## Enlistment, reenlistment successes pose new kind of problem

Success in enlistment and reenlistment is causing problems of a new kind for Army personnel officials.

According to Brig. Gen. William C. Roll of the U.S. Army Military Personnel Center, the Army could be as many as 15,000 soldiers overstrength by the end of Fiscal Year 82.

"We have to learn to manage success," said Roll in an address to Redstone Arsenal officers and senior NCOs at Toftoy Hall April 13.

Roll, the Director of Officer Personnel Management at MILPERCEN, is one of five general officers on the road briefing Army leaders on managing the force.

The problem with the overstrength is money. Roll explained that currently the Army is budgeted for a yearly end-strength of 780,000 soldiers, but current projections are that the FY 82 end-strength will be 790,000 to 795,000 troops. The Army has asked for additional funding for a fiscal year end strength of 784,000 which is expected to pass Congress, said Roll. That would still leave the Army with a projected overstrength of from 6,000 to 11,000 troops.

There isn't enough money to pay for these extra troops said Roll, and unless the FY end strength is reduced other money saving measures such as freezing permanent change-of-station moves or promotions may be considered.

"Our goal is to field a competency-based Army," said Roll. In order to reduce the Army strength and to improve the competency of the Army several steps are being taken.

Tightening reenlistment controls is one step. According to Roll, two measures being used for this

purpose are requiring soldiers to be in grades E-4 or higher and requiring three aptitude scores of 95 (85 for soldiers who took the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery after March 1980) to be eligible for reenlistment.

Another change in reenlistment is that waiver approval authority has been restricted to General Court Martial Authority. Lower headquarters may disapprove or recommend approval for waivers, but final approval must come from the General Court Martial Authority.

Strength cuts aimed at reducing the number of non-performers in the Army are also being considered. Some changes in discharge policies will help company commanders to eliminate non-performing soldiers from the Army.

Soldiers with less than 36 months active federal service may be discharged under the Expeditious Discharge Program, Chapter 5, Army Regulation 635-200, without their consent. Previously consent was required for soldiers between six and 36 months service.

A soldier may also be discharged for unsuitability, Chapter 13, AR 635-200, without a board action if the soldier has less than six years service.

Drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs will not serve as a dodge for soldiers trying to avoid elimination, said Roll. A commander may remove a soldier for failing to make progress after 30 days in a program and initiate discharge action under Chapter 9, AR 635-200.

"Performance is the key," concluded Roll. He stressed that commanders should use the system available to them to keep good soldiers in the service while eliminating non-performers.

## Brochures shipped for open season

The long-awaited open season for federal health insurance will be held May 3-28 and health plan brochures are expected here by the starting date.

The "1982 Enrollment Information and Plan Benefits Summaries" brochures have been shipped from the U.S. Army AG Publications Center in Baltimore, Md. "We should receive them in time for distribution to employees by May 3rd," said Phyllis Partridge of the civilian personnel office.

Department of Army policy for open season is to permit representatives of Federal Employees Health Benefits carriers to address employees upon request.

Representatives of Blue Cross/Blue Shield and AFGE health plans will conduct presentations Friday, April 23 in the Rocket Auditorium. Blue Cross/Blue Shield presentations will be held 8:30 and 10:30 a.m.; AFGE presentations will be at 1 and 3 p.m.

Postmasters and AETNA health plans will conduct presentations Wednesday, April 28 in the Rocket Auditorium. Postmasters presentations will be held at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. and AETNA at 1 and 3 p.m.

The presentations are expected to last about 45 minutes each.

"At this time, no other FEHB carriers have requested to address employees," Partridge said. "Of course if any others request to address employees, we will make arrangements for them to do so."

An open season was originally scheduled for Nov. 9 to Dec. 11, 1981 but was postponed by the Office of Personnel Management because of negotiation problems with the various plans. OPM has tentatively scheduled another open season for later this year; it would run from Nov. 22 through Dec. 10, 1982.

## Army hospital helps local health students

Doctors at Fox Army Community Hospital will be honored by students of the University of Alabama in Huntsville, May 1, at Redstone Arsenal's Officers Club.

Col. (Dr.) John N. Bogart, commander of Fox Army Community Hospital and Dr. William H. Bell, a neurologist at the hospital, will receive plaques of appreciation for their service to the UAH pre-

professional health community. The awards will be presented by Alpha Epsilon Delta (AED, the national premedical honor society) and the Medical Careers Association.

The doctors were instrumental in a joint effort between UAH and Fox Hospital to create a course that would give all pre-health students in the Huntsville area the opportunity to get practical hospital experience, according to Dr. Donald V. McCalister, Director of Medical Student Affairs at UAH School of Primary Medical Care.

"This program is one of only five offered by colleges and universities across the country, and it's the only one where a military hospital is participating," said Dr. Bobby G. Moore, Associate Dean of Admission of the UAH School of Primary Medical Care and national secretary for AED.

"The course is a structured practicum in a hospital setting. It's designed to further realism in the decision making of pre-professional health students and to make their applica-

tions to graduate schools more competitive," said McCalister.

In this pre-clinical program, students serve as hospital volunteers and assist in four clinical settings, said Bell. Students are not directly responsible for patient care and they do not administer any treatments or therapy. "They are always under the direct supervision of a qualified staff member," he said.

Bell is a volunteer UAH faculty member, who along with Moore and McCalister is responsible for grading the students. "Enrollment is limited to students who show academic ability and motivational interest, and each has to be approved by the faculty," McCalister said.

During this three-month course, students spend a minimum of two weeks, 16 laboratory hours, on rotation in the Medical-Laboratory, the Allergy and Immunology Clinic, Family Practice Clinic and EKG/Minor Surgery Clinic. Before successfully completing the course and receiving three college credits,

### Repromotables

Question: How many re promotable GS 855-13s and GS 801-13s are presently employed at Redstone?

Answer: Currently in the re promotion inventory there are 36 employees registered for general engineer 801-13 and 16 registered for electrical engineer GS 855-13.

### How long?

Question: (a) How long is an Outstanding Performance Rating valid for merit promotion purposes? (b) Of what importance is an OPR when applying for vacancies under merit promotion?

Answer: We phoned your questions to CPO on April 1, made a second inquiry on April 14 and got these answers on April 16:

(a) "There is no time limit for crediting an OPR as long as it is related to the job element being evaluated."

(b) "Awards are considered by a merit promotion panel along with experience, education, training and supervisory appraisals in determining which qualified candidates meet criteria for referral as best qualified. Since there is no pre-established criteria for crediting awards, the merit promotion panel decides what importance will be given to an OPR. Under the new general performance appraisal system, ratings of exceptional and highly qualified will be considered along with other job related awards in evaluating candidates."

### Tell it to the IRS

Question: (a) Is it correct that a federal retiree pays no income tax on that portion of his pension fund that he contributed?

(b) Assume he dies — is that portion he contributed also tax free to the surviving spouse?

(c) If she remarries does she continue drawing a pension?

Answer: We phoned your questions to CPO on April 9 and received these answers April 14:

(a) "This is a tax question that should be referred to IRS"

(b) "This is a tax question that should be referred to IRS"

(c) "The spouse will receive annuity unless he/she remarries before the age of 60".

People anticipated that response to questions (a) and (b) and called IRS and got your answers to you in time for you to get your tax done. The answer to both questions, as we told you April 9, is yes.

Be advised that if you are a DOD civilian and intend to drop in at the Main Post Library to celebrate National Library Week (April 18-24), you may have a hard time finding the welcome mat. This is not to say that you can't go in, read a magazine or newspaper, or use a reference book or that the staff will not be courteous or helpful. The problem comes when you go to check out a book. Even if it is job related, you will be informed that DOD civilians are not eligible for checkout privileges. According to the Morale Support Activity Office, the Main Post Library is operating under resource constraints (type not specified) and their checkout privileges are extended only to active duty personnel, retirees, and their dependents. At least that was what I was told when I requested, in writing, checkout privileges.

Every other post that I know of, or have worked at, allows civilians checkout privileges. In fact, AR 28-1 authorizes it. I have been to a number of posts and have found Main Post Libraries are pretty much the same as far as books, space, staff, etc., are concerned. I wonder what the problem is here at Redstone. Can it be that there is truly a demand for services of such a magnitude that patron restrictions are required? I have never seen any evidence of this in my frequent visits to the MMCS Technical Library located just across the hall from the Main Post Library. Can it be that DOD civilians are the victims of a "Let's do as little as possible" policy rather than a "Let's be a full service facility providing valuable service to the entire Redstone community"? There sure seems to be a lack of "Can Do" spirit in an organization whose sole function is to provide service. I feel that I, a DOD civilian, am being denied a privilege that should be extended to me without any real justification for that denial.

Please forgive me if I miss the celebration of National Library Week at the Main Post Library. I was out looking for the welcome mat.

# Alcohol, drugs a factor in crime

Persons under the influence of drugs or alcohol are more likely to be involved in a criminal case.

It could be a drug possession charge, a drunk driving charge or other more serious criminal cases.

Of the 200-some prisoners in the Madison County Jail, "I bet you 90 percent of them are up there because of drug-related in someway," says Sheriff Joe Patterson. "I'm classifying alcohol as drugs."

Ninety percent or more of the people in the county jail are there from either breaking the law under the influence of drugs or from committing a crime to buy drugs, Patterson says. "They're either under the influence of it or doing a crime to get some money to buy the drugs."

"Statewide, I wouldn't be scared to guess that 60 to 75 percent of the people in the penitentiary are there because it related to drugs."

Here at Redstone Arsenal, it is not as easy to tie drug or alcohol use to other crimes. "Every once in a while we'll have a disorderly and the guy will have been drinking," says Sgt. Maj. James Weaber of Military Police Operations.

Ed Polite, the Missile Command's command sergeant major, recalls about eight cases over the last six months in which alcohol usage resulted in a domestic, family disturbance. "The individual was under the influence of alcohol at the time," Polite says.

As far as drugs are concerned it doesn't appear to be the cause of other crimes at Redstone.

Drug usage is a problem, officials say, but it appears to be on a smaller scale without any profit-making connection.

"Here at Redstone, what you've got is drug abuse by convenience," says Randy Campbell, special agent in charge of Redstone's Criminal Investigation Division. "These guys get paid, go off post, buy a little marijuana and come back and smoke it."

Most of the people determined to be drug traffickers are not selling it for a profit but are giving it to their friends, Campbell says. "That's not done for profit, it's done doing the guy a favor."

The use problem here is with non-narcotic controlled substances, according to the CID agent. This means marijuana, speed, amphetamines or barbiturates as opposed to heroin, cocaine or opiates.



He describes the drug problem here as only "nominal."

Capt. Joe Lampley, prosecutor with the Staff Judge Advocate Office, doubts that drug-use is related to other types of crime at Redstone.

"You don't have the old cliché: I did the crime because I needed drugs," Lampley says. "That's no cliché here."

The typical drug offender here is "not the hardcore drug criminal," according to the prosecutor. "He's the lightweight user or the lightweight pusher."

Law enforcement authorities and the command work hard to eliminate drug use, Lampley says. "That's the reason we're not bombarded with drug-related crime."

Alcohol can lead to serious crime, too, according to officials.

The biggest problem is with personnel who go to the clubs, drink alcohol then drive back to work, says CSM Polite. "In my mind, I'm not sure they are in 100 percent control of their faculties."

A superior "reeking of alcohol" in front of a formation is just as bad as a soldier in formation who uses drugs, Polite says.

"While they are working or on duty or driving, they should be free of both of those items," adds the command sergeant major.

Lampley, the prosecutor, requests jail sentences for persons in court for driving under the influence of an intoxicant. A judge sentenced a DUI offender to 30 days at the monthly magistrates court here April 13.

"The emphasis is going to be on some period of incarceration rather than a fine," Lampley says. "DUI is a very serious crime."

# Improved Hawk getting better

The Army's Improved Hawk continues to improve.

The Army Missile Command has awarded approximately \$51.8 million to Raytheon Company at Andover, Mass., for major improvements to ground support equipment that will extend the useful life of the low-to-medium altitude air defense system well into the future.

Modifications to be made under the cost plus incentive fee contract will make the radar more reliable and easier to maintain, improve operator training and increase Hawk firepower.

The Army's decision to retain Improve Hawk indefinitely will bolster the air defense coverage for U.S. air bases and logistical complexes in Europe and will provide air defense support for the Rapid Deployment Force.

Hawk is the Army's primary all-weather, day and night, low-to-medium altitude plane killer that was deployed in 1960. In 1972, the radar-directed missile system was modernized to its Improved Hawk configuration, with additional improvements added in 1978.

Improved Hawk today is deployed worldwide with the U.S. Army and Marines, within NATO, and has been purchased by several other countries.

Col. John S. Drosdeck is the Army's Hawk project manager at Redstone Arsenal and John Robins is his civilian deputy.

Letterkenny Army Depot at Chambersburg, Pa., provides the depot level support.

# BMD system named 'Sentry'

The Army has selected the name of Sentry for the ballistic missile defense system being considered to protect U.S. intercontinental ballistic missiles.

Sentry is a new system based on BMD technology that was previously being developed under the Low Altitude Defense or LoAD program.

Sentry development is managed by the Army's BMD systems command.

# Missile and munitions evaluation report finished

The Missile and Munitions Evaluation (MAME) — 81 final report has been completed and will be distributed in early May, according to officials of the Directorate of Evaluation and Standardization.

The report is a 55-page summation resulting from the efforts of a 12 person task force — 10 from the Missile and Munitions Center and School, one from the Missile Command, and one from the Armament Material Readiness Command. They visited nearly every active-duty missile and munitions combat service support unit in the world.

"Our teams visited personnel at the company, detachment, battery, and platoon levels. Plus, our command assistance team made contact at the battalion levels and higher," explained Jack Matthews, deputy director of the project. "We conferred with them for three purposes. First, we brought along a large repository of materials with new information and we inquired about other types of materials that might be needed. Secondly, we

gathered feedback data on how MMCS training and similar activities are working. This is to analyze the adequacy of our course contents. The third reason relates most directly to the final report. It was to specifically identify the problem areas each unit might have that affects its readiness in the field."

"The report consists of documentation of problems and recommendations for improvements," Matthews continued. "The report is arranged according to subject areas, and not by listing units that were visited."

According to the report's introduction, "The principal areas of interest during MAME (were) personnel, training, doctrine, organization, material, supply, maintenance, and publications."

The MAME final report — the fifth active-duty evaluation in 11 years — is written on a different basis than in the past. Previously, a final report would be an encyclopedic study totaling several hundred pages.

The current one "contains only those issues which

were definable and can be accomplished in the near term," said Lt. Col. Lawrence Residori, the project director, in a letter to readers and users of the report. "Many issues, originally destined (to be included) have already been implemented or are undergoing in-depth study for integration into future logistical and training concepts," he continued.

There are 22 subject areas addressed in the report, with findings and recommendations for each area. Examples are "Printed circuit board (PCB) repairs in the field," "Improvement of TOE 9-59," and "Requirement for transitional doctrine." Eight detailed appendices are also included.

# Fewer trucks needed to support Patriot

Thanks to MICOM's "Skunk Works" there'll be fewer service trucks needed to take care of the Patriot air defense missile in the field.

They designed and built a dual-purpose van that will let three trucks support a Patriot firing unit where four had been needed.

"We took an M373A six ton semi-trailer and gutted it down to the bare frame and started from there," said Lawrence M. Howard, project officer in the Skunk Works, known officially as the prototype engineering section of Army Missile Laboratory.

They lined the walls and ceilings with aluminum and installed adjustable rails and straps to hold cabinets and equipment. "Most component configurations are assembled together in the vehicle with as little as 16 screws, making changes and adjustments simple to meet new requirements," said Howard.

"We were also able to reduce the number of vehicles needed in the field by fabricating a dual-purpose van, combining maintenance and repair parts storage features into a single vehicle, the Maintenance Center."

They also built a separate supply truck called an SRPT, small repair parts transporter.

Supporting a patriot unit in the field will be a Maintenance Center at the battery level and one at battalion level. The third vehicle is an SRPT mobile parts warehouse at the battery level. Originally four vehicles were needed.

"We'll be manufacturing the first 18 vehicles to allow Letterkenny Army Depot time to get production started," Howard said. Skunk Works will deliver the first of the new vehicles this month.

Skunk Works is a small, select group that applies MICOM's engineering and technical skill to tough equipment problems that have to be worked out quickly, and in this case, on a tight budget.

"Skunk Works proved to be of considerable advantage as time and money were extremely critical," said Patriot lead engineer Homer O. Griffith. Scheduled for deployment in 1983, Patriot is the Army's air defense against medium and high altitude targets. It is designed to attack and destroy several enemy aircraft while at the same time tracking many more.

"The maintenance and supply support requirements were finalized in the latter stages of the development program," said Griffith, "and the Patriot Project Office had to determine the most practical approach to designing, developing and producing the associate support vehicles within critical time and cost constraints.

"During an informal briefing the Patriot battalion commander, Lt. Col. James G. Manning, said the Maintenance Center and SRPT are the finest pieces of equipment that he's seen in the logistics arena," Griffith said.

# Sport parachuting is high-flying experience

"OK, GO!" . . . "Arch 1000, 2000, 3000, 4000, 5000. Check canopy." You've just jumped out of an airplane for the first time.

As the plane took off your heart began racing. It was even hard for you to swallow to clear your ears. Crammed into a tiny Cessna with two other student jumpers, jump master and pilot, you have second thoughts about your sanity.

Squashed against the door, your hands get clammy as fear swells within you. The altitude is reached. The jump master opens the door. The brisk air forces its way in as you're awed by the earth's

patchwork-quilt below. It's time to climb out onto the strut.

You're hardly breathing. On due, you let go . . .

"The apprehension leaves when you let go of the strut," said Tim Jordan, instructor and co-owner of Freebird Aviation School of Sport Parachuting. "It's like no other feeling you ever had before. For the first time in your life you feel alone, totally separated feeling close to the clouds."

"Freefall is an art, a sport of self control. It's not for daredevils and it's not dangerous. It's all in how you handle it."

Freebird Aviation offers a first jump parachute course approved by the United States Parachute Association (USPA). This includes one to two weeks of instruction and your first jump. Also included is advanced freefall instruction. "Most clubs only offer about six hours of instruction," said Jordan.

"Before investing in a jump school, know who's teaching it. Check out their program and make sure all their instructors are USPA rated," advised Jordan, who's been sport parachuting for 10 years and teaching for five.

You should visit the drop zone and get yourself familiar with what's going on even before going to class, he said.

Specialized for student type training, Freebird Aviation is dedicated to the novice skydiver. "There's a lot to learn in the sport without having to worry about 'sky gods' pushing you aside for more advanced lifts or dealing with their overinflated egos. And this happens all over the states." Sky gods are more advanced jumpers.

A parachute club for advanced skydivers has a different attitude from one aimed at beginners, Jordan said. "Attitude is very important when training students. A student needs confidence, otherwise it will hurt his performance.

"Skydiving is really a safe sport, contrary to popular opinion," said Jordan, "and it's not just limited to males." Sixty percent of Freebird Aviation's students are females.

"You need to be in fairly good physical shape and have a good mental attitude." Most injuries occur because of poor physical conditioning and lack of knowledge, he said. Sport parachuting is not a physical sport, but it is a contact sport because you come in touch with the ground when you land.

Students jump with a reserve parachute that will automatically deploy at 1000 feet should their main chute malfunction. Another student safety measure, the Stevens Cutaway System, will jettison the main chute and automatically open the reserve. "The student is well trained on how to properly use this system before he makes his first jump," Jordan said.

Freebird Aviation offers all the needed equipment. The first jump course cost \$80 and includes the first static-line jump. The next step is four more consecutive static-line jumps which will cost \$16 each. After that all freefall jumps are \$12. The cost is less for people who own their equipment.

Class A licensed qualified jumpers who have their own equipment can jump for as little as \$6 or \$7, depending on the altitude.

"People interested should come out and see. Give the sport a fair shake," suggested Jordan. Almost any clear day students and freefall skydivers are out at the Madison County Sky Park. "Come, make yourself at home," said Jordan. Freebird Aviation is located at 2714 Governors Drive, in Huntsville. You can get more information on sport parachuting by calling 534-0505.

Jordan also teaches a sport parachute course at the University of Alabama in Huntsville, where students earn one semester hour credit. He has a private pilot license, holds a current USPA instructor rating and is an FAA certified senior parachute rigger.

"Skydiving is a lot of fun and gives you the most exhilarating feeling," said a student of five jumps. "I've made some of the best friends here and I'm hooked."

Now don't get too carried away in the drift, floating so leisurely on that bed of air. You're coming in for the landing. Watch the drop zone, feet together and steer into the wind. Get ready for a good landing.






# Illegal parking, speeding targeted

Illegal parking and housing area speeding are receiving more attention from military police in response to citizen concern.

# Veterans make good in hiring program

Don White and Wayne Campbell are Vietnam veterans who got their "foot in the door" through a government hiring program and made good.

Both were hired under the Veterans Readjustment Appointment (VRA) Program on temporary appointments in the Army Missile Laboratory. White later assumed a permanent slot while Campbell moved on to a supervisory position in Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

VRA, started in the 1970s and extended by Congress until September 1983, is used at the discretion of federal agencies to hire Vietnam era vets to jobs up to GS-7 or that grade's equivalent.

"We bring people in (under the program) really with no idea of their background to low-paying, almost trivial jobs. Both of these individuals came to us unknown and in my opinion turned out to be super workers," said Buford Jennings, deputy director of Directed Energy Directorate in Army Missile Lab.

"The VRA program is a workable program," he said. "Its purpose is to let people get their foot in the door and make good."

White, a veteran with 10 years military service, was hired as a GS-3 mail clerk on a temporary, one-year appointment in December 1978. He started with the High Energy Laser project office which was absorbed by a missile lab directorate in 1980.

In November 1979, White became a permanent clerk. He is a GS-5 program clerk with the lab's directed energy directorate, programming and budget section.

"I enjoy my work," White said. "When I first came on board, Mr. (Buford) Jennings was the deputy director. And when I was interviewed he asked me what my goals were.


"I told him I wanted to work in the area of budget. As I progressed, they worked with me and let me work in the area I wanted to work," White added.

He went to school at night by using his Veterans Administration benefits and received a B.S. degree in business administration from Athens State College in March. He applied for the intern program under the Materiel Development and Readiness Command in February. Recently, White was told he was accepted as a DARCOM intern.

His two-year training program as an intern here will start in July. "My goal once I complete this program is to go to a projects office and become an (GS) 11 and later progress to a 13. That's my long-range goal in the budget analyst area," said White, 34.

Campbell, a disabled veteran with 11 years service, was hired as an GS-2 mail clerk on a temporary appointment in 1980. He went from the directed energy directorate to work in food service at Fox Army Community Hospital in 1981.

About July 1981, Campbell took a job as a WG-11 electronics mechanic in the radio avionics section

under RASA's equipment management division. He holds a supervisory position as electronics mechanic foreman, WS-10, in that section.

"It's my kind of work," Campbell said of electronics. "I've done it most of my life."

The 37-year-old Limestone County resident is content with his position. "I imagine I like it just like it is now. It's work I like. I enjoy doing it," Campbell said.

Jennings, deputy director of the lab's directed energy directorate, is proud of how his organization has used the VRA program.

"The VRA program was designed to help people like this, get into the system," Jennings said. "It has helped them and they're on their way in my opinion."

students must also pass a basic cardio-pulmonary resuscitation course.

"This course helped me to reaffirm what I was interested in. It gave me a realistic idea of imposed demands on patients as well as doctors," said Charles R. Day, who will be attending the University of Alabama in Birmingham School of Medicine.

Formerly in military service, Day is accepting a military scholarship for his medical education and feels that this course influenced his decision.

"The everyday cases show a lot of what a doctor really does, not just in theory but in applied practice," said Jerry Nein, a junior majoring in chemistry.

Krista M. Day a biology senior said, "It made me realize that medicine is not just a glorified profession. There are routine times with a lot of snotty noses and sore throats to take care of. It's not all blood and gore either. You learn to get along with people and to deal with them on a patient-professional relationship."

"The doctors, nurses and hospital personnel at Fox Hospital are really helpful. They're willing to answer any questions and they explain everything so that you can get a real idea of what's going on," said Marsha Drake, a senior majoring in mathematics heading for medical school.

MED 401 is offered by UAH in the spring and fall sessions to pre-professional students in the health fields, including hospital administration, medical technician, clinical nutrition, optometry, dentistry, nursing, medicine and others.

Students are required to attend one lecture hour a week plus eight clinical laboratory hours. Schedules for clinical hours can be worked out on an individual basis and must have faculty approval.

Since its beginning, 35 students have successfully completed this course. It's helped most students be sure of their direction and others to change their area of concentration, according to Bell. "It's even been responsible for at least one student realizing medicine was the wrong profession altogether," the neurologist said.


