## FAAR Readied For Overseas

Sporting a new look, the Army's Forward Area Alerting Radar modified for sale to a foreign country, is receiving final touches at a Pennsylvania Army Depot prior to overseas shipment later this summer.

Letterkenny Army Depot, under contract to MIRCOCOM is currently cleaning, painting and packaging a complete FAAR unit for shipment and delivery to Morocco in July.

Colonel Harold Stubbs, Chaparral-FAAR Project Manager is coordinating the modification program for the Army, the first sale of FAAR equipment to a foreign country.

FAAR is a Redstone-developed, highly mobile radar system that detects low flying aircraft and relays information to Army air defense weapons such as Chaparral, Redeye and the 20mm Vulcan gun.

For Morocco, the FAAR equipment has been taken off its normal carrier, the Gamma Goat, modified and mounted on two new vehicles, the M-796 General Purpose Trailer and a standard two and a half ton Army truck.

The modification program is a classic example of Army-industry teamwork, cooperation and coordination involving the Chaparral-FAAR Project Office, MIRCOCOM, MIRADCOM, Letterkenny Army Depot, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and Sanders Associates of Nashua, N.H.

When Morocco requested the FAAR

## MIRADCOM Uses Microcomputers

The same electronic wizardry which gave Americans digital watches, hand-held calculators and automatically controlled microwave ovens also provides them with cheaper, more reliable and more versatile missiles.

We owe all of these products not to magic, but to the microprocessor.

A microprocessor is the arithmetic control unit of a digital computer on a single integrated circuit. Microprocessors combined with memory units make microcomputers, highly sophisticated computers which may be as small as two inches square.

"Thanks to microprocessors modern computers have large programs in a very small area," said Dan Reed, computer hardware technology group leader in MIRADCOM's Missile System Software Center.

"Today's programmable hand-held calculator," continued Reed, "has a computing capability greater than ENIAC, the first digital computer ever built. Completed in 1946, ENIAC had 19,000 vacuum tubes, weighed 30 tons, took up 15,000 square feet of floor space, and required hundreds of tons of air conditioning to cool it. Microprocessors enable us to have that computing capability in a much smaller area."

According to Reed, as computers have decreased dramatically in volume, they have also decreased in cost. The last major advance in computer technology prior to the microprocessor was the medium scale integrated circuit, or MSI, in the early 1970's. Each MSI cost about 15 dollars; it took at least 25 of them to do what one 8-bit microprocessor containing thousands of transistors and costing 10 dollars can do today.

"Microprocessors enable computers to do more for the dollar because as computer

volume decreases, so do the number of interconnections between components," said Reed. "Needing fewer interconnections, the computer is cheaper and more reliable.

"Also, it requires less power. Heat as a result of power dissipation causes reliability problems and raises cost, because devices are needed to control and minimize the heat."

Reduced cost and increased reliability are not the only benefits derived from microprocessors, said Reed.


"Microprocessors enable us to put very sophisticated computers in very small missiles, thus increasing the capability and effectiveness of those missiles," he said. "Previously we couldn't afford to put digital computers aboard small missiles. Now we can incorporate one basic computer design in a whole family of missiles, from smallest to largest."

Reed added that microprocessors are modular: they can be combined with other computer components as modules or building blocks.

"Previously computers were dedicated to only one specific function. We couldn't change that function without changing the hardware. Now we can use the same computer to perform many functions in different missiles simply by changing programs in the computer's memory. In just a few hours we can reprogram a digital computer to completely change the calculations it performs. By reprogramming the computer, we can change a missile's trajectory, or make it operate with different launch vehicles," said Reed.

Microprocessors also enable computers to work much faster, according to Reed. An increase in the speed of computation is inherent in the technological development which has made components smaller, he said.

# Pressure Kills

(Federal News)

"When I first saw him slumped in his chair, I thought, 'Oh no, Smokey has fallen asleep at his desk.' I wish that had been the case. He'd had a mild heart attack."

"You mean it just hit him out of nowhere while he was sitting at his desk?"

"No. Not really. I learned later that he'd had high blood pressure for years, but had not done anything about it."

The former colleague grimaced, then asked, "What happened to him? Did he recover?"

"Somewhat," the other answered. "He came back to work after the attack and started taking daily medication. Quit smoking too."

"What do you call him now?"

"What else? We still call him Smokey."

High blood pressure, however, can be caught before it strikes by contributing to a heart attack or stroke. Yet 40 percent of those with high blood pressure are unaware of it, according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute. And 40 percent of those who are aware they have high blood pressure do not properly control it. Only about 20 percent successfully control it.

Earl detection and treatment were objectives of a recent conference to establish programs to control high blood pressure—it can usually be curbed—in the Federal work force, where an estimated 360,000, about 15 percent, suffer from its effects.

According to the Institute, "The only way to know if you have high blood pressure is to have it checked. Controlling high blood pressure, usually requires following a doctor's advice for daily medication."

Speaking before the Federal conference on high blood pressure, Raymond Jacobson, executive director of the Civil Service Commission, stressed the crucial need for a planned, unified, and effective campaign to control high blood pressure in Federal workers. "This is important, useful work," he said.

He also noted Federal health units provide a first line defense for checking employees' high blood pressure.

Jacobson noted the high cost of ill health to the government, saying that nearly 10 days were lost per year per employee on sick leave. He spoke of the prevalent role of high blood pressure in detracting from the health of the work force and the desire to develop an effective plan to combat this disorder.

Graham Ward, the Institute's high blood pressure program

coordinator, said the conference "brought the research, the technical base which the Institute had to offer together with the operational expertise of agency personnel. The Institute has been working with the private sector for 5 years. We felt it was high time we brought the knowledge we had gained back into the Federal Government."

The Institute noted high blood pressure, or hypertension, can be such a silent killer because in its early stages, it produces no symptoms which require medical attention. Only after years of stress on the cardiovascular system, does this disorder result in major complications, such as stroke, heart attack, heart failure, kidney failure.


As a result, high blood pressure produces premature disability and death in hundreds of thousands each year.

Although prevalence rates rise steadily with age, hypertension, or high blood pressure, also afflicts persons in the prime of their lives and in their most productive years. It is more prevalent and also more severe in blacks, than in whites.

High blood pressure is a widespread epidemic in this country. Progress in the area of control requires changes in health care, the Institute said, such as emphasis on early detection and treatment.



## Nonresident Class Applications Due

Senior noncommissioned officers interested in the Sergeants Major Academy nonresident course must get their applications in early enough to reach the Army Military Personnel Center by June 1.

All soldiers in grade E8 with one to five years time in grade as of the month the board convenes — usually July — and under 23 years of active Federal service are automatically considered for the nonresident course. Qualifications for the nonresident course are: Must be in grade E7 (promotable), E8 or E9 (no waiver granted) and must have not more than 23 years active Federal service as of September 1 of the year after the board convenes (may be waived).

The board meeting this summer will select 130 soldiers for enrollment in the nonresident class beginning July 1979, along with 200 NCOs for each if the two nonresident classes that begin in July 1979 and January 1980.

Those NCOs qualified for and desiring to participate in the nonresident course should submit a formal application, in accordance with AR 351-1, through their immediate commander to: Commander, USAMILPERCEN, ATTN: DAPC-EPZ-HA, 2461 Eisenhower Ave., Alexandria, VA 22331. Copies of current DA Forms 2 and 2-1 must be attached to the formal application.

All senior NCOs applying for the nonresident course or in the zone of consideration for the resident course should ensure that their official military personnel file is up to date.

## Transfer Not A Temporary Move

(ARNEWS) — The Army's program for reclassification of NCOs into combat arms branches is intended to fill permanent positions, officials say, despite some soldiers' misconceptions that reclassifications are temporary.

Officials say that there is no temporary reclassification program. The misconceptions, they say, may stem from a policy which requires reclassified soldiers to remain at their first station, in their new MOS, at least one year.

Reclassified soldiers may not volunteer for another MOS for at least one year after reclassification, according to regulation, but the needs of the Army prevail over preference and earlier moves may be ordered.

The one year stabilization is designed to give a reclassified soldier job experience, guarantee a filled position and allow DA to monitor progress.




**2nd Lt. Robert Reynolds, Co. C—**



(ARNEWS) — The Army has a current shortage of Captains that is worsened by a shortage of Majors. The shortage of Captains must be compensated for by assigning Lieutenants to these positions, according to MILPERCEN officials.

While the current shortage of 2,400 Captains is not yet critical, officials expect the number "by conservative estimates," to be more than 5,000 in 1983.

The shortage could reach levels by 1983, one official explained, that 40 to 50 percent of all Captain jobs in CONUS could be filled by Lieutenants.

Lieutenants will find advantages and disadvantages in assignments as a result. As a plus, it will increase promotion opportunities. On the minus side will be limited early development in alternate specialties.

The number of Captains now required to fill positions designated for Majors adds to the problem. Currently, there are 1,000 fewer Majors than called for by Army strength documents.

The current problem stems from the height of the Vietnam War when the number of newly commissioned officers entering the Army from FY 1966 through 1969 increased significantly. As strengths dipped following the War, the Army tried to minimize the number of Captains forced out of the service. The only way to compensate for this action was through a limitation on the number of newly commissioned Lieutenants.

As Captains from the heavily populated year groups separated or received promotions, fewer Lieutenants have been available to fill their ranks since the FY 1974 through 1976 year groups advanced, officials say. Experience has shown, they add, that only one of two Lieutenants remains in the Army long enough to accept promotion to Captain.

The shortages are more severe in some specialties than others, officials point out. Officers with Signal specialty codes 27, 28 and 72, Chemical specialty 74, and Quartermaster specialty 92 are expected to experience much difficulty in meeting future Captain needs even if Lieutenants are used to fill these positions. Additional specialties are expected to feel the pinch but not as

severely.

Among these specialties is Field Artillery, which currently has a shortage of 475 Captains, Signal specialties 25 and 26, Military Intelligence specialties 35, 36 and 37, Military Police specialty 31, Adjutant General specialty 42, Ordnance specialties 73 and 75, and Transportation specialty 71. DA personnel officials are

studying the shortage and are "looking at future accession in quotas (of Lieutenant)," according to one official who declined to predict what changes might be forthcoming. He declined to term as "unlikely" the possibility that the recent extension for time-in-service requirements for promotion to Captain, from four to four and a half years, would return to four years.



# TRADOC Tests Lawyer Rating System

(ARNEWS) — A DA program designed to improve services of Army defense lawyers to their soldier-clients began a one-year test within the Training and Doctrine Command in mid-May.

A new organization called the United States Army Trial Defense Service has been formed for the test. Sixteen TRADOC installations, with 41 defense lawyers, are participating. They are supervised by regional defense counsel located at Forts Knox, Dix and Benning. The three regions, in turn, report to a chief trial defense counsel in Washington.

"Some soldiers may be under the misconception that they won't get genuine help with legal defense from an Army

lawyer because Army lawyers come under the jurisdiction of the local commander," the Judge Advocate General of the Army, MG Wilton B. Persons, remarked recently.

For the first time, Army defense counsel will be rated and supervised only by other defense counsel, an official explained. This, he added, should go a long way toward eliminating perceived or potential conflicts for both soldiers and lawyers. The new program will also allow the Army to expand professional services and assistance to defense counsel in the field.

Priorities have been established for defense lawyers in the performance of their duties. First priority will be as counsel in courts-martial and Article 32 investigations. Second priority assignments

include administrative board actions where legal counsel is required. Finally, defense lawyers may be assigned to miscellaneous judge advocate jobs as their workloads permit.

The TRADOC test may pave the way for an Army-wide program, but this decision will be made in the future, the official observed. He said that the TRADOC test should provide an understanding of how heavy defense workloads will be under the new system, where procedures need to be improved, and how efficiently and economically the new organization can provide required services.

The Army currently has over 200 lawyers performing defense counsel duties worldwide.



# Controls Ordered to Halt Fraudulent Use of Form 214

(ARNEWS) — DA has sounded a warning and ordered stricter controls on the use of a form that is being used fraudulently to tap veterans benefit programs.

The tighter controls were ordered for safekeeping and destruction of DD Forms 214 (Report of Separation from Active Duty) after government agencies and investigators revealed an increase in "known fraudulent use" of the form, according to officials.

The form contains information about a service member's active duty history, including dates of service, military schooling, civilian education, discharge status, eligibility for disability compensation, decorations and other pertinent data.

Officials are concerned more with possible deception by active duty service members as well as former soldiers. An official explained that the DD Form 214 is sent to the Veteran's Administration when a service member is separated. The VA determines which benefits he or she is entitled to receive and notifies the veterans of their eligibility. An active duty soldier, however, does not have a copy of the form on record with the VA and the potential for fraud is therefore greater if the VA accepts

a form from an individual rather than directly from the Army.

Because the information on the form must be authenticated by the signature of an official, it is sometimes accepted in lieu of separate documents, such as discharge papers and education transcripts, officials note. One official added that some government and private organizations are also known to accept reproductions and other non-original copies of the form when awarding VA benefits, unemployment or disability compensation and other benefits.

Criminal use of the form has been uncovered involving both altering legitimate forms and forging blank forms, an official said. The official disclosed that a Federal investigation is currently being conducted in a case that involves illegal payments of "large sums of unemployment payments" made as a result of a falsified DD Form 214.

He declined to provide details of the investigation other than to say the Labor Department and the Secret Service are two agencies involved in the case.

Unlawful use of the form is not likely to be widespread.

DOD considers its safeguards against abuse adequate. But the Department realizes that indications are that enough cost to the government as a result of fraud, warrants caution.

DA officials ordered stepped up measures for security of the forms and officials said that alerting agencies to possible fraud has confirmed that some fraud is "definitely going on."

Among the examples of fraud are forging or altering the form to gain eligibility for VA benefits, and altering the dates or active duty in order to qualify for the GI Bill, which was discontinued for most new service members in recent years.

Some items on the form, such as verification of civilian education, have no relationship to military service, an official said. He added that a current review of the form may carry a recommendation to discontinue certifying non-military information.

The officials said that recent attention to the matter by government agencies should serve as a warning to anyone contemplating illegal use of the form.

# ZERO-BASE BUDGETING

The traditional way to build a budget has been to use the current year's figures as a foundation and adjust them according to the expected level of operation and the probable cost of materials and services for next year. But a technique introduced into the Army's budget system for Fiscal Year 1979 may be proving that there is a better way.

Zero-base budgeting (ZBB) approaches each unit of the budget from a zero base rather than from the figures of a previous year. In such a system, a proven old program must vie with an untried new one for the dollars it needs to survive.

When President Jimmy Carter introduced ZBB into the Federal budget, he called for implementation at the lowest level where tax dollars are spent. In the Army that level is the installation.

Installation-level budget officers phased into ZBB by zero-basing the "base operations" segment of their FY 79 operations and maintenance budgets. Base operations embraces such housekeeping items as utilities, supplies, administration, communications and printing,

and usually absorbs at least half of an installation's total funds.

The "mission" segment, often the other significant portion of a post's budget, was zero-based at major command (MACOM) level for FY 79.

## How ZBB Works

A specific function to be included in the zero-base budget is called a decision unit. Examples of decision units common to a base operations budget are custodial support, fire protection, road maintenance and repairs, and supply operations.

For each decision unit, the Comptroller of the Army (COA) defines three levels of operation--basic, enhanced, and decremented--which are called decision packages. Budget officers must then estimate the resources needed to operate at those levels.

Regardless of the function, decision packages can be developed. If the decision unit is refuse-handling, the three levels might call for trash collection three, five, or two times a week.

In any decision unit, money and resources needed for performance *above the decremented level* are arranged in order of priority. This arrangement gives budget reviewers the flexibility to judge the relative merit of organizations' needs, and thus to decide the best uses for anticipated dollars.

The process is similar at each succeeding organizational level of the budget--at installation, major command and Department of the Army levels, and finally at Department of Defense level. A MACOM official preparing the budget for flying hours, a mission-essential decision unit, must spell out exactly what the command would need to operate at various levels of utilization of aircraft and aviators--how many aircraft, how many gallons of fuel, and so on.

If flying hours is a high-priority item, it might be funded at the enhanced level. Another less vital decision unit might be funded at the decremented level and thus be required to operate on less money than it had the previous year.

## ZBB--Debits and Credits

The first year of conversion to ZBB methods was a learning experience for everyone involved with it, and it required more time than preparing the budget only in the traditional way. The preparation of the FY 80 budget will be smoother and will require less effort.

Already evident, however, are several advantages of using the ZBB method:

- Commanders at all levels must provide their goals and objectives as a basis for the priority arrangement of decision packages--and then actively participate in that arrangement. Thus their participation in the budget process is more direct than before.

- Because they have to rank their activities, these commanders and their staffs gain a deeper knowledge of their own programs.

- When budgets are approved for less money than commanders wanted, they know exactly how many and what kinds of things they must do without.

## What About FY 80?


The Comptroller of the Army recently sent to MACOM comptrollers and resources management officials a training package to help them orient their staffs in ZBB techniques. Included in that package are instructions on the commander's role in ZBB. The COA also organized a briefing team to teach FY 80 ZBB concepts at various MACOMs, where installations were represented.

Installations will have an even more active role in the FY 80 budget since they will zero-base the "mission" as well as the "base operations" portion of their budgets.

The practice of preparing parts of the budget by both traditional and ZBB methods, as was done for FY 79, will be eliminated. ZBB techniques have been woven into the traditional budget so as to make single budget submissions from Army field elements possible.

With the benefit of a year's experience in ZBB techniques and a more timely, more comprehensive training program, budget officers should be able to prepare a simpler, more flexible and more meaningful budget in less time.

But the real payoff in ZBB is that its careful scrutiny of every program, old and new, forces commanders and budget officers to decide what is really important and what is not so important to the Army. Their decisions--if they are sound--make possible a more effective distribution of the limited financial resources that are available.


# Microcomputers

Reed and others in MIRADCOM's computer hardware technology group have the job of reviewing this new technology and applying it to meet the computational requirements of all types of Army missiles. Their latest project has been to design a microcomputer which is being built by MIRADCOM's Hybrid Microelectronics Facility. The first flight model will be finished sometime this summer and tested in a T-6 missile, an experimental missile six inches in diameter.

"Our microcomputer will take inputs from a terminal homing seeker and do control computations to guide the missile in flight," said Reed. "A small, high-performance missile, the T-6 is hard to control with a digital computer. If we can control it, we can control any of the larger missiles."

Rapidly advancing computer technology is enabling the Army to produce cheaper yet better missiles. The only drawback to the new technology, said Reed, is that it changes so rapidly it's hard to keep up with.

## Is Your Health Plan Effective?

The Civil Service Commission audits each carrier in the Federal Employee Health Benefit program to insure that the carrier is complying with its contract.

In order to do as complete an audit as possible the Bureau of Retirement, Insurance and Occupational Health Office of Audits has begun sending questionnaires to subscribers just prior to their audit of a particular plan or area.

Employees are advised that they may be receiving such a questionnaire with a return self-addressed envelope. All information requested by the questionnaire is voluntary and is not intended to follow up on individual problems. The survey is designed to determine the overall effectiveness of the insurance carrier being audited.

Since questionnaires have no subscriber information or identification, replies will be anonymous and all information provided is to be kept confidential. Cooperation of employees will help in keeping FEHB premiums as low as possible.

## Ain't Chickenfeed

(ARNEWS) — Individuals traveling with Continental Airlines are now able to take advantage of a new discount fare.

Identified as the "chickenfeed" fare, it offers a 40 per cent reduction in regular coach fares during the midweek period, Monday through Thursday. The weekend fare (Friday through Sunday) is reduced by 30 per cent. The chickenfeed fare is one-way between all points served by Continental.

No restrictions are placed on the fare other than aircraft capacity controls, which may be as low as 15 per cent of the rear compartment on some flights.

The plan offers military travelers a greater discount than with the military reservation fare when seats can be obtained on desired flights. Continental is retaining the military reservation fare so service members will still have the option of getting a seat on their desired flights at the 25 per cent military reservation fare discount.

# "Restricted Fiche" Holds Appeal Data

(ARNEWS) — The paperwork accumulated from denied appeals for upgrading performance and academic reports is no longer being filed in the "performance" portion of a soldiers' official military personnel files according to MILPERCEN.

The microfiche copy of the performance portion now contains only one document indicating that a soldier was denied upgrading of a report. The "restricted fiche" will contain the detailed correspondence about an appeal.

Denied appeals can result in an OMPF being crowded with hundreds of pages of paperwork, an official said. The new policy is designed to unclutter the performance portion.

Starting the first of this month denied appeals are automatically placed in the restricted fiche, according to the official. Those appeals completed prior to May 1 may be transferred to the restricted portion only if requested by the individual and approved by DA on a case-by-case basis, he added.

The performance fiche contains copies of awards, reports and other information about a soldier and are used by promotion and selection boards. Restricted fiche are files which contain reversed courts-martial convictions, the complete appeal correspondence and similar information, and are normally available to these boards.

Requests to transfer denied appeals to the restricted portion must be in writing. Officers should write: Commander, MILPERCEN, ATTN: DAPC-PSR-EA, 200 Stovall Street, Alexandria, VA, 22332. Enlisted soldiers and write: Commander, USAEREC, ATTN: PCRE-OP-A, Ft. Benjamin Harrison, IND, 46249.

# Stanley Bennett Retires After 32 Years



## Code Violation Voids Sentence

(ARNEWS) — A court-martial convening authority must personally detail a judge and may not delegate this power, the U. S. Court of Military Appeals ruled in reversing the court-martial sentence of an enlisted soldier.

The soldier, convicted by a special court-martial of two counts of larceny and two counts of housebreaking, was sentenced to a bad-conduct discharge, confinement for five months, forfeiture of \$215 per month for five months and reduction of E-1.

The court set aside the sentence and guilty verdict. In returning the case to the Army, the court said that a new trial may be held.

In the case, the convening authority had delegated the appointments of judge and counsel to the local staff judge advocate. The court ruled that the Uniform Code of Military Justice does not give authority to delegate those appointments, and to do so was contrary to the intent of Congress as contained in the UCMJ.

## Harnage Elected 5th District VP

Bobby Harnage of Georgia unseated Forest Wooten as National Vice President of American Federation of Government Employees' Fifth District in a close runoff. The election was conducted in Orlando, Fla., last weekend.

Harnage, 38, is a former national representative of the union who resigned to run for the vice presidency. He was one of five vying for the post.

Raymond Swaim, President of Local 1858, said Harnage "... will help pull it all together and do an excellent job for the Fifth District."

# VEAP: education account

The Army leads other services in the Veterans Education Assistance Program (VEAP) participation, according to a DOD report and DA officials. And enrollment continues to increase.

VEAP replaced the G.I. Bill in 1977. The program allows soldiers who do not qualify for G.I. Bill education benefits to contribute from \$50 to \$75 each month, or any multiple of \$5 between these amounts, towards an education savings account. Members contributing for a minimum of 12 months will be eligible to use the money toward college education costs. The Veterans Administration (VA) pays members \$2 for every \$1 they contribute to VEAP. The maximum contribution of \$75 per month, over a three-year period, totals \$2,700. So

participants can collect up to \$8,100 for education. Smaller contributions are permitted if participants plan to use less than the full 36 months of full-time education benefits.

Typical VEAP participants, according to the study, are 19-year-old males, high school educated, single and from one of the 10 most populous states. Least likely participants are married, college educated and women soldiers.

Average dollar contributions to the VEAP "savings accounts" was \$57, with 65 percent contributing the minimum \$50 and 26 percent contributing the maximum \$75.

According to VA officials, 33 percent of all eligible veterans use their G.I. Bill education benefits. If current Army VEAP

participants use their benefits, 34 percent will receive college education as a result. Current G.I. Bill allows 45 months of education, or \$13,995 for a single person using all 45 months of schooling. Larger amounts are given to eligible veterans with dependents.

Some advantages of VEAP are that unused contributions may be refunded to participants. Upon separation from the Army, soldiers can ask for a full refund of their contributions; they can receive a refund up to \$2,700. Participants have 10 years after separation to use VEAP.

A DA official advises interested VEAP participants to receive counseling at education centers before filing the necessary finance allotments for contributions to VEAP.

equipment and Gamma Goat was not available for foreign sale, MIRADCOM's 'Skunk Works' was asked to fabricate a prototype mounting the FAAR on the truck and trailer combination.

Skunk Works is the small, select group in the Engineering Laboratory that applies the scientific and engineering expertise at Redstone to Army missile and equipment problems. From large vehicles or weapon modifications, to tiny microcircuits or a single bolt, Skunk Works can turn ideas into new hardware, or improve existing hardware with new ideas—and do it with a minimum of red tape, documentation and record keeping.

Skunk Works designed and built the first prototype which was road tested at Aberdeen in 1977. Skunk Works then made four kits which were sent to Letterkenny for conversion from Gamma Goat to the truck and trailer combination. Sanders Associates ran tests on the units at Letterkenny and now the depot is completing the first package for overseas shipment.

Performing yeoman work in the conversion program for the Chaparral-FAAR Project Office have been Bob Elias, Engineering; Hayden Glenn, Product Assurance and Test Division; Norman Frederick, System Support; and Ray Whiddon, Configuration Management.

The program has been so successful that the conversion may be adapted Army wide for future FAAR systems.

### STANDBY FARES NOW ON DAVIS MILITARY CHARTER FLIGHTS

Standby fares, with prices as low as \$110 one-way between New York and Frankfurt and \$80 between Los Angeles and Honolulu, are now available to military personnel and their families through Davis Agency. Under DAI's standby program, seats are made available on any Davis flight that is not completely booked at the time of departure, with most fares reduced \$24 for flights to Germany and \$19 for flights to Spain and Hawaii.

Davis military charters operate between numerous American gateways and Frankfurt, Germany, Madrid, Spain and Honolulu, Hawaii. Other standby fares on the DAI Frankfurt flights, representing a 10 to 18 percent reduction in regular military charter prices, range from \$135 to/from Washington, D.C., \$145 to/from Chicago, \$185 to/from Denver and Houston, to \$195 to/from San Francisco, Los Angeles, Salt Lake City and Seattle. The one-way standby fare between Honolulu and Chicago is \$160, a 10 percent fare reduction. The fare for one-way flights between Madrid and New York is reduced 15 percent, to \$110.

The Davis standby fares are for use by all eligible military charter participants who need transportation on very short notice. This would include military personnel stationed outside the U.S. and their families — spouses, children, parents, parents-in-law and children of parents and parents-in-law. Members of the immediate family are not required to be living outside the continental U.S., and all participants can originate their travel in either the U.S., Europe, Hawaii or Spain. The possible availability of these seats can usually be determined a few days before the flight by contacting any DAI sales office in the U.S. or Europe.

### April Contracts

### Post Closing

(ARNEWS) — The separation and transfer point at Ft. Amador, Canal Zone, is scheduled to close at the end of April, DA officials announced last week.

Soldiers who are residents of the Canal Zone or who planned to transfer or separate there or in Latin America should consult local personnel offices to make new arrangements for processing.


