## It's Like Having Relatives Visit

Rudger Niehoff is a lieutenant in the Army of the Federal Republic of Germany. He recently completed the Nike missile system course at the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

He returned to Germany a week ago to apply this training and contribute to the defense of the NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) allies. His wife, who will soon give birth to their first child, returned in October.

During their 13-month stay in Huntsville, the Niehoffs have learned much more than what duty is like at an American military installation. They leave with a knowledge of America's heart.

Through the MMCS Foreign Student Support Office and the Huntsville-Madison County Council for International Visitors, the Niehoffs met the Kellys.

William L. Kelly, a systems consultant with M&S Computing, Inc. is an energetic man who gives a lot of thought to his words. A retired U.S. Army officer, he met and married Annelie while serving in Germany. Together they have carved their slice of the American Pie, raising two daughters and a son along the way.

Annelie, a thoughtful person herself, chairs the Host Family Program of the Council for International Visitors. Due to her German birth, she particularly enjoys hosting German visitors. "For me it is like having relatives visit. Since they just left Germany, we can talk about the latest things in fashion, music and movies."

The Kellys began hosting international visitors 12 years ago, even before the Council for International Visitors was formed. They stressed that contrary to what some people seem to believe, sponsorship has never been a burden.

Kelly added, "We must have hosted nine or 10 young couples and it has always been a mutually advantageous relationship. We entertain them at our house, they invite us to theirs and sometimes we go places together."

With enthusiasm that betrayed fond memories, Niehoff recalled trips to Nashville (Opryland), Guntersville Lake and the Huntsville Speedway—all attractions where the addition of friends multiplies the enjoyment.

appears undecided, but eventually voiced his approval with laughs and giggles.

With obvious relish, Annelie pointed out a major advantage of being friends with the Niehoff family. "Rudger is a gourmet chef. His specialty is Chinese cuisine. We've had some really marvelous dishes that we never would have tried alone."

The subject of dinners sparked a discussion of how important they are to a host family relationship. The consensus of opinion was that dinners were overrated. Niehoff explained, "We don't come here to eat. We come together for friendship. The talking is more important than the eating."

The talking can run the gamut of conversation—from discussing an example of American way of life to recalling similar experiences in different pasts. Then too, they sometimes get together and watch television.

The international relationship of this friendship can not be

forgotten, but for the Niehoffs and the Kellys that aspect is secondary to the warmth they share.

Although not all host family relationships become so close, according to Walton Tarpley, host family coordinator at MMCS, many do. He noted that via correspondence the relationships often outlast the visit. "About the only foreign students who don't ask us to set up a meeting with a host family are the ones who have been here before. Of course, they usually contact their previous host family, sometimes before they even reach the Arsenal."

Tarpley explained that before a meeting between the prospective host families and foreign students is arranged, both are asked to complete a questionnaire that includes language backgrounds and hobbies. An attempt is made to introduce people with similar interests.

He added that the new friends

are basically on their own from that point. "It is left up to the family and the student to decide what they will do together, where they go and how often they meet."

Although records show only 53 families currently involved, Tarpley said they would like to have a host family for every foreign student. There are currently more than 350 foreign students assigned to MMCS.

There are always more students who request host families than families who have shown interest in hosting visitors. Program coordinators are always willing to discuss the program with individuals or groups.

# THE First Thanksgiving Celebrated the Pilgrims' Survival.



The first national Thanksgiving, proclaimed by President Abraham Lincoln in 1863, was during the darkest days of the Civil War. The very first Thanksgiving held by the Pilgrims of Massachusetts, more than three centuries ago, came at the end of a period of suffering during which almost half of the settlers died. It is strange that mankind is very seldom thankful during periods of plenty.

There was a Thanksgiving celebration in Jamestown, Va., several years before the more famous one at Plymouth. In June of 1610, a service was held by the emaciated survivors of the "starving time." Of some 490 colonists who had been at Jamestown in the fall of 1609, only 60 were alive with the coming of Spring. These hollow-eyed survivors were about to abandon the settlement when news came that a ship bearing relief supplies was on its way. A thanksgiving service was held upon the arrival of the ship. Perhaps, as one writer expressed it, the idea and expression of thanksgiving is not a backward look, but one into the future.

It was almost a century before the Lincoln proclamation in 1863 that Congress took the initiative in recommending the observance of the second Thursday in December as a national Thanksgiving. The proposal did not get the necessary approval from the President, however, and the idea was dropped.

The last Thursday in November was not established as a customary day for Thanksgiving until Lincoln's 1863

Presidential Proclamation. But it was not observed as a legal holiday until 1941. By 1939, however, the date had been so established by custom that when President Franklin D. Roosevelt tampered with the date, many people observed both the day proclaimed by President Roosevelt and the traditional date, among them the President himself, who admitted liking the idea of a double celebration.


The director of the Plimoth Plantation, the reconstruction of the first Pilgrim settlement in Plymouth, Mass., said recently, "This controversy over the 'first Thanksgiving' stems from a failure to distinguish between the centuries-old custom of giving thanks for divine favor, and the particular characteristics of the national holiday Americans today celebrate as 'Thanksgiving'. The first far pre-dates either Plymouth or Virginia, but there is no question that the latter relates to the harvest festival and the Thanksgiving observed by the Pilgrims and their friends in Plymouth in the fall of 1621."

Whatever its origins, it is the spirit in which the day is observed, not its origin that matters. Curiously, the English poet Alexander Pope expressed in verse a telling description of the American Thanksgiving:

**"Our rural ancestors with little blest,  
Patient of labor when the end was rest,  
Indulged the day that housed their annual grain,  
With feasts and offerings, and a thankful strain."**

# MG Meyer Takes Over BMD Command

Major General Stewart C. Meyer has assumed duties as the Army's new Ballistic Missile Defense Program Manager and Commanding General of BMD Systems Command.


As Program Manager, Meyer is responsible for managing the programs which are designed to retain the United States' world lead in BMD technology and to maintain the capability to develop and deploy a BMD system if necessary.

He heads the Army's only strategic weapons program, reporting directly to the Army Chief of Staff and serves as principal assistant and staff advisor for BMD to the Secretary of the Army.

He directs activities of the U.S. Army BMD Organization, which includes the BMD Advanced Technology Center, also located in Huntsville, and Kwajalein Missile Range in the mid-Pacific, as well as BMD Systems Command.

MG Meyer commanded the U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command's Combined Arms Test Activity (formerly MASSTER — Modern Army Selected Systems Test, Evaluation and Review) until he was named in September to succeed Brigadier General John G. Jones as BMD Program Manager.

William A. Davis, Jr., the deputy program manager, had served as acting program manager since BG Jones' departure in October, and Colonel Roger D. Powell, BMD Systems Command Chief of



Staff, had served as acting commander of the command.

MG Meyer has an extensive background in defense research and development. In addition to three tours in Vietnam, his major assignments in the last decade have included service as Assistant Director of Plans and Programs, and as Deputy Director for Missiles and Space, in the Office of the Army's Chief of Research and Development; as a military assistant to the Deputy Director of Defense Research and Engineering for Tactical Warfare Programs in the Office of the Secretary of Defense; and as Director of Research, Development, and Engineering for the Army Materiel Command.

The El Paso native is a graduate of the United States Military Academy and holds a Master's Degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Michigan. He has also attended the Artillery School, the Army's Command and General Staff College, and the Army War College.

His decorations and awards include the Distinguished Service Medal; the Silver Star; the Legion of Merit (with Oak Leaf Cluster); the Bronze Star Medal with "V" Device (with five Oak Leaf Clusters); Air Medals; the Army Commendation Medal (with Oak Leaf Cluster); the Purple Heart, and the Senior Parachutist Badge.

# Sheriff Removed Following Verdict

BIRMINGHAM — U.S. District Judge Sam Pointer has sentenced Madison County Sheriff Dave Headrick to 90 days in federal prison for violating the civil rights of Specialist 4 Anthony Squeglia.

Headrick, who was found guilty in a jury trial November 10 of willfully depriving the Redstone soldier of his rights in a beating at County jail on the night of June 15, was ordered to surrender himself to a U.S. Marshall on January 10 to begin serving the sentence.

Headrick's lawyer, Joe Berry of Huntsville, said the verdict will be appealed.

On being sentenced Headrick vacated the office of Madison County Sheriff. The governor appoints a replacement according to state law.

In a pre-sentence hearing last Wednesday, the defense lawyer asked Pointer to consider the "extreme consequences" that could result if his client were given a prison sentence. Berry told the judge that "state statutes bear unusual circumstances that would give punishment not in keeping with the offense." The lawyer was referring to automatic removal from office, which Berry said could result from even a suspended sentence as he interpreted Alabama law.

Asked by Pointer if he had anything to say in mitigation of his punishment, Headrick said he didn't agree with the guilty verdict, but accepted it. He said that in more than 20

years as a police officer "I have always honored my office and my badge" and added, "For all those in law enforcement, I'm truly sorry if I've tarnished my badge in any way."

The U. S. Attorney's Office, represented at the hearing by Mel Alexander, assistant prosecutor in the Headrick case, recommended the sheriff receive a prison sentence because the case involved violation of "a very special public trust" and also involved violence.

The judge, stating that he normally did not lecture or go into detail before pronouncing sentence, said he thought it appropriate to do so in this case.

Pointer said he approached sentencing in the belief that defense testimony was "disbelieved" by the jury rather than perjured. The pre-sentence report, he noted, did not reflect a "bad person", the case did not involve a continuing offense indicating a pattern of corruption and, while maximum punishment under the law is a year in jail and \$1,000 fine, violations of the law that are much more serious than Headrick's offense are possible, for example a violation could involve severe injury or death.

Deeming previous "skirmishes" involving the sheriff as not particularly significant in the case, the judge said he considered Headrick a first offender for purposes of sentencing. But Pointer said also that he was taking into consideration that the offense could not have occurred except by virtue of the office Headrick held, and that the offense was not committed in the heat or excitement of an arrest situation.

Too, the judge added, beyond punishment there was the question of deterring others from a comparable offense.

Also given due consideration, Pointer said, was the matter of depriving citizens of Madison County of an official elected by vote of the people. But to delay sentencing until Headrick's term of office expired would represent a double standard in applying the law to elected officials and average citizens.

Pointer said it was not the court's business to determine Headrick's fitness to hold or continue in office. In that regard, he noted, "State law has its own consequences whatever they may be."

In a brief meeting of Headrick and his attorney with newsmen, Headrick said that while he accepted the verdict, the punishment was undeserved because "I am not guilty."

Berry said that both he and Headrick interpreted state law to mean that removal from office is automatic with sentencing. They said Headrick did not feel it in the interest of the County to try to continue in office through the appeal process. Berry said he believed it would be "8 to 10 months at the earliest" before the appeal could be considered by a court. Headrick's term of office would have been up in 14 months.

Alabama law states that when a person in public office is sentenced to the penitentiary, the office is vacated at the time of sentencing. The person is eligible for reinstatement if the conviction is reversed by an appeals court.

Headrick will remain free on an existing bond until his appeal is ruled on by the 5th Circuit Appeals Court in New Orleans.

# Lily of the Valley No Flower Here

Tradition is a part of the military, whether it be an Army-wide tradition or a tradition upheld by an individual installation. The Lily of the Valley has become a tradition at Restone.

To most people the "Lily of the Valley" is a small, white flower, but to officers of School Brigade at the Missile and Munitions Center and School the Lily is the symbol of Brigade's weekly meeting at the Redstone Officers Club.



The organization was founded in September 1967 by a former commander of School Brigade, Colonel James L. Keown. Its purpose was to give officers the opportunity to express themselves, to build comradery and improve morale. The purpose remains the same, but some changes have taken place.

Gone is the stick, a highly polished device that resembled a miniature cane. Now a deserving officer receives a plaque which is representative of the cane.

Why was the stick given, and why is the plaque given now? Every week nominations are placed, in the form of stories with fabricated but appropriate titles. No names are given during the story telling and when all nominations are made a vote is taken. The plaque goes to the officer who is the main character in the story voted the best.

What warrants an officer being the recipient of the plaque? Any officer who's conduct, favorable or unfavorable, desires attention.

"Just about every week the person who ends up receiving the plaque manages to vote for himself, never realizing the story was about him," 1st Lt. Howard B. Dodson, RR-EO officer and recording officer for the Lily, said.

"One of the best stories I remember," Lt. Dodson commented, "was the story about the Hershey Bar Commando, the officer who received the plaque as a result of a story about the condition of his shoes."

The officers of the Lily also have a time during their meetings for confessions. An officer who confesses to his minor transgressions of the week can not be nominated for that transgression.

Other activities that take place during the Lily's weekly meetings are announcement of new arrivals and departures, special awards and challenges. Challenges are contests between companys in parades, unit sports and blood mobile participation.

"One of the things I find the most interesting about our weekly meetings," Lt. Dodson commented, "is the unwritten rules of the association which members are required to learn from experience. The oldest member of the Lily is in charge of maintaining order over the unwritten rules."

The Lily's weekly meetings give officers a chance to relax and forget about business. A chance to carry on a Redstone tradition.

# New Life for Power System

A team of five soldiers from Ft. Belvoir's Facility Engineer Support Agency have spent the past month here helping to restore an antique.

They had to work without service manuals and diagrams for the most part, because the publications have been out of print for years.

There was great difficulty getting replacement parts, although suppliers were sympathetic and offered to try to make duplicates if old specimens to go by were provided.

The restoration, however, was successful, and as a result a little more life has been coaxed out of Redstone's electrical distribution system, some of which dates from the first days of the arsenal.

The old system had gotten so worn and out of whack that small-scale blackouts have occurred where they should not have.

The team of soldiers, working with arsenal electrical personnel, performed a complete maintenance upgrade on the distribution system. More than five hundred circuit breakers and relays were cleaned and adjusted or replaced.

The maintenance is expected to cut significantly the occurrence of nuisance power outages here.

Arthur Barnette, Redstone electrical chief, said that when relays get out of adjustment the result is "nuisance tripping" in which large areas can be unnecessarily blacked out.

Barnette explained that the protective relays are supposed to trip only the nearest circuit breaker when an overload or short circuit occurs, but improper adjustment can result in a whole series of breakers being tripped. "This summer we had a case where a fault in a station took out two breakers at once. If the breakers had been calibrated properly, only the first breaker at the station would have tripped, but the second breaker went out also and we lost power to a lot of the NASA area as a result."

A similar situation resulted in a massive blackout in New York this summer, Barnette added. "When breakers are calibrated too close to each other one breaker doesn't have time to react before another senses it and they can trip all the way down the line", he said.

Barnette said it is planned to program for new electrical distribution equipment.

The electrical chief said it is planned to bring the team of soldiers back in a few months to perform other services. Barnette noted, "We've only got two men in our electrical distribution unit. They do a marvelous job keeping the old system going, but large scale maintenance like we've just completed is just more work than two men can handle. The soldiers were of great assistance to us."

The Ft. Belvoir team is expected to return this spring to perform an infrared scan of the electrical distribution system to locate "hot spots" in the system which waste energy and cause poor distribution of power. They result mainly from loose and dirty connections and faulty insulators. The scan is performed at night with a camera trained on power lines and poles which appear on the camera screen in silhouette. The hot spots appear as a greenish glow.

A government contractor employee suffered fatal injuries here Friday morning when a truck being used to pull a fork lift from a ditch slipped and pinned him against a building.

Michael Robinson, 24, an employee of Systems Services Corp., was pronounced dead on arrival at Redstone Army Hospital. A co-worker who was helping Robinson attempt to dislodge the fork lift using a truck-mounted winch was not injured.

The Army began an immediate investigation of the accident.

The accident happened at Test Area 2 off Patton Road.

Systems Services Corp. performs maintenance under contract on test range equipment.

## COBET Scrapped

(ARNEWS) — The Army plans to drop a training program it began in 1972, officials say.

The program, Common Basic Electronics Training was designed to give recruits specialized electronics training after they completed basic training and before they reached MOS producing schools.

COBET, which has been taught at Ft. Jackson, S.C., is costing the Army more than if six separate service schools added the basic electronics training to their courses.

The Training and Doctrine Command has tentative plans to graduate its last COBET student at the end of Sept. 1978.

The six schools which will add specialized electronics to their curriculum are transportation, missile and munition, ordnance and chemical, intelligence, field artillery and signal.

# Have Something To Sell? — Give Us A Try

Do you need a butter-churn? How about a hame to fill Aunt Agatha's Christmas stocking? Where can you get a saber, cheap?

Try the Redstone Thrift Shop in bldg 3649 any Wednesday or Friday between 10 and 2. True, the hame and the saber have been sold. But the butter-churn is still available, along with racks of clothes, shelves of books and old records, half a dozen hairdryers, a vintage typewriter, and more.

"We just have anything and everything. An unbelievable variety. And it's unbelievable what will sell. You get some things in you think will just never sell, and people fight over them," Lois Thompson, manager of the Thrift Shop, said. One of the reasons for the variety of goods available could be that it does not have to rely on charity for its stock. This Thrift shop handles goods on a consignment basis, and charges only a ten percent commission on items sold.

Another reason could be the number and variety of customers the Thrift Shop attracts.

"Anybody may buy in the Thrift Shop, but only active duty, retired military, their dependents and badge personnel (civilians currently employed at the Arsenal) may sell," Thompson said.

Thompson added, "All the money we collect in commissions goes to the Morale and Welfare Division here. Everything except absolute operating expenses. They in turn allot the money to the Dependent Youth Activities. All the money is kept right here on the Arsenal."

Business is brisk, especially on the first Wednesday of each month when tag prices are reduced on items too long on the shelf, and checks are written for those items sold in the previous month.

First Wednesdays are also the days that shortages are felt most acutely. The Thrift Shop is a volunteer operation, and there are never enough hands to go around.

"Everyone works hard. You don't have time to sit around and look pretty," Barbara Hanlein, President of the Board of Directors, noted.

"Most of our volunteers work 4 hours a week at the outset, and 2½ hours once a week thereafter. That's quite a bit of time to put into a volunteer organization."

But the work is not all drudgery by any means. A volunteer naturally gets to see the bargains first. The Shop also throws two parties a year for its workers, one in the spring and another at Christmas time.

And the work tends to become addictive. "If you're a Thrift Shop worker you love it," Thompson said. "Wherever you go, this is the kind of work you do."







## Soldiers to get free microfiche copy of Official Military Personnel Files

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) -- Microfiche copies of official military personnel files (OMPF) are being mailed to soldiers who have had their records converted to the miniature sheets and copies will be mailed to other soldiers as they're converted, DA officials announced.

The OMPF microfiche copies, measuring only four by six inches, have been converted for E-8s and E-9s with officer and E-7 files scheduled to be completed by the end of this year. E-

6 records are scheduled to be converted by the end of 1978, and E-1 through E-5 records completed by late 1979.

Each soldier will receive a free copy of the microfiche file and will have one year to correct errors and an opportunity to purchase additional copies of microfiche and original files.

The conversion from paper documents to microfiche files is designed to cut time and money costs from the present system. In addition, it

allows duplicate copies to be stored at an alternate site to safeguard against loss or damage.

The microfiche files, which will eventually be used for reserve files as well, can miniaturize up to 98 documents on the small sheet of plastic, including photographs. The average enlisted file contains 51 pages and the average officer file contains 166 pages of paper documents.

Each soldier will have two sheets of microfiche on file, one labeled "p" fiche for performance and disciplinary data and one labeled "S" fiche for service and administrative data. Some soldiers will also have an "R" fiche containing restricted documents, such as Army Board for the Correction of Military Records cases.

Personnel centers worldwide will maintain viewers that magnify the sheets to 24 by 48 inches.

## On Pay Commission

(ARNEWS) — An Army sergeant major has been named as one of four enlisted staff members of the Presidential Commission on Military Compensation.

Sergeant Major Manley S. Warrick, formerly finance operations chief with the Intelligence and Security Command, will serve as a research analyst with the task force for service pay and benefits.

In addition to the four enlisted staff members on the commission, two Army officers are included among seven armed forces officers with the commission.

The commission's report to the President, scheduled for completion in March, may have significant impact on the future of military pay and benefits.

# GI Bill Takers Over 7 Million

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — With a total of 809,000 veterans and servicemen in training at the end of September, the total number to use the current GI Bill—which took effect in 1966—has exceeded seven million individuals, according to Veterans Administration officials.

VA Administrator Max Cleland said that more than 17 million Americans have taken advantage of the GI Bill since the inception of the first program in 1944.

The current, or "Vietnam-Era" GI Bill, has provided educational benefits to more than 7 million individuals.

More than four million of these veterans were enrolled in college, the VA official said. This is approximately twice the number of men and women who took college level training under the World War II legislation.

The agency said September's enrollment of 809,000 is down by about 295,000 from about 1.1 million GI Bill students enrolled in September a year ago.

During all of Fiscal Year 1976, VA said, 2.8 million servicemen and veterans took advantage of the education benefits. In Fiscal Year 1977, the total enrollment has decreased to 1,938,000.

While the current GI Bill enrollment stands at less than one million, the agency said it estimated that approximately six million Americans are currently eligible for such training.





# Now Is the Time To Make Plans

It isn't pleasant to contemplate, but you could die suddenly—from natural causes or an on-the-job injury.

Would your survivors know where official papers and documents are kept so they could settle your affairs?

They should. Here's why:

When a civilian employee dies, the MIRCOC Civilian Personnel Division prepares a letter of condolence addressed to the survivor to be signed by the Commander of the Agency or Command where the employee was working.

In that letter are the name and phone number of a specialist in CPD available to discuss benefits and complete claims forms for life insurance, monthly survivor annuity payments and the balance due on salary and annual leave.

Survivors must provide the personnel specialist in CPD with copies of the death certificate as well as military discharge papers for deceased employees who were in military service. In addition, the following may be required—as appropriate—marriage certificate divorce decrees, birth certificates of minor children and or death certificates for former spouses.

The amount of annuity due the widow or widower is a percentage of a computed annuity based on the employee's high three average salary and number of years of service. Additional benefits are payable to minor children.

### Avenue of Support

If it is determined that the survivors should receive worker's compensation the necessary actions will be taken to provide that avenue of financial support in lieu of benefits under the Civil Service Retirement System.

The Civilian Personnel Office will process the appropriate claim forms. It is not necessary to employ legal assistance for this purpose.

Personnel officials suggest that all employees inform their families of these procedures and the information required to process claims for survivor benefits.

When military personnel die, either Army active duty or retired, an Army Survivor's Assistance Office (SAO) is appointed immediately, and visits the survivors within 24 hours, as soon as the next-of-kin has been notified of the death.

Other branches of the Services provide their own SAOs.

The SAO's duties cover a wide range starting with help with funeral arrangements through assistance in filing claims for all benefits due, ac-

companying survivors to agencies such as the Veterans Administration, the Social Security Office, and the County Court House to probate a will, for instance.

### In the Military

Military Personnel officials at Redstone provide SAOs with information and guidance on how they will perform their duties. Included is a list of certain documents it will be necessary for the next-of-kin to have in order to make initial application for various benefits. The guidance says it is not possible to prepare a list that would be applicable to every case, but one is provided that include those normally required immediately or in the near future in case of death.

This is the list:

Birth certificates of the deceased, and or

widow, and or parents, and or children.

Marriage certificates

All divorce decrees of both the deceased and the widow if applicable.

Safe deposit box keys

Savings account pass book

Current check book

Death certificate

Commercial Life insurance policies

U. S. Savings bonds

Stocks and bonds

Discharge papers of deceased if he or she had prior military service

Deceased's social security card, stub or number

Previous year's W-2 forms

Deceased's will

Title to house trailer, and citizenship papers, if applicable

Title to car

Deed to house or land

Deed showing owner of burial plot

Adoption papers for any minor child

Civil service retirement papers

Papers pertaining to any loans received.

Both CPD and Military Personnel provide assistance to the retired as well as those on active duty or currently employed.

### Listening Ear

There is a Widowed Person's Service, a national organization started by the American Association of Retired Persons, Action for Independent Maturity, and National Retired Teachers Association to help newly widowed get through the difficult period after bereavement.

The program offers a "listening ear" through telephone contact, one-to-one counseling, and aid with such problems as financial planning, social and family relations.

The local Widowed Persons' Service program was established a year ago and three volunteer teams are serving the Huntsville community.

Anyone who needs the help of this community service can reach a volunteer day or night through the HELP line (539-3424).



# Crews Leads Rockets to Winning Season



On the Sidelines with Crews

Portrait of a winner . . . He loves his work, he's never wanted to get into any other profession. He's dedicated, hard working—money is nice, but it never mattered more than the job itself. The quality of his product always mattered more.

Louis Crews, head coach of Alabama A&M's football team for 16 years and now an assistant coach for Redstone's squad, is that winner. Crews, a highly respected and sought after coach on the college level, decided to help coach the Rockets this year despite having offers to coach for several well known colleges and universities. Proving his dedication to the field, he doesn't get paid for coaching the post team, he coaches here because he enjoys doing it.

"This job is a challenge," explained Crews, who has coached for more than 28 years. "You never have all the players on the team out there at once because of their military duties, so you make do with what you've got. To get these kids to perform under these adverse conditions is the challenge."

A tough challenge it may be, but so far Crews has been more than equal to the task. His coaching and inspiration has been a big reason why the Rockets, now 6-1 in the North Alabama Semi-Pro Football Conference, are having such a fine season. By practicing as much as possible, and by using some of the plays Crews developed during his tenure at A&M, the Rockets have also been refined into possibly the best all-around team in the league.

Crews success with the Rockets is just one in a long line of winning teams he has had a hand in leading. In fact, his first successful coaching was done while he was attending high school in Bessemer, Ala.

"I've always wanted to be a coach," he recalled. "In high school I started coaching a basketball team, and from a sloppy team,

we became a really good team, That's when I realized that I wanted to be a coach."

After graduating from high school, he attended college, went into the Army four years later, then again went back to college, staying active in sports all the while. During his years in school, he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree and a Physical Education Directors Degree from Indiana University.

Crews' coaching career got underway in 1947 when Wilberforce University in Ohio hired him as a physical education instructor and coach. He later served at Alcorn A&M, and then Jarvis Christian College as head coach and athletic director.

His big break came in 1960 when Alabama A&M hired him as their head football coach, where he promptly posted a seven win, one loss season. During the next 15 years, his team went undefeated two times in regular season play, won five S.I.A.C. championships and amassed an impressive 105-53-3 record.

"I really enjoyed working at A&M," said the veteran coach. "More than anything I enjoyed watching the kids grow. It's quite a challenge to take an average kid and make him a tough match for the best players. It gives you a lot of joy."

A few of his players even managed to get into the National Football League. Johnny Stallworth went to Pittsburgh to play for the Steelers, Ron Coleman went to Houston, and Denver Broncos drafted Oliver Ross.

"It thrills me to have my kids from a small school make it big time. It's like part of me is there with them," said Crews.

Now, although it doesn't have the thrills or pressure of college ball, Crews is content coaching the Rockets. And even though he gets no monetary compensation, he still coaches with all the enthusiasm and vigor he had with the Bulldogs of A&M.

# Knights Go After Pop Warner Title

The Redstone Knights, Junior Pee wee Division (80 pound limit) of the Pop Warner League were again crowned North Alabama champions Monday, November 14, and will represent their division for the second year in a row in the Optimist Bowl game against a team from Chicago.

This Redstone team of 26 boys and one girl, all 8, 9, and 10 years old, completed their season with six wins and one loss. The defeat came last Monday evening when the Knights were beaten 20-6 by the Huntsville Boys Club.

During the season the Knights scored 27-7 and 18-6 wins over the Boys Club; defeated Madison 13-6 and 19-6; and took a pair from Northern 12-0 and 13-7.

In the seven games the hard running Knights gained 1283 yards and scored 108 points. The defensive platoon allowed only 500 yards of total gain and held their opponents to 52 points.

# Army Moves to Tighten Accountability

(ARNEWS) — Changes in the Army's property accountability system are expected soon. The changes are results of the work of a DA-level task force created to improve the accounting system. Messages directing the changes have been sent to the field by DA.

Major changes developed by the task force are:

- + Requiring installation and division commanders to develop standard inventory procedures for their units.
- + More thorough inventories of sets, kits, and outfits containing tools and other equipment.
- + Designating company level commanders as unit property officers.
- + Increased use of hand receipts.

An earlier directive placed tighter administrative controls on the use of inventory adjustment reports.

A DA task force official explained that the newest controls give commanders a more active role in property accountability. "This requirement puts the commander back into the property system," the official said. "It gives him more concern for accountability and security, including a bigger incentive to provide the individual soldier with the means to safeguard property."

The increased use of hand receipts, the official explained, also spreads responsibility for property among hand receipt holders in addition to supply and maintenance personnel.

Soldiers at all levels will be required to share responsibility for property as a result of the set, kit and outfit inventory requirement. A mechanic, for example, would "sign" for a tool set and would be personally responsible for its contents.

The task force was created last month at the direction of the Army chief of staff, following a four-month long special investigation by the DA IG. The investigation results estimated that the Army inventory losses are about \$118 million.

Among other ideas the task force is

studying to improve the property system, according to the official, is an overhaul of the report of survey system. "We're coming up with a simple definition of negligence," the official explained.

Also being considered by the task force are improved training programs for property personnel, including DA level recognition — equivalent to the Connelly Award given to outstanding dining facilities — for excellence in accountability, along with a system for automatically writing off certain losses as a "cost of doing business."

## Army Authorizes Special Transfers

(ARNEWS) — Soldiers with handicapped dependents will receive special consideration for assignments and transfers under a new regulation scheduled to reach the field in January 1978.

Soldiers in grades E-4 with more than two years service and E-5s and above are eligible to receive special consideration of dependent handicaps according to the regulation, AR 614-203.

Among the handicapped needs that will be considered are treatment, education, therapy, training and counseling that dependents require.

The purpose of the special assignment consideration is to prevent emotional or financial hardships that may exist for handicapped dependents in some areas.

The regulation also requires strict con-

fidence of applications for entry into the special program.

"Although dependent needs will be given every consideration during the assignment process," a MILPERCEN official said, "the needs of the Army will ultimately prevail."


The official said that soldiers assigned to short tour areas and other locations where dependents are restricted, will not be considered under the new regulation, although they do qualify for special consideration of return assignments.

The policy does not allow requests for deferment or deletion of assignments, but only special attention before orders are actually issued.

Compassionate and other requests for reassignment or deferment are allowed under AR 314-30, along with AR 614-101 (for officers) and AR 614-200 (enlisted).

# New Rates and Benefit Changes

Premium rates and benefit changes that will apply next year to 79 health insurance plans available to Federal employees and annuitants were announced October 18 by the Civil Service Commission.

Rates and benefit changes will become effective in January, 1978, following an open season being held through December 9, to give eligible employees not now enrolled an opportunity to enroll and to give enrolled employees and annuitants an opportunity to change from one plan or option to another, or from self-only to family coverage.

Premiums for most plans will be higher next year, reflecting increases in the cost and use of health care. The rise in the cost of medical care, while slowing somewhat, is still significantly above the rate of inflation in other sectors of the economy. All factors combined should cause the average annual health bill and insurance premium to rise 10 to 15 percent in 1978 and 1979.

The premiums for the two Government-wide plans, Aetna and Blue Cross and Blue Shield, will rise 11 and 12.5 percent, respectively, in 1978. Many of the other plans in the Program will have premium increases in the 10 to 15 percent range.

For annuitants and non-postal employees, the Government's contribution will be 60 percent of the average high option premium rate for six of the largest plans in the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program (Aetna, Blue Cross and Blue Shield, National Association of Letter Carriers, American Postal Workers Union, Kaiser Foundation Health Plan of Northern California, and Kaiser Foundation Health Plan of Southern California).

However, the Postal employees the agency contribution will be 75

percent of the "big six" average, and the limit will be 93.75 percent of any individual rate.

Three employee-organization sponsored plans are eliminating their low options. The American Federation of Government Employees' Health Benefit Plan, the Alliance Health Benefit plan and the Government Employees'

Hospital Association Benefit Plan will discontinue their low options in January.

Employees and annuitants enrolled in the low option of one of these plans, who do not change to another plan during the open season, will be enrolled automatically in the high option of their plan.
