SIG-D on target

The Army Missile Command's three-flight demonstration program to prove out a new missile guidance technique was, in a word, outstanding.

"We accomplished all program objectives," said Jack Clayton, technical program manager for MICOM's Simplified Inertial Guidance Demonstration (SIG-D) which just concluded at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

For the program finale, MICOM, Vought Corp., and Honeywell fired the non-tactical T-22 missile approximately 60 kilometers and landed 'right on target'.

During White Sands tests, MICOM used the solid-propulsion, Lance-sized missile which obtained its accuracy from a MICOM technology program called ring laser, strapdown inertial guidance. Ring laser

gyros are solid state devices having fewer moving parts than conventional gyros, are more rugged and reliable and less expensive.

Strapdown inertial components are 'strapped down' to the missile applications, including the Army's new Corps Support Weapon System and the armor-defeating Assault Breaker program.

MICOM's Army Missile Laboratory under Dr. Julian Kobler conducted the SIG-D program in its Guidance and Control Directorate, headed by Dr. Jess Huff. Dr. Paul Jacobs headed airframe development and Walt Jordan the simulation and system studies. Other MICOM directorates supporting the program were Test and Evaluation, Aeroballistics, Ground Equipment and Material, Propulsion, and the advanced systems concepts office.

MULE

First engineering development unit here for tests

Hughes Aircraft Company has delivered to MICOM for testing the first engineering development laser unit the Army is developing for the Marines. The laser is called Modular Universal Laser Equipment (MULE).

MICOM has tri-service responsibility for development of all ground laser equipment under Col. Stanley Cass, Project Manager for Hellfire and Ground Laser Designators. In addition to MULE, the Missile Command is developing a 16-pound, hand-held unit for the Air Force called Laser Target Designator (LTD), and the Ground Laser Locator Designator (GLLD), the Army's most precise designator and rangefinder.

For the next two months, MICOM's Test and Evaluation Directorate will wring out the MULE equipment, looking particularly at safety, compatibility with Copperhead (the Army's artillery round equipped with a laser

seeker) and verification of maintenance technical manuals.

"From Redstone, the MULE equipment will go back to Hughes for refurbishment, then

More promotions to E-4 expected soon

WASHINGTON — More E-3s can now be promoted, DA personnel officials have announced.

A new way of determining the number of E-4s allowed will raise the number of promotions to E-4, DA officials said.

Previously, 70 percent of the total number of E-3s and E-4s assigned to a unit could be E-4s authorized, a spokesman said. These soldiers don't have the minimum time in service required for promotion to E-4 with a waiver, he said.

Along with this change, 80 percent of the

total number of E-3s and E-4s with at least 15 months service may now be E-4s. Also, 20 percent of the E-4s can be in the waiver zone (15 to 23 months).

Because of these changes, the spokesman said, the number of promotions allowed in April could increase by about 5,000. March figures can be recomputed based on the new system and units may be able to promote more E-3s, he added.

Promotions to E-4 authorized by enlistment contracts and the "Stripes for skills" program will continue to be honored and are exempt from these restrictions.

Proposal said threatening retirement pay

In the past there have been many articles written regarding the Civil Service

Retirement System and Social Security. We Civil Servants are constantly reminded of the generosity of our Federal Government. The Federal Retirement System (taxable) was established many years ago and never has had and never should have any relationship to Social Security.

The Federal Retirement System is exactly

what the words imply: A retirement liberally compensated by its workers for a future income when we have reached retirement age.

The Social Security Program was not initiated as a retirement system but as a social welfare program (untaxed). The funds paid into this program are most assuredly the reason for its unhealthy situation within the Federal Government today. A person receiving Social Security benefits may pay into the program for as little as ten years and at the age of 65 receive untaxed benefits until death. The monthly retirement received from this welfare program will vary according to the recipient's salary during the period he — she was paying Social Security.

The News Services have speculated and highlighted the guesstimates and now the proposals that are being offered to Congress by the Congressional Budget Office (CBO). These options touched on by Mike Causey are totally unfair, unlawful, immoral, and, in my opinion, grounds for grievances and — or lawsuits.

If you feel comfortable knowing your retirement livelihood is being threatened, then sit back and do nothing. If you are concerned, write your Congressmen and express your opinions.

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Legislation helps RFCU

The Redstone Federal Credit Union has announced changes in loan policies and, as a result of national legislation passed this week, an increase in loan interest percentage rates.

According to Roy Hollihan, manager, the legislation which gives the RFCU authority to raise loan interest rates should provide more cash flow. This should enable the RFCU to retire outstanding obligations at a faster rate. The first two months of the year the organization has retired \$4.7 million in outstanding debts.

The interest story actually began in 1978, a good business year, when the organization experienced a 63 percent increase in loans. At that time it was possible to cover them by

borrowing funds. When the spectacular rise in money costs occurred nationally in 1979 the RFCU was at a disadvantage because it could not raise its interest rates to members who asked for loans. Therefore, RFCU restricted its loaning because it could not pass along the rising cost to customers as other businesses could. The RFCU did enter the "money market", offering higher investment returns, and was able to hold almost 40 percent of its funds which would have gone to other investments and would have been damaging as a result.

Hollihan believes the president's new policies will assist the RFCU by making the open market more restricted, such as in the case of mutual funds which will now put up 15 percent in reserve. This will give such types of

investments less advantage over investment in establishments such as the RFCU. He foresees, however, at least three months ahead with loan restrictions before economic conditions can be eased enough nationally to allow larger loans.

The new annual percentage rate for those who borrow from RFCU will be 15 percent per annum. Loans will be restricted to \$500 per year. Add-ons to existing regular, rocket, and space loans are discontinued.

Additionally, after 30 days' notice astro drafts, overdraft privileges, and appollo vouchers are discontinued under existing contracts. Approval of new VISA accounts and increases in present VISA account limits will be temporarily discontinued.

Driver's license check leads to arrest of fugitive

A routine drivers license check by two alert Redstone military policemen led to the arrest of a fugitive from justice on the night of March 21.

The MPs, Sgt. David Bateson and Pvt. 2 Ricky Lanham, apprehended the man at gate 8 when it was learned that he was wanted in Kansas for burglary and theft.

He was driving a Jetplex Limousine Service taxi cab when he attempted to enter the Goss Road gate with two passengers shortly after 8 p.m.

Bateson and Lanham stopped the cab so a visitors pass could be issued. The driver, identified as James C. Rice, 20, could not produce a drivers license when the MPs asked for it.

They obtained his name and phoned it to the MP desk with a request that it be checked with the National Crime Information Center, where the computer indicated the man was wanted in Pratt, Kansas.

The MP desk checked with authorities there and found that Rice was wanted for jumping a \$10,000 bond for burglary and theft charges.

Bateson and Lanham held the fugitive for local authorities. He was taken to jail by Huntsville police.

His passengers, enroute to a wedding reception, were transported to the Officers Club by an MP courtesy patrol.

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

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
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Slots return to overseas clubs



WASHINGTON — The Army and Air Force announced Friday a plan to reinstate slot machines in military clubs overseas where not in violation of foreign laws or agreements.

Officials say the machines will be put in clubs in two phases. The first 200 are expected to be in operation at two posts in U.S. Army, Europe six to eight months from now. These two test sites have not yet been selected, DA officials say.

The second phase is expected to begin about a year later, after control procedures have been tested and slot machines have been procured.

There may eventually be slot machines in 238 clubs in USAREUR, 108 clubs in Korea, four clubs in Japan and at three armed forces recreation centers, according to Army officials.

Three types of machines will be authorized, officials say. The five, ten and 25 cent single line slot machines will be set at the factory

to return about 93 percent to the players. At this rate, the full program is expected to provide a net income of \$6.5 to \$7 million a year for use in morale, welfare and recreation programs.

The Army and Air Force statement cites two reasons for the decision to bring back the slots: "To enhance the recreational opportunities available to our personnel in overseas areas, particularly at remote sites," and "to provide additional sources of revenue to improve the quality of morale, welfare and recreation facilities and programs in both services."

Only authorized club patrons and their dependents and guests who are 18 or more years old may use the machines, officials said.

Club management personnel, others with duties directly related to slot machine operations, and their dependents will not be allowed to use the machines. Installation commanders will have authority to prohibit use by any other persons if necessary.

Reg change affects retirement

Interim changes to retirement regulations are being made to permit military personnel to submit retirement applications upon attaining 18 years and 11 months of active service, according to Frank Adair, Redstone Retired Services Officer.

Adair said the changes are applicable to normal voluntary retirements — those not requiring exception to policy or waiver — and retirement in lieu of PCS.

Effective April 1, he said, applications for retirement that require no waiver of service obligation as of the retirement date may be accepted and approved by the retirement authority for:

— Military personnel who have completed

18 years and 11 months of active federal service, provided the requested retirement date is no later than the end of the month during which the member attains 20 years active service.

— Members who have 19 or more years of active service, provided the requested retirement date is no more than 12 months subsequent to the date of the request.

— Eligible members who request retirement in lieu of complying with an alert or orders.



Tickets are \$5 per person. The tasting fair will begin at 6:30 in the Officers Club. For ticket information call Karen Moore, 837-3507.



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
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
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
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


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


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

"Be a voter!"

"You're a voter only if you vote! Be a voter!" is the slogan that won the 1980 Federal Voting Assistance Program's voting slogan contest.

The author of the slogan, Air Force Sgt. Francis P. Burned, Jr., is a naturalized U.S. citizen. Burned received a letter and certificate of recognition from the Secretary of Defense for his effort.

Burned's slogan was selected as the winner from more than 2,500 entries. The slogan now appears on the new federal post card registration application that service-members, their families and citizens living overseas use to register and vote.

Army Sp5 Gerald R. Reed with "Get in shape! Exercise your right to vote!" and Mrs. Michael Kristula with "Exercise your right to vote! Run to the polls!" tied for second place in the contest. Army MSgt.

Kenneth Beckett took third place with his slogan, "Take time for America! Vote!"

Primaries slated

Primary elections are held before a general election to allow the voters to have a role in picking a political party's candidates for offices at both the state and national level.

In most states, the names of actual candidates are on the ballot while in some states delegates to party nominating conventions are selected during the primary elections.

Separate primaries are held by each of the principal parties in some states. In others, only the major political party holds a primary.

Check with your unit voting officer for complete information on the type of primary being held in your state.

Registering, voting easier

You'll find it easier to register and vote in the 1980 elections.

A new Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) will be accepted in most states as both an application for registration and for absentee ballots.

Some states, however, will still treat the first FPCA sent as a registration request only, and require voters to send another FPCA requesting absentee ballots.

The new FPCA contains 16 detailed questions, a change from the old 11-question FPCA. Questions include citizenship status, state residence, ballots requested, personal information and social security number.

Also, the application is larger. According to officials, all states recommended this change so the new card would fit into state filing systems.

The revised FPCA is available at military installations and at U.S. embassies and

consulates. Meanwhile, the old FPCA will continue to be accepted but many states will use it for registration only.

U.S. citizens should contact their local voting assistance officers or counselors to pick up the FPCA along with other information on absentee voting.

As long as it is mailed in a U.S. postal facility or mailed from an APO or FPO facility, the FPCA is a postage-free form. Voters may also mail FPCAs from U.S. embassies and consulates.

Voters can help themselves and their states by filling out the FPCA legibly, signing it and mailing it early.

Anyone having questions which can't be answered by their local voting officer should contact the Director, Federal Voting Assistance Program, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Pentagon, Washington, DC 20301.

VA finances energy items

WASHINGTON — Soldiers and veterans can now add the cost of installing energy-saving items to their basic loan amount when purchasing a home with a Veterans Administration guaranteed loan.

Improvements may include the installation of a more efficient heating or cooling system and the addition of insulation, storm windows, or any other qualifying energy-saving device.

The purchaser should have a cost estimate for the proposed energy-saving improvements when applying for the loan. The total amount of the loan will be the cost of the house, less the downpayment, plus the cost of the energy-saving items. This total can be financed for up to 30 years.







Report on Credit Union Activities

Share Drafts, Other Favorable Legislation Enacted

Credit union members have won a successful conclusion to their year-long fight to save share draft accounts.

On Thursday, March 27, 1980, the United States House passed and Friday the Senate passed a compromise version of H. R. (House Resolution) 4986, the 'Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980.'

The bill provides Federal credit unions with permanent legislative authority to offer their members share draft accounts.

In his economic program to moderate inflation announced March 14, President Carter promised to sign the bill into law. Bill signing is scheduled for Monday, March 31.

New legislation includes:

Share draft authority:

An increase in the amount of federal deposit insurance, including that for Federal credit union accounts, from \$40,000 to \$100,000 per account;

A six-year phase-out of Regulation Q, which allows savings-and-loan associations to offer .25% higher dividends or interest than banks to their savers;

A provision to allow the Board of Directors of a Federal credit union to increase the 12% ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE limit charged on loans to a maximum to 15% ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE; the National Credit Union Administration could increase the lending rate limit above 15% for up to 18 months when economic conditions require it.

Loan Policy Changed

The Board of Directors has approved increasing the interest rate on all new or refinanced loans granted, except real estate first mortgages from 12% ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE to 15% ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE. The increase is effective either May 1, 1980, or on the date on which both legislation and the final rules of proposed bill H. R. 4986 are in effect, whichever is later.

To cooperate with President Carter's credit restraint program to moderate inflation pressures in the economy, the Credit Union makes the following changes in loan policy:

The Credit Union will consider applications for loans secured by some types of collateral or by shares, although new loans for revolving and open-end types of credit will be discontinued temporarily.

The maximum amount of new loans or credit is \$500 per year, effective Mar. 24, 1980, except shares-secured loans.

Add-ons to existing regular, rocket, and space loans are discontinued. After 30 day's notice, Astro draft, overdraft privileges and Apollo vouchers are discontinued under existing contracts.

Applications for additional credit in all loan programs at the new interest rate will be considered on and after the effective date of the increase, subject to the \$500 limit.

The Credit Union will temporarily discontinue approving new VISA accounts and increases in present VISA account limits.

Credit Union Deals With Tight-Money Conditions

Redstone Federal Credit Union is making changes to deal with current tight-money conditions and to co-operate with the Credit Restraint Program President Carter announced March 14.

The Credit Union has made changes in its loan policy, both to co-operate with the President's program and in accordance with provisions in new legislation enacted.

In addition, the Credit Union has taken other steps to meet current conditions:

The restrictive loan policies adopted in the last few months enable the Credit Union to reduce its expenses and to maintain benefits to the membership.

The Credit Union is repaying its notes payable for funds borrowed previously which were used to meet loan demand. The combination of reduced loan and notes payable volume results in a reduction in assets. The actual effect is to improve the Credit Union's financial condition by reducing the cost of commercial money the Credit Union Borrows.

The Credit Union maintains a large, liquid reserve fund with which it meets daily operating expenses and loan and withdrawal demands. In addition, the Credit Union maintains investments and other reserves.

A large line of credit is available to the Credit Union from local sources should an unanticipated demand occur.

The Board of Directors may choose to borrow funds from the Credit Union Central Liquidity Fund, established through the National Credit Union Administration, Washington, D. C. This fund was established specifically to provide a source of funds should local sources of commercial funds evaporate.

All members accounts are insured to \$40,000 by the Administrator, National Credit Union Administration. The legislation granting share draft authority will increase this amount to \$100,000 per account.

Dividend Declaration

The Board of Directors declared a dividend on First Quarter 1980 members' shares at a rate of 6.25% per annum, payable to members' share accounts as of April 1, 1980.

A night sight is planned for the system for 24-hour operation.


"MULE can be used in a variety of roles," Maj. Carradice said, "depending on the mission. A few infantrymen may carry only

Utility poles are looking better, crossarms don't snag lightning

The short periods without power that are being experienced at various places around the arsenal are occurring as the Facilities Engineer Electrical Section puts up new utility poles and crossarms.

The short outages are necessary to insure that longer, unexpected ones don't occur in the future, according to Arthur Barnette, chief of the Electrical Section.

The project, in addition to replacing bad poles, includes installing new vee-shaped fiber glass crossarms on all of the 6,000 utility poles on the arsenal.

Barnette said the new equipment will look better and be more reliable, resulting in better service to buildings and homes here and requiring less maintenance.

He said it will especially benefit computer users at Redstone, who may experience computer problems for weeks when an unexpected loss of power occurs.

Part of the arsenal's electrical distribution system is original equipment, installed during World War II, explained Barnette.



He said old utility poles have deteriorated with age and it is not unusual for them to break in a high wind. Also, with the old equipment on the poles, lightning strikes are a problem but the new fiber glass crossarms are much more resistant to lightning.

"Generally, we're installing the new stuff first in the places it's needed most", said Barnette. Some of old rundown equipment was

so bad that "We could predict where the power would be going out" during a storm, he added.

Installers of the poles and crossarms are taking pains to make sure people are notified and that power is off for as short a time as possible while the new equipment is being put up.

Where computers or other special equipment is involved, finding a convenient time to cut power to the area require six months of coordination, said Barnette. In some cases "break load" switches and "redundant" feeds are being installed so an area can be switched under load to another line with no disruption of power while the installers work, he said.

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Board will pick senior NCOs for academy

WASHINGTON — Senior active Army NCOs will be selected this summer to attend upcoming resident and non-resident courses at the U.S. Army Sergeants Major Academy, according to MILPERCEN.

A DA board is scheduled to meet July 15 to select about 400 NCOs to attend resident classes starting in August 1981 and February 1982.

The board will also consider applicants for the non-resident course starting in April 1981.

The criteria for resident and non-resident courses vary somewhat, according to a Milpercen spokesman. Only volunteers in grades E-7(P), E-8 and E-9 are considered for the non-resident course. E-8s and E-9s with a date of rank of August 1, 1975, through July 31, 1979 will automatically be considered for the resident course.

Those who have previously declined a

resident or non-resident course will not be considered again. Also, NCOs who have submitted an application for retirement will not be considered by the board for either program.

NCOs selected for the resident course may accept or decline the schooling, the spokesman said.

Those who attend the resident course must serve at least 19-months after graduating. There is no service obligation, however, for those completing the non-resident course, he added.

To be eligible for the resident course, NCOs must have less than 23 years active service as of Sept. 1, 1981. This requirement may be waived for NCOs applying for the non-resident course.

According to the spokesman, the non-resident course used to take two years to

complete. Because of some administrative changes, the course can now be completed in about 18 months.

Six soldiers started the non-resident course April 1, 1979 and graduated in Feb. 1980, the spokesman pointed out, so it is possible to finish the course in less than a year.

Applications for the non-resident course are now being accepted. The application format is in Appendix C, AR 351-1. Applications must be sent through channels to Commander, MILPERCEN, Attn: DAPC-EPZ-HB, 2461 Eisenhower Ave., Alexandria, Va. 22331 and arrive before June 1.

NCOs wishing to attend either the resident or non-resident course should be sure their records and photographs are current.

To review their microfiche, NCOs should write to Commander, USAEREC, Attn: PCRE-RI, Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind. 46249.






