Investigators seek crash cause

Federal inspectors are continuing their investigation today of the private plane crash on the arsenal Saturday. Five persons died.

Louis Carmona, an inspector from the National Transportation Safety Board,

heads the team going over the site and wreckage. Military police and crews from the Test and Evaluation Lab are assisting.

The single engine plane apparently broke up in the air during a violent storm that dumped torrential rain on the area.

Members of the Redstone Flying Club who had been monitoring the pilot's radio conversations with the Huntsville tower from the club building at the Army airfield began an immediate ground search when the tower lost radar and voice contact with the plane shortly after noon.

They were joined by military police and NASA security guards. As soon as the weather moderated, DW4 Harold Simpson and CW3 William Clark took off in an Army helicopter and joined the hunt.

Col. Larry Sisterman, Ret., and William A. Moeller of the flying club found a wing tip fuel tank from the aircraft in a field just west of Test Area 6 about 2 p.m. The helicopter flew to the site and spotted the wreckage in a dense pine thicket shortly afterward.

The site, near the west boundary of the arsenal, is in the impact area of Test Area 1, south of Martin Rd. and north of Swan Pond.

From papers found on the aircraft, the FAA identified the occupants of the plane as Robert L. Shafer and Ann F. Shafer of Rossville, Minn., Michael A. and Debra G. Shafer of Matthews, N.C. and a small girl believed to be the daughter of Robert and Ann Shafer.

The plane took off from Charlotte, N.C. Saturday morning. Robert Shafer, the pilot, had said his destination was St. Paul, Minn. He apparently flew in a southwest direction attempting to find his way around or through the turbulent weather that brought near record rains into North Alabama Saturday.

Computer expert helps solve problems of small cities

Stay tuned as Gerald Price seeks answers for those and other problems on a list that keeps growing.

He can tell you how the war between the pigeons and the people turns out, or will soon. The pigeons lose.

Price, who knows a lot about the computers that are the brains of guided missiles, is on loan from his Army job at Redstone Arsenal, Ala. For the past several months he's been riding a circuit through the south and he knows a whole lot now too about the problems of America's small cities.

One day last summer, Price found in his "In" basket at the Army Missile Command computer center, an announcement of a new federal program. He got interested, volunteered and last fall settled his wife and two children in Spartanburg, S.C., checked in at the city manager's office and began finding out what he would be doing for at least the next year.

Price is one of seven technology agents helping 32 small cities in a National Science Foundation program backed by some federal laboratories. The foundation pays part of his salary and expenses, the Army the remainder. Based in Spartanburg, he spends about 25 percent of his time on the

Bikes in traffic

Editor:

In regard to bicycles in traffic: The State of Alabama has a whole page of traffic laws specifically regarding bicycles—I requested and received a copy of them from the governor's office a few years ago.

Alabama law for bicycles can be summarized by saying that they have all the privileges and are subject to all the laws that motor vehicles are, and they are entitled by law to an entire lane.

However, I would not ride a bicycle on Martin Road at rush hour at all without a fluorescent bike flag, and I wouldn't ordinarily recommend riding a bicycle on any road with a speed limit over 30 mph.

My personal solution to the gas crunch, which I recommend only to expert bicyclists, was to buy a used medium-size motorcycle. I can keep up with the traffic and I get over 50 mpg.





What do you think of the recreational activities for after duty hours and weekends at Redstone Arsenal?






Gas station plans half-gallon pricing

Gasoline at the Redstone Arsenal service station will probably be priced by the half-gallon "within two or three weeks," according to PX manager Joe Robinson.

The Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) will institute the change as soon as gas prices go over 99.9 cents per gallon. The change is being made because the current gas pumps at the station aren't mechanically capable of computing sell prices over 99.9 cents per gallon.

The dollar amount shown on the pump will be doubled to determine the total sale price of the gasoline. A decal on each pump will show customers the actual price of the gasoline per gallon. Other decals on the pumps will indicate that pricing is by the half-gallon.

Pricing by half-gallon will be common at off-post service stations as well, and will continue until the equipment can be modified to deal with the higher prices. Once any grade of gasoline goes over the 99.9 cents per gallon price limit, the post station will start using half-gallon pricing for all grades of fuel.

More dental care for dependents

Redstone's dental clinic has announced new hours and a plan to improve dental care for dependents.

The new exam hours, which are effective immediately, are from 7:30 — 9:30 a.m. and 12:30 — 2:30 p.m.

Dependents can make appointments for dental work after their first examination. Time and space available for appointments will be watched closely so that the post clinic will be able to handle the greatest possible number of patients.

Special consideration will be given in making appointments for those active duty soldiers and dependents who are in school. They will be given priority sick call treatment for the relief of pain.

In addition, dependent children in school will be given appointments from 3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday during the school year.

Emergency patients will be seen any time between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Patients needing emergency dental care after duty hours should report to or call Fox Army Hospital, Bldg. 4100, 876-5854.

Hospital slates preschool physicals; three family doctors arriving

Officials at Fox Army Hospital have announced "an all-out effort" to perform required preschool and nursery physical examinations on dependent children.

Appointments are now being taken for the examination, a complete physical which includes eye, ear and dental screening, immunization record review and laboratory work.

Appointments are being scheduled for afternoons on these dates: August 10, 17, 25 and 31 and September 7 and 14. Where possible, the examination will be given by the patient's personal family physician or pediatrician.

Hospital officials urge parents to schedule appointments as early as possible so there will be late spaces to accommodate new arrivals to Redstone. Appointments can be scheduled by calling the Central Appointment Desk 876-3247-3248-3249-3240.

Capt. Mike White M.D., chief of the Family Practice Service, said the physical examinations will allow most children and parents to meet the three new family physicians now arriving here. They are:

— Capt. John Boyd, family practice residency trained at Fort Ord, Calif. He will

take over Maj. Jay Swedberg's panel of patients.

— Capt. Frampton Henderson, who took family practice training in a civilian program at Columbia, S.C. assumes Maj. Ray Easley's panel of patients.

— Capt. Mike Noce, family practice residency trained at Tripler Army Medical Center in Hawaii, assumes Maj. Craig Collier's panel of patients. Collier will

become director of the Walk-in Clinic-Emergency Room.

Hospital officials said also that all dependents of active duty personnel are eligible for medical care in the Family Practice Clinic. Those who haven't been assigned a family physician should report to the clinic and one will be assigned. Dependents of retired personnel are eligible for care in the Pediatric clinic.

EEO Office seeks 'concerned' counselors

The EEO Office is recruiting new counselors for MICOM. Eleven counselors are needed to replace some that have relocated or resigned. The deadline for applying is August 13, 1979.

"We have about one counselor for every 500 employees," said Stella Moore, EEO specialist. "They act as mediators in solving problems between workers and supervisors. We hope they can solve the problems locally, by working with supervisors."

The counselors listen to complaints from workers in the command, and then investigate the situation. They then file a report with the EEO office, stating whether or not they think the problem is one of discrimination.

The counselors' main job is to help people who feel they are being discriminated against in one of the EEO categories: race, religion, color, sex, age (employees who are at least 40 years old and less than 60 years old, and applicants who are at least 40 and younger than 65), national origin, and

physical or mental handicap.

But counselors should try to guide workers to another area for help if their problems are not EEO-related.

"We're looking for people who have a deep concern for people," said Moore.

If interested in applying to become an EEO counselor, submit a DF through your supervisor saying why you're interested in the program. The DFs should be sent to DRSMI-XQ, Bldg. 5250, Rm. A-116, ATTN: Stella Moore.

If you like hard work and helping people, then you might like being an EEO counselor

Who would want to take on an extra job that gave lots of extra work (especially paper work) no extra pay; and a chance to listen to a lot of people complain?

Sarah Jamar would.

For over five years Jamar has served as an EEO counselor. It's a demanding job, but she feels it has its rewards as well.

Jamar first became interested in EEO counseling because she sought counseling herself. "I had a degree in mathematics when I came to work for the government, but they hired me as a GS-2 clerk-typist. I

began to feel a lot of bitterness."

The EEO counselor, Jamar said, helped her get a better perspective on her situation, "to identify the right things to do to accomplish my ends."

When her organization was looking for counselors in 1974, Jamar applied and was accepted. To become a counselor, Jamar had to take the Basic EEO course, which is given by the Civil Service Commission. In addition, she attended a workshop where counselors practiced handling cases through role-playing, and took the advanced EEO course, where students worked on

case studies and learned about different ethnic backgrounds and history.

EEO counselors are also instructed by representatives from civilian personnel. "Most cases deal with hiring, promotion, and RIFs," Jamar said. "So it's important we understand the regulations and policies of these areas."

Jamar said that there are certain kinds of complaints that come up most frequently. As far as promotion complaints go, Jamar



said, "A lot of it is frustration. Usually it's someone feeling they should have gotten a job that someone else got."

During the last reduction in force, Jamar said the most common complaint she heard was from "people who felt they'd been misclassified in order to protect someone else."

Not all of these complaints actually become EEO cases. There may be no real grounds for a complaint. In promotion cases, for example, Jamar said that many complainants feel they should have gotten the promotion, not because of better qualifications, but simply because they'd been on the job longer.

And in the case of a job misclassification, Jamar said the complaint should be handled as a grievance, unless the misclassification resulted from one of EEO's categories of discrimination: race, national origin, color, religion, sex, age, and physical or mental handicap.

No Bear Bryant

People often bring non-EEO complaints to a counselor, especially if they've heard that the counselor helped someone else.

"They think that counselors are Bear Bryant and can walk on water," Jamar said with a laugh. "They think we can do anything and come to us with a case that's not really well defined or maybe not in an EEO category."

But Jamar doesn't turn people away just because their complaint doesn't fit the EEO categories. It's part of an EEO counselor's job to help the complainant get help elsewhere if it's available. If all she can do is listen, Jamar is glad to do that, too.

"There are many employees who need someone to listen to them," Jamar said. "If you listen to them and hear them out, maybe you can help them get things into the proper perspective. I would say that in 60 percent of my counseling, I just act as a sounding board."

Countless cases

Though she can't begin to remember how many cases she's counseled, some of them do stand out. Counselors are appointed by commanding generals and are supposed to serve the workers in the general's command, but once Jamar counseled a worker who had gotten special permission to talk to a counselor outside of her own command.

Another unusual case has been going on for over four years, and resulted in Jamar's recently testifying in federal court.

Jamar finds that her biggest problem as an EEO counselor is fitting the extra work into her schedule. She has no choice about how many cases she will take on, since the complainants themselves choose which counselor they want to talk to.

She said that many new counselors don't consider the amount of paperwork they will be doing. They must make a seven-day report, a 21-day report, and a final report on each case they handle. The final report is a summary of everything that has been done to resolve the conflict.

"In the role of a counselor, you don't work for the organization. Getting clerical help becomes a problem," Jamar said. "Also, the information you're dealing with is privileged and you can't let others see it."

It's difficult to fit the extra work into your schedule, Jamar said, because EEO counselors still have to perform their regular duties. Also, the counselor's own

manager or supervisor may not be sympathetic to the counselor's extra work load.

"Managers tend not to accept counselors as people working for them. They fail to realize that all the complaints that counselors hear are what managers would have to deal with themselves if there were no counselors. The complainants would have no where to go except to the managers. So I think we help managers more than they sometimes realize," Jamar said.

Jamar said counselors also may have problems dealing with the managers of the complainants.

"The response of managers varies," she said. "The most important thing is the attitude of the person at the top of the organization. Patterns are usually set by the director or lead person — he can demand support."

Help each other


If counselors have undue trouble talking to a manager or seeing information pertinent to the case, they can get help from the EEO office. Counselors also ask each other for advice in handling different kinds of situations. A monthly counselors' meeting gives them an opportunity to talk to each other as well as to hear about any changes in policy or regulations.

Despite the extra work, and problems dealing with complainants and managers, Jamar enjoys the volunteer work.

"I get satisfaction from helping someone," she said. "Counseling is difficult because people are involved. People are our most valuable resource, and if they come to see a counselor you know they've already been damaged in some way."

"You have to try to help them, help them without hurting them any further."



Concurrent travel chances improve

WASHINGTON — Being reassigned to Europe? Your chance of getting concurrent travel approved for your dependents is better than ever.

Concurrent travel of dependents to USAREUR is now being approved if housing is expected to be available within 60 days of the sponsor's arrival, according to Milpercen.

Formerly, housing had to be available within 30 days for concurrent travel to be approved, officials explained. With the 30 day limit, only about 20 percent of the requests were being approved, a Milpercen spokesman said.

USAREUR has been testing the new concept and the rate of approval has reached about 50 percent.

The test has also shown that the 60-day concept has had no significant effect on temporary lodging allowance costs. A DA budget official reports the 60-day concept does not cost the Army any more since in most cases, housing is found within 30 days and when a family is separated, separation pay must be provided. (ARNEWS)

The automobile of the 1950s — America's great glorious era of tail fins, continental kits, chrome and other forms of glitter and garishness — will be featured tomorrow evening in a presentation at the Civic Center by a man who helped create automobiles of the era.

John Norris, an artist in the graphic arts branch here, and formerly an automotive designer in Detroit, will present "Automotive Styling in Review", devoted to cars that were and the stylists who created them.

Norris' 14 year association with automobile styling included a stint as project manager for Dutch Darrin who was consultant designer for the Kaiser automobile. The Kaiser Darrin bears his name. He also created the famous Darrin Packard.

Norris was also a close associate of Alex Tremulis, designer of the too-far-ahead-of-its-time Tucker automobile, and studied his

art under Harley Earl — known as the father of American automotive styling — at the Detroit Institute on Automotive Design and later was employed by Earl as a stylist.

While with Kaiser, Norris was responsible for the design of three special show cars displayed at the Chicago Auto Show in 1951.

Among cars bearing Norris design touches are the '49 Chevrolet, '55-56 Lincoln, and '55-58 Mercury. In addition, he was principal designer of the '50 Hudson hard-top.

He was one of several stylists who participated in a "Save the Edsel" campaign, a last-ditch effort to give that ill-fated make a more appealing design that would sell.

Norris will give the presentation "Auto Styling in Review" tomorrow night at 7:00 at a meeting of the local antique car club. It will be held in a meeting room at the Von Braun Civic Center. The public is invited. There is no admission charge.

Beating the heat

There is no evidence that women are following these trendsetters by also wearing shorts, but many have adopted special dress habits to make the warm temperatures bearable.



road visiting his other cities: Pritchard, Ala.; Natchez, Miss., and Hope, Ark.

Life in those communities has not been transformed by the coming of Gerald Price with all the technical know-how of the United States at his beck and call. Technology tends to be both costly and complex and the biggest problem of all small cities is that they cannot afford costly and complex solutions. When technology can help, as it sometimes can, well and good; but Price sees his job in essence as solving problems, with or without technology.

Growing up in Lynchburg, Tenn., he learned that one way you get help is to ask for it. He's good at that. He not only asks, his government experience has taught him where to go to get answers once he knows the questions.

Some of the problems, he handles himself. He smoothed out routing for the Spartanburg sanitation department with a computer. When the Chief of Police there wanted to know how many false burglar alarms his people answered, Price worked out a computer routine that supplied that information quickly and enough to do five other reports as well.

Once he gains the confidence of city workers by making them understand he is not there to replace them with black boxes, the best thing Price has going for him is a practical man's eye for the simple way to get something done.

Kudzu take-over

Item: Kudzu is a rambling vine of no known practical value intent on covering the southeast United States. Handed the Kudzu control problem, Price got on the phone with some of the nation's foremost experts. They suggested a commercial herbicide, but Price ruled that out. The stuff would kill Kudzu, but it would also kill anything else close to the vines. A lot of Spartanburg fit that category.

"So I made a deal with a farmer. What I was going to do was borrow a couple of

goats, fence off a patch, put the goats in and tell them it was them or the Kudzu," Price recalled with a chuckle. "If it worked, the city could buy the goats." Spartanburg's city fathers agreed that Price had a solution, but as yet they have not grasped the opportunity to become the nation's first municipal goat ranchers.

Pigeon research

Item: Most of what Kudzu has not covered in Spartanburg, pigeons have. Quoting from his newly acquired pigeon learning, Price states the problem:

"Pigeons live to be 25 years old. They have few natural enemies. They raise big families . . . more or less when the spirit moves them."


His pigeon research lead Price to discard hawks, shooting, poison and noise makers, all of which have been tried elsewhere. Instead, with about 50 bucks worth of wood and wire and the help of the Fire Department, he soon had a pigeon trap perched on the roof of a downtown building.

Pigeon give-away

Shortly after he baited the trap, Price had 428 live pigeons and more takers than he could handle responding to his offer of free pigeons. He also had the pigeons' friends hotly complaining that it was mean to trap pigeons during the nesting season. Price quit trapping and bided his time.

"The pigeon problem has been resolved or will be as soon as cold weather gets here and we start trapping again. The technology has been transferred," Price says with a grin and the satisfaction of a man checking off an item on a list of things to be done.

Item: Spartanburg wanted to know how much heat loss it had from municipal buildings. Price went by phone through government labs and research centers, then to universities, then to power companies and finally to a company in the insulating business. "They gave us a free survey. Told us exactly what we wanted to know," Price said.

Price tells about his successes and failures as a city advisor

Not everything turns out that well. Some of his problems have him stumped.

Item: Natchez is a city on bluffs overlooking the Mississippi River. The river is slowly devouring the bluffs. Portions of Natchez are sliding into the river. The Father of Waters is a formidable opponent. Price has called in the Army Corps of Engineers.

The stories are good ones and Price tells them well, aware as is any dedicated researcher that he knows a great many things that won't work. Sometimes the failures make the best stories. He is content to let the successes speak for themselves.

So in four small cities people with problems are learning that their federal government — far from remote and uncaring — turns out to be a guy in gold rimmed glasses and an orange and white checked suit who walks in, listens, understands, and finds help.
