## Four plead not guilty

Not guilty pleas were entered at arraignment last week by four people indicted by a federal grand jury on conspiracy charges.

John William Chambers and Roddy Hoyt Moody, two Army employees at Redstone Arsenal, and Betty Ruth Laird and Billy Norman Brown are scheduled for trial in Birmingham in early November. They were indicted Sept. 4 for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government by obtaining payment of false and fraudulent claims.

They are free on unsecured \$500 bonds set at arraignment by Magistrate James Reddoch. This means the defendant would owe the government \$500 if he or she failed to appear for the next scheduled court appearance, according to Assistant U. S. Attorney Frank Salter.

Pre-trial conferences are scheduled for Oct. 1-2 before Reddoch. A consent docket, for accepting any changed plea, is set for Oct. 19-20 before U. S. District Judge Sam C. Pointer.

Pointer is to call a docket of about 40 cases Nov. 2 with trials set for the following two weeks. The four co-defendants will be tried at the same time unless a motion is made and granted to try a defendant or defendants separately, Salter said.

## Recruiting team seeks scientists, engineers

An organized recruitment effort is under way to attract young engineers and scientists to employment in Army organizations at Redstone Arsenal.

The Missile Command's civilian personnel office and the Army Missile Laboratory started the drive to fill the large number of engineering vacancies here.

"What this is designed to do is bring in engineers at the (civil service) entry levels," said Berney Waite, chief of the research and development branch of personnel's recruitment and placement division.

A centralized recruiting office is being furnished in a room in personnel's Bldg. 7442 and will offer forms, brochures and other materials. Plans include visits by recruiting teams to various southeastern colleges and universities.

Posters, magazine advertisements and school newspaper articles are also planned. "The result we hope to get is to be able to attract and recruit engineers because they're difficult to find," Waite said.

"We're going to try to make the Missile Command more attractive, improve our image to the various students," he added. "We'll tell them what we do here, the benefits

available, the work atmosphere, and the educational benefits available."

Recruiting engineers out of college has been difficult because of competition with private industry, according to Waite. He and a representative from Army Missile Lab have been working on the recruitment effort since Sept. 1.

"This is something we hope to be a continuing thing," Waite said. "We've always recruited engineers but we've never done it in an organized approach like this."

Dr. Walter W. Wharton, chief of advanced technology in the Propulsion Directorate, is the Army Missile Lab's representative for the recruitment effort. "We do have a significant need for young scientists and engineers because we have had and are continuing to have a significant number of retirements," he said.

"If we don't get the young people in, we're going to have a real shortage of engineers here," Wharton added.

The Missile Lab is the recruiting and training ground for young scientists and engineers who go from there to various organizations, according to Wharton.

Why should an engineering graduate con-

## Soldier helps crash victim

An Army ambulance driver says he was just doing his job when he helped one of the injured in a fatal train-truck collision in Huntsville last week.

Sp4 Russell S. Janas was making a routine drive back to Redstone Arsenal after transporting a patient for some tests at Huntsville Hospital. He drove his unoccupied ambulance from the hospital and "saw black smoke, about a mile high."

Janas was headed down Governors Drive towards the arsenal when he had to stop because of the backed up traffic. A man ran up to the ambulance.

"He asked me if I could give him some help. He said there was a man badly hurt down by the railroad tracks," Janas recalled.

"I don't know what was running through my mind but I asked him where it was."

At the wreck site at the Governors Drive and Jordan Lane intersection, Janas saw "flames all over the place." An injured man was lying on the ground about 25 yards from the train.

"He had burns on the front of his legs and the back of his legs

and he had a back injury," Janas said.

The man was conscious and in pain when Janas, assisted by four civilian men, put him on a spine board from the Army ambulance. They carried him up a hill to an Emergency Medical Services Inc. ambulance.

"I gave them (EMSI personnel) a hand, cutting away his clothes," Janas said. They wrapped him in a burn sheet, took vital signs then transported him by EMSI ambulance to Huntsville Hospital.


"I followed them up there so I could get my equipment (the spine board) back," Janas said.

He never learned the victim's name nor saw the other injured persons. The Tuesday morning mishap killed six people and injured five.

"EMSI did a real good job on transporting the patients, giving them first aid treatment," said the 21-year-old medic who has been working at Fox Army Community Hospital about 15 months.

Janas, at the scene for several minutes, recalls being afraid that the train would blow up and being

**Performance standards**

**Question:** MICOM employees have been repeatedly told in the "People" column and other publications that that supervisors have been directed to have their people participate in the development of performance standards.

The suggestion was made to "ask your supervisor when he or she is going to discuss performance standards with you."

Is it rational to assume that a supervisor who does not intend to get any input from employees would respond to such a question in good faith?

Since it is obvious that numerous employees have not been given an opportunity to participate in this important function, in spite of all the assurances that this is General Moore's policy, it is recommended that the Rocket print an inquiry form to permit employees who have never been afforded such an opportunity to make the commander aware of the situation. This action will provide some indication that the commander's stated policy is not just empty words, or have fallen on deaf ears.

**Answer:** If you cannot or will not discuss something as important to you as your performance standards with your supervisor, printing an inquiry form in the newspaper is not going to resolve your problem. Call Jim Temple in Civilian Personnel, 876-72222 and ask him to put you in touch with the employee relations specialist assigned to your area. Another course you may wish to consider is a direct contact with the MICOM inspector general, 876-4905.

## Stand up . . . and be counted



Our annual Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) begins next week. Each of us must now decide whether to participate, where we want our money to go, how much to give and how best to do it.

Those decisions require careful thought. As chairman of the campaign, I hope you will consider these points:

Our national leadership has put first priority on improving our military strength and the combat readiness of our military forces. That effort has had major impact on many of the federal activities here in Huntsville, but it also compels reduction in the amount of federal funding formerly given to the charitable and social work done by member agencies of CFC. The rationale for the reorientation of where our tax dollars will be spent lies in the belief — that most of us share — that charity is best done at home and its services best supported by direct, personal contributions.

Now we have the opportunity to back up our beliefs with dollars.

CFC raises money for a multitude of agencies and organizations. If you happen to disagree with the objectives or progress of one, I pray you will not use that as a reason to deny support to others. You have the option to designate agencies to receive your contribution and you can do that with my promise that your money will go where you want it to go.

Each CFC agency performs a needed, often vital service. Together they touch our lives in ways that most of us may never realize. You may not need them today, but when you do — and the facts are that sooner or later you or someone close to you will need their help — you will benefit not in proportion to what you have given but in direct relation to what everyone has given over the years to further

the work, the research or the service that agency exists to provide.

How much you choose to give is up to you. The need is great. I recognize that all of us have problems making ends meet. The CFC agencies have that problem too. Please remember that unlike many others, federal workers and military personnel in this area have well paying jobs and can look forward to a salary increase next month and the additional benefit of a reduction in our personal federal taxes. I hope that when we look at the results of this year's campaign, we will find that each individual contributed at least a dollar a week, military personnel and federal workers, as their personal commitment to helping others. Many will contribute more. Together we'll meet the challenge.

Within my own command, I have asked all managers to give the CFC campaign personal attention. We put priorities on the things we set out to do well in MICOM. Our number one priority in the 10th month of 1981 will be CFC. I hope all of you will do the same because this is something we owe to ourselves and others who look to us for help to do well.

If we are the kind of people I believe we are, this is the time to stand up and be counted. Let's do CFC right, do it fast, do it together and exceed our goal. Only you can make it happen. Your personal commitment is required.

Don't wait to be contacted. Have the Federal Spirit — stand up at the outset of the campaign and be counted. Your nation and your neighbor and your family will profit.

We can meet our goal in the first week if everyone will participate. We'll all be the better for it.

# Training program begins for equipment specialists

Thirty-six people from a diversity of backgrounds will begin working toward the common goal of becoming missile equipment specialists when a new two-year training program is launched here Monday by Maintenance Engineering Directorate.

The people, called "paratrainees", enter the program at the GS-5 level and receive non-competitive promotion to GS-9 on satisfactory performance. "It's kind of an upward mobility type program . . . similar to an intern program," explained Lula Call, a paratrainees. "You go through two years of training and at the end you're qualified as an equipment specialist."

Call, 37, reflects the wide range of experience and backgrounds possessed by the 36 paratrainees. She was a secretary here for 19 years.

"We have them of all ages and all experience levels," said Richard Laymon, the paratrainees' training manager. "Some are recently out of the military, retired or just through with a two or three year commitment."

"And some are A&M graduates and some are clericals trying to cross over into a career program," added Call. Career program of-

officials recruited and interviewed job candidates at Alabama A&M and other universities, she said.

Laymon said the paratrainees are being groomed for "a big change of the guard with equipment specialists in the next five years. It's retirement time for many of us, myself included, and these people will fill those vacancies which will occur."

"Training in all logistics aspects of weapons systems" is necessary for equipment specialists, Laymon explained. "The final duties may be specialized but they are trained in all logistics aspects," he said. Among areas equipment specialists need to be knowledgeable in are configuration control, engineering change proposals, documentation validations, provisioning, logistics support analysis and field reports.

To train the paratrainees in these skills a combination of classroom and on-the-job study has been set up.

"We've organized a POI and IDPs and scheduled 21 formal courses for them to take during two years," said Laymon. The courses include job-specific instruction in topics like electronics, technical data package development and logistics support analysis,

and "common skills" training in subjects such as problem solving and report writing.

Laymon said CPO has "blocked" the training so that all paratrainees will be studying the same thing at the same time, when possible. The new Learning Resource Center is being utilized for some training, he said.


Paratrainees' training progress is being kept track of with a computer.

A feature of the program, said Laymon, is that all paratrainees are getting a similar training background that will enable the individual to fill any future slot regardless of where they are and what missile system they're in.

"If we train them alike, they'll be able to go anywhere."

The new program will get underway Monday with a get-together of paratrainees and career program and training personnel at 9 a.m. in the auditorium in the lobby of MICOM headquarters building.

They will be addressed by Ernie Young, who was their activity career program manager until leaving Maintenance Engineering recently to become MICOM assistant deputy for materiel readiness.



## Not needed

Ventilation blowers from MICOM headquarters building are loaded on a truck for a short trip to the back of the building. ## Young named to top slot

Ernie Young, 48, former deputy for Maintenance Engineering, has been promoted to the ranks of Senior Executive Service and named the Army Missile Command's top civilian logistician.

Young last week was named MICOM's new Assistant Deputy for Readiness.

"I will work closely with the command group and MICOM elements to accomplish Army goals and support missile readiness programs," he said. "That's our number one priority at Redstone, support the soldier."

"I also plan to work closely with the research and development side of the house and, hopefully, strengthen the command approach to problems and challenges."

Young said a civilian was named to the position to provide continuity in the readiness arena.

"My door is always open to anyone who wants to discuss readiness problems, what's going on at the command, or what should be going on," he said.

Young started with the Supply and Maintenance Directorate when he first came to Redstone in 1958, then transferred to the Hawk Project Office in 1962 where he stayed 10 years. He left MICOM for one year in 1972 as the Defense Department's nominee for the President's Executive Interchange Program, a program between government and industry high-potential young managers to acquaint them with each's problems and capabilities.

He had been with Maintenance Engineering since 1973 but had served in several special assignments, including one as Assistant to the Hawk Project Manager for Iranian programs; steering committee chairman for logistics command planning on AMARC; and he headed the MICOM Readiness Organizational Refinement known as Project MIROR.

A native of Union, S.C., Young holds a BS in Physics from Furman University and an MA in Public Administration from the University of Oklahoma. He is married to the former June Becker and has one daughter who is a graduate of the University of Alabama and is employed at Hermann Hospital in Houston, Texas.



# Promotion requirements; here's a summary

"I've been in the service for two years now and have a year of college," the soldier pondered. "I wonder if that's enough for me to be promoted from E-4 to E-5?"

The soldier could have checked out AR 600-200-Enlisted Personnel Management System. Promotions are covered in Chapter 7, but here is a brief summary.

There are three different systems used for advancement depending upon whether it is through grade E-4, to E-5 and 6, or to E-7, 8, and 9.

Promotion through the grade of E-4 is usually an automatic process based upon time in grade and time in service. Variations exist according to the educational level and rank the individual has upon entering active duty, and in turn upon his in-service performance record. For instance, if Pvt. John Doe begins as an E-1 with no college, he will normally rise to E-2 in six months and to E-3 in the same amount of time. If he enters as an E-2, he'll be eligible for E-3 in 12 months and for E-4 in another 12. Starting as an E-3 with one to four years of college will mean promotion in four to 24 months. Time requirements may be, based upon a good record, waived down to a shorter waiting period.

Advancement to the ranks of E-5 and E-6 involves a semi-centralized selection system at the brigade level. The individual appears before a board. Promotion points are awarded by the board and are also given for:

- Duty performance
- Skill Qualification Test score
- Time in service and in grade
- Awards and decorations
- Formal education and certain military courses
- On the job experience (OJE)

There are two lists for potential promotees — the primary zone and the secondary zone. For E-5 slots the primary zone is for people who have 36 months time in service (84 months for E-6 slots) and eight months time in grade (ten months for E-6). The secondary zone is for those who have at least 24 months time in service for an E-5 opening (at least 60

months for E-6), and who according to the regulations, "strive for excellence and whose accomplishments, demonstrated capacity for leadership, and marked potential warrant promotion ahead of their peers." For exceptional soldiers, time in grade and service requirements may be further reduced through waiver.

Attaining a rank of E-7, 8, or 9 is achieved through a centralized DA selection system. Promotion points are not used and the applicant makes no personal appearance. There are some basic requirements to be met before being considered for a primary or secondary zone:

- "Meet announced date of rank requirement and other eligibility requirements prescribed by HQDA."
- Have a minimum of eight years of cumulative enlisted service for advancement

to E-8, and at least ten years for E-9.

- Be in a current active duty status.
- Possess at least a high school diploma or GED.
- Be eligible for reenlistment.
- Have a required security clearance; an appropriate MOS clearance for E-7, and a National Agency Check or Secret clearance for E-8 or 9.

The selection procedure is a relative one based on examining individual records and filling the needed slots with the most qualified personnel. Promotion to the three highest pay grades, according to regulations, "automatically (with a few exceptions) incurs a two-year obligation."

# Retired military community is 7,000 and growing

North Alabama's retired military community numbers about 7,000 and is still growing, according to the chairman of Redstone Arsenal's Retiree Advisory Council.

"Most who come here for their last years in service and retire, stay here. Huntsville and the Tennessee Valley is the best-kept secret in the U. S.," says Leonard Flank, a retired Army colonel in his fourth year as chairman.

Huntsville's environment is "conducive to a very pleasant lifestyle, especially to retirees," he says. Flank praises the people, the

facilities and the availability of cultural activities.

"The community accepts them (retirees)," he adds. "They're not rejected because they have a military background.

"It's a hopping place. At least, it keeps me busy."

The 18-member Retiree Advisory Council, established by regulation, reports to the commanding general on concerns of the retired community. It "forms a bridge bet-

ween the active components and the retired community," Flank says.

It also tries to "enhance the image of the retired community by being active in the community." The council's annual Retiree Activity Day is Sept. 26 and 500 were expected to attend the day's events.

The council consists of retired military personnel from the Army, Navy and Air Force. It includes a representative from the NCO Retired Wives Club.

"The concerns of any military retiree are first of all, continuation of their retiree pay — that it isn't eroded or cut by actions of Congress, whatever," says Flank, who retired from the Reserve component in 1972.

"Secondly, services to which they're entitled: Medical at Fox Army Community Hospital, dental at the Dental Clinic, the commissary, the PX and the Morale and Welfare Activities," he adds.

Flank, who retired as a patent attorney for the government in 1973, advises military retirees to be active in the community. "You'll get a feeling of self-satisfaction and accomplishment and also benefit the community," he says.

"It's a good image for the military and a good source of self-satisfaction."





A free hunting safety course is being offered by Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge.


It will be presented twice, on Sunday, Sept. 27, from 1-5 p.m. and again on Monday, Sept. 28, from 7-9 p.m.

"We gave 150 percent. The dining facility is an outstanding facility and I'm just sorry it didn't win it," said CW3 Gerald Johnstone, chief of the food services branch here.

The winner was Service Battery, 1st Battalion, Fort Lewis, Wash., representing FORSCOM. Runner-up was Hohenfels (Germany) Training Area, Seventh Army Training Command, representing USAREUR.

The U.S. Army Troop Support Agency at Fort Lee, Va. announced the awards in July and the winner's trophy and runner-up plaque were presented in August. Presentations were made at the International Food Service Executives Assn. convention at Kissimmee, Fla. near Disney World.

Winning and runner-up food service sergeants go to the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, N. Y. for two weeks of food service training.

"I hate to lose but we've run (for the award) in six consecutive years and we've won once and we've been runner-up once," Johnstone said.

The food services branch operates three dining facilities serving about 3,000 soldiers here each day. Dining facility number 3 won the Connelly award in 1976.
