New MICOM commander happy to be in Alabama

Maj. Gen. Peter Burbules expressed happiness at finally getting an assignment in Alabama while Maj. Gen. Jerry Max Bunyard promised to someday return to Huntsville during MICOM's change of command ceremony Friday.

"Mrs. Burbules joins me in saying we are delighted to be in the great state of Alabama, finally," said Burbules, the new commander of MICOM and Redstone Arsenal. He joked that he had once set his sights on being assigned to the Anniston (Ala.) Army Depot,

but "pulled the trigger and ended up in Tooele Army Depot" in Utah.

Burbules praised Bunyard for his leadership here during the past two years which he said has set "tremendous goals for me to try to meet and exceed." He turned to Gen. Richard Thompson, commander of Army Materiel Command, and thanked him for his confidence in naming him as Bunyard's successor. "I won't let you down," he said.

He then had words for the Missile Command's people. "I ask you to give me the same fine support that

you gave to General Bunyard, and if you do that I have no doubt I'll meet the goals I've set for myself," Burbules said.

Bunyard, who leaves to become assistant deputy chief of staff for research, development and acquisition at the Pentagon, spoke of the closing of one chapter and the opening of another.

"Today marks a major milestone in the history of the Army Missile Command," Bunyard said. He called the commander's job here a "two hat" command—one to lead the Missile Command, and the other to lead Redstone Arsenal which includes 19 tenants.

The MICOM motto is "Excellence in missilery," Bunyard said, adding that Burbules will find many professionals here who will help him back up that motto. The people, he said, are "what makes it happen."

He encouraged the people to support Burbules as a new chapter opens at MICOM.

"We wish you Godspeed," Bunyard said, "and we look forward to coming back to Huntsville some day."

Thompson, the commander of Army Materiel Command, traced Redstone Arsenal's history of contributions. "Your record here at Redstone Arsenal is a long and distinguished one," Thompson said. From 250 employees in 1950, it expanded to a peak of 17,000 in 1960 when the space mission was transferred to NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center. "The string of missile and rocket advances which you have engineered during the last 25 years is indeed impressive," he said.

Thompson praised Bunyard for his leadership and listed the command's accomplishments during the past two years. The number of systems deployed to soldiers in the field has grown from 13 to 19; MICOM has exceeded the Army's 90 percent operational readiness goal; and Bunyard led a technical team that successfully investigated the accidental ignition of a Pershing II missile. Thompson also praised Celia Bunyard for being "a great Army wife" and wished the Bunyards "continued health and happiness in their new assignment."

"If we have to change commanders, I can think of no better commander to change the flag to," he said, referring to Burbules.

As a surprise gesture Thompson called Celia Bunyard to the podium to give her an outstanding civilian service medal. "I wouldn't want Celia to go

Burbules began Army career in 1952

The new commander at MICOM is a Chicago native who entered the Army as an enlisted man in November 1952.

Maj. Gen. Peter G. Burbules, 53, was graduated from the Infantry Officer Candidate School and was commissioned in the Ordnance Corps on May 5, 1954.

He served in many ammunition assignments, including tours at Fort Huachuca from 1954-57; Korea from 1957-58; Defense Atomic Support Agency, 1958-61; Turkey, 1962-65; Vietnam, 1967-68; and as commander of the Cornhusker Army Ammunition Plant, 1968-69.

From 1965-67 Burbules served in the project manager's office, general purpose vehicles. He commanded the Support Battalion of the 172nd Arctic Light Infantry Brigade in Alaska from 1971-73.

His next assignment was in the office of the chief of staff as a weapon system analyst from 1973-74. This was followed by a tour as executive officer, systems review and analysis office, ODCSRDA, with concurrent duty as the executive secretary, Army Systems Acquisition Review Council. Burbules served as the chairman of the joint fuze task group under the cognizance of the joint logistics commanders in 1976-77. He then commanded Tooele Army Depot

from 1977-79, and was promoted to brigadier general in 1979. He was then assigned as deputy commanding general of the Armament Materiel Readiness Command from 1979-82.

Subsequently assigned as the first deputy executive director for conventional ammunition at DARCOM headquarters from 1982-83, Burbules was promoted to major general in September 1983. He assumed command of the Armament, Munitions and Chemical Command on Oct. 27, 1983.

Burbules received a bachelors degree under the Bootstrap program at the University of Omaha in 1962, and a masters degree in business from Babson College in 1970. He is a 1971 graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and a 1976 graduate of the Naval War College.

His awards include the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster.

He and his wife Jacqueline have a son, Kevin, and a daughter, Donna. His hobbies include an interest in ancient history, archeology and antiquities, skiing, golf and fishing.



Magazines moved

Editor:

Responding to *The Mailbox* letter in last week's issue of the *Redstone Rocket*, entitled "Smut Magazines," I want all members of the community to know that their local post exchange fully endorses the views expressed by the writer, which are those representative of any concerned adult.

By the time this letter is in print, the following actions will have been completed: Every AAFES employee here on Redstone Arsenal will have seen the letter referred to posted on the activity bulletin board, and it will be accompanied by a copy of this reply. The employees in the three retail outlets that sell magazines will have received personal training from their supervisors as to the common sense approach they must take to restrict, to the greatest degree possible, the access that minors have to such material. The magazines in the shoppette will be relocated to the closest possible point adjacent to the cash registers— something which in itself will be a deterrent to minors.

The entire matter of restricting access of publicly deemed unsuitable literature and other merchandise prohibited by law— such as tobacco products and beer —from minors, will be subject to top exchange management and floor level supervisory attention.

As the exchange manager, and the senior AAFES representative here on Redstone Arsenal, I want to be very clear on where I and my entire management and supervisory staff stand on any matter of concern to any customer or organization. Immediately upon being made aware of a complaint, a complete review of all factors presented and available is made, and when a

conclusion is arrived at, immediate action is taken— either in the form of action as requested, a compromise, or a personal explanation, behind which I stand, as to why a request cannot be complied with. Never to my knowledge has the exchange been guilty of unresponsiveness. Our corrective actions generally occur within 24 hours, and if not within that time, they are completed as soon as is possible.

Our responses are most effective when the complaint is brought to us directly, because we can immediately obtain all the facts from the person expressing concern, and at the same time go to the employee responsible. Usually we accomplish on-the-spot corrections.

To the unhappy MMD employee seeking a lateral transfer (*Redstone Rocket*, July 31), I would like to set the record straight. First, we do care about our employees and their work environment. Morale, challenging duties, rewards, and professional growth are at the top of our priorities.

Second, your accusation of widespread low morale does not track. Just look at the many achievements by the people of MMD, who at the drop of a hat will work long hours at great personal sacrifice to assure the mission gets done to the fullest from supplying critical spare parts to loading depot maintenance requirements to deploying new missile systems. The list is endless. The jobs in MMD are tough, demanding, pressure filled, and highly responsible; we recognize that, but that is the nature of our mission.

By the way, our percentage is average for a MICOM organization, and I submit that several on the list are there for other than morale reasons to include professional development, promotion potential, or simply looking for a different challenge.

Granted all organizations will have their ups and downs, and I admit that ours does too. But I can assure you we are pledged to working the problem. I extend a personal invitation to help you with yours. My door and my deputy's, as well as the director, Missile Logistics Center, are always open to all. The bottom line is we do care.



Cougars win two games to stay in first place

The first-place Cougars took two wins in civilian softball action July 30 through Aug. 1.

In other games, Stallions beat F&A 9-4, MIA clobbered RADS 13-6, T&E edged MLC 8-6, COE slid past Patriot 11-10, BMD beat Pershing 18-14, DED blasted High Noon 29-19, MIA stopped Express 8-3, F&A nosed out MLC 16-14, and Stallions defeated T&E 9-3.

Don Tiller went two for two with three RBIs to lead the Cougars' attack against Express. Dewitt Palmore homered and singled to drive in two runs. Steve Kestler and Stan Williams added two RBIs while Carl Leslie and Lenord Hatcher each went three for four. Hatcher was winning pitcher. For the Express, Edgardo Ortiz hit three for three, Tim Meert tripled and homered to bring in two runs, James Cox hit two for four, James Fletcher went two for three, and Fred Martin singled and doubled.

In the Cougars' win over RADS, Don Tiller and Dewitt Palmore led the way as Tiller batted three for three and Palmore drove in three more runs. Lenord Hatcher went two for three and was winning pitcher.

Ken Moore and Matt Jones each batted three for four and drove in a run for the Stallions against F&A. Pete Barnes went two for four including a double and an RBI. Jerry Williams hit two for four. Accounting for RBIs were Glen Goodnight with two, Jim Chiarizio and Bob Colgan, one each. For F&A, Emmett Mathis went three for four, Jeff Mitchell batted two for three, and Freddie Teague hit two for three including a double. Also for F&A, Ronnie Shoulders, Buddy Garner and Harold Jacobs each went two for four, with Mr. J delivering a double. DeWayne Kelly brought in another run.

John Womack hit a triple and went three for four to lead MIA over RADS. Barry McClure contributed a double and also batted three for four. Bryan Craft delivered two for three while Don Carver went two for four. Ken McCormick homered and Clay Peake tripled bringing in two runs. For RADS, Donny Smith went three for four, Jerry Arzeman and Johnny Kastanakis each hit two for four, and Scott Howard batted two for three.

T&E and MLC both played a good offensive and defensive game, but T&E's persistence paid off for the win. Randy Phillips led T&E by batting four for four. Following closely behind were Earl Shirley, Raymond Deep and Bobby Bates, who all delivered three for four. For MLC, Greg Bliss and Rick Fuller each batted three for four with Fuller delivering a set of triples and bringing in two runs. Bob Johnson and Dave Bryant went two for four with Johnson delivering two RBIs. Phillip Dussault hit two for three while Billy Spencer drove in a run.

John Romeo led COE to victory over Patriot by hitting four for four. Larry Smith, James Mitchell and Gregory Wirt each went three for four with Smith slugging a home run. Wayne Coggins and Tom Norton each delivered a single and a double. For Patriot, Tom Erickson batted three for four, Dirk Siron, Ron Hall and Steve Nelson each went two for four with Nelson delivering a single and double; Brian Hunter hit two for three and Don Marcotte blasted a homer.

BMD's John Troup hit four for five to lead his team over Pershing. Bob Teetz batted two for two, while George Wells and Gary Ceccihini each went two for three. George Gilbert, Horace Garner, Chuck Holbart and Scott Hokrman went one for two. Steve Rogers and Ed Chandler each hit three for five. Pitcher Ed Chandler has won seven games and lost only one since he started pitching for BMD. He was chosen the team's most valuable player for this year. For Pershing, Steve Ansley and Charlie Mitchell each batted three for five; and Harley Harben, Chester Domaracki and Charlie Borum all went two for four.

Max Vaughn slammed two homers and a double and went six for six to lead DED over High Noon. Todd Honeycutt and Kevin Gray each batted four for six with Honeycutt blasting a double and triple. Dave Baginski and Eric Borg batted three for six with Baginski delivering a triple. Steve Russell hit four for five while Chris Pettit went three for five. For High Noon, Russell Cooper batted five for five including two doubles. Len Farbman followed with four for five and another double. Charley Nickell, Mike Fowler and Mark Rowland each delivered three for five with Fowler hitting a double. Judy Nickell went two for four.

Perry Pederson and Buddy Lewis powered MIA over the Express. Both went two for four with Pederson delivering a double and driving in a run, and Lewis also delivering an RBI. Jack Cunningham drove in two runs and Doug Wheatly slammed a two-run triple. For the Express, Charlie Mellies and Randy Allen went two for three and earned RBIs. John Pea delivered a single and double while James Fletcher blasted a double. Tim Meert earned another RBI.

With only eight players, MLC made a stand against

F&A but came up two runs short. Leading F&A were Tony Acklin and Ronnie Shoulders who each batted four for five with Acklin adding a triple to his list of hits. Emmett Mathis and Ricky Prince each hit a double and went three for five. Randy Pate tripled in a three-for-four day. Freddie Teague batted two for three and Jeff Mitchell sacrificed for an RBI. For MLC, Don Jordan went five for five, Juanez Alexander hit four for four, William Strickland delivered three for five, Rick Fuller batted three for six, and Jim Owens hit two for four.

No details were available on the Stallions' win over T&E. Rainout games which were scheduled for July 29 are rescheduled for Aug. 8.

In games played July 22-26, Stallions edged MIA 10-9, T&E nosed out Express 9-8, Patriot beat Pershing 5-3, F&A whipped RADS 21-10, the Cougars clobbered MLC 15-2, RADS slid past Express 20-19, T&E plastered F&A 14-9, MIA hammered the Cougars 11-5, Stallions whipped MLC 18-9, and BMD shut out COE 17-0. Games scheduled for July 24 were rained out and rescheduled for Aug. 8, same time.

This month in history

- 44 years ago:** Col. Rollo C. Ditto was assigned as the first commander of the Huntsville Arsenal and broke ground for construction of the chemical manufacturing facility on the 38,000 acre tract of land located west of Patton Road (Aug. 4, 1941).
- 41 years ago:** The road running east and west connecting Rideout Road and the Huntsville Arsenal Airport was named Hale Road in honor of 1st Lt. Emmett J. Hale (Aug. 10, 1944). Hale was one of the first officers to test incendiary bombs at the Huntsville Arsenal Airport and gave his life in the performance of this duty on June 27, 1944.
- 32 years ago:** The Army's first successful heavy ballistic missile, the Redstone, was launched at the Atlantic Missile Range (Aug. 20, 1953).
- 28 years ago:** The first scale-model Jupiter nose cone was recovered from outer space (August 1957).
- 27 years ago:** The first Jupiter intermediate range ballistic missile, developed by the Ar-

my Ballistic Missile Agency, was delivered to the U.S. Air Force for overseas deployment (Aug. 28, 1958).

- 25 years ago:** ●The first Basic Hawk unit was deployed in the continental U.S. (August 1960). ●The first known intercept of a Mach-3 missile by a missile took place at White Sands Missile Range on Aug. 12, 1960, when a Nike Hercules missile sought out and destroyed its missile counterpart, an incoming Nike Hercules.
- 23 years ago:** The Army Ordnance Missile Command was abolished and its mission and personnel were transferred to the newly activated U.S. Army Missile Command, located at Redstone Arsenal and assigned to the U.S. Army Materiel Command, successor of the Office, Chief of Ordnance (Aug. 1, 1962).
- 20 years ago:** The Office of the Project Manager, SAM-D (Surface-to-Air Missile Development) was established (Aug. 16, 1965). The SAM-D was renamed the Patriot on May 21, 1976.

Running track should be finished in October

Physical training may be a little more enjoyable for Redstone's soldiers when a new running track under construction near Patton Road is completed.

The 400-meter track will replace a quarter mile cinder track at the physical training area at the corner of Patton and Gray Roads.

"The new track will be eight lanes, asphalt based, with a one-inch resilient track surface," said Keith Copeland of Facilities Engineers.


Joe Hopkins, physical activities director of the Morale and Welfare Division, said that in addition to being used by troops for training, the track will be used to add another event to the Commander's Cup

competition, which currently includes softball, basketball, volleyball, tennis and flag football. Track events will be added this fall.

Individuals should be able to use the track if they wish, as long as it's not being used for training or other official purposes, Hopkins said.

"There may be some people who are running on the road now who would like to use the track, but street running and track running are different. Runners who use the road like to run there, and may not like a track," he said.

The track, which is being built to conform with American Track Federation standards, is scheduled for completion in October.



Spill cleanup continues, reclaiming oil is under study

The cleanup of a big oil spill that occurred three weeks ago is continuing here while officials ponder what to do with thousands of gallons of oil and water mixture that was caught and put in storage tanks.

This mixture is being held in tanks south of Neal Road in the NASA area. It was pumped from a trench dug to intercept and contain a 60,000 gallon fuel oil spill caused by an open valve that allowed oil to run out of a large tank into a smaller one which overflowed.

About half of the spilled oil was held within a dike at the foot of the tank. It was salvaged but is contaminated with dirt. The other 30,000 gallons seeped into the ground.

A 300-foot-long trench was cut downhill from the

spill to capture the underground oil. As oil and ground water oozed into the trench, it was pumped into tank trucks and hauled to storage.

As many as three trucks operating around the clock were needed to keep the trench pumped out but now the inflow of oil appears to have slowed some and last week only one pumper truck was needed to keep the trench clean.

Monitoring of test wells and nearby surface water sources indicates that the underground spill was contained by the trench and as of Friday had not spread beyond the immediate area of the tank.

The oil is of a type burned in steam plants here. There are processes by which water can be removed from the oil, rendering it usable, according to Bill Schroder, arsenal environmental coordinator.

"We're looking at ways to reclaim what we've got but at this point I don't know how we will do it or who will do it," said Schroder.

The solution that looks most attractive right now is to run the mixture through a separator since this process salvages the oil.

Schroder said on-site separation service is available commercially. He has talked to one operator who said the oil is OK to use after the water is removed from it. "He said you have almost a pure product again."

There is also a process that will cleanse the 30,000 gallons of oil that stayed above ground but became contaminated with dirt, Schroder said.

The oil spill occurred July 16 at the "tank farm" storage lot south of building 5681.

marked scouting's 75th anniversary with the theme "The spirit lives on." Activities included marksmanship, archery, science fair, canoeing, pioneering, and Indian lore, among others.

"This is something that only happens every four years and the boys have to work hard to qualify," said Peggy Morrow, Patrick's mother.

Requirements for boys to attend as delegates include: They must be a registered scout at least 12 years old (but will not reach their 18th birthday by Sept. 1); and must be a Second Class scout.

Willis, the scoutmaster here, said his troop consists of 38 scouts. He pointed out that three recently completed their requirements for Eagle Scout. They include David Lance, 15, Bill Wilson, 16, and John Paro, 17. Two others—Donnie Butler and Marc Thibault, both 15—did a community project in which they cleaned up and repaired equipment in the nine playgrounds in the arsenal's housing area, Willis said.

"That was quite a lot of work," he added. "Each boy to become an Eagle must do a major project for his community and that's what they chose to do. They (Butler and Thibault) still have merit badges to earn."

Army will exploit space activities

The Army's significant and historic role in space is continuing with an "Army space policy" issued by Secretary of the Army John O. Marsh Jr. and Army Chief of Staff Gen. John A. Wickham Jr.

They signed an Army space policy document June 5 which "emphasizes the increasing importance of space for accomplishing the Army's missions."

Here is the text of the document:

"Since the '60s, space has become increasingly important to our national interests, joining the traditional land, sea and air dimensions of national defense. Space is host to advanced systems critical to this nation's security. Space systems already make essential contributions to airland combat operations and can play an even greater role in Army missions. Future Army operational doctrine must capitalize on emerging space capabilities.

"Consistent with national and Department of Defense policies and in cooperation with other services and agencies, the Department of the Army will exploit space activities that contribute to the successful execution of Army missions. The Army supports assured access to space and will use space capabilities to enhance the accomplishments of strategic, operational and tactical missions.

"Successful implementation of this policy will require development of a pool of Army space expertise and judicious planning, to include development of concepts, requirements and a long-term management strategy. Army plans and evolving space architecture must capitalize on national and joint programs, preserving options to support initiatives that fulfill Army requirements.

"Implementation of this policy demands a visionary outlook to exploit fully evolving space capabilities."

Contaminated fish may await unsuspecting anglers

Public health and environmental officials are still debating whether some local waters need signs warning of contaminated fish and who should post them.

The signs issue surfaced most recently at a June 20 meeting of the federal review panel overseeing the Olin Corp.'s court-ordered clean-up of DDT in Huntsville Spring Branch on Redstone Arsenal.

The idea of warning signs first came up in 1977 when the Army Environmental Hygiene Agency ran tests on fish in Huntsville Spring Branch, Indian Creek and the nearby Tennessee River and announced that DDT rendered them "unfit for human consumption". The Environmental Protection Agency then issued a public warning that they should not be eaten. The Food and Drug Administration banned their sale in interstate commerce.


The federal agencies — the EPA, TVA, FDA, Army and Fish and Wildlife Service — adopted the position that the responsibility for putting up signs rested not with them but with the state. The state, for its part, questioned the risk the fish pose and the need for signs and said, in effect, that federal agencies created the fish issue and should put their own signs up if they think they're needed.

Acting independently, Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge went ahead and posted a sign on Indian Creek at Triana warning "Fish in These Waters are Heavily Contaminated with DDT. Eat Them at Your Own Risk".

Meanwhile, ongoing tests show that fish in Huntsville Spring Branch, Indian Creek and the Tennessee River near Redstone Arsenal are still contaminated, some heavily so, yet unsuspecting people continue to catch and eat fish from these waters which include the arsenal's river recreation areas.

The military recreation area and campground is a popular fishing spot for soldiers and their families. It hosted a few weeks ago a "Take a Kid Fishing" contest.

The review panel reached no decision on signs at the June 20 meeting but indicated it would keep the eight-year-old issue under consideration.



Chaplain Swim plans to keep current program afloat

The new post chaplain here says he hopes to continue a successful program.

Chaplain (Col.) Vernon Swim took over for Chaplain (Col.) Delbert Gremmels who retired from the Army at the end of July.

"I don't have any plans to make any changes at this time," Swim says. "I know Chaplain Gremmels and I know everywhere he's been it's been a smooth operation so I assume there's little need for changes at this point. So my plan is to keep going with the program that is in place. I'm sure that it's a good program."

The chaplaincy here has more programs going on than most installations this size, according to Swim. He says it is a "very fine religious ministry team" which has "obviously had outstanding support from the command at all levels."

Swim, 50, previously served as chief of the department of ministry at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

He was born in Jefferson City, Mo., lived for a while in Pine Bluff, Ark., and spent most of his formative years in Hutchinson, Kan., where his parents still reside. His father Floyd, 85, is a now-retired chemist with Morton Salt Company. His mother Irene, 82, never worked outside the home except for church activities, he says. He has an older brother, Leroy, who is a chemist at Dow Chemical Company in Midland, Mich.; and a younger sister, Charlotte, who is married and resides in Hutchinson.

"When I was a senior in high school, I felt God called me to the ministry," Swim says. "And at that same time, I really didn't know anything about the chaplaincy but I felt God was also calling me to do that ministry in the military chaplaincy."

After he was graduated from high school in 1953, Swim attended Bethany (Okla.) Nazarene College. He majored in religion, minored in psychology, and received a bachelor's degree in 1957. Swim went on to the Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City. He was ordained as a minister in the Church of the Nazarene upon receiving a master of divinity degree in 1961. While attending the seminary he was pastoring a church part-time in Lawson, Mo. He went on to pastor a church in Orangevale, Calif., from May-December 1961.

Swim joined the Army as a first lieutenant chaplain in January 1962. After the basic chaplain course, he served as assistant post chaplain at the Presidio of San

Francisco. He went on to become an infantry brigade chaplain in Korea, an artillery division chaplain at Fort Carson, Colo., and a hospital chaplain in Germany. He first met his wife at Fort Carson where she was an Army nurse. They were married in 1967. When Swim served as a hospital chaplain in Germany from 1967-70 his wife was a pediatrics nurse there. She left the service when their son was born.

From 1971-72 Swim served a year in Vietnam as brigade chaplain for the 18th Military Police Brigade. He spent most of his time as a prison chaplain in Long Binh, ministering to hundreds of American soldiers. Most had drug-related charges.

"It was one of the most meaningful assignments that I've had because the prisoners were people with a great deal of needs, to include deep spiritual needs," Swim recalls. "And we had a full chapel every service

that we had, standing room only. Those who couldn't come to the chapel, who were in isolation, my assistant and I would go to them to conduct services."

After returning to the states, he earned a master's degree in marriage and family counseling from Chapman College in Orange, Calif. He became licensed in California as a marriage and family therapist. From 1973-76 he served at Fort Lee, Va., as a chaplain who did marriage and family counseling and also was a member of the drug and alcohol abuse team. He taught and developed courses in marriage and family counseling at the Army chaplains school on Staten Island, N.Y., from 1976-79.

Swim was director of the U.S. Forces Religious Retreat Center in Berchtesgaden, Germany, from 1979-82. "We had over 10,000 retreatants annually," he says. He spent the next three years as chief of the department of ministry at Walter Reed.

"We had two chapels there (at Walter Reed)," he says, "one in the main hospital and one community chapel on the grounds." The hospital had from 800-850 patients, 13 military chaplains, five civilian clergy, and a clinical pastoral education program with 10 chaplain residents.

At Redstone, Swim leads a staff of seven chaplains (including himself and a captain due to arrive Sept. 25). Lt. Col. Delbert Payne is senior pastor at Bicentennial Chapel while Maj. Frank Turnbow is senior pastor at Post Chapel. The others include Maj. Russell Walker, at Post Chapel; Lt. Col. Dennis Slater, the Catholic priest at Bicentennial Chapel; and Lt. Col. Ronald Bynum, who works with the drug and alcohol program.

Swim and his wife Shirley have a son Bradley, 15, and a daughter Verna, 13. "The only other family member is a Shetland sheepdog named Scottie," Swim quips.

In his spare time Swim enjoys reading and playing basketball and tennis. "I played basketball on an intramural team at Walter Reed, I don't go as fast or jump as high as I used to," he says with a laugh.

Perhaps he plans to continue successfully in that area, too.

Music was provided by the 14th U.S. Army Band from Fort McClellan, Ala., which ended the program with the AMC march "Share the Pride" and "The Army Song."





'Officer Friendly' has fun teaching safety to children

There may be some soldiers who don't like the Army, but Sgt. Carl Cannon doesn't want to know about them. He thinks it might spoil his fun.

Cannon, who enlisted in 1979, intended to stay in only for three years, but he enjoyed the Army so much, he decided to make it his career. He's a member of the 291st Military Police Company, and he's Redstone's NCO of the Quarter.

"I joined for the education. Everywhere you go, they say you need experience, and it's so easy to get here. And I like being a cop. Sometimes it's not too rewarding, but it's needed," he said.

Cannon's father, Charles, is a policeman in their hometown of Peoria, Ill. He was named policeman of the year for Peoria in 1983, Cannon said.

Some of Redstone's younger residents know Cannon as "Officer Friendly." He teaches safety to grade school kids through formal lectures and through work with youth activities. Cannon, who arrived at the end of the school year, ran a similar program at Fort Rucker, Ala.

"Kids basically are afraid of someone with a gun. I'll show kids that some people use a weapon to their benefit," said the 25-year-old soldier. He added that he teaches children that police officers should always try to avoid using their guns, but sometimes they have no choice. He wants kids to think of police officers as their friends.

"It makes them feel safe, and it's fun— it's a lot of fun. It's rewarding when kids come up and give you a

hug— you know they've learned something," he said. Cannon will work with teachers to present programs that teachers have seen a need for.

"I'll teach bike safety, how to walk to school safely, stranger danger, just about anything the teacher thinks the kids need. Officer Friendly works for the teacher," he said.

Officer Friendly will also be highly visible at youth sports activities. Cannon plans to coach youth basketball, baseball and football.

"I like to coach," he said. "If I can be there on the field with the kids every day, they'll know they can call and get help if they need it."

Cannon plans to start a military police cadet group here next summer. Activities will include field trips, parties, service projects and demonstrations of police procedures.

Although his military career has been rewarding, one of the biggest honors was being selected NCO of the Quarter, Cannon said.

"It was a super honor. I had never appeared before a board of all command sergeant majors— the elite— that's intimidating. And when they say you're the best among the NCOs, that's the best!" he exclaimed.

Cannon has one brother and four sisters. One sister, Ramona, 17, is thinking about joining the Army.

Cannon is working on a bachelor's degree in child psychology. He would like to be a counselor someday. He and his wife, Melinda, have a daughter, Summer, who is 22 months old.

Army accepting applications for law school program

The program is open to second lieutenants through captains with at least two, but no more than six years of service at the time legal training begins.

Those who want to apply should immediately register for the fall offering of the law school admis-

sion test, according to the staff judge advocate's office. Completed applications must be sent through channels (including the officer's branch manager in Military Personnel Center) to arrive at the office of the judge advocate general by Nov. 1.





Some payments resume for General Dynamics

The Defense Department announced July 30 that it had resumed some of the expense payments to General Dynamics that were being withheld pending an investigation into the company's billing practices.

About \$100 million in expense payments withheld from the company on order of Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger has been released but another \$337.8 million in claimed expenses is still in dispute and payment is being held up pending the outcome of audits, according to the Pentagon.

General Dynamics came under scrutiny last March after Pentagon auditors revealed the company had billed the government million of dollars in questionable "overhead" expenses that included political and advertising expenses, babysitting services, company parties, a kennel bill, and private travel for company executives.

As a result of these and other revelations, Weinberger introduced a get-tough policy requiring contractors to sign a "certificate of overhead costs" in which they certified under penalty of perjury that their claimed expenses are not illegal and are necessary to national defense.

In a recent case, the Navy since May has withheld about \$1 billion in payments on shipbuilding contracts until General Dynamics ceases "maximizing profits" and adopts a "rigorous code of ethics" for dealing with the government.

General Dynamics is one of the nations largest defense contractors and is a major contractor to the Missile Command.

In other contracting developments, McDonnell Douglas Corp. announced Thursday a refund policy on sales of spare parts and support equipment to the U.S. government and foreign military sales customers.

Under this refund policy, spare parts built by McDonnell Douglas and purchased from the company under prime contracts may be returned within six months of delivery for refund if the customer is unhappy with the price.

The Pentagon has accepted offers from General Electric and the Boeing Co. to provide full credit or refund for any spare part they deliver that subsequently is determined to be unfairly priced.

All three of the refunders have had some of their dealings with the government called into question recently: McDonnell Douglas for billing the Pentagon for legal fees incurred in a court battle with a competitor; General Electric for defrauding the government on a nuclear warhead contract; and Boeing for billing the Pentagon for political contributions and overpricing of small parts.

On July 23 Weinberger ordered Pentagon officials to get written refund guarantees from defense contractors for spare parts that are determined to be overpriced.



Logistics program helps career advancement

The Noncommissioned Officer Logistics Program (NCOLP) is a program that provides the commander in the field with a well trained and knowledgeable NCO who possesses the ability to work in two or more logistics subfields.

The objectives of the NCOLP are: (1) to select and train highly qualified NCOs for key logistics management positions which require technical knowledge of two or more logistics functions, and (2) to professionally develop these NCOs for assignment into key positions as a training base for immediate use in the mobilization expansion of the Army Logistics system.

Held at Fort Lee, Va. over nine weeks, the course

covers the techniques and managerial aspects of integrating logistical functions at each level of command in which a member may serve. Attendance at the school is managed by career fields and is normally in conjunction with a PCS move.

"The course gives an overview of the entire logistic field," said Sgt. Maj. Daniel H. Pierce, logistics program monitor for the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School. "In my opinion the advantage of becoming a NCOLP member is that it will enhance career development as well as assure that key positions are filled by the best qualified NCOs. The most challenging logistics slots in the Army are LP (logistics program), and by excelling in these positions your achievements are more visible."

The prerequisites for enrolling in the NCOLP are covered in AR 614-200. However the program has recently been revamped and two changes have been made. Now personnel must be E-7 or above, previously it was E-6 or above. Also personnel must now have an SQT score (if applicable) of 75, previously it was 60.

There are 38 different MOSs currently in the program, and according to Pierce, some of the MOSs currently below strength are: 21L, 24V, 27B, 27G, 27Z, 63Z, and 64Z.
