Why is Betsy crying?



Life and training named theme for Armed Forces Day

A parade here at 1 p.m. on May 14 and an open house at MMCS to show people "how we live and train" is being planned next Wednesday for Armed Forces Day, according to Capt. Guy Zachry, chairman of the MMCS AFD committee.

Zachry said that the general public and Redstone workers are invited to participate in the observance, and that special invitations have been extended to the five high schools in Huntsville. "They know what their classrooms are like, and we think they would be interested in what an Army classroom is like," he said.

The self-paced electronics classrooms of the school's Common Subjects Department will be opened as well as the outdoor training areas where MMCS students get hands-on experience with the Nike Hercules and Improved Hawk missile systems.

Many other systems will be on display in the parking lot near the corner of Hercules and Patton Roads, across from the Post Chapel. The neighboring 7th Student Company barracks will also be open.

Zachry said, "We'd like to have as many Huntsville citizens visit us as possible. We see it as a great opportunity to meet our civilian neighbors, thank them for their hospitality and show them what goes on on this side of the fence."



He added, "While we've kept the displays as close together as possible, we will provide buses to shuttle visitors between areas."

In addition to the parade and open house, events commemorating the 31st annual observance of Armed Forces Day include a luncheon hosted by the Huntsville Chamber of Commerce on May 16 and the annual presentation of Alabama's Governor's Awards to the outstanding military representatives of the state's many military activities.

A proclamation issued by Huntsville Mayor Joe Davis and James Record, county commission chairman, proclaimed the week May 12-17 as Armed Forces Week in the local area and urged local citizens to "display with prominence the flag of the United States of America" as an expression of support of Redstone Arsenal and the nation's armed forces.

Choppers fly low in tests here

Redstone Arsenal for the next few days will be the site for low-flying helicopters, particularly near the arsenal's western boundary.

The Army is evaluating several candidates for the role of scout helicopter and their ability to operate and survive in a combat environment. Although there will be no live firings, the test program calls for tactical, nap-of-the-earth flights, at extremely low altitudes.

Tests will be conducted jointly by the Army Missile Command (MICOM) here and the Army Aviation Test Board at Fort Rucker, Ala.

Major Jack Swinehart, Rucker's test director for the Near Term Scout Helicopter user evaluation, said the helicopters will fly to simulated battle positions, along carefully planned routes, while attempting to avoid detection from ground observers.

"That means we fly right on the deck," Swinehart said. During the tests he said pilots will avoid residences and populated areas, livestock and cultivated land.

Helicopters will not land on private property unless there is an aircraft emergency.

Tests will be conducted weekdays for the next two or three weeks, depending upon the weather.

MICOM's Test and Evaluation Directorate, under Robert Black, is supporting the helicopter test program.





Do bonds fill the pot . . .



Are bonds losing their luster?

. . . as fast as inflation empties it?

Redstone workers may have once been staunch supporters of the U. S. Savings Bonds program, but they aren't today.

"Our program is decreasing," said Willa Dean Jones, Redstone bonds program coordinator.

Her observation is based on fact. In March of 1979, 67 percent of Redstone's total workforce bought savings bonds. By the end of March this year, that figure had dropped to 43 percent.

Only a few years ago the installation's bonds program participation percentage was in the 90s.

Nationally, participation is down too, said Carolyn Johnston, spokeswoman for the U. S. Savings Bond Program in Washington. Americans purchased \$379 million worth of bonds this March, compared to \$623 million bought one year ago — a drop of 39 percent.

Two problems

Johnston believes the slump is due to two problems: savings bonds "modest" interest rate of 6.5 percent, and inflation's negative impact on all savings programs.

To cure the first problem, "the Secretary of the Treasury has strongly requested an interest rate raise to Congress," which determines that rate, Johnston said. "We're asking Congress to take the cap on our interest rate off entirely so we may set it to respond to the current market rate."

Another factor which may bear on the program's slump is the conversion from E bonds to EE bonds, made on March 30.

The conversion meant:

— Purchase price went from 75 percent of face value to 50 percent.

— EE bonds must be held six months before they can be redeemed, versus two months for E bonds.

— They mature in 11 years instead of five years.

The conversion brought no change in the 6.5 percent interest rate.

Redstone workers were informed of the impending conversion to EE bonds in January. At that time, 61 percent of all civilian employees here bought bonds. By the time the

conversion went into effect March 30, 41 percent were with the program. Jones said program participation has fallen off by two to three percent every pay period since January.

"Most of the complaints we've had with the conversion are about the six months holding time," Jones said. "Also, people say they can get a better investment somewhere else."

"I had them for years, but I cancelled because they just weren't paying enough. They didn't keep up with the inflation rate," said John Norris of Graphic Illustration.

It's hard to find people here who will tell you the bonds are a good deal. Even the people who still buy them often say their money could be put to better use elsewhere.

"Yes, I do continue to buy them to satisfy the minimum requirement. I wouldn't invest a lot of money in them because of the poor interest offered," said Vernon Benson of Maintenance and Engineering.

"I've continued buying them on the basis of supporting the organization. I go ahead and do it even though I don't believe in it," said Leslie Conger of Product Assurance.

For some, not buying bonds is a personal statement.

"While the pitch for buying bonds is

patriotic, some of us consider government spending to be the root of many evils. I consider myself patriotic for cancelling my bond allotment, thereby depriving the government of that money," said a worker at MICOM headquarters.

For nine months last year, members of the American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE) were so angry with the cap on federal cost-of-living pay that they asked all federal workers to boycott the savings bond program.

"We dropped the bond boycott last October when the President agreed to the principle that federal workers' pay should not be capped at five percent. However, many of our workers are still upset about the economy and have maintained their own personal boycott of the bond program," said Dick Calistri, spokesman for AFGE in Washington.

Definitely responsible

Calistri said he believes the union boycott was "very definitely" responsible for the drop in the number of people buying bonds.

"Participation in the program dropped off incredibly during the boycott as people stopped their payroll deductions and cashed in their bonds to invest in other areas," Calistri said.


Officials at the Army Finance Center in Indianapolis agree that Redstone's not the only place having problems with a slumping bond program. They say it's widespread, not just within the Department of the Army, but with all federal and civilian workers.

The levels of participation DA-wide for the first quarter of this year (ending March 30) won't be available until mid-May, said Alice McCarty, administrator of the Army's bond program.

"It's down, I know that," McCarty said. "It even started decreasing last year."

To top it all off, May is Savings Bond Drive Month for DA employees. As usual, there are no set goals, Jones said. Instead, the drive will be conducted "to educate employees on the benefits of the program," Jones said. Each employee will be contacted by a canvasser this month.

"The drive aims to encourage people to save on their own," Jones said.

\$20.7 million contract let for MLRS

The U.S. Army has selected Vought Corporation of Dallas as the prime contractor for further development of the Army's new Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS).

With the selection, the Army Missile Command last week awarded \$20.7 million to Vought for final qualification and design refinements, leading to the fielding by the U.S. Army of a free flight artillery rocket system.

Vought and Boeing Aerospace Co., of Seattle, for the past 33 months have competed for continuation of the MLRS development. During that time, both contractors built, tested and demonstrated their respective weapon systems.

Proposals from both firms were evaluated by an independent evaluation committee of approximately 100 members, during an intensive six-month study at Redstone Arsenal. Their work, in turn, was reviewed by senior military and civilian personnel.

The Army's decision was based on cost and operational effectiveness.

Vought is teamed with Atlantic Research Corp., of Gainesville, Va., for the propulsion components, and Bendix Corp., of Teterboro, N.J. and Norden of Norwalk, Conn., for the fire control system.

MLRS consists of a 12-round launcher mounted on a highly mobile, tracked vehicle that can fire rockets singly or in rapid ripples. Rockets have a range of more than 30 kilometers. A kilometer equals about five-eighths of a mile.

MLRS may be coproduced in both the United States and Europe with Great Britain, West Germany and France. The four coun-


Vought's Multiple Launch Rocket System wins competition.

tries signed a memorandum of understanding last July calling for the cooperative development of a standard NATO rocket. Hardware will be standard except for com-

munications equipment.

The Army plans to field the system in the early 1980's. Col. Monte Hatchett is MLRS Project Manager at Redstone.

City seeks annexation of arsenal

Will Redstone become part of Huntsville? Will soldiers' kids who live on Redstone stop going to Huntsville schools?

Answer to all the above: Maybe, but probably no.

The questions are being asked, however, because the Huntsville Board of Education two weeks ago asked the city government to begin formal action to annex Redstone Arsenal, that is, bring the federal installation — all 38,000 acres of it — inside the city limits.

The city school people want that done because they believe that would make it possible for the city to collect some taxes on post. Not from soldiers or from Army operations, but perhaps from private individuals and contractors operating on the arsenal.

School people are hard up for money to run city schools. Part of the cash problem comes from a plan to cut off federal aid that has been paid to the city for many years for soldiers' kids as well as children attending Huntsville schools whose civilian parents work on the arsenal.

Congress is looking at stopping the federal

aid. If the funds are cut, the city loses more than \$2 million dollars, a good piece of an annual school budget that runs about \$34 million.

The possible annexation of the arsenal has raised many questions, but as yet, there are few answers. Army policy is that it does not oppose annexation, but the Army does want to know what benefits in the form of services it can expect. Would the city, for example, give police and fire protection, sewage, water and street repair to the arsenal as it does to other positions of the city? If the city did do that, would the cost of the additional services be more than the extra tax revenue the city would get?

Apparent gains

There are two apparent gains for soldiers through annexation: soldiers living on the arsenal could vote in city elections. Their children, as city residents, would attend Huntsville schools.

Army kids from Redstone have gone to city schools for more than three decades, but they are not city residents. Redstone is part of Madison County, not Huntsville and that caused the county school board to ask last

week how come the arsenal kids are not in county schools?

The apparent answer is that years ago, the arsenal commander and city officials agreed that the arsenal youngsters would go to city schools.

There are about 1,000 youngsters from Redstone in city schools now. The city school board's money woes have set off some talk that, if federal aid is cut off, perhaps the Army youngsters would no longer go to city schools.

The city school board says it intends to continue to educate Army youngsters regardless of what happens to federal aid. The county school board says it is ready to take the arsenal youngsters if necessary.

The county school board also says it wants to be involved in any talks about annexation. That would cost the county school system some money — no one seems to know how much — it now gets from fees and taxes paid by contractors operating on the arsenal. The county system is also hurting for money.

If the city and county cannot agree on annexation, the idea will probably never get off the ground.





Improvements set for summer

Additions to recreation areas will please picnickers, athletes

A number of improvements are in place and more are slated to be finished this summer at the Vincent Drive and Tennessee River Recreation Areas, according to physical activities director Joe Hopkins.

Already in place at the Vincent Drive Rec Area is a new multipurpose court which can be used for basketball, volleyball and badminton. Three new picnic pavilions are in place there, along with 16 new cement picnic tables.

Funding for the projects is from both appropriated and non-appropriated funds, Hopkins said.

Recreational equipment, such as horseshoes, soccer balls, frisbees, volleyballs, badminton sets, basketballs and footballs are available to active duty military personnel and their dependents. Equipment can be signed out by individuals from the post gym and outdoor recreation.



Want to canoe?

Two canoe float-trips — complete with pre-trip instruction — are being offered in May by Outdoor Recreation.

The float trips will start at 9 a.m. on May 10 and May 25. They will last all day and will be on either the Elk or Paint Rock River, both considered 'easy' rivers to float.

Before the trip, participants must attend an afternoon of basic canoe instruction. These clinics will be taught by Jim Griffin, Director of Outdoor Recreation, and will cover the basics of canoeing including equipment, basic paddling strokes, safety and basic river running. All instruction, equipment, and transportation to the river from the post gym will be furnished free of charge. The clinics will be at 1 p.m. on Saturdays before the trips — May 9 and May 24.

The trips are limited to active duty military personnel and their dependents, and the number of participants are limited. Transportation, equipment and lunch will be provided free of charge.

Tougher PT tests to start this summer

WASHINGTON — A three event PT test for all active duty soldiers up to age 40 and a new mandatory PT program for those over 40 are expected to be started this summer, according to a DA training official.

All soldiers should be physically fit regardless of age. Since most over-40 officers and NCO's have "desk" jobs, they are less likely to get enough exercise to keep fit. They also face a greater risk of sudden death from heart attacks.

The new over-40 PT program will provide medical counselling coupled with regular

exercise and testing. This is intended to give the Army a more physically fit force and reduce chances of heart attacks among soldiers.

Details of the new programs are to be worked out over the next two months, the official says. But the general outline is already clear.

The present system is too cumbersome and requires too much special equipment. The new test will have three events that require no special equipment. The events will probably be pushups, sit ups and a two-mile run.

Events, such as swimming, the official adds, may be included as substitutes for events soldiers cannot do because of profiles.

The testing program for those over 40 has not yet been designed, officials say. But the aim is to keep it as close to the under-40 test as possible, with criteria adjusted for age.

The new tests will likely be given more than once a year to keep up the level of physical training. According to the official, the annual test was not often enough to do this. (AR-NEWS).

Delayed lists release set for mid-May

WASHINGTON — Those battalion and brigade command lists, delayed since March, are now expected by mid-May, according to MILPERCEN officials.

A MILPERCEN official explained the lists are to be published May 14. Included in the lists will be the names of officers selected and which units they are to command in FY 81. The official pointed out the lists will only include the names of principal command selectees.

Alternates will receive individual letters from MILPERCEN informing them of their

status. However, the letters will not include specific unit command assignments.

Officials say the lists were delayed because of several factors, including:

- The extension of normal command tours to 30 months in CONUS and long tour overseas areas last Feb.

- The extension of command tours also provided major commanders with the authority for selective extension of officers already in command of a unit, and

- The total number of officers needed for command in FY 81 could not be confirmed

earlier because of a delay in the schedule of command vacancies.

- May 1, MILPERCEN will notify MACOM's of officers, presently assigned to their command, selected as principals or alternates for command.

Between May 1 and May 14, MACOM's will be notifying the selected officers individually, both principals and alternates. (ARNEWS).




