## MPs go after drunk drivers

Driving while intoxicated is like playing Russian Roulette: you may escape unscathed a few times, but eventually luck will turn against you. At best you may lose your license, at worst you may lose your life.

And it is not just to yourself you are a danger. According to the National Safety Council, alcohol is a factor in one-half of all traffic fatalities, resulting in about 55,000 deaths each year. From 1961 to 1971 six times as many people were killed by drunken drivers as were killed by the enemy during the Viet Nam War.

Here at Redstone DWI arrests have risen markedly in the first few months of 1979. In all of 1978 there were 87 arrests. Already this year there have been 51. And the penalties for driving while intoxicated on the arsenal are just as stiff, if not stiffer, as Alabama's.

According to Capt. Jesse Crider of the Provost Marshal's Office, there are three categories of intoxication as determined by

blood alcohol content: .00 to .04 the suspect is automatically considered by the courts as not intoxicated; .05 to .09 events preceding arrest will determine whether suspect is convicted of DWI (events such as an accident, running a stop sign, etc); .10 and above the suspect is presumed intoxicated by the court.

Crider said: "Anybody with a blood alcohol content over .05 is automatically booked."

Although there are a number of charts that give a rough indication of how much you can drink before becoming legally intoxicated, Crider said these aren't very reliable. Besides body weight and the amount of alcohol consumed, there are some factors the charts don't take into consideration, such as your body metabolism, amount of food in your stomach, and how tired you are. Your body metabolizes one drink every 30 to 90 minutes. so if you drink, know your limit.

## Pact paves way for reorganizing

Union and management officials have agreed to combine competitive areas for professional employees in MIRCOC and MIRADCOM effective July 1.

The action clears the way for the U.S. Army Missile Command to start operating that day with but two competitive areas, one for RASA, the other for all other civilian workers of MIRCOC and MIRADCOM.

The two existing commands are to be merged into MICOM with all people and functions on July 1.

Last week Robert Fletcher, president of Local 1858, AFGE; Maj. Gen. Louis Rachmeler, commander of MIRCOC, and Col. David Smith, deputy commander of MIRADCOM; signed a memo of agreement to put the two professional units together. The step was necessary because a contract signed March 30 covering professionals in both commands had stipulated separate competitive areas for both for the two year term of the agreement.

Civilian Personnel Division plans to use transfer of function procedures to move all civilian workers of MIRADCOM and MIRCOC — less RASA — into MICOM effective July 1.

## Inflation forces chow changes

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Soldiers will soon be seeing less beef and more poultry, pork and cheese in Army dining facilities.

Over the next 18 months, DoD will be cutting its beef purchases by about 25 percent, DoD officials announced recently. The savings will be used to buy more moderately priced menu items.

Substituting items such as poultry and pork will account for 14 percent of the reduction and using 20 percent soy-extended ground beef will account for the remaining 11 percent, officials said.

Red salmon will also disappear from army menus as DoD plans to eliminate the 1979 procurement and reduce the amount purchased in FY 80 by 80 percent, officials added.

The purchase of raisins will also be reduced by about one million pounds, officials said.

DoD's beef cutback is part of a plan to combat spiraling food prices by limiting government purchases of high-priced food items, officials explained.

The use of substitutes for beef and high cost menu items will be monitored, officials said.

## Marrying to escape barracks

Why do young junior enlisted soldiers get married? There's a variety of answers to this question, but I think the biggest influence on early marriages is barracks life.

Most unmarried soldiers live in the barracks, which isn't always pleasant — constant noise, no privacy, GI parties, inspections and other numerous disadvantages. The troops are always looking for a way out, an escape. It would be like a dream come true for any young soldier to have a place of his own. The problem is they just can't afford it. Between paying the rent, gas, utility bills and other numerous expenses a junior enlisted paycheck doesn't go far.

This leaves the idea of moving off-post impossible — unless of course marriage is involved. Most young individuals are

energetic, active and definitely not ready to settle down. But to a soldier trying to find a way out of the barracks, marriage doesn't sound like a bad deal.

Having your own home can be nice. You can actually watch TV when you want without being drowned out by the disco music at the end of the hall. And a nice home cooked meal when you want would be great. It definitely beats the long, noisy lines in a mess. Waking up in the morning to breakfast without worrying about getting details done is another advantage to living off-post. Then of course there's the peacefulness and privacy of your own home.

Living off-post would be terrific, but it's a shame many troops rush into marriage just to experience these advantages. To avoid

this problem, I think a single soldier should be able to collect separate rations and BAQ if he wishes. Why shouldn't a single soldier be able to collect the same benefits as a married troop? Is there some difference in the single troop's performance? Do civilians pay you more if you are married? To both questions the answer is no.

I'm not saying that single soldiers residing in the barracks should receive separate rations and BAQ, but if an unmarried trooper is living off-post he should receive more pay. Why should single soldiers suffer? Remember, if the army wanted you to have a wife, they would have issued one.

### Rocket solves energy crisis?

On the traditional Armed Forces Day, third Saturday in May, the Arsenal will participate with the National Guard in a display of Army missiles at the guard facility on Johnson Road West of the old city airport. The Guard will be commemorating its 20th anniversary in Huntsville. Soldiers of the Missile and Munitions Center and School will place the missiles and stand by to talk to the public about them.

## President nominates new Army Chief

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Lieutenant General Edward C. Meyer has been nominated for assignment as the next Chief of Staff, United States Army, and for appointment to the rank of general, President Carter announced last week.

Meyer will succeed Gen. Bernard W. Rogers, who has been named Supreme Allied Commander, Europe. Currently, Meyer is the Army Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans (DCSOPS), Washington, D.C. and Senior Army Representative, Military Staff Committee, United Nations, New York.

Last month Meyer had been selected to replace retiring Gen. George S. Blanchard

as Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Army Europe and Seventh Army.

Born in St. Marys, Pa., December 11, 1928, Meyer graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1951 and was commissioned an infantry officer. He holds a B.S. in military engineering and an M.S. in international affairs from George Washington University.

During his 27 years of service, Meyer has served as an Infantry Company Commander, Commanding Officer, 2d Battalion, 5th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division (AM), Federal Executive Fellow at Brookings Institute, Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, United States Army Europe and Seventh Army, and Commanding General, 3rd Infantry Division (Mechanized), USAREUR.






**What do you feel is the most serious law enforcement problem at Redstone Arsenal?**

**Pvt. James Mazzoquette, 8th S.C.** — "I've been here since January and I haven't seen any serious law enforcement problems."





# MP sergeant readies for OCS

On June 3, the Army will lose an enlisted man but hopefully gain an officer. That is, if things go as planned when Sgt. Charles Coram of Redstone's 291st MP Company enters the Officers Candidate School (OCS) at Fort Benning, Georgia.

Coram said his interest in applying was kindled by the encouragement of his platoon leader, 2nd Lt. Patricia McDaniel. She

supplied the motivation and he went on to apply to the school following AR 351-5, which describes policy concerning selection of personnel for attendance at an Active Army Officer Candidate School.

To apply, Coram filled out DA form 61, a detailed personal history, took a standard OCS test and a physical training test, and went through a number of personal interviews. His final interview with three OCS officers lasted more than an hour with questions focusing on theoretical MP situations and Coram's personal opinions.

After the candidate is approved by a screening committee at DARCOM, DA makes the final selection.

### Hardest part

Coram believes that the "hardest part is being selected because it's out of your hands." He has served in the Army four years and has an associate degree in criminal justice. The Panama City, Fla. native hopes to earn his bachelors degree in either criminal justice or business.

"Everyone I had to deal with was real responsive to it (applying for OCS)," Coram

said. "It helps to have that type of leadership."

On June 3, Coram will begin 14 weeks of OCS training at Ft. Benning. He expects the

physical training to be strenuous and is preparing himself by running daily, planning to be running ten miles a day by the time he begins school. He's heard talk of the mental pressures of OCS but said, "the stories you hear are worse than the actual experience."

After OCS, Coram hopes to attend a three-week jump school, and a 14-week MP Officer Development Course. He would eventually like to be an MP officer but said "it's up to the Army."

Also entering OCS's 150-member class with Coram will be two female soldiers from Redstone — Sp4 Christine Miller, 6th Student Company, MMCS, and Sp4 Melissa Nichols, MEDDAC. They will be among 18 females in the class.

"Anyone contemplating applying to OCS shouldn't hesitate," said Coram. In 1978, 14 persons from Redstone applied to the school and eight were selected to attend.

# AWOL apprehenders find work exciting

Once or twice a week, the team of SSgt. Thomas Riley and one assistant are on the trail of a soldier who is absent without leave, or has deserted his duty post. The distinction between the two is that soldiers absent for up to 30 days are considered to be AWOL. After that, they are categorized as deserters.

Redstone's AWOL apprehension team is responsible for tracking down men from all services who have gone AWOL in Madison County, geographically the smallest apprehension area in the United States. The soldiers usually are not stationed at Redstone, but hail from posts throughout the country. Most have one thing in common—they call this home.

Often the team is notified of the problem by the absent soldier's post, but Riley said that "many will come in here and turn themselves in." Sometimes, they are tipped off when a girlfriend or concerned parent will call to see if the soldier is legally absent.


"They'll (soldiers) tell them that they are on a special pass, and the parents are suspicious," Riley said. After checking with Riley and finding out that their son, boyfriend or girlfriend is indeed AWOL, "they'll bring him in, he'll get a ticket, and go back." Riley said once an ex-mother-in-law turned in her soldier ex-son-in-law, angry that he was not supporting his child. She even supplied a picture to make the MP's work easier. One person employed at NASA was found to be AWOL from the Marine Corps for over a year.

"Lots have the misconception that if they go AWOL two or three times, the Army will discharge them" Riley said. "and that's just not true." He said various problems will lead to the soldier's departure.

"Most are just uninformed. They don't get along with their platoon sergeant, or have a personal problem that no one will listen to," Riley said. "They'll go AWOL to try to solve that problem, go home, and that usually won't help. We talk to them and try to find out why they left.

"Homesickness is a big problem, bigger than most people would imagine. Mama encourages them to come home. She doesn't

realize that when they're in the Army, they can't do that," Riley said. Other reasons for going AWOL include financial problems and sickness in the family.

"We get all kinds of excuses," Riley said.

### Ruined pants

Riley calls his work the "most exciting" of all MP work. As a rule, he said, the soldiers he apprehends are "not violent, they don't fight." However, he did admit that he's "ruined a couple pair of pants chasing some down" and there have been times when he's found his suspects hiding under beds, in closets and sneaking out the back door. As a precaution police cover all entrances when they approach a home. In one case an AWOL soldier would even go into the woods to hide from police after being tipped off by his sister that they were coming to get him.

Riley does not consider his work any more dangerous than any other part of police business, and often chooses not to carry a weapon when apprehending an AWOL

soldier, believing that could make them hostile.

"We treat them with dignity and try to avoid public apprehensions," Riley said. "We try not to embarrass the person.

Because of the all-volunteer Army, there are "fewer AWOL's now," Riley said, "but of the ones we get, there are more repeaters." He said soldiers who go AWOL tend to be young and new to the service, usually in their first hitch.

"They seem to be easier to catch now," Riley said, "or maybe I'm just getting more experienced at it."

# Precautions help thwart office thieves

Take a close look at an average office. There's an open jar by the coffee pot with the coffee fund money in it. Joe went to a meeting and left his calculator on his desk. Mary's arthritis is acting up again, so she's taken her wedding ring off and put it in an unlocked drawer. Alice spilled coffee on her desk and went out to get paper towels to wipe it up — leaving her purse in full view, on top of her desk.

These items — the coffee fund money, the calculator, the ring, the purse — are all invitations to a thief. You may think your office is immune, but chances are it isn't. It only takes a few seconds when the office is empty or backs are turned for a thief to pocket a small item.

Most office thefts are thefts of opportunity, according to Capt. Jesse Crider of Internal Security. They're not planned in advance and the thieves are almost impossible to identify.

"People work out here at all hours, Crider said. "If you're going to be gone, you shouldn't leave things out or in just an unlocked drawer."

Even when an office is fully manned, a thief can often come and go unnoticed.

"You would be surprised how little people notice," Crider said. "If you see a stranger in the office, you should find out what his business is. Don't just let people wander around."

## Few reported

There are not very many reported thefts from offices. Since this January, 25 thefts of personal property and 12 of government property have been reported to the Military Police.

Crider said that there are probably more thefts of personal property which go unreported because the victims think reporting the theft won't do any good. Theft of government property are usually reported because someone was held accountable for the item. Fewer government items are stolen because people are more careful if something is signed out to them, Crider said.

Most government property taken is like personal property stolen — small and portable.

A few times a year, however, some large item — such as a typewriter — is taken.

This kind of theft is not a theft of opportunity, but a planned theft, according to Crider.

"The person who takes something like a typewriter is someone who has been in your office, has seen the item, and has a way to transport it," Crider said.

Even with a planned theft, catching the culprit is hard.

"The chances of catching someone are minute," Crider said. "Even if you have suspects, being able to prove it is virtually impossible."

The only way to stop office thefts, Crider emphasized, is through prevention. Keep your eyes open when you're at work and lock up valuables, or take them with you, when you leave. Put an identification number on an item to prove it's yours.

"The individual is responsible for his property," Crider said.

"He just has to stop and think."

# Troops urged to deter theft by marking valuables

After three months of recording a remarkably low incidence of barracks larceny, Redstone Arsenal is returning to higher, but more normal rates.

And although many cases will go unsolved, the reason for the rise is no mystery to the arsenal's law enforcement people. Both Ray Clift, chief of the Military Police Investigation Section and SSgt Thomas Riley, crime prevention NCO, agree that the increase is due mostly to a reduced level of watchfulness on the part of the victims.

They explained that, in most instances, larceny is a crime of opportunity. The cash or property that is taken is left unattended by the owner and someone, perhaps a total stranger or perhaps a friend, takes it.

They say the low statistics for the first three months of the year are directly attributable to a meeting between the Provost Marshall, Lt. Col. Terris C. Lewis and the arsenal's battalion commanders. The resulting command emphasis on preventing the thefts increased the individual efforts people made to secure their valuables. The potential thieves had fewer opportunities to steal.

However, according to Clift, many of the soldiers who were here when the drive began have left. And since the "newness" of the drive has worn off, so has some of the

attention paid to it. His statistics show that in December, 28 larcenies were reported. That figure dropped to 11 in February. But in April that figure climbed back to 23.

Investigator Doug Timms noted several of the most persistent obstacles to solving these crimes. "Delays in reporting the larceny hurt our solve-rate most. Rapid investigation is most essential to these crimes, but too often they are discovered in the morning and not reported until after the soldier gets back from school or off duty for the day. By then there's no telling who might have been in the area and disturbed it."

He said the second biggest problem is people's reluctance to give information. "Many times I feel that someone has the information I need, but they're withholding it — either because they don't think it's important or they don't want to implicate someone."


Clift interjected, "If someone even suspects they know something that might help us, but they're not sure or they don't want to get involved, there's no reason for them not to give us a phone call. Anonymous tips are fine with us."

Timms said their third problem is related to the nature of the crime. Being a crime of opportunity, larceny is often scattered and sporadic. He said it isn't unusual for the locations to range from the troop area, to the south side of post and back to the housing area. He said, "If we have a rash of crimes in one area we usually catch someone fairly quickly. They make too many mistakes."

Riley said that prevention of larcenies is basically a matter of education and common sense. "I give a class to all incoming personnel of School Brigade on a weekly basis and Special Troops on a monthly basis."

His class highlights the importance of securing valuables, even if they are to be left for only a short time. He said, "The locks on your door and wall locker won't stop anyone if they're not used."

He suggests that high value possessions such as stereo equipment be marked with the owner's drivers license number because it can be traced more quickly than social security numbers. "They should be marked in two places — one obvious, to deter the thieves, and one hidden."





He added that a written description of the items, including its dimensions and the location of its markings should be recorded and kept.

He also advises the soldiers not to advertise the fact that they have high value property or large sums of cash. One of the problems with larceny is, he said, "You just don't know who to trust."

The investigators added an interesting sidelight to this. They reported that they have investigated several cases where part of someone's money was stolen. Tim explained, "Say a fellow went to sleep with \$180 in his wallet and woke up to find only \$100. The thief must have needed money, but didn't want to leave the victim broke."

Their message is clear. The prevention of larcenies hinges on individual efforts to protect property — even from those they trust.



## Changes due in utility cap

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Some soldiers will be sporting a modified utility cap by spring 1980, according to DA.

A modified version of the utility cap, approved for purchase by DA, will eventually replace the one currently worn in the field. The cap will be available in Post Exchanges this fall. The modified cap will be issued to recruits and be available in clothing sales stores in March or April 1980.

Changes to the cap include an improved sweat band and three different bill sizes. The bill sizes will fit three size groupings of caps.

The improved sweat band will absorb perspiration easing the problem of the sweat ring stain on the outer portion of the cap.

The new utility cap will be made of the same fabric used in wash and wear fatigues.

Officials say consideration will be given to a possible camouflage utility cap to be worn with the battle dress camouflage uniforms when and if the uniforms are adopted.

## Orders changed by ADA inactivations

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Soldiers on orders to air defense artillery units in Florida and Alaska will stay at their present unit until new assignment orders are received, according to Milpercen.

DA is inactivating headquarters and headquarters battery, 31st ADA Brigade, Homestead AFB, Fla. and relocating its three battalions to Ft. Bliss, Texas and Fort Bragg, N.C. The 1-43 ADA BN and the 524th guided missile company, Alaska, are also being inactivated, officials said.

Local Milpos will contact all soldiers on orders for these units, officials said. The

appropriate career branch will be contacted for new assignment orders.

Milpercen will resolve any problems involving soldiers who have enlisted or reenlisted for Homestead AFB or Alaska, officials pointed out, since the enlistment contracts will have to be renegotiated.

A majority of the cases involved, officials say, will be career soldiers on reenlistment contracts. These soldiers should contact their reenlistment NCO or career branch, officials said.

Soldiers who want an alternative assignment should submit three preferences, officials added.






# Absentee ballot applications due





# Drunk drivers

(From front page)

"We don't go out looking for drunks," Crider said. "We don't set up traps at the clubs, we don't stake places out." The MPs usually discover drunken drivers because of certain tell-tale signs. "They look for erratic driving, failure to obey traffic control devices, someone who doesn't dim their lights, or someone who's driving too slow or too fast."

When the MPs confront the driver they check for additional signs: "alcohol breath, slurred speech, incoherence, can't get their billfold open, bloodshot eyes."

If at this point the MPs suspect the driver is intoxicated, they may have him perform certain sobriety tests at the scene, such as walking a line toe to heel, picking up coins, or touching his index fingers to his nose. If the MPs now believe the driver is too intoxicated to drive, they will park his car and bring him into the station. And usually the MPs are sure.

Crider said: "Rarely do we run a test that runs below the intoxication level."

At the station the suspect is given a breath test on a gas chronometer intoximeter. But before taking the test, the suspect is kept under observation for 20 minutes. This is to allow any alcohol in the mouth, such as would result from breath sprays, to evaporate. Each test is administered by a trained operator qualified to testify in court.

Refusal to take the test results in an automatic suspension of the suspect's license. At his own expense the suspect can take a blood test instead of the breath test.

If the test determines that the suspect has a .05 reading or above, he is booked for DWI

and his post driving privilege are immediately suspended until his trial date.

Crider said people have been brought in very extreme states of drunkenness. "We've had people who were lost and didn't know where they were ... people have been brought in fighting and swearing that the next day were meek as a lamb."

DWI arrest records show that the majority of the arrests are made between midnight and 6 a.m. "A small number are repeaters," said Crider. "We've arrested one man four times in the last two months."

After the arrest has been made the case is turned over to Capt. Leo Martinez of the Legal Office. Martinez prosecutes all the DWI cases. Martinez said that all the cases prosecuted are brought before the U.S. Magistrate. The defendant has the right to either a trial before the magistrate alone or one before a jury. "I prosecute 10 to 12 cases every two weeks and usually only 10 per cent of them contested ... The conviction rate is very high. I've only lost two cases since I began prosecuting DWIs last fall ... The range of punishment is a fine between \$100 and \$1000, a maximum of one year in jail, and six months suspended driving privileges ... We sometimes plea bargain cases in the gray area (.05 to .09) to reckless driving on the condition that these people go to a course on alcohol abuse."

## 70% civilian

Martinez said that of those arrested, 70 per cent are civilian, of which 30 per cent work for the Army, 30 per cent are connected in some way to the arsenal, and 10 per cent are so drunk they drive by accident onto the arsenal. The other 30 per cent arrested are military. Martinez said that he can't recall any NASA employees being arrested for DWI.

James Chadbourne of the Huntsville City Attorney's Office said that their punishment of drunken drivers is roughly the same as the federal court's, although they tend to be more lenient with first time offenders, usually amending their charge to reckless

driving with a \$200 fine, plus required attendance at a course on alcohol abuse. Chadbourne added that anyone legally intoxicated who is involved in a fatal accident can be charged with murder.

Crider advises those who feel they must get drunk to "stay home or go with someone who doesn't drink. Otherwise drink in moderation. If you go to a bar and drink more than you should, call a taxi. If you're

at one of the arsenal clubs and don't have money for a taxi, call us and we'll get you home ... All I'm concerned with is getting and keeping the drunk off the road ... But if he's out there, we'll catch him."

# Generals, senior civilians must file disclosure

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — All general officers and senior civilian employees must file financial disclosure statements, according to DA.

Effective January 1, 1979, Title II of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 requires certain individuals to file statements under specific circumstances. The law affects all general officers, executive level employees,

GS-16 and above, and equivalent civilian employees.

For those affected by Title II, Standard Form 278, replaces DD Form 1555, confidential statement of affiliations and financial interests. Each individual required to file an annual financial disclosure statement will receive the form in the mail.

According to officials, the completed SF 278S will be made available for public release, upon request, 15 days after the form is filed with the Army Adjutant General's Office.

Individuals who served in a covered position for more than 60 days during calendar year 1978 should have already submitted their SF 278, to their immediate supervisor. All forms must reach headquarters, Department of the Army, by May 15.

Other filing requirements include:

(a) end of employment. An SF 278 must be submitted to the immediate supervisor 15 days before the individual's employment ends unless another U.S. Government

appointment is being accepted within 30 days.

(b) nominees requiring Senate confirmation must file an SF 278A.

(c) assuming a position. A person must submit an SF 278A before taking a covered position, unless he has left another such position less than 30 days before.

Title V, of the Ethics in Government Act, imposes restrictions on post-government employment of officers and employees of the federal government. According to officials, those portions of Title V which affect "senior government employees" (general officers, executive level employees, and civilian employees paid a GS-17 equivalent salary or higher) have recently received considerable attention.

Several proposed amendments have been introduced by members of congress which, if adopted, would ease many of the restrictions in Title V.

Unless Title V of the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 is changed, those provisions will take effect July 1, 1979.

## Women warrant officers sought

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — More women will be eligible for warrant officer appointments as the number of women in the Army increases, according to DA personnel officials.

Until last year, officials explained, the number of women who could be appointed as warrant officers was restricted. From 1972 through 1978 however, the number of enlisted women jumped from 14,000 to 50,000.

Officials now estimate some 2,600 women will be eligible to apply for the warrant officer program this year.

The warrant officer program is aimed at recruiting and appointing NCOs who have six to ten years service. All MOS except 100E (attack helicopter pilot) and 224B (short range air defense system) are open to women, officials said.

Applicants must be qualified in their current MOS and be selected by a board.

Application instructions are outlined in DA circular 601-81 and further information is available at local military personnel offices.





Have you ever had one of those days where the world seems to be falling around you? One woman in Bldg. 4722 literally had a day like that Friday.


Sherry Batte, who is pregnant, felt the need to lie down for a while. At 9 a.m. she proceeded to the women's restroom to do so.

# Toll-free phone for gas price violations

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — A toll-free hotline is available for anyone to report violations of federal gasoline price controls, according to Department of Energy (DOE).

Prices of gasoline have increased sharply lately, but they are still not permitted to go above the ceiling prices set for each station.

The hotline should be used whenever a station doesn't have the ceiling price displayed on each pump or if the selling price is higher than the ceiling price posted, the spokesman said.

A caller should have the following information to give over the hotline: Name, address, and brand of gas station; type gas (regular, unleaded, premium); selling price; and ceiling price (if displayed).

Calls to the hotline may result in DOE sending a letter to the station involved asking them to explain. If the response is not satisfactory, the station's books will be audited and appropriate corrective action taken, according to DOE.

The gasoline price hotline operates from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily. The toll-free number is 800-424-9246.

# Production engineers want most for missile money

BY BOB HUBBARD

There are a billion good reasons for the Army Missile Research and Development Command (MIRADCOM) to know what's involved in manufacturing missiles and rockets.

This is because MIRADCOM expects to award one billion dollars in contracts this year to research institutes, universities and contractors, much of the money for production of new Army weapons.

"The bottom line for research and development is to bend iron to go into production," said Brig. Gen. (P) Frank Ragano, MIRADCOM Commander. "I didn't have enough people trained to manage production efforts so I have established a staff of specialists to better interface with the production world."

The staff of 16, assigned to MIRADCOM's Engineering Laboratory, Advanced Systems Development and Manufacturing Technology Directorate, includes six production engineering specialists who just completed 15 months training at Auburn University and in selected contractor plants preparing for their new production engineering role.

"We are the production eyes for Army project managers at Redstone and in Huntsville," said Jim Donnelly, acting chief of the specialists. "We must move new systems through research and development and transition them into production and reduce costs without degrading weapon performance."

The production engineering specialist, which will support MIRADCOM in major improvement programs in addition to MIRADCOM, will draw on other MIRADCOM laboratories, Army commands and organizations.

## Do homework

"If we do our homework, the Army will have equipment that can be produced efficiently and economically, on schedule and at desired production rates," Donnelly said, "and meets design, performance and life cycle cost constraints."

"We must be as innovative in manufacturing as we are developing a weapon system."

Donnelly said the most demanding job, initially, is to gain the confidence of project

managers by providing them timely data at the various Army and Department of Defense decision gates leading to production.

"We're already supporting ten active MIRADCOM programs."

For the past 15 months the specialists studied at Auburn and — on-the-job in contractor plants — electronics, manufacturing techniques and materials, computer aided design, automatic machining and processes, production research and operations management.

"Our job, in short, is to make sure the weapon design is sound, that the contractor has the manufacturing plan and facilities to produce the hardware, and that the Army gets the maximum return for every dollar it spends," Donnelly said.


