

EPA Says Fish Inedible

DDT Contamination Found In Tests

Levels of DDT exceeding the five parts per million federal limit for fish sold in interstate commerce were found in fish from the Tennessee River near Redstone Arsenal during recent tests by the Army Environmental Hygiene Agency.

Based on the tests, the Environmental Protection Agency said Friday that fish from the river in the vicinity of the Arsenal should not be eaten.

AEHA analysis of 15 fish collected from a one mile stretch of the river at Triana in July indicated DDT levels as high as 412 parts per million. Based on the Food and Drug Administration standard, AEHA recommended that Army officials at Redstone notify appropriate public officials that the level of DDT in the fish at Triana make them unfit for human consumption, and therefore cannot be sold in interstate

commerce. The Missile Materiel Readiness Command has made that notification.

The potential health hazard to those who

consume the fish with these levels of DDT will be determined after consultation with appropriate local, state and federal health officials.

Fishing in the Tennessee River along the installation boundary is not under Army control, but on arsenal property Huntsville Spring Branch and portions of Indian Creek have been closed to fishing for many years. Both streams, which empty into the Tennessee River at Triana, have contained high levels of DDT since the 1940's.

Residues in Soil

AEHA examined the fish as part of a

study to determine the effects on the environment of DDT residues in soil and streams at Redstone. The residues are concentrated in the area of a former DDT manufacturing plant that was leased by the Army to a commercial insecticide manufacturer shortly after World War II.

Local Army officials are preparing to meet with EPA in Atlanta for discussions on how best to correct the problem.

Used widely in agriculture until it was banned in 1971, DDT is one of the most stable chemical compounds known to man and still persists in the environment. Use of DDT was halted by federal law after it became apparent that it accumulated in the food chain with adverse effect on wildlife.

Fish from the AEHA tests were collected from a segment of the river extending one

AFGE Protests Talk of Merger

A plan proposed by the House Ways and Means Committee to merge Civil Service retirement with the Social Security System has drawn protests from the American Federation of Government Employees and some Army employees at Redstone.

The proposal would phase out the Civil Service retirement fund and place government employees under the Social Security System, a plan employees see as a rip-off and degradation of retirement benefits.

Federal employees contribute 7.5 percent of their salaries into the retirement fund, and that amount is matched by the government, giving the average retiring worker \$670 a month. The Social Security contribution is about 5.5 percent of workers' salaries up to \$16,500 to qualify for monthly payments of \$234 at age 65.

Raymond Swaim, president of Local 1858 of AFGE said, "The union feels that an indifferent attitude has been taken by the committee that totally disregards the Civil Service retirement systems for federal employees. The union will work hard to do something about the situation."

He also quoted the AFGE National President, Kenneth T. Blaylock, as saying, "AFGE will strenuously oppose any attempts to supplant the federal Civil Service retirement fund by merging it with Social Security. The Union will 'pull out all stops' to prevent this action."

Swaim said that AFGE will review the proposal to determine how the change will affect federal workers. "We plan to fight it," he said.

Congressional sources have indicated no strong support for the proposal among

members of Congress. Members of the Alabama Congressional delegation are reported opposed to the plan. The same sources said that the proposal has a long way to go before it reaches any kind of final action, and is not expected to come up during the current session of Congress.

President Carter Invited for Anniversary

A visit by President Carter could be the highlight of local observances of the 20th anniversary of the launching of Explorer I next January.

Dr. Julian Kobler, president of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of AUSA, told a dinner meeting of the organization last week that chapter officials had been in contact with the White House staff and Alabama Congressional delegation following up his invitation sent to the President in July.

Mayor Joe Davis and Madison County Commission Chairman James Record extended a joint invitation in August in behalf of the community suggesting that the president consider an address in the civic center. State Senator Bill King of Huntsville who served as Carter's Alabama campaign manager has also been active in urging the president to come.

The Chamber of Commerce is coordinating community efforts to observe the anniversary of the date when the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Redstone or-

bited the free world's first scientific earth satellite and provided an American answer to the challenge in space posed by two Soviet satellites launched months earlier.

MG George E. Turnmeyer, former MIRCOCOM commander, told groups of MIRCOCOM employees he met with last week that he hoped that the president would come and have time to formally dedicate the Redstone missile Turnmeyer recently had placed before Bldg. 5250.

The American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics and the World Futures Society are planning major local events to coincide with the anniversary. The satellite was orbited January 31, 1958. Mayor Davis and Commissioner Record suggested the President come on or about the anniversary date.

White House staffers told local newsmen who inquired last week that it would be some time before a decision on whether or not the president will come.

Military Raise Reallocation

WASHINGTON (Arnews)—The President has reallocated 12 percent of the October 1 basic pay increase to the Basic Allowance for Quarters. The military pay raise this year is 7.05 percent, equally applied to basic pay, BAQ and the subsistence allowance.

Under reallocation, basic pay will increase 6.2 percent. BAQ increases will range from 10.28 percent to 14.24 percent,

depending on grade. BAS will increase 7.05 percent.

The intent of reallocation is to raise BAQ and BAS rates to more appropriate levels. The average cost of off-post housing is still above current BAQ rates. The reallocation continues the movement toward improving the relationship of quarters allowance and off-post housing costs.

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Commissary To Be Ready 6 Months Early

Completion of the new Redstone Arsenal commissary earlier than expected was forecast by MG Emmett W. Bowers, commander of the Troop Support Agency, Ft. Lee, Va., during his visit to Redstone last week. His headquarters directs commissary operations world-wide. He also promised assistance in improving overall management of the present Redstone commissary.

"I am supporting the Corps of Engineers in reducing construction time for the new Redstone commissary from 21 to 15 months," the General said. "We have the money for the new commissary, and when the Engineers complete the design in December, they will be ready to go out for bids in January. Construction should start in early April next year."

During Gen. Bowers' visit he met with LTC E. C. Smith, chairman of the post commissary council, Mrs. Harvey Day, representing the officers' wives, and Mrs. Eugene Cope, representing wives of non-commissioned officers and enlisted personnel, to hear their suggestions on improving the commissary.

The general said he plans to assign an Army officer on a temporary basis to provide direction and expertise in the ongoing re-setting of stock in the commissary store and warehouse.

He also said his headquarters and the director of the Southeast region for commissaries will support approval of grocery

and food stuff purchases on an emergency basis during times of local shortages.

Holiday Notice

The Commissary will be closed Saturday, Oct. 8 and Monday, Oct. 10.

According to Col. Burt Dall, RASA Commander, Gen. Bowers is pleased with the site for the new commissary and its warehouse next to the recently completed Post Exchange complex. "Having the commissary warehouse adjacent to the sales store means we will have a much more efficient and responsive commissary

sales establishment for the military community," Dall said.

Gen. Bowers inspected every department of the Redstone commissary, and talked with patrons there, during his visit, and also inspected the military clothing sales store in the Post Exchange complex and troop dining facilities.

He was accompanied by key members of his staff from Ft. Lee including Charles Fulmore, director, Southeast Region Field Office for commissaries. The Redstone Arsenal commissary comes under the Southeast Region Field Office.

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

Guthrie Says Readiness Hinges On DARCOT's Work

The Army's ability to fight and win depends on DARCOT's ability to keep it in action, General John R. Guthrie told local Army supporters here last week.

The four-star general who heads DARCOT told a dinner meeting of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of AUSA, "Total Army Readiness depends on the ability of the logistics base to resupply on a regular basis."

Making the point even stronger, he added "How well we in DARCOT do our job impacts directly on the Army's readiness. . . . How well we (DARCOT) do depends on the resources allocated to us."

The resources, the general continued, are down, most notably a drop in funds in accounts which pay most of the command's civilian workers. Last year DARCOT got 92

percent of its requirement, he said. This year it appears it will get but 83 percent.

That could indicate tough times ahead for DARCOT's workforce, but Guthrie did not say so.

The general said both local commands, Missile R&D and Missile Readiness, are deeply involved in actions that must be taken to insure that missile systems once turned over to troops for use can be supported properly.

"An essential prerequisite," he said, will be a smooth transition of a system from management of the R&D command to the Readiness command at the proper time. The general said the shift should be "accomplished without a hiccup and without the user even realizing anything has happened."

Solar Exhibit At Space Center

TRANQUILITY BASESolar energy is the subject of a special exhibit through November at the Alabama Space and Rocket Center. This new traveling exhibit from the Energy Research and Development Administration can be seen during normal science center hours.

America is quickly running out of fossil fuels, and the development of practical alternative energy sources such as solar energy are essential to maintain its present energy needs. While there is an abundant supply of free energy from the sun, methods must be developed for better and cheaper ways to collect and utilize this energy.

The ERDA display describes studies,

research, and systems being developed for the practical use of solar energy. It explains methods for making fuels with solar energy, heating and cooling with solar energy, and converting solar energy into electricity.

A solar-energy quiz tests the visitor's knowledge of biomass, photovoltaic electricity, types of solar collectors, and possible solar derived fuels such as methane, alcohol, and methanol.

The solar energy exhibit is part of ERDA's traveling exhibits program operated by the American Museum of Atomic Energy in Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

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


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He Shows Troops In Field That MIRCOCM Cares


He holds a bachelor's degree in economics from Washington State

Unisex Uniform


(ARNEWS) — Due to the increase in the number of women in Army field and maintenance positions, the Army's Natick Research and Development Command is working on a field uniform that can be worn by both men and women.

A number of women soldiers have expressed dissatisfaction with their field clothing - especially in the areas of durability and warmth. As part of Natick's clothing research and development program, the R&D Command is evaluating and comparing the men's and the women's field items.

Because of the women's dissatisfaction with their field jacket and their preference for the men's field jacket, it was the first item selected for evaluation.

The problems with issuing the men's items to the women is that they are too large for many of the women. Excessive length is the biggest problem. Larger, taller, and broad-shouldered women can wear the men's jacket, but the smaller and shorter women cannot.



Rachmeler Takes MIRCOCOM Helm

Major General Louis Rachmeler returned to Redstone Friday amid the boom of cannons, the pomp and pageantry of the traditional change of command ceremony, called by General John R. Guthrie, DARCOM commander who was the reviewing officer, as one of the Army's most significant, traditional and cherished ceremonies.

"The Rachmeler family is just delighted to be back home," the new commander of the Army Missile Materiel Readiness Command told several hundred friends and well wishers moments after he accepted the command flag from Major General George Turnmeyer.

"As I stood here participating in this ceremony, I felt certain of two things," Rachmeler said. "First, I could count on the continuing solid support of the leadership of communities around Redstone, the kind of support that has been so noteworthy for many, many years.

"So I assume the charge of continuing the fine work of George Turnmeyer and his predecessors and I will continue to strengthen the ties that bind the military and civilian community.

"Second, I know I can depend on the men and women of the Missile Materiel Readiness Command to continue to do the things they are noted for throughout the Army and Department of Defense. Their hallmark has been a pride and professionalism that is unique.

"We're going to be challenged by being asked to do more with less resources, less people, less money," the general said. "But that's when the professionals rise to the fore. And you men and women of MIRCOCOM are professionals.

"I know, that together, with a great deal of determination, perseverance, and a can-do attitude, we will accomplish and overcome these challenges."

"There are good days ahead," he said. "And we are grateful to be able to share

them with you in the home of the professionals."

Participating in the change of command ceremony, staged on the lawn in front of Bldg. 5250, were MIRCOCOM soldiers, Redstone Honor Guard, 14th Army Band from Fort McClellan, and "C" Battery, 1/321 Field Artillery from the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Ky.

General Turnmeyer could remember one thing unique from the past two years, General Guthrie said.

"He was the last commander of the Army's famous Missile Command and the first commander of its, to be equally famous, Missile Materiel Readiness Command.

"Both are distinguished successors to the commands that have contributed so greatly to American missile and space programs, beginning with that great missile we see here today," Guthrie said pointing toward the Redstone erected in front of Bldg. 5250.

General Guthrie presented the Distinguished Service Medal to General Turnmeyer, the Army's highest decoration.

General Guthrie then turned to General Rachmeler.

"I would like to say to your friends here that since you've been in Washington, you have been occupied in the two primary areas which concern you in your new assignment here," he said, "procurement and security assistance.

"I know of no two things under General Rachmeler's command, and perhaps for the foreseeable future, more important to the successful accomplishment of this command's mission than a good, efficient, economic, fair, procurement program and a responsive security assistance program," General Guthrie said.

"So I am delighted that you have been involved in these two activities during your Washington tour and that you bring back

mile downstream of the Indian Creek confluence. No further current data is available on the condition of fish in the vicinity or in other parts of the river, but it has been known for some time that fish in the river contain high levels of DDT.

In a state-sponsored study in 1971, DDT in excess of the 5 ppm standard was found in fish from the river at Triana. DDT in shad averaged 71 ppm, in carp 29 ppm and in bass 6 ppm, with excessive DDT also found in fish from other Wheeler Reservoir sample points.

Over Standard


Significantly higher levels were indicated in the recent AEHA tests of 15 fish. DDT in catfish ranged from 9 to 412 ppm with a 122 ppm average for five fish, in bass from 6 to 260 ppm with a 112 ppm average for six fish, and in sunfish from 2 to 11 ppm with a 7 ppm average for three fish. A bluegill contained 35 ppm DDT.

DDT manufacture stopped on the arsenal on 1970 when the Army terminated the plant lease due to inability of the operators to meet environmental standards.

Evidence that DDT is migrating from the former manufacturing site in drainage water turned up in special tests requested by the Missile Readiness Command environmental staff during a routine water quality survey conducted here in April by AEHA. In later visits they analyzed soil, sediment, water and biological samples, all of which indicate the DDT residues are not degrading in the manner that had been expected, are being carried from the site, and pose a threat to the environment. Drainage from the site is into the arsenal portion of Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge.

No significant levels of DDT were found in tests of drinking water on the arsenal.

The DDT manufacturing plant, which had been used for manufacturing chemicals in World War II, was leased to private industry in 1947 and was a major producer of DDT for 23 years.



The DDT residues built up over the years as process water containing the insecticide was discharged via settling ponds and open ditches into Huntsville Spring Branch, which joins Indian Creek and empties into the Tennessee River at Triana.

Settling Ponds

The plant was torn down in 1971 and extensive decontamination and site restoration work done under guidance from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration, a forerunner of the Environmental Protection Agency. Settling ponds and ditches were treated with lime

and ferrous sulfate to speed degrading of the DDT residues, then filled and planted in grasses to prevent erosion and runoff.

Based on the AEHA study it is apparent that the DDT has not degraded and is being leached from the site.

An Army team of specialists experienced in restoring contaminated areas are here this week to recommend additional measures.

Army officials have advised environmental and public health agencies at all levels of the contamination problem and are cooperating with them in continuing tests.

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
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DDT Troubles Started In 1947

In 1947 the Calabama Chemical Company began manufacturing DDT at Redstone in a plant leased from the Army that had been used for making components of the chemical agents Lewisite and mustard during World War II. The plant was one of several here converted to peacetime use following the war.

Olin Mathieson Chemical Company bought Calabama in 1954 and kept the lease until 1971.

With a body of evidence that DDT was harmful to the environment, in the middle and late 1960's the Army and federal and state water quality agencies began restricting the amount of DDT that could be in effluent from the manufacturing process.

Later a more stringent standard was imposed by the Environmental Protection Agency. The lessee said it was impossible to meet and months of dispute ensued.

In 1969 the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare announced a multi-agency agreement to outlaw practically all use of DDT in the United States over the next two years. At the time the HEW Secretary said DDT was a pervasive threat to human life and the environment.

Less than three months later the President issued an Executive Order giving all federal agencies three years to stop polluting the water and air.

Environmentalists quickly made an issue of a DDT plant operating in the middle of a federal installation and discharging effluent into a wildlife refuge.

The National Audubon Society, the National Wildlife Federation and the En-

vironmental Defense Fund filed suit in federal court charging the lessee with polluting Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge with DDT effluent.

The lessee then announced that production would cease at the Redstone plant July 30, 1970.

Shortly after the announcement, a firm trading as Calabama Chemical Company attempted briefly to manufacture the insecticides TCAN and methoxychlor on the Olin premises. A cease and desist order was issued to Olin by the Army on January 18, 1971. In February the Secretary of the Army ordered termination of the lease on April 1, 1971. The plant was later torn down.

DDT was made by combining monochlorobenzene, a by-product of steel plant coke ovens, and chloral, popularly known as "Mickey Finn" or "knockout drops."

The two chemicals were combined under heat and pressure. The solidified DDT product resembled chunks of white sugar candy. Almost 100 percent pure, it was ground, bagged and sold for compounding into insecticides at a fraction of the raw strength.

A significant portion of the world's DDT — approximately 25 million pounds yearly — was produced at the Redstone plant. In manufacturing, the DDT was washed twice with water. About 1.5 million gallons of waste water containing DDT left the plant site daily into a ditch which emptied into Huntsville Spring Branch, a creek that comes out of the city of Huntsville, flows west across the center of the arsenal and joins Indian Creek which flows south into the Tennessee River. Part of the ditch and

both creeks are in the arsenal portion of Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge.

Over the years heavy concentrations of DDT, which has very low solubility in water, built up in the effluent ditch and downstream Huntsville Spring Branch, from the point where the ditch discharged into the branch some 1,000 yards below the plant.

In 1965 a settling pond was constructed at the head of the ditch. Prior to this, no settling process had been used.

The pond reduced the amount of DDT entering streams, but not the amount in the ground where settled matter from the pond collected.

In late 1967, at the insistence of the Army, federal and state agencies and the Tennessee Valley Authority, the lessee closed and filled the effluent ditch after causticizing it with lime and ferrous sulfate to speed degrading of the DDT.

A new ditch was cut to Huntsville Spring Branch, while a secondary settling pond was constructed from the first 250 feet of the old ditch. Effluent filtering devices were installed also.

Following the plant's closing, DDT residue at the plant site was causticized and covered with clay.

Causticizing was recommended by the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration. At the time little was known of how to speed the degrading of DDT. The process had worked well in laboratory experiments but had never been tried on a large scale. It is apparent from recent tests at the site that the DDT is not degrading in the manner that had been expected.

"Yeh," the young major laughed. "If we built one twice this big, the Army would build a piece of equipment that wouldn't quite fit in it."





selling the land for housing was not, indeed, what Dad had intended, or wanted to do. He said he appreciated the fact that my Father was 69 years old, and the time had finally come when he must take up a less physical profession. He then described the way they pulled up to two heifers, (for those of you who don't know, young female cows), and the look on my Father's face, he said, reminded him of watching an old cattleman who loved the business, watch the last people who were ever going to ride down the "Chisholm Trail," do so ... Of an old Indian, the expression on his face, watching the last buffalos, and look in utter shock as people killed them for sport. He described Dudley Powell, Sr.'s obvious love for the land, and his love for cattle in a way that made your columnist humble about expressing emotion. I was beginning to think, until Mr. Anderson came by, that I was probably the best in Huntsville at expressing my feelings, but now I know that I'm at least second best. He told me when he left here, that he had heard people say that my Father was bound to be glad to be selling the land for development, because he was making a lot of money at it. But he said he knew better than this, because one morning he had ridden by my Father's home, very early in the morning about 6 o'clock, while he was still in the cattle business, and he saw him leaving to get in his car. Mr. Anderson said he knew that a man who was 69 years old, who had sold a chain of department stores, did not get up at 6 o'clock in the morning and go to work if he didn't love what he was doing. We then talked about the fact that Daddy was a lawyer, had been in the filling station business, was once a Chevrolet dealer, had built roads, about one time, just after he bought out the old A.M. Booth Lumber Company, and immediately all of the employees went on strike, and how Dad started running the whole lumber company, loading lumber, nails, continuing to operate it by himself, not having time to look for help. And how Herbert Ray, who was the Ford dealer on Meridian Street, sent help over, and other neighbors did the same thing there, until pretty soon he was fully staffed with other peoples' help, who had just volunteered because they admired his intrepidity and determination. The neighbors helped him until he could hire replacement people. All my life I remember, after a family death, a loss or tragedy or disappointment, when the day before he had stayed up until 10 and 11 o'clock at night, the first person at work the next day, before the cattle hands, before me, before anyone, was Dudley Powell, Sr., plodding along. When the day got hot, he would pull out his handkerchief, that men no longer carry now, wipe the sweat from his face, run cold water over his wrists, which he says "cools the blood and allows him to continue." His strength is derived from traditions that are now, unfortunately, almost gone from this country ... the "Pioneer independant spirit." Frank Powell Sr. built roads all over this part of the country with horse-drawn teams. He and my Father built all of the houses that are now "Lincoln Village," back years and years ago. My Father ran road-graders and trucks as a child. I've heard him, many times, describe how, when my Granddad was building roads in Lebanon, Tenn. and the man who had hired him to build roads defaulted, and could not pay my Grandfather for the work he had done, therefore my Grandfather could not pay off his people. Without a second thought, he sold the house that he lived in, from under him, including family portraits, furniture, and left with only the clothes on the families backs, to pay the debtors, never describing himself as a hero for doing so. He owed money, and he paid it. The property he owned was not owned by a parent corporation, operated by a sub-corporation with another corporation that operated the business ... No sir, Frank Powell believed in paying his debts. My Father was tremendously influenced by this "Frontier" type spirit. It has been an inspiration to me, at times when I would normally give up, and Mr. Andy Anderson, of Beck and Gregg Hardware Wholesalers, "You can consider yourself with a standing invitation to write in The Entertainment Preview, any time you so desire." Knights in Sweep

(ARNEWS) — Three members of the Army's Golden Knights parachute team contributed to the sweep of 12 gold, one silver and one bronze medal by the U. S. Armed Forces Parachute Team at the Conseil International du Sport Militaire (CISM) championships last month.

The U. S.-dominated championships, held near Vienna, Austria, included a perfect "no-miss" score by SSgt. Chuck Collingwood in the Individual Accuracy event. Collingwood landed on the four-inch disk 14 times in as many attempts.

Two other Golden Knights, SSgt. Dwight Reynolds and Cpl. Bob Von Derau, teamed up with Air Force 1st Lt. Jim Hayhurst to capture the gold medal in the team accuracy event. The team missed a perfect score during the four rounds by chalking up misses totaling only 27 centimeters off the four-inch disk.

The Golden Knights team, under coach SFC Bill Knight, is competing in the Adriatic Cup Championships at Vrsar, Yugoslavia, this week. The world champion Soviet team is also entered.

Team Handles SIDPERS At 2nd Bn.

The unit clerks who handle the Second Battalion SIDPERS Standard Installation Division Personnel System) transactions are a team.

They meet all the requirements. They have a team leader, a purpose, a motto and an accomplishment. Their leader is Sergeant First Class Artis E. Wallace. Their job is to keep Department of Army computers updated on the status of 2d Battalion personnel. Watched over by a photo of a rampaging gorilla, their motto states, "We're tough to beat!"

Their accomplishment supports that claim. In August the 2d Battalion became the largest unit at Redstone to have 100 per cent of a month's SIDPERS entries accepted by DA.

Private First Class Ronald E. Dickerson of the 5th Student Company, Private First Class George R. Reyes of the 6th Student Company, Specialist 5 Jane E. Alcorn of the 6th Student

Company, Specialist 4 Laneford W. Ingalls of the 7th Student Company, Private First Class Samuel Funchess of the 4th Student Company and Private First Class Leon A. Royal comprise the rest of the team.

The chain of command throughout the battalion has expressed considerable pride in the SIDPERS accomplishment, but the clerks are anxious to pass the credit around. Dickerson noted, "We did it with help from the Military Personnel Office here and a lot of hard work."

Funchess credited even more helpful people. "It was a lot of hard work, a real strain on the brain, but we had help from the PSNCO, our first sergeants and company commanders too." With a joking grin for the other clerks he added, "It was a great challenge, but we can overcome it any day."

Wallace pointed out that both the Battalion Commander, Lieutenant Colonel John J.

Walker and Command Sergeant Major Charles E. Welch showed continuing interest in the reporting process. All the command interest results in some pressure for the soldiers doing the work, but Alcorn said, "What makes the job a real challenge is the pressure. Once you get the job mastered, it's easy. I like it because we're in a relaxed environment, that makes it enjoyable. Attention to detail is the main factor in accomplishing the goal."

Reyes also enjoys the work. He explained, "I like to work with people in different situations. This job is one where I can relate to people. They depend on me."

Alcorn and Reyes have each received letters of appreciation for sustaining 100 per cent acceptance rates for three consecutive months while submitting at least 100 transactions per month. Although they were each recommended for a four-day pass, they are unsure if their duties will leave them time. According to Royal, "For one

thing, I think this is the best job in Army personnel. The reason we reached 100 per cent is we've got a good PSNCO. He catches a lot of errors."

But Wallace doesn't want that much credit. "The majority of the credit goes to the clerks, but everyone that deals with our SIDPERS, that includes the COs and first sergeants, plus the people at the military personnel office, have a lot to do with it. I just had to show the clerks that I was concerned—that I relied on them and they could rely on me."

No one had a secret formula for success, just hard work, constant attention and teamwork. Reyes observed, "You've got to be up all the time. If you don't stay on top, you will really get behind and be in big trouble."

Before putting the clerks back to work, Wallace had a final comment. "If all chains of command were as interested in SIDPERS as those in 2d Battalion, every unit would achieve the Army's goal of 95 per cent."

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Rockets Manhandle Madison Missiles

There is an unwritten, but well proven rule in football stating that a good defense will almost always stop a good offense. Such was the case at the post football field Saturday night as the Redstone Rockets defeated the Madison Missiles of Huntsville 22-12 to run their North Alabama Semi-Pro Football Conference record to 2-0.

The Rockets, who have two exhibition game victories also, have been extremely dependent on their solid defense in every game they've played this season, and so far it has been as reliable as a Model A. In Saturday's game, Redstone's defense stalemated a determined Madison offense most of the game, and was also instrumental in setting up the Rocket scoring plays. Prentis Thomas and Randy Hooser were the big men on Redstone's defensive squad as they combined for 21 tackles. Tom Abate, Leslie Bullock, Reggie Hope, Walt Williams, and Ron Hopson also contributed heavily in thwarting Madison's scoring attempts.

Redstone was the first to draw blood in the contest as they scored with only two minutes gone in the first quarter, and it was the defensive team that did it. A misfired

punt attempt by the Missiles at their own 30-yard line was picked up by Redstone defensive back Walt Williams and carried in for the touchdown. Ali Sleiman kicked for the extra point.

It wasn't long after that Redstone was able to score again. After several running and passing plays that advanced Redstone from their own 30-yard line to Madison's 20, fullback James McDonald rushed in on a quick hand off from quarterback Ronnie Hooser for the Rockets' second score. Steady and reliable Ali Sleiman again booted for the extra point, and Redstone led 14-0 at the end of the quarter.

Redstone was unable to get anything going in the second quarter, playing at midfield much of the time. While the Rockets were being frustrated offensively, the Missiles weren't. With only a minute and a half gone, Missile qb Brian Colburn threw a 40-yard bomb to fullback Kenneth Halsey, who then zig-zagged the final 30 by several Rocket defenders to score. The extra point try failed, and the score remained 14-6 when the half was completed.

Madison closed the scoring gap to two early in the third quarter when Colburn fooled Redstone on a hand off to Bob Harris,

who ran 30 yards for the touchdown. Madison's booter again failed to get the kick off, leaving the score 14-12 Redstone.

Redstone threatened four times and pushed for nine first downs in that quarter before connecting for another touchdown. A 20-yard pass from Ron Hooser to his twin brother, Randy, brought the Rockets from mid-field to Madison's 30-yard line. On the next play, with less than one minute left in the quarter, Hooser drilled the ball to wide receiver Maurice Buchanan in the end zone and Redstone went ahead 20-12. The extra point try fell short.

The Rockets played "oops ball" in the fourth quarter, fumbling twice and missing several passes that should have been caught. Their lackadaisical play, however, didn't hurt them as Madison failed to capitalize on the Rocket errors. Redstone earned it's final two points with only a half second left in the game on a safety after shoving the Missiles into their end zone.

Redstone's next game will be against the Hamilton Tigers on Saturday, Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m. at the post field. There will be no admission fee, so come on out and have a good time supporting the Rockets.

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Radars Transferred

The Perimeter Acquisition Radar, last operational component of the Army's Safeguard Ballistic Missile Defense System—the free world's first defense against missile attack, was transferred to the Air Force this week.

BG John G. Jones, head of the ballistic missile defense programs, formally turned the facility over to Air Force MG Donald D. Pittman, commander of the Aerospace Defense Command's 24th Air Division, at the PAR site near Concrete, N.D.

The PAR was the long range radar of the Safeguard System managed by the BMD Systems Command.


The Safeguard System became fully operational in 1975 and was shut down in 1976, except for the PAR, in response to guidance from Congress.

As a part of the Air Force space track network, the PAR is called "PARCS"—for Perimeter acquisition Radar Attack Characterization System—and officially designated as Concrete Missile Early Warning Station. In addition to normal day-to-day tracking of space vehicles and satellites, the PARCS could provide the North American Air Defense Command precise data on the size, nature, and intended targets of a missile attack.

The Army has continued to operate the radar while modifying it for its new mission. Initial modifications were finished in December 1976, and it has furnished the Air Force increasingly more and better data as additional modifications have been completed.

The ceremony marked the official transfer of operating responsibility to the Air Force, which plans still more modifications to further increase and enhance the data the radar can provide.

The transfer comes ten years and two weeks after then-Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara announced on September 18, 1967, that the United States

would deploy a defense against ballistic missile attack.

The Nixon administration shortly thereafter reoriented the deployment program using the same Army weapon system to defend U.S. strategic forces rather than population centers.

Up to 12 Safeguard sites were planned. A second one begun in Montana was halted by the signing of the ABM Treaty with the Soviet Union in May 1972, and Congress decided against work on the sites for the national capital area permitted by the treaty. A later protocol to the treaty limited both countries to a single deployed site.

Today the U. S. Army Ballistic Missile Defense Organization is once again concentrating on research and development for

ballistic missile defense in two complementary programs and operates Kwajalein Missile Range.

An advanced technology program is conducted by the BMD Advanced Technology Center, also located in Research Park, to provide the technical foundation for future BMD systems and techniques as well as improvements for components of nearer-term systems. It also indicates what is possible in BMD technology, thereby keeping the U. S. from being surprised by Soviet developments in BMD and assisting in the design and evaluation of U. S. strategic offensive systems.

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


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Don't Let Driving Go To Your Head



If you want to get your car bashed up, the best place to go, according to the MPs, is the Commissary parking lot, home of caved-in fenders, dented bumpers, and broken-out headlights.

For a larger, rougher accident, try the intersection of Gray and Ajax, where old friends and total strangers meet...often.

But if you're in a hurry to meet your maker, offpost is best. Some place like Bailey Cove Road near Grissom High School, where a 17-year-old was recently clocked at 94 MPH in the school zone, to top 42 other speeders caught in a two-day period there.

Authorities say speed is also one of the problems at Gray-Ajax, where cars have been clocked at up to 40 MPH on 25 MPH Gray. Clusters of telephone poles and steam pipes obscure the vision of drivers here, as well.

MPs are not certain whether conditions in the Commissary lot will carry over to the new shopping mall, but they do anticipate some trouble there. Backing accidents are the big problem in parking areas.

Aside from deliberate or accidental violations of the rules, one of the biggest causes of accidents, on Redstone and everywhere else, is a lack of driver courtesy. That's right, courtesy. It didn't die when knighthood was in flower.

On the road, it involves letting a car that's running out of lane merge, allowing a driver with partially obscured vision back out of

his parking space, or braking a little when another vehicle starts to pass at high speed. In other words, not running the other guy off the road.

But have you ever noticed that the person first to hold the door for you is just as often the same one who will cut you off when you try to merge in front of him, or gets in a race with you when you try to pass?

Why does an automobile so often change a normally friendly, courteous individual into a wild man.

Some psychologists have an idea. Every individual requires a certain amount of personal space, or "territory", around him, an invisible bubble which is his. For someone else to enter, or "violate", that bubble without the permission or consent of the individual is the equivalent of an attack on that person. Some people react violently to such a subtle intrusion.

According to the theory, when we get into a car, we put it on like an article of clothing. It becomes an extension of us, and is incorporated into our body space. According to Julius Fast, author of **Body Language**, "A man driving a car often loses an essential part of his own humanity and is, by virtue of the machine around him, once removed from a human being....A car... seems to act much like a dangerous weapon in the hands of many drivers...due to the extension of our personal territories when we are in a car. Our own zones of privacy expand and the zone of privacy of the car becomes much greater and our reaction to any intrusion on that zone is greater still."

The driver, in other words, psychologically becomes a part of his machine, and vice versa. This can be a feeling of tremendous power, to become the controlling part of such a large and angry vehicle, especially to an inexperienced teenage driver, who has all his life been subject to authority, then suddenly finds himself in a position to prove his own mastery over something.

Now imagine what happens in the mind of that driver when he realizes he has to share the road with other drivers who are, in effect, saying, "This is not just your road, this is not just your space."

You shouldn't have to imagine very hard. It happens to you every day.

Whether you are conscious of it or not, the vast majority of us become aggressive territorial owners when we enter a car. If we all let these feelings have full sway over our driving, the roads would become one big dogfight as each car tried to dominate and push aside any others which came too close. Only our deliberate obedience to traffic laws and rules keeps this from happening.

That we don't all behave the way our instincts tell us, even though there are a few who try, is why we can call ourselves civilized. That's why most of us usually obey most of the rules of the road. That's why most of us, even though there are a few who will, don't try to run another car off the road. That's why most of us are still alive after driving to work this morning.

CFC Report Day

It's report day around the Arsenal today with organizational monitors banking the week's receipts and submitting their initial statements on the progress of the 1978 Combined Federal Campaign.

The annual fund-raising crusade began early last week with Huntsville Area CFC coordinator Lloyd Lively calling on the campaign workers to stress the personal fair share approach in their person-to-person interviews.

Lively told them to make a thorough survey of their respective areas, explaining the program and asking each of their fellow workers to take an active part in the appeal, either through a cash donation, or a pledge of a regular amount to be deducted from their paycheck during the coming year.

Whether or not they wish to participate is strictly their own business, he said. And, the area coordinator added, they alone have the authority to set an amount and the agency to whom the donation is to go.

"However," according to Lively, "if the solicitors do their job, Redstone people will respond with the fair share approach, just as they always have."

When someone would ask what his father did and he would reply that "...Dad works with the Hawk program at Redstone--", the response invariably was:


"Oh, is he an ecologist?"
