Reserve offers \$600 bonus pay

WASHINGTON — Soldiers will get a \$600 bonus for enlisting or reenlisting in the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR) or the Inactive National Guard (ING). The program began Jan. 2, 1981, with an effective date of Oct. 1, 1980.

The payments are authorized for eligible active, reserve and prior service enlisted personnel who have completed their military service obligation. They must have less than 10 years total service (waivers considered) and enlist for three years in the ING or IRR.

Active duty soldiers can apply for enlistment and bonus eligibility within 90 days of scheduled discharge or separation.

To be eligible for the bonus, service members must remain as enlisted personnel during their period of enlistment. They must possess and be qualified in a primary or secondary MOS specified for the bonus. All specialties except band are eligible. Individuals may not change their MOS unless reclassified by DA.

The first payment of \$300 will be made upon enlistment or reenlistment. One hundred dollars will be paid each of the next three years completed satisfactorily. Additional bonuses may be paid for future reenlistments if the soldier continued to meet requirements.

Active duty soldiers may get more information through the reserve recruiter at their supporting installation or nearest reserve activity.

Neighborhood watch program planned in post housing area

A neighborhood watch program is among the crime prevention plans for Redstone Arsenal as the nation observes Crime Prevention Week Feb. 8-14.

Major Ben Sanford, director of security and provost marshal, said his plans to prevent crimes before they happen at Redstone require the support of everyone. He calls larcenies and possession of marijuana the major crime problems here.

"Comparatively speaking, we don't have a serious crime problem at Redstone Arsenal, but we do have a problem," he said. "In my point of view, whenever we have one victim we do have a problem."

There were 14 "serious" crimes here in fiscal 1980 (Oct. 1, 1979 to Sept 31, 1980). "The majority of those things were aggravated assaults," Sanford said.

In the same period, there were 358 larcenies. There have been 91 larcenies in the first three months of fiscal 1981.

"Larceny of personal property continues to be a major problem," said the security director the past four months. "Unsecured property is the single most contributing factor. The barracks area is the primary location of crime, and money appears to be the primary target."

Possession of marijuana, especially by lower-ranking enlisted soldiers, is a con-

tinuing problem Sanford said. There were 163 drug cases here in the last fiscal year, and 46 such cases so far this quarter.

Ninety-eight percent of the military drug offenders here were soldiers in grades E-5 and below, according to Sanford.

Besides larceny and marijuana, the security director said he is concerned about juvenile crime. Forty-seven offenses were committed by youths under 18 last year.

Sanford plans to establish a family services branch, to help respond to domestic problems, within his new Crime Prevention Team. The six-member team, headed by SFC James Coley, began Jan. 29.

His other crime prevention plans include a neighborhood watch program in the housing area, military police walking patrols in those areas, and a citizens band (CB) radio alert program.

The watch program means neighbors helping neighbors watch their neighborhood for criminal activity. "When seeing something, they advise us and we respond," Sanford said.

Other parts of this community awareness program include providing literature such as security checklists, and briefing new residents when arrive at their quarters.

Walking patrols would help residents "to

New test

Sexes, standards different, but exercises same

In 776 B. C., man had his first Olympic games in Greece. It was an all-male event. Women were not even allowed to watch the games, let alone compete.

Now women are playing major roles in the sports world. From the professional tennis player, Billie Jean King, to the pro basketball star Ann Meyers, women are proving that they can compete in areas formerly considered "for men only."

Sgt. Burnette Johnson, an 8th S.C. platoon sergeant, describes the advancement as a "180 degree turn . . . women have come a long, long way."

But they still haven't reached the end of the road, according to the new three-event Army Physical Readiness Test (APRT) results. The exercises on the test are now the same for men and women but the standards still differ.


On the APRT, men ages 17-25 are required to complete the two-mile run in less than 17:55 and do at least 40 push-ups and sit-ups within two minutes. Women of the same age are

required to run two miles in 22:14 and complete 16 push-ups and 27 sit-ups.

Here at the arsenal, all Advanced Individual Training (AIT) students E-4 and below are required to take the new test within their first

week here. On a recent diagnostic test, 86 of 568 (15.1 percent) men and 6 of 48 (12.5 percent) women failed the test.

As a group, a higher percentage of women (Continued on page 5)

Question: From time to time, articles appear in the **Rocket**, and information is promulgated by the Incentive Awards Committee, promoting and emphasizing the importance of the suggestion program at MICOM.

The fact that a suggestion can be returned to the suggester, without benefit of an evaluation based on the actual merits of the suggestion, and this action is supported by the statement that "The suggestion appears to be of a complaint type", does not reflect favorably on the suggestion program.

At what point does a suggestion submitted in good faith, identifying a problem and offering a solution, become a mere complaint? Is this judgement being arbitrarily made in such instances? What are the suggester's rights in such instances?

sonnel Office provided the following response:

"A suggestion is determined to be a complaint by the Incentive Awards Office when a complaint is stated without a solution. When a solution to a problem is stated the suggestion is referred to the office of primary interest for evaluation. When no solution is stated, or where it is merely stated that something should be done, it is determined to be a complaint.

"It is a judgement made by the Incentive Awards Office or, in some cases, by the evaluator.

"Whenever a suggester receives notification that the suggestion is a complaint, he or she is encouraged to rewrite the suggestion, clearly and concisely stating the problem and the recommended solution so that it does not have the sound of a complaint. Suggesters are reminded that a recommendation for a study or pointing out a problem does not constitute a suggestion."

First Roland system here soon

Redstone Arsenal will soon have its first Roland air defense missile system according to officials at the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

By mid-February, members of the Roland Task Force of the school's Training Analysis and Design Division of the Directorate of Training Development expect to have the complete system here and assembled. They said it will be used to develop resident and non-resident courses of instruction, soldiers' manuals, training extensions courses and skill qualification tests for future Roland maintenance personnel.

MMCS is scheduled to begin resident training here in late 1982.

CWO 2 Marlin H. Murphree, chief of the task

force, said the two vans that house the Field Maintenance Test Set are already here. Two more vans that house the Organizational Maintenance Test Set are expected any day. The tracked vehicle mounted fire unit is expected to arrive in about two weeks.

The new system will be located in Building 3306, with the task force.

When the system is fielded, Roland will supplement Chaparral in providing all-weather air defense to soldiers in the rear areas of the combat theater.

Hughes and Boeing are building the U.S. version of Roland under license from Euromissile, the Franco-German consortium that developed the system.

It is estimated that the Army saved hun-

dreds of millions of dollars in research and development funds by using the European technology instead of developing a new system.

Since 1975, when Roland was selected, U.S. development work has concentrated on reliability and expanding the system's ability to function in spite of enemy electronic countermeasures.

However, the U.S. and European versions remain very similar and many components, including the missiles, are interchangeable.

So far, France, Germany and Brazil have fielded the European version of the system. Several other countries are reportedly interested in buying either the European or American version in the future.

Sworn in Army lawyers will prosecute misdemeanor cases

Civilians charged with non-traffic misdemeanors can now be tried in U.S. magistrate's court here.

Melton Alexander, the chief prosecutor for northern Alabama district's U.S. attorney, notified the Staff Judge Advocate office here that three Army attorneys will be appointed as special assistants to the U.S. attorney.

Capt. Joe N. Lampley and James M. Smith were administered their oath of office last week. Capt. David J. Sneed was on temporary duty assignment last week and is to be administered the oath later. The appointments expire Jan. 31, 1982.

The appointments mean these Army lawyers can prosecute certain cases for the U.S. attorney in magistrate's court here, according to Maj. Rudy Segaar, Deputy Staff Judge Advocate.

"Mainly shoplifting is the type of case this will help out with," he said. In the past, Army prosecutors could not prosecute non-traffic misdemeanors against civilians. Those cases would require the presence of a U.S. attorney.

Alexander, in a letter approving the Staff Judge Advocate's request for the appointments, cited the U.S. attorney office's limitations. He cited priority limitations, time and expense of travel from the Birmingham office to Redstone Arsenal, and attorney commitments to U.S. District Court.

Lampley, the prosecutor for magistrate's court, said he previously was limited to prosecuting civilians for traffic cases. "We can now try civilians for misdemeanor crimes," he added.

Smith, the legal assistance officer, and Sneed, defense counsel for courts-martial, will

substitute for Lampley when necessary.

The jurisdiction of magistrate's court is limited to a maximum of one year imprisonment, and a \$1,000 fine or both.

Last week's appointments make things easier for both the U.S. attorney office and the Staff Judge Advocate, Segaar said. "We've had one or two cases that have been pending this appointment," he added.

The oaths of office were administered by Leroy Arceneaux, an assistant to the U.S. attorney since retiring three years ago as Command Sergeant Major for the Missile Command.

Credit union holds election

Redstone Federal Credit Union members returned three incumbent members to the organization's board of directors and elected a petition candidate to a three year term at the annual meeting Jan. 29 in the Civic Center.

Those elected to three year terms included Richard Jerry Allen, comptroller of the Marshall Space Flight Center; Brig. Gen. Jack A. Apperson, MICOM deputy commander for readiness, and Donald B. Cook, a

physicist in MICOM's Metrology & Calibration Center.

Dr. Delia W. Black, a career program coordinator in the MICOM civilian personnel office, was unopposed for a one year term on the board. P. Edward Collier, assistant manager of the credit union, was re-elected to another term on the credit committee without opposition.

Cook was one of three candidates nominated by petition, the first time that has happened in the history of the organization which draws its membership from military personnel, government civilian employees and retired members of both groups.

Results of the voting in which 964 ballots were counted: Allen 538; Cooke, 501; Apperson, 491; James Blackburn, 477; J. Keith Fowler, 459 and James T. Deaton, 426. Fowler and Deaton, both employed in the MICOM Legal Office, were the other candidates nominated by petition. Allen, Apperson and Blackburn were the choice of the nominating committee.





Soldier's idea worth \$725

passed, but the high scores of the men were noticeably higher than the women's top scores.

The men's best time in the two-mile run was 11:50 while the women's best score was 16 minutes. Men did up to 90 sit-ups and 100 push-ups while the women did up to 61 sit-ups and 55 push-ups. The three women's top scorers were made by Pvt. Virginia A. Ross, 7th S.C., who was the only woman to max the test.

Sgt. Christine B. Gronau noted that because of the lack of sufficient training women have had in the past, "Raising the standards for the women to be the same as the men would not be fair at this time.

"Men have been trained as the athletes and women as their cheerleaders," she explained. "Over all, the majority of women soldiers are not yet ready to face the same standards as the men."

Agreeing that the standards should be slightly lower for the women, Johnson said

that the percentage of women that fall out of the daily two-mile run is the same as the men, but "I don't think that they have the upper body strength for the push-ups."

SFC. Robert L. Suddeath, Operations Sergeant at the 7th S.C, feels differently. He thinks the standards on the test should be the same for both sexes. "I don't think being a woman has anything to do with how far you can run or how many push-ups you can do.

"Running fairly well and being in good condition," he explained, "takes will-power and training, not a certain sex.

"Women can do as many push-ups as the men," he said, "but they have been told so long that they weren't physically able that as soon as it starts to hurt, they quit.

"It hurts the men, too," he added, "but they still push."

One woman that is ready to face the pain, however, is a student at the 7th S.C. who did 42 push-ups on her APRT. She said, "I like

training with the men. We never get harrassed when PTing with them. If anything, they build us up.

"What amazes me," PFC Debra K. Franklin added, "is that half the men can't even do the push-ups. I can do them just as well."

Another student from the 7th S.C., Pvt. 2 Gwenna J. Owens said, "The guys expect us to automatically fall out because we are women and that makes me work harder. They motivate us and we motivate them."

PFC Kenneth D. Gooding, 6th S.C., doesn't mind running with the women either. In fact, he thinks they "actually advance more than the men do. They try to do the max and that's good. When it comes to PT, I think they are ready."

And who knows, perhaps three thousand years from now men will be screaming for equality. But until then, women still have a few more doors to open.

establish a more personal relationship with the military policeman," Sanford said.

He hopes in the "near future" to put a CB radio on the military police operations desk so that "people on the arsenal can use their CB radio to report unsafe situations, accidents and suspicious activities."

Sanford hopes to implement a telephone hotline that will allow people to report suspected criminal activity to the MP desk.

"We're looking at establishing a reward program, too, to reward people responsible for the apprehension of a criminal," he said of other possibilities.

A drug suppression team has been established as a cooperative effort between military police and Redstone's Criminal Investigation Division (CID). "We are very fortunate to have recently assigned here

More inspections of the barracks and administrative work areas are planned to reduce thefts. Sanford hopes to enhance communications with people appointed as crime prevention officers. These appointments are required for each division, he said, but communications could improve with quarterly conferences.


Special Agent Randy Campbell who headed up the drug suppression team at his previous station in Europe," Sanford said.

The security director plans to increase use of "marijuana dogs" from Fort McClellan, Ala. Those specially-trained German Shepherds assist unit commanders with health and welfare inspections.

"Crime and the reduction of criminal activity is a community problem and stands as one of the most serious challenges we have to every citizen, and we must all recognize our own responsibility," Sanford said.

"It cannot be the exclusive task of the Military Police. It takes a total commitment of all agencies and all individuals."







Arsenal converts to metered mail March 2

In what it hopes will be a cost-cutting step, the Army is going from a postal fee envelope — with the message "postage and fees paid" — to a metering system which will put postage on each piece of mail.

Defense activities at Redstone Arsenal will join the headquarters of the Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command and 14 other DARCOT commands in making the conversion.

The conversion here — which excludes contractors and the Marshall Space Flight Center — is planned for March 2. Envelopes with the indicia "postage and fees paid" will be overprinted with a metering stamp.

Seaburn Hyatt, the mail control officer for Redstone Arsenal, said the indicia envelopes can be used for up to a year after the conversion. After that, he said, envelopes without the indicia will be required.

Under the present system, official mail goes out in postal fee envelopes. The U.S. Postal Service takes a count once a year and tells the Army how much the Army is mailing. Postage will be printed on each piece of outgoing mail under the new system.

"We'll be able to account for all the postage that we pay and there's no guess work," Hyatt said of the metering system.

New machinery valued at about \$25,000 has been delivered to the arsenal mail room in Bldg. 3648 for the conversion. An accumulator that records postage, scales for weighing mail and calculating postage, and a postage meter for printing postage were all purchased by the Army, Hyatt said.

Weight will determine whether a piece of mail is first class or priority; weight also determines whether it is third class or fourth class. The arsenal does not use second class mail — the designation for magazines and periodicals, Hyatt said.



New method

Class determines postage rate: third class is cheaper than first while fourth class (parcels weighing one pound or over) is cheaper than third. Under the present system, most people here use "priority" first class which is the most expensive rate, according to postal officials.

Hyatt said he hopes the new metering system will save the Army money. "But the key to saving money is the mailer," he added. "It's the person preparing and classing the mail."

James Friend, manager of retail sales and services for the Postal Service in Huntsville, said he prefers the metering system. "The main thing is the accountability of it and of course it (the mail) will come to us in better shape," Friend said.

The new system will mean the arsenal mail room will have to separate the out-of-town mail from the local mail, and have all envelopes facing the same direction in trays. The old system did not require this sorting so the metering system "saves us that amount of work," Friend said.

It means more sorting is required of the arsenal mail room although Hyatt says "We've been doing it to a great extent as a favor to the post office."

The conversion affects all mail originating from Department of Defense activities on Redstone Arsenal, excluding contractors and MSFC, according to Hyatt. This installation changed from a postage system to the present fee system in the late 1950s.

All other government agencies in Huntsville except the Army will still be using the postal fee system, Friend said.

Hyatt expects the conversion will mean "a whole new operation" for him and his 13 fellow workers.

He pointed out the new accumulator machine and said, "Some time in the future we'll probably have to budget for our postage."

"Department of the Army is paying all postage at the present time."

Postal officials expect the new system will require that government mail from the arsenal go through the arsenal mail room first instead of downtown post offices.

Based on a one week survey in October 1979, over 602,000 pieces of mail valued at over \$358,000 in postage cost goes through the arsenal mail room each year for the Missile Command alone.

Army lawyer recalls challenging career

Most Army attorneys find themselves practicing a wide variety of law during a career, but Col. Henry L. (Roy) Brown has had more than a usual share of legal challenges.

During his eight years in Huntsville the recently retired Staff Judge Advocate and Chief Counsel to the Army's Ballistic Missile Defense Program Manager had a key role in setting up a new military installation, settling a multimillion dollar law suit and negotiating with a newly emerging nation.


The military installation, the first opened in the United States since World War II, was the Stanley R. Mickelsen Safeguard Complex in North Dakota. Brown joined the command in 1972 during the height of the Safeguard buildup. The Safeguard System resulted from a multi-billion dollar program and was one of the most complex defense systems ever deployed by the Army.

It was during this period that North Dakota filed a \$68 million law suit against Western Electric, the prime Safeguard contractor, for back taxes. Under the provisions of the contract, the U.S. would have to reimburse Western Electric for any taxes paid. Brown is credited with meticulous development of evidence and legal analysis of the case that helped make possible a settlement for a fraction of the amount demanded.

Perhaps his most unique contribution has been his key role in sensitive negotiations with the emerging independent nation of the Marshall Islands to insure continued operation of the Kwajalein Missile Range. This national test range, managed by the Army for the Department of Defense, is located 2,100 miles southwest of Honolulu on an atoll in the Marshall Islands.

The United States has had operating agreements with the Trust Territories of the Pacific for a number of years for the use of Kwajalein Range, but with the trusteeship due to run out during 1981, it became necessary to renegotiate the accords with the Marshallese individually.

According to Brown, this dramatically changed the negotiation process. The Marshall Islands now have initialed a separate Compact of Free Association with the United States which calls for the U.S. to provide military defense of the islands, but reserves all other powers and responsibilities for the

Marshallese government. Since this is the first international compact of its kind, it has generated many new and unique legal concerns. A Base Operating Rights Agreement and a Status of Forces Agreement are also being negotiated.

One of the colonel's primary concerns has been obtaining an agreement with the Marshallese giving the United States the right to exercise jurisdiction over the defense sites and to retain judicial sovereignty over American citizens.

Part of his concern stems from the fact that the new independent Marshallese government is still in the formation stage. "It's too soon to tell exactly how their judicial system, which is loosely based on the U.S. court system, will operate," he commented. "Indications are that the Marshallese plan to maintain a court that makes judgements on the basis of customs and traditions in addition to the regular local and district courts."

These important agreements with the Marshallese are now in final draft form. If Brown has any regret about leaving government service at this time, it's that he won't be on the job to see the accords completed.

Brown, who served earlier in South Carolina, Italy, Virginia, the Pentagon,

Vietnam, and Hawaii, has seen many changes in his Army law profession during a 28-year military career.

He thinks the staff judge advocate's role of legal adviser to his commander is becoming more and more important since the military is a huge operation involving billions of dollars and millions of people.

He also sees a greater emphasis today on rights of the individual. He points out significant changes in the military justice system such as the establishment of both an independent judiciary and independent legal defense counsel corps as examples. These changes were made to eliminate the appearance of commanders exercising undue influence over the decisions of a military court.

Brown is quick to point out that in his personal experience, he found abuses of the previous military justice system to be few and isolated. He says the new system works well, and at the same time, removes the potential for criticism.

The colonel pointed out that a military attorney must perform a dual role. "An Army lawyer not only has the responsibility to uphold the traditions of a military officer," he said, "but also must abide by the legal professions' code of ethics."

While he doesn't see any discrepancy between these two roles, he points out that the Watergate investigation resulted in several government attorneys being disbarred for failure to take positive steps to report or prevent illegal acts by their superiors. He acknowledges that this dual responsibility could put a military judge advocate in a ticklish position should a commander choose to ignore sound legal advice and try to circumvent the law.

It is evident from his record that Brown has succeeded, both as an officer and an attorney. During retirement ceremonies held Jan. 30 at the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization headquarters in Research Park, he was presented his fourth Legion of Merit in recognition of his legal expertise and professionalism.

Brown and his wife, Lucile, plan to stay in Huntsville. They have four children.

Griffin credited an unusually open winter with little bad weather and access to areas closed to hunting last year as the primary reason for the increase.


State game biologists have found that the Redstone deer herd is in good condition and will support an annual harvest of 500 animals, but that figure has never been approached in

Gun hunters accounted for 374 deer this season. Archers took the remainder. Griffin's tally indicated 226 bucks and 159 does killed by hunters.

Host family program helps foreign students feel at home

The best way for a person from another country to learn about the American way of life is to be a part of an American family. At least that is what the staff members at the MMCS Foreign Student Support Office (FSSO) believe.

And that is just what foreign students here at Redstone Arsenal have a chance to do.

The program that enables a foreign student to become a member of an American family in the Huntsville community is called the Host Family Program (HFP). The FSSO and the Huntsville-Madison County Council for International Visitors team up to find a responsible civilian or military family to host a foreign student and his family while they are here.

Waldon Tarpley, a FSSO education specialist, said the main three reasons why a foreign student would want an American family are: to improve his English, make American friends, and see how Americans live.

He added that it is also beneficial to the host family. "They get to see how someone from another country lives. They learn their different customs, languages, and religions."

A foreign student and an American family are matched by the interests and backgrounds that are listed on a questionnaire they both fill out. After the visitor and the family have been contacted, arrangements are made for their

first meeting. After they have been formally introduced, the visitor and his new family are on their own.

According to Tarpley, the host family will normally host the new member of the family two or three times per month depending on their arrangements. The family and the visitor's activities depend on the time of year and what they enjoy doing.

"The program is mainly to help the foreign student along while he is here," said Tarpley. "The students are not looking for a lot of extras and big things. All they want is to see how an American family lives. Expensive meals and big trips are not essential. It's the simple things that count.

He added that "most of the time they end up with a long-lasting relationship. Frequently both parties keep in touch with one another after the visitor leaves."

The program that began in 1965, is a success, according to Indonesian Army Capt. Haran Al-Rasyid, who has had his host family since Nov. 4. "My family takes me sight-seeing, shows me the American customs, how to serve food, and has introduced me to many American friends.

"I do everything in that house," he exclaimed. "I don't ever feel like a stranger. It makes me very happy."


