COMBINED FEDERAL CAMPAIGN



CFC begins here Monday with rally

Major General Louis Rachmeler will be the featured speaker on Monday morning, Sept. 25, when the 1979 Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) in the Huntsville Area kicks off with a 9:00 a.m. rally at the Rocket Auditorium.

The MIRCOM Commander's remarks will highlight the opening of the annual fund raising drive among the military and civilian personnel of 24 Federal agencies at Redstone and throughout the local community.

Joining him in speaking roles will be representatives of the principal recipient agencies and Bobby Harnage, the Fifth District vice-president, American Federation of Government Employees.

Program chairman Frank DuVall said the band and ROTC color guard from Lee High School will open the festivities and the rally will close with the official CFC film that features James Whitmore this year.

Hundreds of campaign officials and workers will hear General Rachmeler set the theme for the drive being conducted through November 3. He will outline the campaign goal and objectives stressing

\$3 million in contracts awarded for anti-tank Assault Breaker

The Army Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM) has awarded approximately \$3 million in contracts to eight firms for research and technology demonstrations on a proposed new Army anti-tank concept called Assault Breaker.

Assault Breaker technology will be applicable to a long-range delivery system that can strike deep into enemy territory and knock out massed tanks and heavy armor. As the delivery system — presumably a missile — approaches the armor it will dispense several submunitions that will be guided independently to their targets.

The technology demonstration, sponsored jointly by the Army and Advanced Research Projects Agency, is focusing on the terminal portion of the program commencing with submunition dispersal. The eight firms will develop and demonstrate missile dispensing systems, seekers, air frames, submunitions and bomblets, and study cost effective delivery systems for the smart munitions.

Companies receiving the MIRADCOM contracts, which have a potential value of approximately \$15 million are:

Boeing Aerospace, Seattle, Wash., approximately \$982,000; Martin Marietta Aerospace, Orlando, Fla., \$952,000; Hughes Aircraft, Canoga Park, Calif., \$150,000; Vought Corp., Dallas, Tex., \$150,000; General Dynamics, Pomona, Calif., \$200,000; Physics International, San Leandro, Calif., \$74,000; Science Applications, Inc., Huntsville Division, \$100,000; AVCO Research and Systems Group, Wilmington, Mass., \$50,000.

Following the technology demonstration, MIRADCOM will select one or more contractors for more advanced development of Assault Breaker.

MIRADCOM's Advanced Systems Concepts Office, headed by Col. Charles Cranford, Jr., has primary program responsibility for Assault Breaker, which will be heavily supported by MIRADCOM's Technology Laboratory. Dr. Don McDaniel of ASCO is program manager and John French, Advanced Sensors Laboratory, is technical director.

Negotiating the contract for the Army was MIRADCOM's Procurement and Production Directorate, headed by Lt. Col. Bobby Hiland. William Sevey was the contracting officer.

"Slob" hunters ruin environment and sport



Unless there is some truth in a tale old hunters tell here — that once upon a time a red-haired lieutenant was mistaken for a fox squirrel and shot in the head — there has never been an instance that anyone can recall of an arsenal hunter being seriously injured by a firearm.

This record is rather remarkable, in that Redstone has been a prime hunting area for more than 20 years, with more than 12,000 hunters fielded in a single season in some years. It no doubt reflects the strong safety and enforcement programs carried out by the game warden and outdoor recreation staffs, but more than anything is attributable to the caring and good sense of the great majority of those who hunt on the arsenal.

But sadly, there are fools with guns blundering around in the woods, a tiny minority — referred to as "slob hunters" by the hunting fraternity — who stand to be the undoing of the great number of responsible hunters. On the arsenal, these slob hunters don't appear to have gone so far as to shoot at people, but there have been instances of them taking pot shots at just about everything else.

The slob hunter's malicious bent does not begin and end with his firearm. He works in other ways to harm the environment, public and private property and the reputations of responsible hunters, a case in point being the use of an off-the-road vehicle to tear up terrain, tear down fences and chase cows.

Increasingly, hunters find themselves not welcomed by property owners, their territory becoming ever more restricted because of the actions of the irresponsible few. And it is truly regrettable, for there is probably no group that has devoted more time, money and effort to the conservation and protection of natural resources for the benefit and enjoyment of all.

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Stillwell speech urges Asian defense

Gen. Richard G. Stillwell, U.S. Army, retired, stressed the need for American awareness of the importance of helping to defend northeast Asia in a speech to the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U.S. Army last week.

Stillwell is a former Army Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans and Operations and is now a Senior Advisory Consultant to the Strategic Studies Center, Stanford Research Institute.

"Few Americans appreciate that, in an economic sense, Asia today is more important than Western Europe," said Stillwell.

Japan, the Republic of China and Korea are all of economic importance to the United States, he said, but are dependent on U.S. military support for survival. According to Stillwell, the adequacy of that support is lessening because of this country's increasing emphasis on Europe in its defense policy.

"Our preoccupation with Europe is obscuring our understanding that there are parallel changes and challenges afoot in Asia," said Stillwell.

Stillwell cited the vulnerability of the Republic of China, which remains free

only by U.S. forces and recognition. He noted that the People's Republic of China has made withdrawal of U.S. support for the Republic of China a condition for entering into full diplomatic relations with the U.S., and said it would be "unconscionable" to meet that condition.

South Korea faces a grave danger from their northern neighbor, said Stillwell. North Korea "has developed armed forces which, despite the inferior population and economy, outguns South Korea in every category," he said, adding that it keeps those forces in attack positions so they can cross the demilitarized zone on short notice.

Stillwell said that only the U.S. military

presence in South Korea prevents a war there, and if those troops withdraw "any war in South Korea will be a tragedy beyond comprehension."

Japan, said Stillwell, is "an economic colossus and a military midget." It is vulnerable to both air and sea attack from Communist forces and lacks a central military command or a national security act, he said.


Stillwell said that Japan should develop a military might comparable to its economic power, but in relation to U.S. desires. And, he said, Japan feels that the freedom of South Korea and the Republic of China is vital to its own survival.



Pershing instrumentation van hosted by Depot

For the second year in a row, the historic Memphis and Charleston Depot has hosted an instrumentation van being used to conduct tests on the Pershing II Weapon System.

The instrumentation van is being used to measure critical flight parameters of PERSHING's terminally guided reentry vehicle. The van is furnished and staffed by

White Sands Missile Range, N.M. Measurements are taken as the reentry vehicle is flown in a simulated ballistic trajectory while attached to an FJ4B aircraft formerly owned by the Navy. The aircraft is now owned and operated by Flight Systems Incorporated, Newport Beach, Cal.

The depot, now known as the Huntsville

Depot and owned by the city, was built in 1860 as headquarters for the Memphis and Charleston's Eastern Division. The city of Huntsville is completing the first part of a three-part program to convert the depot and surrounding property into a museum of commerce and industry in the North Alabama area.

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
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TWO MILLION MILES BETWEEN THEM


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OWC chairmen picked for Annual Charity Ball

Betty Ragano's comment is typical of the things people say about the Red Cross Volunteers.

The volunteers are of all ages, backgrounds, and sexes. They work everywhere from the Field Director's office to the hospital.

Some work because they want to keep busy some find the work especially interesting, some just want to help people. They may work once every two weeks or nearly every day.

Red Cross volunteers go through an orientation program and then decide which area they would like to work in. Some areas, such as the Dental Clinic, require a second orientation. Some, like the Hospital, make further training possible on the job.

Joy Brown is in charge of the hospital volunteers. Her administrative assistant is retired Colonel James Nabors.

Nabors said he became interested in joining the volunteers after he retired. He has only been working with them for a few months, but enjoys it very much.

"After many years in the Army, receiving Red Cross benefits, I thought maybe I could do something," he said.

Nabors works in the hospital's Red Cross Volunteer Office. He sets up orientations for new volunteers, finds out where they want to work, and helps to set up work schedules.

Nabors said it was unusual for a man to be a volunteer, but that he had inquired about the possibility through the Retired Officer's Association. After he became a volunteer, other men became interested, too, he added.

Vols work wards too

Pearl Elser also has been with the volunteers for less than a year. She became interested in the work after a stay as a patient in the hospital.

Elser does mostly administrative work, either at the Medical Surgical Ward or as a receptionist at the Central Appointments Desk.

When working at the Medical Surgical Ward, she may also take patients to radiology, or run hospital errands, such as picking up records or delivering specimens.

"Working at the hospital is very rewarding," she said.

She also complimented the hospital staff, saying that everyone was concerned about the patients and willing to spend time with them.

"This is definitely not an assembly-line operation," she said.

Mary Ferguson has been with the volunteers for fourteen years. She now works either at the Family Practice Clinic or at the Orthopedic Clinic.

In both clinics she screens the patients when they arrive and may also check their vital signs. She also takes the patients to an examination room and sometimes assists the doctor.

Both Ferguson and Elser said that they received some on-the-job training after arriving at the hospital.

Ferguson said she had done volunteer work for the American Cancer Society before moving to Huntsville, where her late husband worked for Boeing.

"The whole family used the medical facility, and I just felt that was where I belonged," she said.

One of the places where volunteers are most frequently seen is at the Bloodmobile. There are many jobs for the volunteers there — registering the donors, taking temperatures, preparing the bags, and handing out refreshments at the canteen.

Carolyn Stogner has been working at the Bloodmobile for about two years.

"I was already working at the school (the Madison High School Clinic)," she said.

"One day a friend of mine and I saw the Bloodmobile and I said, 'That looks interesting to work on.'

"Before I knew it, one of the girls grabbed me and said, 'Come on, you're the one we need.'"

Marion Webber agreed with Stogner.

"It's interesting," she said. "I've worked on several Bloodmobiles. I like to keep busy."

One of the areas where more volunteers are needed is at the Dental Clinic. Bonnie Jarvis likes her job there.

"I got interested in being a volunteer when all my children were in school," she said.

"I didn't want a full-time job, but I thought this would be interesting."

Jarvis prepares the instruments for different procedures, greets and seats the patient, prepares the different filling mixtures and also assists the dentist.

"It really IS an interesting job," she said.

"There is so much to learn. Every procedure is different."

One of the places where volunteers are appreciated most is in the office of Field Director Leo Kirk. Every day a volunteer comes in to assist in the office.

The office volunteers have become known

as "Leo's Angels." Kirk thinks they are all wonderful.

"We couldn't get along without them," he said.

"But then all the volunteers are good. I've been with Red Cross for twenty-five years and I could tell you the name of every volunteer I ever worked with.

"You may forget some of the professional people who worked with you," he added, "but you never forget those volunteers."

Bill Ray, who will replace Kirk in November, agreed.

"Volunteers ARE the Red Cross," he said.

Red Cross directors face new challenges

Leo Kirk and Bill Ray form a mutual admiration society. Kirk is Redstone's current Red Cross Field Director, but Ray will replace him when Kirk leaves for Turkey on November 3.

The directors have two things in common — years of experience and a cheerful outlook.

Just what does a Red Cross field director do? According to Kirk and Ray, the director's primary responsibility is servicing his client, all active duty personnel.

The field director handles communications between servicemen and their dependents, provides financial assistance, arranges emergency leave, and provides counseling. He may also help a serviceman with a problem to obtain a reassignment or a hardship discharge.

Civilians may also be helped if they are dependents of servicemen or in case of an emergency need for blood.

The Redstone Field Director's Office usually handles about 170 cases a month, though that figure has lessened recently.

Field directors overseas often face higher case loads. Overseas directors are responsible for civilian as well as the military population. Also, servicemen overseas are more likely to have problems, because of the new environment and the distance from home.

Kirk faces a challenging re-assignment in Turkey. He will be the only field director in the entire country, and will handle 350-400 cases a month.

"I hear they're working eighteen-hour days over there," he said. "But I'll be glad to keep busy — it will keep me from missing my family."

Ray has just returned from assignment in Germany. A native of Birmingham, he is glad to see Alabama again.


"I've been all around the world since '43," he said. "I've seen lots of states and countries, but I still think Alabama is the prettiest."

Ray is also pleased with the arsenal's Red Cross program.

"I'm excited about being here because the volunteer program is outstanding — in fact, I heard a great deal about it before I got here.

"Also, the commanders here indicate a great knowledge of Red Cross and its workings."

replacement, Kirk said he didn't think Ray needed any.

"It's not as if he were a beginner," Kirk said. "He knows the ropes. He came from the 'mill' over there in Germany — it IS a mill because of the density of troops."

Kirk also said that Ray could bring some extra knowledge to the job.

"I'm looking forward to a nice long stay here and lots of co-operation," he added.



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

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
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
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
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
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
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


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515th Ordnance Company joins MMCS School Brigade

payroll deductions, fair share giving and designated gifts.

General Rachmeler, who is Area Chairman for the 1979 CFC, will call on the individual workers to conduct a thorough person-to-person solicitation asking each person in their assigned area to become a part of this great appeal.

The drive this fall seeks to raise \$575,000 from the almost 16,000 Federal personnel in the area. The funds will be distributed to nearly a hundred local, national and international health and social welfare agencies.

The Huntsville area has passed the half million dollar mark in overall contributions for the past eight years with the final tally in the drive a year ago being \$538,727. The United Way of Madison County received \$371,603 and \$59,496 was designated for the fund raising agencies in 16 Alabama and Tennessee communities.

For small game—that includes dove—the


