Soldiers test new protective suit

Explosive ordnance disposal personnel at the Missile and Munitions Center and School have tested aspects of a new protective suit designed to keep them safe in atmospheres containing chemical or biological agents.

The test last week was to determine how efficiently the pattern size of the new outfit meets the needs of the user. Soldiers performed a number of exercises, including calisthenics and vehicle operation, to measure how well the forced air suit allowed them free operation to conduct disposal operations.

The suit, developed by the Army's Natick Laboratories, is an improvement over older models in that it has a built-in forced air filtering and cooling system. It can be used in atmospheres containing as little as 18 percent oxygen, and may be worn up to 2 hours without changing the battery pack powering the air system. With a battery change, the outfit may be worn for 4 hours. It also has a backup filter system in case of emergencies, or when changing out of the suit.

A number of separate components make up the outfit:

- A large, clear plastic bubble helmet, with two built-in voice transmitters, a sun visor, and an

adapter to connect with the alternate filtering system.

- A backpack, containing a battery-powered blower motor to pump air through filters and into the suit for cooling and breathing.

- A backup air filter system (the M46A air filter)

- Flame-resistant Nomex overalls, to deflect heat and to protect the inner butyl rubber suit

- A butyl rubber suit, with one-way exhaust valves, so that air may be released from its interior. The butyl rubber suit is the main protective cover for the individual.

- A liner, which goes between undergarments and the butyl rubber suit; the liner receives filtered air through the backpack, and circulates it around the body to cool the user.

- Rubber gloves and boots, attached to the rubber suit with locking rings.

The outfit is designed to protect against chemical and biological agents; it is not designed for use in atmospheres containing carbon monoxide or ammonia. It weighs approximately 64 lbs., and costs \$9,000 per copy. The suit comes in five sizes — small, medium, large, extra-large, and extra-extra large. The extra-extra large pattern suit was the one tested at Redstone.



MPs plan 'courtesy' rides for holidays

Military police can give arsenal residents upon request courtesy rides home from clubs on post where they have been drinking.

"We have a program whereby people who drink too much can call the MPs for a courtesy ride on Redstone Arsenal," explained 2nd Lt. Charles Tribolet, assistant MP operations officer.

Under the program, the MP phone number and a warning against drunk driving is to be posted at the Officers Club, NCO Club and EM Club. Club person-

nel can also call to request a courtesy ride for someone.

For those who call to get a courtesy ride, there are no official records kept nor "ramifications," Tribolet said.

"The emphasis is on avoiding being involved in DUI (driving under the influence)," he said.

In a related development, the Secretary of Defense has issued a strong message regarding penalties for drunk driving on military posts.

In a recent memorandum for the Secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger ordered the services to revoke on-post driving privileges for "a minimum of one year" of anyone convicted of drunk driving on a military installation.

"He's just telling the installation commanders to do what the regulation already allows them to do," said Capt. Joe Lampley, prosecutor in Redstone's office of the staff judge advocate.

Army Regulation 190-5 states the post commander can revoke the driving privilege of convicted drunk drivers for one year. Driving privilege can be revoked for a minimum of six months for refusing to take a blood and alcohol test, Lampley said.

"People need to understand if they're caught driving while intoxicated, they stand a serious possibility of having their driving privilege revoked at Redstone Arsenal," said the prosecutor. "What's the moral of that story? Don't drink and drive."

Compensation statements: what's their purpose?

After examining my Personal Statement of Military Compensation there are several questions I have about how the Army figured what the total value of my service is.

I wasn't surprised with the total which they came up with. For an E-6 over six years service they say the pay is 23,036.16. That's not terribly far from the estimate which I came up with on my own.

There are some items which I have questions about on the form.

For instance, quarters value was figured at full BAQ. This means that I get \$303.30 per month value for the same three bedroom unit where an E-4 gets \$244.80 and an E-9 would get \$383.40. What about the soldier living in the barracks. He gets the same rate (\$147.00 per month for an E-4) whether he's living in a one, two, three or four-man room. The BAQ costs come from a chart, but its hard to say what the real value of military housing is for different soldiers.

Retirement is also a sticky point. Cost of Army retirement was figured at 7 percent of base pay. This adds up to \$893.64 for me this year. In many civilian retirement plans the members can receive some compensation if they leave their present company. This is not the case with Army retirement. It's fine to include career soldiers retirement costs,

but what about the junior officer or enlisted man who is in for only a short period of time and knows he will never see retirement.

One of the best known and least understood benefits of the Army is medical care. Soldiers and their family members receive care free at Army medical facilities. According to the compensation statement, medical insurance which would pay for the range of services available to military personnel would cost \$520 per year for single soldiers or \$1092 for those who are married. This is somewhat misleading since many civilian employers offer cost sharing medical insurance to their employees and some companies pay the total cost of medical insurance for their workers. Add to that the fact that military families which use CHAMPUS already pay some money toward their health care, just as they would pay the deductible amount of civilian insurance. Also if soldiers had to get their own insurance they could shop for a plan which would suit their needs at the cost they want to pay.

The final indirect compensation listed is the cost of Social Security coverage. Since the Army has to pay an amount to Social Security matching each soldier's contribution they have added that cost into the compensation picture. They cannot count this amount. Any employer would have to pay the same matching amount and would never try to tell an employee that it is part of his pay.

Under additional considerations and programs I

found only three which applied in the last year. I figured that I received some state tax advantage during the year, a great deal of savings at the commissary and savings in legal counseling.

The only item I object to in this area is leave and holidays. Most civilian firms offer some paid vacation time. This time may vary and the requirements to be eligible for paid vacations may vary, but the plans are there. The Army isn't the only generous employer either. My father-in-law was receiving 30 days a year vacation before he retired, not counting weekends and holidays. And, a teacher who gets paid on an every-month basis is getting two to three months vacation each year.

The biggest question I have about the statements is what purpose do they serve. Income is a personal item. Either its enough or its not. If income is enough soldiers will probably agree with the Personal Statements of Military Compensation. If income is not enough soldiers may discount more than what I've outlined in this writing.

The Army estimate of total compensation for me is \$23,036.16. That's if you count the Army share of Social Security payments which they really shouldn't count as compensation to me.

I would've estimated my total compensation about \$3,000 less than the Army figure, but its still in the same neighborhood. Is it enough? That's between me and my creditors. What about you?


Try operator





Soldier sees dramatic evidence of seat belt value

The value of seat belts and infant car seats was illustrated dramatically to a Redstone soldier who had just completed a defensive driving course here.

Pvt. Kenneth Watson, a storage specialist with 515th Ordnance Company, was home in bed the night of Dec. 2 when he heard a "loud bang like dynamite." It was the sound of a fatal two-car collision around 10:13 p.m. on Highway 36 just east of Hartselle.

"I was the second one there," Watson said. "One car was heading west on 36, and the other east on 36."

He went to help the eight victims, three of whom died and the remainder hospitalized, he said. He was able to remove a baby from an infant car seat in one of the cars.

Another baby, in the front seat with the mother, died, he said. "Apparently the mother was holding that one."

In the driver's seat was the father who died about three hours after arrival at the hospital, Watson said. The mother died also.

The soldier from Hartselle recalled that none of the victims were wearing a seat belt. Watson had just completed a two-day defensive driving course here to get his military driver's license.

The following Monday, he went to tell course instructor Johnny Elliott about the accident. "I just thought maybe (Elliott) might be able to use it in his class, use it for an example. I thought maybe some people might get some good out of it," he said.

Elliott, a safety specialist and an accident investigator, said seat belts probably could have saved lives in the mishap.

The lesson was not lost on Watson. What did he learn from the tragedy?

"Always put my seat belt on . . . unless I just forget it which I'll try not to ever do," Watson said.







Army team of experts study physical fitness



CARLISLE BARRACKS, Pa. — In the continuing story of the growth of Army fitness expertise, a small group of educators here is proving to be a major influence.

The setting is the Army War College, where Col. Fred Drews instructs the Army's future senior leaders in such things as nutrition, weight control, strength development and cardiovascular diseases. Drews, who was called to active duty from the Army Reserve, spent 12 years as head of the physical education department of North Carolina State University. Assisting him in his current job at Carlisle Barracks are two Army captains: a cardiovascular specialist and professional physical fitness educator.

Aside from the classes, the group prescribes individual exercise programs for students and conducts physiological tests, nutritional analysis and practical field training in aerobics and strength conditioning.

The three-person team, plus a non-commissioned officer and a civilian secretary, make up the relatively new Army Physical Fitness Research Institute. The staff may be modest in size, but has had a lot of impact on the development of army fitness programs.

"The institute formed in January, 1982," Drew said. "There was a need to educate emerging leaders, but also a perceived need for a small group of experts to keep abreast of the whole field of physical fitness."

So far, the institute has contributed to such programs as over 40 physical training, cardiovascular screening (a pilot program that started at the institute), stress reduction techniques, the army physical readiness test and a program to prepare non-commissioned officers to become battalion-level fitness trainers.

In addition, the institute has been able to answer technical questions from the soldier physical fitness

center at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., and the Army surgeon general's office, which wanted data about the types of exercises profiled soldiers can do. Drews also described a current study with the Army Institute for Environmental Medicine. The study will determine the physical requirements of light infantrymen on five days of continuous operations. With the results, the institute can recommend suitable training programs for light infantrymen.

Drew says that the institute can't be looked at strictly as a "think tank," since it has the real-world mission of educating senior Army leaders. However, he says, "Yes, we're idea people, but we do realistic work that leads to important information for the Army to use in its fitness programs."

What's more, the institute's work is built upon specific ideas about why health and fitness is important to the army and to its people.

"We can't view physical fitness development solely as a physical exercise program," Drews said. "We must pay adequate attention to nutrition, rest, recreation and health protection measures before we can exercise in a beneficial way."

"We view the health of the soldier, any soldier, as the basis upon which physical readiness is built." (ARNEWS)




In other games Tuesday, Missile Labs stopped TMDE 53-26, and Controllers defeated Finance and Accounting, 42-35.

Saddle club established in new location

Redstone Arsenal's saddle club is now well-established in a new location after being displaced by expansion of the Alabama Space and Rocket Center.

They occupy a 24-building facility built by members on approximately 400 acres in the northwest part of the arsenal.

More than 75 arsenal officials, club members and guests attended a dedication of the new facility held Dec. 4.

In a dedication speech Maj. Gen. Robert L. Moore commended the effort of club families who worked on the project and praised the club as a morale builder for arsenal personnel.

The saddle club was established here in 1963 on a tract of Army land that was transferred by Public Law 96-125 to the Alabama Space and Rocket Center in 1979. As part of that transaction the state agency prepared a new site for the club in a field on the arsenal approximately one-half mile west of Rideout Road. Seabees with Naval Reserve Mobile Construction Battalion 24 erected the framework for the 24 buildings. Club members purchased necessary materials and completed their individual buildings in their spare time at a cost of approximately \$1,000 per member for a half building and \$2,000 for a whole one. Members put roofs and tin siding on the buildings and built corrals.





Guardsmen shoot missiles in TOW tests

MICOM and the project office killed three birds with each missile here Saturday by bringing in National Guard units from three states to fire TOW.

Eighteen guardsmen from Alabama, Tennessee and Mississippi, fired eight missiles at MICOM's Test Area 6.

In addition to giving guardsmen valuable training experience, the tests enable the Army to evaluate 'stockpiled' missiles, many nearing the end of shelf life, and to look at a modification planned for thousands of the older missiles.

"MICOM is installing a circuit inhibitor to eliminate a battery problem we've had in a few of the stockpiled missiles," said Chris Leachman, Chief of TOW's System Readiness Division, and coordinator for the conversion program.

Leachman said Saturday's firings were the first eight of the Army's pilot modification program "... in anticipation of using those older missiles for annual service practice."

Some 40,000 missiles will be fired during annual service practice through 1990, he said, with more than 3,400 scheduled worldwide during FY 1983.

Missile modifications will be done at Anniston with the program getting in high gear early next year.

"With the cost of shooting live missiles, soldiers seldom get the chance to fire," Leachman said. "We thought it a good idea to bring in the guard and let them fire, which helped them and us too."

Firings were fully instrumented, with cameras and recorders, and scored to show gunners where they hit, what they did right, or wrong.

"We even showed them where they took a breath during the firing," Leachman said.

How did the guardsmen feel about firing TOW? "They were tickled to death, they jumped at the chance," said Lt. Col. Charles (Mick) Ryland, operations officer for the Redstone Readiness Group in Huntsville Research Park.

"I think they would pay their own way just to come here and fire TOW."

The MICOM tests afforded the gunners a unique opportunity because for the National Guard to get TOW practice rounds is "extremely hard", according to Ryland. Last year only three rounds were made available to the entire state of Alabama. All but one of the gunners and assistant gunners taking part in Saturday's test firings had learned on "trainers" and had never fired a live TOW before.





Lieutenant finishes degree in Army

'... maybe the pressure helped' —John Rickling



Soldiering is a full-time job that may work you long hours and move you around a lot. Getting a college degree is often difficult. But the Army helps with tuition assistance, on-post classes, counseling

and other services, and numerous arsenal soldiers are enrolled in degree programs. Here are stories on two who completed theirs at Columbia College, which held a graduation here Monday night.

He gives education a '10'

CSM Ed Polite, who earned a college degree this year, gives education a "10" on his scale.

The command sergeant major here since 1979 says he wanted to set an example for other soldiers. Now that he has an associate degree, Polite plans to continue his education.

"Number one of course I am a great believer in education and I've been talking to all my soldiers throughout the world and Redstone Arsenal telling them the benefits and advantages of receiving an associate of arts degree, baccalaureate, a masters and finally their doctorate," Polite says.

"I feel the best way to encourage another individual is by example and not by lip service. Therefore I felt I'd take courses not only for the soldiers but for myself also."

On Oct. 2, Polite earned an associate of arts degree in business administration from Columbia College on post. He started working on it in early 1981 "in between my TDY's and what have you."

His official travel to visit the troops was only one thing he had to reserve time for while pursuing his degree. "Schedule, TDY and your family. Those are the biggies. And when you have seven kids and seven grandkids like myself it's a little difficult," says Polite.

"As far as recreation, trying to enjoy life, I had to forfeit those things," he says, adding that he was willing to make sacrifices to pursue his degree.

Duty always came first so there was never any conflict between his education and work, according to the command sergeant major. Polite took his courses in the evening, after military hours.

Tuition was paid entirely through the Veterans Administration so Polite only had to buy his books.

"If I had to pay for it out of my pocket, I would

never have been able to afford it especially with two kids in college," he says.

Polite, who is to retire in October 1983, has applied to take bachelor's and master's degree courses at the same time through Century University of California. This is a non-residence course which he expects to start in January or February.

He enlisted in the Army in 1945 and served in Japan with the 159th Field Artillery Battalion and the 24th Infantry Regiment. They were both black units back in those days before integration.

Polite left the Army in 1947 and returned in 1950. With his World War II victory medal, he is a veteran of three wars — World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

The 52-year-old soldier recalls the time he spent in Thule, Greenland as a launcher platoon sergeant working with Nike-Hercules missiles from 1959-60. It was extremely cold there, about 85 percent ice, and "we worked under ground," according to Polite.

"We cooked, we ate, we slept, we looked at television, everything under ground," he says.

"The only disappointing thing about it is they told me I could find a woman behind every tree and I'm still looking for that tree," Polite adds with a laugh.

The career soldier places military education — the NCO courses, etc. — on the same level with civilian education.

"I think if I was to measure the value of an education for an individual and I were to put it on a scale of one to 10, one being the lowest, I'd give it a 10," he says.

"I'm not only talking about civilian education. I'm talking about military education also," adds Polite. "I think they're equally as important and I would give them the same priority."

1st Lt. John Rickling this year, with the Army's help, earned the bachelor's degree that eluded him the year he joined the Army.

The operations officer for 515th Ordnance Company entered the service with almost four years in accounting from the University of South Florida.

He planned to have his degree before becoming active so he joined the Army on delayed entry in April 1977.

"But then school attendance in the summer was so light that the school dropped some of my required courses," recalls Rickling who went active that October without the degree.

The career soldier was stationed for a while at Fort Riley, Kansas but "the majority of the courses they had on the post were for associates level," he says.

"I'm lucky I'm here at Redstone because not only did I get the baccalaureate but I get to go to F. I. T. (Florida Institute of Technology) now which is also on post and I'm going for my master's," says Rickling.

He earned a bachelor of science degree in business administration in February 1982 from Columbia College on post. He started working toward it here in April 1981.

Though the availability of tuition assistance funds was sometimes a problem, Rickling credits tuition assistance with helping his education. "Never could've done it without it," he says. "That's still true today. I couldn't attend school without it."

The soldier from St. Petersburg, Fla. attended basic training at Fort Jackson, S.C. from October through December 1977. He attended the Hawk fire control repair course at the Missile and Munitions Center and School here the following year. He was assigned to the 6th Student Company while here.

After being stationed at Fort Riley, Rickling attended Officer Candidate School. In April 1981 he returned to 6th Student Company as executive officer.

Rickling describes as "taxing" the period he was both going to college here at night and taking the ordnance officer basic course during the day. He took that course here from July 1981 to January 1982.

"At one point during the winter season it snowed here so they didn't have classes some nights. Columbia had to conduct makeup classes so instead of three nights a week, we started (having class) five nights a week," he says.

"That was the only rough time," adds Rickling whose days during that period started at 5 a.m. and ended at 10 p.m.

He was graduated on the dean's list from Columbia College and was graduated with honors from officer basic "so maybe the pressure helped," he says with a laugh.

After the officer basic course, he was reassigned to 6th Student Company as executive officer. He later became operations officer for 515th Ordnance Company.

Rickling, 27, and his wife Marjorie have two children: Amanda Sarah, two years 11 months, and John Peter, seven months.

"This is my career," he says. "My heart really lies with the Army and I will hope to have a majority of my master's completed and attend the ordnance officer advanced course here at Redstone prior to moving overseas."

The center is working on getting about 18 different video games and hopes to have them in by mid-January, he said.


The center's 200 to 250 seat auditorium is being renovated for new lights, acoustics and a complete sound system.

Army increases reservists overseas

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Army Reserve doesn't limit itself to stateside locations; the Office of the Chief of Army Reserve has announced plans to bring Army Reserve strength in Germany up to 300 from about 125.

Most of the people in the three units now located in Germany are Americans working for the U.S. government and civilian corporations. The number of units will be increased by as many as five.

Some of the new units will be forward elements of stateside units — such as the 310th Theater Army Area Command, Fort Belvoir, Va.; the 2nd Hospital

Center, Hamilton Field, Calif.; and the 8th Medical Brigade, Brooklyn, N.Y. In addition, the army will establish a replacement regulation detachment and is considering a military intelligence detachment.

The first three USAR units to be stationed in Germany were the 3745th and the 3743th U.S. Army Reserve Schools (in Munich and Frankfurt) and a forward element of the 412th Engineer Command, Vicksburg, Miss. The Army Reserve also has units in Saipan, Guam and American Samoa. (ARNEWS)



VA explains headstone options

Families of veterans who select a burial site for a deceased veteran in a private cemetery have two options for Veterans Administration assistance in marking the grave, according to Montgomery VA Regional Office director James W. Conway.

VA will provide, upon request, a headstone or marker free of charge and ship it to the consignee designated on the application, Conway said. Cost of placing the marker in a private cemetery must be borne by the applicant, however.

A second option, said Conway, is that VA will reimburse part of the cost of a headstone or marker bought privately and placed on the grave of a veteran. The current amount is \$67.00 which is the average cost of headstones purchased by VA.

Application for the VA headstone or marker should be addressed to Director, Monument Service (42), Department of Memorial Affairs, Veterans Administration, 810 Vermont Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20420.

Application for the \$67.00 reimbursement for a marker other than the VA standard should be filed at the Montgomery VA Regional Office, 474 South Court Street, Montgomery, Alabama 36104. Proper routing of the application will expedite service.
