## Law requires car seat child restraint

A new Alabama law, which applies at Redstone Arsenal, is aimed at stopping the scene of a parent driving along with a small child resting in one arm or standing in the seat.

"It requires that a child under three be in proper restraints. It makes no difference in either the front seat or the back seat of the car," says Bobby Noles, the traffic engineer for Redstone's Security Directorate. "The restraint has to be a nationally-approved restraint."

The state child restraint law went into effect July 1 and authorizes special car seats for young children. Alabama motorists can face a \$10 fine for failing to obey this law although state troopers will be giving warning tickets during the first year.

Military police will be giving verbal warnings and eventually can be expected to give tickets to violators, according to Noles. As an Alabama law, it can be enforced on this military reservation within the state.

"I think most people once they find out it's the law, will comply with it," says Noles. "Number one, they love their child and see the need to protect him. Number two, because it's the law."

The legislation is aimed at protecting young children who could be thrown through the air if unrestrained during a car wreck. Even if there is no wreck, unrestrained children can be injured if a car swerves or stops suddenly, according to state officials. Several states have passed similar legislation.

"It's necessary for the protection and safety of small children," says Noles. "What bothers me is some mother driving with a baby in her arms. That's really dangerous."

Parents should never transport children in any type of device other than an approved restraint system meeting federal specifications. They can save money when purchasing a child restraint by looking for a "convertible" type of restraint, according to the Alabama Department of Public Health.

A convertible restraint is one that can be used in the rearward facing position for an infant weighing less than 20 pounds. When placed in a forward facing position, it converts to a restraint for a child weighing over 20 pounds who is able to sit upright alone. Several infant restraints are designed for infants only, and a second restraint must be purchased when the child is able to sit upright alone.

Restraint labels and instruction booklets will state whether a restraint is convertible, and outline complete instructions for installation in both the infant and toddler positions.

"It's going to be the driver's responsibility," Noles says. "If you have a child in your car that's under three years old, he has to be in this restraint and it's the driver's responsibility to have this restraint."

## Quality circle group wins suggestion award

Nine co-workers have become the first quality circle group to win a suggestion award here.

The total group award is \$400 or \$44.44 for each of the nine workers in the electrical standards and development laboratory, TMDE Support Group. The group's suggestion saved \$4,000, according to civilian personnel's incentive awards executive secretary.

"The suggestion resulted in providing training on microfilm machines and a written summary of available information, thereby saving time in locating procedures and other information relating to calibration and repair," said Jimmy Temple.

Group members include Brian R. Moore, group leader, William J. Barron, Jesse W. Smith, Latika Becker, Ronald F. Dion, John T. Bowles, Charles F. Brown, Richard B. Hachey and George N. Boyer.

The quality circle group meets once a week for one hour in the conference room in building 5435. Its first meeting was last Nov. 5.

A lot of information in the calibration laboratory center is stored on microfilm machines and "there were only a few people in this center who really understood how to use those machines," said group member Barron.

"Now there's training provided so everybody gets a chance to look up this information themselves rather than waiting to have somebody else do it," he said. "It's a time-saving situation; more effective use of your time."

The winning suggestion resulted from a "team effort, surveying the area to determine what kinds of information was available and in what form," Bar-

ron said. They found there was a "wealth of information" but only the ones responsible for keeping it up knew how to use it. The suggestion was submitted about mid-April this year.

"The quality circle program, which is a problem solving group, fits the group suggestion program very well," said Dr. Frank Rouse, an organizational (Continued on page 13)

## Support solicitation draws 3 proposals

Only three proposals were received here from civilian firms interested in providing support services to Redstone Arsenal under contract.

August 2 was the cut-off date for the proposals which were solicited from the business community under the Army commercial activities program.

That program required Army agencies to conduct cost comparisons to see whether it will save money to let civilian contractors do "commercial" type functions now performed by government employees.

Following a period of technical evaluation and negotiation, contractor offers will be compared

with the government's sealed estimate of the cost to continue performing the support services in-house using government employees.

The Army is expected to announce the low bidder sometime in December and begin in July 1983 performing support services under either a contractor or a "streamlined" in-house organization.

While only three proposals came in, there were more than 100 requests in February for the government's solicitation package, a 3,500 page collection of documents based on a statement of work that identified more than 30 separate installation support functions at Redstone Arsenal.

# Civilian workers can get counseling service

An effort is under way to inform supervisors and their civilian workers of the counseling services available here for civilians.

Army civilians and their family members are among those eligible for an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program and a non-abusers group under the Human Resources Development Office. The office also provides an information and referral service for people with problems other than alcohol or drugs.

"I think it's an effective treatment program and it's not being used as much as it could be," says Tony Capowski, civilian program coordinator for the Human Resources Development Office. "One of the things we're doing right now is an extensive effort to provide training to the civilian workforce — supervisors and nonsupervisors — about the availability of programs.

"We would like to see folks earlier in the process. The earlier problems are identified, the more effectively we can provide treatment."

From 70 to 80 percent of the people involved in the rehabilitation program return to work as effective employees, according to Capowski.

## Voluntary and Free

The program is voluntary and free of charge. People processed through Redstone's civilian personnel office get administrative time for attending the drug and alcohol rehabilitation.

Enrollment is either by self-referral or by supervisory referral. Someone who feels he or she might have a problem can go to Human Resources for help

or a supervisor can refer a worker. "A supervisor who sees a person's job performance is deteriorating can make a referral to us for evaluation," Capowski says. "The employee is referred on a voluntary basis."

"It's a totally voluntary program and it's also confidential," adds the civilian program coordinator. Information on a worker's participation and prognosis is available to the supervisor only with the worker's signed consent.

Each civilian goes to see Capowski first and he helps determine whether it is a drug and alcohol problem. "If it's an alcohol and drug problem, they're referred to our rehabilitation treatment staff," Capowski says.

## First Step

The first step of the rehabilitation program is an evaluation of the problem and, based on that evaluation, the worker is enrolled in one of three "tracks."

Track one, for people with a minor problem, consists of an educational seminar. This is 12 hours of information and education spread over one month — three hours each Wednesday for four Wednesdays.

Track two, for people with more extensive problems, consists of enrollment in track one and individual and group counseling. This can extend up to one year. "That usually consists of one hour of individual counseling each week for the first month or two in the program and two hours a week of group counseling while the person is enrolled up to a year," Capowski says.

Track three involves "about 10 percent of the per-

sons who are referred to us for alcohol and drug problems and whose problem is serious enough to require hospitalization," according to Capowski. This is four to six weeks in an inpatient rehabilitation service off-post; the cost of such treatment is the employee's responsibility.

"Upon return from inpatient treatment, inpatient rehabilitation, clients participate in the track two program," Capowski says.

## Re-Enroll



Participants in the alcohol and drug rehabilitation program here can re-enroll after a year if they choose to continue. There are 100 people involved in the program, including 85 percent military and 15 percent civilian, Capowski says.

A non-abusers group, also provided by Human Resources, is for people who are related to or closely involved with people with alcohol and drug problems. This is group counseling for two hours once a week and participants can re-enroll at the end of a year. There are about six participants at present and the number has varied up to 12.

"In addition to the treatment we provide for alcohol and drug problems, we provide an information and referral service for behavioral and emotional problems other than alcohol or drugs which either do or might interfere with job performance," Capowski says. This could be a family problem, for example.

"What I do is provide information as to the kind of resources which are available in the community; how to get in touch with those resources; how much they cost; and, if somebody asks me, I'll even make an appointment for them to get in touch with some other resource," says Capowski.

# PX layaway service charge starts Aug. 26

Redstone's Post Exchange, along with the other exchanges under the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, will start a \$1 layaway charge Aug. 26.

This nonrefundable service charge will help defray the paperwork and administrative costs of the layaway program, according to AAFES officials. The program allows patrons to guarantee availability of items with a minimum down payment.

"Before, to cancel a layaway we charged a \$3 penalty. Now (under the new system), to cancel you don't lose anything but that \$1," said Sarah Ewing, customer service supervisor at Redstone's PX. The exchange here will automatically cancel a layaway and return the item to stock if the customer is delinquent on a monthly payment.

Under the layaway program here, the minimum amount of merchandise the patron can put on

layaway is \$15. It can be a combination of items but they would have to amount to \$15 value or more.

"If it's less than \$30 (value), you put \$3 down. If it's \$30 or more (value), you put 10 percent down," Ewing said. Customers can put merchandise — electronics and household goods — valued at \$200 or more on layaway for 180 days. They can put items less than \$200 — generally clothing — on layaway for 90 days.

A recent study indicated that in-store processing costs for each layaway transaction are \$2.17 from the time the layaway is initiated until customer pick up. When overhead costs and markdowns required are added, the total cost of the layaway program to AAFES is \$17 million a year.

While major retailers such as Sears, J.C. Penney and Montgomery Ward charge their customers a \$2 service fee, AAFES officials felt this was too much

to impose on their customers and elected to absorb the majority of the cost.

Layaways average 1,300 per exchange per month in the continental U.S. and 1,700 in overseas exchanges and amount to \$420 million per year worldwide. According to the study 44 percent of all items placed on layaway are clothing, 16 percent home entertainment items, 11 percent household items. The remaining 29 percent covers all other items sold in exchanges worldwide.

The layaway program benefits customers by offering price protection while guaranteeing availability of the items with a minimum down payment. The AAFES layaway program offers customers another advantage over commercial retailers — either 90 or 180 days to pay off purchases. Major retailers offer 30, 60 and 90 day programs.

## Airline discounts still available

WASHINGTON — Military furlough-fare discounts offered by airlines are constantly changing, according to officials at the Military Traffic Management Command. "But bargains are still out there waiting for the smart shopper," said an official.

Participating airlines are offering discounts ranging from 33 1/3 to 65 percent. Officials note, incidentally, that special promotional fares available to the general public may be even lower than leave fares.

Currently, a 50-percent discount on all routes is offered by TWA, U.S. Air, Northwest, Air Midwest, Empire and Jet America.

Airlines with 50-percent or higher (up to 65-percent) discounts on selected routes and generally 33 1/3 on others are Alaska, Altair, American, Aspen, Delta, Eastern, Frontier, Mississippi Valley, Ozark, Pacific Southwest, Pan Am, Piedmont, Republic, United and Wien Air Alaska. Frontier offers a 55-percent discount with 7-day advance purchase and 35-percent discount without.

A third-off is available from Air California, Air Florida, Continental, Texas International and Western.

A discount of 25 percent is offered by Air Wisconsin, Britt, Rocky Mountain, Southwest and World.

## Italy joins MLRS group


Italy has joined with the United States, France, Germany and the United Kingdom in the joint development and production of the Army's new Multiple Launch Rocket System.

The original memorandum of understanding signed by the other four countries in 1979 calls for the cooperative development of a standard NATO rocket and the agreement with Italy now becomes a supplement to the memorandum.

That means that the Redstone-developed MLRS likely will be coproduced in both the United States and Europe. The joint program will strengthen the NATO alliance, reduce development costs through the cooperative effort, and enable the five countries to share production benefits.

MLRS is a free flight artillery rocket system consisting of a 12-round launcher mounted on a highly mobile, tracked vehicle. Rockets can be fired one at a time or in rapid ripples.

Equipped with a sophisticated position-determining system and computerized fire control

system, MLRS can be emplaced quickly and deliver massive firepower against enemy troops, equipment and materiel.

The Army is fielding the rocket system in the early 1980s.

## Engineers need generator operators

WASHINGTON — Soldiers interested in learning to operate electrical generators have until Oct. 15 to apply for the 1983 training program that begins in January.

The U.S. Army Facilities Engineering Support Agency offers the one-year training course at Fort Belvoir, Va., to qualified soldiers. Those who complete the course become prime power production specialists with an additional skill identifier in either mechanical, electrical or instrumentation.

To be eligible, applicants must —

- Be in grade E-5 or below;

- Agree to serve at least three years after completion of the course.

- Have passed the basic math and science proficiency test administered through the local post education center; and

- Have GT/ST and EL score of 115 or higher.

PFC Jim Riser, Co. A — "No, I don't think so. Bicyclists have as much right to be out there as anyone else."









A number of thefts have been reported recently in and around work areas, according to Redstone military police.


MPs offer a checklist to avoid theft in offices here:

# AAFES recovers cash, merchandise

DALLAS — The Army and Air Force Exchange Service reports that in the two years that its "hotline" program has operated, 249 persons have been disciplined and 23 management actions have been undertaken to correct problems.

The hotline was begun in 1980 as part of AAFES' fraud waste and abuse program. Since then, more than 3,800 calls, letters and mailers have been received through hotline channels worldwide. Although not all the calls dealt with fraud, waste or abuse, the validity of many of them has led to the recovery of \$137,000 in cash and merchandise.

# Fort McCoy wins for resources conservation

WASHINGTON — Fort McCoy, Wis., has been named winner of the Secretary of Defense 1981 Natural Resources Conservation Award as a result of its natural-resources management program.

The award is presented annually to the military installation in the United States that has demonstrated the most progress during a three-year judging period in applying sound principles of natural resources conservation in line with DoD policies and objectives. The program is also design-


ed to obtain maximum recreational use of military property consistent with the installation's military mission.

In announcing the award, Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger also announced that J. Kim Mello of Fort McCoy has been selected to receive the individual conservation award. The award is designed to recognize an individual, military or civilian, who has made outstanding contributions to the defense natural resources program.

The defense natural resources conservation program encompasses more than 19 million of the 24.3 million acres of land managed by the Defense Department. The Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force each nominated one installation from which a selection committee made recommendations to the Secretary of Defense.

The awards are scheduled to be presented at a Pentagon ceremony in mid-August. (ARNEWS)

# SFC promotions set at 11,500

WASHINGTON — The Army is expected to select about 11,500 staff sergeants and specialists 6 for promotion to sergeant first class.

A Department of the Army selection/promotion board will convene early in November to consider some 54,000 E-6's for promotion. In addition, the board will select soldiers to attend advanced non-commissioned officer courses. A final responsibility of the board will be to identify unsatisfactory performers for possible elimination under the qualitative management program.

The primary zone of consideration for the upcoming promotions will include those soldiers with dates of rank of Jan. 31, 1980, and earlier. The secondary zone extends from Feb. 1, 1980, through Sept. 30, 1981. Potential selectees must also have at least a high school diploma or GED, and must not have an approved retirement before the board convenes. The E-6's must also be free of any personnel actions that may restrict promotion to the next grade.

Check with the personnel office for complete details concerning eligibility and other requirements for consideration. (ARNEWS)

# Enlisted promotions soon normal again

WASHINGTON — The slowdown of enlisted promotions, plus the moratorium on the promotion of E-4's, will end Aug. 31, according to officials in the office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel.

With the return to normal promotion levels, officials anticipate up to 20,000 promotions in the top five enlisted grades during the month of September. Of this total, as many as 9,000 could go to E-5 and 5,000 to E-6.

E-4 promotions, open again on Sept. 1, will be controlled more closely than in the past to avoid the possibility of another moratorium, said officials. DSCPER will now provide military personnel offices with a monthly percentage of E-3/E-4 strength that can be in grade E-4 the following month, based on requirements and budgetary controls.

E-4 promotions are also affected by the waiver zone change on May 1 that reduced the time-in-service requirement from 15 to 12 months. (ARNEWS)

## New trucks tested

WASHINGTON — If testing of the new High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWV) at Yuma Proving Ground, Ariz., proves successful, the venerable jeep (M151A2 utility truck), M561 gamma goat and M880 commercial truck will be phased out of service.

"The new trucks are superwheels compared to those they may replace," said a Proving Ground official. Their mission will include carrying the standard or improved wire-guided Tow antitank missile, providing base defense, serving as mobile command-and-control headquarters and providing combat support.

The three candidates of the HMMWV now undergoing rigorous testing for performance and durability were built by General Dynamics Corp., Teledyne Corp., and AM General (a subsidiary of American Motors Corp.). (ARNEWS)

# Sky No Limit For Space Command

With an eye on the 21st century, the Air Force has announced the formation of the Space Command, to become active September 1, 1982.

Making the announcement at a June news conference, General Lew Allen, Air Force Chief of Staff, said, "Creation of Space Command will further consolidate USAF operational space activities, (and) provide a link between the space related research and development process and operational

users." Space activities referred to by Gen. Allen include "... surveillance, early warning, communications and meteorological functions." Participation in space shuttle operations also was indicated.

General Allen said he believed the Space Command would develop into a unified command, depending on the needs and interests of the other Services, "... within a year or thereabouts."

The first commander of the Space Command will

be General Jim Hartinger, Commander in Chief, North American Aerospace Defense Command and Commander in Chief, Aerospace Defense Command.

Headquarters of the new command will be in Colorado Springs and initially will be built around the existing Aerospace Defense Center staff there. Also, approximately 200 manpower authorizations will be transferred from Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska.

# 'Look-Alike' Drug Abuse Spreading

The use of counterfeit or "look-alike" drugs is a peculiar form of drug abuse which is sweeping the country, according to the U.S. Department of Justice's Drug Enforcement Administration.

Look-alikes are carefully designed to resemble prescription drugs, such as amphetamines, barbiturates, tranquilizers and narcotic pain killers which are sold, in many cases, illegally on the street. They are known by the same names as their dangerous counterparts: Black Beauties, Dexies, Yellows, Christmas Trees and Rainbows. But look-alikes contain only substances such as caffeine, ephedrine, phenylpropanolamine, acetaminophen and other over-the-counter non-prescription drugs.

The public health dangers of look-alikes have become apparent.—The user who thinks he has been purchasing "speed" (an amphetamine, such as dexedrine) or "ludes" (methaqualone) and has become used to taking several look-alike capsules or tablets at a time in order to "get the full effect" runs

the risk of serious overdose or death if one day he ingests the same number of the "real thing."

Also the look-alikes, themselves, can have serious effects. The number of emergency room incidents attributable to these drugs has risen dramatically in the past year and more than a dozen deaths caused by look-alikes have been reported.

These drugs not only cause problems for those who take them, they are causing serious problems for state and federal officials and medical personnel. Since the pushers are not selling a controlled substance, legal authorities are almost powerless. Also, overdoses of look-alikes are difficult to treat since the actual substance ingested may not be known.

If it is suspected that such a substance (look-alike or other unknown drug) has been taken, contact a physician immediately and try to obtain a capsule (or tablet) of the drug so that it can be identified.

# Uniform alteration policy explained

Enlisted personnel can usually have a new uniform altered for free under the Army and Air Force Exchange Service uniform alteration policy.

Minor alterations to commercial (AAFES-Procured) items, including hems and trouser bottoms, minor waist, and sleeve alterations on coats, overcoats and mess dress uniforms are available at no additional charge to all patrons.

Enlisted personnel may have shoulder loops removed, buttons aligned and customer-furnished service stripes and rank insignia sewed on dress uniforms free. The attachment of customer-furnished rank insignia on coats, blouses and overcoats is also free to enlisted personnel.

For "issue" items from the Defense Personnel Supply Center free alterations for enlisted personnel include those on coat shoulders and collars, sleeves on coats, side and back seams on coats, skirts and trousers. Hemlines on coats and skirts will also be adjusted free of charge.

These alterations are free to active duty, Reserve or National Guard enlisted personnel only. The military clothing sales store (MCSS) clerk will issue a free alteration certificate good for 30 days for the alterations. Warrant officers, commissioned officers and retired military must pay for all "issue" item alterations. MCSS clerk will provide further details on all alterations if desired. (ARNEWS)

# Tests done on Bradley IFV




DAC 8-0 to earn the right to play for the championship.





## State primaries are beginning

WASHINGTON — With national elections coming in November, individual states are beginning to hold primary elections. Two states, Mississippi and New Mexico, will hold theirs in August. Twenty-four states will hold primaries in September.

For soldiers stationed away from home, this means absentee ballots in order to vote. The process is simple, and the person to see is the voting assistance officer assigned to your unit. He or she should have copies of a new Department of Defense brochure that answers questions and provides

details on how to file an absentee ballot.

The brochure has special sections devoted to military personnel, their families and U.S. citizens living overseas. It is being distributed to military organizations worldwide.

Your local voting officers should also have a copy of the 1982 voting assistance guide, which contains additional information about voting in your home state. (ARNEWS)

## Civilian pay advance for trip overseas

WASHINGTON — A recent personnel policy change now allows pay advances to civilian employees going to overseas assignments.

Upon request, a single lump-sum advance of pay may be approved by the servicing finance and accounting office one month before the estimated date of departure and up to three months after arrival at the foreign post. The advance will be limited to a maximum of the employee's net base pay for six pay periods.

The employee must agree to repay the advance in payroll deductions within a maximum of 13 pay periods beginning with the first pay period after receipt of the advance. (ARNEWS)

## Permissive TDY for house hunting

WASHINGTON — The regulation covering permissive temporary duty (AR 630-5) for the purpose of house-hunting contains certain provisions that some soldiers may be overlooking.

According to an announcement from the U.S. Army Military Personnel Center, you must contact the housing office at the installation you are moving to before traveling there to look for quarters. This is to determine your eligibility for permissive TDY. Ac-

ording to the regulation, the TDY will be approved only if government quarters are not available, or not required to be occupied. In cases where government quarters are available, and you are required to occupy them, permissive TDY for house-hunting will not be granted.

The local personnel officer can provide you with the proper forms for obtaining housing information from the gaining installation. (ARNEWS)

# SQT changes explained to school personnel

All Skill Qualification Tests with test windows beginning Feb. 1, 1983, or later will be in the new single component SQT format, said Maj. Robert Dye in a briefing to MMCS personnel Aug. 4.

Dye is chief of the missile school's Training Analysis and Design Division which produces SQTs for 17 specialties. He recently attended a TRADOC conference on changes to SQT and briefed MMCS personnel on changes which are proposed in draft regulations now being considered.

The old SQT consisted of three parts that had to be completed to get a score — hands-on component, job site component and skill component.

According to Dye, the new MOS task SQT is but one part of the three-part training and evaluation process. The other parts are common task testing and hands-on training.

The MOS task SQT will be an annual written test. It will be given to all soldiers in an MOS during a three-month test window and will have a two-hour time limit. The test will have a minimum of 13 scor-

ing units and will be centrally scored. MOS task SQTs will be given to all soldiers in skill levels one through four.

Skill level one soldiers will have their SQTs scored locally for immediate feedback. SQTs for E-4s will also be scored centrally, but according to the draft regulation E-1 through E-3 soldiers will only be scored locally and their results will not be reported to higher headquarters.

Another scoring change is that norm scoring will be used to give soldiers an idea of how they fared compared to other soldiers in the same field. For example a soldier whose score is 85 would be told that he is in the top 10 or 20 percent of soldiers in his MOS and pay grade.

Prior to the SQT, soldiers will receive a two-page SQT notice. This notice will list 150 percent of the tasks to be tested but it will not give sample questions and answers like the current SQT notice and job site component booklet.

In addition to the SQT soldiers in skill levels one

through four will take an annual common task test. The results of this will be used to direct training and will not affect soldiers in personnel matters.

Hands-on training will be a tool available to commanders to train soldiers in tasks in their MOS. Task checklists will be included in soldiers manuals to assist commanders in conducting hands-on training. Results of hands-on training will not be reported through the chain of command unless directed by higher headquarters.

According to Dye, results of the new SQT will be more closely tied to the enlisted personnel management system. Exactly how the scores are planned to be used has not been released.

Dye listed three goals for development of the SQT in the new format. He said the test must be representative of the MOS, identify the non-performer and enable the soldier who can do the task to pass the written test.

# Proposal approved for higher aptitude scores

An MMCS proposal to raise the minimum aptitude area prerequisite scores required for four military occupational specialties taught here was approved recently by TRADOC, according to the Directorate of Evaluation and Standardization.

Final approval by the Department of the Army is "imminent" according to Ken Meacham, a training specialist in the directorate. This means the minimum required aptitude area score to enter the four MOS courses will be raised by 15 points.

The proposal was based on a study conducted by the directorate to analyze the factors involved in the academic attrition rates for courses taught here which require a minimum prerequisite score in the electronics aptitude (EL) portion of the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB).

The study group began by computing the academic attrition rates for each of the 16 MOSs which have the EL requirement. Each currently requires a score of at least 95. The team focused its attention on academic attrition occurring from Jan. 1, 1981 through April 1982. Administrative attrition was not addressed.

Four MOSs were selected for in-depth study: Pershing Electronics Repairer (21L), Improved Hawk Fire Control Repairer (24H), Improved Hawk Pulse Radar Repairer (24J), and Improved Hawk Continuous Wave Radar Repairer (24K). Academic attrition rates for these courses ran from 12 to 19 percent.

To lower the attrition levels the group recommended that the EL prerequisite requirement for the courses be raised from 95 to 110. This recommendation was forwarded to the U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command May 18.

"The EL category is a broad one," Meacham said. "It is based upon the factors of arithmetic reasoning, math knowledge, general science, and electronics information. It is the best of the ten ASVAB categories to use to choose people for these MOSs. So we didn't bring in any additional categories."

"The recent trend in the Army has been for an average of 26 percent of entering recruits to have

EL scores of 110 or higher," he continued. "By raising the minimum requirement to 110 we will not on-

ly lower attrition levels, but will also be sending better trained soldiers out to the field."

This is consistent with current Army interest. According to a letter from TRADOC: "In recent visits to (TRADOC) headquarters and to Soldier Support Center, Mr. Clayton Gompf, Assistant Secretary of the Army (M&RA), indicated that the Department of the Army is receptive to recommendations to raise ASVAB Aptitude Area prerequisites. Concurrently, attrition in the training base is receiving high visibility and concern at Army Staff and Department of Defense levels."

Meacham agreed that this is a part of a broader trend in the Army of tightening up its enlistment requirements. "Commanders in the field receiving MMCS graduates will be pleased with this new policy," he said. "We'll receive feedback about it in the next Missile and Munitions Evaluation Report."

"We hope this trend continues into other MOSs," he added.

Meacham noted that according to the Department of the Army, the higher prerequisite scores shouldn't produce any manpower shortages.




