

## When women ran Redstone



**Women workers on World War II assembly line**

In 1941, production lines at Redstone Ordnance Plant were almost ready to begin turning out the vast amounts of munitions needed so badly on the battlefield. But there was no one to man them.

Skilled workers needed in the extremely dangerous munitions manufacturing business were not to be found in the rural environs. What few able bodied men weren't pressed into military service were drawing wages in booming war construction at a pay rate Uncle Sam could not match.

Faced with a big job to do but not nearly enough people to do it with, Major Carroll D. Hudson, commander of the new Redstone Ordnance Plant, made what was then a bold decision: He would man his plant with women.

This use of women was "definitely frowned upon" at the time, according to Mary T. Cagle of the MIRCOCM Historical Office, who was employed here during the war. Her recollections of the Redstone Ordnance Plant and the role of women in war production are contained in an illustrated history she compiled in 1955.

She writes: "Contrary to existing practice at the time, Major Hudson began to lay plans for the employment of women on the ammunition production lines . . . Shortly thereafter, the Civil Service Commission announced examinations for jobs known as 'Female Trainees'."

"The first two female employees were hired on Feb. 28, 1942. When production operations started at Line No. 1 in March, there were six female employees proudly working alongside a crew of 22 men. At the close of December 1942, about 40 percent of the personnel working on the four production lines were women." Later the proportion of women in production work rose to more than 60 percent. The total workforce was about 4,500.

So it was that the burden of producing munitions in previously unheard-of quantities, of meeting bewildering production quotas (using new, improved techniques in

some cases) rested heavily on women. Women who, by and large, had never before worked outside the home.

What motivated them likely was not money. The prevailing wage was around \$5 per day and less. Plus the work was hard, hot and dangerous. But they knew that it was a war that was being fought on production lines as well as on battle fronts where their sons and husbands had gone and felt there was a direct ratio between the number of shells they produced and the number of loved-ones who would come home. Redstone Ordnance Plant — it was renamed Redstone Arsenal in 1943 — boasted three generations of women in one family, the eldest in her 60s, the youngest a teenager. One woman worker had five sons in military service.

The spirit of times is reflected in a full page advertisement that ran in the Huntsville Times Oct. 29, 1944, announcing jobs available for "laborers . . . men and women between the ages of 18 and 60 years" with salaries starting at \$4.32 per day. "We

simply cannot and must not fail on the Home Front, especially getting ammunition to our boys . . . The responsibility is clear . . . the need is acute . . . we must act now, all of us together!" The ad carried a picture of production women at work, captioned, "Women workers at Redstone smile as they work. You too will get a big kick out of working for Uncle Sam, Victory and Peace."

There appear to have been few, if any, women supervisors in production work, but they held down the whole range of available laborer positions which ranged from assembly line workers and inspectors to laundry workers and janitors and security guards. Production workers manufactured and loaded high explosive bursters for chemical artillery shells and bombs, artillery shells of all sizes including 155 mm, rifle grenades and many other types of ordnance.

How well they did their jobs is a matter of record. In 1942 two carloads of ammunition was shipped per day. In 1945 20 carloads — at times as many as 50 carloads — were being shipped daily. More than 45 million separate units of ammunition were shipped during the war. By the end of the war Redstone Arsenal had won five "E" flags, conferred by the Secretary of War for production excellence.

Redstone also flew the Minuteman "T" banner, signifying that more than 90 percent of workers had invested over 10 percent of their income in War Bonds and earned recognition for safety achievements that were unsurpassed by any munitions plant in the nation.

Similar honors were gained by neighboring Huntsville Arsenal (later absorbed by Redstone), a separate installation operated by the Chemical Warfare Service for manufacture of mustard gas and other toxic war chemicals. Women made up more than 35 percent of the Huntsville Arsenal workforce, and shared in the severe eye and respiratory problems that chemicals inflicted on some workers. Fires and explosions were commonplace.

Huntsville Arsenal is reported to have claimed the first area government-worker fatality of the war, a woman who died in an

# Many women still behind desks

Life for women at Redstone is changing, and women are now seen in many different roles. But the most common place to find them is the same as it was twenty years ago — behind a desk, typing, filing, answering the phone and keeping leave time.

Women who are in clerical positions are happy, frustrated, indifferent and angry about their jobs. Their reactions to their jobs seem as numerous as they are.

Nelda Gray, an editorial clerk-typist in the Technical Publications Branch of the MIRCOC Maintenance & Engineering Directorate is happy with her position.

"I'm content where I am with no more responsibility than I have," she said decisively.

Gray is a slender, tanned woman with an engaging smile and outgoing personality. Her co-workers like her and say she works hard.

Gray has had several different jobs during twelve years with the government, and thinks that a good attitude toward a job makes it enjoyable.

"If you were really unhappy with a job you wouldn't like any of it no matter how interesting it was," she said adding that, "I've never had a job I was unhappy with or a boss I didn't like."

"That's more because of herself than anything else," a co-worker interjected.

Some women see their present jobs as stepping-stones to a later career. W. K. Miller, a clerk-typist for technical assistance in Maint. & Engr., is one of them.

"I'm going to graduate from college next year," Miller said, adding that she sees her job as the means to an end—her degree.

"I guess I have a really indifferent feeling toward my job," she said. "I do my work, and do it well, but there's no real self-satisfaction."

Miller, who is soft-spoken but determined, plans to graduate with a degree in childhood education and sociology. "I feel that it would be more fulfilling to do something for children—I'll be qualified to help disabled children."

Miller said she likes Redstone and likes the people she works with.

"I just don't like to type," she said flatly. "There are all sorts of people, and every job is right for one of them. A clerical job and me — well, we just don't fit. But for someone who likes to type this would be a good job."

Margaret King would also like to pursue a new career, but wants to continue working for the federal government. King worked at Redstone as a clerk-stenographer, then left to raise a family and earn a degree in economics. When she returned to government work in 1974, she hoped to enter a professional job.

King has had trouble trying to advance, however. "I had to come back to work in the same sort of position that I had when I left," she said.

King added that there are few jobs to bridge between clerical and professional positions, and that her degree does not seem to compare to work experience.

"I don't dislike my job as such, but I feel that I'm overqualified," she said, adding that since arsenal jobs were hard to come by in 1974, she may have been lucky to get one at all.

"I would like to get a chance to work up to my ability," King said. "But I like the people in my office very much. It's relaxed, it's professional. I like to work with professional people."

Another woman clerk, who asked to remain anonymous, echoed King's complaints and added a few of her own. Like King, this clerk came back to Redstone after earning a college degree, only to find herself stuck in the same job she had when she left.

"If I were just hiring in I would be at a better advantage," she said. "The whole training system seems to be set up to lock you into the position you already have."

"There is no training to give you potential," she said, and explained that many training courses are limited to people who are GS-7 or above — just the people who she feels don't need them.

Training for clerks is limited to courses which relate to their jobs. "Capitalization", "Punctuation", she said with disgust. "I've had twelve hours of college English. Why should I take 'Capitalization' or 'Punctuation'?"

The clerk also complained about the Civilian Personnel Office, saying that workers there often haven't known how to help her. "I wish they would just say, 'I don't know' if they don't know," she said. "Sometimes I think they gave me the wrong information."

The clerk also felt that some positions publicized as being open were in actuality pre-determined.

"Sometimes I think people want to promote someone in their office, so they make the job description tailor-made to fit that person. It just gets everyone's (people who are applying for the job) hopes up, when there really isn't a job available at all."

She also complained about the standards

used to choose who gets promoted. "I know that the Board has a hard time because there are so many qualified people, but the things I've heard that they use to break ties—like who had 'Secretarial Proficiency' most recently! I think my degree should be more important than that."

Like the others this woman had nothing bad to say about her surroundings or co-workers. She likes working with everyone in her office. But she couldn't help adding, with a touch of sarcasm:

"It would be a wonderful spot for a clerical."

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# She set her sights high, hit the target

Maraynor White, a procurement analyst for MIRCOM, is a woman who knew what she wanted to do.

"I set my sights on procurement and I never wanted to leave it."

She also knew where she wanted to do it.

"I said to my husband, 'I don't know how we're going to manage it, but we've got to get on at Redstone.'"

White now has a temporary promotion to GS-13 in the Policy and Compliance Branch of the Policy and Resource Management Division.

White began working for the government as a clerk typist at Greenville Air Force Base. She worked her way into office management, only to take a cut in pay in order to become a clerk typist in procurement.

She had always been interested in the procurement field and her new supervisor cemented that interest.

"He let me attend the training sessions with the buyers," she said. "That's what sold me on procurement."

Then the command closed, and White worked for a time at the commissary of Craig Air Force Base. But she never lost her dream of working in procurement, and soon applied to work at Redstone.

Since she was hired in 1966 White has worked in almost every area of procurement. Some of the changes were by choice — White says she never hesitated to try something new.

"If I wanted something I asked for it, or applied for it . . . I've been aggressive."

Some other changes, especially those in recent years, have resulted from RIFs or re-organizations. White was disappointed by some at first, but thinks they usually worked out for the best.

"I try to maintain a good attitude," she said. "I felt that wherever I was needed, I could contribute . . . I've tried to look on each new assignment with optimism — it is a new opportunity."

White credits her success to her supervisors, who recognized her potential and gave her extra responsibility, and to her own hard work.

"I know I've had a lot of good fortune and lots and lots of help," she said, "but I feel that I've given in return. You have to accept that responsibility and be willing to give a little extra."

White's husband also works in procurement. Recently both received the Certified Professional Contract Manager's Certification. The certification is presented by the National Contract Management Association and requires extensive training and ten years experience.

White says neither her husband nor three children ever minded her career. Her husband, she says, "was very understanding," and her children were taught "independence and self-reliance."

"They act like they're proud of me," she said. "I hope they are."

explosion that leveled an incendiary bomb filling plant in April 1942.

Women bore the brunt of several accidents that occurred at the Redstone Ordnance works. Explosion of a 75 mm shell on Line No. 4 killed a female hit in the chest by a flying fragment. Others were wounded and burned.

On August 14, 1943 at 11:26 an explosion occurred on Line No. 1 that killed a woman. Another was severely injured, and had to have one foot amputated. Fifteen months later she returned to work on the same production line.



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
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# Lockheed named for \$118 million HOE contract

The Army's Ballistic Missile Defense Systems Command (BMDSCOM) awarded a \$118,427,794 contract to Lockheed Missiles and Space Company, Inc., Sunnyvale, Calif., to design and conduct the Homing Overlay Experiment (HOE) for its Systems Technology Program.

The cost-plus-fixed-fee contract calls for Lockheed to resolve the key issues involved in developing an interceptor missile that would be launched from the ground and use its own long-wave infrared sensor and computer to locate attacking intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs) above the atmosphere, home in and "kill" them without the use of a nuclear warhead.

The five-year program includes four flight tests at Kwajalein Missile Range in the Pacific and an option for two additional flight tests.

Lockheed was one of three contractors awarded a \$500,000 study contract in September 1977 to define the configuration of the experimental interceptor and the management and technical effort required to develop it. The other contractors participating in the competition were the Boeing Company, Seattle, Wash., and the

Vought Corporation, Dallas, Tex.

Several major subcontractors will participate in the HOE with Lockheed.


Three divisions of Honeywell, Inc., will be involved in developing the optical sensor and fuze, the guidance software and hardware, and associated electronics: Honeywell Avonics Division, St. Petersburg, Fla., Honeywell Defense Electronics Division, Lexington, Mass., and Honeywell Defense Systems Division, Hopkins, Minn.

Rocketdyne Division of Rockwell International, Canoga Park, Calif., will develop the axial propulsion engine which will propel the homing vehicle to intercept its target.

Space Vector Corporation, Northridge, Calif., is responsible for integration of the booster.

Aeronutronic Division of Ford Aerospace & Communications Corp., Newport Beach, Calif., will perform analysis of optical sensor test data.

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
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
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# Getting ahead

## Training, education boosted clerk into career field

"You stay in the bottom ranks so long, it seems like you'll never get ahead. Everybody says you're a good worker, but no, you're not qualified for a promotion."

That's how Anne Cooley describes the plight of Redstone workers who have raw talent, energy and ambition but are stuck in low graded jobs.

Cooley has first-hand knowledge of the problem. She worked for the government for almost 15 years in the clerical ranks before being accepted into the para-trainee program and entering a professional field.

"The para-trainee program is an excellent way for people to get ahead," she said. "It's one of the few ways someone can get out of the clerical field into a career field."

Cooley became a Budget Analyst para-trainee in the Logistics Services Division of RASA in April, 1977. She entered the two-year program as a GS-5 and will leave it as a GS-9. Her training consists of both on-the-job training and formal courses. Most of the schooling is via correspondence courses, but she has also taken night courses at local colleges.

"I had worked in the clerical field for so long . . . This is new, different, a challenge. I have a lot to learn," she said.

Cooley had been in the Upward Mobility (Continued on next page)

program, having entered it in 1974. "I was training for an entry level position in the personnel field. I took courses and worked four hours a week at Civilian Personnel. But

just participating in the program doesn't guarantee you a job in that field. I became qualified for a position, but none opened."

## GS-13: 'The opportunities were here'

Nancy Walker does not fit the stereotype of the successful career woman. Her face is not hard or cold. It is easier to imagine her home, baking cookies than in the office, controlling the money of MIRADCOM. But Nancy Walker, Chief of Program Budgeting for MIRADCOM, is one of the most successful civil servants on the arsenal. Shortly after her graduation from Auburn University in 1962, Walker was hired as a GS-5 Budget Analyst for the Anti-ballistic Missile Defense System (Nike-X). Within

seven years she was promoted to GS-13.

"I advanced quickly because the opportunities were here," Walker said. "Nike was a new system in the 1960s, and the program had top priority. The work was there to be done, and if you were willing to do the work the opportunities were there to be had."

She learned to make RIFs, re-organizations and re-assignments work for her in the early 1970s, and was promoted to GS-14 in 1974. The 1975 Civil Service Commission downgrade in her specialty reduced

her grade to GS-12, but she regained her GS-14 within 6 months and has retained it ever since.

Although sometimes bumped during RIFs by those enjoying Veterans Preference, Walker does not consider herself a victim of discrimination. She prefers to talk about the help she's received in her career, not the obstacles.

"One of the people especially important to my career was the supervisor in the first job I had at Nike," Walker said. "She gave me the responsibilities I needed to develop myself, and provided the support I needed to advance."

But Walker came to Redstone with a key (Continued on next page)

At that point she took a downgrade to enter the personnel area as an employee relations clerk. "I thought it might be an opportunity to get into personnel from the bottom up," she said. Later she was chosen as a para-trainee.

It was her decision to further her education — long before she became a para-trainee — that started her on the road to advancement.

"Some people expect to just sit there and get ahead," she said. "I suddenly woke up one day and said, 'Look, kid, if you want to get ahead you have to go back to school.'"

It wasn't easy.

"I have two children, and had to give up a lot of family time. I went to school three nights a week, four hours a night. Sometimes I wondered if it was worth it. I felt like giving up lots of times, but stuck it out. It gave me a feeling of accomplishment and self-worth.

"It's difficult to go back to school, but it's the only way. It just depends on how bad you want it. I had sat around long enough."

Pursuing a higher education proved a financial burden, but under the Upward Mobility program the government paid part of her job-related courses, she said. "That helped tremendously, I might not have been able to get my degree without it."

Cooley did get a bachelors degree in business administration from the University of Montevallo, graduating with highest honors. But she doesn't plan to quit going to school. Nor does she plan to remain a GS-9 after her training ends.

"I'm enrolled in the administrative science program at UAH. I plan to get a master's degree next year. I'm interested in management and management problems. I'd like to be a manager myself. That's my goal. It's beginning to open up for women. Getting a master's degree should help me qualify."

Anne Cooley speaks with the quiet con-

fidence of a person who knows what she wants and has the determination to work for it.

"I feel like I've been very fortunate," she said. "I worked for a long time until I got the break I need. Since I got my foot in the door, things have been going very well.

"I just feel fortunate to be here. I'd like to see other people get the same opportunities I've had."

ingredient for success already in hand: a college degree.

Circumstances also worked in her favor. In the early 1960's Redstone needed specialists trained in money management. Walker's business education degree qualified her to fill that need.

Having no children the first years of her career helped. Walker was free to work late without worrying if the children were fed, and in general "had more time to devote to work."

Walker added, "My husband and I now have three small children, aged 4, 6 and 9, and because of them I've had to develop a new set of priorities with regards to work.

"I'd like to continue my education, but I've only been able to take a few courses at the University of Oklahoma. I just don't have the time for everything right now, so I stick to what's most important to me — my family and my work."

At the heart of Walker's career philosophy is a belief in the importance of doing one's work well. She advises careerists to ignore the petty irritations that arise in any working place and "get down to business." According to Walker, budding careerists should also be wary of stereotypes and try not to let themselves to be forced into someone else's mould.

"I think the best thing to do would be to

set out to do the best job you can, ignoring anything that could interfere with your work," Walker said, "You don't have to be aggressive about anything but your work. I'm not very outspoken or aggressive about anything but my job. Aggressiveness divorced from work doesn't appeal to me, and I've found most people are turned off by it.

"Unfortunately that kind of aggressiveness is a problem for a lot of career women today. They don't see how the stereotype they're conforming to is working against them."

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# Sex discrimination

## Mary Bryson refused to accept unfair treatment

"I would not have been able to live with myself if I hadn't done it."

That's what Mary Bryson says about her decision to file a sex discrimination complaint after working in civil service for almost a quarter of a century and never "rocking the boat."

It was almost three years ago that Bryson filed her complaint, but she has a vivid recollection of all the details of the case.

"I had never been discriminated against before," she said. "But when I learned that five males in my organization who got promotions had been permitted to hand-carry their paperwork to Washington, while my own paperwork was handled routinely and my promotion denied, for the first time in my life I experienced the feeling of injustice. I began to have a real understanding of why people get involved in demonstrations, marches, etc. Before I understood that in words only — not feelings.

"I knew that my career, and more important, my self-respect, had been challenged."

She filed a sex discrimination complaint.

"This was an unusual move for me," said Bryson. "I was never a 'boat rocker.' This kind of news travels. It was amazing how many people said 'You? Filing a sex discrimination complaint? I can't believe you are involved in something as controversial as that!'"

Bryson expected controversy, but got none. "I thought at the time I might be putting my whole career on the line, but now I know that was a silly thought. I didn't get my head cut off and management didn't get mad at me. Actually, they were very supportive. Nor did I experience any hostility from my co-workers. I don't recall that anybody became angry."

Her case was probably unusual in that respect, said Bryson.

"My counsellor said it was the most unusual case she had handled. I think it depends on the reasons you do it and the feelings you have about it. I was only trying to correct an injustice . . . never trying to get anybody in trouble or hurt anybody. I was never mad at the people involved."

Although she is a long-time member of Federally Employed Women, Bryson said she filed her complaint more for personal reasons than for the advancement of her sex. But she did become more concerned about the welfare of other women as a result of her experience.

"I learned that there are some women who are more supportive in this sort of thing than you can believe. I learned that some

"I think women saw from my case that you can use the system without repercussions," she said. "I feel that more women should use this system, not let fear prevent them. I think management goes along with the process. Management people are pretty nice people. They're fair."

Asked why she had been a victim of discrimination, Bryson said "I'm not sure whether I was deliberately not included in

women really care. It was a new kind of feeling. They were helping me for the cause, while I was doing it for myself."

Other women first helped Bryson by listening to her problem and giving her the benefit of their experience. "I got reinforcement from these people, she said. You can't just jump into something you don't understand. You need encouragement."

Bryson's EEO counselor and her representative put in long hours of their own time on her behalf, with "no motive except furthering the women's movement," she said.

"The experience made me more active in women's affairs and more confident," said Bryson. "When somebody has given you a helping hand it makes you want to reach out and help someone else."

Bryson hopes that her example will prompt other women to file complaints if they believe they have been discriminated against.

the preferential treatment afforded the five men or if others were just concerned about themselves. If I thought somebody was saying, 'Boy, we're not going to let Mary get promoted,' I'd feel pretty bad about that, but I think it was more passive. It's hard to know what somebody's motives are."

She does feel, however, that many men often discriminate against women covertly, in their everyday attitudes. She said that their "socialization" has caused men to view women as being less than equal.

Bryson won her case. She got a promotion with back pay. She is now a program analyst in the Lab Support Office of MIRADCOM's Technology Lab. When she filed her complaint she was working in a different office, but says the move was not a result of the complaint.

Bryson won, but said even had she lost, it would have been worth it to do what she did. "I felt just really good about doing this, I mean just really, really good."

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

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


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# R&D captures tournament championship

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
