## Roads named after soldiers

Fifteen roads on Redstone Arsenal have been named for soldiers from Madison County who died in the Vietnam war.

This is part of project to name 38 unnamed roads on the arsenal and also to replace old road signs, according to Bobby Noles, the traffic engineer.

"When I came to work as a traffic engineer, I discovered there were many roads on the arsenal that did not have names," said Noles, who plans to submit a work order for signs to Facilities Engineering. The roads need names so that accident reports can be computerized.

"There were 38 I considered to need names," Noles said. "All have been named."

Fifteen were named after soldiers because they were "our more prominent unnamed roads," according to Dave Bryant of Facilities Engineering's master planning office.

"It's our most commonly used roads and roads we feel it would be an honor for the soldiers to be named after," Bryant added.

The roads include Lewter Road for Sp4 Stanley R. Lewter; Hankins Drive for Cpl. Joel R. Hankins; Cooper Drive for Cpl. Jeffrey L. Cooper; Cline Street for Sgt. Donald L. Cline; Bason Street for PFC William A. Bason II; Ausborn Street for Sp4 Donald E. Ausborn; Acton Drive for PFC Marion F. Acton; Wells Road for 1st Lt. Benjamin G. Wells; Williams Road for PFC Paul E. Williams;

Hicks Road for SSgt. Prentice W. Hicks; Wood Road for Sp4 Larry D. Wood; Stewart Road for PFC Sam W. Stewart; Sheffield Road for Sgt. Anthony D. Sheffield; Raiford Road for Sp4 Mark P. Raiford; and Matthews Road for Sgt. Charles T. Matthews and Sp4 Robert L. Matthews.

Wells was from Madison and the rest were from Huntsville, Bryant said.

## Five MPs reenlist at once

Five 291st Military Police Company soldiers reenlisted and one extended on the same day last week.

"That's the first time here," said SFC Ben Cole, reenlistment NCO for the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal. He called the number of same time reenlistments with one company "fairly unusual."

The reenlistments Nov. 3 included Sp4 David Earl Vanhorn, for overseas area of choice Europe; Sgt. Marlin Leonard Esh, for overseas area of choice Europe; Sp4 Jeffery Alan Story, for a 12-month stabilization at Redstone;

Sp4 Kevin Lee Guerrero, for overseas area of choice Hawaii; and Sp4 Joseph Carlton Goode, for overseas area of choice Korea.

SSgt. Leroy Ellis extended for training in a military occupational specialty through the Bonus Extension and Retraining (BEAR) program.

"I think it's outstanding," said 1st Sgt. Artis Miller of the 291st MP Company. The company's first sergeant since May 1980 said this was the most reenlistments his company has had at one time since he's been here.

Capt. Larry Forster, the company commander, said usually the reenlistments are spread out over a month and don't occur on the same day. "I'm really grateful because these are all good people," he said. "I personally like to see the Army retain good people for leadership roles.

"I'm very happy because I like and respect all six of these individuals involved in this this morning. I also think it's a reflection on the fact the Army is attracting and retaining good people."

A small reenlistment ceremony was held at 9 a.m. Nov. 3 at the MP station. "The unit lately has been doing very well on reenlistments," said Forster, the company commander for about 16 months. "We were over 100 percent last year."

## CFC over goal

For the first time in three years, the Huntsville area Combined Federal Campaign has met and exceeded its goal.

The CFC drive collected \$552,000 as of late last Friday, the final day for the six-week fundraising effort. The goal was \$500,000.

"I attribute that to the involvement we had from upper levels of management — from General (Robert L.) Moore on down," said Willard Holmes, the campaign coordinator.

Maj. Gen. Moore, MICOM's commanding general, was this year's campaign chairman.

"For two previous years, there was a continuing decline in participation and decline in contributions," Holmes said. "The goal we've got was set roughly nine percent above what we actually collected last year (\$464,000)."

Fifty-three local, national and international agencies are to benefit from this year's drive.


Holmes, chairman of CFC's coordinating group, partly credits this year's success to early establishment of "credibility" between CFC recipient agencies and the contributor. He also cited support from top management and from "the overwhelming majority of federal agencies in town."

"I think we had the support and cooperation of almost all the segments of the federal family," the coordinator said.

Approximately 18,000 federal employees in 32 North Alabama agencies were to be asked to contribute during the campaign that started Sept. 28.

Holmes' message to those people who worked on the campaign is "Thanks is not enough. It's an appreciation that goes beyond thanks.

"There were a lot of people who put forth a personal effort," he added. "Thanks is not enough; it's extreme appreciation for their effort."

## A tough trek to freedom

He originally came from communist North Korea and entered the non-communist world as an infant on his mother's back. Today he is one of the most respected NCOs in 7th Student Company.

His name is SSgt. Chang Ho Yi and he has been a soldier in the U. S. Army for over seven years.

Yi was a member of northern Korea's royal family. His grandfather fought the Japanese occupation of World War II, but was later imprisoned and then killed in 1950 because he also opposed the communist government.

Yi was born in the North Korean capital of Pyongyang in April 1953 when the Korean conflict was still raging. His father had fled to the south and became a major in the Republic of Korea (ROK) Army. Yi's mother decided it was time for her to leave the north also.

After the war ended, she packed her son on her

back and walked nearly 200 miles from Pyongyang to Seoul, the South Korean capital. To cross the 38th parallel — which separates the two countries — she paid the owner of a boat and floated across the Imjin river. Stepping on shore, they were in South Korea.

Inchon, the location of General MacArthur's famous military landing was where Yi spent his childhood and adolescence.

"I enrolled in Inwha University in 1967," he recalled, "and was enrolled in the ROK ROTC program for four years. I even had combat training in Vietnam. My group was only there for ten days, but believe me, we were fighting during that period."

From 1971-73 he continued in school sporadically and studied English. In 1973 he moved to Hawaii where he had relatives. "I then joined the Army in 1974," he continued. "I had my advanced training here at Redstone Arsenal in the TOW-Dragon Repair and Vulcan Repair courses. Then, in 1975 I





### Senate hearings

**Question:** What did the Army say in that Senate hearing last week about the charges that New York businessman made about the way MICOM buys calibration equipment?

**Answer:** The Senate Government Operations Committee held a hearing Nov. 5 on allegations made by Loebe Julie, president of Julie Research Laboratories, of New York City. James R. Ambrose was principal Army witness. The Army Inspector General has been investigating those allegations since April. The DA IG report is to go to the Secretary of the Army Nov. 16. The Army said last week that once the secretary has acted on the DA IG findings, his decision will be made public.

A copy of Ambrose's 16 page statement to the committee and an 11 page summary of the DA IG report made public at the hearing are available in the MICOM Public Affairs Office if you want to read them.

### Holiday leave

**Question:** Employees are encouraged to schedule annual leave at the beginning of a new year. Historically, the commanding general encourages the liberal use of annual leave during holiday periods. Historically, about this time of the year employees are admonished that 50 percent of the workforce must be at work during the holiday period, including the Friday after Thanksgiving.

Before employees are coerced into quickly using annual leave which was originally scheduled for the holiday period, what is the commanding general's position on liberal use of annual leave for this year?

**Answer:** The general's policy is exactly the same as stated in these columns last year at this time: liberal leave for the holidays, with no "50 percent" requirement. Managers and supervisors are being told to keep enough people on board to supply and support the command's customers and perform other essential work. That means minimum staffing.

### MICOM goals

**Question:** A Rocket article dated Oct. 29, 1980 entitled "Micom Implements 'Yardstick' to Measure Progress" provided a summary of activity and anticipated completion dates.

- (1) Have the stated goals been met?
- (2) Will the FY81 performance against goals be published?
- (3) Have the FY82 goals been established?

**Answer:** Virginia Stacey of comptroller review and analysis responds to your first question this way:

(1) "The FY81 goals covered a wide area of subjects such as resources, people, security assistance and acquisition. In many areas we met or exceeded the goals, but in some areas we fell short.

"Progress toward attaining the individual goals was tracked throughout the year via quarterly command review briefings. MICOM managers looked at their own organization, and the commander and staff looked at significant trends through the command review briefings."

(2) The Rocket plans an article summing up MICOM's performance against goals as a command.

(3) Yes, and will be published soon, according to Maj. Bernard Bennett of the organizational effectiveness office.

## Soldiers lose unemployment pay

Soldiers who leave the Army are no longer automatically eligible to receive state unemployment compensation under a new federal law retroactive to July 1.

"What it states in essence is anybody that leaves the service that is eligible to reenlist is not entitled to unemployment compensation," said Robert G. Wright, the federal claims examiner for Alabama.

The law signed by President Reagan in August disqualifies soldiers who resign, voluntarily leave the military after completing the service contract, or are released or discharged "for cause."

Those who leave for cause would be those who leave the service because of drug abuse, alcohol abuse, "things of that nature," Wright said from his Montgomery office. "They really haven't specified in writing what that (for cause) would be."

People released from the service for "other than cause" such as for physical disability may be eligible for compensation, according to Wright.

"In order to be eligible at all, they must have at least 365 consecutive days of service and an honorable discharge," he said.

The law pertains to anyone who leaves the service — any branch of the military — on or after July 1. It was signed by the president Aug. 13 as part of the Budget Omnibus Reconciliation Act.

"It used to be as long as they had an honorable discharge and had been in (the service) 365 days, they would automatically qualify," said Wright who works in the federal programs section of the State Department of Industrial Relations.

"In other words, right now about 98 percent of them are disqualified," he said. "I had 27 qualified out of 240 last month for the state of Alabama."

Generally, under the new law, a soldier who is eligible to reenlist, but who leaves the military voluntarily after completing the service contract, no longer may receive unemployment compensation.

"I think it's wrong because if the boys get out and kept their nose clean, they should get it," said Wright, whose advice to servicemembers concerned about the law is to write their congressman.

## Learning center makes training easier

Participation at the civilian personnel Learning Resource Center is "increasing constantly," according to its administrator.

"By bringing the courses in-house, we reduce the cost and make the training available to a whole lot more people," said David Kieselbach, the administrator since August.

The LRC opened to the workforce June 1 as a large one-room addition to Bldg. 7446 in the civilian personnel complex. In October, an average of 10 people a day went to the learning center for generally two-hour sessions.

"Most of this is self-paced teaching whether it's computer-assisted instruction or computer-managed instruction," Kieselbach said.

He is available at the LRC to assist managers in providing training for their workers. Twenty-five people, for example, were scheduled to take the contract officers representative course at the LRC. The alternative was travel to the Army Logistics Management Center at Fort Lee, Va.

"We have in-house programs working very well," Kieselbach said. "Instead of having people off post to do the work; by reducing the cost, we can get more people trained."

Participants in October included 99 who took the Program Logic for Automatic Teaching Operations (PLATO) computer-based courses; 112 who took the video cassette programs; and seven who viewed the Training Extension Course (TEC) tapes.

Features at the center include individual learning booths, each equipped with audio and video equipment. "We're getting some new terminals. We may be adding some extra PLATO terminals, too," the administrator said.

Kieselbach was a self-employed management consultant for industry before he was hired by the civilian personnel office Aug. 3. He was director of continuing education at the University of Alabama in Huntsville before retiring in 1970.







After being assigned to Fort Bragg, a second hitch in Korea, Redstone Arsenal Support Activity, and to Korea once again, Yi came to the MMCS 7th S. C. as a senior platoon sergeant.

"He is frequently involved in performance counseling," noted Sgt. Dolores A. Wilkerson. "This is either for something outstanding or when students get into trouble. But he also helps them with personal problems. The students really respect him and know they can count on him if they're having difficulties."

As far as discipline goes," Yi said, "I realize these troops are young and need some understanding. I try to avoid Article 15s if I can.

"If a soldier needs some correction I'll give him some extra training and tell him he should be proud to be a member of the U. S. Army. His job is important and he is part of an organization that influences world history."

Yi's hours are long. An average day in the company for him will be from 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. or later. However, in his off-duty hours he likes spending time with his wife and three-year-old son, plus he practices Taekwondo — a Korean form of karate. Yi is a 5th degree black belt who has instructed in Korea and Hawaii.

"In my opinion he's an NCO's NCO," said 1st Sgt. John J. Carr of 7th S.C. "He's the type that all soldiers should emulate. His standards of appearance are very high and his concern for the troops is great. That's why he puts in the hours that he does. He usually even stops by on weekends. Sergeant Yi is also in charge of the platoon sergeants. He does a great job."

# Plenty of customers but not much wood

The clamor for firewood from the arsenal is bigger than ever but the supply is unusually small this year, according to Ben Woodham, Redstone forester.

Blame lamb-like March winds for the shortage. "Some springs we have pretty bad blow-downs but not this year," said Woodham, explaining that much of the firewood available here comes from windfall trees. "Usually the March wind blows more down than it did this year," he said.

The popularity of wood heat has brought on an intense interest in firewood from the arsenal in recent years. There's not a lot available but you can't beat the price: \$2 per load.

The colder it becomes the more calls Woodham gets from people wanting to buy wood or get on a waiting list. He patiently explains to each caller that there is no waiting list, that it's sold at Property Disposal Office on Thursdays first come, first served, and that dead trees only may be cut.

He advises firewood customers to check on availability before coming out by calling him at 876-3122, or Property Disposal at 876-3617. "We don't have firewood all the time," said Helen Claunch of Property Disposal, "just when (Woodham) turns it in to us."

She said customers pay \$2 and receive a permit to cut a load of wood and have 30 days to haul it away. Woodham turns in wood for firewood sale as it

becomes available as a result of storm and flood damage, construction, range and firebreak clearing and the like.

Woodham said cutting standing live timber is prohibited except where he may specifically authorize it in areas that need cleared.

Woodham said there is sometimes wood available for free on the arsenal portion of Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge. Permits to cut Refuge wood are available from Woodham. Only downed wood can be cut on the Refuge since standing dead trees are left in place for cavity-nesting birds.

Woodham also advised that Refuge wood may be difficult to get to. "Since it's a waterfowl refuge it's hard to find anytime of the year you can cut, or it's restricted and you can't get to it," he said.

A few live ash and oak trees recently were illegally cut on the arsenal. Woodham said it's the second instance of firewood rustling to occur here since he became forester in January, replacing David M. Bryant who accepted a management position in Facilities Engineering.

Woodham called the rustling a "bad precedent that could lead to stopping of woodcutting altogether" should wood theft become widespread.

But "99 percent do right — it's that one percent who can ruin it", he added.

# Knights win fifth world title

WASHINGTON — Completing a flawless come-from-behind effort in the last round, the army's Golden Knights captured their fifth world parachuting title recently during the fourth world parachuting championships of relative work at Zephyrhills, Fla.

The 1981 contest was held Oct. 11-16 at a site about 30 miles north of Tampa and was sponsored by the United States Parachute Association. The championships are held every two years and are conducted under the auspices of the International Aeronautical Federation. Over 20 countries were represented in this year's events.

In the 10th round of scheduled competition, the Army's official parachute team managed to tie the Canadian team, forcing a "jump-off" round — the first ever in the history of the event. During this tie-

breaking round, the U.S. Army team edged out the Canadians by one point to take the championship title. The Golden Knights finished with a total of 129 points followed by Canada (128), Great Britain (109) and Australia (97).

Relative work competition is a team effort and is scored by team standings. Four-way competition begins at 9,000 feet with all jumpers exiting together. Teams have 35 seconds to complete five prescribed maneuvers. They may then return to the first formation and continue to complete as many as possible before time expires. The team completing the most maneuvers over a fixed number of rounds is the winner.

Members of the victorious army team, all stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C., are: SSgt. Glenn Bangs, Reading Pa.; Sgt. Bob Finn, Santa Barbara, Calif.; Sgt. Andy Gerber, Anthony, N.M.; Sgt. Mark Gabriel, Fort Walton Beach, Fla.; and alternate SSgt. Mike Deveault, Orlando, Fla.

In addition to their five world titles, the Golden Knights have won 16 national championships in more than 17 years of competition. (Arnews).

## Course trains first sergeants



## Reserve officers selected

WASHINGTON — Sixty-five Army Reserve officers have been selected to attend in-resident senior and intermediate service colleges. An additional 77 officers have been picked for the U. S. Army War College correspondence studies course.

According to officials in the Office of the Chief, Army Reserve, more than 500 officers applied for the course, which were announced in March.

The War College correspondence course was the most popular course, with 238 colonels and lieutenant colonels applying. This is a two-year course paralleling the resident War College Course, it consists of non-resident studies and two two-week resident phases at Carlisle Barracks, PA.

More than 100 officers applied for 12 seats in-resident at senior service colleges. One seat exists at the National War College, one at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and 10 at the U.S. Army War College.

Forty-seven captains and majors were selected to attend resident intermediate command and staff courses. One officer was picked each for the U. S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College and the Armed Forces Staff College. Seven officers will be going to the Combined Arms and Staff Services School and six will attend the logistics executive development course.

Eleven officers will attend the 323-day command and general staff officer course at Fort Leavenworth, Kan. The remainder will be in the 139-day command and general staff officer course — reserve component, which begins Aug. 1, 1982.

Captains and majors have until Dec. 11, 1981, to apply for another 24 in-resident command and staff course seats for late 1982 and early 1983. The details are in HQDA letter 140-81-1, dated March 17, 1981 (ARNEWS)

## PX policy change for Reservists

WASHINGTON — Family members of most USAR unit members are no longer required to have their Reserve sponsors present every time they shop at Post Exchanges.

The House Armed Services Committee has ruled that dependents of Reservists who are assigned to troop program units are entitled to one day of unac-

companied exchange shopping for each day of inactive duty for training (IDT) performed by the reservist. The new privilege does not extend to dependents of those reservists attached but not assigned to troop program units.

To shop unaccompanied, family members must present the reservist's leave and earnings statement or a unit letter of authorization. (ARNEWS)

# Pre-separation program planned

WASHINGTON — Two military agencies have put their heads together to make the soldier's transition to civilian life easier.

The U. S. Army Military Personnel Center and the Army's Adjutant General's Office have designed a program for pre-separation counseling beginning Nov. 15.

The program is designed to insure the soldier and his or her spouse receive realistic information early enough to ease the transition to civilian life.

Coordinators, selected by the local commander, will arrange for facilities, speakers, equipment and material to help the soldier prepare for the civilian world.

Pre-separation counseling briefings will provide information on civilian living expenses, civilian job-search activities. Educational benefits, documentation of education and training received in the service, veterans' benefits, and opportunities to join the U. S. Army Reserve and the Army National Guard.

A soldier's handbook has been prepared for distribution at the briefings to assist the soldier in filling out job applications and provide information on apprenticeship programs.

Briefings normally will be presented in classroom

areas for groups of soldiers nearing their separation date.

Officials hope the new program will help the soldier make a smooth move into civilian life. (ARNEWS)

## Food inspector specialty opens

WASHINGTON — A new career field for warrant officers will soon expand the Army's food inspection program.

The first 10 candidates for the Army's newly adopted military food inspection technician program will begin a six-week training course in November at the Academy of Health Sciences, Fort Sam Houston, Texas. The program calls for 53 warrant officers over the next two years.

The new warrant officers will fill the middle manager food inspection roles now being occupied by veterinary officers. Veterinarians, officials note, are charged with insuring that Army commissaries and food storage facilities meet health standards.

As food inspection technicians, the warrants will manage and direct personnel, facilities and equipment needed for military food hygiene, safety and quality. This will release veterinary officers to support other needs within the defense department.

The selection process for the new program is outlined in change 5 to AR 611-112. Soldiers must have at least six years military or civilian experience in food sanitation or quality assurance. Also, they must complete the new technicians course at the Academy of Health Sciences.

Those interested in a food inspection career as a warrant officer should contact a medical activity having a veterinary officer, or their local military personnel office. (ARNEWS)

# Division 86: Preparing today for tomorrow's challenge

Division 86, or "heavy" division, is the name given to the first major reorganization of Army divisions since the 1960's.

The reorganization combines advanced battlefield concepts, new organizational designs and modern equipment to give soldiers the best combat division for meeting the challenges of the future.

The heavy divisions are armored and mechanized divisions that will begin to show change starting in fiscal year 1983. Major shifts will be noticed as more new equipment rolls off the production lines.

## Division 86

The armored division, totaling 19,998 soldiers, is organized with three brigade headquarters, six armored battalions and four mechanized infantry battalions. The mechanized infantry division totals around 20,300 and is identical to the armored division, except that it has five armored battalions and five mechanized infantry battalions.

Each armored battalion will have four maneuver companies and a headquarters company. Each company will have 14 M1 Abrams tanks. The headquarters company will have two tanks and seven M3 cavalry fighting vehicles. There will be 58 tanks in each battalion, instead of the present 54.

Mechanized battalions will have four rifle companies of 13 M2 infantry fighting vehicles each and a headquarters company, including consolidated mortar, scout and maintenance assets. These battalions will also have an anti-armor com-

pany of 12 improved TOW vehicles. There will be 54 infantry fighting vehicles, seven cavalry fighting vehicles and 12 improved TOW vehicles in each battalion.

## Cavalry brigade (air attack)

A big plus for the heavy division is a cavalry brigade (air attack). All division aviation resources will be joined in this brigade for better command and support. The brigade will have two attack helicopter battalions with three companies each, a combat support aviation battalion and a cavalry squadron of two air cavalry and two ground cavalry troops.

The cavalry brigade (air attack) will be assigned 50 attack helicopters, 48 scout helicopters, 30 Black Hawk helicopters, 12 surveillance and electronic warfare helicopters and six observation helicopters. It will also have 41 M3 cavalry fighting vehicles.

## DIVARTY

Division artillery (DIVARTY) provides close support to the maneuver battalions. In the new DIVARTY, target-acquisition equipment will be increased. There will be a target acquisition battalion equipped with the AN/TPQ-36 countermortar and AN/TPQ-37 counter-battery radars to locate threat weapons. Another new item will be the remotely piloted vehicle that will provide over-the-hill visual capability.

Direct support artillery has been increased by the addition of 18 more 155mm tubes per division. General support artillery has been increased by the

addition of a multiple launch rocket system battery with nine launchers and an increase in the number of eight-inch weapons.

## Division base

The Division 86 headquarters has a capability of operating as separate cells over a large area for improved survivability. The military police company will be smaller than before, because many of its duties have been shifted to battalion and brigade scout platoons. The signal battalion has increased capability with improved tactical satellite, high frequency and FM communications.


The air defense battalion will have three DIVAD/Stinger and two Chaparral/Stinger batteries. Major equipment increases have been made to the engineer battalion which improves the survivability, mobility and countermobility of the division.

The nuclear-biological-chemical (NBC) company will have a greater decontamination capability, plus a smoke capability. The military intelligence battalion (CEWI) contains a variety of new systems to locate, identify enemy units and to disrupt their communications.

## Division support command

Division 86 support, as in today's division, will come from the division support command (DISCOM). Each brigade will be assigned a forward support battalion. This unit will provide dedicated maintenance, supply and medical support to each brigade.

The new idea behind each support battalion will be to conduct logistical support as far forward and as close to the

combat brigade as possible. This will save time in repair and resupply-time that may make the difference between winning and losing on the battlefield.

Where possible, repairs will be made without sending equipment to the rear area. Ammunition and fuel supplies will move as far forward as the tactical situation permits. Sick and wounded soldiers will either be returned to duty immediately after treatment or be medevaced out of the area by corps personnel. To recover essential heavy equipment, such as tanks, a heavy transport company with 24 transporters has been added to the division supply and transport battalion.

# Blood coordinator likes posters

Linda Gentle likes to post reminders for her co-workers at Procurement and Production Directorate the day before the monthly blood drive.

Gentle, the most consistent blood coordinator at Redstone Arsenal, doesn't take credit for the artwork. "When I see something that's really cute, I borrow it," she says.

Her November poster has a drawing of a pumpkin and the message "Give Blood . . . Someone will be thankful." For October, she used a drawing of a black cat for Halloween with the message "Someone needs what you have . . . Give."

"You can't have the same thing up every month so you have to be a little creative," says Gentle.

The blood drive takes place every second Friday. "This month it's on Friday the 13th. I sure hope that doesn't affect any of our donors," Gentle says jokingly.

P&P Directorate averages about 7 percent of its workforce for its monthly blood donations and has

held the trophy as top donator for eight out of nine months this year. At year's end, the trophy goes to the organization with the most wins.

"I don't think to win is the whole thing. It's the fact that there's an everyday need for blood," says the blood coordinator. "I don't think winning a contest should overpower the need. We're very happy to have won these months but we're very proud to be a part of the Redstone Arsenal blood drive."

Gentle, a DARCOM intern, volunteered to work with the Red Cross blood program here last spring. The Huntsville native had served as a Red Cross volunteer for 10 years and is on the local chapter's board of directors.

She recalls when a request for a volunteer came to her office at P&P in Bldg. 4488. "I saw this as an opportunity to do something and I like it," she says.

Gentle doesn't take credit for her directorate's success with blood donations. "I think it's just the people are aware of the need and they respond to the need," she says. "It's not anything I do. It's just they're aware of the need."

"I don't feel like you can single out one person and say 'Hey, he or she's the reason they've won.'"

She meets the donors when they arrive on the day of the blood drive then goes back and forth from that room to her office. "I try to be available but my work in the office has to continue as a normal day," she says. "By the time they leave, I'm exhausted from running back and forth."

Gentle and her husband, Brooks, have three children: Edward Brooks Jr., 20, Amy, 15, and Jessica, 10. They reside in Hazel Green.

She points out a poster proclaiming "We're glad you're here," one of her many blood program illustrations. "I put that in the room where the blood drive is," she says. "I think that really summarizes."

# Flag football championship decided this week

A semifinal game in the double elimination tournament for the flag football championship is scheduled for 6 o'clock tonight.

The last two contenders will face each other tomorrow to decide which team takes home the trophy.

At presstime only HHC and the 515th Ord. Co. remained undefeated in the double elimination post flag football tournament.

Co. A, Co. B, the 95th SVC and the 6th S.C. were still in competition with one loss in the tourney.

When the regular season ended last week, Company A (11-1) took top honors in the Eastern Conference and Company B (9-3) won the Western title.

The champs didn't have a chance to rest on those laurels because the 1981 Championship Tournament opened Thursday with four games scheduled. Four more were scheduled for the next night.

Alpha, the tournament's top seed, finished the regular season with the league's best record. They were the league's most successful defensive team, allowing only 40 points in 12 games. Almost half of those points were scored by Co. B in a 18-0 shutout. Three teams scored more than Co. A's 146 points.

HHC was the season's top scoring team with 203 points but finished fifth in defense, allowing 64 points. Their record of 10-2 equaled that of the 515th Ord. Co., but the 515th was awarded second place in the East based on their 8-0 win over HHC in season play.

The 5th S. C. lost a tournament berth in the same way. They finished the season tied for fourth in the East with the 6th S. C. The 7-5 tie was decided in favor of the 6th because of their earlier 8-6 victory over the 5th.

In addition to Bravo, the Western Conference championship contenders are the 4th S. C. (7-5), the 8th S. C. (4-8) and the 95th SVC (4-8).

The 4th S.C. finished the regular season with the lowest total of scoreboard points of any contender. In 12 games they scored 66 and allowed only 57 points. Defensively, they tied Bravo for second in the league.

The 95th SVC is the tourney's underdog. They ended the season tied with the 8th, 4-8, but lost to the 8th by a 14-12 margin in regular season. However, the 95th is the only team in the league with the dubious honor of winning less than half their games while outscoring their opponents 114-105.

Conference and tournament trophies will be presented to the victorious teams after the last game of the tourney, Friday.

# Guard, Reserve manpower up

WASHINGTON — The Army National Guard and the Army Reserve continued to gain in manpower during the first six months of fiscal year 1981, according to DOD officials.

The National Guard increased its strength by 11,900, reaching 97 percent of its six-month goal. The Reserve increased by 9,400, exceeding its quota for the period by 12 percent.

For the first half of the fiscal year, 88 percent of the total Guard and Reserve enlistees were high school graduates, and 94 percent scored in the three highest mental categories.

Despite the gains, however, officials report that the National Guard is 11 percent below its readiness objective, and the reserve is 18 percent under strength. (ARNEWS)






