

# Planning moves ahead for commuter buses

At least 150 arsenal workers are ready to leave the driving to someone else.

That's how many Redstone people responded to the poll in last week's edition of this newspaper taking an informal pulse on riding a bus instead of making the daily car trip to and from work.

MICOM is exploring the possibility of a pilot test of a commuter bus line, service from selected points in Huntsville to selected drops on post. There are a lot of details that must be worked out: The would-be bus operator has to compute costs to see what sort of a fare would be essential and work out arrangements for pick up points in town. MICOM is looking into the possibility of shuttle bus service to distribute passengers to work sites and bring them back to bus stops on the arsenal.

But the response to last week's poll was enough to send the planning into another round. Additional details will be published as soon as available.

One hundred fifty responses from a workforce of well over 10,000 hardly qualifies as a landslide in favor of buses, but those who did respond made up in enthusiasm what they may have lacked in numbers. People in the Public Affairs Office who talked with

them came away with the impression that there is a hard core of people who live in Huntsville and work on post ready and willing to ride a bus if someone can come up with the bus.

## Age-education criteria lowered for enlistees

WASHINGTON — Army enlistments are again open to 17-year-old males who have not graduated from high school.

According to DA, the Department of the Army has authorized, for the first time in two years, the U.S. Army Recruiting Command (USAREC) to enlist 17-year-old males who have not completed high school.

Prior to the change, USAREC could enlist 17-year-old males only if they possessed a high school diploma.

DA said the change will assist in meeting

Here's what else they told us:

— Just about everyone said they wanted to ride every day. Only 11 callers said they would only use it part time.

— There was agreement too that the callers would change work hours to match the bus schedule. Ninety-one said they'd change if they had to. Twenty others said they'd vary as much as a half hour.

— Just about everyone said they'd be — willing to drive to meet the bus. Sixty callers said they'd go more than two miles to get to the bus, 30 others said they'd go two miles, 27 others said a mile would be about right. Only 29 said the bus stop would have to be within a mile of their homes.

Most people thought a buck a day would be about right for a ride to and from Huntsville; 73 callers said 50 cents a trip struck them as a fair price. Thirty four others said less than a dollar should be charged for a round trip. Twenty seven callers said they'd pay more than a dollar a day.

The poll was restricted to people living in Huntsville. Post vehicle registrations indicate about two thirds of the arsenal civilian work force live in the city limits.

Most of the calls came from residents of the southeast and northwest portions of the city.

## 'Wizard' tackles Cobra problem

Shortly after he began taking deliveries of new Army Cobra helicopters earlier this year, Colonel Robert Molinelli, Commander of the 6th Air Cavalry Brigade at Fort Hood, Texas, placed an urgent call to Redstone Arsenal.

"I need your help!" he told John Harrity, acting 2.75 rocket system project manager at the Army Missile Command, and a long time friend. "Cobras coming off the production line are not equipped to fire rockets.


"Would you look at the aircraft and see what can be done?"

(The AH-1S, or Cobra, is planned to fire TOW, 2.75 rockets, 20 or 30mm cannon, and 7.62 ammo).

Harrity listened carefully and assured Molinelli that MICOM immediately would get on the problem.

Harrity at once turned to Mel Bartlett, a 2.75 engineer since 1972 known in the trade as an 'electronics wizard'. Bartlett, in fact, built the first prototype fuze setter and stores management system for helicopters subsequently tested and deployed in Vietnam. Before the 2.75 program moved from Picatinny Arsenal to Redstone, Bartlett owned his own avionics company

## Has close call on Martin Road

Editor:

With regard to bicyclists riding to the Arsenal on Martin Road, I personally like the idea of bicycling and I wish very much that there were bicycle trails available but it is very dangerous to mix automobiles and bicycles on Martin Road during peak traffic hours.

Speaking as one of the motorists who came unexpectedly up on a bicyclist on Martin Road — there was fast-moving traffic behind me and beside me and luckily, I was in a very small car so I moved as closely to the center line as possible to pass the cyclist. I may have frightened the bicyclist but I was terrified too. There was no other place to go.

I think that every bicyclist who rides on Martin Road should for his or her own safety and those around him at least have a flag on the bicycle. That would give the motorist an opportunity to spot the person far enough in advance to change lanes or to slow down without having to brake suddenly.

I have talked to several people about this problem. I have found no one who seriously objects to anyone bicycling to work but it is very scary to come suddenly upon a very vulnerable bicyclist and have no way to go around him without jeopardizing everyone in the process.

## Bicyclist wants full use of lane

Editor:

In Regard to the article in the July 11 issue of the 'Rocket concerning "Common sense the key to safe bicycling," Capt. Jesse Crider of the military police should reevaluate some of the suggestions he made on bicycle safety.

First of all, "common sense" will tell you that one of the most dangerous things to do while riding a bicycle in traffic is to ride as far to the right side of the road as possible

which Capt. Crider suggests. "Common sense" will tell you this makes the motorist think he can squeeze by the bicyclist thus possibly causing the bicyclist to lose control and run off the edge of the road and topple over — perhaps under the tires of the automobile trying to squeeze by. The incoming traffic during peak hours at Redstone has two lanes to use. Most faster traveling automobiles use the left-hand lane . . . they leave the slower traveling traffic in the right-hand lane. Some of these automobiles travel slower than bicyclists but no-one expects them to ride on the edge of the right-hand lane to permit "speedsters" to fly by them and completely squeeze them off the road.

Secondly, if bicyclists have the same rights as automobiles as Capt. Crider stated, why then would he expect bicyclists to ride on the edge of the road instead of in one lane as automobiles do? I can understand people being offended by bicyclists out "joy riding" during peak traffic times at Redstone and blocking one lane, but this is not the case. No one seriously traveling to work on a bicycle is out "joy riding" as insinuated nor are they wanting to be tortured by automobiles. I doubt that bicyclists seriously traveling to work are traveling at a slow rate of speed impeding traffic as suggested by Crider. Most bicyclists are cruising along at a sensible rate of speed and if they do use "common sense" they won't endanger themselves by riding on the very edge of the road where they could possibly slip off. That's what you'd call "not too swift."

If more concern was paid to the amount of automobiles traveling over the speed limit instead of bicyclists traveling under the speed limit in so-called "rush-hour" traffic, I think some military police would be surprised. Maybe the phrase "rush-hour" is the wrong wording. This seems to give some motorists the idea they have to "rush" by speeding and completely lose all respect, consideration and courtesy to others traveling on the same roads we all paid for. It is a sad fact however that some automobile drivers lack consideration completely for anyone whether it be a fellow automobile driver, a motorcyclist, bicyclist or whatever. They get disturbed when anything gets in their way. These are the people who should be fined — not the bicyclist!

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
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
**What's your opinion of the Army's move to once again allow 17-year-old non-high school graduate males to enlist?**

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# Two commuting bicyclists offer safety ideas

Two experienced bikers who banded together to brave the traffic of Martin Road found that the ride wasn't nearly as harrowing as they expected.

Robb Lucas and 1st Lt. Thom Tullia have been bicycling to work ever since Huntsville's gas crisis in June. They say they have found it to be a healthy, economical alternative to driving and plan to continue riding regularly when weather permits. They like to talk a subject seldom encountered in pre-gas crisis days — safety rules for bicyclists and for motorists driving around them.

Both men's experience with bicycle touring gave them confidence to tackle the high-speed traffic of Martin Road. Lucas made a 4500 mile coast-to-coast trip in 1974, and Tullia has toured throughout the Northeast. In all their travels — they estimate their collective mileage total is well over 10,000 — they have been treated with courtesy by drivers.

Tullia said he's found Huntsville driver's treatment of him as a bicyclist "commendable."

"I've got no complaints about drivers here," Tullia said. "The only people I've had honk at me are people who know me, and I can hardly complain about that."

Lucas and Tullia's ride begins at 6 a.m. when traffic is light. From an apartment complex in Southwest Huntsville, they ride down South Memorial Parkway to Martin Road, and take Martin to their destinations

— buildings 5400 and 4488. The seven-mile trip takes 20 to 25 minutes.

"If done correctly, there's no reason why there isn't room for everybody on the roads," Lucas said. "Both bicyclists and drivers have rights and should treat each other with respect."

"You have to be just as alert on a bike as when driving," Lucas said. "Be aware of other car's positions." He said it's important for bikers to ride as close to the right side of the road as possible, and to yield and stop when that action is required of motorists. A safe bicyclist should also be

prepared to fix a flat tire or make minor repairs on his bicycle. And traveling with another biker is safer than traveling alone, Lucas said.

Lucas' seasoned advice to drivers: "They don't need to stop when they approach us — there's room for all of us. Drivers are startled when they come up on a bicyclist, but they can slide over in their lane and leave sufficient room for a biker."

But Lucas is adamant about one bad trait of drivers here — speeding.

"Drivers do not go the speed limit, and passing a bicyclist at 60 mph is not safe," he said. "The speed limit needs more enforcement."

"Drivers should realize that bikers are scared of them. As a courtesy, drivers should slow down and help them out a little bit," Lucas said.

Lucas said he knows people who want to ride their bikes to work but don't because they are afraid of high-speed traffic and shoulderless roads. He believes that if more was done to encourage bicycling at Redstone, the number of riders would increase.

"If there were enough bikers, I'd like to see them designate one lane of traffic for bicycle riders only," Lucas said. "More people would ride bikes."

Tullia's solution for safer bicycling is the construction of extended pavement shoulders on arsenal thoroughfares specifically designated as bicycle lanes.

Lucas also suggests that regular bicycle and driving safety briefings be initiated for all employees, similar to or as a part of the required security briefings.

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# Army to announce DDT fix; commercial fishermen sue

The Army will make public next week its plans to seek possible ways to fix DDT contamination resulting from manufacture of the insecticide on Redstone Arsenal by the Olin Company and others prior to 1970.

The Mobile and Nashville Districts of the Army Corps of Engineers have been directed by the Army to do an engineering study on the problem. The Corps has scheduled a public hearing to explain how they will perform the study. The public

hearing will be held in the Triana municipal building beginning at 7 p.m. July 26.


Meantime, a Decatur law firm acting for 32 commercial fishermen, filed suit in federal court last week against Olin and the Army claiming DDT contamination of fish in the Tennessee River had put them out of business. The fishermen contend they should be paid \$50 million in damages on each of 10 specific counts.

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

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
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## Army chief notes 'energy challenge'

WASHINGTON — "Every effort must be made to demonstrate to the taxpayers of our country . . . that we are not wasting energy."

These were the words of Army Chief of Staff Gen. E.C. Meyer in a recent message to major Army commands.

"All Army military and civilian personnel are asked to minimize the use of motor gasoline through more efficient vehicle use. Commercial transportation services should be used in preference to government or privately owned vehicles whenever possible," Meyer said.

DoD is not seeking special treatment on gasoline allocations at this time.

"I urge each of you to take a personal interest in meeting this challenge — we must reduce our energy consumption without degrading our readiness," Meyer concluded. (ARNEWS)

## PCS delays are authorized

Installation commanders now have the authority to grant 30-day PCS deferments for officers and enlisted soldiers who have DA directed reporting dates during June, July, August or September, according to DA personnel officials.

This deferment authority applies to overseas moves as well as CONUS to CONUS moves, officials said, but is only for accompanied personnel.

Deferments will be used to allow for shipment of household goods and personal property or to avoid personal hardship.

Soldiers delayed for this reason who would have less than 12 months remaining in service upon arrival in an overseas command will still be required to comply with original assignment instructions with an adjusted arrival month, officials said.

If a soldier has already received a reply from an overseas command for dependent

travel, the reply will remain valid, officials added.

Transportation officials still warn that regardless of when a PCS move occurs in the next few months, personnel should expect delays and plan accordingly.

# More than just 'ammo humpers'

It's been said that in wartime, a soldier's best friends are his rifle, mess kit, and the man who supplies his ammunition, once referred to as an 'ammo humper'. This nickname for the Ammunition Storage Specialist (55 B) died a rightful death back in the late 1950s and early '60s with the expansion of the ammunition field.

According to Major Martin D. Monroe, chief, Conventional Ammunition Div., Munitions Dept., Dir. of Trng., MMCS, "With the increase in complexity of munitions required on the battlefield, the use of computers for management, and heavy equipment to move large tonnages of ammunition, the Ammunition Storage Specialist of today must have a comprehensive understanding of many technical skills relating to handling, storage, maintenance, and accounting procedures."

"The unique point about this course of instruction over most others," added Capt. Larry O. VanMeter, assistant chief of the div., "is the fact that the average student

has absolutely no prior knowledge of explosives or ammunition before entering the service. Naturally, everything learned is completely new to them."

The Conventional Ammunition Div. employs approximately 35 Army, Marine and civil service instructors and \$1.2 million worth of training equipment to train 1,100 to 1,300 ammunition storage specialist students annually.

Although the division presents other courses of instructions, such as the Ammunition Inspectors Course and the Marine Officer, Chief Refresher Course, most assets are dedicated to 55B10 training. Student input includes active duty and reserve soldiers, marines and allied country personnel.

A student attending the course at Redstone Arsenal today is faced with four and a half weeks of training designed to teach the basic skills needed for entry level performance in direct or general support ammunition units.

Using self-paced and group-paced

methods of instruction, the students will master such subjects as Ammunition Identification, Storing Ammunition Under Combat Conditions, Loading and Unloading Procedures, Stock Control Procedures, and Forklift Operations.

Broken down into four main areas of concentration, the students attending the Ammunition Storage Specialist course first become familiar with ammunition materials.

Students will spend approximately 31 hours learning to identify ammunition by type, hazard and use, and will be introduced to and become familiar with the majority of the reference publications they will be using in the field.

According to Pvt. 1 Dan Reichert, a student who recently began the course, "I came into this field because I'm interested in ammunition and explosives. So far, I've only been here a couple of days, but we've covered a lot of information. I'm trying to learn as much as I can, but there's a lot of information to know."

The next phase of the course involves approximately 60 hours of instruction at the Training Ammunition Supply Point located off Rideout Rd. on a 265 acre tract of land.

propelling charge containers are protected from moisture.

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Corps students, the ammunition storage specialist course is offered to Reservists from both services, national guardsmen and allied students.

With a staff of seven instructors handling up to 60 students a day, the ASP is broken down into different training areas. In one segment of training, the students are taught preventive maintenance, proper hand signals, and the safe operation of the 6,000 pound rough-terrain forklift.

In other phases of instruction at the ASP, students learn to load and unload ammunition, storage and inventory

procedures, and the many housekeeping aspects of maintaining an ASP.

From the ASP, the students are moved to the Maintenance Section where they receive 18 hours of instruction on the care, maintenance and inspection of munitions.

Commenting on the mode of instruction used in the course, a student, Pvt. 1 Donald Barnes, in the Maint. Section, said, "I like the self-paced instruction, because I can go at my own pace without being slowed down or speeded up by anyone else. I know it has helped me a lot of times."

The final segment of training involves a bus ride to F-Range located off of Patton Road. Spending one day there, the students learn to set up electric and non-electric demolition shots for salvage and disposal operations, and how to perform emergency destruction of an ammunition wupply point. Live explosives are used in this phase of training.

According to GySgt. Willis Towns, senior instructor at F-Range, "We first try to show the students what explosives can do. We don't want them to be afraid of explosives, but, since they'll be working with them, they need to know specific hazards. We want them to learn to respect any and all types of explosive devices and to handle them safely."

After the final phase of training at the range, the students undergo comprehensive testing to insure they have retained knowledge of all significant course performance objectives, and are qualified for the MOS 55B10.

For Army component members, National Guard and foreign students, this completes the course. But, the Marines have yet another two weeks of instruction in the Marine Peculiar Course.

According to GySgt. James Chapman, an instructor for the Marine training, "We try to teach the Marines things that are peculiar to the Marine Corps. The majority of what is taught here is administrative type work such as being familiar with Navy and marine Corps publications and regulations, along with technical differences between the services concerning the ammunition field."

"The Army course plays a major role as

far as coming up to this level," he continued. "The students are going to use about 90 percent of what they have learned in the course, and apply it here."

Chapman added, "Everything a Marine learns here, he'll use within his first tour of duty."

A student in the Marine Peculiar Course, PFC Nick Schultz, said this about the training he received: "I feel I'll be ready for my next assignment when I leave Redstone. From the first day of the course (55B10) until I graduated, I learned a great deal about ammunition. Having gone through this course, I've found that it takes a good educational background to be successful in this school."

And, with that dies the old image of a not brainy, very brawny man moving your ammunition. Today's 55B10s are not 'ammo humpers', they are educated, technically advised and highly proficient ammunition storage specialists.

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

specializing in communications and navigation gear for private aircraft.

Bartlett and Harrity knew at the outset there were two approaches to the problem: 1) Use existing Army launchers which would require modifications to the aircraft circuitry; 2) Use components from the Navy and Air Force and adapt those to the attack helicopters without modifying wiring.

Obtaining drawings of the AH-IS, Bartlett meticulously studied the aircraft wiring and recommended that the project office utilize equipment from the other services and avoid major circuit modifications.

Since MICOM has tri-service responsibility for procurement and delivery of rocket components, Bartlett had access to available equipment and he quickly found a suitable launcher — the 19-tube LAU 61A — and the all-important intervalometers, the electronic switches that select the rocket to be fired.

With those major items accounted for, Bartlett focused on the fine tuning and designed adapter cables to connect the two, devised a system to electronically check the

equipment, developed a test program for both ground and air firings, and established troop training procedures.

Having completed his homework at Redstone, Bartlett packed launchers and equipment in his private van and headed west for Fort Hood.

Arriving there, he attached launchers to the helicopter, hooked them together, made the necessary electronic checkouts, and conducted actual ground firings to demonstrate that the system was safe for flight.

The bottom line is that everything worked perfectly.

Bartlett obtained the flight safety release for six planes and, what's more, he accomplished the entire job less than 45 days after MICOM got the call, including the training of troops in the 4th Squadron.

"Mel did an outstanding job," Harrity said.

The fix was so successful and looks so promising that Marlin Buffington, deputy project manager for the Cobra at the Troop Support and Aviation Materiel Readiness Command (TSARCOM) in St. Louis, Mo.,

called MICOM just a couple of weeks ago and asked the 2.75 project office for a plan to equip some 98 helicopters.

Harrity said his office already has prepared and forwarded the plan to TSARCOM outlining the scope of work.

"We believe we can do the whole job in four months from the go-ahead," Harrity said, "and that includes launchers, test equipment, adapter cables, intervalometers and spares, operator manuals, equipment to perform safety checks and training courses at about five locations.

"We're talking a relatively small amount of money, roughly five hundred thousand dollars," he said.

Whereas the 'quick fix' would take approximately 120 days, the Army could anticipate a delay up to 1½ years to retrofit the aircraft with permanent systems, Harrity said.

"The units we'll give them are standard with Air Force, Navy, Marines and some NATO countries so there are some repair parts throughout the world," Harrity said.

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
