In brief

Fox Hospital dedication set

Formal dedication ceremonies have been scheduled Sept. 19 for Fox Army Hospital.

Among those participating will be MG Enrique Mendez, Deputy Army Surgeon General, and Dr. Theodore Woodward of Baltimore, a personal friend of BG Leon Alexander Fox for whom the hospital is named.

The \$12.5 million, 40 bed hospital opened in early July. Representatives of the Fox family will be among the many invited guests. The ceremony will begin at 11 a.m.

Gen. Kroesen to visit here

General Frederick J. Kroesen, the Army vice chief of staff, will visit local commands on Sept. 18.

General Kroesen commanded FORSCOM until a few months ago, last visited Redstone about a year ago.

His schedule includes breakfast with soldiers at dining facility number three at 0645 and then briefings at BMDSCOM, MIRADCOM and MIRCOM. He will leave after a lunch with local commanders and invited guests at the Officers Club.

The vice chief will arrive at Redstone during the afternoon of Sept. 17. No official events are scheduled that day.

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Soldiers who have more than 60 days leave should use their excess leave before September 30, 1978, Army Finance and Accounting officials announced this week.

The cut-off date for the accumulation of accrued leave for FY 78 is September 30, 1978 and accrued leave will not exceed 60 days as of October 1, 1978, Finance officials said.

Physicist seeks diamond lathes to produce Army HEL mirrors

Ordinarily one would not build a million dollar machine to manufacture mirrors, but then most mirrors aren't used in high energy lasers.

Bill Friday, a High Energy Laser Center research physicist, is conducting a Manufacturing Methods and Technology (MMT) project designed to meet future Army needs for large quantities of specially designed high energy laser mirrors and Infra-red optics. The key to the project is a single point diamond turning machine.

"MMT programs are designed to overcome technology gaps in the manufacture of items needed in Army systems, such as parts for which the fabrication process is very long or very expensive, or both," said Friday. "High energy laser (HEL) mirrors are in that category.

"HEL mirrors have stringent requirements. They usually must be water-cooled and must be very smooth and highly reflective. Otherwise they will scatter or absorb too much laser light, and thus lose efficiency or burn up the mirror. The mirrors can be flat, but often must be spherical or even aspherical."

According to Friday, these stringent

requirements cause the production of HEL mirrors by conventional means to be slow and expensive, and in some cases, impossible.

"Some laser resonator mirrors require faces to meet at 90 degree angles," he said. "You can't get into those tight corners or make the sharp points with conventional techniques—a man working with glass and a grinding compound, or grinding and polishing machines.

"Sometimes you need parabolic mirrors. You have to make a sphere first, go back and zone polish to make a parabola. When you get to the edge with a conventional polishing tool, it tends to round off the edge."

Irregular shapes and critical angles are not the only problems: the degree of surface smoothness required is also difficult to attain, said Friday.

"The mirrors have to be flat over the entire surface within 10 micro-inches," he said. "A micro-inch is one millionth of an inch. By comparison, a human hair is one thousandth of an inch thick. This kind of accuracy is required for the mirror to reflect a perfect image."

Lax to speak at AIEE meet

Reserve starts new program

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — The Army Reserve has expanded a training program which promises to attract more high school and college students to service in the Reserve. The program, called split training, allows students to adjust the program to their school year, according to U.S. Army Reserve officials.

Eligible young men and women will be able to separate basic training from advanced individual training (AIT) by up to one year, according to the officials. Individuals will take eight weeks basic training during the summer of a school year. The following summer the recruit will

take AIT, learning a military job skill.

Previously, many high school and college students were unable to join the Army Reserve because they could not obtain the required training while going to school. The required initial training period meant a minimum of 12 weeks away from home or school on active duty for training.

The split training alternative is designed for those who enlist for six years in a Reserve troop program unit and who otherwise meet the basic eligibility requirements for enlistment, say the Army Reserve officials.



QUESTION: What is your opinion of the Army's legal services?



MSgt Dennis R. Bonner, MED-DAC—"The legal services are outstanding here. When I was first sergeant at the Medical Company they were overworked and understaffed but still took time to help the troops. They've always been well organized and very helpful."

Legal Assistance

Army's way of helping soldiers solve problems

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Remember when a friend and his wife moved into an apartment complex across town? They decided to have Army Legal Assistance check the lease. Legal Assistance advised the couple that the lease placed many unnecessary restrictions on them and protected the building owner more than the tenant.

Personal legal problems may contribute to a soldier's morale and ability to perform efficiently and sometimes create problems requiring disciplinary action. Helping soldiers resolve their personal problems is an effective preventive measure.

An installation's Legal Assistance Office offers advice and assistance on personal legal problems.

According to a Pentagon JAG official, most of the people seeking legal assistance request office counseling on domestic relations, consumer disputes, landlord-tenant problems, and the preparation of legal documents, chiefly powers of attorney.

In consumer disputes, Legal Officers may negotiate with the conflicting parties, performing all professional functions short of an actual appearance in court. They may also sign letters written on behalf of their clients.

A servicemember's private income-producing business activities, however, are excluded from the Legal Assistance Program.

When a power of attorney is prepared for an eligible individual, Legal Assistance discourages a general power of attorney, since it gives the holder the right to conduct almost any business transaction, from selling real and personal property to using the grantor's credit. Legal Assistance recommends that an expiration date be put on a power of attorney, according to the official. The date, however, will depend on the purpose or circumstances under which the power is granted.

For example, when a soldier being reassigned cannot personally arrange to ship his property, he should give written permission to his spouse or some other person, who can handle the shipping arrangements. Without the written authorization, usually a power of attorney, and a copy of the servicemember's orders, the spouse cannot authorize the movement of household goods to the servicemember's new duty station.

The power of attorney allows the holder to sign the application for shipment of household goods and carry out any other action needed to move to the new duty station.

Legal Assistance Officers make case referrals to the civilian bar, usually to the client's family attorney, lawyer referral services, or legal and public defender organizations. If none of these services are available, at least three attorneys are recommended so the client may select whomever he or she wishes.

In a limited number of states, a court representation program, the Expanded Legal Assistance Program (ELAP), allows Legal Assistance Officers to represent servicemembers who could not otherwise afford an attorney in court. Lawyers assigned to these programs may represent eligible clients in federal and state courts on civil and criminal matters — domestic relations, minor offenses. Before ELAP can be established in a particular state, the Judge Advocate General must first give approval, and the local installation JAG office must have the lawyers to handle such a program. Two requirements must also be met: approval must be obtained from local-state courts and approval must come from the state bar.

Persons eligible for assistance include:

- (A) Members of the Armed Forces, active duty and retired, and their dependents.
- (B) Civilian employees and their dependents in the employ of or accompanying the armed forces to foreign countries.
- (C) In the U.S., allied forces members and their dependents.
- (D) Prisoners confined in U.S. Army disciplinary barracks although discharged from the service.

Soldiers needing legal advice on personal affairs should make an appointment with Legal Assistance. A big problem could be remedied with a visit.

Hispanic soldier

Language only real problem confronting Redstone Private

Working by their side day after day we can easily forget that some of Redstone Arsenal's workers have a Hispanic heritage. But this is not the case for the coworkers of Private First Class Lucy VasquezNavarreto.

A dental assistant here, her name should be enough of a reminder, but if that fails, her dark hair and eyes and the rolling staccato of her accent are ready and pleasant evidence.

In fact, the 23-year-old Puerto Rican said that except for cold weather language has been her only real problem since joining the Army 11 months ago. However, she had no particular difficulty completing basic training at Ft. McClellan, Ala. "Everyone was very helpful there. And since everyone was doing the same thing all the time, if you didn't understand what was said you could see what everyone else was doing and know what was expected."

Her Advanced Individual Training at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, did not trouble her either. "I understood almost everything there because I came into the Army with a background in Dental. I've been working in dental since I was 15," she said. The Rio Piedras resident also earned an associate degree in dental hygiene from the University of Puerto Rico before joining the Army.

But still, she said, "It's hard to be good at your job when the language is hard to un-

derstand." Along the lines of a pet peeve, she added, "Some people try to make fun when I have trouble saying something — sometimes that makes me real mad. If they tried Spanish, they would have the same problems."

A very adaptable person, VasquezNavarreto adjusted easily to the Army. "I like the Army. I have a chance to travel, to come here, to meet new people . . . learn another language. And it keeps me busy — that's very important."



Shopping by mail convenient, but can be risky

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — While thumbing through a mail order catalog, an Army specialist four saw an ad for a \$75 body-building set. He sent away for it and after waiting 62 days he got a \$3 jumping rope in the mail. Not exactly what he expected to receive for his \$75, but what could he do about it?

Another soldier saw an ad for a set of mag wheels for \$125 in a mail order catalog. He sent away for the wheels and 30 days later received them through the mail.

Purchasing merchandise through the mail can be a convenient means of shopping. The consumer can order almost anything without leaving home, from antiques to food and clothes to services such as bookbinding and metal repair. This convenience is made possible through the various catalogs mail order dealers send out to buyers each year.

All the buyer has to do is go through one of the catalogs and order the items of choice. Since most mail order firms rely on repeat business, they try to provide fast shipment and quality products.

Problems can arise

Large catalog showrooms, some clothing firms and some large shoe companies sell through the mail. Consumers generally do not have much trouble with these businesses. However, problems with mail order merchandising can arise.

Some customers have ordered products by mail and have waited a long time for the

goods to arrive. Some never receive the merchandise ordered.

Other problems develop when the merchandise ordered is out of stock or damaged during shipment. Major dealers usually settle up to the customer's satisfaction. If the wrong item is delivered, there's usually no problem getting a refund, credit or a substitute item. Getting a settlement on damaged items usually takes more time.

To correct mail order abuses, the Federal Trade Commission has rules to protect the mail order consumer.

Soldiers buying through the mail have the following rights:

Consumer rights

(A) To know when the merchandise ordered will be shipped. Many advertisements state when customers may expect their products to arrive. If the seller does not provide a date, the consumer has the right to expect the merchandise to be shipped within 30 days.

(B) To cancel the order if the seller does not ship the items within the stated time or within 30 days. If the seller cannot meet the deadline, the seller must give the customer the right to cancel the order or get his or her money back. The business must notify the customer of any delay and provide a free means of reply. If the shipping delay is 30 days or less, the consumer has the right to cancel the order and get a refund, the right to agree to a new shipping date, or the right not to answer. If the customer fails to respond, the seller can assume that the consumer agrees to the new shipping date.

(C) To receive a full refund if the order is

cancelled. The seller must mail the refund within seven business days after the customer cancels the order. If the sale is on credit, the seller has one billing cycle to adjust the consumer's account. If a mail order business does not follow the FTC

rules, the consumer should write the business directly to try and get the problem resolved. If there's no response within a reasonable amount of time, the consumer should send the details of the deal, a copy of the advertisement to which he or she

responded, a copy of the receipt or cancelled check and any other related information to: Director, Bureau of Consumer Protection (MO-P), Federal Trade Commission, Washington, D.C. 20580.

The FTC will forward any complaint it receives about mail-order fraud to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.

Check with BBB

To avoid being taken in the first place, the consumer should, if in doubt, check with the Better Business Bureau.

Shopping by mail can be convenient and enjoyable. All the soldier has to remember is that you usually get what you pay for. Beware of unbelievable deals; they usually don't make good business sense, if you stop and think about them. If you use a lot of healthy caution with a grain of salt, when you do buy something through the mail, what you ordered is what you'll get.





Diamond lathe

Friday said that the need for diamond lathes to produce these mirrors was recognized several years ago by Tom Norwood of the HEL Center and Gil Hutchison of Quality Assurance. Now it's Friday's job to help fill that need.

"Our contractors could use these diamond lathes to cut a metal mirror finish usable on HEL with no final polishing or touch-up required," said Friday. "And the odd-shaped and multi-faceted, critical-angled mirrors can be produced on this machine as easily as spherical surfaces. The diamond lathe easily turns copper, aluminum, electroless nickel, germanium and other Infra-red materials."

Diamond the key

The diamond is the key, said Friday.

"A diamond is so hard you can put an extremely sharp edge on it, much sharper than tungsten carbide machine tools," he explained. The tool's sharp point enables it to get into deep corners, make sharp points and produce a very smooth surface finish. "Diamond lathes produce a surface ripple—the raised area which appears between strokes of the tool nose during cutting—of only 10 billionths of an inch. Because of vibration in the machine, however, the roughness of the finished surface is three-millionths of an inch," said Friday. "You can't even see the tool marks when this level of accuracy is maintained, because the surface ripple is less than one-tenth the wavelength of the laser light itself.

"And the chip produced by the tool nose is so small that it carries away all heat generated by the cut. This results in a mirror surface with no stress, cracks, or impurities ground into it to burn up when hit by a HEL," added Friday.

Speeds production

A diamond lathe also can greatly speed up the production of mirrors, according to the physicist. "It can make a small mirror in 30 seconds that would require hours for a conventional machine operator to make, or a large mirror in a week which would require a year by grinding and polishing."


According to Friday, the diamond lathe can produce HEL mirrors, but companies don't have the machines, nor can they get them readily, for no one manufactures the lathes on a production basis.

Nor do companies have much incentive to get the machines now, said Friday. "The lathes cost between half-a-million and a million dollars, and are limited in application. The diamond tool won't turn a smooth surface on glass, iron or steel. Most machinery is made out of iron and steel and most optics out of glass."

Friday said a contractor would have to make about 1,000 complex mirrors with a diamond lathe to offset its initial investment and operating costs, and "right now there just aren't many special HEL mirrors designed, because we haven't been able to get them."

So there are few special HEL mirrors designed because companies don't have the machines to make them; on the other hand, companies don't have the machines because there are too few mirrors to make. Friday hopes to end this paradoxical standoff with a three-year MMT program beginning Fiscal Year 1979.

"We're looking ahead to when the Army will be producing HEL systems, when we'll need big, accurate, damage-resistant mirrors. If diamond lathes are available,

the Army will be able to procure these mirrors much faster and less expensively than it could otherwise.

"So MMT is saying that we'll invest money now to make it easier for companies to buy and use these machines. We'll help to design the lathes, help them check out the machines when they get them and help train the operators, so when the Army needs the production there will be companies in business able to manufacture these mirrors."

Special features cited

Friday will help design the diamond lathes, based on predicted optical needs. He said that the machines require a number of special features to guarantee accuracy.

The machine's spindle, which carries either its tool or the mirror it's working on, uses air bearings to minimize and in fact almost eliminate friction, said Friday. An air bearing, he explained, is a cylinder fitting into another cylinder very closely. Air is forced into holes drilled in the cylinders, causing one to ride on the air cushion without touching the other cylinder.

"Air bearings are a very important part of this machine," he said.

Numerical control is another important aspect of the diamond lathe, he added. A laser interferometer (LI) locates the position of the machine tool's lead screw to within one millionth of an inch. By counting the screw's turns, the LI knows exactly where the tool is. Any error in the lead screw's course can be corrected by using a computer to give instructions to the screw via the LI.

Temperature strictly controlled

Temperature control in the area of the machine is also vital, said Friday. The temperature must be controlled to within one tenth of a degree. One way to do this is to inundate the entire machine in an oil bath whose temperature is accurately controlled. Or the room's air temperature can be carefully controlled. "But then the operator has to be cautious about getting too close to the machine, because the body temperature of a man standing alongside the lathe can create distortions."

The machine must also be isolated from outside and inside vibration. "Otherwise someone sneezing in the same room with the lathe or a truck driving through the parking lot outside would affect the cut, causing irregularities in the mirror's surface," said Friday.





Argentine plane picks up rocket launchers here

Redstone missiles and rockets go to U.S. soldiers and friendly countries around the world, but since Redstone's forte is missile management, not manufacturing, customers don't come here to pick up hardware.

Until recently.

A sleek 707, painted silver and white with a blue stripe and with bold, black letters in the fuselage spelling out "Argentina Air Force," landed at Redstone Army Airfield Wednesday. It took on a cargo of 2.75 rocket launchers and departed that afternoon for Buenos Aires.

The rocket launchers, built by AC Inc. in Huntsville under contract to MIRADCOM, were delivered to the Argentinians by MIRADCOM's 2.75 Project Office. The Navy-developed, 19-tube launchers are designed for use from jet aircraft.

The 2.75 Project Office not only manages the Army's program but manages procurement, production and delivery of all 2.75 inch rocket components for the Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps as well.

Don Askins, a 2.75 production specialist responsible for launcher delivery, said the military sales contract called for the launchers to be delivered by Wednesday. Since time was running out, the 2.75 Project Office and Redstone Airfield arranged for the equipment to be picked up at the airfield.


Converted for cargo hauling, the 707 and its crew flew here Wednesday morning from Kelly Air Force Base at San Antonio, Texas. The plane departed Redstone shortly after 5 p.m., enroute to Dobbins Air Force Base, Marietta, Ga., where it was to refuel for the return trip to Buenos Aires.



Redstone duo has flying fever

Tom Wilkinson and Charlie H. Laney, Jr. have had the flying fever for as far back as they can remember. Flying had all the elements necessary to fascinate two boys growing up in the '20s: novelty, adventure, and—Lindberg!

"I was about fourteen when he (Lindberg) flew," said Wilkinson. "Back then a plane was so rare that people used to run out of the house to look when they heard one overhead."

Laney also remembers Lindberg, who was his idol. He used to go out to a nearby airfield on Sunday afternoons.

"I would wash planes all day with a mop and a bucket, just for the chance of a five-minute ride at the end of the day," he said.

Both men now work as industrial specialists in the same office of MIRCOM Production and Procurement.

Both still have an interest in aviation—old and new. They willingly talk about the past.

They build planes too

Almost as early as their interest in flying itself came an interest in building planes. Laney used wings from a Curtis JN2 ("Jenny") to build a glider. The "Jenny" was a plane used for training pilots during WWI and later for barnstorming.

Wilkinson also built gliders. The first he made with two friends. It was an open fuselage biplane, and its wings were braced with clothesline wire and turnbuckles.

Wilkinson, being the lightest, "piloted" the plane — the first flight lasted only a matter of minutes before the plane wrecked.

Wilkinson went on to get professional flight training in 1935.

"The first thing I remember noticing when I started taking instruction was the size of the field," he said. "I thought, 'You mean we have to land in that little thing?'"

Laney agreed that at first the field looked like "a postage stamp."

Laney couldn't get a license for many years because pilots were required to have 20-20 vision.

"I had caught a baseball in my left eye when I was a kid," he said, "and I couldn't pass the test. So I flew under a student's permit for years."

A student's permit allows you to fly without a license as long as you have no passengers.

Neither man ever got more than a private license. Wilkinson operated a private commercial airport as a sideline for a time, but said his real interest was always in "the fun side" of flying.

Laney's only "professional" job as a pilot is as Safety Officer for the arsenal Flying Club. He makes sure that the airplanes are up to standard, investigates any accidents and conducts regular safety sessions for club members and interested people.

Both men are members of the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), a world-wide organization of homebuilders of aircraft.

Laney is building a plane that he calls "an over-sized model airplane." The plane has a wing span of 22 feet, a Volkswagen engine, a constant speed propeller and retractable landing gear.

Its fuselage is made of plywood and spruce, but the rest is made of styrofoam covered with fiberglass.

Laney says the plane will reach a 200 mph speed and cruise at 180.

Wilkinson is also building a plane of his own design, a detachable portion of which will be capable of road travel.

They talk about the planes they are building, and old planes they built or rebuilt . . . But flying for them is not all nostalgia and mechanics.

They say the important thing about flying is the experience of pilot and plane working together, and the thrill of doing something different, which requires new skills and provides a break from the routine.

"It's a wonderful feeling," said Wilkinson.

Coworkers also fly

Two of Wilkinson's and Laney's coworkers — members of the same office in P&P — share that feeling, for they too are licensed pilots.

Sam Tona served in the Air Force during World War II, as did Frank Wright in the Naval Air Force. Tona got his charter commercial and instructor's license in 1947, and has worked off and on as a commercial pilot and flight and instrument instructor. Laney called him "one of the most competent pilots I've ever flown with . . . When he steps into that airplane, he becomes a piece of it." Tona was staff pilot for NASA and was Dr. Werner Von Braun's pilot for several years.

Wright has the most varied qualifications of the four men. He worked in maintenance quality and service engineering on both conventional and jet aircraft during his sixteen-year hitch with the Air Force. He has a commercial license and also an Aircraft and Power Plant license, which means he is qualified to work on both the aircraft itself and its engines.

He also has a Pilot Instructor's License and is a rated instructor at the Redstone Arsenal Flying Club.

Flu shots on way to soldiers

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Soldiers will be immunized against three different types of flu viruses during the Army's annual influenza immunization program to be conducted during October and November, according to a DA official.

Following the recommendations of the Armed Forces Epidemiological Board (AFEB) two flu vaccines are being obtained

for administration to military personnel.

Basic trainees will receive both shots, a vaccine against 'A type USSR' virus and another three-in-one vaccine against A type USSR, A type Texas, and B type Hong Kong. All other soldiers will receive a single shot of the three-in-one vaccine.

Dependents, civilian employees, and other non-military beneficiaries will

receive vaccines as recommended by the U. S. Public Health Service (USPHS) for the general public.

The USPHS recommendations are: individuals 26 years or age and older will be encouraged to receive the 'A and B type' vaccine; for those 13 to 25 years of age two doses of a different 'A and B type' vaccine. No recommendations have been made as to dosage for individuals under the age of 13 years.

The 'A type USSR' vaccine is now being distributed to the field and administration to basic trainees will begin soon. The 'A type USSR - A type Texas - B type Hong Kong' vaccine is scheduled for delivery late this month and use will begin in October.

Chamber of Commerce sponsored Special Children's Day at the Northeast Alabama State Fair.



Dove season at Redstone opens Saturday

Hunting returns to Redstone Arsenal Sept. 16 at noon when the dove season opens throughout Alabama. State authorities meantime have announced regulations for the upcoming waterfowl season and the third of the four scheduled orientations for prospective arsenal hunters comes this weekend.

Doves become legal game at noon Saturday. The limit is 12. Arsenal hunters must have a valid state license and arsenal hunting permit in possession. They must also have attended a hunter orientation.

Two orientations have been held so far. The next one will be at 1 p.m. Sept. 17 at the Outdoor Recreation Center. A final session has been scheduled for Oct. 7.

State officials last week announced duck season dates and bag limits. Duck hunters will have a 50 day season beginning Dec. 2 and running through Jan. 20, five more days than last year.

As usual, the state will use the 100 point limit on daily bag. The point total for drake mallards has been upped from 25 last year to 35 this season. That means hunters can take only three a day.


American widgeon, known locally as baldpates, have been dropped to 10 point ducks, however, raising the possibility of a 10 duck day for arsenal hunters who can pick their ducks. Mallards, gadwalls and baldpates comprise the majority of ducks shot on post. Gadwall, too, are 10 pointers.

The points on ducks this year line up like this:

- 100 points — canvasback.
- 70 points — hen mallard, black duck,

wood duck and red head.
 35 points — drake mallard
 10 points — all teal, gadwall, shoveler, scaup, pintail, widgeon.
 Shooting time runs from one half hour

before sunrise to sunset each day.
 A special eight day season for teal only opens Sept. 17. The limit is four a day and shooting time runs from sunrise until sunset.

Soldier becomes world champion woman parachutist

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Sergeant Cheryl Stearns became the womens world champion in sport parachuting today at the World Parachuting Championships in Zagreb, Yugoslavia.

She took first place in the overall women's style and accuracy competition with jumpers representing East Germany placing second and the Soviet Union placing third.

Stearns placed first in the individual style event and in addition to winning she bettered a world record she set in June of this year at the U.S. National Competition in Richmond, Ind.

In the individual accuracy event, Stearns took second place, following Jackie Smith of Great Britain, a former member of the British Army's parachute team.

Stearns, currently the world record holder for women's day accuracy-landings, is also the reigning U.S. national women's champion in the sport.

Stearns earned her first world title last year in competition with women parachutists from the USSR. In the competition she made 19 consecutive dead-center landings on a four-inch disk.

A long time athlete and former Arizona State University tennis champion, Stearns is the first woman ever assigned as a competitor on the Golden Knights, the Army's parachute team.

She joined the Army in February 1977, and was honor graduate of her class at the Airborne School at Ft. Benning, Ga.

Monetary goal set for CFC

For the first time in over a decade a monetary goal has been established for this fall's fund raising effort within the Huntsville Area Federal community.

Lee Watson, Area Coordinator for the 1979 Combined Federal Campaign, said the six-week solicitation will seek to raise \$575,000 in cash gifts and payroll deduction pledges.

The drive at Redstone and throughout the local area gets underway with the traditional Kickoff Rally at the Rocket Auditorium on Monday, September 25. It brings together some 16,000 military and civilian personnel of 24 participating agencies for their annual fund raising for charity drive.

Their contributions to support the charitable work of nearly a hundred local, national and international health and social welfare agencies have exceeded \$500,000 for the past eight years.

Watson said the goal for the 1979 drive is approximately \$37,000 over last year's final contribution. However, he added, the Huntsville area raised over \$570,000 in 1971 and in 1972 when the six-week solicitation netted a record contribution of \$575,243.

He pointed out last year 91 percent of the 15,750 Federal employees in the area contributed to the drive with their donations totaling \$538,727. Their contributions averaged \$37.49 per donor.

From this amount, the United Way of Huntsville and Madison County received \$371,603 and another \$91,758 went to the National Health Agencies. The International Service Agencies received \$15,869 and the remaining \$59,496 was

distributed to the United Way drives in 16 Alabama and Tennessee communities.

"We are asking every person to study the campaign objectives carefully, and then

contribute their own personal Fair Share," Watson exclaimed. This has been a winning formula in past years and one that will boost the final contribution well past the pre-campaign goal, he added.


