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Sheriff On Trial For Violating Soldier's Rights

The trial of Madison County Sheriff Dave Headrick on charges of violating the civil rights of a Redstone Arsenal soldier is scheduled to begin Monday in federal court in Birmingham.


A federal grand jury indicted the sheriff in September, charging him with violating the civil rights of Anthony Squeglia, who has alleged that Headrick assaulted him in the Madison County jail on the night of June 15 following a disturbance at a local bar.

Squeglia and two other soldiers, Chris Caldwell and Chester Smith, signed sworn statements alleging that Headrick and another officer threatened them and beat two of them.

The soldiers say they were taken into custody by the sheriff after an argument in which Smith was hit in the face with a beer bottle by a dancer at Underground Huntsville, a go-go club. The sheriff, who was at the club, intervened when they tried to call city police, according to the soldiers.

When city police arrived, the soldiers said, the sheriff told them he was handling the matter and ordered the soldiers be taken to county jail by sheriff's patrol.

At the jail, the soldiers said they were taken into room individually and confronted by Headrick. Squeglia said the sheriff hit

him and claimed he was also struck by sheriff's lieutenant Bill Graves. Caldwell said Graves hit him too.

After the alleged assault, the soldiers were taken back to their car at the night

club and released without being charged, they said.

The soldiers did not report the incident because they were frightened, (See 'Trial', page 4)

PM Awards to Roland Manager and Former BMD Head

Secretary of the Army Clifford Alexander has named two Huntsville officers to receive the 1977 Secretary of the Army Award for Project Management.

The Army's top man cited them for outstanding accomplishments and authorized awards to Brig. Gen. Frank P. Ragano, U. S. Roland Project Manager at Redstone Arsenal, and Brig. Gen. John G. Jones, former Commander of the U. S. Ballistic Missile Defense Program in Huntsville Research Park and recently reassigned Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations of NATO Allied Forces Central Europe.

Both men were cited for "...dynamic leadership, innovative actions, and management resources in an austere environment."

Roland, the French-German developed system selected as the U. S. Army's missile programs. Under General Ragano's direction, the Army for the first time is transferring major weapon system technology from a foreign country to production in the United States.

Hughes and Boeing are building the U. S. Roland system in this country and mounting it on the M-109R tracked vehicle.

General Ragano accepted the first four missiles to come off the Hughes production line at Tucson, Ariz. on October 21. Early next month he will take delivery on the first complete fire unit at the Boeing facility in Seattle, Wash.

Of particular significance and importance to NATO defense, U. S. and European Roland systems are compatible. The U. S. can fire French or German missiles from its launcher and vice versa. In fact, more than 90 per cent of U. S. and European parts are interchangeable.

General Ragano initiated many of the guidelines and procedures for NATO standardization of the Roland air defense system.

Prior to becoming U. S. Roland Project Manager, General Ragano was project manager for both the 2.75 Rocket System and Cannon Artillery Weapons Systems (including the highly successful Cannon Launched Guided Projectile).

General Jones, in addition to being BMD Program Manager, also was Commander of the BMD Systems Command, the first man to hold the positions concurrently. That meant he also was National Range Commander of Kwajalein Missile Range in the Marshall Islands.

General Jones headed the U. S. BMD program during a difficult transition period. He completed deactivation of the BMD System as directed by Congress in 1976 and initiated a revised, broadened approach to BMD. As a result of his leadership, the BMD program today consists of two complementary research and development efforts.

The BMD Advanced Technology Program explores future technologies and concepts under the direction of the BMD Systems Technology Program integrates BMD technology into system concepts and assesses their operational feasibility under the BMD Systems Command.

Together, the two programs are designed to maintain the U. S. lead in BMD

Coordinator Explains FWP

Women work nearly nine days to gross the same earnings a man grosses in five days, reports the Women's Bureau of the U.S. Department of Labor.

According to Ladies Home Journal, July 1977, in 1955 men earned 56 per cent more than women who worked full time, today men earn 75 per cent more. Women with four years of college have lower incomes than men who have only finished 8th grade.

These and many similar facts are the reason the government feels the need for the Federal Womens Program, FWP.

The FWP Coordinator for Coordinator for MMCS is Carolyn Orr, secretary at the Academic Records Branch of the Directorate of Support.

"The goals of the FWP are not radical. They are based on the assumption that a woman is a human being and has the right to choose what she would like to do with her life. She should have the opportunity to try and if she fails, have the opportunity to try once again, as her brothers do," Orr wrote in a speech she gave to explain the program to employees.

"After the presentation, managers and supervisors became much more aware of the situation that does exist and became much more willing to help. I think we had some improvements after we taught the classes."

"Basically," she added, "the program is to help federal women help themselves. All

the women want is equality from the system and to be able to compete equally," she said.

The program is relatively new at the school. It's been a federal program since 1967, but started at MMCS two years ago. Orr has been program coordinator for a year. The coordinator works with the EEO coordinator and keeps the commandant informed on the program.

"I can take discrimination complaints," Orr said, "and try to upgrade women's jobs, to try and get some of us out of these clerical jobs."

Presently there are approximately 147 women employees at MMCS and only 37 are GS-6 or above.

"It's a technical area here at the missile school," she commented. "It can be hard for a woman to break into it. However, women who are qualified, confident and motivated are being under-utilized. Women do not want or feel they need any special consideration. They only want equal consideration and equal opportunity to achieve on the basis of merit."

Ms. Orr's recommendation to young women is, "Get the skills required to compete and get them early. "If you lose out to a man, let it be caused by something other than a lack of skills."

"You're always going to run up against some oppositions and resentment," Orr commented. "But many have expressed a



genuine concern about the situation here at the school."

No Holiday Closing For Army

(Editor's Note: The following story appeared in last week's issue but the order of paragraphs was not in correct sequence).

Commanders of local Army agencies are passing the word to managers this week that liberal holiday leave policies of other years will be used again.

Generally, supervisors interpret "liberal leave" to mean keeping mission essential operations going with only the minimum number of people at work to do the job. In practice just about everyone who want leave during the holiday period gets to go.

Indications are that the liberal leave policies followed in the past will satisfy the desires of most workers.

Redstone Arsenal will not shut down on the Friday after Thanksgiving or during the Christmas holidays as had been discussed previously.

Shutting down during the holidays appeared to have merit at first look, but detailed analysis turned up major obstacles. Most of them boiled down to this: unlike civilian organizations, Redstone Army commands and activities have many world wide obligations that must be met regardless of the time of year.

It had been hoped that the shut down would result in major energy savings, but most of the projected savings vanished on closer look. No one would have been forced to take leave during the period of shut down. That meant either heating buildings as normally done, or wholesale relocation of people and essential activities to centralized locations.

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Army R&D Head To Speak Here

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala. — The man who directs research and development of all the Army's weapons and equipment will visit local commands and speak here Nov. 10.

Dr. Percy A. Pierre, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Research, Development and Acquisition, will address a dinner meeting of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the United States Army in the Redstone Officer's Open Mess.

Activities will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Main Ballroom.

Dean of the School of Engineering at Howard University, until joining the Carter Administration earlier this year, Dr. Pierre is making his first official visit to local Army commands.

On Thursday and Friday, he will tour and be briefed on the Army Missile Materiel Readiness Command, Army Missile

Research and Development Command, Patriot Project Office and the Ballistic Missile Defense Systems Command.

Dr. Pierre, 38, earned two degrees in electrical engineering from Notre Dame and his PhD in the same field from Johns Hopkins University in 1967. He worked as a research engineer for Rand Corporation and spent a year as a White House Fellow before joining the Howard faculty in 1971.

they said, but two weeks later told their story to military authorities who learned of the affair from other sources.

Evidence developed in investigations by the Army, FBI and U.S. Attorneys Office in Birmingham was reviewed by the U.S. Department of Justice in Washington, which referred the case to a federal grand jury.

The grand jury indicted Headrick on September 8 for violating Squeglia's civil rights. Graves, who has left the Sheriff's Department, was not indicted. He was named in news accounts as having testified before the grand jury.

The charge against Headrick is a misdemeanor. Conviction carries a maximum sentence of one year.

Civil Service Removed From Social Security Bill

WASHINGTON — The House last week approved an amendment removing the Civil Service retirement system from H.R. 9346, the Social Security and Financing Amendments of 1977.

The House vote delays any decision on making Social Security mandatory for federal employees by requiring a two-year study of it.

The H.R. 9346 bill caused controversy because of uncertainty about its effect on the current Civil Service retirement system.

The financing amendments would have required federal, state and local employees to pay into the Social Security system as well as private funds. Some Civil Service workers consider they enjoy a more financially sound system than employees of state and local systems which appear to suffer many of the same ills as the Social Security system.

Currently, civil servants pay seven percent their salaries into a retirement

fund. The current Social Security deduction is 5.85 per cent of the first \$16,500 earned. That percentage is likely to increase by 1982.


Federal employees and organizations were worried that the bill could result in a loss of retirement benefits for civil servants who moonlight and already pay into the Social Security system. In addition, questions were raised as to whether federal

retirees would continue to draw retirement at age 55 or would be required to wait until the 65-year-old limit applied to Social Security.


The bill would have required deductions from an estimated six to seven million federal, state and local employees. Military personnel were not affected since they are already enrolled in the Social Security system.



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Teams Begin DDT Tests

Teams from the Army's installation restoration project office and the Tennessee Valley Authority are beginning preliminary sampling programs in streams on and in the vicinity of the arsenal.

The water and sediment samples are to determine how much DDT is present in area streams, and specifically will aid decontamination specialists in getting a better handle on the extent to which DDT may be escaping from a contaminated area on the arsenal.

Streams and aquatic life in the area have contained DDT for many years as a result of widespread use agriculture. DDT was banned several years ago but the persistent pesticide takes many years to degrade.

Initial sampling plans are for TVA to check area streams while Army specialists will concentrate on sampling drainage water and sediment at the contaminated site.


The tests are preliminary to a much broader sampling program. Before long-term solutions to the problem can be worked out, much more knowledge needs to be obtained on where DDT contamination exists and in what amounts, and if it is escaping and in what manner. Hundreds of water, sediment and soil samples from the contaminated site and streams that receive its drainage are expected to be analyzed during the next few months.

Meanwhile, work is in progress to seal off beds of contamination and to divert drainage from the site. To keep incoming surface water from causing release of DDT from the contaminated site, ditches are being cut to channel it into Huntsville Spring Branch before it crosses the site.

Other temporary measures to prevent DDT escaping from the former DDT manufacturing site include installation of retention dams in the ditch that drains the site. The dams will form basins to retain water that has passed over the site and allow any DDT that may be in it to settle out before the water is released into Huntsville Spring Branch.

Dam Built With Hunting Dollars

A 50-foot concrete dam to form an impoundment for waterfowl in an arsenal stream has been completed in hunting area 48.

The dam, the first major project here using fees from sale of arsenal hunting and fishing permits, will form an 8 to 10 acre impoundment over a mud flat that is one of the arsenal's best duck hunting places when water is present.

With the dam, which has a spillway in the center that can be opened or closed to raise or lower the water level, water can be maintained in the impoundment to attract waterfowl. Previously water was present on the mud flat only when the Tennessee River was high.

The spot is considered ideal duck habitat and, when the River is high enough to flood it, for many years has been a favorite resting place and shelter for ducks flying upriver from Wheeler Refuge to feed.

With the spillway feature, the dam will permit maintaining a water level that will attract waterfowl in season, and at other times the impoundment can be drawn down to allow planting of waterfowl forage and prevent damage to trees.

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

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RSA Course Sets Turkey Shoot


The Redstone golf course has scheduled its annual mixed scramble turkey shoot on Sunday, Nov. 20.

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Woman Learns 'Dynamite' Job

In the past few years, women have "exploded" onto the Army scene, doing jobs that were once considered "for men only." Recently a young woman came here to learn a skill that should give her a dynamite career. She is training in the first phase of Explosive Ordnance Disposal.

Why would a woman be interested in EOD? Spec. 4 Debbie Cooper, had a lot to say about that.

"There's a lot of adventure and challenge involved in it, and it's always changing. You never know what you'll be doing next. Actually when I began looking at MOS's I didn't know EOD was open to females, but I was happy when I found out I'd be able to get into it."

Formerly EOD was strictly an all male MOS, but regulation changes allow female soldiers to enter the field. The job of the EOD person involves discovery, recovery, and rendering safe, dangerous explosives.

"The job scares me," Cooper said. "And then again it doesn't. I'm a sports parachute jumper and I've been doing it for two years. It's the same sort of feeling I get when I'm jumping. I wouldn't really call it a fear, but you learn to keep the feeling under control."

Sometimes when a woman breaks into a

previously all male job, she encounters resentment from her fellow workers, but according to Cooper this hasn't been the case with her.

"They treat me the same, we're all equal," she said. "The course is open to all services and everyone's a little different, but it works out well. The only time I was separated from the rest of the class was after we came in from the field working with dangerous chemicals. I had a different shower room."

There is always the question in everyone's mind, can a woman perform the job as well as the males who until recently dominated the MOS?


"I feel I can perform as well as the men," Spec. Cooper said. "I can't lift extremely heavy equipment, but I feel ready to handle anything."

The second phase of EOD training consists of 13 weeks of instruction at Indianhead, Maryland. Cooper will soon be on her way to complete the second phase and then proceed to her first permanent assignment.

"I hope when I get to my permanent duty station and finally get to work in the field, I'll be able to work the full spectrum of everything I've learned," she concluded.

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
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
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Two Agencies Score 100% In CFC

Lloyd Lively isn't exactly in the beer hauling business but he appeared ready to join Jerry Reed for a chorus of "We've Got A Long Way To Go and A Short Time To Get There" when he submitted his latest progress report for the 1978 Combined Federal Campaign.

"We're running ahead of last year," the Area Coordinator said this week, "but we haven't realized our pre-campaign hopes yet, and there is just a few more days remaining."

Lively released his weekly report on Monday indicating that the funds already banked had risen to \$489,023 through last Friday. Eighty per cent of the assigned personnel in the 15 Federal agencies reporting are listed as participants with their gifts averaging almost forty dollars.

Twenty-two agencies participating in the annual fund raising drive have yet to report on their activity. However, Lively indicated that all of them are small units that report only at the conclusion of their drives.

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Captain Aids Intelligence Effort Here

Only nine months into his first intelligence assignment, a young Army officer has already made two important contributions to the missile intelligence effort here.

Captain Gerald L. Rutledge, an operations research and systems analyst with the Tactical Air Defense Systems Directorate of Missile Intelligence Agency, has developed MIA's foreign tactical air defense input to the Extended Planning Annex for use in a comparative study of Soviet and European Countries' surface-to-air missile systems logistical support.

The captain, selected this month's top Junior Officer, has also prepared for DARCOM's Battlefield Systems Integration Office, a study analyzing logistic support to foreign tactical air defense missile systems, including refire capability, maintenance, reload potential, and depot availability. Such a study had never been attempted previously. It will be used to support planning of U.S. system developments and estimates of system effectiveness in operational environments.

This is Rutledge's first intelligence assignment. It's different for me. In the past I've been more directly involved in the command of troops. I had never done this kind of work before. It's both interesting and challenging. I work with very competent engineers every day. It's a challenge to develop my own knowledge so that I can do my job well."

"The development of good intelligence is vital to any military organization," said Rutledge. "It may provide threat information, and aid us in the development of equipment to counter the threat. Without good intelligence information we wouldn't know what kinds of systems to develop."

Rutledge said that having served in Hawk and in Chaparral-Vulcan battalions has proved valuable in his new job. "It's interesting after all these years of serving in Air Defense units to see what the other side is doing. I find that I can use the insight gained from working with our own systems, can apply my past Army experience to the intelligence business."

Rutledge is currently serving as a member of an analytical team responsible for evaluation of foreign integrated air defense. The team is considering the operational effects of foreign air defense systems operating as a consolidated unit. "It's a very fascinating area, something that hasn't been done before," said Rutledge. "It's a challenge to start doing it."

Rutledge has spent six of his ten Army years overseas, with two tours of duty in Germany and one in Vietnam, and has also served in the former Combat Developments Command at Ft. Bliss, Texas. Of Redstone, he says "I like it. It's a unique experience. The ratio of military to civilian is something new to me. It's a nice environment to work in. A lot of exceptionally competent people work here."

Rutledge has a Bachelor of Science Degree in mathematics from Pennsylvania Military College and is currently working toward a Master of Science Degree in Operations Research at the University of Alabama in Huntsville. He has also attended the Air Defense Artillery Officers Basic and Advanced Courses, the Guided Missile Systems Officers Course, the Chaparral-Vulcan Officers Qualification Course—all at Ft. Bliss, Texas—and the Operations Research Systems Analysis

Executive Course at Ft. Lee, Virginia.

Despite a busy schedule of work and school, Rutledge finds time to serve as a committee member for RSA Cub Scout Pack 234. His wife Christine is the secretary of the pack, and son John is a member. The captain's youngest son, Jeff, plans to join as soon as he is old enough. "Scouting is a real family affair," said Rutledge. "Scouting relies upon participation of parents. It can't survive without it. We really need more help, more volunteers."

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"We do everything possible to expedite

Each year we get a flood of 'last minute' orders, process them quickly and then find some customers are disappointed because their parcels are delayed in the annual rush of Christmas mail entering postal channels," he continued.

"We urge our customers to order early, before November 1 for APO-FPO delivery and December 1 for Zip Code delivery, to avoid that 'Christmas disappointment.' Further, if customers definitely want the parcel mailed regardless of time they should check the 'Hold My Order' box on the order form so that AAFES will not refund their money after 30 days."

NEW STRONGER STEEL CORD


Our previous steel cord used only five steel filaments. The new cord is stronger, more durable because it has 10 filaments — seven wrapped around two with one more filament binding the cord together.

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
