

Wood-burning stoves

Gayle Wells chuckles when she recalls her conversation with one caller to the Energy Hotline, a service offered by the Alabama Energy Extension Service (EES). When he inquired about heating alternatives for the home he was building, Wells suggested installing wood-burning stoves.

There was a long pause, then the caller said, "Ms. Wells, this is going to be a nice house."

"He remembered the old box stoves that were in use when he was growing up," she said. But times have changed and so have the stoves. Today's models are more efficient and can save on heating costs. They also offer something that many people are searching for—a feeling of personal energy independence.

As a result, more people are turning to wood-burning devices to heat their homes. Wells, who is an information specialist for the EES, said 60 to 70 percent of the Hotline calls deal with woodburning questions.

Many of those questions concern installing and operating the stoves, which both must be done properly to prevent the danger of fire.

"There have been many times when we have become alarmed at the way people were planning to install stoves," Wells said. "And because the industry has grown so quickly, there are few guidelines to follow now. The southern building codes contain nothing about add-on-furnaces. In general, they don't inspect until you call them."

Usually, installation instructions are furnished by the manufacturer. EES also recommends checking with the local

building inspector and an insurance agent to see if there are certain requirements to be met. Installation should meet the minimum requirements of the National Fire Protection Codes and-or local building inspection department requirements.

Special attention must be paid to the amount of clearance area around the stove from wall, floor and ceiling. EES can furnish guidelines on clearance distances and fire-resistant materials. Precaution must also be taken when installing the smokepipe, which connects the stove to the chimney. For it to operate safely, it's necessary to use proper materials, allow adequate clearances and provide for proper draft.

Once installed, the chimney must be cleaned periodically to help prevent buildup of creosote, a mixture of unburned combustibles that can build up and cause a chimney fire. Creosote collects when the stovepipe and chimney system cools enough to condense this volatile matter. It can be controlled by keeping the exhaust system warm through use of a flue liner in masonry chimneys or by using insulation in metal chimneys.

Most chimney fires are contained in the chimney and will burn themselves out but there's always the danger that a large fire can spew burning pieces onto the roof. Stove-owners agree that chimney fire's intensity can be terrifying. One woman said she's seen fires that "roar, crackle and leap out with a fury. They will flat scare the devil out of you."

Wells has several suggestions for people

considering installing a wood-burning stove.

"Before you do anything else, you should insulate and weatherize your home. And you do need to consider the total costs involved. Wood can be an economical way to heat—under certain conditions. A plentiful, preferably free source of wood is needed and you must be aware of the amount of personal labor it takes to cut and burn it."

Wells said one of the best ways to learn about a stove is talking with someone who has one.

"It may seem unscientific, but it's one of the best ways to check out a stove," she said. "There are features that you will love or they'll become annoying."



Another good source of advice is the Energy Hotline. It is offered by EES, which is part of a pilot program funded by the Department of Energy. For the past two years, Alabama has been one of ten states in the program exploring new ways to reach citizens with personalized help on energy conservation and use of new technology. The program has proved to be successful

Cemetery site still undecided

Editor:

On October 2, 1979 a local newspaper published an Atlanta AP article concerning the Region IV National Cemetery. Because of the omission of several pertinent facts, this article seems to suggest that VA Administrator Max Cleland has selected Fort Gillem, Ga. as the site of the National Cemetery. This is most definitely not the case!

Selection of Fort Gillem has several practical and aesthetic disadvantages. If the site is to be used, DDT and corrosive chemicals which have been buried there over the years would have to be exhumed and relocated, at an estimated cost of at least one billion dollars. In addition, Fort Gillem is located directly under the landing and takeoff patterns of large, noisy aircraft, which would frequently disrupt interment ceremonies.

Fort Mitchell Park, Ala. is very much in the running for selection as the site of the National Cemetery. It consists of 450 acres, which would be donated to the VA by Russell County, Al. There are 323,000 veterans within a 50-mile radius of this area and a total of 422,000 in Alabama. Many Georgia veterans prefer the Fort Mitchell location.

During his recent visit to Fort Mitchell, Cleland stated that this location would be ideal, but he would have to visit the other

proposed sites located in Georgia and South Carolina before making a decision. Some months prior to Cleland's visit, the U.S. House of Representatives unanimously passed legislation, sponsored by Bill Nichols, D-Ala., designating Fort Mitchell Park the desired location for the Southeast Regional Veterans Cemetery.

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DoD says no pay delays expected

Soldiers should receive their mid-month paychecks on time if congress gives DOD the authority to pay its employees. That was the situation when the **ROCKET** went to press.

"We're guardedly optimistic that, short of no Continuing Resolution Authority (CRA) funds, we'll make payments on time," stated Maj. Gen. Richard G. Fazakerley, commander of the U.S. Army Finance and Accounting Center (USAFAC), Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

A CRA would allow DOD to operate and pay bills based on rates in effect during the first quarter of FY 79. The CRA would remain in effect until its expiration date, or until the actual Defense Appropriations Act for FY 80 is passed by Congress.

Fazakerley does not expect soldiers to experience any delay in mid-month pay, if funds are available.

"We've taken steps to control the distribution of checks to Finance and Accounting Offices (FAO) very carefully to insure payments are made on October 15," Fazakerley. "These mid-month payments,

which affect about 390,000 soldiers will be make provided we have a CRA. If we do not have a CRA or actual budget authority, payments will be held until we get the funds."

The General emphasized that the Army is better equipped to deal with the problems associated with nonavailable funds because of last year's budget situation.

According to USAFAC officials, FAO's had to burn the "midnight oil" to get payroll checks out in time after the last minute passage of the appropriations bill for FY 79.

"All the questions of last year's experience turned out quite favorably," said an USAFAC official. "Very few people didn't get paid on their normal payday. In fact, only three installations didn't pay their people on that Friday. But, those people were paid the next day."

The Army has geared up to insure timely mid-month pay, according to the USAFAC officials. They emphasize that the only way soldiers will not be paid their mid-month pay on time is if there are no CRA funds to do so.

Health insurance cost goes up 10%

Health insurance premiums for most federal workers and retirees will be going up approximately 10 percent in January. The rate and benefit changes were approved recently by the Office of Personnel Management.

The exact premium rates will vary, depending on the plan you chose and the options within it. OPM announced that high-option premiums for Blue Cross-Blue Shield, largest of the 80 insurers in the government program, will climb 11.5 percent.

For Aetna, second-largest insurer, the high-option increase will be 7.6 percent; for the American Postal Workers Union Plan, 8.4 percent; for Kaiser Northern California, 9.9 percent; and for Kaiser Southern California, 19.5 percent.

More information on the rate and benefit changes is contained in brochures being sent to Civilian Personnel Division by the insurance companies.

Workers will have the usual "open season" between Nov. 12 and Dec. 7 to make changes in the plan or type of coverage they want for the coming year.

However, the brochures have not arrived yet and personnel workers don't know when to expect them. The MICOM civilian insurance office has no specific information on the rate changes, according to a representative there.

The new rates are expected to cost workers \$150 million a year more, while the government contribution to worker insurance coverage should rise \$250 million annually.

The government pays between 60 and 75 percent of the health insurance for workers and retirees, depending on which plan is chosen.

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
Why are you staying in the Army? Or why not?




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Crippled in childhood by mysterious illness, F&A man is handicapped employee of year

Bill Talkington likes his job as a voucher examiner in Redstone's finance and accounting office. He has only praise for the people he's worked with there. And they express similar feelings about him.

"He really touches my heart. He's always so cheerful, smiling and pleasant, said Mildred Donahue, administrative officer in finance and accounting.

Talkington will tell you, "I feel very fortunate. I can come and go when I want, I can go to school and I can work."

What he probably won't come right out and tell you is that he can't walk. Bill Talkington has had to use leg braces and crutches since he was 14.

He also may not tell you that's he's just been named the Handicapped Employee of the Year by the Huntsville area Committee for Employment of the Handicapped. Fred Boseck, job placement officer for Huntsville's Vocational Rehabilitation Services, said Talkington was selected because of his "outstanding desire to overcome his handicap." Talkington was nominated for the honor by the counselors at the Vocational-Rehab Center.

A normal child at birth, Talkington underwent an operation when he was 14 to try to cure the mysterious ailment that struck him and several other members in his family. It's so rare that it has no name and doctors still don't know it's cause.

"It was a gradual process, a weakening of the muscles in my knees that made my feet turn in and made it harder and harder for me to walk. At first they thought it was polio," he said. Specialists were flown in to examine him at the Children's Hospital in

Birmingham, but their tests provided no results. They finally operated, severing his hamstrings in a last attempt to solve his problem. But the operation was unsuccessful.

Talkington hasn't let his handicap stand in his way. Always attending public schools, after high school he attended Northeast



State Junior College in Rainsville, and then Jacksonville State College where he earned his degree in accounting.

Talkington began working part-time at Redstone during his last summer vacation from Jacksonville when he lacked only six hours for his degree. When a full-time voucher examiner position came open in August he said, "I saw my chance and I jumped." He finished up the credits he needed for his degree in evening classes at UAH, and has now been working for the government for a little more than one year.

"I wanted to get experience in the field,"

he said. "I like it and I really want to stay with the government."

Talkington, who is 27, lives with his family on Gunters Mountain near Grant. He rides in to work with a carpool each day, even though he can operate a regular automatic transmission car himself.

In his spare time, Talkington goes fishing "anywhere the water's deep enough," he

said. "And from past results that's been wherever they haven't been biting."

The award came as a complete surprise to him.

"I didn't know about it (the award) plumb up to the time I got it. I was real pleased over that." Talkington has been associated with the Vocational-Rehab Center since he was a child and said it is a "great organization."

When asked if he had any advice for other handicapped persons, he first said, "I'm not much for giving out advice." But several minutes later he did offer one bit of philosophy: "Just be yourself. You're no more or less important than anyone else."

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You've been in the Army long enough to know exactly what you'd like to do. If another job has a greater appeal, you don't have to leave the Army to get it. You can take advantage of the time you've still got left to see if you can change your MOS. SP4 Olivia Cunningham did just that.

"After your first enlistment, the Army gives you the chance to change your MOS. I'm going to be-

come an Equal Opportunity NCO. That's something I always wanted to do. I think the opportunities in the Army are fantastic."

The Army has a lot of ways for you to get ahead. You can change MOS, duty stations, even get an assignment overseas. But you've got to take the next step. And that means talking with your Reenlistment NCO. You'll get all the facts on how you can get ahead by staying in.

"At times it feels kind of strange working in the same building as my father, but basically it doesn't bother me. We get along real well," says 20 year old Dwayne Brush, a private first class assigned to the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

Brush, an instructor in the Hawk Pulse Acquisition Radar course, works on the upper floor of Bldg. 3307, while his father, SFC Eddie Brush, is working temporarily as the supply sergeant for the Hawk Division, on the first floor. The elder Brush's primary military specialty is Hawk Maintenance Chief.

Dwayne said, "My dad had showed me the equipment in the Hawk building before I enlisted and that got me interested in the electronics field."

His father could not attend Dwayne's swearing in. He said, "I was in Korea when he joined. I didn't force or persuade him to enlist, he did it on his own."

Prior to attending his systems course Dwayne was on a casual status for a month and a half waiting for his class to begin. During this time he was assigned to help out in the supply room where his father worked.

"It was kind of funny at first, having my son work for me in the supply room," commented Eddie. "I made a conscious

effort of not showing him partiality over the other lower enlisted who were working for me. It worked out well, though. He's a real hard worker."

On his assignment here, Dwayne said, "Towards the end of my course, I was asked if I'd be interested in staying here. And, of course my answer was 'yes'."

"It's funny," his father added, "I had nothing to do with his assignment here. His present section chief requested Dwayne be retained here as an instructor."

There have been no negative comments made about the two working together in the same building. "We were teased a little at first," said Eddie, "but after that, things got back to normal."

Dwayne came in for the educational benefits and experience he could receive from the Army. Now his sister is also thinking of entering the service.

And, according to Eddie, "She's thinking of entering the Hawk field."

Laser guided tank killer busy in helicopter tests

Hellfire, the Army Missile Command's laser guided tank killer planned for fielding in the early 1980s, is busier than a three ring circus.

Hughes and the Army have fired the first guided missile from the AH-64 Advanced Attack Helicopter at Yuma Proving Ground, Ariz. The missile scored a direct hit on a stationary target illuminated by MICOM's Ground Laser Locator Designator.

Col. Ben Pellegrini, Hellfire-Ground Laser Designators' Project Manager at Redstone, named recently to get his first

star, said all test objectives were accomplished.

The AH-64 hovered at 200 feet for the first guided flight.

Meanwhile, MICOM has completed 13 guided shots off the Army's Cobra helicopter, 11 successfully, as the Hellfire engineering development flight test program continues.

And finally, the Army has two contractors, Martin Marietta and Northrop, competing in a flyoff scheduled to begin later this year for development of a target

acquisition and designation system and pilot's night vision system.

The Army will select the winner next spring.

And MICOM is preparing for the first completely autonomous firing—designating a target and firing from the same aircraft. That shot will be done off the Cobra.

Hellfire is being developed as an evolutionary modular system that will accommodate a family of terminal homing seekers on a common airframe to engage tanks and hardpoint targets. The initial configuration utilizes semiactive laser guidance.

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Can of gas in car may kill you, Redstone fire department warns

If Huntsville's gas crisis in June caught you running on empty and you swore it would never happen again, you may be tempted to carry a spare can of gasoline around in your car. Concerning that practice, Redstone's Fire Inspector Bob Elder has only one word of advice — don't.

What harm could that small amount of gasoline do? Well, one cup of gas when aerated has the explosive force of one stick of dynamite, said Elder, so one gallon of gas could equal the power of 16 sticks of dynamite. A five-gallon can of gasoline has the potential of being more than enough to destroy your home or car.

The only safe place to store gas in your car is in the gas tank, Elder said. When you aren't driving, the trunk and interior of the car have no ventilation. They also heat up quickly in the sun — two factors which could easily contribute to explosion of a can of gas.

You also should not store gasoline in your home. If you must keep gas around, Elder said, it should be kept in a utility shed. Never store more than one gallon and always keep in a UL approved can. These cans have self-closing lids with release valves which keep pressure from building up inside. You should also be sure to store the gas in a well-ventilated, cool place.

Safe and proper storage of gasoline is only one aspect of fire safety being stressed this week — Fire Prevention Week — by Redstone's Fire Department.

Activities scheduled this week include fire safety presentations for children's groups and fire drills and demonstrations of fire

extinguishing techniques at selected buildings on post.

Elder said Redstone Firefighters put special emphasis on making children aware of the dangers of fire, because about half of all fire-related injuries occur to children. The National Fire Protection Association

estimates that there are 1,800 home fires each day in the United States and that about 8,800 people lose their lives each year because of fire.

Many of those fires can be prevented, Elder stressed, adding that the following things should be checked to help keep your home safe from fire.

- Are portable heaters kept away from the beds, curtains, clothing, and other flammable objects?
- Are light bulbs free of things that can burn?
- Are electric cords in good condition and never placed under rugs or through doorways or hung over nails or hooks?
- Are too many plugs in any one outlet?
- Is the furnace checked and cleaned regularly?
- Are things that can burn kept away from the furnace and heater pipes?
- Is trash kept covered and away from stairways? Is it taken away regularly?
- Are the right size fuses being used?
- Are paints kept in closed metal cans?
- If you have children, teach them as early as possible the dangers of matches and fire.
- You should also discuss how to escape in case of fire. You should establish at least two escape routes for each room. If all rooms aren't on the first floor, provision should be made for ladders or ropes to allow your family to escape safely. And you should also establish ways to warn your family swiftly in case of fire. In some cases fire will prevent you from running from room to room — alternate methods are pounding on walls, blowing whistles, or using fire alarms.

Gas siphoning is dangerous

One alarming by-product of the gasoline shortage has been an increased number of people poisoning themselves by siphoning gas.

Poison control officials across the country have noticed an increase in the number of gasoline poisoning cases in areas with the worst shortages and longest lines.

Experts say the problem isn't so much swallowing gasoline as it is getting gasoline — even as little as a teaspoonful — into your lungs.

Gasoline in your lungs can quickly cause chemical pneumonia and death. Fuel can enter the lungs if a person chokes or gags during or after swallowing.

If you should have to siphon gas, experts stress that you should go to a hospital immediately if you have any breathing problems afterwards.

But the best advice to remember is simply not to siphon gas at all. Siphoning pumps are an inexpensive, safe alternative to what could otherwise turn out to be a do-it-yourself disaster.

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
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
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

SIG-D shines in demonstration

BY BOB HUBBARD

Army Missile Command researchers are jubilant in the wake of the first flight test of a new missile guidance technique at White Sands Missile Range, N.M. recently, calling it "a picture perfect flight".

"Accuracy exceeded our expectations", said Jack Clayton, technical program manager for MICOM's Simplified Inertial Guidance Demonstration, or SIG-D, program.

MICOM, Vought Corp. and Honeywell fired a non-tactical T-22 missile approximately 60 kilometers, and landed "on target", in the first ballistic missile firing utilizing what the Army calls ring laser, strapdown inertial guidance.

Two additional flights are planned at White Sands to demonstrate and evaluate the new technology, Clayton said.

Ring laser gyros are solid state devices having fewer moving parts than conventional gyros, are more rugged and reliable and less expensive. Strapdown inertial components are "strapped down" to the missile airframe, eliminating the conventional gimbals and associated hardware, and consequently are more compact and flexible than conventional systems.

The new guidance technique, offering long range accuracy and lower costs, has potential for across-the-board Army missile applications, possibly as a replacement for Lance or as a contender in the Army's new armor-defeating Assault Breaker program.

For the demonstration program, MICOM is using the Lance-size T-22 missile and Lance-size solid propellant motors and

ground support equipment. Vought is supplying flight test vehicles and related hardware and Honeywell the laser inertial measuring equipment.

Prior to the initial flight, MICOM conducted static tests and evaluated components at Redstone, including hardware-in-the-loop simulations in the Advanced Simulation Directorate, and sled tests at Holloman Air Force Base.

researchers called the test to demonstrate a new guidance technique "... a picture perfect flight —".

MICOM's Technology Laboratory under Dr. Julian Kobler is conducting the SIG-D program in its Guidance and Control Directorate headed by Jess Huff. Dr. Paul Jacobs headed airframe development and Walt Jacobs the simulation and system studies. Other MICOM directorates supporting the program are Test and Evaluation, Aeroballistics, Ground Equipment and Materials, and Propulsion.
