Soviet inspectors visit Redstone

Inspectors eat American food, comment about hot weather during visit

History was made at Redstone Arsenal at about 9:20 a.m. Saturday when a C-141 carrying 20 Soviet inspectors and their U.S. escorts touched down at the airfield.

The Soviet men, two 10-member teams, shook hands with awaiting officials and waved to reporters before boarding two Army buses. Their first visit to Redstone was part of the on-site inspections agreed to in order to ensure compliance with the Intermediate Nuclear Forces Treaty between the U.S. and Soviet Union.

Pershing II, managed at Redstone, is among the intermediate range nuclear missiles the countries have agreed to eliminate under the INF treaty.

"No problems that I'm aware of, everything seems to be going perfectly," said Air Force Capt. Jack Giese, a public affairs officer assigned to the U.S. On-Site Inspection Agency (OSIA).

The two Soviet inspection teams that arrived here were part of four groups—a total of 40 Soviets—who came to the U.S. last week to tour eastern U.S. sites. The first group went to Fort Sill at Lawton, Okla. the second group went to Longhorn Army Depot at Marshall, Texas; and the other two groups came to Redstone. These initial visits were "baseline" inspections, to verify data exchanged between the two sides. Similar inspections are being conducted by the U.S. at Soviet sites. "We're just checking each other's numbers," explained Air Force Capt. Matt Durham, an OSIA public affairs officer.

At about 5 a.m. Saturday, the Soviet inspectors said they wanted to travel to Redstone to see two of the three sites designated for their review here. These include a launcher repair facility, and a missile storage area where less than six Pershing motor stages are stored, according to Dave Harris, public affairs officer for the Missile Command.

The two Soviet teams came here from Dulles International Airport in Washington. The two OSIA

spokesmen— Giese of south Texas and Durham of Lexington, Ky. —talked with reporters who were cordoned off from the airplane and buses at Redstone airfield.

"Under the treaty, we can be here 24 hours plus eight if they'd like to stay another eight," Giese said. In response to questions, he said the Soviets had made no comments to him and that they were resting during the long flight.

Reporters were allowed to take photos of the inspectors' arrival and departure at the airfield. They were

not permitted to accompany the Soviets during the inspection. On June 13 news media representatives were given a preview of what the Soviets would see here.

On Sunday, the Soviets were bused to the airfield for their return trip to Washington about 3:30 p.m. "We had a 24-hour inspection," Giese said. The Soviets finished inspecting the launcher repair facility at 10 a.m. and the missile storage area at 10:10, he said. They ate hamburgers and hot dogs for lunch.

"I can tell you one thing," Giese said, in response to questions about the Soviets. "They said it was hot."

Fraud alleged

Commander orders review of contract performance

Maj. Gen. August Cianciolo has ordered his new command to conduct a complete review of base support contract performance to determine if contractor charges have been misrepresented and inflated.

Allegations that contractors providing support services to Redstone Arsenal have committed criminal acts, that include keeping two sets of books and throwing supplies into the Tennessee River to cover false labor charges, were aired last week in hearings before the House Committee on Government Operations.

The panel heard that a General Accounting Office investigation of Holmes & Narver/Morrison-Knudsen and its support contractors "revealed evidence of a pattern of abuse...including illegal activities..."

Some of the evidence originally was surfaced by MICOM workers who passed their information to the CID which has been probing some of the allegations for more than a year.

Cianciolo directed that initial focus of the support contracting review at MICOM be on the contractor's first year of performance since payments during that period formed the basis for the current contract the command has with H&N/M-K.

In an unrelated development, MICOM has decided not to exercise its fifth and final renewal option with H&N/M-K in fiscal 1990. The contract will be re-competed but not under the all-encompassing "um-

brella" concept currently used. Instead, the umbrella is being reduced to about half its present size by breaking out and competing separately about a dozen functions now covered by it.

Redstone Arsenal contracted support services to H&N/M-K in 1985 with an expected five-year savings of \$7.9 million but instead has incurred a cost increase that would amount to more than \$100 million over the same period of time.

Cost of the contract has escalated as H&N/M-K has been granted additional payments to cover an increased workload and other tasks not well delineated in the scope of work on which the contract was bid. In its first year of performance, the company received an \$18 million increase in a negotiated settlement.

In the congressional hearings last week, David C. Williams of the GAO Office of Special Investigations leveled these allegations at H&N/M-K or its sub-contractors:

—Time sheets were falsified to overstate labor hours, for example a 45-minute job was charged 23 hours of work, and contractor management officials instructed idle workers to hide from government inspectors.

—Building supplies that had to be expended to cover falsified labor charges were taken by employees or

given away or discarded in dumpsters or thrown in the Tennessee River.

—The government was overcharged 5,000 hours each year for vehicle oil changes and chassis lubrication.

—No-show employees and \$86,000 in non-existent repair parts were charged to the government by a sub-contractor who also submitted counterfeit bills for cars leased from a fictitious firm.

—A sub-contractor maintaining communications equipment grossly inflated labor costs, charged for non-existent equipment and repair parts and maintenance that was never performed, and substituted cheaper parts after billing the government for more expensive ones.

—A third sub-contractor gained a \$4 million contract modification on which it realized a \$1.5 million profit by not performing to terms of the contract and awarded its project manager a \$200,000 bonus equaling five times his annual salary.

The sub-contractors under investigation were identified by GAO as Gradwell Company Inc. of Huntsville, Mercury Consolidated of Virginia and Navatex Laboratories Inc. of Texas.

Information developed in probes by CID and GAO will be turned over to a U.S. Attorney for a determination. (See Fraud, cont'd on Page 2)

The smoking public

Editor:

The Surgeon General (U.S. government) has declared that tobacco is a dangerous drug. The Department of Agriculture (U.S. government) pays subsidies to farmers to grow tobacco. The military (U.S. government) placed free cigarettes in my rations for over 20 years, and exhorted me to "smoke if you've got them" during that time. The Army (U.S. government) states that smokers will have "designated areas" in which to smoke. Some commanders (U.S. government) have decided that a "designated area" will be outside, despite the fact that smokers supposedly have weaker lungs and would thus be exposed to extreme cold/heat/rain/snow, and resultant pneumonia and other diseases.

What are the facts? Let's take the Northwest Airline commercials that ballyhooed banning smoking on all domestic flights, when the U.S. government made the smoking ban on flights of two hours or less. An Eastern Airlines response was that Northwest had no domestic flights over two hours, so they were banning for commercial purposes what was already banned! How bad is "second hand" smoke? Studies by the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health in 203 office buildings concluded that tobacco smoke was a significant contributor to poor indoor air quality in only 2 percent of the buildings studied. The "sick building syndrome" occurs when a building is sealed so tight—in an effort to reduce energy costs—that enough fresh air doesn't get in. The same polluted air is recycled. Symptoms resulting from these pollutants are often mistakenly thought to be caused by tobacco smoke. In a typical restaurant, a non-smoker would have to spend 420 hours to be exposed to the amount of smoke equivalent to one cigarette. A person in the non-smoking area of an airliner requires 224 hours of non-stop flying to reach the exposure level of one cigarette.

"Experts" claim smokers use excessive sick leave and cost the government and big business billions. During the past eight years, I have averaged 41 hours per year of sick leave use. For sprained ankles, dental appointments, etc. I'll match that against some of the biggest non-smoking sick leave abusers at Redstone.

tion whether criminal prosecutions can be mounted.

"Our investigation also identified an unusual provision in contracts between the (H&N/M-K) joint venture and two of its sub-contractors," Williams' congressional testimony reads. "This provision called for subcontractors to split proceeds of labor-cost savings with the prime contractor. This would appear to encourage overestimates of costs to the government, and, if implemented, could be a violation of the Anti-Kickback Act.

"We also interviewed a former official of the joint venture," the testimony continues, "who stated that the contractor kept two sets of accounting books...one set was maintained for government review and the other to state actual profits."

The transcript also states that a MICOM official with contract oversight duties maintained a close association with a sub-contractor from whom he accepted gratuities and furnished sensitive procurement data. He was identified by GAO during the hearings as Bobby G. Sheppard.

GAO said also that it discovered in a separate investigation "criminal activity" in the way MICOM awarded contracts to small businesses, noting that the CID and FBI are investigating.

Still another investigation revealed "weaknesses" in MICOM's procurement system that possibly enabled government employees to steer bids to favored contractors and collude with them in preparing contract specifications and estimates. These weaknesses were surfaced and corrected by the command in 1986 and 1987.

"We found that the procurement system permitted the technical expert who prepared the contract specifications to evaluate bidders," according to testimony. "This practice would permit a single corrupt employee to customize specifications, then steer the bid to a select contractor."

Smokers are paying \$9 billion in taxes at the local, state, and national level. Tobacco is one of the most excessively taxed substances in the world. What will replace this money if tobacco is banned? Taxation of churches? How many studies have been conducted to determine the carcinogenic qualities of heavy perfume and deoderant? How much sick leave has been used recovering from jogging incidents? How much actual work time is used by joggers, and written off as "long lunches"?

When will the American smoking public start becoming activist in attitude like other minorities?



MICOM won't 'miss a step' under new commander

The Missile Command will continue to excel under its new commander Maj. Gen. Gus Cianciolo, according to the commanding general of higher headquarters.

"As Cianciolo takes command, I know you're not going to miss a step," Wagner said. "I know that he is going to continue the great tradition of the Missile Command."



Military services moving toward era of change

Technology and global politics are driving the Defense Department and the Navy toward an era of change, and the generation entering the services today must learn to deal with those changes, said Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci in his commencement address at the Naval Academy.

He cited the Strategic Defense Initiative and Stealth technology as two examples of how changes will come to the services in ways that cannot be comprehended today. Carlucci challenged the graduates to adapt the technologies to fit national security requirements. "You will confront daily the effects of change throughout your careers," he said. "What has not changed and what will not change are the special demands of the military profession for strength of character, stamina of will and soundness of judgment."

Carlucci said the graduates should not view the Strategic Defense Initiative as just another program fighting for scarce defense funds, but as a means of propelling the services into space. "What is far more relevant is how the ongoing debate over strategic defense, and the larger issue of the military's involve-

ment in space...., will affect tomorrow's vision of our naval forces and their roles and missions."

He said that imaginative thinking was needed to transform these technologies from the drawing board to actual defense applications.

Some naval thinking has embraced a technology normally associated with the Air Force: Stealth technology. Ship designs may differ radically from the ships of today's fleet. "These designs," said Carlucci, "could restore the surface combatant to an independent role as a significant strike element of the fleet just as it was two generations ago. We are only now beginning to look at the application of signature reduction technology to maritime warfare, but clearly it will revolutionize how we will employ our maritime forces."

Looking into the future, Carlucci said that the USSR will remain our principal adversary. While he welcomed the new Soviet willingness to speak with the West and efforts to reduce strategic nuclear arms, he said there has been no change in their military configuration. "We must judge our adversary not on what he says but on what he does," he said. "The Soviets say their doctrine has changed—from what to what is unclear. If it is defensive now, what was it when

(General Secretary Leonid) Brezhnev (who led the USSR from 1946 to 1982) was saying it was defensive?"

Carlucci said the United States should be wary about the Soviet Union even in times of good relations. "General Secretary (Mikhail) Gorbachev is looking for respite, but to what purpose?" he asked. "If it is to change Soviet society in a way that makes it less aggressive in its expansionist policies, then we will all have gained. On the other hand, if the West heeds the siren call and relaxes its security guard only to awaken to a rebirth of Soviet military power based on a modernized and technologically advanced industrial base, then we will have made an enormous miscalculation."

Another change the defense secretary said the services will have to contend with is the growing economic and political strength of the countries of Asia. The rise of Japan and the predicted rise of the People's Republic of China "...mean we must carefully construct our security relationship with these key participants in the world economic and political community."

Suggestion program alive and well

Money-saving ideas continue after big changes made to program

Last year's DA-directed reorganization of some Missile Command elements made big changes in the Army Suggestion Program here. Last October the program was removed from the Civilian Personnel Office's Incentive Awards Office and placed within the Productivity element of the Resource Management Directorate (formerly Comptroller Office).

There is also a new form for making suggestions.

That hasn't stopped Missile Command workers from submitting their ideas for improving the way MICOM does business, according to Pat Scroggins, coordinator for the program.

Almost 300 suggestions have been submitted this fiscal year, and 56 were adopted. Of those adopted, 26 resulted in cash awards for the suggesters. Total savings to MICOM for the adopted suggestions is more than a million dollars, Scroggins said.

"We still work closely with CPO, because the awards are processed through Incentive Awards," Scroggins said.

Although some people are still unaware of the move, MICOM's regular suggesters have kept up with the changes.

"We seem to have a hard core of suggesters. They caught on very quickly, but at least once a week I get suggestions submitted on old forms, or they go through Incentive Awards—a lot of people don't know," she said.

"And we always have new employees who are not aware of the program."

Misconceptions

Some workers have misconceptions about the program, as evidenced by the questions Scroggins receives. Many people call to ask if they're eligible to participate.


"Any active duty soldier or civilian employee is eligible to participate. Grade makes no difference.

"A person's position or their salary has nothing to do with the amount of the award for a suggestion. It's based strictly on the tangible or intangible benefits the suggestion has," she said.

The new suggestion form is an interim form (AMSMI-2) which was developed here to conform to the automated Army Suggestion Program system. The Army will distribute a new, standardized form when the regulation which covers the program has been revised, Scroggins said.

Procedure

If you have an idea for improving the work place or the way MICOM does business, fill out an AMSMI-2, clearly stating the problem and your proposed solution. When it gets to the Suggestion Program office, it

will be assigned a control number. The office will let you know the number of your suggestion.

"The typical suggestion takes four to six weeks until the person receives a disapproval letter or a check," Scroggins said. She's working on getting each suggestion closed out as quickly as possible, she said.

A suggestion can be about anything concerned with work. "Most suggestions concern functions within a suggester's organization. Many are terrifically complicated and technical, but most are just plain old common sense.

"I'm constantly amazed. Some are just so simple, I wonder why somebody didn't think of it 20 years ago," she said.

Before suggestions are reviewed by the affected office, the name of the suggester is removed from the form. And, if a suggestion is disapproved, the name of

the reviewer does not appear on the form, Scroggins pointed out.

Redstone receives a surprising number of off-post suggestions, Scroggins said. Those are suggestions that are made by people at other commands, but must be sent here for evaluation.

"Most deal with logistics or weapon systems, and most come from the Depot System Command," she said.

"I'm very proud of our turnaround time on off-post suggestions. It's an average of 30 days from when we get it to when the answer is mailed to the command."

Scroggins' enthusiasm for the program is evident when she recalls individual suggestion awards. The largest she has handled in her year on the job was a case in which two people each received \$2,500.

"I'm as tickled as the suggester when I get an adopted suggestion back," she said.



Unit training takes careful planning, early preparation

Editor's note: Training is the Army's theme for 1988. In the following article Capt. Albert Mandrell, commander of A Company, 73rd Ordnance Battalion, gives his ideas on training.

Conducting effective training in a Staff and Faculty permanent party company environment is difficult at best.

Take for example, our recent NBC (nuclear biological chemical) training exercise. This training was held for one week, requiring soldiers to attend one-half day of training, either morning or afternoon.

While this may not on the surface sound that difficult, one has to understand the command structure of both the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School and Alpha company to really grasp the difficulties involved.

Alpha company, 73rd Ordnance Battalion, 269th Ordnance Brigade has seven platoons with personnel assigned to four diverse OMMCS activities: School Secretary, comprised of administration support branch, security division and logistics division, totaling 278 soldiers; Electronics and Technology Training Department with 91 soldiers; Personnel Proponent Office with 16 soldiers; and Office of the Inspector General with two soldiers.

Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School is comprised of 19 directorates and departments totaling more than 2,000 soldiers and civilians, training more than 6,000 advanced individual training (AIT) students annually.

No prime time

The structure and mission of OMMCS and A Company do not easily lend themselves to scheduled prime time training.

Normally training is conducted at directorate/activity level, emphasizing common task training. This is done because the primary mission of OMMCS is to train AIT soldiers.

Unfortunately, there is a tendency to neglect training of permanent party soldiers on behalf of the AIT mission. Prime time training is also difficult for permanent party soldiers because it's all taken up training AIT students.

Solution

Three techniques I used to solve this included: early morning classes for recurring training and centralized physical training using Master Fitness principles, emphasizing nutrition and smoking cessation.

The third and most successful proved to be small group instruction, as was demonstrated during the NBC exercise. It succeeded, I believe, because it allowed the greatest flexibility in the scheduling of soldiers to attend training.

Activity NCOs-in-charge were tasked with sending X number of soldiers to both morning and afternoon sessions. This allowed NCOs to plan around commitments and support the exercise.

Careful planning, preparation and the overcoming of minor obstacles began well in advance of the exercise.

Planning and preparation for the exercise began 60 days prior to execution. It involved requisitioning CS (a riot control agent) capsules, protective suits and masks, coordinating transportation, reserving the Field Training Center Gas Chamber, identifying and training instructors, coordinating for classes to be given by chemical training facility personnel, and identifying an officer in charge.

'Fort Tears'

Getting protective suits and masks was the most difficult requirement to fill, as we had to compete with AIT companies to get them. Unfortunately one AIT company was going on their field training exercise the same week of this exercise. But we obtained what was needed as the bare minimum to train.

Getting soldiers to and from the exercise area could have been a stumbling block, depending on the AIT mission, but coordination for transportation went smoothly. The request itself was processed within the School Secretary activity and was handled quickly.



Soldier convicted on larceny charge

A Redstone soldier has been court-martialed for larceny and violation of a regulation.

Pvt. Marcus A. Burns of B Company, 832nd Ordnance Battalion was given a bad conduct discharge, two months confinement, forfeiture of \$447 per month for four months, and reduction to E-1. "He'll be serving that confinement at Fort Campbell, Ky.," said Capt. Will Rathbun, chief of military justice in the Staff Judge Advocate office. Rathbun prosecuted the case before a military judge.

Burns was convicted of stealing \$800 and \$60 worth of traveler's checks from a fellow soldier. The theft took place at Redstone on May 1, according to Rathbun.

"He was also convicted of possession of 17 rounds of blank ammunition; that's a violation of a MICOM regulation," Rathbun said.

The BCD special court-martial (empowered to give a bad conduct discharge) was held here July 11 before Lt. Col. Andrew Chwalibog, a military judge from Fort Campbell.

Burns, 18, is from Cleveland, Ohio. He joined the Army in September 1987.

A chief warrant officer four at the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School has been selected to become a master warrant officer.



Battling quarters fire just part of job to MP pair

The storage shed behind a Redstone residence is a thing of the past but the fire that destroyed it could have been a lot worse, if not for the actions of two military policemen.

Sgt. John Hickerson and Spec. Gene Pelley woke up the residents, who included a fellow MP, and fought the fire with garden hoses until the fire department arrived at 228 Niblo Drive on the morning of July 4.

"It was commendable what they did," said Fire Inspector Rick Ryan.

"It sure was," agreed Bill Cross, the acting fire chief.

Hickerson, the patrol supervisor that night, and Pelley, who had that patrol area, got the call at 4:17 a.m. and arrived at the same time. On fire was the storage shed attached to the rear of the two middle quarters of the one-story, four-family dwelling. They beat on the back doors of the two middle quarters. Then Pelley went around front and awakened all the families and told them they needed to get out. Hickerson used a garden hose to keep the fire from spreading to the quarters. After evacuating the occupants, Pelley got another garden hose to help fight the fire until the fire department arrived.

The shed was "practically leveled when we got there," Pelley recalled. The fire had already started to get one section of the roof, he added.

"It had burnt through the eaves and was getting up to the attic," Hickerson said.

Residing in the two middle quarters were the families of Spec. Eddie Bomagat and Sgt. Charles Maricic, an MP. Maricic's motorcycle was destroyed by the fire that was so intense it melted the paint on his fence. "I was about four feet away from that motorcycle when it blew," Hickerson said.

Hickerson, 25, of Shreveport, La., and Pelley, 23, of Seattle, Wash., both said they were just doing their job.


"Essentially, it was just part of the job; taking care of the people, taking care of the soldiers," Hickerson said. "Like anything else we might have— from a

holdup at the shoppette to somebody having a coronary at the swimming pool —it's our job to protect and serve and defend."

"It's part of the job, I didn't really think about anything else," Pelley said. "I saw the fire, I couldn't just sit there and watch it burn. I couldn't just let it happen. We're there to serve, that's what we're here for. People may not always appreciate us, but that's what we're here for."

Maricic credits his fellow MPs with going beyond their duty to ensure public safety by trying to save as much property as they could. He said they awakened him, his wife Lisa and year-old son Charles III. The family, who has lived on post a little over a year, lost the motorcycle and winter clothes being stored but would have lost more if not for the two MPs, according to Maricic.

"I think they deserve a pat on the back," he said. "I really appreciate what they did."

Fire prevention tips

Redstone Fire Department offers the following advice on avoiding storage shed fires:

- There's no safe place for storing gasoline, according to Bill Cross, the acting fire chief. "If they want to keep gasoline, they should keep it in a safety can," he said.

- Use good housekeeping in the storage shed.
- "No smoking, and no altering electrical wiring," Cross said.

"Some people go in there and want to put in an additional outlet or something like that. That should be done by a qualified electrician."



New method proposed for keeping track of missiles

A proposed automated method for following missiles from receipt and storage until firing was discussed here last week.


Under the proposal, missiles would be followed by attaching radio frequency microchips to them. The Missile Logistics Center hosted a conference July 14 at building 5250 to discuss this proposed computerized method for accounting and tracking of missiles.

Lt. Col. James Link, acting director of the MLC, opened the conference by pointing out that, if successful, this proposal will help bring missile accountability and control up to state-of-the-art.

Jack Ingram, special assistant to the deputy commander for logistics automation at the Army Logistics Center at Fort Lee, Va., presented the proposal supported by representatives of the contractors involved. About 40 people, including contractors, attended the daylong meeting.

The concept involves physically attaching microchips which have built-in miniature radio transmitter/receivers. These microchips can store essential logistics information concerning the item to which they are attached. The microchips can be remotely contacted, read and programmed with information, greatly enhancing inventory accuracy and efficiency.

This proposal was tasked at the Department of the Army, Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics level and is being managed by the Army Logistics Center.



North Alabama anglers win honors at state tournament

Two local fishermen have taken top honors for military bass anglers of Alabama.

T.C. Nettles is state angler of the year, and Spec. Steve McConnell is the state's rookie of the year. Nettles finished in fourth place and McConnell placed sixth in the state tournament held July 9-10 at Lake Eufaula.

"We had a good time at the tournament," said Don Larimore, director of North Alabama MBAA (Military Bass Anglers' Association). "The fishermen from North Alabama really did a super job representing North Alabama. We had three fishermen to finish in the top 11 plus angler of the year and rookie of the year."

Besides Nettles and McConnell, Morris Sheehan of North Alabama finished ninth in the state tournament.

"We are looking forward to the nationals in September at Lake Kerr in North Carolina," Larimore said. "We have three or four people who have a good chance of finishing in the top 10 at the nationals."

Nettles, a retired Army master sergeant, won state angler of the year by getting 685 points out of a possible 700. This was his point total from four tournaments—including three district and one state tourney. "I don't go for big fish, I go for quantity rather than quality," Nettles said, referring to his state tournament strategy. "I went for quantity of fish—a lot of fish—rather than a big fish. That's my secret around here, too."

This is Nettles' third state title. He was Arizona federation state champ in 1976 and the Arizona state champ in 1982. His other titles include angler of the year for Redstone Arsenal in 1974 and '75 and angler of the year in Tucson, Ariz., in '79.

"If I get in the top three (at the nationals), I feel I stand a chance of getting angler of the year," Nettles said.

The North Alabama MBAA meets at 7 tonight (July 20) at the NCO Club for pairing of partners for a tournament scheduled July 23 at Decatur boat harbor. For information call Larimore at 876-4138.

Joint-service program combats family violence

An innovative family advocate program with the objective of dealing with the problem of domestic violence in military families is getting a lot of attention these days. Called the Service Assisting Family Environments program, it assumes a service member with problems at home will carry those problems over into work.

"A person with family problems just isn't going to be as productive at work," said Navy Rear Adm. Russell L. Marlor, surgeon, United States Pacific Command, which runs the program. "Getting involved is not only the compassionate thing to do. It also makes sense from a productivity side."

Child abuse and neglect and wife abuse are not peculiar to the military, nor does the military exhibit a larger tendency than the civilian community to have these problems. "I don't think there is more abuse, I think there has always been a certain amount," said Marlor. "I do think that people are more aware of the problem and are reporting it more frequently now."

Services Assisting Family Environments is a joint-service program providing care for the 125,000 service members and dependents in Hawaii. "Sen. (Daniel K.) Inouye (the senior senator from Hawaii) was instrumental in getting this process off the ground," said Marlor.

One component of the program is SAFE teams. These teams—a social worker, a nurse and an outreach worker—visit families and work with families to get them to work out their problems. "These teams are trained in helping families," said Marlor. "The idea of reaching out to families is not new. What we have done here is put together what we believe is the right combination of people to provide intervention, treatment and support when the family situation is not going well. Further down the line, they can call on other resources—psychologists, medical experts, other social workers and what resources there are in the civilian sector."

The program was started in 1982. In fiscal 1987, SAFE teams assisted 348 families. In the first half of fiscal 1988, teams served 257 families.

The second component of the program is a shelter the command provides for abused wives and abused or neglected children. "There are times when a crisis occurs—or is about to happen. Then you have to have a place for the wives or children to stay," said Gwendolyn R. Costello, special assistant for family advocacy for the Pacific Command.

Children and wives receive counseling and other help. "This shelter provides a place to put families that are in immediate danger," Marlor said. "We work with all members of the family, and the time away

and volunteered to be instructors. Sgts. Daryl Clute and Anthony Maddox prepared lesson plans using STP-21-1, Soldiers Manual of Common Tasks, and conducted the training with minimum supervision.

We asked the OMMCS Chemical Training Facility to provide classroom instruction on NBC alarms, hasty and deliberate decontamination, and allow a hands-on demonstration of decontamination apparatus.

The easiest part of preparation was identifying an officer-in-charge for the exercise. Arnold, the company executive officer, became the officer-in-charge and was responsible for coordination and execution.

Safety stressed

During the exercise, safety was stressed to the utmost. The weather was unseasonably hot. We conducted training in the early morning and afternoon, and in shady areas at all times. Time spent by soldiers in MOPP 4 (full protective gear) was only the amount of time it took to suit up and go through the chamber.

The exercise itinerary was simple and straightforward. Soldiers first met the bus in front of the company and rode over to the chemical training facility.

There they attended an hour and a half class and then were bused to the field training center. At the field training center, soldiers were divided into small groups and received training on the levels of protective gear and the proper wear, fit and care of M17-series masks. Then the small groups were taken into the gas chamber for the confidence exercise.

Participation exceeded expectations as the activity NCOs supported the exercise wholeheartedly. Feedback from soldiers indicated they enjoyed and benefited from the training.

gives the situation time to stabilize. Then we can make an assessment without the time pressures that would be felt if the families stayed at home."

In fiscal 1987, 195 adults and 237 children stayed in the shelter. In the first half of fiscal 1988, the shelter served 124 adults and 155 children.

In addition, the shelter has a crisis hotline. In fiscal 1987, the crisis line received 867 calls. In the first half of fiscal 1988, it received 672 crisis calls.

Finally, the program has a prevention segment. This is the Wellness in the Home program, and it seeks to identify potential problems. "The old saying 'an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure' is a cliché, but true," said Marlor. "What we try to do is identify those people at risk of child abuse and give them support and, when necessary, education about pregnancy and child development that will help them cope with the stresses of child-rearing."

"We're all at risk," Costello said. "You can never be 100 percent correct, we're dealing with people. But there are some factors that point to some people being more at risk than others."

Among these are very young mothers, those having twins or multiple births and those giving birth by caesarian section. "None of this means that these families will abuse their children, but these factors do complicate an already stressful period in a family's life. They need to learn to cope," said Marlor.

The Wellness in the Home program screens all pregnancies and identifies those with risk factors. The women are contacted and offered the service. "This is voluntary," said Marlor. "No one has to be involved in WITH. But most families welcome the help."

Wellness in the Home workers then go to the homes and teach child-rearing and coping techniques. In fiscal 1987, they screened 4,222 women, and 146 received visits. In the first half of fiscal 1988, they screened 1,858 women, with 96 receiving home-visitor service.

Since the program began, it has been under the auspices of the Pacific Command. On July 1, Pacific Command turned over management of the program to the services. "Each service has now taken responsibility for its own SAFE teams. The Navy runs the shelter program and the Army has assumed responsibility for the WITH program," said Marlor. "My office will have some funding responsibility for the next year or two, but eventually that will be taken over by the services."

Marlor pointed to research that shows that family programs have an effect on readiness and retention. "The program is there as a safety net for families," he said. "Even if a family doesn't need this kind of help, they at least know it is there. They may never use the program, but I think families understand that the services care about what happens to them, and I think that attitude can have long-term benefits."




