Archaeological study

Ancient bones found in arsenal cave

Bones found in a cave on the arsenal have been identified as ancient human remains by University of Alabama archaeologists.

The bones, thigh and pelvic fragments and a knee cap, were found recently by Randall Blackwood and David Cass,

National Speleological Society members conducting a survey of arsenal caves.


"We're very excited over this find," Carey B. Oakley Jr., the University's director of archaeological research, said here Friday. Oakley identified the bones while here preparing for a cultural resources inventory to be conducted on the arsenal over the next six weeks.

Oakley said persons who have some archaeological knowledge of the arsenal, for instance those who may have found arrowheads or other Indian artifacts, could be a tremendous help to the inventory team in its effort to locate archaeologically-significant sites.

"We believe there has been a continuum of occupation of the area since pre-historic times," said Oakley. The archaeologist's interests cover a time frame going back 20,000 years or more, all the way up to what the area was like before the Army arrived.

The cultural resources inventory is being performed by the university under contract to the Facilities Engineer Environmental Office. The survey's purpose is to identify areas of archaeological significance that should receive special protection.

Oakley said the area has "excellent potential" to yield discovers of human habitation dating back many thousands of

Army observes 203rd birthday



In the summer of 1775 George Washington arrived in Cambridge, Mass. to assume command of the newly formed Continental Army. He found, in his own words, "a mixed multitude of People, under very little discipline or order of government . . . Confusion and disorder reigned in every department."

The continental force was formed, said Congress, "for the defense of American Liberty." General Washington provided discipline and order, and the American soldier did the job expected of him. A group of British colonies became a free nation.

Continental Soldiers

Those first American soldiers were, for the most part, volunteers. They came from all walks of life and all social classes, and ranged in age from mere boys to old men.

They fought with everything from fowling pieces to British or European muskets to Kentucky long rifles. The long rifle was a precision weapon, deadly at up to 200 yards. The soldier couldn't mount a bayonet on it, but didn't mind, because having a bayonet was a luxury he seldom enjoyed.

Besides, the Patriot had a better weapon than a bayonet for close quarters, the dreaded "buck and ball" load. Consisting of two buckshot dropped in on top of the normal bullet, it was devastating at close range.

There was little pomp and circumstance in the Continental Army. Not even a standard uniform existed. Soldiers wore everything from fine linen to buckskin, in all cuts and colors.

To keep up morale there was the spirited playing of a fife and drum corps. Patriotic anniversaries abounded, featuring barbecues, fireworks and heated oratory. There were occasional dancing assemblies, and even a theatrical performance in a bakehouse at Valley Forge.

Those first American soldiers were paid six and two-thirds dollars a month, when

they were paid at all. Skyrocketing prices made this less-than-modest salary all but useless. By 1789 an officer's traveling expenses for one day almost equalled a month's wages. A man would have to soldier for 10 years, saving every cent of pay, to buy a good horse. Many soldiers spent all the money they had in the world just to subsist during the war.

Our nation's first fighting men suffered many and severe hardships. Powder, cartridge paper, tents, horses, wagons, artillery: everything an army of the time needed to function was in short supply. Food and clothing was often sadly inadequate. The soldiers had to weather bitter winters in make-shift huts. Smallpox and other diseases ran rampant, with doctors and medicine almost nonexistent. Often the sick had not a bit of straw, much less a bed, to lie upon.

At one point the Army dwindled to less than 4,000 men. But it endured and, finally, prevailed.

The American Crisis

Thomas Paine, in one of 16 pamphlets dating from the American Revolution and now known as **The American Crisis**, wrote just after the origin of the Continental Army that "America did not, nor does not want force; but she wanted a proper application of that force. Wisdom is not the purchase of a day, and it is no wonder that we should err at the first setting off. From an excess of tenderness, we were unwilling to raise an army, and trusted our cause to the temporary defense of a well-meaning militia. A summer's experience has now taught us better . . ."

203 years of experience leave us with the same lesson, the need for an effective, well-prepared Army. Now, as then, our nation must make a proper application of its resources "for the defense of American Liberty." Happy Birthday, U.S. Army.

Birthday parade

A retirement parade in celebration of the Army's 203rd Birthday will be held at 4 p.m. at the parade field.

The parade, with General John R. Guthrie as reviewing officer, will feature a band performance and cannon salute by units of the 101st Airborne Division, of Ft. Campbell, Ky.

The observance will end with a low-level fly by of National Guard jet aircraft. The public is invited to the parade.

Activities will begin with a short official ceremony and include company level competition, free food and beverages and entertainment.

The day will mark the school's 26th year of training military missile and munitions specialists for the United States and 43 allied nations.

Commanders meet here

DARCOM senior commanders are charting a course for the command in the next fiscal year during a three day conference here this week.

General John R. Guthrie, key members of his staff and commanders of DARCOM's R&D and readiness commands began discussions yesterday. MIRCOM is hosting the conference.

The conferees will break early today to attend a 4 p.m. retirement parade honoring the 203rd birthday of the Army. General Guthrie will be the reviewing officer. The conference ends tomorrow afternoon.

Last night the conferees, joined by key officials from MIRADCOM and MIRCOM and members of the Huntsville Army Advisory Committee attended a banquet hosted by General Guthrie in the Officers Club. Representative Ronnie G. Flipppo of Florence was the banquet speaker.

The conference is a periodic meeting of top officials to review programs and plan future actions within the command.

LTG John R. Thurman II, Commander, Combined Arms Center and Ft. Levenworth and MG Robert Haldane of FORSCOM Headquarters are special guests.

DARCOM command group attendees include LTG Eugene J. D'Ambrosio, Deputy Commander for Materiel Readiness; LTG Robert J. Baer, Deputy Commander for Materiel Development and MG Robert L. Bergquist, Deputy Commander for Resource Management and BG Robert L. Moore, chief of Staff.

In all, 27 general officers are scheduled to participate in the working sessions held in MIRCOM Headquarters.

Redstone last hosted a DARCOM commanders' conference two years ago.

DoD issues wage schedule

The Department of Defense has issued a new wage schedule granting pay raises averaging 58 cents an hour for approximately 1,000 federal blue collar employees in the Huntsville area.

The new schedule is effective June 11, and applies to all federal blue collar employees engaged in laboring, trade and craft occupations.

Increases range from approximately 48 cents an hour for non-supervisors to 69 cents for supervisors.

Most of the federal workers affected in the Huntsville area are Army employees at Redstone Arsenal but include Marshall Space Flight Center and National Guard Technicians.

W. Va. reserve group undergoes training


The 38th Ordnance Group from South Charleston, West Virginia, is undergoing two weeks of reserve training at the Missile and Munitions Center and School, ending June 17.

food service; physical security; and the motor pool.

Spec. 4 Gary Underwood, Co. A—"Cover more off-post happenings that involve soldiers. There is not enough coverage of enlisted people either."



Hughes gets \$22.3 million Roland contract

The Army Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM) has awarded a \$22.3 million contract to Hughes Aircraft Company to Culver City, California, for engineering planning and support leading to production and fielding of the Army's new U. S. Roland air defense weapon system.

Total potential value of the 16-month engineering services contract, including options and award fees, is \$104.9 million.

Roland, a short range, all-weather air defense missile system developed by France and West Germany, has been selected for production and deployment with the U.S. Army to protect troops, air bases, fortifications, supply depots and other battlefield targets against low level air attack.

Hughes, the prime contractor, and Boeing Aerospace Company of Seattle, Wash., the major subcontractor, are building U.S. Roland in this country under license to Euromissile.

Under the engineering services contract, Hughes and Boeing will adapt European drawings and designs for the most efficient and economical automated American production; keep abreast of European technology and maintain international interchangeability; develop and publish manuals, maintenance concepts and procedures; insure that quality and reliability standards meet U.S. requirements; and upgrade documentation to support competitive procurement and production of the Roland weapon system.

U.S. built missiles and approximately 90

percent of the field replaceable units are interchangeable with their European counterparts.

Army acquisition of Roland is a

significant step toward greater standardization of weapons improving the combat readiness and cost effectiveness of NATO forces.

Hospital gets two-year accreditation

Redstone's Army Hospital has received a two-year accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, Col. Robert B. McLean, Hospital Commander, announced last week.

This accreditation which extends from March 21, 1978 to March 20, 1980, is the result of an on-site survey by field representatives of the Joint Commission's Hospital Accreditation Program. It indicates that the Redstone Hospital operates according to standards set by the Commission.

"The standards, published as the 'Accreditation Manual for Hospitals,' set forth optimal achievable goals of excellence against which a facility can measure itself

and be measured by the Joint Commission survey," McLean said.

"I am very pleased. Criteria for accreditation have become increasingly stringent. Many hospitals formerly accredited have not been able to meet the standards this year.

"Furthermore, this accreditation is transferable to the new Fox Army Hospital set to open next month. We presented plans for the new hospital to the Commission representatives at the same time the present facility was being surveyed.

"Accreditation will enable us to continue our training of medical students of the University of Alabama in Huntsville, and it is reassuring to our clientele that this hospital meets such high standards for health care."

The Redstone Hospital is one of approximately 4800 general hospitals throughout the U.S. that have earned accreditation. There are approximately 7150 hospitals in the U.S.

The Joint Commission's accreditation surveys are voluntary. Health care facilities seek accreditation because it represents a benchmark of quality higher than governmental licensure alone.

The chief aim of the Hospital Accreditation Program is to help hospitals in their pursuit of excellence and thereby provide the highest quality of care to patients. The program also seeks to recognize, and to identify for the public, those facilities which meet its standards.



White House fellowships open to soldiers

The Army is accepting applications from active duty soldiers wishing to compete for positions in the 1979-1980 White House Fellows Program.

Each year the President's Commission on White House Fellows selects 15 to 20 outstanding young soldiers and civilians from all walks of life to participate in the program. Fellows serve one year as special assistants on the White House staff or with cabinet officers.

Civil Service workers are not eligible to compete in the program.

Soldiers wishing to apply for the program must submit a "Request to Compete" to DA in accordance with AR 621-7. Requests must arrive at DA no later than September 1, 1978 to be eligible for the 1979-1980 program.

Enlisted men should address their requests to their company commanders. Officers should submit theirs through their raters.

To be considered eligible by DA soldiers must demonstrate exceptional ability, high morale character, motivation and leadership. Commissioned officers should

have a minimum qualification in their primary speciality in the grade of captain.

White House Fellows Program applications will be forwarded to the soldier when DA approves his request to compete. Completed applications should be mailed directly to the President's Commission on White House Fellows.

U.S. citizenship is required.




Da Nang reunion



Along with studying and touring, the couple spent lots of time corresponding with


their house-sitters back in Huntsville.






Weather cooperates on arsenal noise tests

The weather was good last week — if you happened to be a duck, or were conducting an environmental noise study.

The heavy overcast and downpour were welcomed by a team from the Army's Environmental Hygiene Agency, because clouds and rain can be factors in how far and in what direction sound travels.

The object of the study, said Dr. George Luz of the AEHA team, is to see if a practical method can be developed for predicting when weather conditions might focus blast noise on residential areas on the arsenal's perimeter.

He said the favored method at this point is to draw on an upper air sampling capability and computer-based prediction system used by Marshall space scientists to predict noise effects of test of giant Saturn boosters.

"We're trying to find out if their system can be made to work for small charges, if it can be adapted to small blasts like the Army has," said Luz.

Dr. Nelson Lewis, an acoustical engineer, said the Marshall system was used in developing a model to predict the noise effect of last week's test explosions. "We should know in a couple of weeks if the data we're collecting matches what the model says should have happened," Lewis said.

The noise study ran four days, June 6-9. Explosives detonated included small anti-tank missiles with warheads, training devices for instructing military students in handling hazardous materials, and packaged charges used in demolition of munitions.

Weather balloons were released each

morning and afternoon by Marshall Center's atmospheric research facility. The balloons carried instruments which relayed to a ground receiving station information on temperature, humidity and wind speed and direction, all of which affect the way sound travels.


"A temperature or wind inversion can make a remarkable difference," Lewis noted. It can cause a sound which normally would be inaudible to reach a level of 40 decibels, which is loud enough to be annoying, Lewis said.

The Tennessee River on the arsenal's southern boundary can affect sound travel when temperature inversions form above the cold water.

Blast noise resulting from military training and testing activities was measured at various selected points, including adjacent residential areas where residents sometimes are annoyed by blast noise and concussion.

Peak sound pressure levels recorded during the study were of sufficient intensity to be annoying in some cases but were not high enough to present a health hazard or cause damage to structures, said Luz, who is a PhD psychologist trained in the effects of noise on people and animals.

Luz said it is not unusual for military installations to experience noise problems. Systems similar to the one envisioned for Redstone that predict when the type of detonation and weather conditions might combine to focus unpleasant noise effects are being used successfully by some installations, Luz said.



New rocket motor named 'Skychief'

A new and improved motor being developed for the Army's only aerial rocket, the 2.75, has been named Skychief.

The Army Missile Research and Development Command's (MIRADCOM) 2.75 Project Office here has initiated a development program to modify and adapt the Navy-developed MK66 motor for Army use to extend the range of the famed 2.75

rocket for launch from both helicopters and high speed aircraft.

Skychief is expected to replace both the MK4 (for fixed wing) and MK40 (for rotary wing) motors currently being used by the tri-services.

The 2.75 Project Office, working closely with the Naval Ordnance Station and MIRADCOM laboratories, is managing the development program, testing the rocket at Redstone, and procuring some of the rocket components. The Navy is producing and assembling propellant grains and providing technical support.

Col. James Tow, the Army's 2.75 Project Manager said the new motor will greatly improve 2.75 range and accuracy and thereby improve attack helicopter effectiveness and survivability.

"The higher velocity motor reduces the amount of pitchup required to achieve longer range and eliminates the need for helicopters to attack the target in a diving approach at close range," said the colonel.

The Army is the largest user of the 2.75 rocket system, which is also an air-to-ground weapon for the Navy, Air Force,

Marines, and 34 countries around the world. The 2.75 Project Office has research, development and life cycle management responsibility for the Army's 2.75 program, and also manages procurement and delivery of components for the other services.

The MK66 rocket fin and nozzle assembly is being redesigned to improve helicopter hover firing, accuracy and interoperability with Army launchers.

In addition to the new motor, MIRADCOM is planning a new generation of warheads, fuzes and launchers to adapt the 2.75 to the Army's Cobra and Advanced Attack Helicopter. Improvements include both 7 and 19 tube lightweight launchers, a variety of warheads (illumination, smoke, explosive submunitions) and a stores management subsystem which gives the pilot selectivity to fire several rocket configurations, depending on the target.

Originally called Mighty Mouse during the Korean War as an air-to-air rocket, the 2.75 is maturing into the Terrible Tiger of the 1980s in its adapted role as aerial artillery.





New evaluation for DA civilians

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Civil Service Commission has approved a new civilian performance evaluation system for Department of the Army. To begin in October, the system is designed to improve the current method which was criticized for lacking specifics and employee involvement.

Officials say the new system is expected to be more responsive to management needs, providing a better basis for employment decisions — promotions, training nominations, and awards.

The new system will feature rating on elements related to each employee's particular job assignment. Both employees and their supervisors will identify practical performance objectives. Contained in the new system will be a provision for evaluating how well supervisors rate their employees.

DA will sponsor a training institute on June 13-14 to prepare major command representatives to teach installation personnel how to use the new system.

Ben E. Beeson, Army Civilian Personnel Director, said that "Line Manager acceptance of the system is the key to its success." According to Beeson, while the system will be more demanding to administer, the pay off in better communication and personnel decisions will more than justify the extra effort. Before the system goes into effect, all civilian employees will be oriented and military and civilian supervisors trained in its use.

Redstone Civilian Personnel officials say that no implementing instructions have been received locally as yet, and that details on the system will be announced as they become available here.

VA counseling

The Veterans Administration has announced financial counseling services available without charge to veterans who fall behind in payments on their VA-guaranteed home mortgages.

William D. Davis, Director of the VA Regional Office in Montgomery, urged all veteran home owners to take advantage of the free financial counseling. "This new emphasis on person to person help could make a difference between successful home ownership and a veteran losing his home," he said.

The agency seeks to help veterans plan family budgets so they can keep current with their home mortgage payments.

Counseling services are available in the Montgomery Regional Office. This service may also be available in the veteran's home at the convenience of the VA traveler. Appointments may be arranged by calling 832-7083 in Montgomery.

Form fraud

ALEXANDRIA, VA. — DA has sounded a warning and ordered stricter controls of the use of a form that is being used fraudulently to tap veterans benefit programs.

Officials have ordered tighter control for safekeeping and destruction of DD Forms 214 (Report of Separation from Active Duty) after government agencies and investigators revealed an increase in "known fraudulent use" of the form, officials said.

The form, according to the officials, contains information about a service member's active duty history, including dates of service, military schooling, civilian education, discharge status, eligibility for disability compensation, decorations and more.

Officials are concerned more with possible deception by active duty service members as well as former soldiers. An official explained that the DD Form 214 is set to the Veterans Administration (VA) when a service member is separated. The VA then determines which benefits he or she is entitled to receive and notifies veterans of their eligibility. An active duty soldier, however, does not have a copy of the form on record with the VA and the potential for fraud is therefore greater if the VA accepts a form from an individual rather than directly from the Army.

Because the information on the form must be authenticated by the signature of an official, it is sometimes accepted in lieu of separate documents, such as discharge papers and education transcripts, officials note. One official added that some government and private organizations are also known to accept reproductions and other non-original copies of the form when awarding VA benefits, unemployment or disability compensation and other benefits.



Soldiers need reenlistment info

(ARNEWS) — Army officials say that too many soldiers aren't aware of the Conus-to-Conus and Bonus Extension and Retraining Reenlistment programs.

The Conus-to-Conus program allows first term soldiers to reup for a one-year stabilized tour within Conus. The option is available to soldiers in certain MOS who are currently assigned in Conus and whose last digit in their social security number is 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9.

The option is subject to vacancies at the Conus post selected and is open to soldiers in the following MOS: 02B, C, E, F, M, J, K

and T; 11B, C, D, and E; 12B; 13B; 16P; 17M; 26L; 31M; 35E and K; 43E; 44B; 51M and R; 54D; 55B, 62 B and E; 63J; 64C 67U; 71 C, D, G, L, P and Q; 75 C, D, and E; 76 W and Y; 82 B C and D; 83 E and F; 84C; 91 B E G, R, S, and T; 94 B and F; and 96 B and D.

The BEAR program allows soldiers in overstrength MOS to reenlist for an understrength MOS and draw the full bonus for the new skill. Soldiers are allowed to extend their current enlistment by 12 months in order to receive training into the new MOS. Once they're trained, they

qualify for the bonus at reenlistment.

About 12 MOS are now open in the BEAR program and are subject to change as reenlistment in certain MOSs improve or drop.

Information on which MOS qualify for the BEAR program may be obtained from the unit reenlistment NCO. Vacancies for MOSs under the Conus-to-Conus option may also be determined through local reenlistment channels.

DA officials expect both the BEAR and Conus-to-Conus programs to continue through the end of the year.

SHARE CERTIFICATE ACCOUNTS

The following disclosures are made to all share certificate purchasers pursuant to regulations promulgated by the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration (12 C.F.R. 701.35, Shares Accounts and Share Certificate Accounts).

1. Share certificates will be issued in a minimum amount of \$1000.00 and in increments of \$100.00 above the minimum amount, and when issued may not be reduced below the original amount. No dividends shall be paid on share certificates which have been issued for less than 90 days.

2. Dividends on share certificate accounts shall be credited to the member's regular shares account quarterly and will be paid on the basis of the actual amount of the certificate. No dividends will be added to the share certificate account and, therefore, will not compound unless left in the regular shares account.

3. Federal regulations prohibit payment of dividends in excess of available earnings.

4. Except as otherwise stated herein, in the event of a withdrawal of principal from a share certificate account before maturity the dividend rate on the amount so withdrawn shall be paid to the date of such withdrawal at the then current rate on regular shares accounts for the period since issuance or renewal of the account (whichever is later), less ninety days.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing, funds in the share certificate account may be withdrawn without penalty:

- (a) Upon maturity;
- (b) If the withdrawal is made subsequent to the death of any owner of the share certificate account;
- (c) If the withdrawal is made pursuant to Article III, Section 5(e) of the By-Laws of Redstone Federal Credit Union (pertaining to termination of membership under certain conditions);
- (d) The share certificate account is part of a pension plan which qualifies or qualified for specific tax treatment under Section 401 (d) or 408 of the Internal Revenue Code and withdrawal is made to effect distribution of the funds evidenced by such account following the participant's death or disability or upon attaining not less than 59½ years of age; or
- (e) Such withdrawal is made as a result of the voluntary or involuntary liquidation of the Redstone Federal Credit Union.

6. In the event that a share certificate account is not renewed at maturity the account will be converted to a regular shares account and receive dividends at the rate then paid on regular shares accounts.

7. Membership in Redstone Federal Credit Union will terminate upon maturity of a share certificate account, unless renewed, if the holder does not have, establish or otherwise make provision for a shares account or share certificate account in addition to the share certificate account which is maturing.

Nobody does it better than Thurman

commentary by Sp. 4 D. R. Fuller

I've never liked Thurman Munson very much. He's rude, childish, mean, stubborn, moody, and worst of all, he's made some very nasty comments about my favorite player, Carlton Fisk.

Like him or not, I have to admit the proven fact — Munson is the best catcher in professional baseball and probably its finest all-around player.

What makes Munson so good is hard to say. He's never won a batting, RBI, or home run title, or even a golden glove. He's not a fast runner, and he certainly doesn't have a great throwing arm. But sometimes it's an intangible quality that makes a ballplayer great.

Besides the fact that he has one of the steadiest and most productive bats around, and that he is more than adequate defensively, Thurman does the little things necessary to make his club a winner. Things like calling for the right pitch at the right time; hitting a home run when it's needed most; getting on base to keep a rally going; or even occasionally stealing a base to upset the opposing pitcher's concentration. Munson is able to perform best when he is needed most — a trait found in very few athletes.

With his almost superhuman ability to consistently perform in the clutch, Munson is the most dangerous hitter in the

American League . . . but there is one drawback. He is prone to mental depression, and that of course affects how well he performs. He will never do his job lackadaisically, even when in the foulest of moods, but there are times when he doesn't do his best. The sourpuss attitude is something he displays more often than not. "Munson's not moody," observed teammate Sparky Lyle, who knows Thurman as well as anyone on the Yankees. "When you're moody, you're nice some of the time."

Munson is bitter, and maybe he has reason to be. Never recognized outside of New York as the outstanding catcher in the league until recently, Munson's had to take a back seat to less productive backstops. Namely, Boston's Carlton Fisk. Only twice has Fisk had a better season than Thurman, but he has been the starting catcher for the American League in the All-Star game four out of the last seven years. Fisk, tall and handsome with dark wavy hair and a charming personality, became a favorite of press and public, and got the headlines.

Munson, short and stout (nicknamed Squatty Body) with a round face, a receding hairline, and forever carrying a chip on his shoulder, got much less ink and fanfare.

In the '76 World Series when Munson batted .529, highest ever for a player on the

losing team, Cincinnati manager Sparky Anderson made a statement to the effect that it would be foolish to compare Munson to the much more celebrated Johnny Bench.

The comment embarrassed and infuriated the Yankee catcher. "Losing four straight is bad enough," said Munson. "Having it rubbed in your face really hurts. I'm a good player. I'd probably lead the league if I played on artificial turf (which most National League teams play on)." Anderson withdrew the comment and apologized to Munson.

Popular or not, Munson is the indispensable member of the Yankees. Without his leadership, it is a surebet that the Yankees won't win their division title.

His bat is essential to the Pinstripes, although they have a strong line-up even without him. Munson is the first player in more than 20 years to bat over .300 and drive in at least 100 runs for three straight years. If consistency measures greatness, Munson is a shoe-in for the hall of fame. Behind the plate he is a craftsman, one of the best defensive catchers around.

No matter how gruff and grouchy Munson is, he is an asset to his ballclub and a credit to his profession. I suspect that under that rough, tough exterior there is a big teddy bear wanting to be liked. And he probably doesn't even hate Fisk.

Counseling for some parents

Mandatory counseling began for first term officers and enlisted soldiers married to other service members, or who are sole parents with minor dependents (less than 18 years old), May 1.

According to DA and MILPERCEN officials, the policy was necessary because of frequent misunderstandings about Army responsibilities and family needs. Through counseling, officials hope, both duty conflicts and potential personal problems can be avoided.

About 15,000 male and 4,000 female soldiers are identified as sole parents; most have minor children, according to recent Army figures. Statistics also indicate that 3.6 per cent of Army officers and 8.5 per cent of Army enlisted personnel are married to service members. These figures, however, do not reflect whether these service couples have children, or if spouses are on active duty.

Counseling will be given on a one-time basis and only to soldiers with less than three years' service, according to officials. Counseling information will be part of a soldier's personnel record and will be verified upon arrival at a new unit. Counseling needs

will be updated if dependent or marital status changes, added officials.

MILPERCEN's counseling guidance requires commanders to advise and counsel soldiers on those matters contributing most frequently to conflicts between families and their Army duties. Specific items include CQ, field duty, TDY, alerts, deployment, overseas assignments, non-command sponsored tours, dependent medical care, and family needs during duty hours. Also included is information on joint domicile, concurrent travel, assignment to government quarters, benefits and allowances, availability of ACS and other services, transportation allowances, and soldier and spouse/dependent responsibilities.

Soldiers must state in writing in the standard counseling statement what steps have been taken to designate a guardian to care for dependents should the parent be deployed. Power of attorney and medical

release documents must be prepared before soldiers sign the statement.

Current regulations restrict sole parents from entering the Army but not from reenlisting. AR 601-210 does not allow any unmarried person with a dependent less than 18 years old to enlist. No waivers to these restrictions are allowed, according to officials.

"Physical and financial responsibilities of a sole parent with dependents are among the Army's most serious personnel problems," said an official. "A civilian just doesn't realize the unique requirements placed on soldiers. They have to meet their full military responsibilities first."

Although regulations do not restrict the reenlistment of a sole parent, these soldiers may be separated or denied reenlistment if they cannot perform their jobs, just as a non-parent or married soldier could be separated, according to officials.



Airfield

Redstone's aviators stress service and safety

The Jetplex isn't the only airport in town where you can catch a plane to Washington, California or Timbuktu.

The Army-run Redstone Airfield on Hale Road sends cargo planes and experimental aircraft all over the U.S. All types of planes have landed on its airstrip, from props to presidential jets to hitchhiking space shuttles that one day will travel much further than Timbuktu.

The variety of aircraft using the airfield is due in part to its designation as a Research and Development facility.

Flights around the world

Much airfield activity involves testing and transporting experimental equipment developed by MIRADCOM. Experimental aircraft and weapons systems have been flown to places like White Sands Missile Range, Yuma Proving Ground and Ft. Hood for testing. Explosives and sensitive materials developed at Redstone are flown all over the U.S. for storage or use in the field.

Thirteen of the 14 helicopters assigned to the airfield are used in MIRADCOM tests, and the other provides administrative support to MIRADCOM.


The airfield's four planes provide transportation and administrative support for local Army commands.

"The Redstone Airfield is also unusual in that we are the only Army airfield with a NASA tenant," SSG Brewer Leggett of Flight Operations said. "The Marshall Space Flight Center has a support agreement with RASA and shares the field with us."

An attractive assignment

According to Leggett, the scope of the airfield's mission makes Redstone a very attractive assignment for Army aviators.

"Let me put it this way," said Leggett. "If you were involved in the development of a new system of any kind, or if you were selected to be involved in the testing and engineering end, wouldn't you be excited?"

"Redstone is a very rewarding assignment for an aviator. The work is challenging and highly technical, and all our aviators enjoy it."

Despite its big mission Redstone is a relatively small military airfield, averaging less than 30 take-offs and landings a day. But because of the importance of its mission, the airfield's operational facilities are no less complete than those of the Jetplex.

Information on national weather conditions is immediately available through military and national weather services.

Radar systems in the Air Traffic Control Branch monitor local weather conditions and make it possible to compute the correct approach and take-off pattern for each aircraft using the field.

Maintenance provided

Airfield crews perform the periodic and calendar inspections of planes and helicopters assigned to Redstone.

"We are authorized to perform limited general support and direct support maintenance on all the aircraft here at Redstone," SFC Donald Bates of Flight Operations said. "But the type of servicing we can do depends on the aircraft."

"For example, on fixed wing aircraft we can change the engine. But on helicopters we can't. We don't have the special equipment needed to test helicopter engines."

A preponderance of fatigues and Army-green decor set the airfield apart from the Jetplex and other civilian airfields. But operations at Redstone are in many ways closer to civilian practices than to those of other military fields.


"We have our own budget," said Major Norwood Sothoron, the new chief of Flight Operations. "We have to charge customers for our services and account for expenses. Very few other Army Airfields are run in this fashion."

The size and unusual funding arrangements have sometimes worked against the airfield. The Fire Station was phased out several years ago to cut costs,

and because of the small number of aircraft using the field and its exceptional safety record.

Crash rescue team

Flight Operations, understanding the economy, but not wanting to be left without some fire protection at the field, organized a crash rescue team from among airfield maintenance crews.

This team has been trained in rescue techniques, outfitted and equipped with a light water truck. A member of the post

Fire Company is on duty at the airfield 10 hours a day to direct operations and provide on-going training for the crash rescue crew.

According to Sothoron, the crew's presence on the airfield will shave at least three minutes from the time needed to respond to an accident call.

"That may not sound like a lot, but aircraft fuels ignite so quickly. Three minutes and the equipment on hand can mean the difference between saving lives and some of the plane, or losing both," Sothoron said.

Voided contracts

ARNEWS — Some enlistees whose contracts are voided will get another change to opt for the enlistment bonus, according to a policy change announced by DA last week. The change affects those soldiers whose contracts are voided because of errors not the fault of the soldiers. To get the bonus, recruits must sign a new, valid contract and meet all eligibility requirements for the enlistment bonus.

In the past some enlistees had their enlistment contracts voided because of errors which were not their fault. They were barred from signing another enlistment contract for the enlistment bonus because they were not considered "initial enlistees."

Regulations which govern the EG program (DOD Directive 1304.22 and AR 600-200) specify that the enlistment bonus may only be awarded to "initial enlistees." The new policy considers recruits as first term enlistees when they renegotiate their contracts, therefore making them eligible for the EB option.

years to a time when mastodons roamed the area.

Bone fragments found in the cave probably date from around A.D. 300, Oakley said, but they can be dated more precisely after a thorough examination has been made by the university.

The bones appeared to belong to two persons, an adolescent and an adult. One was a woman.

The bones were found in the mud floor of a new cave discovered during the speleological survey. Access was gained to the cave through a pit opening dropping 50 feet straight down. The cave is a side room of what is believed to have been an extensive cave system, now broken down.

The pit opening entered by Blackwood and Cass appeared to have formed only recently. Previously the cave had been

inaccessible for an unknown length of time.

More pieces of bone are present on the cave floor, said Blackwood. They were left in place for the cavers wanted to leave the site unmolested until an evaluation was made by professional archaeologists.

The bones are beside a small pool fed by a waterfall inside the cave. The underground chamber's 50-foot high walls are decorated with stalactite and flowstone formations.


There is a possibility that the cave contains an ancient burial site.

Indians of the area are known to have practiced both cave and mound burials. Burial caves are known in the vicinity south of the river, Blackwood said.

One of the bone fragments found appears to have been burned. Corpses sometimes were burned as part of the burial rite, Oakley said.
