needs and may use their own judgments as to the frequency, length, method, and the topics to be covered.



RESPONSIBILITIES

The chain of command will be the primary channel for communications on equal opportunity matters.

The Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel (DCSPER) at DA level has general staff responsibility for all plans, policies, and actions pertaining to the Army Equal Opportunity Program. The Director of the Office of Equal Opportunity acts as the principal staff assistant and advisor to the DCSPER.

Commanders are responsible for training their units in equal opportunity, just as they are for other subjects. Members in the chain of command, including supervisors, will participate in equal opportunity sessions as instructors and discussion leaders.

Staff EO personnel will not be assigned further duties in other human development areas such as drug and alcohol abuse programs.

The EO staff members will function as those of any other section within the command. Command channels will be used in working with EO staff officers in the next echelon of command.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTIONS


Affirmative Actions are those efforts by the Army directed toward assuring that each soldier is afforded an equal opportunity to advance in his or her military career.

Affirmative Actions include identifying and eliminating all discriminatory practices within the Army. They are the keystones of the Equal Opportunity Program.

The regulation calls for an environment in which each member is offered impartial treatment at all times. Commanders must now develop plans and follow-through to achieve that goal.

Equal opportunity is everybody's business. The revised regulation reflects this view. For example, new emphasis has been placed on the Equal Opportunity role of all commanders and staff officers and not just on the Equal Opportunity Officer.

More than any other single feature, the revised regulation is designed to continue strengthening the Equal Opportunity Program.

Hospital Honors Noted Army Doctor

Army officials have announced that a new hospital here will be named for the late Brigadier General Leon Alexander Fox, a Birmingham native with long and distinguished service as an Army doctor.

Fox Army Hospital, a modern 40-bed military medical facility, is expected to open in mid 1978.

BG Fox made major contributions to the medical profession during a military career that began in the Alabama National Guard in 1915 and continued until his retirement from the Army Medical Corps in 1946. He died in 1965 at the age of 74.

His medical successes include the discovery in 1941 that malaria is transmitted by the anopheles mosquito, a vector which until that time had not been suspected. He is also credited with major medical victories in controlling typhus fever in Africa and Europe in World War II.

The general graduated medical school at the University of Cincinnati in 1912. While in the Army he earned three more degrees, including doctorates in health sciences from American and Johns Hopkins Universities.

During more than three decades of military service he served in two World Wars and earned 16 medals and decorations, including awards from the British and Italian Governments.

In World War II he received high military honors for carrying out large scale public health and preventive medicine programs

in connection with construction work for military bases and ferry routes in various parts of the world.

In one instance, under war pressure and difficult tropical conditions he quickly pulled together a health program for 60,000 civilian construction workers in the Caribbean that resulted in lasting contributions to the field of tropical medicine, including the discovery that malaria is transmitted by the anopheles mosquito during research in the West Indies.

In what was regarded as one of the greatest triumphs of preventive medicine in World War II, BG Fox was placed in charge of fighting a typhus epidemic which broke out in Naples and Southern Italy in 1943, threatening military operations. Securing the cooperation of civilian and military agencies in an assault on the disease, he managed to bring it under control within a month. He was awarded the United States of America Typhus Commission Medal.

He received numerous other successes in the medical specialties of laboratories, epidemiology, pathology and sanitation, and was a prolific contributor to medical literature, specializing in studies of bacterial warfare.

Fox Army Hospital will be dedicated in his honor at the opening ceremony. The hospital commander is anxious to contact any relatives of the late general who wish to participate in the dedication.

Problems Bring Need for Union

Speaking before a Senate committee, the president of the American Federation of Government Employees said recently that any work force will unionize if it has serious problems, and the armed services will too unless Congress resolves problems of military people.

Kenneth T. Blaylock, AFGE President, said if the problems continue military unions will form whether or not AFGE organizes them.

Results of a vote by the AFGE national membership on a proposal to organize the military are expected to be announced in the near future. AFGE locals at Redstone said no to the proposal in a recent vote.

Opposition of officials in the defense establishment to unionization appears total.

Blaylock said AFGE's interest in organizing the military developed after concerned service members came to the union. He said there is serious concern among members over attacks on their benefits. Career people view these benefits as part of their enlistment contract with the U.S. Government, he added.

Blaylock said Congress deals effectively with the weapons and hardware aspects of national defense but is less effective with the manpower and people aspects. Unionization focused on peace-time living and working conditions outside combat command channels would contribute positively to the armed services, the AFGE President said.

AFGE would represent members of the military before disciplinary boards, administrative proceedings and Congress, he said.

Blaylock was elected to the AFGE presidency last October from a union office in Huntsville.

dug in and are waiting for retirement. Their views contrast sharply with men and women who want to work but who say they are not being used effectively, seldom have enough to do.

The conventional wisdom holds that personnel turbulence hurts productivity. Maybe so, but individual workers and their bosses, contacted separately, are reluctant to admit that their work is off. Almost all of them say they're doing fine, and then add that if things are off generally it must be because of a slowdown elsewhere in the organization.

Those who say things like that however, also add that they are working harder for several reasons: fewer hands to do the job; fewer still, because of RIF reassignments, who know what the old jobs are all about.

And they say too that they must take time from their jobs to teach people reassigned from other work areas, many of whom they feel have a "what's the use" attitude because of RIF reassignment.

Often people express concern that although the quantity of work may be holding up, the quality may be falling off. One man downgraded and moved to a new job summed it up bitterly:

"You get what you pay for," he said.

Elsewhere supervisors and workers alike, however, agreed that individuals reassigned to their work areas in the RIF had excellent attitudes, picked up the job quickly and were pulling their weight.

Managers and some workers expressed a concern that a long term RIF impact on morale—just now being felt—is that where talent has been spread thin, "good" people must be kept constantly pinned down to the office routine, seldom if ever have the opportunity for a new challenge.

Many more men and women who talked with us, however, were far more concerned with a short term result of RIF and realignment: Where people are working hard, those who are not area a lot easier to spot than they used to be.

The workforce, generally, is much less tolerant than it once was of the office character or non producer. "The guy at the next desk who falls asleep is not so funny if you have to do his job and yours too," one woman said.

"We can see them, the supervisor can see them too," a man added. "If they want to retire he ought to help them find the door."

Electric Bills High in July

A blazing hot July sent electrical bills soaring throughout the Tennessee Valley. Redstone was no exception.

TVA billed the arsenal \$536,000 for electrical power for July — a record high that will force some changes.

About \$21,000 was an added charge for exceeding a pre-set demand, that is the arsenal gets hit with extra charges if in a specified 30 minute daily period, it draws power from TVA above a previously stated limit.

Much of the installation's electrical power use is now controlled by computer. In addition to continuing conservation measures, one obvious means of not exceeding the pre-set limit is to program the computer to start turning things off as the limit is approached.

ARPA Experiment

Army missile men are working on a new concept for an infantry assault weapon - a cantaloupe-size, rocket propelled high explosive warhead aimed and launched with a standard service rifle.

The Rifleman's Assault Weapon is managed by the Missile Research and Development Command. MIRADCOM recently awarded a \$509,000 contract to Brunswick Defense Division to do exploratory development work on the new concept.

The RAW warhead mounts on a launcher bracket that slips on the end of an M-16 rifle barrel. Firing a regular cartridge round in the rifle, starts a small rocket motor that propels RAW to the target. The design envisions spinning the RAW as it leaves the launcher to stabilize the warhead in flight to the target.

Using a RAW, a rifleman would be able to hit a close-in target such as a building or bunker with an impact now obtained only with mortars, satchel charges or artillery.

The contract to Brunswick from MIRADCOM followed an early effort funded by the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency. Experimental firings under that effort were sufficiently impressive to warrant the follow on work.

Nationwide Opposition

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — A recent Gallup Poll showed almost 75 percent of the nation's population opposed to unionization of the military. The interviews for the poll were conducted in June at more than 300 locations across the country.

The question, "Would you favor or oppose unionization of the American Armed Forces?" was asked of 1,526 individuals. Of that number, 74 percent opposed the idea, 13 percent favored it, and 13 percent had no opinion.

Critics of unionization stated that there would be a loss of discipline and readiness if the services were unionized. In addition, they felt that the costs of the military would increase.

Those who support unionization say that military men and women have legitimate problems dealing with working conditions and pay.

In the Gallup poll, those opposed to military unions were found to be almost as great among members of labor union families as in nonunion families.

Board Considers Specialty

Officers eligible for promotion to Colonel have received notification that specialties will be considered by the promotion board. Board results will be released in September, though the current list is not projected to be exhausted by them.

The 1977 Colonel AUS, APL, CH and JA Promotion Board, following the normal compilation of the recommended list containing the maximum number of promotees allowed, will compare selections with the OPMS in which a shortage in the grade of Colonel is projected during the next 12 months, excepting CH and JA.

The Board will be given additional promotion quotas and instructed to select additional officers on a best qualified basis to fill the projected specialty shortage. Names of those selected to fill the additional requirements will be integrated into the final promotion list in the normal fashion.

Officers selected to fill these additional quotas will be true specialists as evidenced by their demonstrated expertise and past assignments in the specialty for which selected. Selections will be made on a best qualified basis and selected officers must be fully deserving of promotion.

If the board determines that the population of best qualified officers within a specialty does not support selection for promotion, a short fall will be accepted. Specific shortage specialties will not be released until the board adjourns.

These instructions represent another phase in the implementation of the officer personnel management system, begun in 1973, which is designed to better meet future army needs and a system to which the army is committed.

An additional change in instructions given the 1977 Colonel Promotion Board involves the selection of officers from the secondary zone. Guidance given the Board requires that those officers selected from the secondary zone be better qualified for promotion than primary zone officers they replace. It is felt this policy will assure to the maximum extent possible the selection of the best qualified officers for promotion.

Wage Reform

(Federal News)

President Carter has endorsed a legislative proposal for reforms in the Federal (blue-collar) wage system, submitted to the Congress by former President Ford with his 1978 budget message.

In his 1978 budget revisions, President Carter said "This legislation would correct those provisions of current law that cause significant departures from the local prevailing rate principle, and result in an unfair competitive advantage for the Federal Government and unjustified payroll costs. Early enactment of those reforms is strongly recommended by the administration."

If enacted, the bill would repeal the provision of law referred to as the "Monroney Amendment." This provision requires that private industry wage-rate data be obtained from outside the local area for certain specialized jobs when there are large numbers of Federal employees but few private industry employees in the specialized job within the local wage area.

The data obtained from outside the area are then used to construct the wage schedule for all Federal blue-collar employees in the area. In most cases this results in Federal wage employees being paid rates higher than their privately employed counterparts in the local area.

The proposed legislation would also repeal the requirement that Federal wage employees be paid uniform differentials of 7.5 percent of their basic pay for second shift work and 10 percent for the third shift. This would permit the differentials to vary from area to area based on the

prevailing local practice.

In addition, the bill would repeal the requirements that non-supervisory federal wage system schedules have five steps with the prevailing rate (the payline rate developed from statistical analysis of private industry survey data) set at the

second step, and 4 percent increments between steps. This will enable the Commission to establish a step-rate structure closer to that found in the non-Federal sector, and to align average Federal Wage System rates more closely with average rates found in industry.

Children entering first grade must be six years old on or before October 2 and must have a birth certificate. Children entering other grades should have some school record such as last year's report card.

All students entering the Huntsville School System for the first time must have an immunization slip. To obtain an immunization slip military families should take their international shot records to Pediatrics at the Base Hospital, Monday through Friday. Only the immunization slip can be accepted by the school. The slip is placed in the child's school record.

New students entering middle school or high school should register at the school any weekday as soon as possible.

Children of military families living on Post attend the following schools: first and second grades - Ridgecrest Elementary; third through fifth - Morris Elementary; sixth through eighth - Westlawn Middle School and ninth through twelfth - Butler High.

Families having a student in first or second grades at Ridgecrest have the option of letting their other children in grades three through six attend Ridgecrest also.

The first day of school is Monday, August 29. Lunch will not be served that day. Schedules for Monday, August 29 are: Ridgecrest and Morris, 8:30 a.m.; Westlawn, eighth, 8:00 a.m.; seventh 9 a.m.; sixth grade 10 a.m.; Butler, twelfth, 8 a.m.; eleventh, 9 a.m.; tenth, 10 a.m.; and ninth, 11 a.m. All sessions will be 30 minutes to an hour. The first full day of school is Tuesday, August 30.

Butler will have a freshman orientation session August 25 at 6:30 p.m. to be followed by a Pep Rally.

Madison on September 26 if necessary.

Nance warned that registered voters who have moved or changed their address should make certain they are properly transferred to the right voting district before the elections. Transfers will be accepted by telephone through August 29 by calling 536-5911, ext. 232.

Persons attempting to vote in districts in which they do not reside, face the probability of having to vote a challenged ballot.

Qualification to register for voting in Madison County are that the person must be a resident of the County, 18 years of age, and free of any disqualifying conviction as defined by Alabama law.

Cheverie is a Master Mason and his lodge is Rural Lodge, A.F. and A.M., Quincy, Mass. Both he and his wife, Margaret, are world travelers and plan to do more traveling in the near future.

His hobbies are traveling, photography, dancing and sports.

The Cheveries are planning to make Huntsville their permanent home.

Shorter European Tour?

(ARNEWS) — Officials at DA continue to support a reduction of first term tour length in Europe. One plan, if implemented, calls for the reduction of the tour to 30 months in FY 78 and 24 months in FY 79.

Officials caution that the reduction depends on the availability of funds and approval by the Secretary of Defense.

Staffers are considering several options to reach the desired reduction while maintaining required force levels in Europe.

The options being looked at are:

- o A two and one-half year enlistment for Europe.

- o Continuation of present enlistment options with a 24 month tour in Europe. In the case of a three year enlistment, an early drop of six months would be permitted after the soldier had served 24 months in country.

- o Continuation of the present enlistment option with a 24 month tour in Europe, permitting a 3 year enlistee to reenlist for CONUS after completing 24 months in Europe. If reenlistment were declined the soldier would serve 30 months and return to CONUS for ETS.

Paper Sugar?

(ARNEWS) — Scientists at the Army Natick Research and Development Command are working on a project that has the potential of solving critical world food shortages. The project involves the conversion of cellulose waste into energy-rich glucose sugar.

The original technology was developed by Natick in 1975. A year later, funding for the project was taken over by the Energy Research and Development Administration, with work continuing at the Natick Labs.

Scientists are studying the process to determine if it is economically feasible. Researchers at Natick are trying to convert cellulose into glucose sugar and its host of food, fuel and chemical by-products at an affordable price.

The basic material for the conversion is inexpensive and readily available. Some glucose sources include cellulose pulp,

newspapers, sugar cane stalks, waste currency, cotton, sawdust and even food stamps.

Natick researchers have found that paper mill waste is an ideal substance for conversion to sugar. Paper companies often pay for the disposal of these waste products—usually as land-fill. Instead it is a potential source for any number of useful products.

Researchers at Natick have built a small-scale production plant for converting paper wastes to sugar. They feel that the next step is to build a larger pilot plant close to a supply source where there is a high concentration of pulp and paper companies.

Officials say that the idea is still in early planning stages and much more engineering, design and economic data must be collected and evaluated before any plans are finalized.

Job Satisfaction Encourages Re-up

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The results are in on a Soldier Survey on job satisfaction and reenlistment intentions. DA officials have begun analyzing the results of the survey, conducted among approximately 4000 soldiers Army-wide in February 1977.

The initial results indicate that many soldiers who intend to reenlist were strongly influenced by the extent to which their expectations of the Army (gained through their recruiters) had been realized.

Staffers said the survey shows there are four major reasons volunteers join the Army:

- to become eligible for GI educational benefits.
- to learn a skill or trade to use in civilian life.
- to have the chance for adventure, travel and new experiences.
- to take time out to find oneself, and gain maturity.

These four categories accounted for almost two-thirds of the first term soldier responses.

Another point brought out by the survey was that the intent to reenlist in the Army was highest among soldiers who:

- originally joined to serve their country for patriotic reasons.
- joined "to be a soldier."
- had a family history of military service.
- enjoyed or benefited from the adventure, travel and experience their service provided.

Intent to reenlist was lowest among soldiers who joined the Army principally because:


- a friend was a soldier.
- of the area-station of choice plan.



Sponsor Can Remove Hassle from Moves

Moving around in the Army can be a hassle. Orders to another post mean packing and moving out, finding a new place to live, locating new schools, getting shots and digging up the kids' birth certificates—over and over again.

The Army has a program which can take some of the hassle out of moves. It's known as the sponsor program and it works if a soldier takes advantage of it.

Commanders are required by AR 608-7 to make their soldiers aware of the program, yet a survey two years ago showed that 40 per cent of soldiers had never heard of the program; 78 per cent of the enlisted soldiers said they had not been encouraged to participate in the program. DA officials stress that the responsibility for getting the message to the troops about the importance of the sponsor program lies with the commander.

The losing command is expected to issue a copy of DA Form 3922 to each departing soldier within seven working days after assignment orders are received. The first part of the form is filled out by everyone. If you elect to have a sponsor from your next unit, simply fill out the second part of the form. A copy of that form is then sent to the

gaining unit and the wheels of the sponsor program begin to roll.

The gaining unit has a fixed number of days to accomplish certain things after receiving the form. First, a sponsor is appointed; the sponsor should be of equal or higher rank, and the same sex, marital status and professional specialty as the person being sponsored. Second, a welcoming letter should be sent by the CO along with a locally produced information packet.

The newcomer is informed about such things as government and civilian housing, schools, household requirements, climate and recommended clothing, along with any other information that might help a soldier and his family adjust to the new location.

The sponsor should send a letter with home address, duty and home telephone numbers. The letter should include the number of the housing referral office as well. The newcomer should be furnished with a map of the area and should be advised that he or she will be met by the sponsor upon arrival at the new post.

There are many bits of information that a sponsor can provide. For example, some countries (and states) do not allow personal weapons or gun collections. Some countries do not allow automobiles made after a

certain year into the country; some areas do not have unleaded gas.

Restrictions on exotic pets and quarantine lengths can become major problems for a soldier who knows nothing about them. Some overseas posts may not be able to provide certain necessary furnishings. The sponsor can pass along that kind of information.

The sponsor should accompany the newcomer during in-processing at the unit, finance office, family housing office, the Army Community Services Center, vehicle registration, etc. Along with this, an introduction to coworkers and a tour of the post and local area will do much to make the newcomer feel at home.

Dispelling fears and false impressions the newcomer may have will make transition from one post to another happier and simpler for the soldier. Commanders can make the sponsor program a real "people program," but it can work only if soldiers understand it and use it.





ARRCOM Given Ammo Assignment

WASHINGTON — The Secretary of the Army announced last week that the Commander, Armament Materiel Readiness Command, at Rock Island, Illinois, has been designated DOD single manager for conventional ammunition.

Under the single manager program, a single military command is tasked with acquiring all the materiel of a specific type used by all branches of U. S. services. In this case, the naval ammunition depots at McAlester, Oklahoma, and Hawthorne, Nevada, will be transferred to the Army as Army ammunition plants on October 1. On the same date, an Army ammunition activity will be activated as a tenant unit at the Naval Weapons Support Center, Crane, Indiana.

The Single Manager mission for conventional ammunition was assigned to the Army in November, 1975, since the Army already procures 80 percent of U. S. military needs in this area. Conventional ammunition is defined as small arms ammunition, hand grenades, artillery and shipboard ammunition, bombs, land mines, demolition materiel, and unguided projectiles and rockets.

RIF CAKE — On the day before RIF notices came out recently, people in the MIRCOM Library in Building 5250 decided to have a Pre-Doomsday Party, on the assumption that no one would feel like partying later. Salads, cookies, coffee, and punch were the order of the afternoon, but the piece de resistance was this cake, prepared by Mrs. V. C. (Peggy) Mitchell. The Navy will transfer 100 personnel spaces and the Air Force 13 to ARRCOM at Rock Island. Initially, no civilian reduction-in-force will be required as a result of this action.

The orientation will be repeated on Sunday, August 29; Saturday, October 1 and Sunday, October 9. A session lasts approximately one hour.



Everyone hunting on the arsenal must have a state license in possession as well as the special Redstone hunting permit. It costs \$5 and is good for the entire season. Proceeds from the sale of the hunting permits go to a fund supporting wildlife management on the arsenal.

Upset Season

Before the 1977 baseball season began, anyone predicting that the Orioles, White Sox, Cubs, or Dodgers would be in the running for a pennant would have been called crazy.

But now, almost unbelievably, those same teams are leading their respective divisions going into the homestretch of the long season. If Baltimore, Los Angeles, and the two Chicago teams can hold on for the next 50 games, this season could be labeled as the biggest upset in baseball history. Everyone from Jimmy the Greek to your average local baseball nut chose four teams—the Yankees and Royals in the American League, and the Phillies and Reds in the National—that were undoubtedly going to be number one in their division. Two of those teams, the World Champion Reds and the free agent improved Yankees, were considered invincible in their leagues. But somehow, nothing has happened like it was supposed to.

In the American League last year, the Yankees took the East easily, beating out Baltimore by 10½ games, and the West was won by the Royals, edging Oakland by two and a half games—both teams were expected to repeat. New York, with the additions of super slugger Reggie Jackson and former Cincinnati pitching ace Don Gullett, was supposed to glide to a first place finish. In contrast, the Orioles lost Jackson, all-star second baseman Bobby Grich, and 20 game winner Wayne Garland, and were given little chance of finishing better than fifth.

With the big guns gone, Baltimore went to their farm clubs and brought up a squad of rookies to take up the slack of losing the stars. By scratching and digging for every run, they vaulted themselves to the top of the division, staying close to or ahead of the Yanks and another good team, the Boston Red Sox. And they did it without superstars or free agents. Only time will tell whether the Orioles can keep winning, but a lot of credit must be given to them for just being in the race at this stage of the season.

The results in the Western Division have been as startling as those in the East. The Chicago White Sox are leading. Last year the Chisox finished last with the worst record in the league (64-67), but this year they've played the best ball in the loop.

Although basically the same team, except for the loss of shortstop Bucky Dent and pitcher Rich Gossage, the additions of outfielders Richie Zisk and Oscar Gamble, and a few players brought up from the farm, there are few resemblances between this team and last year's. The key to Chicago's success has been their awesome hitting (they lead the league in team batting average and runs scored), and the ability to come up with the clutch play.

Much of the credit must be given to Bill Veeck, the club's colorful owner. By making a few shrewd trades and bringing up some talented minor leaguers, Veeck has transformed the Sox into a respectable team once again. And the White Sox couldn't have picked a better time to perk up, because they were on the verge of financial collapse. With a winning team, fan interest has increased considerably, easing the White Sox money woes for the time being.

The White Sox aren't the only team stirring up commotion in the Windy City these days. Their National League cousin, the Cubs, have been equally exciting. The Cubs, who finished fourth last year, 26 games behind first place Philadelphia, have led the East most of the season despite predictions of another fourth place finish.

The Cub phenomenon cannot be credited to one or two players, it has been a total team effort with everyone contributing. Good pitching, especially by starter Rick Rueschel, 15-3, and sophomore reliever Bruce Sutter, 28 saves and an ERA of about one, played a big part in the success of this surprising club. The hitting attack has been balanced and impressive also.

It would seem that fate owes the Little Bears a thing or two. The last time the Cubs were world champions was 1908, and their last pennant was in 1945. Maybe 1977 is finally the year of the Cub.

Predicting the outcome of the National League West was thought to be as safe as guessing that tomorrow would come. Everyone and his grandmother chose the mighty Cincinnati Reds to win it, and the rest of the teams would battle it out for second.

But for some unknown reason, the normally well oiled, smooth running Big Red Machine ran like a Model T with vapor lock, while the Los Angeles Dodgers have performed like a Dino Ferrari, zooming to a 13 game lead over Cincinnati.

With the power of Ron Cey, Steve Garvey, Reggie Smith, Dusty Baker, and Rick Monday to lead the way, this year's Dodger team has been one of the best offensive teams in the game. Along with the good hitting, there has also been the strong pitching so common to Dodger teams. At this stage of the game, it looks impossible for anyone to overtake LA.

This crazy, mixed up season proves one thing. There are no "sure things" in sports. No baseball team will ever again become a dynasty. Those days are gone forever, along with the Babe, Lou Gehrig, and the great Yankee teams. And maybe it's better this way, the future is a lot more exciting when it cannot be foreseen.

The Basic Program

Editor's Note: The new CHAMPUS reg, according to DoD officials eliminates inequities and will simplify CHAMPUS interpretation for beneficiaries, claim processors, and for the government. As a service to Army editors, ARNEWS is serializing an account of some of the benefits, eligibility and the appeals procedure in the new reg, along with the responsibilities of the beneficiary. These CHAMPUS articles are adapted from the Retired Army Bulletin.

Basically, CHAMPUS provides financial assistance to its beneficiaries to pay for medical care obtained from civilian sources; generally when such care is not available from Uniformed Services medical resources. In many ways, the Basic Program is similar to private medical insurance programs.

The Basic Program can be broken down into three categories:

- o Institutional benefits—Services and supplies provided by hospitals, residential treatment facilities, skilled nursing facilities, and certain special treatment facilities.
- o Professional benefits—Services provided by physicians, dentists, clinical psychologists, optometrists, podiatrists and certain other paramedical professionals.
- o Other benefits—Ambulance service, prescription drugs and medicines, durable medical equipment, etc.

The key qualification is that a service or supply must be medically necessary for the diagnosis and treatment of illness or injury or for maternity care. This concept has been the basis for CHAMPUS since the program was launched. The only difference is that it will be enforced more strictly under the new CHAMPUS regulation, which provides that all claims will be subject to special review.

Beneficiaries and their physicians should be aware of this intensified enforcement. This knowledge could prevent financial hardship for the member who might otherwise be faced with a medical bill which CHAMPUS cannot share because it is not considered medically necessary.

Some services and supplies must be preauthorized—authorized by CHAMPUS before they are received. Also, some beneficiaries must have nonavailability statements from a Uniformed Services medical facility before CHAMPUS can share the cost of inpatient care. Both these topics will be discussed separately later in this issue.

As a rule of thumb, CHAMPUS will share the expense for medically necessary services and supplies required in the diagnosis and treatment of illness or injury, or for maternity care. However, there are definitions, conditions, limitations and exclusions specified in the new regulation which can affect the benefits you think you should receive.

Certain services and supplies must be approved in writing by CHAMPUS before they are received for CHAMPUS to share the cost. This preauthorization is required primarily in those circumstances where there

are program limitations regarding services and supplies that might not qualify under CHAMPUS. Preauthorization also serves as financial protection for beneficiaries.

Under the Basic Program, preauthorization is required for cosmetic, reconstructive and-or plastic surgery, dental care, and inpatient admission to a residential treatment center (RTC) or any institution classified as a special treatment facility (STF). The regulation also requires preauthorization for admission to a skilled nursing home, but this will not go into effect until next year.

Preauthorization is valid for 90 days after it is issued unless otherwise indicated. The approval will show how long the preauthorization is valid, what it covers, and any special requirements.

A separate preauthorization request is required for each cosmetic surgery procedure, for each incident of dental care, and for each inpatient admission to an RTC or STF.

Diagnostic Admissions

CHAMPUS will share the cost on an inpatient basis when a beneficiary is admitted to a hospital or other institution primarily for medically necessary diagnostic tests that cannot be performed on an outpatient basis.

However, if a beneficiary is admitted to a hospital or other institution primarily for medically necessary diagnostic test that could have been performed on an outpatient basis, the cost of the tests will be shared on an outpatient basis. This provision is included in the regulation to discourage inpatient admissions that are not medically necessary.

Laetrile Not Cost Shared

Use of the drug, Laetrile, is not cost-shared under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services MG Benjamin R. Baker, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Resources and Programs) emphasized recently in a memo to the Military Departments.

Since Laetrile has not been approved by the Food and Drug Administration as safe and effective in the treatment of cancer for people, its use is excluded from the program by the CHAMPUS regulation, the General pointed out.

The purpose for singling out Laetrile for special comment, Baker stated, is to avoid confusion on the part of CHAMPUS beneficiaries. Since several states have passed legislation to permit its sale locally, he expressed concern that beneficiaries might assume CHAMPUS benefits are available for this drug, at least in those states where the sale of Laetrile is now legal.
