Computers run show at TA-1

From the outside, the one-story blockhouse guarding the entrance to Redstone's Test Area 1 remains virtually unchanged since it was built in 1953.

But behind the foot-thick walls and ceiling of reinforced concrete is the 21st Century, Star Wars and Star Trek for the Army Missile Command (MICOM) has completely refurbished the blockhouse interior with the latest in communications and electronics.

Bob Black, Director of MICOM Test and Evaluation, calls Test Area 1 with paternal pride "now one of the finest small missile test ranges in the world. We're abreast of the state of the art in testing missiles."

Joe Smith, Chief of Instrumentation and a 24-year-missileman at TA-1, says bluntly: "We've got some stuff not normally found on small ranges... maybe at White Sands."

TA-1's nerve center is jammed with flashing lights and humming computers with a control center enclosed behind glass to reduce noise. Nearby is a 15-seat theater, complete with television monitors, for showing films and for visitors to watch firings and monitor range activities.

Lights throughout the building can be dimmed or brightened at the push of a button.

Computers run the show, start and stop instrumentation, automatically operate cameras, fire the missiles, operate radars and telemetry, analyze data and stop a test, anytime, for safety reasons.

"We've never had a major accident, or injury, as the result of a missile firing," Smith said.

No matter what test data are needed, TA-1 has the instruments to get it, optical or electronic. On the launch site, there are instruments to measure noise, recoil, temperature, tube pressure, acceleration, whatever is wanted.

There are radars, telemetry and more than 100 cameras to show what is happening from missile launch to impact. Cameras can shoot from 24 frames a second to 40,000 frames a second. Some cameras are so large they require a five-ton crane to emplace, with film nearly five inches wide.

In addition, there are four long-range cameras that manually track missiles and give position-in-space data.

Laser radar

Special equipment includes a laser radar that tells within a foot of where in space the missile is. MICOM also has on contract with Motorola a Ranger 3 tracking system that uses radio signals and can track up to 16 objects in space, like a helicopter and several tanks.

The blockhouse can install a television on helicopters and radio the signal back to the blockhouse, seeing what the pilot sees.

TA-1, approximately five miles long and 10,000 acres, fires hundreds of short range missiles every year, primarily anti-tank

weapons like Viper, TOW, Dragon and Hellfire. Engineers and technicians also fire conventional guns like the 105 mm and the eight-inch Cannon Launched Guided Projectile, along with M14 and M16 rifles.

TA-1 part of MICOM's Army Missile Laboratory, even has its own weather instruments that show temperature, humidity, wind direction and velocity. For higher altitude information, Marshall Space Flight Center releases balloons and shares that data.

As targets, the range maintains approximately 25 armored vehicles in running condition and has several tank and truck hulks for stationary targets. A few tanks are radio controlled and test engineers also have a few remotely controlled electric cars to pull targets.

To operate the multi-million dollar complex, Bill Storey, chief of the Flight Test Division, has approximately 17 engineers and technicians who work closely with perhaps twice that many contractors.

Many of the 17 have over 25 years at TA-1, a few over 30. "This is such an interesting job when you get here, you don't want to leave," Smith said.

A few men like Doc Reagan, Robert O'Brian, Manuel Garcia, John McGhee and Alvin Reid remember when TA-1 was nothing but woods and a swamp. They helped clear it. They remember later when the blockhouse was a one-room shack with a desk and a couple of chairs, the place where the foreman

'Whatever we have to do, we will do together'

Maj. Gen. Robert L. Moore told MICOM workers this week that he wants to hear from them when they have thoughts "on how better to manage this place."

And he told several hundred soldiers and civilian workers of the Material Management and Maintenance Directorates "Whatever we have to do, we will do together."

The thing to be done, the commander said is to make sure that Army combat units get MICOM's best effort.

"We don't exist for any other reason than to make sure that if we go to war, we win and win the first battle. . . ."

"MICOM is the best, but as the best we are not good enough. There is room to improve and we will."

One of the first things he wants to do, the general said, is to set priorities for the command and he told the people "I need your help in determining what those priorities should be."

He charged supervisors to make sure that each of their people have individual development plans, know how to switch from non career to career programs and to assure that they have the help and training necessary to do that.

Describing himself as a "Tinkerer", Moore said, "Yes, we're going to tinker with the organization, but I will not let a face go out the door unless I am ordered to do so."

Moore asked for the chance to talk to the Material Management and Maintenance people Monday before being briefed on operations of the two directorates. He plans to talk to the people in other command elements.

elements of MICOM. "I want to make sure you know that I know who does the work here and that I care," Moore said.

Veterans buck-two-eighty assistance program

Editor:

In general, the opinions about the VEAP (Veterans Education Assistance Program) in the July 30 edition of the *Redstone Rocket* were disgraceful.

A more appropriate name for the VEAP would be the Veterans Buck-Two-Eighty Assistance Program.

Under the GI Bill the government gives a single person (note the word gives, the VEAP is a third YOUR money) over double of what the VEAP gives you (VEAP here based on \$8,100 total) regardless of marital status. The VEAP also lasts for 36 months, while the GI Bill can last up to 45 months. A good analogy of the VEAP would be giving someone 50 cents when they need a dollar.

Even though the GI Bill is long gone and almost forgotten, there might be relief in sight. Sen. William Armstrong R-Colo. and Rep. Charles S. Bennett D-Fla. have introduced bills S2596 and HR7700 respectively, namely the Veterans Education Assistance Act of 1980.

If passed this act will pay 100 percent of tuition and fees at an accredited university to a maximum of \$3,000 each year for four years

and pay a subsistence allowance of \$300 a month for 36 months.

How much does one have to contribute to this program? Not one proverbial red cent. This program will also do things the present VEAP can't "touch with a 10 foot pole". For example, if your period of entitlement ends during a quarter or semester, your period of entitlement will be extended till the end of that quarter or semester.

I urge everyone to write to their congressmen in support of the Veterans Education Assistance Act of 1980 and to urge

others to support this act as I plan to do. If anyone would like to see the House and Senate versions of this bill, I have both and you can contact me at 881-9806 (after duty hours) if you wish to see them.

To be blunt, it's time for the government to give the veteran a good educational assistance program and not just any "Tom, Dick or Harry" assistance program the government feels like giving.

BMD worker gets behind-the-scenes look at congressional work on defense budget

A local Army civilian has seen the congressional action on the new Department of Defense budget from a different angle this year.

Carl T. Bayer, an operations research analyst with the Ballistic Missile Defense (BMD) Systems Command in Research Park, spent the past five months working on the staff of the House Armed Services Committee as part of the LEGIS Fellows Program.

Sponsored by the Office of Personnel Management, the new LEGIS Fellows Program is a developmental assignment for government workers whose current or prospective position may require a working knowledge of the operations of Congress. Bayer was one of only 10 government executives, and the only one from outside of the Washington, D.C., area, selected to participate in the pilot session.

Assigned to the House Armed Services Subcommittee on research and development, Bayer found himself in the unusual position of being called on to critically examine the administration's military budget proposal. Usually he's been on the other side of the fence providing inputs to the budget request concerning Army requirements. As part of his legislative training he was called on to review program justifications, to prepare questions for testimony hearings, to write sections of the committee report, and to prepare point papers for use during debate on the House floor.

Bayer came away with a positive impression of the legislative procedure. "The system is filled with checks and balances," he said. "For the most part, the legislation that

emerges is well researched and thought out. Most of the time any political maneuvers are weeded out."


Because of Bayer's technological expertise attained in nearly 13 years of involvement with the development of ballistic missile

defense systems, he was called on to make recommendations for dispositions of monies earmarked for basic and exploratory defense research. He also prepared an Armed Services Committee amendment to a small business bill on military research and development expenditures.

The LEGIS Fellows Program uses a combination of both classroom training and hands-on experience in writing and staffing legislation to expose participants to congressional operations. Bayer felt that the program was successful.

"By the time the program was over, I really felt like a contributing member of the committee," he said. "The five months I spent on the House Armed Services Committee was long enough to learn the legislative process. If I'd stayed any longer, I would have been functioning as a permanent staff employee."

When asked if he had considered staying on, Bayer answered with a boyish twinkle in his eye: "Working on a congressional committee has got to be one of the best jobs in government. It's a very prestigious job, and it's easy



to get caught up in that environment. But staying on would have been more tempting," he added, "if Congress was located in Huntsville rather than Washington, D.C."

Following his return to Huntsville, Bayer has been named acting chief of the BMD Systems Technology Project Office's Systems Definition Division, which is responsible for defining future ballistic missile defense systems. He describes his office as the "leading edge" of the command, always looking for new ways to use current and advanced technology.

Bayer has worked on ballistic missile defense since 1967 when he was employed by what was then the Sentinel Systems Command. He has seen the BMD program develop through Safeguard and Site Defense programs into the two-tiered, layered defense concept being studied today to defend the U.S. against an enemy strategic ballistic missile attack.



Soldier gets bachelor's degree ...without ever attending class

Sp5 Rod Norris is to graduate from the University of the State of New York through college equivalency testing.

On September 24 he plans to go to Albany and join other degree candidates in a commencement ceremony at the northern university. It will be his first look at the institution he's to graduate from.

In fact Norris, 21, has earned a bachelor's degree "without ever setting foot in a college," in his words.

Norris, an electronics instructor at the U.S. Army Missile and Munitions Center and School here, is receiving the degree through the state university's Regents External Degree program. Under the program soldiers and others can earn a degree without attending college — with the thought that what they know is more important than how they learned it, according to a university spokesman.

Norris never took a resident course nor a course by correspondence. He earned his college credit through testing programs available to soldiers at the Army Education Center here.

Norris says the bachelor's degree has cost him a total of \$117. Seventy-five dollars of that was for enrolling in the Regents program. The Army paid for most of the tests.

Norris completed all the degree requirements during his four year Army hitch. "I'm one year ahead of my senior (high school) class. If I had followed them I would be graduating next June."

Four years ago Norris was a 17-year-old dropout who quit school and joined the Army "because I felt like it."

He said he intended to go to college and wanted to get GI education benefits, which it turns out he hasn't needed.

Norris took military electronics training, then began looking for a way to boost his chances of making rank.


He learned that tests soldiers can take at the Education Center to get college credit were also good for promotion points. The Army gives one promotion point for each hour of college credit earned.

"I was being pragmatic, taking the tests to get promotion points. Any one test is worth 3-6 promotion points," said Norris. "I really wasn't planning to put them together for college credit."

He said counselors at the Education Center showed him how he could apply the tests toward a degree.

"The Education Center has been very helpful. I wouldn't have the degree today without them. They don't just test you and push you aside — they show you what you can do with it once you have it."

Sgt. Maj. Everett Brooks, education

counselor, said Norris is the first soldier to earn a bachelor's degree through the Regents program at Redstone. The degree program is fully accredited, he noted. The Regents of the State of New York is responsible for all educational institutions in New York State.

Norris said he took two types of tests, known by the shortened titles of DANTES and CLEP, plus the Graduate Record Examination which alone was worth 39 hours of college credit on the basis of his score.

Norris said some of the tests were on broad basic subjects such as social studies and natural sciences while others were on specific subjects.

50 tests

The soldier took approximately 50 tests in all. His subjects included the basics as well as oceanography, geophysics, French, education, astronomy and many others. "You name it, they have a test on it. There's something for everyone there (Education Center)," Norris said.

To prepare for the tests, he read. "Before, say, an anthropology test, I'd go to the library and get a couple of anthropology books."

Norris says he reads "six or seven" books a month and feels reading has been his key to getting the Regents degree.

The soldier says the Regents non-resident program has worked well for him. "Most colleges require resident instruction. But in the military in the missile field, a lot of times you can't go to school because of your work schedule.

"Also, it's a good way to go to college if you've got a wife and a son. It saves you money, time and you do it at your own pace — convenience is the best thing."

He explained that the program may let soldiers get college credit for military training and experience, although Norris obtained his degree solely through college equivalency testing. He pointed out, however, that military electronics training helped him on three tests, while knowledge gained at the NCO Academy was applicable to two personnel management tests.

Norris said he wants a degree in electrical engineering but chose to major in psychology because "my math level only goes to trigonometry."

Norris is getting out of the Army in less than a week. He plans to go back to Massachusetts and work. He is from Fitchberg, 40 miles from Boston.

More school is in his future but for now, "I can't go to school — I've got to get a job." He is weighing several job offers. "Electronics or psychology — I can go either way."

He plans to start work on an engineering degree when able. "I won't have to bother with the basics and can concentrate on the electronics," he said. And he has, as yet untouched, four years of GI Bill education benefits to help him along when he decides to go for another degree.

 stayed and the range crew checked in and out. In those days, firings were accomplished by putting battery leads together.

The range had a portable trailer, with very crude instrumentation, that was pulled from place to place and there were four or five cameras available to cover a firing.

By contrast, today's flight tests normally involve 40 to 50 cameras, computers running the show at the push of a button, while the blockhouse has instant communications with military aircraft, vehicles and people involved in the test and with all the other MICOM ranges as well.

Biggest missile ever fired on the range was the 25-foot Honest John.

"We had to depress the launcher a minus three mils to keep the rocket from flying off range," Smith said, "and it flew two or three feet off the ground for about four miles."

Smith also recalled that the job at TA-1 had its lighter moments when testing here was in its infancy.

"Once we were firing a mine clearing device that consisted of two missiles attached to each other by chains. When the missiles were fired, one got ahead of the other and they started coming back toward some spectators who were watching.

"The men started to run away," Smith laughed, "and two of them ran together and knocked each other out."

Another time the range crew was just about set for a firing when the announcer came over the loudspeaker:

"Attention all personnel. This is your three

minute warning from Test Area . . ." Boom! The missile went off.

Another time, Smith and Manuel Garcia were atop a concrete firing bay, some 20 feet in the air, when the announcer started a 30-minute countdown.

"We were arming the missile and I had to stick my arm about a foot up in the igniter," Smith said. "About that time, the announcer was down to twenty minutes but mistakenly announced that the time was T minus 20 seconds and counting.

"We literally dived over the rail. We were really bailing out," Smith said.

And once, during an armed forces day demonstration, the range wanted to make a firing more spectacular by setting off a drum of gasoline to simulate a warhead and create a fireball.

So they put a big drum on Bradford Mountain and hooked it to a detonator with explicit instructions at what point to set it off.

But the man misunderstood the count and the missile was about halfway to the target when . . .BOOM!, the drum exploded.



With that in mind, Redstone Arsenal and other Army bases use enlisted medical technicians to screen patients. Redstone's Automatic Military Out-Patient System (AMOSIST) consists of four medical technicians at the Troop Health Clinic.

The four AMOSIST medical technicians refer to guideline sheets to diagnose various maladies such as skin, stomach or respiratory disorders. They treat broken bones and can prescribe limited number of drugs.

AMOSIST technicians deal with "acute minor disorders," explains Sp4 Myles Yoshimoto, an AMOSIST technician here since last December. "They're things that should be looked at by somebody in the medical field, but not that a doctor would need to look at."

The Armywide program started in 1974 through the Health Services Command. The idea was to use specially trained technicians to do certain details to free doctors for other needs, Yoshimoto said.

Two female and two male AMOSIST technicians work in the troop clinic which has a medical staff of eight persons. Yoshimoto is a clinical specialist and the other technicians are basic medical specialists. All four are soldiers, a requirement.


"We are an extension of doctors, like physician's assistants," Yoshimoto said.

Yoshimoto volunteered for the program "because it's an important position and it's responsible."

Guideline sheets specify when a patient should be referred to a doctor. They also specify what drugs should be prescribed and list alternate drugs to avoid allergic reactions.

"We have guidelines for every disorder we're allowed to diagnose," Yoshimoto said. "We can diagnose between 40 to 50 different medical disorders."

He estimates the four AMOSIST technicians together see about 500 patients a week, 100 a day, at the troop health clinic which provides

medical care for active duty personnel. Persons requiring hospitalization are referred to Fox Army Community Hospital.

"Generally, the AMOSIST sees up to 70 to 75 percent of the patients that come into our clinic. If there's anything very acute, (the patient would) be sent to the doctor," Yoshimoto said.

Dr. Ernest Bralley, chief of the troop clinic who is assisted by another doctor for three hours each morning, praises the program.

"It definitely saves the physician's time taking care of things he doesn't need to see," Bralley said. "I think it's very effective and these people are highly motivated and do a very good job."

Bralley said he's always available to the AMOSIST technicians and signs all their charts. The medical technicians are limited to

prescribing drugs cleared by the AMOSIST program at Fort Sam Houston, he said.

"It's a well-thought out program," added Bralley, a retired colonel who commanded the old hospital here several years ago. "All kinds of experts giving them advice on what they can do. I think it's very well planned."

Capt. Harold Drayton, Fox Hospital's administrative officer for department of primary care and community medicine, said the AMOSIST program is "working fine."

The hospital administrative officer responsible to the troop health clinic said the program may be expanded in the future. "It's just in the mill to look into the possibility of bringing an AMOSIST from the Troop Health Clinic to work in the (hospital) emergency room in the evenings," Drayton said.



MICOM needs EEO counselors

The MICOM Equal Employment Opportunity Office is interested in people with a "desire to help someone" as EEO counselors.

Letters have been sent to managers asking them for nominations. The deadline for volunteering to be an EEO counselor on the arsenal is set for Aug. 27.

The counselors, who have numbered 31, listen to complaints of discrimination and report their finds and recommendations to the EEO office.

"Many times the complainant has gone to management regarding the problem to no avail," said Stella Moore, EEP specialist. "They become hostile and the problem is still not resolved.

"We need someone to serve as mediator — to listen to the complaint, be objective and try to work it out starting from the lowest level

and going to the highest level if necessary," she said.

Serving as counselors is part time volunteer work. Counselors, appointed each year by the commanding general, take three mandatory training courses.

Eleven counselors are needed because of resignations or relocations. "We need a person able to go into a situation regardless of how complex it seems, talk to a person who may have info regarding that situation, write up the facts gathered and put it in the form of a report," Moore said.

The EEO office says areas in which an individual could suffer discrimination include race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin, physical or mental handicap.

"This person is supposed to be really an uninvolved party who is willing to listen and open avenues of communication between the parties of potential complaint," Moore said of counselors.

Busy people — individuals busy on their jobs, with their families and with community affairs — make the best counselors, according to Moore. "These are concerned individuals — people not just concerned with their promotions or their getting ahead on their jobs but they're concerned about others," she said.

Persons interested in becoming an EEO counselor should submit a DF through their supervisor telling of their interest. DFs should be sent to DRSMI-XQ, Bldg 5250, Room A-104, Attn. Stella Moore.

Counselors hear discrimination complaints

A common thread runs through conversations with MICOM Equal Employment Opportunity counselors: They "enjoy" helping people.

"It really gives you a good feeling to know you can just listen to people and try to help them," says Elaine "Sandy" Plaia.

Plaia, a program analyst in the Review and Analysis section of the MICOM comptroller's office, has been an EEO counselor about a

Spearman said she has had one case on alleged age discrimination, one based on sex discrimination, and several based on race.

"I've had a lot that didn't go into formal or informal grievances," she said. These are cases when the complainant felt he was being discriminated against at first "but once he really understood the processes, he could see he wasn't being discriminated against," she said.

whether (a complaint) goes formal or not," she said. "And the complainant reserves the right to go ahead and file a formal complaint after 21 days if he's not satisfied with what has transpired during the pre-complaint process."

Maurice Hayden, a contract price analyst with the Contract Cost Branch of the Procurement & Production Directorate, has been an EEO counselor about a year.

He called his "most satisfying case" an employee who had been ill off and on over four years. Hayden was able to work with him and the man, who had missed time from work, was given a promotion.

"It didn't have to go through the EEO process," Hayden said. "The object of the EEO program is to resolve any EEO complaints at as low a level as possible. All the cases I've handled have been disposed of at the lower level."

He said applying to be an EEO counselor appealed to him because the legal profession is a hobby of his. He said he also felt he could repay a debt from 1964 when he was assisted in getting employed at Redstone Arsenal.

The object of the EEO program is to resolve any EEO complaints at as low a level as possible.

year. Last Friday she said she has just had one case so far.

She has gone through the required training for EEO counselors: a week long "basic" EEO course, an advanced course, and orientation from the Civilian Personnel Office.

"I feel more confident now that I've had one case," Plaia said. "I think the more cases I have, the more I'll enjoy doing it. I really do enjoy working with people and I find it to be a really good experience."

Lola Spearman, a supply management specialist for the Policy Plans and Programs Division of the Directorate for Materiel Management, has been an EEO counselor for four and a half years.

EEO counselors are necessary, Spearman said, because "we only have one EEO officer and really we are the feet, legs and hands of that officer.

"He cannot be all over the arsenal at one time," she said. "You're doing work that the EEO officer cannot normally do cause it's not humanly possible. So they're very necessary."

Counselors gather information on a complaint and then present a report to EEO officer Charles Ray. The report is due 21 days after a complainant signs a statement saying he wants to start the complaint process, Spearman said.

"We have to file the report regardless of

Sergeant puts together book of memories for mother of Medal of Honor winner

Thanks to a first sergeant from Redstone Arsenal, a West Virginia woman has memories of a ceremony held here in her son's honor two years ago.

First Sgt. Ralph Wyke presented a scrapbook of photographs to Mrs. Gale Bennett Gray in her Morgantown, W. Va. home on July 14. The scrapbook remembers the Sept. 19, 1978 ceremony dedicating Fox Army Community Hospital and naming its access road Bennett Road in honor of her son, Thomas W. Bennett.

Army Cpl. Bennett was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions Feb. 9-11, 1969 in the Chu Pa Region, Pleiku Province of the Republic of Vietnam. A conscientious objector, Bennett was a medical aidman with 14th Infantry. He was killed while trying to treat a soldier in action Feb. 11, 1969.

Because of a mixup, an invitation failed to reach his mother to inform her of the ceremonies here naming the access road in his honor.

Wyke played with Bennett while growing up in that West Virginia area. He learned of the mixup shortly after arriving here from Korea for his second tour of duty on the arsenal.

Wyke, first sergeant of Medical Company, checked back with Mrs. Gray last June and told her he would personally see that she had memories from the ceremony she missed.

With help from former hospital adjutant, Lt. Margaret Withrow, he gathered color photos from the ceremony. The first page in the scrapbook carries a letter from Maj. Gen. Louis Rachmeler, retired arsenal commander. The book includes a three-inch section of ribbon used in the dedication ceremony, a printed program, and two articles from the *Redstone Rocket*.

"I went through every photo they had in the hospital that I could get my hands on trying to find stuff," said Wyke, who personally delivered the scrapbook in uniform.

He had played sandlot baseball, football and basketball with Bennett and describes the Medal of Honor winner as "well brought up, very well mannered, very well liked, a terrific athlete."

Wyke, who was born in Star City about three miles from the center of Morgantown, says he would have done the same for anybody.

"I would've done it for anybody — any soldier or GI's parents that had this honor bestowed upon them," he said. "Their not being able to attend and their not knowing anything about it, I felt this is something they'd be pleased to have. And I would've done it for anybody.

Fortunately I knew this individual," he added.

An estimated 200 persons attended the 1978 ceremony to dedicate the hospital and name in Bennett's honor a horseshoe-shaped road that provides two entrances to the hospital grounds. A 50-piece band from Fort McClellan performed.

A plaque telling about Bennett was mounted in an approximately five-foot-tall rock taken from the hospital construction site. The unusually shaped rock is located on the southeast portion of the hospital grounds.

Wyke phoned Mrs. Gray and set up an ap-

pointment to deliver the book. "She had a friend of hers there, and her husband, and her aunt and a newspaper reporter," he recalled.

A bedroom in the home is decorated with Bennett's awards. A three-story medical company barracks for DeWitt Army Hospital, about 14 miles outside Washington, D.C. in Alexandria, Va., is named Bennett Hall in his honor.

Command Sgt. Maj. Ed Polite, who Wyke credits with supporting the scrapbook effort, said "I think it's commendable what (Wyke) did."

Wyke last Thursday received a letter from Mrs. Gray. "Just a note to express my gratitude and appreciation for the album about Thomas W. Bennett Road," she wrote. "There was a Bennett reunion two weeks ago and it was great having it to take and show . . ."



Prentiss Thomas, the All Star center fielder, drove in four runs with a homer and a double


and Hines nailed his second homer of the tourney.

Motorists warned on registration violations

Military police here are issuing warning tickets to motorists entering the arsenal gates without displaying an annual expiration sticker on their vehicles.

Copies of the armed forces traffic ticket are retained by the security office, said Lt. Col. Terris C. Lewis, director of security. One copy is kept by the vehicle registration section until the motorist gets his required decal.

"Once he gets his decal, the copies are destroyed," Lewis said. No copy is sent to the person's supervisor.

But starting Sept. 2, motorists who have not gotten their car registered will "actually be cited for violation of the MICOM regulation that establishes registration," Lewis said. In that case, copies will go to the supervisor or unit commander "for necessary action."

The citations won't carry a fine, Lewis said. "When we started this, we gave people 90 days to get their vehicles registered. We even went around to the buildings to make it easier and even gave them the month of August. They've had plenty of time and enough warnings at the gates," he said.

Exceptions are retired persons living outside of Huntsville who have not been here for 30 days. Those individuals with retired decals on their vehicles will simply be told to go to the vehicle registration section to get their car registered, Lewis said.

Annual expiration stickers have single number representing the month in which they will expire. Security was the reason behind the issuance of the stickers which display a large numeral and are to be placed to the right of the previously issued arsenal decal.



Summer hires not just students

Summer hire is not just for students. Everyone from high school students to college professors took part in Redstone Arsenal's summer hire program.

Over 300 extra people were employed ranging from GS-3s to GS-13s.

Donald Dixon, chief of special recruiting at Civilian Personnel Office, said the temporary workers included 89 summer aides, 32 CETA (Comprehensive Employee Training Act) employees, 11 college interns and two junior fellowship students.

There were 102 persons on temporary class act positions and 162 student aides who work full time in the summer.

"We had 1,000 applications for summer work, far more than we could hire," said Dixon.

"We feel that the program was a good one this year," he said. "The Army was provided with a temporary source of manpower and the worker obtained employment providing the needed funds to either stay in school or to further his career."

Some of the employees like Bernard Collier and Ching Tsung Lee held professional positions this summer.


Collier, athletic director for the Metro Columbus Boys Club in Columbus, Georgia, counseled the student assistants as to their school and job careers. "I would like to come back again next summer if I am hired," said Collier.

As a former drug and alcohol abuse counselor in the Air Force, Collier is accustomed to jobs where he can help others. "I try and smooth out job related problems between the student assistants and their supervisors," he said.

In the Directed Energy Directorate, Dr. Ching Tsung Lee, research physicist and professor at Alabama A & M University, is studying the application of high energy lasers. He believes that his summer work has helped him see the practical side of physics.

"Here, the work is directly useable, whereas in teaching I tend to always be involved with theory," Lee said. "By the end of the summer, I feel I will have made a contribution to further the research in some new aspect of laser development."

Steve McGuffy, a recreational assistant with Dependent Youth Activities, likes the

informality of his job. "I am playing Steve this summer instead of Mr. McGuffy," he said. "I like being a good friend to the kids." During the rest of the year, McGuffy teaches physical education at Randolph School.

"I have enjoyed being a part of dependent youth activities," he said. "I hope I am fortunate enough to be selected again — it's good for me and the kids."

The majority of the summer employees are still in high school or college. Those who have not already left to go back to school will be leaving soon.





Pershing sites sought in Idaho

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M., — A team of White Sands Missile Range researchers is in Owyhee County, Idaho, surveying an area that could be used as a temporary launch site for testing Army Pershing missiles in 1983.

Experts in such fields as radar instrumentation, real estate, geography, missile test management and flight safety are visiting an area 40 miles south of Boise and 35 miles southwest of Mountain Home to determine if terrain is favorable for a launch site and if tentative locations can be found for temporary instrumentation and communications sites.

The Idaho launch site is required for testing Pershing II missiles in flights of about 800 miles to White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

Currently, Pershing I-A missiles are in the field with NATO forces. The basic Pershing missile system has been operational since

1964. The Pershing II is an improved version featuring a longer range, more accurate warhead delivery and fewer soldiers to operate the system.

The Army will fire the Pershing II in short, medium and long range flights beginning in 1982. A total of 26 missiles will be fired during the program.

During the test program, four short range launches of about 100 miles will be conducted from the Army's McGregor range near El Paso, Tex. The range's Utah Launch Complex near Green River will provide flights of about 400 miles. The launch site in Idaho will provide for long range flights to White Sands.

The site survey being done now is for preliminary test planning only. No construction or grading is planned.

Humanitarian medal for disaster relief

WASHINGTON — The Department of Defense recently approved the Humanitarian Service Medal (HSM) for soldiers who took part in two civilian relief operations.

Soldiers who directly took part in the rescue and evacuation of Alabama residents during the devastations by Hurricane Frederick from Sept. 12, 1979 to Feb. 23, 1980, are now eligible for the HSM.

Also, those soldiers who have directly participated in the Cuban resettlement operation since April 27 are eligible for the award. No cut-off date has been set for this operation. During the Alabama operations, soldiers assisted in the search and rescue of storm victims.







Flying club says plane is best way to go

If you have traveling in mind, the Redstone Arsenal Flying Club would like to talk with you. They think they can convince you a private plane is the way to go.

The club was established for the use of active duty and retired military personnel and members of the National Guard and reserves. Civilian employees of the Department of Defense can become associate members. Dependents can also join the club.

The flying club offers a full range of services. Student pilots can earn anything from a private pilot's license through an instrument instructor's rating from the club's eleven instructors.

A Cessna 150 and two Cessna 152s are used primarily for training. For experienced pilots, there are four cross-country planes, including a 4-place Cessna 172 and a 6-passenger Piper Cherokee. The cost of rental ranges from \$20 an hour for the smaller planes to \$46.50 an hour for the largest. That charge includes fuel, and is calculated only for actual flying time.

"Flying a private plane is usually the cheapest way to travel," says instructor Marine Gunnery Sgt. Ralph Grier, "especially if you value your time." He explains that to fly commercially to a small town 700 miles away would take about five hours and cost \$200.

To travel to the same town by bus would cost \$155 and take 27 hours. Traveling by private car would take at least 13 hours and cost \$50 for gas, plus meals and maybe a motel.

The economics work for private aviation. To fly a two-place Cessna 150, rented from the club, would take about five hours and cost \$100. That's faster and cheaper than commercial travel. For most people, the time saved is worth the extra cost over driving the car.

"This club must be a God-send to someone who wants to learn to fly," Grier continues. "I spent less money getting an instrument rating, an instructor rating, and an instrument instructor rating through the club that I did to get a private pilot's license outside the club."

For the student pilot, the club has a FAA approved ground school. The 40 hours of instruction cost \$35, far less than a commercial course. The FAA written exam is given at the club following completion of the ground school.

Earning a private pilot's license just puts the student at the beginning of learning how to fly, Grier believes. With that license, the pilot can fly when the sun shines.

The written private pilot's test can be administered by a club member, and the practical flight test can be administered by any of several flight examiners in the area.

Once the pilot is working on ratings above the private pilot's license, the training is eligible for VA support.

Having an instrument rating is safer for you and your passengers, he says. A pilot with an instrument rating can fly at night or in less than good weather. More importantly, Grier says, the instrument rating gives the pilot the

experience and confidence to fly in bad weather. If the pilot is caught by bad weather, he doesn't panic.

The cost of belonging to the club is small. There's a \$25 initiation fee, and dues of \$11 a

month. That includes liability insurance. All pilots are required to attend the quarterly safety meetings.

"If you want to fly," concludes Grier, "you can do it better here than anywhere else."
