

## CSC postpones downgrades here

Downgrades that would normally take effect immediately for about 25 workers in Army commands at Redstone have been deferred until the end of December 1979, subject to certain conditions, Civilian Personnel officials announced recently.

The deferrals result from Civil Service Commission approval of a DOD request to defer downgrading of positions identified as overgraded due to gradual erosion of duties, correction of a classification error or the application of new standards.

Written notices are being sent to affected workers advising them of the deferral.

Qualifications of workers occupying positions identified as overgraded will be reviewed by the Civilian Personnel Office. Workers will be registered in the local priority placement system and considered for all positions at their current grades for which they are qualified.

Prior to any reduction in grade, CPO will try to place workers in continuing positions at their current grade level in all activities serviced by the MIRCOM Civilian Personnel Division.

Deferral of downgrades is subject to change if circumstances should require processing of the downgrading action to assure compliance with related regulatory requirements.

Specifically, if it becomes necessary to conduct a reduction in force during the temporary deferral period, CPO must determine whether any affected competitive level contains overgraded positions and whether any other overgraded positions would be in that level if properly graded. If so, positions must be properly allocated and the worker downgraded through adverse action procedures or placed in other available positions prior to the RIF.

If gradual erosion of duties is the cause of the downgrading, corrective action can be taken concurrent with the RIF.

Personnel officials said downgrades resulting from managerial changes — such as reorganization; reduced manpower, missions and workload; reduction of high grades; average grade reductions; and skill imbalance — or other managerial causes are not deferrable.

## Scientist devises war gaming model

It's a quiet war. Tanks rumble over the landscape, helicopters fill the sky, missile warheads explode everywhere. Yet the only sound heard is the soft hum of the computer.

"Computer 'war gaming' simulates a realistic battlefield situation mathematically, enabling us to determine the performance and cost effectiveness of weapons systems," said Jill Burt, a mathematician in MIRADCOM's Advanced Systems Concepts Office.

Burt recently received an Army Meritorious Achievement Award, presented by DARCOM Commander General John R. Guthrie, for creating a mathematical model for land combat computer war gaming.

"I simply used mathematics to describe how missiles work. That's what a simulation is," said Burt.

She explained that by analyzing such factors as a missile's position, range, launch angle, thrust, drag, velocity, shape and aerodynamics, performance data about the missile can be developed. This data includes such things as flight profiles and hit and kill probabilities.

"I used this data to determine the probability of events in a war gaming situation with many defenders and aggressors, each firing at the other," said Burt.

She established performance data for tanks, armored personnel carriers, helicopters and four different anti-tank systems. Burt then developed an "event logic tree" for each by stringing together block after block of computer code.

"Each block is a logical element, some based on statistical probabilities," said Burt. "Each represents one step of a weapons system's operation on the battlefield."

"I had to establish a whole series of probabilities to create my mathematical model," she continued. "First I had to determine, in the case of each weapon, the probability that the weapon will acquire the target. To establish this one must consider the weapon's position, movement, range, angle and so on, and similar information about the target."

# Army tests Dragon jump pack

Army combat infantrymen will soon be able to jump into battle strapped to their own instant knockout punch — the Redstone-developed Dragon tank killer.

The Army has just concluded successful tests with the Dragon Missile Jump Pack which contains one complete Dragon round (missile and launcher) and the infantryman's rifle. The jump pack weighs approximately 40 pounds.

Dragon, the Army's manportable system with a range of 1,000 meters, will defeat all known enemy armor, fortified bunkers, concrete gun emplacements or other hardened battlefield targets.

Col. Arthur Goodall is Dragon Project Manager at Redstone Arsenal and participated in the development and testing of the jump pack in a cooperative effort with MIRADCOM; Natick Research and Development Command; McDonnell-Douglas Corporation, the original development and production contractor; TECOM, Yuma Proving Gound, Ariz.; the Army Cold Regions Test Center; and the Army Airborne Communications and Electronics Board, Fort Bragg, N. C.

Natick redesigned the jump pack to include the M16 rifle and provided packs for testing in early 1977 and, subsequently, at Yuma, the jump pack was found to be acceptable for jumper safety but live missiles were prohibited in jumps because of impact damage during drops.

At a meeting at Redstone in Sept. 1977, a revised development plan was established requiring additional protection for the missile. Development tests, including dropping live missiles, were then conducted at Yuma and those same missiles were fired at Redstone.

Later, operational tests were staged at Fort Bragg, N. C., and included dropping and firing live rounds.

Dragon is far superior in range and accuracy and is more lethal than the 90mm recoilless rifle it is replacing.

# Army needs full travel info

(ARNEWS) — Applications for dependent travel to Europe will not be approved after June if special educational and medical problems are not properly documented, according to MILPERCEN.

Officials say that applications received in Europe indicate special dependent needs are increasing. And because complete and documented information about the special needs is not always being provided along with a soldier's application for overseas movement of dependents (DA Form 2370), MILPERCEN Europe is having difficulty in evaluating these requests.

MILPERCEN Europe will disapprove, pending proper documentation, incomplete

requests dated after June, officials say.

Complete and documented information is essential, officials stress, so that MILPERCEN Europe can determine if dependents can receive necessary special medical attention and educational assistance there.

Otherwise, soldiers face disapproval of dependent travel and unnecessary hardships due to delays encountered while obtaining required data.

Local personnel offices can advise soldiers on what information and documentation are required, and assist them in providing the necessary details to accompany applications.

# Overgrading costs govt. \$279 million

WASHINGTON—Overgraded jobs cost the government \$279 million a year in pay and \$90 million in benefits, according to a recent Civil Service Commission analysis.

Ten percent of General Schedule white-collar jobs were found to be overrated in paygrade and 2.9 percent were undergraded. 4.2 percent were found to be improperly classified in terms of title or occupational series, which are important for determining qualifications.

About 136,000 jobs are overgraded and 40,000 undergraded, said the CSC.

GS grades 7, 8, 10, and 15 had the highest error rate, and GS 13 and 15 resulted in the highest cost: \$153 million in salaries and benefits, nearly 55 percent of the total estimated cost of overgrading.

Two basic causes were cited. Judgment errors by position classifiers accounted for 27 percent of the overgrading, according to Commission evaluators who collected their information from desk audits. Managerial considerations — “administrative allocation,” management's pressure and other factors — contributed to more than 50 percent.

The Commission is taking corrective actions and plans follow-up studies to analyze special problems.

President Carter's reform proposals concerning incentive pay, if enacted, could help correct the overgrading. New methods for providing monetary awards for performance could discourage attempts to upgrade positions as a means of rewarding employees.

The agency must correct overgrading which is not the worker's fault without financial injury to the worker, if possible.

The agency is required to try to assign the worker to another position at the original pay-grade. If this can't be done, the agency must demote the worker to the proper paygrade. Then salary protection comes into play.

Most downgraded workers don't lose money. They go to a step in the lower grade which permits them to hold at least the equivalent of their original salary.

The Commission said the overgrading study should lead to greater awareness among managers about their responsibilities for assuring proper classification and help avoid unwarranted costs.

The study was based on a one percent random sampling of the 1.3 million full-time permanent, white-collar jobs in the General Schedule. The Commission said this is the most reliable study ever conducted on overgrading.

Legislation for further salary protection is pending before Congress.

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


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
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## What is your opinion of Soldiers Magazine's decision to run a male pin-up?

 "I'm glad to see the magazine considering the interests of the female, but as for the male pin-up, I'm not interested."



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# Burt gets award for computer model

"If the weapon acquires the target, what's the probability that the soldier will fire at it? Again, this depends on factors like the range of the weapon vis a vis the enemy, lines of sight, both at firing and at expected time of impact, and so on.

"Step by step I went down the list of events that could happen when particular weapons systems oppose one another on the battlefield, calculating the mathematical probability of the occurrence of each."

Burt said that an event logic tree can easily contain over 100 blocks, and over a thousand blocks may be used in a simulated battle. The user of her mathematical model describes a scenario, postulating particular weapons systems and their deployment and movement over a specified terrain. When the correct cards are fed into the computer in the correct order, the model assembles itself for that particular situation, and the war game begins.

Burt compared her creation, called Land Combat PERCAM (Performance and Cost Analysis Model), with a Dynamic Combat Model (DYNCOM).

"PERCAM works statistically, based on probabilities, whereas DYNCOM, which requires a great deal of detailed information to function, is deterministic," said Burt. "DYNCOM takes up much more space and is more expensive than my model.

"There was widespread doubt about the effectiveness of statistical models as compared to dynamic models, but my study showed that in this case the former compares very favorably."

Widespread use of Land Combat PERCAM could save the Army time, space and money, said Burt.

"Why do we need computer war games?" Burt asked rhetorically. "Because we have to know in advance what will actually occur on the battlefield. If the enemy does this, how will I respond? By playing out these scenarios mathematically, we can compare systems and look for improvements.

"Say we have a weapons system that is effective at a thousand meters. By how much would its effectiveness be increased if we could boost the range to 1,500 meters?"

"We can find this out by running two scenarios through the computer, one with the weapon functioning at a thousand meters and another at 1,500. Is the outcome of the battle different? How much of an

advantage is the extended range? These are the kinds of questions computer war gaming can answer."

## Retirees get tax break on disability pensions

Retired service members who receive retroactive disability pensions from the Veterans Administration may now get a tax break for taxes paid before retroactive disability was granted, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has announced.

The IRS said it will abide by a 1976

decision by the Fourth Circuit U. S. Court of Appeals. In that case, a retired soldier sought a tax break to compensate for taxes paid before his tax-exempt disability was awarded. The court ruled that the former soldier could exclude the disability income from taxable income for the retroactive period.

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# Summer work program swings into action

Army commands and agencies serviced by the MIRCOM Civilian Personnel Division are again employing more than 270 youths under several government programs which provide a meaningful work experience during the summer.

Included are 110 summer aides who are

from disadvantaged backgrounds; 76 student aides who have worked part-time during the school year and are now converted to full-time employment during the summer; under the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA), there are 25 youths; and 65 young people who qualified under the Agency's Merit Staffing Plan and are employed as office personnel, engineering aides, technicians and recreational aides.

These summer employees have a wide variety of experience and skills. Some are in their first work experience while others have worked under this program for several years.

Many are filling clerical positions, while some are assigned semi-professional positions.

The Summer Employment for Youth programs develops the job skills and abilities of participants and provides them a base to earn money to obtain their educational goals.

In addition, college faculty members are working in MIRADCOM P & P Directorate and the Patriot Project Office.

Civilian Personnel has employed two full-time counselors for the summer to assist in directing the program, Kenneth Smith and Carl Ratcliffe. They are located in Rm. 8, Bldg. 7442, phone 876-8435. They coordinate placements and help supervisors orient youth to the work environment.

Ratcliffe is a math instructor at Ed White Middle School in Huntsville. He earned a bachelors degree in math education and a masters in counseling, and served as intern counselor in a British detention home. Last year he worked in NASA's summer program.

Smith's experience ranges from military career-counseling to placement of unskilled youth in the Job Corps, to working with heroin addicts in Thailand.

He received a bachelors degree in business administration (management) from Alabama A&M University

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# Madkin Mt. quarry opens for fishing

The small quarry pond at Madkin Mountain is once again open for fishing.

Stocked with bass and bream a year ago, the pond was examined Friday and found to contain catching-size fish.

District Fisheries Biologist Curtis Lawson said that removing too many bass at the outset could cause the bream they prey on to become overcrowded, and suggested the bass catch over the next few months be limited to 30 fish.

Seinings indicated that both game species released last year have spawned. Following Lawson's recommendations, a fish poison was used to rid the pond of all fish before the hatchery-raised bass and bream were introduced.

The pond is fertilized regularly to


promote growth of natural fish food and provide a high fish yield.

A larger adjacent pond also was stocked with bass and bream and fertilized, but less fish production is expected because depth of the pond prevented using poison to kill rough fish that compete for food with the game species.

Stocking fish were provided free of charge by a state-operated hatchery.

A spot check also was made of Finance pond. It contained plenty of good-sized fish. Bass in the 5-pound range are caught there with some frequency.

Persons fishing in arsenal waters are required to have an arsenal fishing permit in their possession as well as the state fishing license.

## City offers adult education classes

The Adult Education Program of Huntsville City Schools is offering instruction in English as a foreign language and in various subjects as preparation for the high school equivalency diploma test.

All classes are held at the Adult Learning Center, 2627 Hall Ave., NW.

Classes in English as a second language are free. Offered year-round, they are held from 9-12 a.m. daily, and from 6-9 p.m. on Monday and Thursday.

A special class to prepare foreign students for the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) will begin July 10 and run to August 4. Students must register by June 29. A \$40 fee will be charged. TOEFL is a test many colleges and universities require of foreign students seeking admission.

Both formal classes and informal instruction are being offered year-round in science, social studies, math, literature, and English. This instruction is intended to help students prepare for a test to earn a high school equivalency diploma.

There is no charge for this instruction, which is offered while the Adult Learning Center is open: 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesday and Friday. Adult Basic Education (reading, writing and computation) is also offered during these hours.

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
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# Hercules observes 20th birthday

Hercules is 20 years old today.

To honor the long-serving system, members of the Hercules Division will assemble in Bldg. 4488 at 2:00 p.m. and pay tribute to the various persons who have made the program successful throughout the years.

Some 40 people here have been identified as being with the Hercules project in various occupations for the past 20 years. They will be recognized for their contribution by Brig. Gen. Patrick M. Roddy.

Also, representatives of five major contractors of the system will receive recognition for the part industry has played through the years. Foreign military customers will be represented at the ceremony.

Hercules began as an outgrowth of the Nike program which featured the Nike Ajax as an air defense missile for the cities of the U. S. Rather than try for upgrading on the Ajax the decision in 1952 was to redesign the system. The result was the Hercules con-

cept. The first prototype flight tests were conducted successfully in 1955 and production units followed in 1956.

Now directing the Hercules through its myriad of administration for domestic and foreign defenses is Col. Theodore A. Baker, Chief of the Special Systems Management Office, and LTC Burford F. Morgan, Chief of the Hercules Division.


The business of managing Hercules today differs from earlier days. At its peak it was on almost 400 sites surrounding major cities of the United States. Today, the U. S. sites have dwindled, but Hercules' protection perimeters have extended world wide. It waits in defense from the Far East to Europe.

In FY 79 the Hercules training requirements at the Missile and Munitions Center and School reflect a student ratio of almost 50-50 U. S. and foreign troops, further example of the changing times. The School conducts, under direction of Major Warner A. Davis, Chief of the Nike Division, four enlisted and one warrant officer courses ranging from 30 to 51 weeks in length.

A NATO Area Material Supply Agency (NAMSA) study was performed on Hercules. As a result, the system is being modified in foreign nations to bring the system more in line with the state of the arts, such as the use of solid state components. Additionally, the Japanese hold a co-production agreement with the U.S. A total of 13 foreign nations have the Hercules in their defense inventories.

Over the years there have been 875 modifications to the Hercules system, much of it in the area of radar components. The system now stands at about 55 percent current in the state of technology.

The fact that Hercules could be used as a surface to surface missile in addition to its air defense capability has made it a system which answered many defense needs for the past two decades.

However, the closest contest of the day was the semi-final tug of war that matched Company A against the 6th Student Com-




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# CWF softball race remains heated

A total of sixty-four golfers participated in the two-day event.

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


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


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**Leader should set examples**

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

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# Smart soldiers shop the commissary

"Surveys have shown a soldier will save about 24 percent on his total grocery bill by shopping at the commissary instead of civilian stores," William Penney, commissary officer said.

"On individual items he can sometimes save more, or less. And we can't compete with some of the specials run in the larger

stores. But 24 percent is a good average figure." Despite inflation, bargains abound for the careful military shopper in Huntsville. One store in particular offers soldiers and their families name brand foods, toiletries and other personal items at savings of up to 30 percent off the list retail price.

It's called the Redstone Arsenal Commissary.

Soldiers using coupons can save even more. The commissary accepts current manufacturers' coupons on brands in stock.

While most soldiers are aware of the savings available at the commissary, many do not take advantage of them — usually because they think of the commissary as strictly a food store.

However, the commissary stocks name brand health and beauty aids and laundry products. The savings amount to over 30 percent on many items, and can go higher. A recent in-house special on shaving cream saved buyers 50 percent off the retail price. Commissary savings on cigarettes are legendary.

Snacks packaged for individual servings, and canned drinks that require no refrigeration or preparation are sold at prices substantially less than those charged by convenience stores and vending machines.

Although there is presently no bus service from the barracks to the commissary, the commissary is within a 15 minute walk from most of the barracks. Proposals are also being considered to add a commissary stop to the post shuttle bus route.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

"Five days before and five days after pay day the commissary check-out service can be slow," Penny said. "But at any other time customers will be processed out very quickly."
