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## Interstate Redstone Fades Away

Redstone workers took RIF, Reorganization, downgrade, tornado and flood more or less in stride, but the decision to close two arsenal gates touched a nerve in most of those who used Gates 2 and 7.

They reacted with concern and -in many cases- anger. About 1,000 Army, NASA and contractor employees called the MIRCOM public affairs office to question or protest the new security plan and the reasons behind it.

(Note: See "Why" page 2 this issue for a detailed explanation of why the gates had to be closed.

With few exceptions, every caller either used one of the closed gates or was calling in behalf of people who did.


Both Army and Marshall Center employee unions circulated petitions. Some offices and organizations started their own. Angry workers called local radio and television stations, newspapers and city, county and state officials. Many carried their protests to members of Congress and the Pentagon.

There were similar efforts by some contractors and individuals not employed on the arsenal protesting the closing of gates and tightened security that denied them a quick trip to work across Redstone.

Unlike that group of protestors, however, most federal employees, at least those who talked with MIRCOM public affairs staffers, agreed that physical security should be improved. Their agreement ended short of closing the gate most convenient to them, nor were they willing to minimize the problems caused by a new route to work.

Basically, the many who questioned the decision argued three themes:

1. "It's not necessary": More specifically, to close my gate. Their arguments ranged from the simplistic: "If there are things like missile magazines to guard put the MPs on them instead of on the gate" to the involved. Those in the latter category usually said something like this: "Surely you can scrape up one MP to open my gate for an hour in the morning and an hour at night." (See "Why" on page 2). Others questioned using traffic counts for

the basis of picking the two least used gates to close. Some said the decision had obviously been made to "favor Huntsville" and penalize the community where they lived.

2. Wasted Energy: Almost every caller asserted that the decision would compel greatly increased travel, gas use, and cost. The estimates of how much varied widely. Some Gate 7 regulars, for example, insisted closing it would add up to 40 miles a day to their trips. One said flatly that the closure of gate 7 would cost him \$720 out of pocket annually.

It does mean a longer trip as the diagrams accompanying this article show.

For most accustomed to leaving Highway 20 at the Jetplex and entering Gate 7, using

Gate 9 means 2.9 miles added to a one way trip to work clocking the distance through both gates to the intersection of Martin and Rideout Rds.

The worse case for former Gate 7 people are residents of Triana. They face an additional 10.5 miles one way measured from the center of Triana through Gate 7 and 9 to the same arsenal intersection. Only one resident of Triana was identified among the 1,000 callers.

The apparent worst case for former Gate 2 people are Army Finance and Accounting employees and those who work in test areas south of Buxton Rd. For those used to coming off the Parkway and driving

## Some Help On the Way

The Commanders of MIRCOM and MIRADCOM have approved a one-year test of flexitime to begin on March 5.

Although the test is planned to continue for a year, a mid-test evaluation will be made and a determination made at the time whether to continue for the additional six months. Guidance and specific instructions are now being furnished the directors, project managers and office chiefs.


Under the flexitime tests, continuous fixed times of an employee's arrival and departure are replaced with a working day which is composed of two types of time—core time and flexible time. Core time is the time in which all employees must be present. Flexible time is the time designated as part of the schedule of work hours within which the employee may choose, within certain constraints, his or her time of arrival and departure from the office or shop.

The core time for the flexitime tests has been set as 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. with the flexible

time hours as 6:30 to 9:00 and from 3:00 to 5:30.

The decisions to approve the flexitime test in MIRCOM and MIRADCOM were based upon favorable and positive results being experienced with flexitime in a number of government agencies. According to evaluation reports prepared by these activities, flexitime has proved significantly beneficial to managers, supervisors and employees. Benefits often identified by managers and supervisors include an increase and improvement in both the quantity and quality of work, reduction in short-term usage of sick leave, elimination of tardiness, reduction in overtime, and improved employee morale.

Employees report several important benefits of flexitime including: Job satisfaction, increased opportunities to pursue educational goals, increased accessibility to family, community and recreational activities, reduction in traffic congestion when driving to and from work, and increased opportunity to conserve leave.

**Question: Why were Gates 2 and 7 closed?**

For reasons of security.

Redstone's security had been under intense review for several weeks. Then came the incident December 20 when a guard discovered the lock on the door of a magazine containing Dragon missiles had been broken open. None of the missiles were taken but the incident triggered immediate moves to tighten security. New gate hours, two MPs on each open gate and the closing of gates 2 and 7 are the most visible—and painful to the work force and public—of many things being done.

When the single MPs who once manned open gates during business hours were removed in mid-August and reassigned to internal patrols because of limited manpower in the MP company, many individuals with no valid business on Redstone began to use the post road network. Some came and stayed, others drove through in increasing numbers. That alarmed not only the commanders and heads of all major arsenal activities, but many members of the workforce as well.

Redstone is a closed, military post, but obviously only if the Army keeps it closed. Why keep it closed?

Much of the work is classified. A lot of what goes on in some parts of the arsenal is or could be dangerous to people who wander in. There are great quantities of expensive

equipment scattered widely over 38,000 acres.

Missile Manufacturing operations—a fairly recent addition to activities on the post—have created new security problems.

General Rachmeler's decision to man the arsenal gates and control who enters and leaves as the first of several changes to increase security. Note there are now two MPs on duty at each gate. The MPs' function is not to open the gate and stand aside while vehicles pass. They are there to control who comes into the arsenal.

The MPs still do not have enough people. More have been asked for. Until additional MPs become available, there are not enough to man all the gates all the time. That fact drove the second decision: man those gates that can be manned and close the others. Two gates had to be closed. Gates 2 and 7 were chosen because traffic counts of all vehicles passing through arsenal gates showed those two to be those least used by arsenal workers.

Surely the Army has enough MPs at Redstone to open the gates for a short time in the morning and afternoon?

Sorry, right now the Army does not have enough MPs to do what has to be done and also man and control access at Gates 2 and 7. Again, the idea is to control access to the arsenal, not open the gate and stand aside.

Is there any chance that either one or both of the gates might be open again, even for a limited time?



Yes, if more MPs become available, it may be possible to open one or both of those gates for a limited time morning and afternoon. Should that be worked out, there will be an announcement to all arsenal workers.

There is no chance for a return to the easy access of the recent past for the public and others who do not have proper identification and valid business on the arsenal.

straight west on Buxton, it will take an extra 2.7 miles to come in at Gate 3, go west to Patton and then south to reach the intersection of Patton and Buxton Rds.

Another variant of the energy argument was the projected impact on carpools. Many of the vehicles entering the post at 2 and 7 came from long distances and carried members of car pools. Many callers asserted their carpools would now be forced to break up.

4. Danger: The bottom line for most was an argument centered on increased hazards caused by forcing more vehicles to enter at other arsenal gates. The MPs tallied 560

cars in their count at Gate 7. Almost all of them will now share Gate 9 with the 2,800 vehicles already using it. The single lane turn off Highway 20 eastbound to enter the arsenal does concern officials and it is to be widened soon so that cars may enter Gate 9 three abreast.

Gate 2 traffic used long stacking lanes for left turns by northbound parkway traffic at the Buxton Rd. intersection and there was a special traffic signal to halt southbound parkway traffic for vehicles entering Buxton Rd.

Huntsville Traffic Department switched the special signal to the Redstone Rd.-Parkway intersection over the weekend, plan to construct additional stacking lane space as soon as the new Gate 3 traffic patterns settle down.

Drivers entering the arsenal have the additional option—if concerned about safety at Redstone Rd—of continuing north on the Parkway to Martin where a looping right hand turn off the parkway will put them on the Martin Rd. overpass headed west to Gate 1.

Finally, Arsenal officials expect significant traffic reduction at all gates shortly as both MIRCOM and MIRADCOM begin year-long tests of flexitime which will spread peak traffic periods in morning and afternoon over three hour periods.

## Traffic Patterns Take Shape Early

Redstone workers settled reluctantly into new traffic patterns this week resulting from tightened arsenal security.

Elsewhere area residents not employed on the arsenal who had been using its road network as a convenient way to reach their own jobs were adjusting to longer rides around rather than across Redstone.

Arsenal gates 2 and 7 were closed on schedule beginning Monday and most of the 1,200 vehicles that normally entered the arsenal through those gates between 6 a.m. and 8 a.m. sought new entry. Most switched to gate 3 and gate 9.

After the first day, military police reported things had gone better than expected during the morning traffic peak, although frozen gate locks caused some delay Monday at Gates 3 and 9.

Temporary control points were set up at Rideout and Goss just inside Gate 9 and at Patton and Redstone to help drivers get adjusted to the traffic patterns.

On Monday morning traffic entering Gate 9 from Highway 20 flowed freely at 7:35. Cars were not backed up from the gate onto the highway as some feared they would be.

However, at Gate 3 traffic did back up about a quarter of a mile past Stonegate

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
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# Memorial Speaker Named

Rev. C. T. Vivian, Board Chairman of the Black Action Strategies and Information Center Inc. will speak here at a memorial service observing the birthday of the late Dr. Martin Luther King.

The memorial service will be held in the Bicentennial Chapel, beginning at 11 a.m. Jan. 16. This service sponsored by the local Army commands, and will be conducted by Rev. Vivian and Army chaplains. It is open to the public.

Rev. Vivian worked closely with Dr. King, serving on his executive staff and also served as national director of affiliates for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and as vice president of the Nashville Christian Leadership Conference.

He led community organization and direct action operations during the heights of the Birmingham movement. He organized the initial phases of the Selma, and St. Augustine, non-violent movements, and directed various operations in the later phases of the campaigns.

Dr. King requested Rev. Vivian's presence as a consultant for the Albany, Georgia campaign.

Rev. Vivian has written several

books including, "Black Power and the American Myth," "Americas' Joseph: the Blackening of America;" and "Interdependence: Means of Black Survival." He helped originate The Baptist Layman, the first magazine designed for Black laymen, and the Nashville News Star.

Prior to organizing Basic, Rev. Vivian served as Dean, Alternative Education and National Director of the Seminary Without Walls at Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina.

## Lower Cost Targets

MIRCOM's Targets Management Office is now offering its Air Defense customers better targets for less money, thanks to an idea of project engineer Serge Tonetti.

Tonetti was presented an award certificate for suggesting the installation of B-52 QUAIL decoy jet engines in Firebee target missiles. Over 50 such engines recently became available to the Army without cost due to a change in Air Force needs.

The improved Firebee has an increased speed capability of 100 knots, yet costs \$50,000 less per target, according to Targets Management Office Chief Col. Hal C. Bennet Jr.

Bennet anticipates annual savings in excess of one million dollars over the next several years, and air defense developers will enjoy a more challenging target.

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# Commander Looks For A Promising Year

1978 will be a good year for the Army at Redstone and in Huntsville, maybe better than good, Major General Louis Rachmeler told a Huntsville audience last Tuesday.

"Reason number one is obvious," the MIRCOCOM and Redstone Arsenal Commander told the Huntsville Rotary Club. "Last year was not an easy year for the Army, its soldiers, civilians and their families. It was a year like all those mean places you drive through fast with the windows rolled up. No one wants to go back...ever."

"Most people at Redstone would swap last year for this one sight unseen," he said, citing Army reorganizations and realignments of 1977. "That's why the first order of business now is to get all that behind us and get our folks looking ahead again instead of over their shoulders."

"What we need now is some time to sort things out," he said. "One of the primary reasons I believe we're headed into a good year is that it now appears we're going to have that breathing space."

General Rachmeler explained the reasons for his optimism.

"Unlike the recent past, none of the major local Army organizations has orders to make significant personnel reductions. In the case of the 5,000 civilian workers in my own command, and several thousand soldiers, I can say right now that there will be no need for any kind of a layoff to reach my year-end manning levels. We can get there by attrition."

"Stability, at least in terms of total Army employment, seems to

be something we can look forward to this year."

That figures out to roughly 10,000 government civilians and several thousand soldiers with an annual payroll that now stands at approximately \$261 million dollars, he said.

Rising federal people costs are causing concern at the highest levels of government, he said, and "... higher authority can and probably will adjust average grade limits during the coming year."

"That could compel some of the local Army commands to shift people internally from one job to another. We'll do all we can to avoid that. But it appears—again I'm talking based on what I know today—that none of this will be great enough to cause an adverse impact on the community at large."

He noted that there will be no influx of new workers joining Army commands in Huntsville, that commanders will have to do the job with the people and resources they already have.

"But it should be a good year because Army commands have plenty to do," he explained. "Given the workload we have, without any more people, we're simply going to have to improve efficiency and effectiveness through better management techniques."

"That puts a focus on our people," he said, "and it's the people I see around that causes my optimism."

The general reminded that Army commands have a specific mission here—support and improve the Army's ability to fight. Major Generals Stewart Meyer

(BMDSCOM), Oliver D. Street (Patriot), and Charles Means (MIRADCOM), are primarily concerned with the Army of tomorrow, he told the audience. They are doing the research, developing the weapons that will shape the Army of the future.

"Colonel Ed Rudd (MMCS Commandant) and I are concerned with the Army of today. The school sends well trained soldiers to Army outfits worldwide and my command is responsible for the readiness of missile armed Army units worldwide."

General Rachmeler said it's too soon to tell what President Carter will ask Congress to approve in funds for the Defense Department this fiscal year but there are indications he may seek increases in Huntsville managed programs. There does appear to be major budgetary cuts in the offing.

"In my own command, we have a substantial source of funds other than the dollars the Army provides," he said, citing the sale of Army missiles to other countries, a \$500 million dollar a year business, managed by MIRCOCOM.

Services available to the military community at Redstone and the more than 20,000 retired people and their dependents who depend on Redstone for support will be much improved during 1978.

The general said the new Fox Army Hospital will open this year, featuring several new clinics that will make possible better outpatient service. Some time this year the Army will also break ground for a new commissary.

But one of the major reasons Redstone is a good place for the

soldier and family, is the Huntsville civilian community.

"We've been bound together so long that I note a certain amount of blending or crossing over. Without much fanfare, Colonel Bob McLean, the Army hospital commander, has gotten together with his counterparts in the Medical School at UAH and worked out an agreement that is good for both parties. The university will now train doctors in the new Army hospital, something that will help the Army provide better medical service to the military community. We have the same arrangement with the school of nursing."

"We are working out details of yet another arrangement that will bring civilian dental technicians from Calhoun into our dental clinic for training."

"One reason we get along so well, in my judgement, is because we trust one another, level with with one another," he said.

"I can't imagine a tighter, better Army-community relationship," he added, "and I'm committed to keep it that way."

## Enlistees Are Graduates

Of 155,493 men enlisting in the Army without prior service during FY 77, 56 percent had high school diplomas. This figure does not include enlistees with GED equivalents.

The 15,175 women without prior service enlisting during FY 77 all had high school diplomas or GED equivalents, as required by regulation.

Army strength at the end of FY 77 was 781,763. (AR-NEWS)

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
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# KROOP TALK

## QUESTION: After three months of the new military pay scale, what is your opinion of it?



**SSG. James Okabe, Meddac:** "I think it's okay. With the medical, and other benefits, I think it's more than sufficient to live on."



**Pvt. Terry Fitzpatrick, 8th SC:** "I actually didn't notice that much change in my paycheck. I'm sure it's helping a lot of people who live off post. I live in the barracks, so I don't have too many outside expenses. But it's always nice to get a raise."



**Spec. 6 Bobby Williams, 4th SC:** "Even though we got the pay raise, it still doesn't bring us up the inflation rate. It's not so bad here in the states, but it's worse for the people overseas because of the devaluation of the dollar."



**2nd Lt. Gary Tilbury, Mircom:** "I think about the only problem with the new pay scale is shifting some of the basic pay into the housing allowance. Instead, I think it should have been a straight across raise. Other than that, I have no complaints."

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## New Clinical Director Named

Dr. Robert T. Strong Jr. is the new Clinical Director of the Human Resources Development Office. He comes to Redstone from Fort Hood, Texas, where he served for four years as a clinical psychologist in the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Program.

"The term 'clinical director' is not exactly accurate," said Strong. "In effect I am the director of a professional counseling program. My primary responsibility is to train and direct the activities of our staff, which currently consists of three counselors. I also do some counseling myself, and act as psychological consultant to the staff."

Although Strong has been on the job for only two months, he has already taken action to extend the program's alcohol and drug abuse counseling services by extending office hours until 8:30 on Monday and Thursday evenings.

Strong has a B.S. in social sciences from Centenary College; an M.A. in education from George Peabody College for Teachers; and a doctorate degree in education, with a major in counseling psychology, from the University of Utah.

Strong has 16 years of experience in clinical and counseling psychology. He has been a clinical psychology intern in psychiatric hospitals in Louisiana, Washington, and Indiana; a clinical and

counseling psychologist at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Dallas, Texas; a research psychologist at Columbus State Hospital and Ohio State University Medical School; and a private practitioner and consulting psychologist at the Barrow Neurological Institute, the Arizona State Hospital, and the Yuma County Guidance Clinic.

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
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'Hey, I Care About You'. . . Trabue

The EEO counselor has one of the toughest jobs at Redstone, and doesn't even get paid for doing it.

"In fact, there are some adversities," said Charles Ray, MIRCOM's EEO Chief. "Some managers feel threatened by having a counselor in their organization. Performance appraisals might be affected. They really make a sacrifice, take a chance on their own careers, to provide a service required in the command."

Who are the EEO counselors? What do they do?

"They are just people selected from the work force," said Ray. "Some have volunteered, some were nominated by management or employee organizations. They are part-time counselors; they have other jobs."

"The EEO counselor is perhaps the most important link in the EEO chain in the complaint system. He or she is the complainant's first contact with the system. The counselor listens to a complainant's problem, defines it, gathers information,

and makes recommendations based on the findings."

According to Ray, part-time, volunteer counselors are necessary because manpower is not allotted for professional personnel. Also, said Ray, if counselors were attached to a management-controlled office, their recommendations would be suspect. They might not be viewed as free agents.

Though not professionals, the counselors are well trained, said Ray. They take courses in intermediate and advanced counselling from the Civil Service Commission, and one day a month get in-service training from EEO and Civilian Personnel, to keep them updated on regulatory changes.

What does Ray think of the counselors?

"I think they are fantastic," he said. Not everyone thinks so.

"Being an EEO counselor is the fastest way I know of to lose all your friends," said Maria Bradley, a Program Assistant at the Post Chapel who has been a counselor for the last 18 months.

What's it really like to be an EEO counselor?

"It gets hectic," said Bradley. "The minute we receive a complaint, it takes priority over everything, even our job. We have only 21 days to make a report. I probably handle two to four cases a month, and when on a case I may spend as much as half of my working time on EEO. Also, everytime I have a case I take something home with me, nights and weekends."

Has performing the time-consuming


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

counselor's job adversely affected Bradley's civil service career? "I certainly hope not. Of course any supervisor would rather see you at the job than taking an EEO case, but it really hasn't been a problem for me. I consulted my supervisor, Chaplain (Colonel) Wetzel, before I accepted the responsibility."

Even if the counselor's supervisor is understanding, fellow employees can be hostile. "The people where you work may not understand the role of the counselor. They think you should be there working," said Curtis Trabue. A chemist in the Materials Analysis Group, of MIRADCOM's Test and Evaluation Directorate, Trabue has been a counselor for one year. "In the beginning, my fellow workers didn't fully understand," he said. "But now it's better. We have been discussing it, and attitudes have changed."

Trabue estimates that he handles two cases a month, usually spending from 25-30 hours on them. He admits that counseling responsibilities make his regular job more difficult, in that the phone calls and interviews that come during a case can be distracting.

Those involved in an EEO dispute may also react negatively to the counselor. "The complainant and supervisor don't always understand the counselor's role," said Trabue. "Some supervisors think right away that I am taking the complainant's side, while the complainants think that I'm supposed to be their representative. I tell them that I serve as an impartial mediator to informally resolve the complaint. I am there to help them solve their problem between themselves, if possible."

Even if all parties involved understand the counselor's position, things can still get unpleasant. According to Bradley, a face-to-face confrontation between the disputants is often necessary to resolve the problem. "Generally, in confrontation, the heavy points surface. Things are very tense, usually, and sometimes even hostile."

Also, if the parties cannot reach agreement, said Bradley, whoever is found

to be in the wrong blames the counselor.

There are other difficulties involved in EEO counseling. "At times it feels as though you're going in circles, not getting anywhere," said Trabue. "You can be misled, or promised cooperation that doesn't materialize. Also, offenders often aren't punished. We get case after case involving particular supervisors, yet they're still right there in the same positions doing the same thing. It's frustrating."

Bradley also has felt frustration, especially in promotion cases. "The supervisor will say, 'You can see that I've picked the best person.' But a study of the personnel files will show that over the years the supervisor has groomed that person for the job."

"Also, merit promotion announcements contain certain specifications based on the merit promotion plan put together by the hiring or promoting office. They can tailor the qualifications to fit a specific person."

"Years ago Redstone had a very strong buddy system. The merit promotion plan permits this system still. I think the merit promotion system needs restructuring: now actions can come out legally sound, but morally wrong."

If EEO counseling is such a difficult job, why do people volunteer? One reason is that it's a job that must be done.

"Even with the risk of being looked down upon, someone has to do the job," said Bradley. "If there were no counselors, there would be a lot of formal complaints, a lot of money spent. The cost incurred by the government when a case goes formal is horrendous."

Trabue said that the counselor is an essential link between the minority work force and management. "If there was full compliance with regulations and understanding between employees and supervisors, we wouldn't need EEO counselors. The counselor helps people communicate with each other with understanding."

"When I counsel, rather than stick specifically to the particular problem, I try

to work with them and point out things they can do to avoid getting in that bind again. My goal is to get them to arrive at the point where they can communicate and solve their own problems."


Both Bradley and Trabue agree that their primary motivation is a concern for people. Said Trabue, "Counseling provides the opportunity to reach out and touch someone in a small way and say, 'Hey, I care about you.' That's what it comes down to, people caring about people."

The new facility will be financed by the sale of first-mortgage bonds in both coupon and compound interest form. They will earn 8 1/2 and 9 percent interest, which will be paid semi-annually beginning in six months and each six months thereafter for 15 years. Denominations will be \$5,000, \$1,000, \$500 and \$250.

Members of the church will be given the first opportunity to purchase the bonds before sale to the general public. Interested persons may call the church at telephone number 539-3300,

between January 9-31.

Pastor Gary Brady states that bids for the new building will be received in early March, and that bids will be by invitation only.

Completion date should be mid-November.

The new church will be of stone veneer and wood siding.

The sanctuary will seat 430 and will also be utilized for recreation. There will be thirteen class rooms, a choir room, kitchen, and an administration area consisting of six offices. Jones and Herrin are the architects.

The church is presently located at 3804 Oakwood Avenue. The Oakwood Avenue location is presently for sale, listed with Charles Weaver Agency.

# CFC Drive Called "Big Success"

The Huntsville Area's response to the 1978 Combined Federal Campaign conducted throughout the local Federal establishment was the fourth largest ever.

The official report on the annual fund raising drive showed contributions totaling \$538,727. Ninety-one per cent of the 15,750 assigned Federal workers participated in the six-week crusade with gifts that averaged \$37.49.

In releasing the final report, Area Coordinator Lloyd Lively said that the drive conducted last fall surpassed all others with the exception of those held in 1972, 1973 and 1974 when the Federal population was much higher.

Military and civilian personnel of 21 Federal agencies at Redstone Arsenal and throughout the Huntsville area were included in the drive. They donated \$101,758 in cash gifts and pledged another \$436,969 in payroll deduction allotments.

The cash donations have been forwarded to the designated agencies and the pledges will be forwarded as they are deducted during 1978.

Funds raised during the campaign go to support the work of six International Service agencies, eight National Health agencies and the United Way activities in seventeen Alabama and Tennessee counties and communities.

The largest single donation goes to the United Way of Huntsville and Madison County. The local organization will receive \$371,603.

The health agencies will receive \$91,758 and the service agencies will receive \$15,869.

The UGF of Morgan County was allotted \$20,523 and the agency in Limestone County will receive \$11,869 while the community UGF in Arab will receive \$9,290.

Other county United Givers' Funds in Alabama and the amounts they will receive are: Colbert, \$203; Lauderdale, \$956; Lawrence, \$700; Cullman, \$879; Jackson, \$1,051; and Blount, \$543.

The Guntersville UGF will receive \$5,625, the agency in Albertville will receive \$1,669 and another Marshall County community, Boaz, was allotted \$557. The UGF in Ardmore will receive \$876.

Tennessee counties scheduled to receive funds are: Rutherford, \$93; Bedford, \$105; and Lincoln, \$4,551.

Five of the agencies attained 100 per cent participation and seven others finished over 90 per cent.

Those agencies with perfect participation figures were the Ballistic Missile Defense Systems Command, the Army Engineering Division, the Defense Contract Administration Service, the Civil Service

Commission and the Social Security Administration.

The Marshall Center turned in the largest agency contribution with a total donation of \$188,940 and their average gift ranked of \$52.97 ranked second to the Ballistic Missile Advance Technology Center whose 101 contributors averaged \$72.43.

MIRCOM reached 94 per cent in participation with donations totaling \$143,275 while MIRADCOM turned in \$107,119 with 95 per cent of the assigned personnel contributing an average gift of \$43.16.

The Missile and Munitions Center and School enjoyed an outstanding successful campaign when 99 per cent of the 1,500 assigned personnel responding with contributions totaling \$48,358.



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

Seeing Kid Happy Is Satisfaction . . . Goss

The family that plays together, stays together. A cliché, perhaps, but it accurately describes the family of BMDSCOM's LTC Joseph B. Goss Jr. Goss, his wife Nancy, and children Daphne, Joe 3rd, and John are all active in sports, and especially in Dependent Youth Activity programs.

The colonel and his wife are avid bowlers and golfers. Goss is on the golf rules and handicap committee, and Nancy is head of

the OWC golf group. Each is a secretary for a bowling league. In addition, Goss officiates high school basketball games twice a week, and also plays the game.

Goss' DYA activities take up a

Goss first got involved in DYA when his children began to par-

ticipate. "I felt an obligation as a parent," said Goss. "If the DYA is going to work at all, you need active participation by the mother and father."

Not all parents feel that obligation. "One of my biggest problems as a director is involvement of parents," said Goss.

"I have to coach two basketball teams because nobody else will do it. Many parents view DYA as a free baby-sitting service. They sit back and leave the responsibility to us. With the amount of kids enrolled, there should be many more parents involved."

Why don't more parents get involved? "I wish I knew the answer," said Goss. "I think a lot of parents are afraid to coach. They think they don't know enough about it to contribute. Lots of parents come to the practice, so it's not always the time involved. I don't think you need to know that much about a sport. You could read up on it, and still contribute to the kids."

DYA is not just for kids, said Goss. "It's very beneficial to both kids and parents."

# MARED Applications Due

Local Army commanders are urging eligible employees to apply for DARCOM's 1978 Materiel Acquisition and Readiness Executive Development program now open to individuals in grades 13, 14, and 15 who have significant duties directly related to supply, procurement, quality and reliability assurance, materiel maintenance management and science, and non-construction engineering.

Applications must reach Activity Career Program Managers by Jan. 20.

Instructions for applying were sent to employees in December.

The program offers an opportunity for eligible personnel to receive competitive training that could lead to leadership positions, in materiel development and readiness, grade 16 or higher, in DARCOM or other elements of the Department of Defense.

Both formal training and developmental work assignments which challenge and expand managerial and technical abilities are included for personnel selected to participate in MARED.

Individuals who apply must be willing to relocate geographically and organizationally, and must expect to remain in Federal Service for a minimum of five years. Those not selected for the 1977 MARED program must re-apply for the 1978 program if they wish to be considered.

Intent of MARED is to develop individuals so they will be ready to assume higher level positions as vacancies occur. Promotions come about as the result of competitive procedures under the appropriate career program or other merit procedures.

Instructions sent to eligible employees said, "In addition to basic requirements for applying, personnel must have demonstrated high level intelligence, initiative, imagination, judgement, and superior potential for advancement to managerial positions of great responsibility."

Basically the application and nomination process consists of application by the employee; rating by his or her supervisor; preparation of an Individual Development Plan; endorsement by the Activity Career Program Manager; technical review by the Civilian Personnel Office; review and rating by the joint MIRCOCOM-MIRADCOM MARED Board; and nomination by the Commander.

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


