

## Archaeologists study arsenal

MOBILE — Archaeologists working under contract to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District, are scheduled to begin a cultural resources reconnaissance study this week of a two mile wide and seven mile long corridor on the eastern boundary of Redstone Arsenal.

The reconnaissance, to be done by New World Research of New Orleans, Louisiana, will take place on both federal and private property. Landowners in the area selected for study are being contacted this week.

The study will attempt to locate significant historic or archaeological sites on the arsenal, and to determine if they may be affected by potential solutions to DDT contamination in the area of Huntsville Spring Branch. Six potential solutions to the DDT problem now are being studied by the Mobile District.

Dottie Gibbens, a Corps archaeologist in Mobile, said the

study will be conducted in an area one mile wide on each side of the eastern boundary of the arsenal, and extending from Martin Road to the Tennessee River. She said the study is being made in that area because testing of weapons on the arsenal makes it impractical to do the study solely on arsenal property. Gibbens said the area to be studied contains the major land forms found on the arsenal and should provide an accurate predictive model for possible archaeological sites on the arsenal.

This will be the first major archaeological study in the area since the 1930's. She said the study will entail revisiting all known sites and doing random sampling of land forms to predict where new sites might be found. Some heavy machinery, such as backhoes, will be used in the search.

The study is scheduled for completion in March.

## Survey: Results show workers unaware of 1978 Civil Service Reform Act

The results of a survey of 127 Redstone workers taken by the Office of Personnel Management last September confirm the worst—most employees are still not familiar

with the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978.

"We found that many employees appeared generally unaware of the provisions of the Reform Act," despite efforts to inform them

with pamphlets, newspaper articles, civilian personnel bulletins, and briefings, said OPM regional director David Caldwell.

An OPM analysis of the survey said in some instances, employee "no knowledge" responses show employees tend not to pay much attention to things they don't think will affect them directly. However, officials expressed concern because of high levels of unawareness in areas such as performance appraisal.

Responses indicating no awareness or knowledge ranged from 12 percent on grade and pay retention to 71 percent on the difference in weighing evidence for an employee's removal for unacceptable performance.

The greatest difference in responses was registered between nonsupervisory and supervisory employees. The latter group showed strikingly lower percentages of "no knowledge" response.

Responses showed:

—48 percent had no knowledge of an agency plan for implementing the Civil Service Reform Act. Twenty three percent were aware of agency plans.

—50 percent were unaware that the CRSA

## Jets swarm as troops test Patriot

Air Force jets swarmed over White Sands Missile Range, N.M., in the largest operation of its kind there last week during tests involving Patriot, the Army's newest air defense system.

Approximately 50 planes were used during the large scale operations described as tests to demonstrate troop proficiency in operating the Patriot system against large numbers of aircraft.

Some 240 sorties were flown during the four-day program.

Trained military personnel from the Air Defense Center at Fort Bliss, Texas, and the Army Material Test and Evaluation Agency at White Sands, formed a test battalion to demonstrate and evaluate the man-machine interface during air defense operations.

Maj. Gen. Oliver D. Street, III, Patriot Project Manager in Huntsville, said the tests were extremely successful.

Planning for the tests was conducted jointly by the Operational Test and Evaluation Agency, with Headquarters in Falls Church, Va., and the Air Force, with support from ARMTE, Office of Military Electronic Warfare, White Sands personnel and the Patriot Project Office.

Aircraft were provided through the 12th Air Force based at Austin, Texas.

Patriot, the Army's medium to high altitude air defense system of the 1980s, has undergone extensive testing at White Sands and is now in pre-production operational testing. Patriot will replace the Nike Hercules and Hawk air defense systems.

## State gets 30 days to amend DDT suit

BIRMINGHAM—A federal judge last week gave the Alabama attorney general 30 days to amend his suit against the Army for DDT contamination near Redstone Arsenal after hearing government lawyers argue the suit should be dismissed.

In the same hearing, Jan. 17, U. S. District Judge J. Foy Guin Jr. heard lawyers representing the Olin Corporation argue that the firm should be dropped as a defendant in the state suit and a second action filed last year by Tennessee River commercial fishermen.

Judge Guin must decide whether or not the case will be tried. Last week's hearing was to clear away preliminary motions. No date has been set for trial.

Attorney General Charles Graddick sued the Army, Army Corps of Engineers and Olin last year contending Olin's DDT operations in a plant at Redstone leased from the Army had contaminated the environment. Graddick asked the court to make the Army and Olin pay millions in damages and pay for whatever action may be necessary to clean up the contamination.

The commercial fishermen originally sued both the Army and Olin claiming \$50 million in damages, but later dropped the Army as a party to the suit. The two suits were consolidated last November.

The U.S. Attorney's Office in Birmingham is representing the Army and the Army Corps of Engineers.

# Post congregations to sponsor Vietnamese refugee family

A Vietnamese family will soon be immigrating to the United States and heading for Huntsville, thanks to the efforts of the two protestant congregations on post.

Their names weren't available but last week, Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Geoffrey Knott was notified that three family members — a father and two sons, age 4 and 6 — have been approved to immigrate from an Indonesian camp. Eventually, the congregation hopes to secure approval to bring in the family's mother, who is still in Vietnam, and four members of their extended family.

The idea to sponsor the family evolved from congregational members wish to "touch someone outside our community," said Knott. Before Christmas, the congregations made a request to the refugee section of the Home

Mission Board of Southern Baptists Convention in Atlanta for a Vietnamese family.

"Our hopes were to get the congregation to work together on something meaningful. It's been doing wonders," Knott said.

Since undertaking the project, church members have been raising funds, checking out other family needs such as housing and jobs available, and securing food, clothing, transportation and schools for the family.

Knott believes Redstone will be a "natural" sponsor since so many soldiers have been stationed in the Far East who will understand the family's cultural needs.

No date has been set for the family's arrival, but Knott said they hope it will take no more than three to five weeks.

## PX increasing cigarette price

DALLAS — Major tobacco companies have announced a cost price increase for cigarettes, necessitating a price increase by the Army and Air Force Exchange Service effective January 26.

A spokesman explained that the increase will include both individual packs and cartons and will apply to tax-paid cigarettes in the 50 states and to tax-free cigarettes sold in overseas exchanges.

King-Regular size cigarettes in the U.S. will increase from 4.25 to 4.45 a carton and the price of 100 MM cartons will be raised from 4.35 to 4.55. Individual packs in all lengths will go from 50 to 55 cents.

Overseas carton prices will be 3.55 for king-regular size and 3.65 for 100 MM: both prices reflect a 30 cent increase. Prices for individual packs will rise from 40 to 45 cents.

## UCMJ change affects bogus enlistment

WASHINGTON — Soldiers hoping to escape trial by court martial for a military offense just because their enlistment was fraudulent may no longer be able to do so.

For the first time in more than a decade, according to Army legal officials, Congress has made substantive changes to the Uniform Code of Military Justice. The biggest change is to Article 2. Which defines who is subject to the UCMJ.

The change to Article 2 remedies situations where a soldier was either intentionally enlisted fraudulently by a recruiter or enlisted fraudulently without the knowledge of the recruiter.

An enlistment is now considered valid for court-martial jurisdiction if the soldier has "the capacity to understand the significance of enlistment in the Armed Forces" and had voluntarily enlisted. The change was intended to overcome the effects of the 1974 "Russo" decision of the U.S. Court of Military Appeals.

In the Russo case, the Court of Military Appeals set aside Russo's conviction on the basis that he was not subject to military jurisdiction because he had been fraudulently enlisted.

Russo suffered from Dyslexia, a condition which affects a person's ability to read. Although the recruiter knew of Russo's condition, he provided Russo with the answers to the armed forces qualification test, enabling him to enlist.

Additionally, where the initial enlistment was defective, the change sets four conditions which must be met for court-martial jurisdiction. The soldier must have:

- Voluntarily submitted to military authority
- Met mental competency and minimum age at the time of voluntary submission to military authority
- Performed military duties
- Received military pay or allowances.

## GI life insurance dividends increase

WASHINGTON — The 4.1 million veterans holding GI life insurance policies will receive larger insurance dividends this year, according to the veterans administration.

VA will mail dividend checks to eligible veterans on anniversary dates of individual policies kept in force from World War I, World War II, and the Korean War.

According to VA, veterans holding World War I GI insurance policies will receive an average dividend payment of \$298. In 1979, they received \$256.

An average payment of \$149 will be sent to veterans holding World War II GI insurance policies, while Korean War veterans who kept their GI insurance active will receive average payments of \$62.

Some World War II and Korean war veterans with service-connected or serious non-service-connected disabilities will receive dividends on their insurance policies for the first time. The average dividend for these individuals will be \$94.

Officials point out, however, that the dividend amounts will vary with each veteran depending on the type of policy, amount of insurance, age at issue or renewal, and how long the policy has been in force.


All insurance dividend payments will be made automatically, according to officials. Policyholders do not need to apply for the payments or contact VA about them.

# Officer rating system said 'well received'

WASHINGTON — The new Officer Evaluation Reporting System has generally been well received throughout the Army, according to Milpercen.

During the summer of 1979, more than 51,000 officers were briefed by Milpercen teams as part of an Army-wide program to familiarize the officer corps with the new system, officials said. A similar program for reserve component officers was also conducted.

The new OERS represents the most substantial change in officer evaluation concepts and philosophy since World War II, officials said. It's aimed at dampening inflation, increasing communications and improving individual and organizational performance.

One of the strengths of the new system, officials say, is in the 'objective setting process' and use of the support form (DA form 67-8-1).

The support form increases two-way communication between the rated officer and the rater. It is also designed to strengthen the connection between the officer's performance and organizational performance, officials explained.

To do this, the new system requires the rated officer and the rater to discuss within the first thirty days of the rating period the rated officer's duty description and major performance objectives.

The main purpose of this process is to guide the rated officer's performance early in the assignment, officials explained.

Although it is suggested that the support form be used as worksheet during the objective setting process, it is not mandatory

that it be completed then. During the rating period, the objectives and duty description should be updated to reflect any changes which occur. This will insure that both the rater and the rated officer are aware of the latest performance requirements, a spokesman explained.

At the end of the rating period, the rated officer must complete the support form and give it to the rating officers to aid them in their evaluation.

The Army Vice Chief of Staff has tasked the DA Inspector General to monitor the new system at all levels of command. Teams are already conducting inspections in the field placing specific interest on insuring that:

- Duty descriptions and major performance objectives are set and discussed at the beginning of the rating period.

- Performance objectives and duty descriptions reflect actual key elements of performance.

- A continuing dialogue exists between the rated officer and rater providing for appropriate updating of the duty description and major objectives.

In addition to the IG's findings, input on the program will be provided from individual officers, career managers, selection boards and a variety of other sources. This input will be used to analyze the effectiveness and impact of the system on other personnel management systems, mission accomplishment and professional development, officials explained.

Initially, a spokesman said, every effort will be made to avoid formal changes to the new system. This will allow time for the system to take full effect before making adjustments, he explained.

Progress reports will be published by Milpercen periodically, the spokesman concluded. (ARNEWS).

## Army units train to single standard

WASHINGTON — All active Army, Army Reserve and Army National Guard units are now expected to train to a single standard, according to DA training officials.

The level 2 requirements in army training and evaluation programs (ARTEP) will no longer be published after Oct. 1, 1980, officials say. Units are expected to orient their training programs to the use of a single level ARTEP by Oct. 1.

The decision to go to a single level ARTEP was made with the support of all major army

commands, officials say. "There can be only one standard in combat so the different levels only caused confusion," one official said.

But what about reserve component units that do not have the personnel, equipment or funds required to train to the standard for all tasks in the ARTEP? In such cases local commanders will report shortages and tasks affected to their next higher commanders. The higher commanders will either provide the needed resources or temporarily accept the training deficiency.

provides for the removal of an employee when performance in one or more critical elements of job requirement is unacceptable.

—60 percent were not aware that CRSA stipulates the merit principles that must be followed by federal managers and supervisors.

However, 88 percent of respondents here were aware that the act provides for grade and salary retention under certain conditions when an employee is downgraded, although 60 percent said they do not understand fully who those provisions will operate.

The provision most employees expressed interest in learning more about was performance appraisal.



# Weekend concludes good hunting season

The waders have been hung to dry a final time. The 4 a.m. lines outside the Outdoor Recreation Center are gone. And that half-crazed look that comes into the eyes of some soldiers and civilian workers when the weather changes is a thing of the past.

Redstone's hunting season is now over for much of the most popular game, deer and waterfowl. It ended last weekend.

"It's been a good season," said SFC Charles Thorpe, game warden. "On the whole, we've had as good a game harvest as in any previous year."

How good has it been? The figures tabulated through Jan. 15 don't tell the final story, but they do indicate trends:

## More deer, dove taken

— More deer — 302 — were taken in this season, Thorpe said, a number up to par with large kills several years ago. He said several factors aided the hunts, such as having more ranges open, and more hunts when deer of either sex could be taken. Eighteen of those special hunt days were scheduled between Dec. 1 and Jan. 13.

— Dove hunting, which ended Jan. 13, produced 4,595 birds, up from 4,019 last year. Dove hunting is done in a split season, with one in September and October, and one in December and January.

— The only other game with a complete season total was squirrels — 1,038 were killed

this year, down from 1,208 in the previous season.

— The duck total stood at 553 last week. That's up from 330 killed last year, but neither year has been a particularly good season.

— Quail, rabbit and raccoon hunting are progressing at the same rate as last year. Those seasons continue until the end of February, as do those for opossum, snipe and trapping.

## Looking ahead

Looking ahead, Thorpe said February will be a big month for those remaining hunts. Special hunts in Wheeler Wildlife Refuge will be allowed for rabbit. Small game hunters will now have access to most areas previously limited to deer and waterfowl.

And in April, there's a possibility that the state will allow Redstone's first hunt of turkey gobblers. Thorpe said he will know next month if that can be arranged.

The number of people hunting this year has been "ideal," according to Joe Hopkins, physical activities director who's been in charge of assigning people to hunting areas and determining what game can be taken in specific areas. The Outdoor Recreation personnel have checked in 522 duck hunters; 3,604 deer hunters, an average of about 200 per day on each of the major hunts; and 360 hunters of small game.

"We've had a good situation this season," Hopkins said. "They're killing deer and we

have been able to accommodate all eligible hunters."

Last minute reassignment of areas was the only aspect of the season that caused some snags. On weekend deer hunts, hunters receive advance assignment of areas they are to hunt. Should a range area have to be closed for tests, hunters assigned to hunt there must be reassigned and there are times when they don't like that, Hopkins said.

Assignment of hunters to areas is run on a first-come, first-served basis which accounts for the lines waiting when the Outdoor Recreation Center staff begins to take advance requests for the popular weekend hunts at 4:30 a.m. Friday.

Hopkins and the Outdoor Recreation Center staff — augmented on busy early mornings with volunteer workers — have processed the hunters swiftly.

## Few problems

Thorpe and three other military policemen handle enforcement of hunting regulations in the field. They watch for safety problems and patrol to make sure hunters stay within their assigned areas.

Thorpe said there had been relatively few enforcement problems this season.

"Generally, hunters police themselves," Thorpe said. "The hunting regulation has built-in controls which provide a good, fair system."



# Young foresees new focus in 80s civil rights

On Martin Luther King's birthday, former U. N. ambassador Andrew Young's message to Redstone Arsenal was that although we are a long way from the fulfillment of the ultimate dreams of King, "that dream has come further to a fulfillment than any of us in this room imagined might have been possible."

Young spoke to a sell-out crowd of over 600 persons at a commemorative luncheon in the Officer's Club ballroom Jan. 15.

Although Young said he was sure King would be extremely proud of the progress made socially and politically in dealing with the problems of race and color in the U.S., Young sees another dimension to this struggle "much more related to class than to race."

"That has been the character of the struggle virtually since 1965 . . . and I think we have made genuine and significant progress when race is complicated by other socioeconomic factors," he said.

The next phase of the movement will deal with economics, especially one of the biggest problems facing the nation—teenage unemployment.

"One finds that there is no longer the kind of easy, take-it-for-granted upward mobility as a result of public education. I doubt that public education was ever able to bear that full burden," Young said.

"It used to be the military that supplemented public education and that young people who somehow as a result of their experiences in school were not able to achieve a trade or job or move into college, somehow went into the military. And the military, through its basic training, through its job training, through a tremendous, almost remedial program, served as an important supplement to the educational system and the basic family structure.

## Access into mainstream

"It (the military) made sure that all of our young people, especially our young men, had some continued opportunities and access into the mainstream of the economy.

"That's one of the reasons I happen to miss the draft and think that perhaps it was a loss to our nation for it did many, many things beyond the military aspects," Young said.

"Martin Luther King Jr. . . . said our science and our technology have made us neighbors, but now our morality, our religion and our politics must make us brothers. And if our politics, morality, religion and diplomacy fail us, the alternative is not separation in this kind of world. The alternative may well be destruction."

"The kind of mission and message of Martin Luther King Jr. is quite an appropriate message in the context of the military en-

vironment we are now sharing," Young said. "For indeed, we are safe and secure in these United States and able to pursue diplomatic and economic alternatives to war—essentially because of the military security and the higher level of military sophistication that has been developed in the confines of Redstone Arsenal."

At the conclusion of the luncheon speech, Young held a press conference with local media.
