## New deputy for readiness named

Maj. Gen. Robert L. Moore, commander of the Missile Command, has named Brig. Gen. William E. Potts as deputy commanding general for research and development.

Moore said Col. Charles M. Murray will replace Potts, who has served at Redstone since March 1981, as deputy commander for readiness. Murray was recently selected for promotion to brigadier general. He has just returned to the United States from service in Germany where he was a senior logistician at Headquarters, U.S. Army Europe and Seventh Army.

Murray entered the Army as an enlisted man, graduated from Officers Candidate School and was commissioned in 1958. He has a bachelor's degree in education from the University of Nebraska, Omaha, and a master's degree in communications science from Shippensburg State College. He is a graduate of the Army Command and General Staff course and the War College.

Murray and his wife have a son and a daughter. He is scheduled to assume his new duties here July 15.


## Command change

Col. Joseph R. Cote will take over as Commandant of the Army's Missile and Munitions Center and School in ceremonies at 9 a.m. tomorrow. He succeeds Col. Harry L. Foradori who is retiring.

The public is invited to the change of command ceremony, which will be held on the parade field just off Patton Road. Markers showing directions to the field will be in place at the Patton Road (Gate 10) entrance to the Arsenal. Music for the event will be provided by the U.S. Marines Corps Logistics Base Drum and Bugle Corps from Albany, Ga.

Cote has been the Missile School's school brigade commander since May 1981. A New Hampshire native, he is a 1960 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, and holds a master's degree in physics from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School. He is also a graduate of the U.S. Army War College.

Prior to his assignment at Redstone, Cote served in the office of the assistant chief of staff for logistics, U.S. Army, Washington, D.C. He has also served as assistant Army attache in London.



## Four get merit pay cash awards

Four Missile Command workers — two at the civilian personnel office and two at International Logistics Directorate — received merit pay cash awards last week.

David R. Fisher and Norman F. Foster, both of civilian personnel, received \$2,000 each; Henry J. Davis and Carl M. McCranie of International Logistics received \$2,005 each. An awards ceremony was held July 7 at MICOM headquarters.

Fisher was commended for "having made a

significant contribution throughout the period 11 January 1981 through 30 April 1982, by reduction of the average time to fill positions." Foster was commended for "significant contributions to the successful implementation of the Civil Service Reform Act since its inception to date."

Davis and McCranie were commended for "exemplary performance during the period 1 August 1980 through 31 March 1982."

## BMD manager moving to D.C.

The BMD program manager's duty station is moving from Huntsville to Washington, D.C., according to Maj. Gen. Grayson D. Tate Jr., the program manager.

Tate informed BMD personnel in a letter Friday that relocation will take place "in the next few months when it seems most sensible.

"This move has been under consideration for some time to enable the BMD program manager to respond more effectively to increased management demands in the Washington area," Tate said. He added that the increased demands were created by the

growth of interest in BMD as a part of the strategic modernization program announced by President Reagan last October.

Also involved in the move will be the duty station of the deputy program manager but the scheduled retirement of the present deputy, W. A. Davis Jr., will take place before the relocation becomes effective.

Since 1976 when the program manager's duty station originally transferred to Huntsville from Washington, he has also served as commander of

## Letter details Vietnam escape



Cass goes over letter from friend

A recent letter from a South Vietnamese army officer who finally escaped from Vietnam reminded Col. Stanley Cass that many people are still suffering in that country.

"It's a long time since Vietnam and people don't tend to think about Vietnam anymore," said Cass, project manager for Hellfire and Ground Laser Designators at Redstone. "I think a letter like that will kind of remind people that all is not smooth over there."

Lu Van Thanh served as his Vietnamese liaison officer and interpreter when Cass was commander of the 11th Combat Aviation Group at Danang, South Vietnam, from June 1972 to April 1973.

Thanh was about 30 years old and a lieutenant in the South Vietnamese army when Cass left. "He was at the airport when I left," Cass recalled.

In 1975, the North Vietnamese were victorious and Thanh was captured soon after the communist takeover. He was put in a prison camp.

"We don't realize that a lot of those people who we befriended and fought with and for are still suffering. A lot of them are still in concentration camps," Cass said. "I hadn't thought about it until I received this letter."

## Do you have to be perfect to be promoted?

Many E-4s and E-5s waiting for promotion feel stuck on long standing lists, and some complain about "impossibly high cut-off scores." Until the "floating" of cut-off scores this winter E-5s with 886 points and E-4s with 801 points were assured of promotion. Now that has changed.

Scores have soared since January. In some specialties the cut-off has been as high as 999. There are only 1000 points possible so some soldiers are literally having to be perfect to be promoted.

What does it take to obtain a perfect score? Take an E-5 who wants to make E-6 with a cut-off of 999 for example. To make that score he must have been in the Army for nine and one-half years and must have been an E-5 for three and one-half, he must also have maximum scores on his enlisted evaluation report and skill qualification test, have an Army Commendation Medal and three awards of the Good Conduct Medal, score 250 out of 250 on the promotion board and have a maximum education score. (A soldier with a college degree and about 45 hours of Army Correspondence Courses would max education, for example.)

Few soldiers have met all of those requirements but many soldiers are getting maximum scores in some areas. A review of recent promotion standing

lists reveal many soldiers on the list have scores of 850 or greater. Competition for available promotions is intense between these near-perfect soldiers.

High scores may not be enough to get promoted these days.

Promotions are made according to the needs of the Army, and career soldiers know that Uncle Sam isn't going to promote anyone to a higher grade in fields where there are already surpluses at those grades.

It seems that the only way for some soldiers to get promoted is for someone else to retire or die. For those who aren't willing to wait for someone to retire and don't plan on killing enough senior people so that they can make E-6 there are other options.

Some soldiers retrain in MOSs where there are needs for more NCOs. Many Army schools are now turning soldiers qualified in an overstrength field into NCOs in fields that need personnel.

For those with higher aspirations warrant officer and officer commissioning programs are also open for well qualified soldiers.

The most popular option by far is to wait. Waiting for promotion may take longer than changing speciality, but for soldiers who are happy in their

jobs and want to continue to serve in current specialties it just might be the best thing to do.

Soldiers have been waiting for promotion since before the chairman of the joint chiefs of staff was a private.

The more senior sergeants I talk to the more I realize just how lucky a soldier is to get promoted soon after he makes the list.

Some old timers tell me they waited as long as five years to make E-6. Even the practice of recommending soldiers as soon as they're eligible for E-5 and E-6 is relatively new. I know some outstanding NCOs who weren't recommended for E-5 until they had four years service behind them.

E-4 and E-5 promotables shouldn't lose faith though. Thousands of soldiers have waited for promotion before, and thousands will still be waiting when everyone currently on the list has been promoted. According to figures in the Army Times there are more than 47,500 soldiers currently waiting for promotion to E-5 and E-6, the word on grapevine is that a large number of these soldiers will be promoted when the current slow-down of promotions is lifted at the end of fiscal 1982.

# Volunteer counselors needed for EEO

Workers at the Missile Command interested in serving as volunteer EEO counselors are asked to submit their names to the EEO office here by July 30.

"We're looking for mature, responsible people," said Bonnie Kilgore, senior EEO specialist in MICOM's equal employment opportunity office. Anyone at grade GS-5 or equivalent and above is eligible.

"The EEO counselor will serve as a bridge between management and employees in trying to resolve complaints at the local level," Kilgore said. "We've found that good EEO counselors have saved the command and serviced activities a lot of money and manpower by resolving the complaints locally rather than having them go off for investigations and hearings."

Volunteers are to be interviewed before the EEO office makes its recommendations to the command

ing general for counselor appointments. There are 23 counselors at present.

A counselor is appointed by the commander to serve "as a mediator between the complainant and management whenever a problem develops," said Stella Moore, an EEO specialist. "It's an individual selected to resolve problems."

Generally, counselors are contacted once a problem arises. Their actions could range from sitting in on a meeting with the supervisor, assisting in writing disposition forms regarding some action, or mediating a meeting between the worker and management.

A counselor should have time for cases and the ability to resolve the cases. "We want counselors that can work with supervisors because that's really the key to resolving complaints," Moore said.

"Counselors are not representatives. Many times, people expect counselors to be on their side, to represent them," she said. "The counselor's job


is to write a report that is unbiased. They are just there to present the facts as it unfolds."

Counselors are appointed for a year but may continue beyond that. They represent EEO Officer Charles Ray Jr. "because he can't go to all these people. That's why they're there — to represent him in trying to get these problems resolved," said Moore.

"They're necessary because this agency provides a channel by which employees who feel they have been treated differently because of their race, age, religion, color, sex, national origin, or mental or physical handicap can have that addressed through the EEO complaint system," she said.

The volunteers need to be "innovative, sophisticated and mature persons" who believe the system works, according to the EEO specialist.

## Here's how to get ROTC scholarships

Soldiers interested in becoming officers only need to go to the post Education Center for information on the Army ROTC scholarship program.

Qualified candidates are selected for two or three year Army ROTC scholarships to earn a bachelor's degree. Soldiers selected for the program are discharged from active duty, enlisted in the Army Reserves and upon completing a degree become commissioned as second lieutenants, according to Mary McGough, education services officer at Redstone.

"Interested applicants must be less than 25 years of age as of the 30 June of the calendar year in which they would be commissioned," she said. "A four year extension may be granted for active duty service. A GT score of 115 or higher and at least completion on one year of college are just some of the requirements."

The program pays all tuition, lab fees, uniforms, Army textbooks plus \$100 monthly subsistence fee for 10 months of each year the scholarship is in effect. Attendance is required at a six-week advanced camp between the junior and senior year.

Individuals who entered the service before Jan. 1, 1977 are for the "Vietnam Era GI Bill," according to McGough. VEAP (Veterans Educational Assistance Program) entitlements are also available for those contributing persons entering the service after June 1, 1977. Information about supplemental financial aid is available at the education center, building 3222.

## Marines pull out of MP training

FORT McCLELLAN — Marine Corps students are ending their long association with the U.S. Army military police school here and soon will be taking their basic MP training elsewhere.

The Marines won't be taking the basic law-enforcement and basic corrections courses here because of a growing difference in training needs between the two services.

"We haven't developed the (combat support) doctrine the Army has," a Marine spokesman said. "Our emphasis continues to be in the areas of discipline, law and order."

The Oct. 1 move to Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, will involve about 1,000 Marines yearly. They'll continue to take other courses at Fort McClellan.



**Pvt. 2 Gabriel Pacheco, HHC MICOM** — “I make use of the daylight in my room instead of the lights and play my radio at a minimum.”







# Impact expected from changes in SQT

Changes in Skill Qualification Testing will have a big impact on soldiers taking the test and on personnel who make up the test such as those working for the Missile and Munitions Center and School's Training Analysis and Design Division.

"The bottom line is that this will significantly reduce the administrative requirements of the SQT for both the SQT development personnel and the personnel who administer the test," explained Maj. Robert Dye, chief of the division.

Reducing the administrative workload is what the changes are all about. In a June letter Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. E. C. Meyer said, "Our insistence upon standardized, hands-on testing of skills across the entire Army has imposed a massive administrative burden. To alleviate the burden I have decided to decentralize the hands-on component of

the SQT to its proper role as a normal function of command; a diagnostic tool to be used in conjunction with unit training programs. . . ."

According to Dye, SQT refinements will divide evaluation into two parts. First, commanders will conduct year-round informal hands-on evaluation on tasks of their choice using tasks checklists to be included in the Soldier's Manual. Second, soldiers will take an Armywide written proficiency test on their MOS as well as a separate test on common tasks.

The MOS specific written test is the one that counts the most for soldiers. According to a TRADOC fact sheet, "The MOS proficiency, as measured by the SQT, will have greater influence on the soldier's promotion and retention. MOS-specific evaluation results will be firmly linked to promotions to E-5 through E-8 and have a strong impact upon other personnel management decisions."

The common task test will be for training only. It will be a hands-on test with a written test provided as a substitute for the hands-on evaluation where equipment is not available. It will test all soldiers on fundamental tasks that are essential to survival and success in combat. The results will be reported to Department of the Army for Army leaders to make appropriate adjustments in training priorities and programs.

Adjustments are already being made by SQT personnel at MMCS. The change to the single component SQT will be immediate for the 17 missile and munitions MOSs for which MMCS writes 53 SQTs.

"There will be an immediate reduction in the administrative workload. However, there won't be a complete reduction of administrative requirements until soldiers manuals are all designed to include hands-on scoring checklists," Dye said. "We think that this process will take 18-24 months. Until then we are preparing soldiers manual supplements which are packets of hands-on evaluation checklists for field commanders."

The soldier's manual with task checklists may be used in much the same manner as Army Testing and Evaluation Programs are used today, states the TRADOC fact sheet. Hands-on evaluation will be informal unless a formal external evaluation is directed by the chain of command as part of an exercise.

While test scores will have little effect on soldiers in grades E-4 and below, Meyer explained the reason for testing all grades. "I want soldiers who have worked hard, and who have demonstrated their abilities, to have some means readily at hand in the record jackets to indicate their qualifications to a gaining command."

The Army Training Support Center and Army Schools will begin incorporating the changes in tests developed for use in fiscal year 1983. According to an Army News Service release, it is not expected that changes will be fully implemented in all SQTs until 1984.

"1983 is the transition year for SQT," concluded Dye.

## ACS centers serve 'vital need'

# Army participates in 'Space Camp' for youngsters

Youngsters interested in science tour some Army laboratory areas at Redstone on Thursdays as part of their weeklong "Space Camp."

Two directorates under the Army Missile Laboratory are participating in the nation's first such camp, started this summer by the Alabama Space and Rocket Center.

"Boys and girls age 12 to 14 spend a week learning about the development of Army and NASA rockets with emphasis on those developed at the Redstone Arsenal and Marshall Space Flight Center," said

Lee Sentell, promotions director at Space and Rocket Center.

Space Camp, held each Sunday through Friday, includes participation in a simulated Space Shuttle mission at the Space and Rocket Center's museum. "We have converted our old snack bar area into mission control for Space Camp," Sentell said.

The weekly camps began June 13 and will continue to Aug. 13 at the center. Each youngster is responsible for his or her own \$175 registration fee which includes food, room and all materials.

"Right now we have youngsters scheduled from a total of 45 states. Last week, we had youngsters from 25 just for that one week alone," Sentell said July 7. "We have some from three provinces in Canada scheduled this summer."

The purpose is to "stimulate interest in careers in aerospace and high technology," according to the promotions director. "This is the nation's first Space Camp and this is the first summer of it.

"We will have an expanded program next summer to give the boys and girls that came this year an advanced course and also have another program for beginners."

The youngsters are all bright individuals who "have to indicate that they have an interest in science and space and must get a teacher to recommend them," Sentell said.

On Thursday mornings, the youngsters pile out of a bus at the Army Missile Laboratory for a tour of areas in the Systems Simulation and Development Directorate.


"We're showing three of our areas and just sort of giving them a briefing of what's going on," said Don Spring, an engineer in that directorate. They tour the terrain model, helicopter simulator station and the color graphics area. At color graphics, they see a "demonstration of simulation of an actual flight as opposed to test data from an actual flight."

"We have two groups every Thursday morning, here approximately 45 minutes per group," Spring said. "We get about 55 (youngsters) per group."

They take a tour at Research Directorate in building 7770 from 2-3 p.m. that day. Dr. Charles Christensen, staff research physicist, coordinates Research Directorate's involvement.

"He gave the initial lecture and he has a group of two or three young fellows helping him," said Dr. Jeff Bennett, acting deputy director for Research Directorate. The tour includes a lecture with slide show on lasers and a demonstration of laser light.

Said Bennett: "We're using some Phd candidates to do that (conduct the lectures) so far and they're developing a lot of rapport with the young people and it's going quite well."



the BMD Systems Command. According to Tate, the commander's position continues to be authorized a general officer but will be filled by a colonel who has not yet been named.

Tate also said in his letter to BMD personnel that 118 additional positions have been requested for the

BMD program overall in fiscal 1983, but the request has not been approved yet and is subject to alteration in congressional action on the administration's budget request. If approved, somewhat more than half of the positions would be located in Huntsville.

**Savings allotments limited to two**

WASHINGTON — Army finance officials have issued a few reminders concerning savings allotments because many of the allotment authorization forms (DA Form 1341) are held up because they're filled out improperly. For the soldier, this can mean a delay of a few weeks in getting a pay action through the system.

Here are some of the reminders:

- You can have only two savings allotments at one time. If you have two allotments already, do not start a third.
- To change the amount of an allotment, you

must mark the "change" box in block 4 and also list the amount of your current allotment in block 10.

• You cannot have two savings allotments going to the same financial institution. Also, you can send allotments only to such institutions as banks, savings-and-loan associations and credit unions. You cannot send allotments to finance companies, mutual funds, auto-credit companies and similiar institutions.

• Finally, don't attempt to change your end-of-month/mid-month pay option with an allotment form. To change pay options you must use a DA Form 3685. (ARNEWS)

## Rent-plus housing in 57 countries

WASHINGTON — The "rent plus" housing allowance plan went into effect July 1 for soldiers assigned to Greece, Italy and Hong Kong, bringing to 57 the number of countries in which Army personnel are on the rent-plus system.

According to an official from the Department of Defense per diem committee, soldiers already assigned to these three areas will have the option of drawing rent-plus or of keeping their station housing allowance (SHA). Over the next four years,

rent-plus will gradually replace SHA for all soldiers in these areas, newcomers after July 1 will automatically draw rent-plus.

Under the rent-plus plan, the current rate is re-evaluated at regular intervals and, if necessary, adjusted to meet rising housing costs. If, however, your rent takes a sudden leap before the regular re-evaluation period, you may make a request for more money up to the amount authorized for your grade. (ARNEWS)

## Physical training regulation now in field

WASHINGTON — The Army's new training regulation on physical fitness now is in the field.

Titled "The Army Physical Training Program,"

AR 350-15 will be the guidebook for directing the Army's approach to fitness as a system beginning this September.

## Discount bus fare now in effect

WASHINGTON — Sixty-four U.S. bus companies now offer discount bus fares to American active duty military personnel and their family members.

To take advantage of the discounts, you must be on leave and be traveling from one state to another within the Continental United States. The offer is not good on trips within a single state. You need not be in uniform while traveling, but you and the members of your family must show ID cards. Children under age 5 ride for free.

The discounts — which range from 25 to 40 percent, depending on the length of the trip — were announced by the National Bus Traffic Association and the Military Traffic Management Command. The programs will run on a trial basis until November 1982. (ARNEWS)







# First group finishes MARED program

MARED, the program to train people in the workforce for top management positions, recently recognized its first group of "graduates".

Thirteen people who entered the program during 1976-78 and completed it this year were awarded certificates of recognition signed by the DARCOM commander.

They were presented in a local ceremony by Brig. Gen. William Potts.

Certificates were also presented to nine people newly selected for the Materiel Acquisition and Readiness Executive Development program.

"It's been a highly successful program in preparing future executives and high level managers for the Army," said Dr. Ted Dixie, an employee development specialist at Civilian Personnel.

Those in the executive development program train with courses and developmental assignments for an unspecified time. "A command decision is made on when training is sufficient to graduate," Dixie said.

MARED is for people in grades GS 13-15 in supply

management, procurement, quality and reliability assurance, materiel maintenance management, engineering and scientific (non-construction) and transportation management.

"MARED is DARCOM's way of identifying employees in those six fields with potential of becoming managers at the highest levels in the organization through a series of training activities and developmental assignments," Dixie explained.

"Participants are provided the opportunity to gain necessary skill and knowledge in management to assume and carry out the responsibility of positions at higher levels," he said.

Training is done according to individual development plans that may specify courses, seminars, developmental assignments and self development activities. "We encourage participants to engage in development at higher headquarters, to get a total overview of the whole spectrum of acquisition," Dixie said.

People apply for MARED during an "open season". "A local screening panel selects an initial group and forwards the initial group to DARCOM for competitive selection," Dixie said.

In last year's open season held during August and September there were 34 applications. The screening panel narrowed the field to nine applicants and DARCOM approved all of them.

The nine selected for MARED are: Donna Brock, Army Missile Lab; Thomas McVey, Product Assurance; Joe Mitchell, Viper; John Smith, Stinger; and from Procurement and Production, Bobby Hemby, Myra King, Dianne Landtroop, Ramous Morgan, Jay Snyder.

Those who have completed MARED training include James Brannon, P&P; Francesca Conners, TOW; David Dalton, International Logistics; Douglas Driskill, Missile Systems Readiness; James Hinkle, Hawk; Truman Howard, Comptroller; Jack Isom, Missile Logistics Center; Millard Jernigan, Missile Systems Readiness; Clair Kepler Jr., Missile Logistics Center; Marcelo Lara, Hawk; LeRoy Schnurbusch, Missile Logistics Center; Henry Valadez, Hawk; Ernest Young, Office of the CG.

## 'Visibility' one of best benefits of MARED

A big benefit of being in MARED is the "visibility" it offers, according to some of the people who have completed the program.

"I really think it got me more visibility in the project and throughout MICOM," said MARED graduate James Hinkle, recently selected Hawk deputy project manager.

Hinkle entered MARED as a GS-14. Within two years he was promoted to GS-15 chief of the program management office. "I think it had at least something to do with my getting that job . . .

"When the deputy job came open, MARED visibility with the command group and key functional managers probably gave me a little plus-up in being reassigned to this job," said the 43 year old engineer.

Ernest Young, the top-ranking civilian at MICOM involved in readiness, said MARED "gave me visibility I wouldn't have had otherwise which probably helped from a career standpoint.

"In moving ahead, the mere fact that I was in MARED might have indicated I had a little more on the ball — not that I necessarily did, but the perception was there."

Young, 49, was promoted last September to the Senior Executive Service and named MICOM assistant deputy for readiness.

In addition to MARED, Young is a graduate of the Presidential Executive Interchange Program.

"These had some bearing possibly on my promotion to the SES, but nobody told me I was being selected because of them," he said.

For Young, the best thing about MARED was "basically the opportunity that came out of it. I got to attend training and seminars I probably wouldn't have got to go through otherwise. That was the biggest advantage."

# Simulation chief will involve people in hardware problems, solutions

Rex Powell, newly-named MICOM director of systems simulation and development, says one of his immediate goals is to get the men and women of his directorate involved in technical problems and solutions that will accomplish Missile Command goals.

"When you get to the bottom line, hardware problems are important because that's why we're here at Redstone," said Powell, a veteran of 30 years in MICOM research and development.

"I'm not knocking theory or research. We need a strong and viable research program because problems can't be solved without the theory. But I believe our efforts must be directed toward real system problems."

Powell said his three decades at Redstone have been particularly satisfying because of the many diverse technologies here. "I've been fortunate wherever I worked. I've been blessed with management that let us do technical work across the board, often times not connected to aerodynamics, my specialty."

"I think most young engineers have better morale, and are happier when they're doing technical work, a good forty hours a week, and can

see a payoff between what they do and hardware in the field.

"That's why I want to get them on jobs supporting the command technology base and project managers here at Redstone but minimizing their time on non-technical work."

Powell, a native of Columbus, Ga., is an Auburn graduate and holds a master's from Georgia Tech, both degrees in Aeronautical Engineering.

A renowned model airplane builder and flyer, and winner of several major events across the country, Powell still attends three to five competitive events a year throughout the southeast.

"Right now I'm doing mostly indoor flying and work with radio-controlled sail planes," he said. "I don't win as much as I used to but I have more fun."

Winning takes a lot of practice and planning, Powell said and "... I'm satisfied, most of the time, if I can finish in about the top twenty percent."

Powell said most of the people involved with model planes come from all walks of life but the best are good craftsmen with ability to create things. "That's something we engineers have a tendency sometimes to get away from."

Powell said he hopes to work closely with all the

Army Missile Laboratory directorates and teams to strengthen the command's approach to challenges and problems.

"So far, the cooperation and support given me has exceeded my expectations and I really appreciate the teamwork. I just hope I can bring a few things to pass."

MARED graduate David Dalton, like Young, points out that there is no direct link between being in MARED and getting promoted.

Regarding promotion, "there was no guarantee and there shouldn't have been. You could send people to school forever and they still be non-producers. MARED was to train us and groom us, and then we are on our own," he said.

Dalton, 45, is chief of the ILS management and evaluation division. He said MARED afforded him "some awfully nice schooling . . . but most important is the people you met, the crossfertilization from people in DoD and other government agencies.

"It was an excellent opportunity to be schooled, and it never hurt to have been associated with the collection of highly competitive people," said Dalton.

Francesca Conners, chief of procurement and production in Tow project, said MARED benefitted her with "the opportunity to get priority consideration for managerial courses."

She said also that she got to spend four months in DARCOC headquarters in a developmental assignment.

For Truman Howard, a promotion and "continuous growth in responsibility" paralleled his participation in MARED. Howard, an operations research analyst with an engineering background and two masters degrees, heads up the cost analysis division in Comptroller.

Howard agrees that the training and assignments are the most important aspects of MARED.

"It give you a competitive edge in being selected for executive level training. Otherwise, your name


goes in with all the others but when you put "MARED" in the corner of your (form) 1556, that shows you already have been designated as having executive potential."

He said people in MARED also get circulars offering developmental assignments on the DA and DoD staffs. "The circulars come direct to you as a MARED executive trainee," said Howard, "and you can selectively say yes or no."

Howard said that while in MARED he was selected twice for assignment to MICOM special study teams, once as a cost team chief for a source selection board, and a second time as head of program management for the "PM Core" study.

Also, while in MARED, Howard, 39, got his second masters degree, in systems engineering from the University of Virginia at Charlottesville.





# Escape

(Continued from page 1)

The letter dated June 15, 1982 was neatly handwritten in English and mailed from Palawan, Philippines where Thanh waits in a resettlement camp. He and his family escaped Vietnam in a small boat, were picked up by a U.S. ship and taken to the Philippines.

Cass remembers him as a "very efficient officer" who was a teacher before entering the Vietnamese army and was fluent in English and French. "I've written him back telling him I'd help them and to let me know his status. I've asked him to let me know if he needs a sponsor," Cass said. "And we're going to be sending the children some clothes. We're going to gather up some clothes here within the project office and send them to him."

Here are excerpts from Thanh's letter to Col. and Mrs. Cass:

"Very glad to inform you that my family (my wife and my four children) and I finally escaped from Vietnam. We're now at the Vietnamese Refugee Center (VRC), Palawan, Philippines. We have been pre-screened, interviewed and re-interviewed by TVA delegation (Mr. William Aplegate); by Mr. Joseph Langlois, USG interviewing officer; and by INS officials; and waiting for resettlement in the USA.

"... Its been a long time, over 9 years, since I last saw you off at Danang Air Base. Time has changed everything, it especially affected me very much.

## COULDN'T LEAVE

"After your leaving VN in 1973, I was transferred back to HQS, I Corps & MR 1, spent about one year and a half, then reassumed my detached duty as a teacher at Le Quy Don High School, Nha Trang, my hometown. I was then Army Captain. I was also teacher of English at the Vietnamese-American Association within US Consulate-General, Nha Trang. When the communists took over SVN, I couldn't leave VN as others did, since my wife had been pregnant and the road leading to Saigon was then crowded with thousands and thousands of people.

"I had to stay at Nha Trang, was captured, handcuffed by local communist authority, and sent to A-30 Re-education Camp. I spent 43 months in this camp. Life was really hard at this camp. I was released from there on November, 1979; lived at Nha Trang jobless, being considered as a CIA member due to my close cooperation with the US Forces in SVN, especially with US Con Gen at Nha Trang...

"Much of the time, after my release, was spent in finding ways to escape from VN. I made two escape attempts in 1980, 1981 but failed (cheated by boat owners). This is my third attempt and I succeeded in getting out of VN along with my family, on a small, old boat 11.5 meters long x 2.7 meters wide carrying 59 persons; most of them are children, girls and women. God saved us, Col.

## SHOOTING STARTED

"The organizing committee of the trip had paid twelve thousand dollars for the place, but when we were moving fuel, food, water, compass, map, binocular, etc., they started fire on us. Everybody was startled, scared, then ran to every direction. I swam to the boat, over 100 meters away from the shoreline, under the shots, flashlights, and yellings, and finally reached it when the engine started. It was then 2100 hrs, April 24, 1982. We had about 100 liters of fuel, 120 liters of drinking water, some rice, 1 bag of carrots and cabbages; not enough for a long trip (800 miles).

"Lack of everything, we couldn't go any farther, agreed to go the north direction, 10 miles away from the beach in order to buy more fuel from a certain fishing boat. The next morning we were chased by a state-owned fishing boat, well-armed.

"We rushed to the open sea as fast as we could for fear of being recaptured. As for me, if caught, I'd receive a life sentence. That fishing boat finally gave up the search. At 2000 hrs, April 25, 1982, we decided to reach any fishing boat, generally state-owned ones, with risk. We spotted a light ahead. Dead or alive, we should get fuel, water. God saved

us once again, when our navigator recognized two old friends in that state-owned fishing boat. We gave them everything on hand, gold rings, diamonds, necklaces, wedding rings, money, etc., in order to satisfy what they asked.

"It cost us 700 dollars to buy 2 barrels of fuel, 1 barrel of water, some rice. When everything seemed to be ready, we set up our trip, on the East direction with the help of a very, very small compass as big as a coke bottle cork.

"The navigator reported to me, two days later, that the gear-box was almost broken. The speed was now 3 miles per hour. The next day, we saw 17 foreign vessels, made SOS signal but in vain. They reached us then went away without giving food or fuel. On the 5th day, a US Navy plane appeared. I saw 2 pilots over the cockpit. We yelled for rescue. They made 5 turns overhead then flew away. Death came slowly due to lack of food and water, two sips of water mixed with salt water, 1 bowl of spoiled chow for everyone a day. Everybody was completely exhausted. The sun had burnt their skins, faces, etc. . .

"At 2000 hrs, April 30, 1982, another light suddenly appeared in a long distance. We made SOS signal by using the cover of a pan before a fire. The ship came over, made a circle then stopped at a distance. I had

to yell out either in English or French. They were checking whether it was a refugee or fishing boat. The ship finally reached our boat. I was so moved that tears came to my eyes when I realized it was a US Ship. They spoke English on board. We're saved at last.

## SOUVENIR

"While on board, we were well treated, drank and ate as much as we could. I reported to Captain Tucee and briefed him on our dangerous trip, and gave his assistant the compass as a souvenir. . . They took us to the Subic Bay, a US Navy Base, stayed on board for three days in air-conditioned rooms, got good food and drinks. Captain Tucee is really a good-hearted and generous man. We were moved to Jose Fabella Center, Manila, and arrived at VRC, Palawan, Philippines on May 10, 1982.

"I am serving now, as a volunteer interpreter, at the Resettlement and Interviewing Section. . . I'm looking forward to be resettled in the USA as we were picked up by a US ship, the Mason Lykes. . .

"It is time to close my letter here. My best regards to you all. Hope to see your letter soon."

# Officer basic courses revised in past year

Ordnance Officer Basic Courses taught at the Missile and Munitions Center and School have undergone some major changes in the past year, improving officer education and saving in the cost of training programs.

As a pilot school for the Army's Review of Education and Training for Officers (RETO) program, MMCS' experiences and innovations will provide benefits to the entire TRADOC school system according to Lt. Col. Stephen Torok, chief of the professional development division, directorate of training developments.

The need for changes originated from the 1977 RETO study which revealed that officer training from the pre-commissioning stage through the Officer Advanced Course level was often inefficient and haphazard. The goal of the RETO effort was to develop a new, improved comprehensive system of officer training and education to ensure maximum officer effectiveness.

Although Officer Specialty Code 73, Missile Materiel Management, was selected as one of the TRADOC pilot specialties, Specialty Code 75, Munitions Materiel Management, also MMCS' responsibility, was included in the revision process to ensure unity of effort and maximum benefit from the program.

## SKILL REQUIREMENTS

The first step was a massive data collection effort starting in the summer of 1978 using questionnaires and survey forms sent to every specialty holder in the Army. In conjunction with this, numerous personal interviews were conducted with officers and their commanders and supervisors. The purpose was to determine the skill requirements necessary for each officer's duty position as well as to identify the extra tasks the officer might be required to perform. From this study effort, task lists were

developed and the program of instruction development process begun, Torok said.

"A broad concern that surfaced was that the majority of commanders was fairly satisfied with the technical training and qualifications of the officers surveyed, but were concerned about weaknesses in the basic officership knowledge," Torok explained.

"A second problem area concerned the two munitions specialty officer basic course tracks," he continued. "Those trained in the 75B course as conventional ammunition officers and those trained in the 75C course as nuclear weapons officers are often used interchangeably in the field. Officers trained in conventional ammunition only were having trouble when presented with nuclear weapon related duties."

## TARGET DATES

Milestones for implementing the revised Officer Basic Courses were established as Oct. 1, 1981 for Missile Materiel Management, and July 1, 1982 for Munitions Materiel Management. Both courses were implemented ahead of schedule, on Aug. 15, 1981 and Jan. 4, 1982, respectively.

The RETO effort has produced the following actions:

- The OBCs each became one-site courses at MMCS. Before, each was in two phases, the common subject training being at Aberdeen Proving Ground and the functional at MMCS.

- The time length for each OBC was shortened. Each went from about 27 weeks to 19 weeks and four days. This was done by eliminating redundant training, reducing non-academic time and increasing the class week from 36 to 40 hours.

- The "common subject block" was increased one week to a length of 10 weeks and two days with more academic hours on such subjects as leadership, ethics, basic unit level functions and organizational effectiveness.

- Initiation of Training, Advising and Counseling (TAC) Officer positions to provide appropriate training, motivation and guidance to the OBC students in the variety of programs essential for proper training.

- Initiation of a Platoon Leader program where, under close supervision of the unit commanders, the student officers act as AIT unit platoon leaders, participating in such activities as conducting formations and inspections, PT, counseling and soldierization training.

- Increasing Training Management instruction to 40 academic hours with the training aimed at the responsibilities in a Combat Service Support unit environment.

- More emphasis in unit level leadership and management activities in such functions as unit supply, maintenance and motor pool operations.

- Culminating combined arms instruction with a rigorous three day field training exercise in addition to completion of a confidence course, leadership reaction course and a detailed "MILSTAKES" practical exercise.

- Functional training in the SC 73 track culminating with a two-week hands on practical exercise whereby the students are placed in a realistic direct support missile maintenance shop and have an opportunity for role-playing of positions and practical application of previous classroom instruction.

- Combining the conventional ammunition and nuclear weapons instruction into one track to produce an officer able to function more effectively in either role. Proposals are being made to officially eliminate the course separations to combine both into one designation.

"As a result of one-site training at MMCS, reduction of non-academic time, use of a full 40-hour academic week, and the variety of other than normal duty hours officership training programs, we now have solid, hard-hitting officer basic courses that meet the needs expressed by field commanders," Torok concluded.



# Civilian maternity bills unexpected

Soldiers who leave active duty while they or their wives are pregnant sometimes end up facing unexpected civilian maternity bills.

There is no statutory authority permitting the Army or any other military department, CHAMPUS or the Veterans Administration to pay civilian maternity care expenses for former ser-

vicemembers or their family members who were pregnant at the time of separation from service.

Also, as is the case with virtually all civilian health insurance, the short-term insurance policy available to separating servicemembers does not cover such pre-existing conditions as pregnancy, according to Army medical officials.

Because of this drawback, the secretaries of the military departments authorize former members who were pregnant when honorably separated maternity care on a space-available basis for up to six weeks after delivery. The care can be provided only in an armed forces medical treatment facility having the capability for maternity care. Access to such care, say officials, is unavailable to family members of former servicemembers.

Redstone's Fox Army Community Hospital does not offer maternity care to former servicemembers. "We do not have obstetrician capability available here. We do have the facilities but we do not have the personnel assigned," said Capt. Oliver Cuff, chief of the clinical support division and patient assistance office.

"There's a shortage of those type of physicians within the Health Services Command," he added. Former servicemembers in the Huntsville area may go to Fort McClellan, Ala., or Fort Gordon, Ga., for maternity care.

For active duty personnel and their family members, Fox Hospital offers initial pregnancy tests at Family Practice. Once pregnancy is determined, they can be given a list of participants under CHAMPUS (Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services).

"They are given a statement of nonavailability and their care is given to them by the civilian facility of their choice that is participating in the CHAMPUS program," Cuff said. "The government pays for it but the civilian facility would provide the service."

"Once their baby is delivered, they can go to the well-baby clinic here," he said.

Many military medical treatment facilities cannot provide maternity care. Before deciding to leave the Army, a pregnant active duty member should write to the commander of the armed forces medical treatment facility she plans to use to determine if it can provide maternity care, if it is close enough to her home, and if its workload will permit acceptance of her case.

The former servicemember must furnish documented evidence that her pregnancy existed before her separation from active duty. This must be confirmed by examination in an armed forces medical treatment facility before maternity care can be furnished.

Pregnant servicemembers may remain on active duty if they choose not to separate on grounds of pregnancy before giving birth. They are then obligated to complete their tour.

Also, the Army offers enlisted husbands of pregnant wives a chance to remain in the service in monthly increments up to nine months, according to Army medical officials. In both these cases — pregnant servicemembers and enlisted husbands of pregnant wives — the soldier is entitled to medical care at Army expense, and to civilian care for family members under CHAMPUS throughout the maternity and recovery period.

Officers are not afforded a similar opportunity to extend on active duty solely for the purpose of obtaining maternity care for a pregnant wife at government expense. Consequently, the Secretary of the Army has authorized designee status for wives of involuntarily separated officers.

Designee status authorizes the pregnant wife to receive maternity care only in an Army medical treatment facility that has maternity-care capability. Designee status must be applied for in accordance with paragraph 4-57 of AR 40-3, say Army medical officials.

## Environmental award

WASHINGTON — Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., one of the Army's major test facilities, has been declared winner of the Secretary of the Army environmental quality award for 1981.

The award is given annually to the Army post that conducts the most effective environmental protection program during the preceding year. (ARNEWS)
