Accidents hasten driving school

Everyone who drives Army vehicles — both civilian and military — may soon wind up in driver education class, thanks to a new program aimed at reducing the number of accidents and traffic violations on this post.

They will be attending several classes offered by the MICOM Safety Office Driver Improvement Program.

Classes began after FY 79 figures showed that 16 Army Motor Vehicles (AMV) were involved in accidents on post. Nearly 70 percent of those accidents involved cars driven by members of the internal security division (military police and civilian guards).

"We've got to ask 'Is this an inordinate amount?' I have a feeling it is," said B.F.

Hankins, chief of the Safety Office. "Year-in, year-out, we see the same thing. The trend never improves."

MICOM's AMV accident rate is the fourth highest among the 14 DARCOM installations, which vary in size and driving density. Several other installations also have driver education programs.

"Now we're concentrating on getting all emergency personnel through primary training," said driving instructor Donnie Rogers. Redstone's 120 military police, 30 firefighters and 18 medics are now in the process of receiving 20 hours of driving instruction.

They won't be the only ones going to driving school. The program's next priority will be to train all military personnel under age 25 with driver's licenses. Eventually, all civilian and military personnel with Army drivers licenses will be scheduled for the program's National Safety Council Defensive Driving Course (DDC).

Remedial driving training will also be taught, as required by a new regulation, to all personnel — civilian and military — involved in moving violations on post, and to drivers at fault in accidents here.

Within the past year, most of the security vehicle's accidents have involved loss of control. Two were collisions of two Army vehicles. Other accidents were caused by striking a tree, a fence, skidding into a guard rail, striking a bus and striking a deer.

\$21 million spent on Assault Breaker

The Army Missile Command has selected General Dynamics Corp. of Pomona, Calif., to supply air frames and seekers for the Defense Department's new Assault Breaker program.

General Dynamics received Thursday approximately \$21 million dollars for design and manufacture of Infrared Terminally Guided Submissiles (IRTGSM) for the 15 flight, technology demonstration program scheduled to begin early next year at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

General Dynamics and Boeing competed for the contract.

Late last month, Martin Marietta Aerospace at Orlando, Fla., was named integration contractor for the flight test program. In addition to furnishing the T-16 booster, Martin will manufacture dispensers, integrate submunitions and demonstrate the complete Assault Breaker system.

Assault Breaker will destroy large-scale tank assaults by hitting them with precisely aimed clusters of smart bomblets or terminally guided submissiles. Submunitions will be carried to the general vicinity of the armor

A great loss of talent

Time and the vagaries of the federal retirement pay system have combined to give tomorrow a special significance. More than 86 Army civilian workers and 24 soldiers will end their federal service on February 28, 1980. It marks the largest one-time loss of experience, talent and leadership in the Army missile team since the day, almost 20 years ago, when the entire Von Braun team transferred to NASA.

Some of those we lose tomorrow had a chance to go too, back then, and decided instead to stick with the Army. Many of them came to work here after 1960. A few have been here much longer. At least one remembers when the standard of success was a wheezing

V-2 staggering up, away and, if not North with precision, at least in that general direction.

And that is one way to measure how far we have come with their help. There are many other ways, because the standard of performance in the Army missile business has been pushed upward many notches and many times. Whatever the Army missile team is today — and most of us believe it something special — those who are leaving now helped shape it and bring it to where it is. They carry away an equal share of its accomplishments past and future.

There have been dinners or lunches for some. Small gatherings at their work sites for others. A common thread carries through


most of those events. When the jokes stop and the old days have been rehashed one more time, the retiree takes a minute or two to praise others. It is somehow typical that most, if not all those leaving tomorrow say, if given the opportunity, that others did more. Perhaps, but it is also true that the good teams and the fortunate organizations get solid performance from everyone. Certainly these have given their best and their best was very good indeed.

PFC Daniel Dotson, 291st MP Co. — "When the NCOs are at fault they should be punished. They're there to train the troops and look after them. When young people first come into the Army they're frightened. They'll do what the drill instructor says. There's no need to abuse them."



SFC Eddgardo Rivera-Castro — "I don't think Congress is right. The NCOs, not the officers, were the ones responsible. And they were punished."


What do you think of the congressional view that the Army is too lenient in cases of trainee abuse?

A veteran photographer's view of Redstone

Last Friday, Bill Kellar witnessed his umpteen thousandth awards ceremony in the commander's office, but this time things were a little different.

Smiling, Maj. Gen. Louis Rachmeler said to photographer Rex Evers, "Make this a good one" and handed a service award to Kellar, who is used to being behind a camera lens instead of in front of one.

The award marked Kellar's 35th — and last — year of federal service. The photographer who just may be the most universally recognized individual on the arsenal is retiring Friday.



In 25 years here Kellar, who has handled most of Redstone's "people" photography, has photographed so many thousands of arsenal workers receiving awards that he won't even hazard a guess as to how many. But along with all those grip-and-grin shots there have been some unlikely jobs, like the time military police wanted a picture of obscene writing on the wall of a stall in a women's restroom.

And there have been the unpleasant jobs, like posthumous awards presentations to brokenhearted local fathers and mothers during the Vietnam war.

Kellar seems to have laughed a lot, and cried a little too in the course of covering the arsenal with a camera for 25 years.

He laughed the time he was given what he terms his "most absurd" assignment — taking a \$3 picture to justify a claim for a broken mop handle.

He cried the time he had to crawl into a sewer to get a picture. Not that the job was all that distasteful — he found it a lot more pleasant than an assignment he once had to photograph an autopsy — but the sewer had carried waste from a World War II tear gas factory and residue in the pipe made Kellar cry so hard that he could barely see to focus his camera.

Kellar's also photographed crime scenes, U.S. Presidents and a lot more. In the course of getting his job done he's been turned in as a security risk, sprayed generals with the glass of exploding flash bulbs, and almost scared one of the Army's famous space monkeys to death.

Kellar, 59 years old, came here in 1955 from the Army photographic school at Fort Monmouth where he was on the faculty.

He recalls being apprehensive about his new job with the Army's glamour agency. "I was afraid I might be getting in over my head, was really concerned that I might not be qualified to work at Redstone. But on reporting to work he found that the photo operation — like many things on the arsenal back then — was really very primitive.

He also remembers the deep secrecy that surrounded almost everything that went on here — and how it proved a problem for him on one occasion. Kellar laughs when recalls the time a hearing was held to determine if he was a threat to national security, after he had been turned in as a security risk by an engineer, an Army corporal, who didn't like the questions Kellar was asking during a very routine assignment to photograph construction progress of Army Ballistic Missile Agency buildings.

He also remembers the time he photographed a missile displayed on the courthouse square on Armed Forces Day, and then being required to stamp "Secret" on the printed pictures.

Embarrassing moments

Kellar also admits to a few very embarrassing moments, like when a flashbulb would explode scaring and showering his photo subjects with glass fragments. "It wouldn't happen but maybe once in a thousand bulbs, but if you were using a big bulb it would pop like a pistol and spray glass." Flash pictures could also be dangerous to the photographer in the early days of electronic strobes, said Kellar. "There's a god-awful charge in that capacitor and sometimes you could get a short circuit that felt like it would paralyze you."

In his years here Kellar has photographed three presidents — Eisenhower, Kennedy and Nixon, countless lesser government officials and one of the Army's famed space monkeys.

The monkey was undergoing a conditioning experiment in preparation for space flight. A light bulb would flash in front of the monkey and the animal had to respond quickly by tapping a button on its chest, or receive an electric shock. Kellar said the monkey must have feared electrocution when the camera flash fired, as it began furiously beating the button on its chest.

Kellar says he wants to continue shooting a few pictures after he retires, but also wants to "hit the crafts circuit" and pursue his hobbies, which include collecting old tools, guns, bayonets, cartridges and Army uniforms, and maintaining his sons hand grenade collection when he enters the Army in July for Ranger training.


Kellar also collects plants — he had as many as 60 or 70 including 27 different ferns and seven palms — is active in church and Shrine work and plans to build a new house — a tiny one. He's building all the furniture too. House and furniture are miniatures, constructed on a scale of an inch to the foot.

Of his career, Kellar says, "I've got damn few regrets . . . it used to bother me that I couldn't get to be a supervisor. But the Good Lord or fate saw not to make me one and now, looking back, I can see that I probably wouldn't have made a good one. I believe it's better to leave here knowing I've been a good photographer, or always tried to be, rather than a poor supervisor.

"No, I've seen too many supervisors go out of here with everyone wishing they'd left five years earlier. I think I'll be leaving here with a lot more friends than if I'd been a supervisor."







Searching:

Sixteen new archaeological sites, including a prehistoric Indian village, have been found by a group of archaeologists conducting a study here for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The village site, in a farmer's field just off the arsenal's east boundary, appeared to have been used by Indians for many years.

Projectile points and pottery fragments found at the site are of the late Archaic and Woodland periods, indicating the site was inhabited, probably intermittently, within a period of approximately 3,000 years beginning around 2,000 B.C..

The type, depth and distribution

of the cultural deposits indicate the site may have been used off and on for perhaps 2,000 years in all, according to Carol Weed, leader of an archaeological team from New World Research, a Louisiana firm. "I hate to be that indefinite, but what probably happened was that they'd come in and set up shop, spend a few months and then split for the outlands", she said.

The excavation uncovered cooking hearths and a number of shallow round depressions, post molds where the support timbers of shelters had been sunk.

More precise dating of the site will be possible after careful examination of artifacts that were collected, along with radiocarbon dating of materials excavated from two trash pits that were approximately three feet deep.

Avoiding damage

New World Research, working under a contract to the Corps of Engineers, is trying to determine if there are significant archaeological or historic sites that would be damaged in the event Huntsville Spring Branch has to be rerouted because of DDT pollution in the stream bed.

The study area is a corridor seven miles long and two miles wide. It extends in length from Martin Road to the Tennessee River, and in width for one mile on either side of the arsenal's east boundary.

The corridor was selected for study because missile testing makes it impractical to do the study solely on arsenal property, said a Corps spokesman, and because the study area contains the major land forms found on the arsenal, and it should provide a model for predicting where other



Archaeologists find old village, ancient burial site during study

Archaeological sites may be discovered.

Sites examined by the archaeologists include an ancient village situated along the riverbank. The study was directed by Bill Schroder, chief of the Facilities Engineering Division, Ordnance Engineering Office. Evidence of Indian occupation was found in the Byrd Spring area.

Still rich

The area is still rich, even after 2,000 years. It has been picked up and studied for 200 years.

Archaeologists concluded their work last Friday and will return next week or so in order to examine old records. They are particularly interested in the layout of the land and how it was built in the area before forests were cleared and streams diverted and changed as a result of military use patterns.

Archaeologists tested 26 sites that had never been tested before. Additionally, they found sites that haven't been

documented. The latest discoveries, including 100 archaeological sites on the arsenal, have been documented. Many were found in 1978 by the Ordnance Engineering Office in Alabama for the Ordnance Engineering Office. They include ancient village sites.

Archaeologists discovered six human burials in North Alabama.

To remedy this, all personnel driving emergency vehicles must attend the 8-hour defensive driving course. They also must complete emergency vehicle training, which includes classroom time and some hands-on practice in the actual work vehicles. For that training, they will use the obstacle and pursuit portions of the Huntsville Police Academy Course at the old Huntsville airport.

"Many of these accidents happen because people are unfamiliar with the vehicle they're driving," Rogers said. "We'll stress handling characteristics — learning what their vehicle will do, what it don't do, and how it will respond to various situations."

Emergency vehicle drivers will also be instructed about "details they should know" such as liability, how to escort, and the correct way to make a traffic stop, Rogers said.

"We're getting good rapport among the students we've seen so far," Hankins said. "We're hoping for the same response from the civilian drivers."

Hankins estimates that there are 3,000 licensed drivers here, and that it will probably take two years to run all of them through the driving program. After that, he expects the program to be a continuing process.

In the future, safety officials also plan to teach courses for motorcyclists and bus drivers. The program is staffed by five instructors, including main instructors Rogers and Johnny Elliott. The driver education classroom is on the second floor of building 3468.

MAC flights add booze

WASHINGTON — Passengers traveling on some MAC charter flights may now buy mixed drinks, according to military airlift command.

Full beverage service began Feb. 1, but officials say not all the contract carriers have installed the necessary equipment yet. They are expected to all have full beverage service by March 1.

The service will be the same as that of regularly scheduled commercial airlines, officials said.

Previously, beer and wine were the only alcoholic beverages served on MAC charters. Each carrier's normal rules regarding age and sobriety will apply to the new service. (ARNEWS)
