## Vehicles checked for updated registration

If you work here or are stationed here, you'd better be sure your car is registered with an arsenal decal and expiration sticker.

The second annual registration drive by military police started Saturday and continues through Aug. 22. Warning notices are being placed on vehicles parked on the arsenal with no registration, expired registration or improper registration.

"The main purpose of the annual drive is to make people aware that they have to keep their vehicles registered and updated," said Sgt. Maj. James Weaber of MP operations.

Warning notices direct people to re-register their vehicle within three working days. Of course, notices are not placed on vehicles with a temporary pass or a visitor's pass.

From next Monday until the end of the drive, more MPs than usual will be at the gates issuing Armed Forces Traffic Ticket 1408. This form warns drivers without proper registration to register their vehicle within three working days.

"If we give you one of those and

you don't comply with that warning, we'll send it down to your unit or your supervisor," Weaber said.


There will be more MPs on the gates next week because about six are to report to work a few hours earlier each day and leave their normal time, according to the sergeant major.

A study is being conducted, at the provost marshal's direction, "to determine if we really need to register vehicles on an annual basis," said Capt. John Long, the MP operations officer.

"We're trying to determine whether or not going to a bi-annual registration or tri-annual registration would be more cost effective for the arsenal as well as convenient for residents while maintaining some degree of security," Long said.

They are also looking at the possibility of changing to another type decal that would be less costly. In January, officials began issuing decals for the front of the vehicle only instead of front and rear decals.

## Civilian training needs surveyed here

The annual survey of training needs of Army civilians here will be conducted this month by the civilian personnel office.

Two catalogues — one for computerized courses and the other for non-computerized courses — will be distributed to supervisors. These will include descriptions of training courses available here.

Supervisors are to submit a list of their workers' training needs to personnel's training and career management division by Sept. 16, according to Dr. Delia Black, division chief.

"Redstone Arsenal has traditionally had one of the most active training programs in the entire Department of the Army and has historically been a leader in developing ap-

proaches to meet the dynamic requirements of managers and employees located here," she said.

The Learning Resource Center, which opened to the workforce June 1, is the newest technique of civilian training here. It offers self-paced, individualized instruction in computerized courses, Army Logistics Management Center courses, Training Extension Course tapes, and educational video tapes.

Features of the large one-room addition to civilian personnel Bldg. 7446 include 22 individual learning booths, each equipped with audio-video equipment.

"For years we have relied primarily on two types of delivery of the training service — on the job training and classroom training,"

Black said. "The Learning Resource Center provides an individualized approach to training, most of which is self-paced."

Training programs can be divided into those that supervisors nominate people for and those that workers apply for and compete with other applicants.

Supervisors nominate their people for job related self-improvement courses, such as those offered at the Learning Resource Center.

Workers themselves apply for advancement opportunity courses that they have to compete for. These include the Advancement Training Program, Para-trainee (local intern)

## Count calories

Editor:

I have what I believe is a valid complaint about the dining facilities on Redstone Arsenal. At this time the U. S. Army has a large emphasis on the weight control program, yet it is virtually impossible to eat in the dining hall and stay on a valid low-calorie diet. The items on the serving line are not marked as to calorie content. Except for the weekday dinner, it is not possible to get a decent salad and even then there is a lack of low-calorie salad dressing (such as plain oil and vinegar dressing).

I would like to offer the following suggestions: Post signs on the serving line giving the calorie content of each entree; consider starting a permanent self-service salad bar (this would not only help dieters but would also enhance the operation of the dining hall); and offer a selection of low-calorie salad dressings.

## Government annuity

**Question:** If a widow or widower of a government employee remarries and this marriage doesn't work and ends in divorce, can the person at anytime be reinstated for the government annuity check from the first person?

**Answer:** Remarriage after age 60 does not terminate the widow or widowers annuity. The annuity which is terminated because of remarriage before age 60 may be restored if the remarriage is later terminated by death, annulment, or divorce and if the widow or widower pays back the lump sum benefit (if any) that was paid upon termination of the annuity.

## Merit promotion

**Question:** Will a supervisor's appraisal of "I don't know" on merit promotion prevent you from being "among the best qualified" for the job?

**Answer:** Under the merit promotion evaluation procedure a rating of "don't know" will not preclude an applicant from receiving a rating of "best qualified." If your supervisor rates your application "don't know" the merit promotion panel will evaluate and rate you on experience, education, training and awards which relate to each knowledge, skill, ability

and other characteristics (KSAO). It is extremely important that you submit a complete application to include SMI form 1219-1, merit promotion applicant questionnaire, each time you apply under merit promotion to insure you receive proper consideration. The merit promotion office at 876-8488 can give you more information if you need it.

## Supervisor's appraisal

**Question:** I recently received a notice from CPO that I was "among best qualified but not within reach" on a merit promotion announcement. It is my understanding that the policy has been changed and all best qualified are being referred. What is the story on this?

**Answer:** The "policy change" you refer to did not go into effect until Aug. 3 — after you received the notice from CPO. Changes in merit promotion regulations in the negotiated agreements with AFGE Local 1858 now allow for referral of more than 10 candidates. Effective Aug. 3 all candidates who meet the high qualified criteria will be "best qualified" and will be referred for selection consideration. More information can be obtained from 876-8488.

# New director plans to get familiar with job first

Bernie Cobb has no laundry list of immediate goals, no crash program of operational changes going into his new job as director of the Missile Command's Ground

Equipment and Missile Structures Directorate.

"I have no preconceived notions about the job," said Cobb, who succeeds former director Will Lewis. "I plan to get familiar with what my folks are doing, how they're doing it, and go from there."

"I expect not only to continue the good work the lab is noted for but, hopefully, enhance it with my project experience."

Cobb, in fact, brings to the job more than 20 years' experience in all phases of Army research and development. He started at Redstone with Thiokol in 1958 but switched over to the Army two years later.

"I've liked all my jobs. They've all been interesting and challenging," he said, mentioning in particular his stints in the Propulsion Directorate, Advanced Systems Concepts Office, and as Viper deputy project manager.

His strong suit, in his opinion, is managing Army in-house programs — including several anti-tank technology programs preceding Viper—because of his broad background in propulsion, missile design, materials, and warheads.

"SMAWT" (Short Range, Man-Portable, Anti-Tank Weapon Technology) was a challenging program because we competed with a recoilless rifle version," said Cobb, who was project engineer and helped bring the anti-tank weapon from concept to project office. He holds a patent on the launcher.

Cobb has a bachelor's degree from Louisiana State University, and a master's from the University of Alabama in Huntsville, both in mechanical engineering.

What does he think about his new job?

"This is a great opportunity," he said of the GE&MS Directorate, which has approximately 95 people. "They're good people, it's a challenging environment. And you can't ask for more than that."

## Viper passes operational test

Viper, the shoulder-fired weapon under development here, performed successfully during recent operational testing at Ft. Benning, Ga.

The anti-tank weapon that weighs about eight pounds and resembles a long tube "met or exceeded its requirements in several important areas," according to Viper project officials.

Those were the initial findings on the July 12 testing that compared Viper with M72A2 Light

Anti-tank Weapon (LAW). Viper is to replace that weapon system.

Both systems were tested by soldiers during simulated field combat operations. The Operational Testing Evaluation Agency of Falls Church, Va., was responsible for the test conducted by the Army Infantry Board.

Col. Aaron J. Larkins is the Viper project manager here and General Dynamics, Pomona Division, is the prime contractor.

## NCO reenlisted

SFC James N. French reenlisted for six years of service in a recent ceremony at the Alabama A&M University military science department.

French is the operations non-commissioned officer and principle advisor to the ROTC Ranger, Airborne and Air Assault platoons and the Orienteering Club at A&M.

An MMCS soldier was found guilty of possession of marijuana during Special Court Martial proceedings here Thursday.

PFC Michael T. Marquis of 6th Student Company was sentenced to reduction to E-1, forfeiture of \$250 per month for four months

and hard labor without confinement for 30 days.

He was to begin performing hard labor immediately under School Brigade supervision, according to a spokesman for MICOM's Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.

Since Marquis did not request a jury,

Military Judge Col. John A. Mooneyham heard arguments and handed down the finding and sentence.

Capt. Joe N. Lampley of the Staff Judge Advocate's Office acted as trial counsel and Capt. David Sneed of the Army Trial Defense Service was the defense counsel.

# Test aluminum cylinders before filling

WASHINGTON — Serious injury and property damage resulted recently in two instances in which aluminum diving cylinders failed while being filled, say officials at the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES).

Preliminary reports indicate that the two cylinders were being filled for the first time since being painted or refinished by a method involving high temperature curing of the paint.

The exchange urges customers owning cylinders which have been painted, refinished or heated, to have them hydrostatically tested before filling, to make sure that there has been no loss of cylinder strength. Customers should also let the serviceman filling the tank know that it has been tested.

Government regulations prohibit the use of cylinders exposed to fire, emphasize AAFES officials. Additionally, the compressed gas association specifies that a cylinder which has been exposed to heat of more than 350 degrees

fahrenheit be condemned. Failure to heed the regulations could cause cylinder failure resulting in property damage, bodily injury or death.

Although the reported incidents involved aluminum cylinders, the regulations apply to all diving cylinders.



# E&S referral system changes

Changes are being made in the career program registration and referral process for engineers and scientists in the Missile Command and other agencies serviced by the civilian personnel office.

As of July 15, competitive referral activities for GS-12 through GS-15 Engineering and Science (Non-construction) positions are to be handled at the installation level.

Referrals had been done at the major command or Department of Army levels under the Interim Decentralized Engineering and Science System (IDEAS).

The Missile Command's Automated Career Appraisal and Referral System (MACARS), a

computerized system, is being developed to handle these referrals. The new system will be phased in during fiscal 1982 for appraising the 1,600 Engineering and Science (Non-construction) careerists, according to Mary Spears of the civilian personnel office.

The MACARS steering committee consists of top-level engineers and scientists from the local workforce, a civilian personnel office team, and a representative from Local 1858 of the American Federation of Government Employees. A team from the Directorate of Management Information Systems is automating the system.

program, and the nationwide Presidential Management Intern Program.

"The reason behind training is basically to improve performance on the job," Black said. "The Civil Service Reform Act of 1978 will continue to have an enormous impact on the training because its requirement in so many aspects is to improve productivity."

Personnel records show there were 9,581 cases of training for eight hours or more

during fiscal 1980. Participants were civilians from the local Army agencies serviced by the civilian personnel office. This was an increase from the 9,239 cases in 1979 and the 6,750 cases in 1978.

"The Government Employees Training Act of 1958 was the significant document that recognized the need for continuing training of civilian employees in a developing, complex, technology oriented society," Black said. "It is the basis in law for most of the programs."

# Red Cross needs people who want to help others

Despite a growing number of male volunteers in recent years, the Red Cross at Redstone Arsenal needs more volunteers.

"The only requirement is to have a desire to help others," said Gerdy Wyatt, chairman of volunteers.

Military dependents and retirees serve as volunteers at Fox Army Community Hospital, dental clinic, troop medical clinic, the bloodmobile, and the Red Cross station here. They also may serve off post in first-aid clinics in schools.

The need for volunteers has grown because of the gradual loss of paid Red Cross workers. "A lot of the paid staff has been let go," Wyatt said. "Therefore, it's that more important that we get volunteers."

The Red Cross station director's office has gone from three paid workers to only one paid worker. Twelve volunteers would be "ideal" for the offices located upstairs in Bldg 3491, according to Wyatt.

Volunteers are not allowed to give medication or medical advice. They serve where needed whether this means answering questions at an information desk or taking pulse and blood pressure.

They may receive training at the dental clinic or at the Red Cross first-aid clinic downtown. Whether training or working, volunteers can get free baby-sitting service at the Child Care Center on post.

"I think the biggest thing is just the satisfaction you get from working," said Wyatt, a Red Cross volunteer for two years in Italy and two years here.

"Without the volunteers on post, the hospital could not treat as many patients as they are treating," she added. "The more help they have from volunteers, the more time staff people have to treat patients."

The approximately 130 volunteers include 14 men, mostly military retirees who have served Red Cross for three years. Two were serving in the troop medical clinic and the rest at the hospital.

"That's more or less a new development that we have men who are volunteers. But

we'd like to have more because they're doing a great job and they seem to enjoy it," Wyatt said.

Leo Kirk, a paid Red Cross worker at Ft. Campbell, Ky., who was here on temporary duty, said "once they get involved, they really make a good volunteer."

A Red Cross worker for about 28 years, Kirk said volunteers are "scarce" today. "Because so many wives are looking for jobs, getting volunteers today isn't easy."

Teen volunteers, age 14 to 18, numbered 18 working this summer at Fox Hospital. They are to receive certificates at an awards ceremony Aug. 18 at Bicentennial Chapel's activity room.

Most volunteers serve a half a day a week but some work practically fulltime, according to Wyatt. There is no minimum or maximum "as long as they let us know when," she said. "What we try to stress is consistency."

Wyatt, wife of Col. David L. Wyatt, said many people mistakenly believe Red Cross is a function of a club. "They think it's a part of the officers wives club's functions which it is not," she said.

"It is for every dependent, even military retirees. Anybody is welcome to be a Red Cross volunteer."

An orientation for all new volunteers is to be held in the third week of September, Wyatt said. Her phone number is 837-6967.



# Volunteer enjoys working with people, staying busy

Mary Ferguson admits that one reason she spends so much time as a Red Cross volunteer is because she's too "hyper" to stay at home.

"I have always enjoyed volunteer work, working with people. I'm not a golfer and I'm not a bridge player," said the volunteer here since 1964.

"I thoroughly enjoy the work. If I stay home two days, I'm climbing the walls."

Ferguson is chairman of the 70 volunteers at Fox Army Community Hospital and the two volunteers at the troop medical clinic.

Her duties in the hospital's medical surgical clinic include assisting doctors with examinations of female patients, finding lab reports, and making telephone calls for doctors.

She may put a band-aid on someone and check someone's "vital signs" by taking temperature and blood pressure but she doesn't handle "actual" first-aid. "That's not needed by volunteers because there's too many qualified people to really handle an emergency situation like that," she added.

Ferguson, a Seattle, Wash., native, came to Huntsville in 1964 with her husband, the late Cmdr. Edward F. Ferguson. The retired 30-year Navy man was working with the Boeing Aerospace Company.

"We came here with the Boeing Company in the spring of 1964 and I took the (Red Cross) training course that fall," she recalled.

She had done some volunteer work since she was a teen-ager for the Childrens Orthopedic Hospital (now reportedly called Childrens Hospital) in Seattle. She served with the

American Cancer Society her last four years there.

"When we came here, we couldn't find an American Cancer Society group and that's why I came here because we were using this hospital," Ferguson said.

The mother of five fully-grown children has served the Army hospital on the arsenal ever

since. In fiscal 1980, she worked 1,270 hours — over 100 hours per month.

As hospital chairman, she interviews prospective volunteers and tells them the needs for volunteers in the hospital. She is trying to enlist at least 10 volunteers to operate the information desk.

"Ordinarily a chairman is a chairman," she said. "Actually I prefer clinic work."

# You can get more mileage for your money

WASHINGTON — Though gasoline prices are high, you can get more mileage for your money if you follow these tips:

- Use the air conditioner. When operating at interstate speeds (or anything over 35 MPH), air conditioning actually can improve your car's gas mileage. Open windows produce added drag, resulting in less gas mileage.
- Don't race the engine. Besides wasting fuel, this practice can damage an engine if its oil is sluggish and has yet to circulate among the vital engine parts to protect them from wear.
- Tune up the engine regularly. A properly tuned and maintained engine gives better

mileage and performance. It also helps reduce air pollution.

- Cut down on engine idling. Shut off the engine instead of letting it run at railroad crossings, drive-in banks, and in traffic jams.
- Keep the tire pressure up to par. Too little air in a tire causes extra drag and thereby wastes gas. Not only does an underinflated tire increase tread wear, it also can cause steering problems. Too much air can be dangerous, too. Check the car's operating manual for the recommended air pressure.
- Maintain a constant speed. Frequent slowing down and speeding up increase fuel

consumption.

- Avoid sudden starts and stops. You'll save gas and wear on brakes and tires by coasting to stops.
- Don't store heavy items in the car. The increased weight requires extra gas to keep it moving.
- Obey the 55-MPH speed limit. This is devised not just for safety but also for holding back gas consumption.
- Take extra care in planning your summer trips. Remember that use of an up-to-date map can help you avoid costly re-routing. (ARNEWS)

## Apply now for 82's White House fellowships

WASHINGTON — Soldiers interested in serving in special positions at the White House may consider applying for the 1982 White House fellows program.

Each year, the president's Commission on White House Fellows selects about 15-20 people to serve a one-year period in such jobs as special aids on the White House staff or with cabinet members.

Fellows come from all sectors of the national life — the professions, business, military, the arts and academic community. The only non-waiverable requirement is U.S. citizenship.

Army Capt. Thomas C. Shull of Somerville, Mass., was recently among 15 fellows chosen for the 1981 program beginning in September. Shull competed with over 1,600 applicants for the position.

Military members must receive permission from the Army before applying for the fellows program. Requests must be in writing and include the soldier's name, rank, Social Security Number and the statement, "I desire to compete for the 1982-83 White House fellowship."

Interested soldiers should send their "request to compete" to the Department of

the Army by Oct. 16. Requests may be sent directly to their career management division.

White House fellowship commission application forms will be forwarded by HQDA when permission to compete is granted. Candidates should submit their application forms directly to the commission before Nov. 16.

Final selection of winners of the 1982 White House fellowship will be made next June. The year-long 1982-83 fellowship begins in Sept. 1982. (ARNEWS).



The four types of decals include enlisted servicemember, red lettering; officer, blue lettering; civilian, green; and contractor, black. Retired military decals start with the letter "E."


Last year the arsenal began issuing yearly expiration stickers which have a large numeral for the month of registration. The color of the stickers is changed each year.

NASA has its own registration system which consists of decals

with no expiration, Weaber said. Warning notices for the registration effort refer NASA workers to Bldg. 4312.

There were 53,946 vehicles registered here by Aug. 4, not counting NASA vehicles. The vehicle registration office is located in Bldg. 3708 at the intersection of Patton and Aerobee Roads.

Weaber and Long agree that most people comply with the registration rules. "I think our biggest problem is young soldiers buying cars and selling them to another guy and the guy doesn't re-register it," Weaber said.





# Army extends leased housing program

WASHINGTON — The Army's scheduled termination of the Domestic Family Housing Leasing Program at the end of fiscal year 1981 is getting a breather.

It comes in the form of specially allocated Army funds for continuing the program for FY 82 and 83, according to housing-management officials at headquarters, Department of the Army. But it allows no new leases to be executed. Based on projected legislative relief from the statutory dollar limitation, the Army's share of resources

earmarked for the program will be closely monitored by the Secretary of the Army.

Leases now in effect will be cancelled when occupants finish their current tours of duty or voluntarily assume personal responsibility for the leases.

By the end of FY 83, all leases will be terminated. In many cases this would coincide with the completion of duty tours. If a tour goes past FY 83, the occupants will be afforded maximum advance notice of termination, say officials. This grace period

would have the way for assumption of personal responsibility for the leases or for making other housing arrangements. When it's a matter of individual hardship resulting from the leasing moratorium, the affected party can seek adjustment to the variable housing allowance rates.

The phase-out of the leasing program also entails revisions of previously formulated data on lease and funding requirements extending through FY 85. (ARNEWS)

# Court decision impact limited

WASHINGTON — The vast majority of Army National Guardsmen and Reservists are not affected by a recent U. S. Supreme Court decision, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Reserve Affairs), Dr. Edward J. Philbin emphasized recently.

The Supreme Court decided in *Monroe V. Standard Oil Company* that a reservist-employee was not entitled to preferential work scheduling in order to gain work time lost when he performed weekend military duty.

The Defense Department's office of general counsel said the decision reaffirmed that employee-reservists are protected against discriminatory acts by employers such as discharge, denial of promotional opportunities, or other adverse treatment resulting solely from the performance of their military obligations.

The general counsel's office evaluated the court's decision as follows:

"In *Monroe V. Standard Oil Company*, the U. S. Supreme Court ruled that a reservist-employee of a refinery was not entitled to be paid for time lost when he was required to perform weekend military duty. However, because of the very unusual fact situation, the case is not to be regarded as a precedent that is prejudicial to the retention-reemployment rights of reservists. Generally, employees of the refinery, which operated continuously on a 24-hour schedule, seven days a week, were required to work rotational shifts on various days of the week which differed week to week. The reservist involved in the subject case lost work time (and hence pay) not because of discrimination by the refinery but because his fellow workers were not willing to trade weekday for weekend-day work tours. The Supreme Court merely held that the employer here was not required to give preferential treatment to the reservist by providing special work scheduling that excluded weekend work days when that arrangement was not provided for other employees."



# Touring exhibit teams tell the Army story

WASHINGTON—If traveling, meeting the public and telling the Army story appeal to you, then consider applying for one of the U. S. Army Recruiting Support Center's touring exhibit teams.

The center, located at Cameron Station in Alexandria, Va., is seeking qualified soldiers to travel with the 16 exhibits that tour the country about 11 months of the year.

The support center's eight 40-foot expandable theater vans, six cinema pods, and four modular indoor exhibits visit hundreds of high schools and colleges, malls and shopping centers, fairs and other places each year in support of local Army recruiters.

Team members move the exhibits from site to site, set them up present the shows and

answer viewer's questions. They also maintain the exhibit vehicles while on the road.

Because of the extended TDY periods, soldiers wanting to be considered for the assignment must be single and financially stable.

They must also be in pay grade E-6 or E-7, have no record of courts-martial or recent Article 15 actions and have no limiting profiles. A current passing score on the PT test is required.

Further, applicants must have a GT score of 100 or higher, at least 24 months left in the Army, no assignment restrictions, and not be on levy for overseas assignment.

The travel requirements dictate that applicant have a valid civilian driver's license


and be eligible to obtain a military license.





# Army assists national Scout Jamboree

WASHINGTON — Some 800 military people helped with this year's 10th national Scout Jamboree. Approximately 30,000 boy scouts and their leaders from all 50 states and a number of foreign countries gathered for the jamboree from July 29 to Aug. 4.

Fort A.P. Hill, Va., was the site for the jamboree. This is the first time a jamboree has been held on a military installation.

The theme for the jamboree was "Scouting's reunion with history." This year marks the 200th anniversary of the last major


battle of the Revolutionary War when Cornwallis is surrendered to George Washington at Yorktown. The jamboree site is about 100 miles from the historic site of the surrender. Many of the jamboree's activities will reflect the nation's heritage.

Army support of the jamboree began last January. Members of the 76th Engineer Battalion, Fort George G. Meade, Md., constructed an amphitheater large enough to seat 80,000 people. They also constructed six regional campfire mini-areans, installed 18 miles of underground water pipe and two and

a half miles of overhead electric lines.

Since the 1972 enactment of Public Law 92-249, the Secretary of Defense has been authorized to lend equipment and provide transportation and other services to the Boy Scouts of America in support of world and national jamborees.

In addition to providing a unique training opportunity for units involved, new or expanded facilities will be left intact — enhancing the post's future capability to support Army training. Supplies and materials were paid for by the Boy Scouts. (ARNEWS)
