

Computer workers get profit sharing cash

Over 60 computer workers here are to receive cash awards for their efforts in the successful profit sharing test program conducted here through March.

The 61 data transcribers, under the Directorate of Management Information Systems, are to receive checks ranging from \$25 to over \$1,000 at an awards ceremony in June.

This represents half of the \$22,048 total

savings that resulted from the Missile Command's test of profit sharing. MICOM conducted the six-month pilot program from last Oct. 1 to March 31.

"I think it's one of the best programs the Department of the Army has considered in a long time because it does award people for doing a good job," said Richard Wright, chief of the computer management division which participated in the pilot program.

The test here is to be evaluated by the Army

Materiel Development and Readiness Command to see if profit sharing can work in a government structure as it has in industry. Profit sharing enables workers to share in profits made through their efforts.

The 61 data transcribers, who receive information and key it into a computer, produced 14.6 percent more computer records during the six-month period.

The 13 GS-1 worker trainees, 24 GS-2

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AER drive best ever

This year's Army Emergency Relief fund drive, boosted by a new allotment form system, has been the most successful ever at Redstone Arsenal.

The 1981 AER drive here exceeded its \$8,000 goal by over \$4,000. The drive ends June 1.

This was the first year for the allotment forms which allow active duty military and retired military to check off what amount they want deducted from their pay for AER. Allotments accounted for over \$8,000 of the \$12,217 total reported May 20.

"Allotment deductions have been a tremendous help by allowing the soldier to give over a longer period of time," said Juanita Phillips, the local AER officer.

The minimum deduction for AER can be \$1 per month for three months. The maximum time for deduction is 12 months and the maximum amount is unlimited.

"Actually because of the payroll

deduction plan I'm sure, this is our best year ever," Phillips said.

This year's campaign, which began April 9, surpassed the previous high total set in 1977 when \$7,184 was collected.

Offices which completed their drive by May 20 included Systems Development Office of Army Missile Lab, Stinger Project Office, International Logistics Directorate, Infantry Man-portable Anti-Armor Assault Weapon System (IMAAWS) Management Office, Chaparral-Faar Project Office, and Patriot Project Office.

Lt. Eric Borg, the 1981 AER campaign's project officer, said the campaign is "going really, really well. The results are a lot better than expected.

"Most organizations that have turned money in are usually doing almost twice as much as last year," he said.

Borg called the allotment forms "the biggest difference between last year and this year." The 1980 campaign failed to meet its goal.

Merit pay employees, commander meet

Maj. Gen. Robert L. Moore is to meet with the Missile Command's merit pay employees and their supervisors May 29 to discuss MICOM's implementation of the merit pay system.

The meeting will be held from 2:30-4 p.m. in the Rocket auditorium, Bldg. 7120. The commanding general's opening remarks are to be followed by a short presentation by Al Monger, the command's merit pay project officer.

"We're on target. We've completed our mid-year review test and we're getting ready to go into the real thing," Monger said of the merit pay system's status.

His presentation will be followed by a question and answer session in which the command's merit pay review board will answer questions from attendees.

Attendees are invited to a social in the patio room of the Officers Open Mess immediately following the meeting.

Roland is the foreign-developed but American-built air defense system that will protect troops, airfields, fortifications, supply depots and other battlefield targets against low altitude air attack. The short-range, all-weather plane killer went into production in October 1979.

Stevens is a graduate of Utah State University with a B.S. in industrial arts and holds a Master's in business administration from the University of Utah.

Prior to coming to Redstone in August 1980 as Hawk Project Manager, he was commander of the 59th Ordnance Brigade and concurrently the Permasens military community in Germany.

My husband works in one of the directorates in MICOM. He was recently injured and has been out from work on sick leave by his doctor's orders. He is restricted to complete bed rest in order to allow his injury to heal properly. His supervisor has called and tried to get him to return to work; however, the doctor has stated repeatedly that it is out of the question and would only hinder the progress being made in healing of the injury. He has been assigned some work his supervisor directed completed in a specified amount of time and it seems to me that it would be very demanding to expect someone to complete a task while lying in a prone position. Aside from the fact that his supervisor was rude enough to make such a request to my husband, I was appalled at the thought that he was brazen enough to tell my husband to do this work at home while using sick leave (I believe sick leave is to be used when one is sick — if he felt like working, he would not be on sick leave). 
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'Boss of year' surprised twice

An accounting branch chief here got at least two surprises last week — an award and a story about it.

James L. O'Hara, a branch chief for Finance and Accounting Division, received a "boss of the year award" from the Heart of Dixie Chapter of the American Business Women's Assn. His secretary had nominated him behind his back.

A few days later, another F&A worker phoned to tell this newspaper about the award. "How did you find out about it?" O'Hara asked the reporter who came to his office.

His secretary, Mae-Parrish Harvey (who goes by the nickname "Tweak"), had submitted his name and qualifications to her organization's panel of judges.

She told him about the May 18 dinner meeting the group was having. "She told me it was bosses' night and asked me if I would attend and so I did," O'Hara said.

He was surprised when it was announced that he had won the plaque as 1981 "boss of the year" over other nominated bosses. "Well, I was completely surprised but it's an honor to have that organization to bestow that on me," O'Hara said. "I was very pleased to get it."

"It deals with the accounting for procurement appropriations, and accounting for stock fund appropriations, as well as accounting for the billing and collecting for foreign military sales," he explained.

O'Hara directly supervises his secretary and three section chiefs in the 90-worker branch.

The GS-14 branch chief joined F&A in 1958 as a GS-9 accountant. He worked two years with the Army Audit Agency in Birmingham, Ala. after he was graduated from Tennessee Tech University with a B. S. degree in accounting in 1956.

Tradition revived

NCOs plan formal military ball

An effort is underway to revive the Non-commissioned Officers Military Ball at Redstone Arsenal as an annual event.

This year's ball is scheduled Oct. 30 at the NCO Club. Invited to the formal affair are corporals and E-5s through E-9s, and retirees.

"It has been done in the past but it hasn't

been carried out as an annual thing like the officers (ball)," said MSgt. Richard Brigmond, publicity coordinator.

The NCO ball has been held sporadically over the years because it was "never an enlisted man's tradition," he said. "That's what we hope to do — make it an annual event.

"We think as far as morale and esprit, it has a little more dignity than, say, an enlisted man's picnic."

The affair will be conducted in the traditional manner of a ball — complete with presenting of colors, a band, dining, dancing and toasting. Anyone will be able to follow the program without any prior experience with formal events, Brigmond added.

Service members are required to wear their branch's formal attire. Soldiers may wear either blue Army uniforms or their green uniforms with white shirt and bowtie.

"The retirees can wear either business suits or their uniforms," said Brigmond. "They're allowed to wear their uniforms for this occasion."

Women, except soldiers in uniform, should wear evening dresses.

Persons in attendance are not required to be accompanied by a date.

The event, which starts at 6 p.m. Oct. 30, has been in planning by sergeants major onpost since March. They formed a committee to handle all the details.

"People have already been assigned to all areas — decorations, and so on," Brigmond said. "Tickets will be distributed through normal command channels." Ticket prices will be announced in August and tickets will be available that month.

A military ball "traditionally has been an officer-type function, but now we want to pick up on it, too," said Brigmond.

Former commander gets ordnance honor

Sp5 Charles Ingram, Co B — "Not really. It's a very slight change from the previous program and it's not enough to be a better incentive that it was."




Sp5 Martin Meyer, Co A — "No. You still have to hold it for 8 years. I can't wait for eight years. It's too long."




Sp5 Melvin Thomas, HHC — "I don't think it has. I've been in the program for a while. It's a good program, but a one percent increase isn't going to attract many people."

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Promotion points recomputed for some soldiers

By the end of this week, 137 soldiers on the arsenal's standing list for promotion to E-6 will have their promotion points recomputed.

Most will gain points. Some will lose points. A few will leave the session with the same number of points they had in November when the second of each year's semi-annual recomputations was held.

Louise Akers of the Enlisted Management Branch of Redstone's Compact Military Personnel Division explained, "Most soldiers

gain some points for their time in grade and time in service. Plus, they may have received an award or completed a correspondence course or a college course since they went before a promotion board or since November's recomp.

"But soldiers can lose points if they have received a low SEER (Senior Enlisted Evaluation Report) or SQT (Skill Qualification Test) score. A soldier who has reached the maximum time in grade and maximum time in service and has not received an award or any education credits would see no change in his score."

The recomputed scores will be compared to the promotion cut off scores Department of the Army will publish for Aug. 1 promotions. Previous scores will be used for June and July promotions.

Depending on the soldier's MOS (military occupational specialty), cut off scores for promotion to E-6 range from 550 to 886.

Local promotion boards which screen and

recommend promotion of qualified E-5s may award up to 250 promotion points. The remaining 750 of a possible 1000 points depend on an administrative review of the soldier's records.

For example, time in grade and time in service can add up to 100 points each. Duty performance, as reflected by the Enlisted Evaluation Weighted Average, can be worth up to 150 points as can Skill Qualification Test results.

Awards and decorations are worth up to 50 points. The most possible points can be gained through military and civilian education. Soldiers can gain up to 200 points in that area.

Because these points are so important to an individual's promotion list standing, Akers advised, "Soldiers should be sure that their records are up to date. As soon as they earn points through awards or education they need to make sure those certificates get into their records.

"We want every soldier to get all the points they've earned, but we can't give points for something that isn't in their file."

workers and 13 GS-3 workers exceeded the standard output for their grade level, said Dennis Henry, assistant division chief.

Also receiving awards will be seven GS-4 lead data transcribers, who arrange the work and assist in providing it to each operator, and two GS-5 and two GS-6 supervisors.

"The facts speak for themselves," Wright said. "All the employees are real enthused

about it because there's no way they can do anything but gain."

Each operator has a terminal hooked into a mini-computer. The three mini-computers, located in Bldgs. 4488, 5678 and 8027, keep track of how much work each operator does.

Fifteen of the 61 people slated to receive awards have some handicap, mostly deafness. Most of the supervisors have been trained in sign-language, Wright said.

The top award winner, Julia Burton, went from level GS-2 to GS-3 during the test period. She exceeded the GS-3 standard of 190 computer records per hour by producing at a rate of 500 records per hour.

"We've never had anybody who produced that much," Wright said. "She was hired under the handicapped program."

Maj. Gen. Robert L. Moore, MICOM's

commanding general, is to distribute the checks and special act award certificates at a ceremony expected in June.

Meanwhile, the MICOM report on its pilot program has been prepared and was to be sent soon for evaluation.

"We hope DARCOM will approve the program and make it a permanent program," Wright said.

Bob Fletcher, president of the American Federation of Government Employees Local 1858, said "We're proud of them. We're proud that they're receiving an award, very much so." A memorandum of understanding between the union and the commanding general before the test gave the union's support for the test and the command's support for protection of employees.

"A good size group of lower-grade employees stood a possibility of getting some spending money, and we thought it was a good incentive," Fletcher said.






