

New missile works well in first test

Resembling a pipe with fins, the missile rises straight up off the launcher for about 200 meters, pitches over to level flight and heads down the arsenal's Test Area 1

trailing what appears to be a fishing line.

Seconds later, several kilometers downrange, the missile locks on a tank parked among several targets and dives headlong onto the tank, hitting it on top where it's most vulnerable.

That was the scene April 21 as Army Missile Command test engineers conducted the first guided flight of the Army's new Fiber Optic Guided Missile (FOG-M).

All test objectives were accomplished, according to Dr. Paul Jacobs, FOG-M program manager in the Guidance and Control Directorate of MICOM's Army Missile Laboratory.

"We're pretty excited about the test results—and the program itself," Jacobs said. "We've got about fifty or sixty people working on FOG-M full time, real hands-on engineering, and the success we had in this first guided test represents a lot of hard work and dedication by all those people. The team performance has been outstanding."

FOG-M is the brainchild of the Army Missile Laboratory, headed by Dr. William C. McCorkle, and was designed and built almost entirely in-house by the

FOG-M team which includes players from almost every laboratory element.

Jacob said Saturday's test was the first of about 15 demonstration flights planned at Redstone during the next couple of years.

"Along with the test program, we're doing concurrent producibility studies looking for ways to refine the system and reduce costs."

The MICOM team may come out of the FOG-M demonstration program with a technical data package ready to go to industry.

The prototype missile designed and built by the team uses a fiber optic link to attack tanks and battlefield targets. In flight, the missile carries an imaging seeker—like a low cost TV—that looks for targets and sends pictures over the fiber to an operator looking at a TV receiver.

The operator selects a target, and locks on an automatic tracker which simply flies the missile into it.

FOG-M will enable gunners to take advantage of cover and fire without being exposed, locate and destroy targets at longer ranges.

Driving under influence penalties in city listed

Penalties for driving under the influence in Huntsville range from a \$250 fine and suspended jail sentence to \$5,000 fine and some 60 days in jail.

The legal assistance office has received inquiries on what punishment a soldier would receive if convicted in Huntsville courts for DUI, said Capt. Lonnie Groot, assistant staff judge advocate. Local attorney and former staff judge advocate, Bob Gammons, provided a chart of the penalties.

First offense would mean a \$250 to \$1,000 fine plus \$19.50 court costs and \$30 highway intoxication seminar tuition. The seminar lasts four nights. Additional penalties include a 10 day suspended sentence,

six months probation and loss of license for 90 days.

Second offense, within five years, would bring a \$500 to \$2,500 fine plus \$19.50 court costs. Additional penalties include a 30 day jail sentence with 28 days suspended, two days to serve or a 20 day jail sentence to be served on community service. Also there would be two years probation and loss of license for 12 months.

Third offense, within five years, means a \$1,000 to \$5,000 fine plus \$19.50 court costs. In addition there are 160 days in jail with 100 days suspended, two years probation, and loss of license for three years.

Plane crash, car and boat accidents cause fatalities

Two Redstone soldiers drowned, a third died at the controls of a private plane that also carried his four passengers to their deaths, and a civilian worker suffered fatal injuries in an on-post vehicle accident last week, the worst five days for arsenal people since seven died in a commercial plane crash seven years ago.

The dead:

Clista Fay Counts, Missile Logistics Center.

Sergeant First Class Grant M. Cowan, Company B.

Staff Sergeant Leon Jensen, Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

Captain Thomas C. Pusey, 5th Student Company.

Killed with Pusey in the crash of a Redstone Arsenal Flying Club plane near Knoxville, Tenn. April 27 were: Carol B. and Robert H. Clark; Steven Guest and Matthew Johnson, all of Huntsville.

Cowan and Jensen died in a boating accident on Gunterville Lake April 28.

Counts was killed in a two vehicle head-on crash on Hansen Road April 23.

Cowan and Jensen had gone to the lake to participate in a fishing tournament sponsored by the local chapter of the Military Bass Anglers Association. Police were unable to locate anyone who saw the accident happen. Persons on the lake shore reported

Cowan's large bass boat running in circles with no occupants shortly after 2 p.m. Saturday in an area north of the Highway 431 bridge.

Searchers recovered Jensen's body late that afternoon and found Cowan's body the following morning. Neither man was wearing a life jacket, police said.

Pusey and his friends took off from Redstone Army Airfield about 3:30 p.m. Friday in a Piper Cherokee Six, a single engine airplane belonging to the flying club. The captain's flight plan listed an airport near Harrisonburg, Va., as his destination.

According to the Union County, Tenn., sheriff, the plane crashed near Maynardville, Tenn., north of Knoxville about 90 minutes later. Fragments of the aircraft were scattered over a wide area on a wooded hillside leading to speculation that the aircraft came apart in the air. Persons on the ground reported a loud noise and said they saw pieces of the plane fall out of a solid overcast and plummet to the ground.

The National Transportation Safety Board is investigating the crash. No finding on the cause is expected for several weeks.

The crash was the worst in the history of the flying club, an organization of active duty and retired military personnel, government workers and govern-


ment contractor employees based at the Redstone Army Airfield.

Two soldiers were killed Jan. 15, 1975 when their flying club aircraft struck a wire stretched across the Tennessee River at Hobbs Island and the plane crashed and sank in the river. The two were flying a volunteer search for a missing child when the accident happened.

Counts was pronounced dead at Fox Army Community Hospital shortly before 5 p.m. April 23 following the accident on Hansen Road about 4:15 p.m. She was riding in the right front seat of a car driven by Dirksen Sibert, also of the Missile Logistics Center. Sibert and a third Missile Log Center worker, Larry T. Wampler, were hurt in the crash. Sibert collided head on with a vehicle driven by Molly Payne, a Marshall Space Flight Center worker. Payne was also hospitalized.

Military police are continuing their investigation of that mishap. None of the people involved were wearing seat belts, MPs said.

Seven Army civilian workers and soldiers from Redstone were among more than 70 passengers who died in the crash of a Southern Airways DC-9 near Atlanta on April 4, 1977. Six other arsenal people on board escaped alive. One later died of injuries sustained in the crash.



Not suprised

Editor:

I was not surprised to find a rebuttal in the **Rocket** April 25, to my letter to the editor in the April 18 edition. However, I was amazed at what was not said in the rebuttal rather than what was said.

The rebuttal said that Mr. Huggins was received with open arms. The fact is that on the night that I was elected to an RFCU office, all newly elected officers and existing officers were invited to a RFCU sponsored social at the Hilton Hotel—all except me (candidate by petition) that is. There was no communication (officially or personally) at the time or afterwards from any board member concerning my election to the RFCU, including the current chairman of RFCU. Surely this does not constitute "open arms" reception.

The letter goes on to say that overtime would have been required of two members (paid RFCU employees) if the Credit Committee had met after normal duty hours. Those Credit Committee positions were non-pay positions at the time. If I could meet without pay, why couldn't the other two members do the same instead of collecting RFCU pay when they were serving in non-pay positions. I certainly did not receive any RFCU pay for my time on the committee. I did receive mileage for my personal vehicle use.

I have no complaint about the RFCU financial statement availability; but what you do not see on the statements or in the "Counselorette" are accounts of expenses for social events or secluded RFCU board meetings in recreational areas hundreds of miles from Huntsville. Such meetings cost thousands of dollars to credit union members. Also, you do not see the NCUA and other audit reports made public to the credit union members.

The proposal in the "Counselorette" to eliminate the petition method of nominating candidates did not tell the public that petition candidates have to be cer-

tified by the board secretary before they go on the ballot, nor did Mr. Chairman's letter.

Mr. Chairman, I remind all elected and appointed officials that your job is to represent all credit union members rather than what appears to me to be suppression of differences of opinion. Also, Mr. Chairman, if you want all credit union members to be aware of our differences, I challenge you to run our respective articles in the "Counselorette," the original source of these differences.

The April 1984 edition of the MICOM Safety Information Letter has a brief but informative article on Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs). I highly recommend it.

Mr. Prince of the Family Housing Branch has informed me that during bathroom renovation of several houses on Ripley Drive that GFCIs were installed, but to his knowledge, there are no plans to install GFCIs in any other housing units. He also stated that it would be an excellent idea to have these devices in all housing units.

I have personally witnessed the protection afforded by these devices. A relative came in contact with a bare wire while on the patio. Had a GFCI not been installed, the event certainly would have resulted in a serious injury and possibly a fatality.

I laud the MICOM Safety Office for publishing this information and encourage a recommendation that these devices be widely installed on this installation, especially in family housing.

This month in history

42 years ago: The first carload of finished ammunition left the Redstone Arsenal Classification Yard (May 29, 1942). During World War II, more than 45 million separate units of ammunition were loaded and assembled for shipment.

30 years ago: Linton Field on Patton Road was dedicated to the memory of Capt. Paul M. Linton who served at Redstone Arsenal from August 1952 to February 1954 and later died in action in Korea (May 17, 1954).

28 years ago: The VIP guest house, located near Redstone Arsenal headquarters building 101 was officially named Goddard House in honor of Dr. Robert H. Goddard, professor of physics and pioneer in rocketry who died in 1945 (May 1956).

The first Jupiter missile was fired successfully at the Atlantic Missile Range, marking the first successful firing of an intermediate range ballistic missile in the western world (May 31, 1957).

25 years ago: Monkeys Able and Baker, passengers in a Jupiter nose cone, became the first living beings to be recovered alive from a flight into outer space, paving the way for putting the first man into orbit around the earth (May 28, 1957).

23 Year ago: The improved Honest John system began replacing the basic Honest John, which had been in the field since June 1954 (May 1961).

21 years ago: President John F. Kennedy made his second visit to Redstone Arsenal for an Armed Forces Day speech (May 18, 1963).

12 years ago: The first American-made guided missile was fired by U.S. soldiers in combat near Kontum, Vietnam, when airborne Tow antitank missiles destroyed four captured American M41 tanks, an artillery gun, and a truck (May 2, 1972).

7 years ago: The last Sergeant battalion was phased out of the U.S. Army (May 1977).

Intelligence agency joins Washington-based group

WASHINGTON — The Missile Intelligence Agency at Redstone Arsenal will become part of a new Washington-based intelligence group but will not relocate, the Army said last week.

Dr. Rankin A. Clinton, the local missile intelligence director, will head the new Army Intelligence Agency which will also include the Foreign Science and Technology Center in Charlottesville, Va. and the Intelligence and Threat Analysis Center at Arlington Hall Station, Va.

A headquarters for the new intelligence agency will be activated in Washington Oct. 1. Clinton will report directly to Maj. Gen. William E. Odom, assistant chief of staff for intelligence. Clinton has been named acting director of the new agency and will also continue to serve as director of the Missile Intelligence Agency here, splitting his time between Redstone and Washington.

The Army said there are no plans to relocate personnel among the three agencies. Headquarters of the new element will be formed from resources already

available, the Army said, adding the headquarters will be "austere".

The main purpose for the consolidation is to provide a focus for Army intelligence and ensure timely and efficient intelligence support to the Army and national intelligence community, the Army said.

The Missile Intelligence Agency has been operating at Redstone as part of the Army Missile Command. The agency produces and disseminates scientific and technical intelligence concerning foreign missile and space activities.

As an element of the new Washington group based here, the Missile Intelligence Agency will be supported by MICOM in the manner the missile school and other tenants are now.

Clinton, 53, a Huntsville resident and member of the senior executive service, has been with the Missile Intelligence Agency since it was formed at Redstone in 1960. He came to Redstone in 1956 and worked at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency as a research engineer.

Allied students' bus trip to Smokies a 'blowout'

Members of the Allied Student Training Detachment who visited the Smoky Mountains on Easter weekend "experienced how it feels to be a pioneer," according to Capt. Mike McChesney, detachment commander.

Their bus had a blowout on a mountain back road, there was no jack on the bus and no service station anywhere near. So the students had to change the tire using "field expedient methods," McChesney said.

They located some flat rocks and stacked them high enough so that when one rear tire was driven upon them the axle with the blowout was clear of the ground. There was a lug wrench aboard the bus so the students were able to change the tire. It took almost two hours but "All was not lost as the scenery was magnificent and the stop gave some of the students a chance to walk around on the nature trails," the detachment commander said.

On their way to the Smokies the students visited Oak Ridge National Laboratories, the University of Tennessee and its agricultural experiment station, the American Museum of Science and Energy, and Gatlinburg.

The Allied Student Training Detachment, formerly called the Foreign Student Support Office, sponsors regular excursions for the students to introduce them to the American way of life.

Forty-four of the detachment's 105 members took the Easter trip to the Smokies. Capt. Tom Hauser and Capt. Tony Visk went along as escorts.

McChesney said he felt a sense of "deja vu" on this trip as the bus tire went flat. On their Easter trip in 1983, the allied students also had a flat tire on their bus deep inside Great Smoky Mountains National Park. While the tire was being changed, some students went for a walk in the woods and one, an Egyptian colonel, fell into a creek. Former detachment commander Capt. Lenny Jefferson received the Soldiers Medal for saving him from drowning.

The name comes from the soil

How Redstone Arsenal came by its name has puzzled people over the years since sandstone, iron ore or any other red rock seem conspicuously absent from the arsenal area.

The explanation that the name was selected by the first commander because of the red soil has never been readily accepted by people whose thought processes balk at equating soil and stone.

Old news accounts tell of a big effort in 1955 to trace the origin of the arsenal's name. One possibility investigated was that it was named by "a colonel" who looked down on the land from the air and mistook red soil for red rock.

Another theory held that the name was derived from a railroad siding in the Farley area called Redstone siding.

"The more searching made, the more intriguing it is that the answer to the question, why Redstone?, is so hard to find," a newspaper article from June 1955 states.

Contacts were made with people affiliated with the arsenal in its earliest days and also with the Chief of Military History and the Office of the Chief of Ord-

nance but none knew the origin of the name.

People surnamed "Redstone" were sought out in several cities in an attempt to determine if the post were perhaps named for an individual.

A letter to the arsenal's first commander Col. Carroll D. Hudson "brought a reply that he did not remember," a news article states. A Maj. Henry N. Sachs whose job it was to propose new names for installations to the Office of the Chief of Ordnance said that Redstone Arsenal was so named because of "red rocks predominating" in the area and said he believed the area to have been known as the "Redstone area" before the Army came. There is no record that a Redstone area existed in pre-Army days.

An individual working at post engineers on the arsenal came forward and said the name was derived from a red sandstone boulder used as an orientation point by surveyors who laid out the arsenal.

A second contact with Hudson was made by Mary Cagle, now command historian, late in 1955. He stated in a letter to her that "I wanted the name of Redstone because of the red rock and soil in northern Alabama. . ." and that the name was proposed and became of-

ficial. Cagle also contacted several area old-timers who agreed with Hudson's version.

One of Hudson's early associates here, Henry Attaya, a retired lieutenant colonel living in Huntsville, recalls asking Hudson the origin of the name while the two were bird hunting here around 1945. Attaya remembers:

"I said, colonel, where is that red stone."

"Hank," Hudson replied, "we were looking for a name for the ordnance plant and we were looking around for something locally that we could reference it to."

Hudson pointed to the red clay soil and told Attaya that's where the name came from but that he modified it to Redstone because "red clay just didn't strike a note", said Attaya, recalling his conversation that day with the arsenal's first commander.

So the arsenal's name was chosen because the first commander liked the way the word Redstone fell on his ear. "But it came out of the red clay. He told me that personally," Attaya said.

'Sure-pay' will become standard way of paying soldiers

WASHINGTON—"Sure-pay" direct deposit will soon become the standard way of paying all soldiers, according to plans recently announced by Army finance officials.

Under the sure-pay plan a soldier's net pay goes directly to an account in a financial organization of the soldier's choice.

Conversion of pay accounts for officers and the three senior enlisted grades is scheduled to begin July 1. On that date, local unit commanders will begin conducting special personal financial management training designed to prepare soldiers.

Soldiers in pay grades E-6 and below will be phased into the program as they complete training and establish accounts with banks, credit unions and savings and loan associations.

The conversion will affect only those soldiers serving in permanent duty assignments.

Commanders will have authority to waive sure-pay for some soldiers. These include those soldiers in need of further training in managing a checking account, and soldiers stationed where there are no U.S. finan-

cial facilities (such as in Turkey, Greece and Spain).


The proposal to enroll all soldiers in sure-pay originated at the 1983 Army-wide commanders' conference. The sergeant major of the Army had recommended it as a means of improving deployment readiness.

Officials acknowledge sudden deployment can create difficulties for those whose checks normally go to their unit or to a designated mailing address. This means the paycheck heads in one direction, while the soldier goes in another. The result: delayed pay, which can lower morale as well as create financial difficulties. This problem surfaced, for example, during the Grenada operation.

While the program's primary thrust aims at improved readiness, officials note that family members also should benefit. Unannounced deployment seldom permits family members time to arrange finances. But sure-pay and a joint account assure the family's uninterrupted access to funds.

Officials point to certain direct personal advantages in sure-pay, even for the non-deployed soldier. Direct

deposit eliminates such problems as waiting in lines to buy money orders and deciding how to safeguard cash. (Arnews)



Energy system meters each building

A \$6 million energy monitoring and control system believed to be the biggest of its kind in the Defense Department is planned for Redstone Arsenal.

The computer-based system will work similar to the controller in use here for several years but will perform several new functions including metering of energy consumption in individual shops and buildings.

Design work on the system should be completed in December with installation in phases beginning next spring, according to Oscar Eubank of Facilities Engineering's architectural and engineering contracts section.

The computer and accessory equipment will be located at Utilities Branch in building 5414.

"A centralized computer will be connected via telephone lines to each building," explained Eubank, "wherein will be installed what is known as a field interface device with a microprocessor installed in it. It will take computer commands and convert them to control signals which in turn will control heating and air conditioning equipment within buildings.

"It will also have the capability of metering consumption of energy and will compile statistical data to allow us to determine those facilities which are using the greatest amount of energy per unit square foot," he said.

The new system will regulate energy consumption in military residences here as well as in most office and shop buildings on the arsenal by "cycling" air conditioning and heating units.

Larger buildings will be divided into smaller control zones. "Some buildings like 4488 are so big that they are actually a building within a building so we can control by zones in those buildings," Eubank said.

The system will control inside temperatures automatically, in summer by turning off fans or refrigeration units and in winter by turning off fans or closing steam valves. "It will actually shut the valve off and tell you when the valve is closed," Eubank pointed out.

Between 4,000 and 5,000 "operating parameters" such as temperatures, pressures, air flow rates and filter conditions will be monitored, he said.


A 24-hour operator in the control room at building 5414 will have energy and equipment information from the computer displayed on three printers and three video monitors.

By viewing the monitors the operator can see a visual layout of a building's heating and air conditioning system along with temperatures and other operational data considered important in determining operating efficiency.

There is an alarm printer and display to alert the operator to problems.

The system will also have the capability to predict problems by monitoring bearing temperatures of

equipment being used to maintain constant high or low temperature over long periods as is done in conditioning tests that can't be interrupted, Eubank said.

Ability to meter is a key advantage of the new system, Eubank said.

"It will give us statistical data on who is using the most energy and why. We can't do this with the system

we're using now."

Joe Dickey, arsenal energy conservation coordinator and the workforce's point of contact on energy matters, agrees. "Basically it's going to help us know better where we're using the energy and if there is a failure in our program that's it right now, not knowing where we're using the energy."

Female veterans' needs are studied

In an effort to find the needs of the rapidly increasing female veteran population, the Veterans Administration has awarded a \$790,000 contract to Louis Harris and Associates, Inc. of New York to conduct a survey of female veterans.

The survey, which will be completed in early 1985, will poll an estimated 3,000 female veterans nationwide to determine future needs. At present there are about 1.15 million female veterans and that number is expected to grow to 1.26 million by the year 2000.

Information obtained from the survey will be used to plan for the future care of the woman veteran. The survey will focus on the specific needs and demographic projections of this particular group.

VA Administrator Harry N. Walters, in announcing the contract, said the purpose of the survey is to provide information to the VA which can be used to establish baseline data for the current population of female veterans—their knowledge of, attitudes towards, and usage of VA programs—and to estimate the future support needed for this expanding group of

veterans.

The survey will consist of a random sample of personal interviews of women veterans. "Data from the survey will aid the VA in making policy decisions relating to current programs and for designing future ones," Walters said.

The survey will attempt to provide answers concerning the impact of increased demands of VA programs and benefits for female veterans.

A separate study of post-traumatic stress disorder and other readjustment problems among Vietnam-Era veterans, announced last month, will include female as well as male veterans. Study findings will assist the Veterans Administration in planning for the future needs in this area.

Walters also indicated his support for a study on the possible effects of exposure to herbicides on women who served in the armed forces in Vietnam which is being considered by the Centers for Disease Control. This study has been proposed by the VA's Advisory Committee on Women Veterans.

Army takes bite out of crime

WASHINGTON—Crime in the Army has shown a downward trend over the past ten years, according to statistics released by Army law enforcement agencies.

The statistics reflect a general decline in four categories of crime and misconduct: crimes of violence, crimes against property, absences without leave and desertions.

Although violent and property crimes rose in 1980, both the fiscal 1981 and 1982 year-end rates show a decline. Officials say FY 1983 figures suggest the decrease will continue.

AWOLS and desertions also have declined in number, with both categories showing a rapid drop

between fiscal 1974 and 1977.

AWOL rates continued to decline slowly, and in fiscal 1983 had reached a historic low, officials say. The desertion rate rose slightly between fiscal 1977 and 1980, but as of fiscal 1983, the desertion rate had reached an all-time low.

The Army's crime prevention program plays a decisive role in decreasing such crimes as rape, robbery and burglary, officials say. Tougher commanders, better-educated soldiers, and a decrease in similar crimes throughout the general population are also credited for the steady improvement in crime statistics. (Arnews)

Seminar provides forum for ammunition officers

Division ammunition officers from throughout the U.S. got some advice on how to do their job during a two-day seminar here last week.

The Directorate of Training and Doctrine at MMCS was the host of what is to be an annual event. Planning is under way for a similar conference in Germany in November for ammunition officers in Europe.

"We brought them up to date on current doctrine, new developments in ammunition support. Probably second to that was the sharing of problems and solutions to problems," said Maj. Gary Andrew, director of training and doctrine at the school.

Division ammunition officers plan and coordinate ammunition resupply to their division units. Most of the attendees were from active Army divisions while there were representatives from the reserves.

About 50 people, less than half from the school, at-

tended the seminar April 24-25. Locations represented included Fort Carson, Colo., Fort Hood, Texas, Fort Campbell, Ky., Fort Bragg, N.C., Fort Riley, Kans., Fort Stewart, Ga., Fort Polk, La., Fort Ord, Calif., Fort Lewis, Wash., Alaska, Hawaii, and Korea.

"Next year it'll be at least three days. That was one of the biggest complaints, they didn't have enough time," Andrew said.

Topics covered included ammunition support structure, ammunition transfer point operations, unit productivity, material handling equipment, and the reserve component. There was also an open discussion for the attendees.

"I think it's a great idea to hold it every year," said Capt. Hugh Trent, chief of the doctrine literature management office of the training and doctrine directorate.

Tuition assistance cutbacks slated for soldiers

Tuition assistance will be reduced as the result of funding cutbacks for Army education.

Soldiers with Vietnam era GI Bill benefits will no longer be able to get tuition assistance and those who remain eligible for tuition assistance will generally pay more of the cost than they did before. The cuts are to go into effect Oct. 1.

"It's kind of a Catch 22 for the soldier because with tuition assistance he only has to pay 10 percent or 25 percent of the cost whereas under the GI Bill he will be required to pay 100 percent and then wait to be reimbursed by the Veterans Administration under the GI Bill," said Mary McGough, director of Army Continuing Education Division here.

Not only will soldiers entitled to the GI Bill have to come up with the total cost for tuition, but they face the prospect of the bill's expiration Dec. 31, 1989.


Soldiers who are not eligible under the GI Bill will receive tuition assistance according to revised percentages. For enlisted members, the government will pay 75 percent of tuition and fees for undergraduate lower level study, 50 percent for upper level, and 50 percent for graduate level. Formerly soldiers E-5 and above with less than 14 years service could receive money for 90 percent of the cost at each level.

For officers and warrant officers, the government will pay 75 percent for lower level study, 75 percent for upper level and 50 percent for graduate level. The graduate support will be cut from 75 percent.

"You've got two major programs. You've got the Basic Skills Education Program and the tuition assistance program," McGough said. "The basic skills program is very important to provide required remedial training for the AIT soldier under BSEP I. It also provides critical training to the NCO who is trying to qualify under the new reenlistment criteria under BSEP II.

"Tuition assistance is a program that provides financial support for personal growth opportunities," she added. "So the decision was made to make the cuts in the tuition assistance, not the basic skills."

The cuts could possibly go into effect before October. "If we do not receive our unfinanced re-



quirements in fiscal year 84, it may go into effect sooner and that would affect the fall term 1984," McGough said.

Recommended minimum education goals include a bachelor's degree for officers and an associate degree for other soldiers, according to McGough.

So far in fiscal 1984, some 767 soldiers here have used tuition assistance while 318 others used the GI Bill. Basic skills program enrollment was 1,104. McGough expects the basic skills total to double in the third and fourth quarters of this fiscal year.

She expects the number of soldiers enrolling in college courses to drop at least 10 percent as a result of the assistance cuts. "But I think the major impact is the financial hardship. It may require some soldiers to get an education loan or apply for a basic grant," the education director said.

Soldiers eligible for the GI Bill are likely to be E-6 and above on the enlisted side or captains and above or warrant officers. Eligibility for it began Jan. 31, 1955 and expired Dec. 31, 1976. "Realizing the GI Bill will expire in December 1989, this would be an opportunity to make use of those appropriated funds," McGough said. "Really the only time you're going to be actually required to have the money on hand without help is that first (college) term and then you can use the reimbursement to pay for your next term."

Alternatives include basic education grants, bank or credit union education loans, and possibly financial assistance for soldiers in critical need.

"We're dealing with such a highly motivated soldier here at MICOM and MMCS and this will just have a major impact on ability to go to school due to financial hardship," McGough said.



Couple accepted into Army NCO logistics program

Going to school, working and raising a family can be difficult especially if both parents do all three.

SFC Ronald Henry and his wife SSgt. Karen Henry manage well enough to be accepted into the Department of Army noncommissioned officer logistics program.

Each received a certificate stating they "qualified by manner of performance, personal qualities, and technical capabilities."

Col. Joseph Cote, commandant at the missile school here, presented the certificates in a ceremony last week. "We are going to honor this morning the family Henry," he said.

The Henrys work in different offices but are both assigned to the school's Directorate of Training and Doctrine. Acceptance in the logistics program should mean more opportunities.

"When it first came back that I was qualified I was excited because they only pick what is supposed to be the cream of the crop," Karen said. "It'll not only help me as far as promotions in the Army but it'll help me when I get out of the Army."

They expect to eventually leave Redstone for training before being placed as logisticians who perform supply functions at staff level.

"You're handling people's supply problems at battalion and brigade level," Ron said. "If they have a problem, it's our job to dig into it and see if we can correct it. We both have a background in the supply field, her on the ammunition side, and myself on missile parts."

The couple came here in February 1983 after four and a half years in Germany. "We've always been stationed together, been pretty lucky," Ron said.

Both are pursuing associate degrees by taking college courses at night on post. Karen is working toward a degree in computer science from Columbia College while Ron pursues an electronic engineering degree at Calhoun College. She is at school Monday and Wednesday nights while he goes to school Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Karen's sister lives with them and helps raise their three children. "Between working and going to school at nights and raising the family I don't have hobbies," Karen said.

"I don't know how we manage it. We know we have certain goals, the Army standards are raising so high now, we have to keep up with the Army's trends," she said. The 29-year-old Pottstown, Pa. native has been in the Army for nine and a half years.

Ron, 32, does find time for his hobby of playing disco music. The Washington, D.C. native is a disc jockey who provides disco entertainment for parties as

The couple married for nine years has always been stationed together in the same company but never

worked in the same office. "And it's probably better that way," Karen said with a laugh.

Plan ahead for trips, avoid travel vouchers problems

Filing a correct travel voucher can be easy for those who prepare ahead and ask questions, according to a legal officer here.

Capt. Judkins Bryan, a defense counsel in the legal assistance office, has some advice for first-time travelers. "First and foremost, ask questions. Your finance office will be more than happy to assist you in filling out your travel voucher, but you have to ask questions," he says.

He advises talking to people who have often been on TDY and thoroughly reading travel orders. "Make sure that your orders mean what you think they mean. For example, 'quarters available' does not mean you have the option to live off post at government expense while TDY," Bryan says.

"Do not accept more advance travel pay than you think you will need," he adds. "If you possess credit cards, then you should consider using them as much as possible. Any cash you receive in advance, you must secure, manage, and account for later, as a general rule. You will find that you are much more frugal when you are spending your money instead of the Army's. Remember, you will be reimbursed for most of your actual and necessary expenses. Also, it is possible to receive advance pay at most of your TDY assignments."

It is a good idea to keep receipts for everything, according to Bryan. This can include receipts for food, taxis, porter fees, parking, laundry, telephone calls, and so on. The finance office may want to see them to settle a voucher. Lodging receipts must be submitted. Keeping receipts may also help at tax time when claiming deductions for travel expenses that were not reimbursed.

A pocket calendar might help in recording daily expenses on an extended TDY trip in a high cost area.

"Read the (travel) forms before you fill them out


and sign them," Bryan says. "Never sign something without first reading what you are about to execute. If possible, request to take the forms home overnight so you can carefully read them and discuss it with someone."

An alarming number of soldiers and civilians have filed incorrect travel vouchers, according to Bryan. He points out that the penalty for willfully making a false

claim is a maximum fine of \$10,000 or maximum jail sentence of five years, or both.

"At the same time, don't be intimidated by the apparent complexity of it all. Filing a correct travel voucher can be made easy for those that prepare ahead and ask questions," he says. "Remember, if you need assistance in this area tell your section chief."

Read contract thoroughly before signing on dotted line

Watergate hero and former U.S. Senator Sam Ervin analyzed the plight of consumers by remarking that "the law requires all laymen to know every bit of the law; it requires lawyers to know a reasonable amount of the law; but it does not require judges to know a doggone thing."

Chairman Sam's comments may seem to put the average consumer at a distinct disadvantage in business transactions, but let's look at one area of the law where you, the consumer, make the law.

Idealistic political scientists proclaim that U.S. citizens make laws by voting politicians into office. Although we are blessed, as Americans, with participatory government; the way in which you make law virtually every day of your life is by entering contract—by signing on the dotted line or otherwise.

A contract is any court enforceable agreement, in writing or orally made, between two or more people. You enter a contract when you tell the grease monkey to "fill it up", when you put a coin into a candy or drink machine, when you buy a movie ticket, or when the government takes Social Security deposits from your paycheck.

As you can readily see, you enter contracts in different ways almost every day. Although contracts need not be in writing, unless (in most states) dealing with real estate or a long-term obligation; this article is intended to assist you when faced with the decision of whether or not to put your "John Henry" on the dotted line of the written contract.

The U.S. Constitution guarantees U.S. citizens the right to enter contracts and prohibits the government from interfering with that right. Only immoral, unlawful, or treasonous contracts are forbidden. A good example of an illegal contract is the Mafia "contract" which adds little to our Gross National Product.

When you negotiate and enter a legal contract, you are making law. You are obligating yourself to fulfill private obligations in consideration for some benefit conferred upon you by the other party. A judge often-times doesn't need to know a "doggone thing" about law to settle a contractual dispute. All his or her honor need do is read the words of the agreement. The terms and conditions of a well written contract set forth who must do what and when. Since contracts obligate you, they should not be casually entered into. If you violate the terms, you are in "breach" and will have to pay damages.

Whenever a business places a document in front of you to sign, you have every right and opportunity to amend it by scrawling in terms that better suit you. Of course, the business doesn't have to agree to your terms, but by taking the initiative and changing a few words you may get yourself a better bargain.

Scribbling all over a proposed contract is not the most important point to consider when entering a contract, however. Foremost in your mind should be the command "Read the Contract"! Obviously, you can't change the terms unless you've thoroughly read the contract beforehand. But, more important, you won't clearly understand your rights and obligations if you don't read what you're signing—including the *fine print*.

If you don't read your contract and attempt to object to its provisions after the ink has dried, you will probably be laughed out of court if you challenge it. In addition to being a demoralizing experience, a courtroom defeat is also costly. Attorneys' fees and court costs will be borne by you.

Common examples of failing to understand what has been signed are when an auto purchase contract says "as is" and when a homeowner puts a house on the real estate market.

In the first example, if anything goes wrong with the car, the buyer can shed tears without much hope of

having it repaired (if repairable) at the seller's expense. The finance company will, of course, continue to demand its car payments regardless of the car's condition.

As to the second example, the homeowner has problems if he or she decides against selling the house after signing the standard real estate sales contract. The standard sales contract gives the real estate agent a certain period of time to sell the house and if the agent finds a buyer, the homeowner is going to be held in breach of contract unless the house is sold. It is unlikely that a judge would order the house to be sold, but the homeowner would be liable for the agent's lost fees and other damages.

Both results could easily be avoided with the flick of a pen. The car buyer could have crossed out "as is" and written "warranted 12 months" and the homeowner could have scrawled on the contract "right to withdraw house from market is reserved". A few words can make a great deal of difference in a contract. That's why lawyers make bundles of money spotting or creating so-called "loopholes". You can manufacture your own loophole with some thought.

Another point every consumer should remember is that oral offers made before an agreement is signed are not part of the contract unless in writing. If a salesperson tells you that you will receive a bonus \$500 rebate if you buy a car or a free ocean cruise vacation if you buy a lot in Miserable Estates in Nevada, don't plan on spending the money or get your heart set on a Love Boat romance until you've read the contract and are assured that you are **unconditionally** promised the bonuses. Don't take the word of a stranger when you want to know what you're going to get and what you're not. You've worked too hard for your money. Judges don't like oral evidence about oral promises when a written contract is available.


Likewise, make sure all the blank spaces are filled out before you sign a contract. If any part of the contract is altered, make sure both you and the other party initial the changes.

Military personnel have a great advantage over the average consumer. You have access to your Legal Assistance Office which will gladly review contracts you're thinking about signing. This legal advice is at no cost to you and can save you from future aggravation and expense. There are few purchases which can't wait long enough for legal review.

If you've already signed an agreement and are now remorseful, don't give up hope. Your legal assistance attorneys are aware of many consumer oriented laws which, if violated, may open escape routes when you appear to be hostage to a damaging contract.

Contracts are boring to read. They are chloroform in print. But, read every word of every contract you sign! Avoid being rudely awakened only to learn that you are obligated beyond your means or bound in ways you never imagined.







Program makes it easier to hire family members

WASHINGTON—The civilian personnel directorate in the Army's personnel office is making it easier for Army-employed family members to get a job when their sponsor moves on permanent change of station orders. One such effort involves a test of the priority placement program's family-member referral program. Registering in the program won't guarantee registrants a job at the new duty location, but it will make sure that, all else being equal, qualified registrants will have an inside track over non-Army candidates.

As of Feb. 29, 90 family members had registered in the program since the test began in September 1983. From these, 43 were selected for jobs at their new duty locations.

The program is open to spouses, dependent children under the age of 23, and dependent parents of either the spouse or the sponsor. To register, the family member must have "status" (serving in a "career" or

"career conditional" appointment) and work for the Army.

If you have "status" and work for the Army, here's how you go about registering:

—Go to the civilian personnel office at the activity you'll be leaving with a copy of your sponsor's PCS order to confirm eligibility to register.

—Get a DD form 1817 (registration form) and SF 75 (form containing your basic federal personnel history).

—Take the two forms to the civilian personnel office at the activity where your sponsor is being reassigned (or, to the nearest DA or Defense Department activity servicing the DA activity to which your sponsor is assigned.)

—Register within seven working days of arrival at the new duty station. You then, for the next 90 days, will receive consideration for vacancies for which you qualify. (Arnews)



TRADOC projects that as many as 7,100 active-duty and reserve component soldiers may be promoted annually under the policy. (Arnews)





Election '84 activities limited for federal employees

Federal employees cannot make contributions to the Reagan reelection campaign because of a law that restricts their political contributions.

"There's a federal statute that prohibits federal employees from making contributions to their bosses or other federal employees for a political objective," said Capt. Kin Clinton, chief of administrative law in the Staff Judge Advocate office here.

This does not prevent family members of civilian or military workers from contributing in their own names to the Reagan-Bush '84 campaign committee. It must be clear that the money is being given in the family member's name, Clinton said.

There are other political guidelines aimed at avoiding conflict of interest by federal workers. Generally, federal employees cannot work for a na-

tional party, Democratic or Republican, in a campaign.

"You can participate in local campaigns that do not support a partisan political objective," Clinton said. "Of course you can vote, you can wear stickers or buttons, you can go to rallies, be members of clubs. The line is drawn when you are actively engaged in working for a partisan political objective."

Federal employees cannot collect contributions or sell tickets to political fundraising functions. They cannot distribute campaign buttons or stickers even though they can wear them.

"You cannot be a candidate for a public office in partisan elections," Clinton added. "Typically your local elections do not involve political parties so those are not precluded."

The political activity of government employees has been a concern of officials since the days of Thomas Jefferson. In 1939 Congress approved landmark legislation called the Hatch Act which limits the political activities of federal workers, employees of the District of Columbia and certain employees of state and local governments.

With the Hatch Act, Congress determined that partisan political activity by federal workers must be limited for public institutions to function fairly and effectively.

The U.S. Civil Service Commission was in charge of enforcing the Hatch Act before 1979. The Civil Service Reform Act of 1978 transferred the commission's investigative and prosecuting authority to the Office of the Special Counsel.
