AER fund drive falls below goal

Redstone's Army Emergency Relief (AER) fund drive, the Army's way of "taking care of its own" with loans and non-repayable grants, has ended on a disappointing note. By last Friday, one week after the official end of the fund-raising effort, a little over \$5000 had been collected from the troops, retirees and civilians here. Last year, the fund drive netted \$7,000.

Redstone isn't the only installation in Alabama having trouble matching last year's total. Fort Rucker personnel contributed \$9,800 to AER last year. This year, they "hope" to make \$9,000 with the help of a \$3,500 contribution by local retirees. Fort McClellan raised \$13,000 for AER this year, down from the \$14,000 collected in 1978.

A spokesman at AER headquarters in Washington reported that nationwide, "It's a mixed bag. Some campaigns have come along fine, while some areas are having problems and have asked to extend their campaign periods."

There are two stock answers given when officials are asked for reasons for the paucity of giving

this year. The biggest and most predictable culprit in sapping AER donations appears to be inflation and the economy. Another oft-mentioned reason for decreased giving is the impact of a lawsuit won by soldiers at Ft. Meyer, Va. Damages were paid to 65 soldiers there whose privacy was violated when their names were posted as noncontributors to that post's 1977 Combined Federal Campaign (CFC). Collection techniques were changed Army-wide following that court case.

"Money is just tight nowadays," said 1st Lt. Isaac Austin, AER loan officer at Fort Rucker. Austin believes that the decrease in giving "appears to be a bit of a trend."

An AER spokeswoman at Fort McClellan echoed his thoughts.

"Money isn't going as far as it was last year," said Martha Morrison, an ACS specialist there.

Yet for many, AER loans, which are extended interest-free to tide Army personnel through emergencies like initial rent payments, car repairs and utility bills, are becoming the key to survival as costs rise. Loan use is on the increase nationwide.

Whether or not the operation is attempted depends on the response from the workforce.

'Nightmare' moving situation is much improved this week

"It has been a complete nightmare."

That's how the situation stood last week at the height of the big problems involved in moving of military personnel's household goods, according to Virginia Arnold, chief of the household goods section. Early in the week, as many as 55 shipments outbound from Redstone were languishing in the storage areas of local agent's warehouses. And as for the number of shipments that could be delayed inbound for Redstone, Arnold said, "Heaven only knows."

But if phone calls were any indication of the extent of that backlog, inbound personnel may have faced an even worse situation. Arnold said that in a four-hour period one morning last week, the inbound clerk in her office took 87 phone calls from personnel inquiring about their shipments.

However, the problem now seems to be ending.

By the end of last week, the trucks were

moving again and the number of shipments in storage here had shrunk to only 15 or 20.

No household goods were moved in the three weeks following the gas crisis in northern Alabama, Arnold said. The only alternative means utilized for moving was by freight line, which was feasible only for smaller shipments.

Arnold said she wasn't sure what caused the extended delay of the mover's operations. The vans were grounded for one week because there was no fuel available. Since then, fear may have played a part in the delay, since at the height of the independent truckers strike, she said some movers were actually shot at and forced off roads. Also, some were participating in the strike.

DA officials are encouraging alternative methods for moving household goods, as nationwide over 3,000 Army household goods shipments have been delayed with no immediate prospect of relief. They suggest considering a Do-it-Yourself move. But,

Even though I ride a route where the speed limit for autos is 25 mph, I regularly get run off of the road or must slam on the brakes to avoid being run down by unseeing or uncaring motorists. Apparently, many non-bicyclists believe that a person on a bicycle has no right to be on the road. Unfortunately, we incur the motorists' wrath in this regard when we ride on the wrong side of the road, the wrong way on one-way streets, on the sidewalk, etc. In addition, any child can ride a bicycle but you have to be grown-up and trained to drive a car. Obviously the bicycle is not a serious means of transportation, right! All of us who have been to Europe or the Far East know that is obviously wrong.

Alabama law gives the bicyclist the same right-of-way as the motorist, for most "city" riding. Unfortunately any bicyclist who takes that right of way is headed for

Two things are needed here at Redstone; (1) a little education for all as to what the rights and responsibilities of a bicyclist are, and (2) some bicycle trails — one from the housing area into the MMCS troop area would be a start!

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



New energy limits cause little change

The Department of Energy’s move to control heating and cooling levels at many public buildings, both governmental and private, will call for little change in Redstone energy policies.

Seventy eight degrees has been set as the minimum cooling temperature for public buildings, following a public outcry last week which caused DoE to relent in its original plans that thermostats be raised to 80 degrees.

“We’re already trying to maintain an 80 degree minimum,” said John Norton of Redstone’s Facilities Engineering Division. However, because each thermostat regulates a large area, Norton said some offices may be a little cooler than that, while others may be warmer.

The energy-saving regulation provides for penalties of up to \$10,000 a day for violators. It will become effective on orders from President Carter, which are expected soon.

Facilities’s Engineering plans for the winter here call for a 65 degree maximum permissible thermostat setting, which is in compliance with the new DoE ruling.

The only change which may result from the new regulation will be a lowered temperature for Redstone’s hot water supply. The ruling calls for hot water temperatures year-round to be limited to 105 degrees, which will cause water here to be “a little cooler,” Norton said. In the average home, the hottest water from the spigot is 140 degrees.

Man buys van for commuting

A Tennessee man who submitted a car-pool ad to the **Rocket** several weeks ago says he got so many responses that he's bought a 12-passenger van, which he hopes will eventually carry a full load of people to and from work at Redstone.

Marvin Throneberry now carries six passengers from the communities of Hot Rock, Taft, Bobo and Toney, and four more have shown interest in commuting in the van. The passengers pay for the gas and maintenance costs for the trips, which take about an hour each way.

Throneberry said his enterprise has become "more of a treat than anything. They're joking and carrying on, and it doesn't seem like it takes long to get here."

Common sense is the key to safe bicycling

If you're one of the increasing number of people riding your bicycle to work these days, the Military Police have several suggestions for making your ride a safe one.

First and foremost, Capt. Jesse Crider of the MP's urges bikers to use common sense. Crider said that bikers that travel in high-speed rush hour traffic should be extremely cautious.

Bicyclists should ride as far to the right side of the road as possible, single-file. To be highly visible to traffic, bikers should

wear light-colored clothing and equip their bicycle with reflectors.

Crider said that bicyclists at Redstone have the same rights as automobiles, and likewise are subject to the same traffic regulations. All bicycles ridden in Huntsville must be registered with the city. That registration is honored on the arsenal. Personnel living on the arsenal should have their bikes registered with the Military Police. They are then permitted to ride on

arsenal and Huntsville roads.

However, a bicyclist's rights may not extend to riding side-by-side in rush hour traffic.

"That's not too swift," Crider said. "They shouldn't do it."

Crider said that there is no minimum speed limit on arsenal roads but if a bicyclist or vehicle is going so slowly that it is slowing or blocking traffic, that person could be charged with impeding traffic.

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
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Stork beats ambulance



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Executive order offers job alternatives for handicapped employees in civil service

How would you feel if you were accepted into civil service and found the only job open to you was a GS-2 or GS-3 data transcriber slot, with virtually no chance of advancement, ever?

That's the situation that has confronted 16 deaf employees at Redstone. Hired as a part of a DA excepted appointments program, the length of time they've been employed here ranges from eight months to 11 years.

However, an executive order which became effective on March 15 could pave the way for new career opportunities for the deaf. According to Jim Quinn of the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) in Huntsville, the order will allow excepted appointments to be converted to career conditional or career positions, making them eligible to compete for merit promotion opportunities provided they've been on excepted appointment for two years.

"I think the executive order will be a big breakthrough for all deaf employees who try to apply for GS-4 level jobs," said Bob Payne, chief of the computer control branch of the Directorate for Management Information System (DMIS) here.

Richard Wright, chief of the computer management division at DMIS said that much of the deaf's success at breaking into new career fields depends on management's acceptance of them and management's willingness to open up jobs to handicapped employees.

"It's up to management to take the job and make it applicable to handicapped persons," Wright said. "The problem is that there are very few jobs on the arsenal now that are designed for deaf people — except the data transcriber job."

Wright's division has been hiring the handicapped since the division organized in 1970. He has found that his deaf employees on the whole perform better than the standard employee.

"Our directorate's goal is to produce a standard number of 240 records every hour. The overall average is 239. As a group, my deaf employees produce 285," Wright said.

"The job of data transcriber is well-suited for these people because it does not require direct communication with other people," Wright said.

But many of the deaf employees are restless after spending years in the data transcribing field, and are anxious to move into other career fields.

"They're probably qualified for a lot of jobs and can do the jobs — if they're given the chance," said Cookie Fuell, rehabilitation teacher for the deaf for the state of Alabama's Department of Education. To help the deaf find out what jobs are available, her office, the vocational

rehabilitation service, is working toward setting up a computerized listing which would match up hearing-impaired persons with the jobs available.

To improve lines of communication for deaf employees, Fuell has recommended that the arsenal hire an interpreter for the

deaf. This fall, she will teach a sign language course to supervisors of deaf employees.

Civilian Personnel officials say they have no plans at the present to hire an interpreter for the deaf. They are in hopes that the sign-language class taught by Fuell will provide sufficient training for supervisors to communicate with their deaf employees.

In a recent meeting conducted by OPM and Civilian Personnel to explain the new executive order, Redstone's deaf employees expressed interest about different career fields. They were interested in one deaf employee's recent conversion to a computer aid position. They also expressed interest in a variety of fields including illustration, printing, mail sorting and filing, locksmithing, and library work.

Their questions echoed those of any employee hoping to gain entry into a new career field. One woman was concerned that she might spend the time and effort to get a college degree and then find no job available. Others had questions about how the government would help with schooling and on-the-job training. They expressed their desire to gain more experience, and to enter fields with more potential.

"Without finding another field, I'll stay here until I die," one deaf woman said, but she ended that statement with a hopeful smile.

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With 12-0 records, M&M hangs on to the top spot

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HHC MICOM wins twin bill; tourney starts July 13



"With inflation up 11 percent and our pay rising by only 5.5 percent, somebody's got to make up the difference," Morrison said. She said at McClellan, "It looks like we've almost doubled the amount of money we've loaned out in the past year, and the amount of people using AER funds has almost tripled." Fort Rucker officials also report AER assistance is up 50 percent.

"We definitely have an increase in the number of people seeking aid here," said Juanita Phillips, assistant AER officer at Redstone. Phillips also believes inflation is driving more people to seek assistance.

The ruling in the CFC lawsuit caused many AER coordinators to take a cautious approach when planning this year's campaign.

Redstone's campaign coordinator's response to the lawsuit came in the form of solicitation guidelines provided by personnel at AER. The guidelines prohibited one-on-one or small group solicitations by commanders or supervisors, and specified that no campaign coordinator could solicit donations from persons under his or her control or supervision. In the past, company commanders in the brigades or directors in the respective directorates served as campaign coordinators. Harvey Adams, a civilian who served as this year's fund coordinator for MMCS, said he was chosen for the job "so we'd stay in the spirit of the recent court ruling."

Most campaign coordinators used a low-key approach, providing information about

the merits of AER and citing examples of ways the funds are used at Redstone.

Some individuals found it hard to collect donations under the new guidelines. "Hard is not the word for it. It's like banging your head against a brick wall," said MSgt. Henry Holiday of MEDDAC. Holiday found working under the new guidelines "impossible."

Campaign coordinators found that some people did come forward with their donations, often because of their belief in the worth of the AER program.

At MMCS, Adams said, "Even though we faced limitations, I believe we got maximum cooperation." Adams believes the guidelines take the pressure off and leave the decision to give up to the individual.

The number of donors at MMCS was close to the same as last year's participation level, but the dollar value of the donations was only 70 percent of last year's total. Of the school's 1,600 military personnel, 1,100 contributed to the campaign and a little over half of the school's 455 civilian employees contributed to the drive, even

though they are not eligible for AER services.

An official at AER headquarters said it was "unfortunate" that the CFC lawsuit has affected the AER fund drive. He said the situation may have provided some people with an "excuse" not to solicit or donate funds.

"We've always run our campaign in a straightforward fashion," he said.

All money collected for AER is channeled into an Army-wide AER fund and is delegated to each installation as needed. Full returns for the nationwide AER fund drive won't be available until September. And even if the nationwide effort falls short, Phillips said this should not cause an immediate impact on the program since loans are constantly being repaid. Ninety percent of AER loans are repaid.

"I don't think we will have to turn people away because of this," Phillips said.

Arnold said her section has had to contend with some angry soldiers whose goods were slated to be moved. One man became so irate that officials had to contact his

company commander and finally call in the military police to remove him from the household goods office.

Her advice to movers?

"Just be patient and calm. The shipments are going out slowly, but they're moving at last," Arnold said.

More than 300 youths have summer jobs at Redstone

Army commands and agencies served by the MICOM Civilian Personnel Division are employing more than 300 youths under several government programs that provide a meaningful work experience during the summer.

Included are 87 summer aides who are from disadvantaged backgrounds; 108 student aides who have worked part-time during the school year and are now converted to full-time employment during the summer; under the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA), there are 31 youths; and 83 young people who qualified under the Agency's Merit Staffing Plan and are employed as office personnel, engineering aides, technicians, and recreational aides.

These summer employees have a wide

variety of experience and skills. Some are in their first work experience while others have worked under the program for several years. Many are filling clerical positions, while some are assigned semi-professional positions.

The Summer Employment for Youth programs develop job skills and abilities of participants and provide them a way to earn money to help pay for their education.

CPD has employed two counselors for the summer to assist in directing the program, Carolyn Haraway and Betty Kellog. They are located in Rm 8, Bldg. 7442, phone 876-4735.

Both have master's degrees in guidance and counseling. Haraway is a guidance counselor at Sparkman High and Kellog has worked in that capacity at Butler High.
