



Ground Breaking Set

Ground breaking ceremonies for Redstone's new commissary are set for 10 Friday morning when MG Louis Rachmeler, MIRCOCOM Commander, and MG Emmett Bowers, Troop Support Agency Commander, will turn the first shovels of dirt signalling beginning of construction.

The 80,000 square foot structure will provide sales and warehouse space and be connected with the new Post Exchange

through a 5,000 square foot mall.

Estimated cost of the facility will be \$4,542,000. The Corps of Engineers, Mobile District will provide coordination and inspection during construction. Funding is from sur-charge funds accumulated through sales operations.

Completion date for the new commissary is presently scheduled for Sept. 1, 1979, and is the second of buildings to be constructed

in the new Community Center Complex. The Post Exchange was the first new building in the area, near family housing.

The commissary now in use is in a building constructed in 1943 as a plant and service shop of 19,686 square feet. The building has been modified several times and now contains 23,686 square feet.

The contractor is the Collins Com. of Montgomery.

AER Launches Appeal

The Army Emergency Relief fund drive is now under way and it is hoped Redstone Arsenal soldiers will add \$8,000 to the fund before the drive ends on June 2.

That seems like a small amount when compared to the \$34,337.50 in loans and grants the AER made to soldiers here last year. And it seems smaller when compared to the \$5,813,424 in assistance soldiers throughout the Army received last year.

However, even though it may seem small, it is a very important contribution. The AER makes no appeal for funds outside the Army. When they say AER helps the Army take care of its own, they are accurate.

The annual fund drive is one the three major sources of income for AER. Their largest source is the repayment of loans and grants, followed by money earned through investments.

But regardless of the source of income, its use is limited to assisting active and retired soldiers and their dependents.

Emergency financial assistance is provided as quickly as possible when a genuine need arises. The assistance is usually in the form of a loan without interest, but may be provided as a grant when repayment of a loan would cause undue hardship. A combination of loan and grant is sometimes used, permitting the recipient to repay part of the money.

A limited amount of money is also available for educational assistance. This is limited to the unmarried dependents of

Employee Picnic

MIRCOCOM people can now place an X on the calendar to attend an all-employee picnic.

Chaired by Col. Robert W. Gruen, a planning group has set June 17 as the date for the event. It will be held in the Civilian Welfare Recreation Area, the largest of the recreation areas available on post. The picnic is open to all MIRCOCOM soldiers and civilians and their families.

Fun and games is the idea of the picnic. The committee is planning games which will appeal to all ages.

A picnic dinner will be furnished, prices to be announced later. The tickets, to be available soon, will cover only the meal. Additionally, concession stands will be placed in the area to dispense soft drinks and beer.

Food will be served from 11:30 to 2. The games and other activities begin at 10 and continue until 4.

Because of expected attendance, parking will be outside the Picnic Area. The boat launching ramp will not be in use that day, as the Area is reserved the full day for the MIRCOCOM picnic.

Inspections End

The 30 month shotgun marriage of Redstone drivers and mandatory annual vehicle safety inspection came to a sudden end last week.

MG Louis Rachmeler, post commander, directed an immediate end to the inspection on April 13. A recent change in Army policy gave the commander that option in states — such as Alabama — that do not require annual vehicle safety checks.

Ending the inspection, however, does not open the arsenal to clunkers. MPs have the authority and will ticket unsafe vehicles. An obvious candidate for a ticket, for example, is a car with a headlight out.

Redstone reluctantly began tagging almost 60,000 privately owned vehicles in October 1975 to comply with an Army reg that made the check mandatory. The inspection posed little or no problem at most posts since all but a few states have mandatory annual vehicles safety checks.

Here, however, the work force regarded the whole business as an unnecessary hassle from the beginning.

The going rate to have the 23 point safety check completed in a local service station had been about \$2.00. The post service station charged \$1.75.

Although all vehicles required to have Army decals had to be inspected — that included all soldiers, retired, Army civilian workers and contractors — Marshall Center never required the inspection for vehicles they decal.

First reaction to General Rachmeler's decision was an almost unanimous sigh of relief, the few exceptions being those who had paid recently to have a vehicle inspected.

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Sorry, Leave Refused

The 2,108 Army civilian workers who asked for excused absence for from one hour to four days because of winter storms aren't going to get it.

Supervisors were notified by the Civilian Personnel Division within the last few days that Commanders have turned down all requests for excused absence during the January snow and ice storms.

Written statements submitted by the individuals who wanted time off showed that 97 percent decided on their own to stay home or turn back rather than come to work on the stormy days.

Their reasons broke down this way: 53 percent said they based their decisions on radio or TV reports or the calls to local officials; seven percent took a look at weather and road conditions and decided against driving; 15 percent said they didn't try because of bad weather and a few other cited advice from friends and neighbors as the reason they chose not to come to work.

Most of those who wanted excused absence worked in MIRCOM, 1,491; 410 were MIRADCOM people; 82 came from BMDSCOM; 39 worked in the commissary; 32 in MEDDAC; 24 in BMDATC; 16 in MMCS; 12 in USACC and two in ARTADS.

In all, the requests totalled 23,389 hours of excused absence; 11.24 man years. Based on the average grade of Redstone civilian workers, the value of the excused time would have worked out to about \$200,000.

Civilian Personnel regulations on excused absences due to inclement weather and the MIRCOM-AFGE agreement on the subject were used to analyze requests.

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excused absences due to weather was first set in 1973 as a result of the Tennessee River flood. In 1974 excused absence was granted for employees unable to get to work because of a tornado.

Snow and ice covered roads are considered a different situation, officials said, and careful planning, such as purchase of chains or snow tires can significantly ease the risks of traveling under those conditions.

The memo that went back to supervisors with the requests said:

"Please take action to remind all your employees of the longstanding policy that Army activities at Redstone do not automatically close during periods of bad weather. In the unlikely event that the post is going to be closed, local radio stations will carry official announcements. Failing an official announcement to the contrary, the Arsenal will be open and employees will be expected to report to work or request appropriate leave.

"This does not mean that individual employees should risk their lives attempting to get to work. If, in the employee's judgment, road conditions due to climatic conditions make it unsafe to get to work, the employee should contact his or her supervisor and request appropriate leave. This policy includes liberal granting of annual leave and envisions that employees will be prepared for traveling to and from work in adverse weather conditions."

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Flexitour

If you have been looking at the different kinds of Flexitime used, and are confused about it as practiced here, this is the story.

There are various models of Flexitime. The one chosen for use in MIRCOM and MIRADCOM is commonly known as "Flexitour."

When Flexitime was to be started in the Commands, supervisors were provided with all details on how employees who participate are to be scheduled, and the plans outlined under which they can make any changes in the hours they work.

The plan says that participants may make a permanent change in their schedules by giving supervisors a two-week notice, and may also deviate from their schedules on a temporary basis by giving the supervisor one-day notice.

On the other hand, when workload and missions require it, a supervisor may require an individual to temporarily revert to the basic tour of duty, normally 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., less one-half hour for lunch, with a one-day notice or permanently with an okay from the Director, Project Manager, or Office Chief after giving two weeks notice.

Flexitime in the local commands does not mean that an employee can vary working hours from day to day.

Major Terence Parker, Chief of the Electronics Division in the Directorate of Training at the Missile and Munitions Center and School is not a typical U. S. Army Ordnance officer.

He studied for two years at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in England. His degree in Electrical Engineering was also earned in England—at the Royal Military College of Science Shrivenham.

Since his promotion to Major in 1971, he has returned to Shrivenham to attend a guided weapons course, commanded two units of British soldiers and served as the project officer for the procurement of a sophisticated surveillance system for the British Army.

In fact, this is his first assignment in the United States and the first time he has served with American soldiers. And, to him, this is his first unusual assignment.

Parker is not a U. S. Army Ordnance officer, but a British officer and Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineer. He is assigned to MMCS under an officer exchange program designed to strengthen the working relationship and improve understanding between the United States and her allies.

In the short time he has been here, he has found Americans, "Very polite and very friendly." Concerning the 80 degree Alabama spring weather, he noted, "The family is enjoying the warm weather. Especially coming from a rather cold Germany via a rather cold England."

Parker's wife, Mary, and four children—Andrew (14), Helen (13), Fay (11), and Holly (8)—currently reside with him at Redstone Arsenal. The younger girls will attend local schools, while Andrew and Helen will return to boarding schools in England.

Parker reported, "The American and Alabama versions of English were a bit difficult to understand at first, but it's coming more easily now." Regulars at Toftoy Hall, which houses the Electronics Division, have no difficulty understanding his clipped British accent since Parker's predecessor was also British.

After duty hours, Parker is an avid outdoorsman and plans to see as much of America's natural beauty as possible during his scheduled two-year tour.

A volunteer for this assignment, he described it as "A bit of choice and a bit of career development." On behalf of himself and his family, he said, "We're generally pleased to be here."

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Cutoff Down On New Worksheet

(ARNEWS) — Promotion cutoff scores for hikes to E-6 dropped in May, reflecting use of the first results of the new semi-centralized promotion worksheet, according to a DA enlisted promotion official.

Although 1,150 E-5s will sew on E-6 stripes in May (more than double the number promoted in April), individual scores were generally lower than those the previous months, using the former promotion worksheet.

The official said that a clear comparison between scores obtained by both worksheets is difficult because of variances in monthly allocations by MOS, an increase in the overall number of promotions in May

and a decrease in the total number of soldiers competing for E-6.

A sample comparison of one MOS shows that E-5s who required 746 points for promotion in April could be promoted in May with only 716 points, the official said.

The maximum cutoff score of 886 has not declined. During April, 29 E-5s equalled or exceeded 886 points. In May, 32 E-5s earned hikes with an 886 or better score, according to DA figures.

About 1,000 fewer E-5s were on the Army-wide promotion lists in May than in April, dropping from 14,349 to 13,436. In April almost three per cent of all E-5s in primary zone consideration for E-6 had scores

between 796 and 805. In May, the number of E-5s within this point range dropped to slightly more than one percent.

The new worksheet also allowed some E-5s to qualify for promotion with minimum scores of 550, compared to 600 using the former worksheet. Those soldiers already on promotion lists and who lost points using the new system were allowed to remain on lists, even with scores below 550.

The May cutoff scores, scheduled for release later this month, reflect E-6 recomputations from February. E-5 recomputations with the new promotion worksheet were delayed until March and those scores will determine E-5 promotions beginning in June.

Hughes Wins Production Bid for Laser Target Designator

MIRADCOM has awarded approximately \$17.2 million to Hughes Aircraft Company for production and engineering services of the Army's new Laser Target Designator, the shoulder-held 'flashlight' that illuminates targets for laser guided missiles and projectiles.

Hughes will produce the devices at El Segundo, Calif.

The 16-pound LTD, one of two laser designators under development for the Army at MIRADCOM, is the first selected for production.

Colonel Benjamin J. Pellegrini, MIRADCOM Project Manager for Ground Laser Designators, has tri service

responsibility for development and initial production of all ground laser equipment. Robert P. Whitley is his civilian deputy.

Resembling a stocky, short-barreled rifle, the LTD projects an invisible laser beam that can guide any weapon equipped with a

laser seeker—weapons such as Copperhead, Hellfire, Maverick, Navy gunfire, and laser guided bombs. What's more, the LTD can identify friendly forces, hand off targets to aircraft for attack with conventional weapons, pinpoint drop zones and helicopter landing zones for rescue, resupply and reinforcement operations.


In addition to Army ground laser designators, the Redstone project office is developing a unit for the Marines.

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

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
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Formidable Challenges Cited

The Soviet Union has moved aggressively to achieve parity not only in strategic power but has expanded conventional capabilities until today conventional forces in Europe are grossly imbalanced in favor of the Warsaw Pact, General John Guthrie has warned.

"That's why the military recognizes the need to increase standardization of weapons and support systems within NATO, especially in the areas of fuel, repair parts, logistic support and ammunition," said the DARCOM Commander who has worldwide responsibility for providing soldiers with weapons and equipment.

Citing the challenges as formidable, General Guthrie said "... we must eat the elephant a bite at a time. Our first priority should be interoperability in the short term while, to coin a phrase, standardization may take a bit longer."

General Guthrie's remarks were made in a keynote address at a recent symposium of the American Defense Preparedness Association in Los Angeles.

Confronted by the threat, the U.S. and its allies need to "strengthen conventional forces, amplify that strength in terms of NATO fighting as a coalition, and accept the

premise that standardization and interoperability are essential to fighting as a coalition."

"We must learn to cooperate with our allies from the beginning of the research, development and acquisition process," he explained, "with common objectives, willingness to compromise, complementary expertise, economic incentives, mutual respect and trust."


There must be a two-way street, open to traffic, he pointed out, citing Roland as one example of traffic flowing from Europe to the U.S. Conversely, he cited the General Support Rocket System (under development by MIRADCOM) as traffic going the other way.

Traffic in both directions could include a variety of options for technology transfer — co-development, co-production and direct purchase.

There are many other possible cooperative programs involved, among them Viper, Stinger and Patriot.

General Guthrie said that NATO must not only achieve standardization and interoperability in the systems that are acquired but must maintain them over the long run.

"In the face of the growing Soviet threat in Europe, nothing less will do," he said.



Big Payoff

A suggestion to modify Self Propelled Hawk amplifiers so they could be used on the Improved Hawk has made Willis M. Roberts of the MIRCOM Maintenance and Engineering Directorate \$1405 (\$1067 after taxes) richer.

Parts for the modification were readily available and could be made at the depot level making it unnecessary to procure 148 elevation and 150 azimuth amplifiers for Improved Hawk. In addition the Self Propelled Hawk was being declared obsolete by the Army.

Tangible savings for the first year came to \$300,656.




SGM Dwight Uemura, Co. A—



Budget Stresses Threat from East

(ARNEWS) — The Army justified its \$874.3 million construction budget request for FY 1979 before a Senate panel last week.

Paul W. Johnson, of the Office of Assistant Secretary of Army for Installations and Logistics, said that approximately 45 per cent of that amount would pay for mission-oriented construction projects.

"This is particularly true in Europe where we and our NATO allies face a Warsaw Pact capable of launching a major attack with little warning and without reinforcement," Johnson said.

He told the Senate subcommittee on military construction and stockpiles that more than one-third of the budget would be used for projects in Europe.

Some of the money will be used in support of NATO and the building of storage facilities.

A second major thrust of the construction program will support "people oriented" projects, Johnson said.

"One of our pressing needs is the modernization of health care facilities," he added.

Johnson said that about \$254 million will pay for health facility construction, including a hospital improvement project at Landstuhl, Germany.


The construction plans also call for upgrading Army Dental Clinics at eight other locations in Germany.

Johnson said the Army plans to modernize barracks for enlisted soldiers but he did not specify the locations of the construction. He said new family units would be built at several stateside locations.

Slightly more than \$100 million would be used for air and water pollution projects throughout the Army, according to the official.

The Environmental Protection Agency has cited violations of air and water pollution standards at 57 installations.

Johnson said the Army will allocate \$50.1 million of the total construction project to fund energy conservation projects in FY 1979.

Ragano, U.S. Roland Project Manager, said flight test accomplishments are demonstrating that the transfer of European technology to the U.S. has been successful. Last December, the first two U.S. Roland missiles produced in this country were fired successfully from a German fire unit in France.


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
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
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


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
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Litton Data Systems has delivered to the Army the first full-scale production Missile Minder, a computerized command and fire control system for the Army's Improved Hawk and Nike Hercules missiles.

Robert Heitz, Litton's Director for Army Air Defense Programs and Charles Krause, Vice President for Program Management, delivered the equipment last week in a ceremony at Van Nuys, Calif.

Accepting for the Army were Col. Eugene Fox, Project Manager for Missile Minder-Air Defense Command and Control Systems and Cecil Morgan, Chief of the Army Tactical Data Systems Resident Development Office at Van Nuys.

The system was delivered without a single deficiency or shortcoming.

The Missile Minder was developed under direction of Brig. Gen. Donald Lasher, Project Manager for Army Tactical Data Systems at Fort Monmouth, N.J. MIRADCOM awarded approximately \$25.6 million to Litton in March 1977 for full scale production of Missile Minder.

Although initial equipment deliveries are made at Van Nuys, final assembly, checkout, and follow on shipments will be conducted at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Missile Minder, or AN-TSQ-73, not only

controls surface to air missile batteries, but coordinates air defense capabilities and communications with the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force. The equipment is housed in a shelter that can be moved by truck, plane or helicopter and deployed quickly.

Featuring the latest in electronic and computer technology, Missile Minder receives, processes and displays target information from various radars and assigns the appropriate Hawk or Nike Hercules battery to the hostile threat. The system requires fewer operators than its predecessors, has faster reaction time, is more reliable and easier to maintain.

The first production system is now at Redstone where it will be used in maintenance and diagnostic software development and support for fielded systems.

Earlier, Litton had delivered pre-production systems to the Army for test and evaluation.





Personnel Purges Unneeded Papers

MIRCOM Civilian Personnel Officials have started a several month material effort to remove extraneous material from employees' Official Personnel Folders. Such includes duplications of documents, obsolete information, and papers improperly placed in the files.

Charles Provence said, "We are undertaking this task in strict accordance with Civilian Personnel regulations and guidelines.

"We recognize that everything in an Official Personnel Folder is sensitive information and are making every effort to handle it accordingly. Over the years, employees have submitted information to the CPO for inclusion and it has been placed into their file. Consequently, the OPF has become a personnel repository for information rather than the use as prescribed by the Civil Service Commission. Too, because of RIF's, reorganizations, etc., we have included material not authorized by regulation to be in the OPF."

"Even though there is some material which could be included in the OPF, the manner in which the information has been approved for filing does not conform to the required procedure and must be returned to the employee for proper re-submission.

"When material is returned to an individual, an instruction sheet will be included on how to re-submit items that had been improperly submitted originally."

Provence cited as examples of material to be removed: copies of college diplomas and transcripts submitted without proper standard forms; duplicate training forms; reletypes on job availability; letters of appreciation not job related; SF 171's, Personal Qualification Statement, not

incident to reemployment, appointment or promotion from a Civil Service Register, or reinstatement; DF's designating temporary assignments; and obsolete security sheets.
