## Preventing procurement fraud

### 'Everyone's doing it' attitude shouldn't apply to violations

Each worker is responsible for being aware of procurement fraud and reporting it when they see it, according to government officials who addressed a seminar here last week.

"It's not just at one level; we need everyone we can to prevent loss to the government," said Ed Allan, legal remedies adviser for the Defense Department's Inspector General office. "What we hope to do is make everyone aware of what they can look for, what they can do to assist in the process."

The Missile Command's annual procurement fraud prevention training was held Aug. 9-11. Guest speakers included Allan; Kathryn Hoener, procurement fraud coordinator for the Army Materiel Command; Michael Whisonant, assistant U.S. attorney in Birmingham; and Ruben Young, chief of the CID (Criminal Investigation Command) economic crime unit here.

"AMC has a coordinated remedies program," Hoener said during a break in the seminar. She said this organized program includes "legal, quality, procurement representation with detection of unethical conduct in the procurement process."

The U.S. attorney's office is actively engaged in the investigation and prosecution of defense procurement fraud, according to Whisonant.

"I think this seminar will raise MICOM's awareness of fraud and that they will forward any information about fraud to us," he said. He confirmed that the U.S. attorney's office has procurement fraud cases from the Missile Command but declined to discuss specifics. "All I can say is we have cases under investigation," Whisonant said.

Recently a contractor, Exotic Metals Corporation of Huntsville, was convicted and fined for providing untested components. The Department of Justice refers to this type of crime as product substitution, and considers it very serious.

"Defense procurement fraud is the No. 1 white-collar crime priority of the U.S. attorney," Whisonant said. He said the Birmingham office has had "a half a dozen" convictions in such cases over about the past year.

Prevention of fraud is each individual's responsibility, according to Hoener of AMC. She said a reporting system is available all the way up to the Defense Department.

"We don't expect it (procurement fraud) to be condoned, we expect it to be reported," Hoener said. "It's not an 'everyone's doing it' attitude, or it shouldn't be."

Anti-fraud initiatives include the Defense Department's reporting hotline which has been in effect a number of years. "Education of the work force is really our best preventative tool," Hoener said. She said others include more oversight of contracts, more aggression on procurement loss, and legislation to increase penalties and fines and to set up procurement fraud units throughout the country. "It is a very aggressive enforcement throughout AMC," she said.

"MICOM is a prime example of it, it is a very good procurement fraud effort here."

Personal integrity is important and the vast majority of MICOM workers have this integrity, according to Allan of the defense inspector general's office. But it's important that they take the "extra step" to report and be aware of fraud, he said.

Increased awareness is paying off. Close to \$200 million was recovered in defense procurement cases in 1987, up from \$13 million in 1982. The government got this money back in various forms— through civil recoveries, fines and forfeitures. "We can expect next year to be another banner year, close to \$200 million (in recoveries)," Allan said.

"Our awareness of having problems has increased," he said. "Chances are better that procurement fraud will be caught and punished than say five or 10 years ago."

## Family symposium identifies 164 issues and concerns

Redstone's first Family Action Symposium, held last Thursday, is already considered a success, even though the final data has not been tallied.

"It just went terrific. I couldn't have been more pleased," said Ramona Lindsey, project officer for the event.

The day opened with remarks by Maj. Gen. Gus Cianciolo, Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal commander; Col. Perry Butler, deputy post commander; and by Maj. Gen. Charles Bussey, deputy chief of staff for Personnel, headquarters, Army Materiel Command.

Bussey pointed out that although there wouldn't be immediate answers for all the questions asked during the day, it was important that the questions be asked and issues raised so they can be sent through channels for action.

"Little things make a difference— little things that get overlooked at higher levels. And little things develop at local levels," he said, adding that most major quality-of-life improvements made by the Army have resulted from grassroots type work sessions like the one Thursday.

"We're not there yet, but we've come a long way,

and we will get there through work groups like the one here today," he said.

Approximately 100 delegates split into six groups which worked on the following topics: medical/dental; commissary/post exchange; youth/education/family member employment; housing/traffic/maintenance; transportation/personnel/finance; and morale and welfare.

A total of 164 issues and concerns were identified at the symposium, including the perceived shortage of physicians at Fox Army Community Hospital, shortage of housing for junior enlisted families, the need for some sort of mass transportation on post and off, day care and jobs for family members.

The final Family Action Plan should be completed by the first of October, according to Lindsey, and delegates will meet again in mid-October to receive an update on issues which have been included.

"One important thing that came out of the whole symposium is that Redstone is doing a great job, but there's a lack of communication between people who provide services and the users," Lindsey said.

"We are continuously looking at ways to provide better support services, but sometimes we forget to communicate to our community what we are doing to improve Redstone's quality of life programs."



## Pershing motors to be static fired

WASHINGTON— The United States has advised the Soviet Union in accordance with the Treaty on Intermediate Range Nuclear Forces that the U.S. Army will begin to eliminate Pershing missile rocket motors on Sept. 8.

Weather permitting, the Army plans to static fire two Pershing motors that day at Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant near Marshall, Texas. MICOM has a contract with Thiokol, the plant operator at Longhorn, to static fire the first 72 Pershing motors. The firings will take place over a 60 day period. Once the solid fuel propellant is consumed by a static firing,

the empty rocket motor case must be crushed to comply with the treaty. The Army plans to bury the crushed motor cases in a landfill within the plant grounds.

The Army has an application pending in Colorado to static fire additional Pershing motors at Pueblo Depot Activity east of Pueblo, Colo.

In all, the Army has about 800 Pershing 1a and Pershing II rocket motors that must be eliminated within three years to comply with the treaty.

Soviet inspectors will be present to verify destruction of each motor.

## Germans honor former worker

A former MICOM civilian manager has received a high honor from the Federal Republic of Germany for his work with the Multiple Launch Rocket System.

Larry Seggel, now retired, served as deputy program executive officer for fire support and as deputy project manager for MLRS. He received the prestigious Commander's Cross of the Order of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany in a ceremony Tuesday night, Aug. 9 at the German Air Force Detachment, building 3511 on Gray Road.

This award is one of the highest given by the Ger-

man government and is "very seldom given to people outside the German territories," according to Lt. Col. Bernhard Seen, the German Air Force liaison officer to the Missile Command.

"MLRS is an international program between the United States, United Kingdom, Italy, France and Germany," Seen said. "He (Seggel) did a lot of things that keep it going."

The award was presented by Alexander von Schmelting, the Atlanta-based consul general of Federal Republic of Germany.

## Drolet eligible for his first star

Col. Robert Drolet, manager of the Stinger Project Office here, is now eligible for promotion to brigadier general.

Drolet's name was included in the latest promotion list published last week by the Pentagon.

Drolet, 47, has served as the Stinger project manager since 1986. He holds a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics from Boston College and a master of science degree in public administration from Shippensburg University, Miss.

His prior assignments include chief, Missiles Air Defense Division, in the Army's Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Research, Development and Acquisition; air defense chief in the Firepower Division of the DA Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations; and commander, 3rd Battalion, 68th Air Defense Artillery.

Drolet, a native of Cambridge, Mass., and his wife Ann have three children: Chris, Michelle, and Karen.

## Women's Equality Day celebration planned

# Associate technology director likes varied work

## Receives distinguished rank from president for lifetime achievements

Dr. Dick Rhoades says he never gets tired of his work as associate director for technology because every workday is different.

"It's still fun," says Rhoades, who came to Redstone as a soldier in 1963. "When I come to work each day, I don't really know for sure what I'll be working on that day. Each day brings constant challenge and variety and surprise. In a position like this, you get to work on a great variety of important things—dealing with people and money and weapon systems and technology, a whole variety of things."

On Aug. 2 President Reagan awarded Rhoades the rank of Distinguished Executive in the Senior Executive Service at a ceremony near the White House. The award, which includes a \$20,000 stipend, is for lifetime accomplishments. No more than one percent of the government's senior executives can receive the distinguished rank in one year. Rhoades was among 60 honorees this time—one of four from the Army and the only recipient in the Army Materiel Command.

Over the years, the Missile Command has had three receive distinguished rank and three receive meritorious rank. Dr. William McCorkle, director of the Research, Development and Engineering Center, received the distinguished rank last year.

"I feel extremely fortunate (to receive the award)," says Rhoades, one of eight members of the senior executive service at the RD&E center.

"I feel lucky because I've been fortunate enough to have bosses that gave me the kind of assignments and freedom to do well in the assignments. And we're fortunate to be in a business that's important to the country and have a lot of good people to make you look good."

His accomplishments through the years have included developing new classes of propellants as director of

propulsion, directing the command's productivity planning effort, developing cooperative programs with the Department of Energy, and trouble-shooting programs for various missile projects such as Viper and Pershing.

As associate director for technology, Rhoades manages the technology base activities related to missiles and high energy lasers. He is also responsible for strategic planning for laboratory staffing, facilities, and resources. "We're in the middle of a major facilities modernization program," Rhoades says. This modernization effort at the research center includes eight projects—four of which are either completed or under way. Among the current projects is \$21 million of construction on advanced simulation facilities in the center's high bay area.

Rhoades, 50, was born in Northampton, Mass. He was a 1960 ROTC graduate from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., who delayed entry into the Army so that he could attend graduate school. He received a doctorate in chemical engineering from Rensselaer in January 1964. After the basic officer course at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., Rhoades came to Redstone as a first lieutenant in the Ordnance Corps. He got promoted to captain here. Rhoades left the service in December 1965 and became a research chemical engineer in the propulsion laboratory (now called the propulsion directorate of the research center). He served as director of propulsion from 1973-81 before assuming his present job in '81.

He and his wife Dale have three daughters: Lawren, 16, Liz, who turns 15 later this month, and Lee, 13. The family has taken a number of skiing vacations. Rhoades, who also enjoys golf and gardening, has been a volunteer ski patrolman for the past 20 years, most recently at Cloudmont in Mentone, Ala. As a member of the National Ski Patrol Society, a

volunteer organization, he spends winter weekends providing on-hill first aid for injured skiers.

"I certainly never planned, when I was in graduate school, to work for the federal government. That kind of just happened," Rhoades says.

"The reason that I stayed was because the people here are so capable and interesting to work with. The work is challenging, the responsibility that you are given is great. The R&D business is fascinating and varied."

# Army clerk gets honorary appointment from governor

A longtime clerk in the military personnel office here now has a honorary state title.

Sue Nelson was appointed a honorary lieutenant colonel aide-de-camp in the Alabama militia for her help in recruiting into the National Guard those soldiers leaving active duty. The certificate, signed by Gov. Guy Hunt, was presented by Maj. Gene Fundum, the chief of military personnel office.

"I feel it was a great honor," said Nelson, a military personnel clerk for the past 22 years. "I feel that they appreciated the work that I had done over the years."

It was in recognition of her assistance to the in-service recruiter who comes from Fort McClellan to enlist soldiers who are separating from service into the National Guard. She has been helping the current recruiter, MSgt. Robert Robertson of Fort McClellan, for the past six years.

Nelson works in military personnel's transition point which does the retirements and discharges for soldiers in this area who are leaving active duty. It gives them the opportunity to enlist in Army Reserve or state National Guard units. Each year, probably at least 100 of the separating soldiers enter such units. Nelson works with Dorothy Howard and Sue Forrester, the supervisor of transition point.

"I like it, I've been doing it for 22 years so I think

it's the best job in this office or this division," Nelson said.

A native of Somerville, Ala., she was one of seven children—four girls and three boys. Her father was a farmer who also worked for the county road commission. Nelson graduated from Cotaco High School, in a rural route of Somerville, in 1950. She worked a few years then served in the Air Force from 1953-55. While in the Air Force, she met her future husband at Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana. She and Charles, who himself retired from the Air Force in 1966, have been married since March 1955.

Nelson has worked in the same job since May 1966, starting when the military personnel office was located on Aerobee Road in an area where new barracks are being built now. Building 3482 has since been torn down. "We've been in four or five different buildings," Nelson recalled.

Her hobbies include needlework, camping, fishing and yardwork.

"I'd like to retire in the not too distant future," said the 55-year-old Nelson, "and then find a part-time job or volunteer work. I want to keep busy; I don't want to sit home, but would like to have more spare time than I have now."

She plans to put the framed certificate from the governor on her wall at home.

His work at the center qualified him to receive Red Cross babysitting certification, Mohler said.


Shannon participated in field trips, accompanying his small charges when they went on picnics, to skating parties, and fishing.

# Diet a safe, practical way to reduce blood cholesterol

Many people know that too much cholesterol in their blood is not good for them, but they do not know how much is too much. The number to keep in mind is 200.

According to the American Heart Association (AHA), more than 50 percent of American adult males have cholesterol levels above 200, a level at which the risk of heart disease begins to rise sharply.

Approximately 27 million adults have serum cholesterol levels higher than 200 milligrams per deciliter of blood.

The 10-year Coronary Primary Prevention Trials provided medical scientists with reinforced evidence that a high blood cholesterol level is a cause of coronary artery disease. The study also showed that people who lower their cholesterol levels with diet and drugs have fewer heart attacks and less heart disease.


Cholesterol is a soft, fat-like substance found among the fats in the bloodstream. These fats are called lipids, and a high level of lipids in the bloodstream is called hyperlipidemia. Hyperlipidemia is a major risk factor for coronary heart disease.

Hyperlipidemia can affect your heart in this way: cholesterol and other lipids build up in the inner lining of blood vessels like rust in water pipes, and over time vessels can close. This narrowing of blood vessels, called arteriosclerosis, keeps oxygen-carrying blood from getting to the heart. The result can be severe chest pain and eventually heart attack.

The body gets cholesterol from two sources. Every day the liver produces about 1,000 milligrams of cholesterol, which is needed to produce certain hormones and to construct cells. The remaining cholesterol in the body comes from food sources. This dietary cholesterol is the cholesterol that could be of concern to many people.

According to the AHA, a person's blood cholesterol level depends on his or her age, sex, and other risk factors: smoking, high blood pressure, excess weight or a family history of heart disease.



# Lab searches for and identifies American remains

For thousands of American families—next of kin of U.S. servicemen listed as missing in action during World War II, Korea and Vietnam—the wars of this century are not over.

The Army's Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii is dedicated to ending the uncertainty of those families.

The 42 men and women—both civilian and military—of the lab use painstaking care to search out and identify the remains of American servicemen missing in the Pacific.

The strongest focus within the Central Identification

Lab has been its work on identifying the remains of those returned or recovered from the Vietnam War. Since 1974—when the first government-to-government turnover of remains began—Vietnam has passed about 160 sets of remains to the United States. The lab is responsible for putting names to those remains.

The lab is divided into search and recovery, laboratory and casualty data analysis sections. Although the lab is an Army unit, it has members of the other services attached to it.

There are three search-and-recovery teams at the lab. These teams go to the crash or battle sites and recover the remains and any equipment that will aid in

identifying the service members. "(The teams) use normal, accepted archeological methods of searching the sites," said laboratory commander Army Lt. Col. Johnie Webb Jr., "such as establishing grid squares to pinpoint on-site maps where items or remains are found, sifting the dirt to find fragments and other excavation procedures."

The Central Identification Laboratory teams have searched for missing service members in Vietnam and Laos. "These searches are the result of negotiations with the Socialist Republic of Vietnam and the Lao People's Democratic Republic," Webb said. "When our people go in (these countries), they must wear (See Lab, cont'd on Page 9)

civilian clothes and we can only recommend sites to be investigated. The Laotian or Vietnamese government says specifically where we can search."

The teams have made four trips into Southeast Asia searching for remains. The first occurred in February 1985, when 13 remains were recovered from an AC-130 crash site in Pakse, Laos. Another excavation in November 1985 of a crash site of a B-52 near Hanoi recovered partial remains. In February 1986, a trip to Savannakhet, Laos, took the team to the crash of another AC-130 that had 14 men on board. The most recent trip, in May 1988, was to the site of an OV-1 crash in Laos and turned up no remains.

Time is running out for remains in Southeast Asia. "The soil (in Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia) is extremely acidic," said Webb. "The remains are deteriorating from that acid. In contrast, we have remains from World War II that we've recovered recently that are in better condition."

Search-and-recovery teams have also searched in Korea. Recently, the teams excavated a mass grave containing North Korean soldiers. "Because we didn't have medical or dental records to compare against the recovered remains, all we were able to state conclusively was that the remains were Korean Mongoloid," Webb said. Through a detailed analysis of the artifacts found with the remains and extensive research into the troop movement history of the area, the remains were identified as North Korean soldiers from a specific unit.

An attempt to repatriate the bodies to North Korea was made; however, the North Koreans refused to accept them.

"We'd like to gain entry to North Korea to recover remains," Webb said. "We estimate there are more than 6,000 Americans, of the approximate total of 8,160, still unaccounted for in the north. If the North Korea government would cooperate with the United Nations' Command Military Armistice Commission, we are confident we could recover quite a number of them."

"Logistically speaking, these teams operate much like special forces A teams," said Webb. "When they conduct missions in remote areas, they can charter,

rent or lease any equipment they need to perform the job."

Once the teams recover remains and personal effects, the remains are taken to the laboratory— two buildings built on a pier on the Honolulu waterfront.

What can its specialists tell from remains that are often almost 50 years old? "A lot," Webb said. "Even with a relatively small amount of certain skeletal material, we can tell the approximate age at the time of death, the race, sex, approximate height and handedness."

**Identifications**

Other information specialists can glean includes the muscularity, dental patterns, injuries the person had prior to death and any abnormalities in the skeleton. This information helps the identification process. Also helping: computers, microscopes and radiographic equipment. "The technology— especially the computer— is simply tools. The computer does not make an identification— people do," stressed Webb.

Today, dental work is a key to making identifications. During the Vietnam War, most service members had dental X-rays taken. If there is a full set of teeth, then identification is made easier. "We don't need a lot of remains (to make an identification)," Webb said. "Just a few from critical areas— like the jaw— will work." Still, specialists continue work to make sure the other physical characteristics match.

**Results**

Once analysis is completed, the results are compared against the records of those listed as missing. The casualty data analysis section of the lab handles this work. "We have the original health and dental records of those unaccounted for from Vietnam as well as extensive Korean and World War II files," Webb said. "In addition, we have the records of all of those who died in Vietnam and whose bodies were recovered." These records are kept for comparison with remains recently recovered in cases where previously identified individuals were involved in the same incident.

If the remains come from a specific crash site, the casualty data analysis section develops files for those listed as passengers on the aircraft. However, if the remains are received during an official repatriation, the

analysts use the information provided by the government to conduct a circle search of a given area. They determine which Americans were lost in that general location and develop appropriate files. The findings of the scientific staff are then compared against the records of those individuals to make an identification. If no match is made, the circle search is expanded.

The laboratory has a stringent in-house review on proposed identifications before its "recommended identification" is submitted to a panel of outside experts. The families may also have an independent expert review the lab's work and submit findings with those of the lab and the outside experts to the final approval authorities. The service secretaries are the final reviewers in identification.

The lab also serves in other capacities. It helped identify the bodies of soldiers killed in the crash of a commercial airliner in Gander, Newfoundland. It also helped identify the remains of the Marines killed in the bombing of their barracks at the Beirut airport. And, most recently, lab members helped identify the sailors killed on the USS *Stark* in the Persian Gulf.

and how can you reduce it if it's too high? Your doctor can measure the amount of cholesterol in your blood with a simple test. Ideally, everyone should have a cholesterol level test done by age 30, and it is suggested the test be repeated every five years. If there is a history of heart disease in the family, the cholesterol level should be checked at age 20 and every five years thereafter.

If your cholesterol level is high, your doctor will want you to begin a long-term program to lower the level. Diet is a safe, practical and effective way to reduce blood cholesterol for most people. Reducing the intake of high-fat meats, whole-milk dairy products, egg yolks and other foods high in saturated fat and cholesterol is helpful, along with eating more poultry, fish, fresh fruits and vegetables, grains and cereals, and low-fat dairy products.

If diet changes alone won't reduce a person's blood cholesterol, his or her doctor may prescribe one of the medications available to help keep within the ideal range.

# Continued education becomes crucial for professionals

There was a time when an education was for a lifetime. A person prepared for a career through apprenticeship, trade school, or college, and the initial training was sufficient for 40 years or so of work. The changes in required knowledge and skills were so slow that it was easy to keep up to date through on-the-job contacts and perhaps a little outside reading.

During the latter part of this century, the situation has drastically changed. In essentially every field, the changes in theory, techniques, and applications are coming at such a rate that practitioners must run to stay abreast of the state of the art. In most high-technology areas, staying up to date has become a significant part of the everyday job.

The concept of "half-life" is useful in describing the changes. The half-life in a particular area is the time (years) during which half of the initial knowledge needed to enter a career has been replaced by something new. Another way of looking at this is that in a half-life period a practitioner must gain new knowledge or skills at least equal to half that required for initial entry.

In professional fields such as engineering, management, and applied science where four years of college are needed for preparation, the half-life is now less than ten years, and in some areas it is as little as a year! Even at the longest period, a person now needs to spend the equivalent of one year out of five in knowledge and skill maintenance.

Where the half-life is two years or less, keeping up to date would become a full-time job! For most individuals this is not possible; thus, professionals in these areas must narrow their specialization and concentrate on maintaining their expertise in some very small corner of the field.

Maintenance of knowledge and skills can be accomplished in a number of ways. Certainly, the old method of work contacts still plays a major role. Professional societies with their publications and meetings can also be of considerable help. A primary function of undergraduate education is to develop learning skills so that the graduates can continue to study on their own, and this is perhaps the best single way to keep up to date. However, courses and seminars on a formal basis have become vital for professional maintenance.

The concept of continuing professional education is that the practitioner will never reach a point that formal studies can be stopped; the alternative is professional obsolescence. Many of the licensing agencies now require a minimum number of hours per year in structured continuing education. A national standard, the continuing education unit (CEU) is used to recognize successful completion of work, with one CEU awarded for each ten classroom hours.

An important type of continuing professional education is found in what has traditionally been called graduate study. The pursuit of an advanced degree is an excellent way to renew and maintain competence, and taking the courses for academic credit ensures that the participant gets the most out of the endeavor.

Nationwide, the majority of persons now taking graduate-level professional courses are not "regular" students; they are mature adults, employed, and studying on a part-time basis. Such people are having a major influence on the schools and their offerings.

The Huntsville community is fortunate to have a number of institutions with programs suitable for professional continuing education.

Each school has different offerings and characteristics, and the prospective attendee should closely examine all aspects before making a selection.

Compare the courses; will they benefit you in your career? Compare the faculty members; can they relate to you and your background? Compare the programs; do they balance theory and contemporary applications? Compare the schedules and administrative procedures; are they designed to accommodate the school or you?

It is the purpose of schools to serve their "customers". You are the buyer of a very important product, and should demand the best from the sellers!





# CSCC maintains Redstone extension office

Although John C. Calhoun State Community College calls Decatur, AL (located 20 miles west of Huntsville on Highway 201) its home, a complete, totally active extension office is maintained here on Redstone Arsenal. Approximately 350 students attend classes at Calhoun's RSA extension in general education, business or computer-related fields.

Through a special agreement with MMCS, Calhoun Community College offers a unique program in Missile and Munitions Technology (MMT). This program is the minimal amount of time needed to complete the degree requirements. To earn the associate in applied science degree in MMT the student takes seven basic freshman and sophomore level courses (either from Calhoun or as transfer credit from another school) combined with college credit awarded through the evaluation of certain MMCS schools (a complete listing can be obtained in the extension office). This enables the student to take that important first step towards a college education by taking these basic college courses required for any future degree program.

Calhoun Community College also offers an associate in applied science in

Electronic Engineering Technology. This board-based program includes industrial electronics and communications, but the primary emphasis is on digital electronics and microprocessors. The freshman electronic courses establish a foundation in the principles common to all electronic systems, including networks and discrete semiconductor circuit design. The sophomore courses provide training in communications, logic, digital circuits, microprocessors, industrial electronics, and troubleshooting. These electronic courses are offered at the Westlawn extension site.

After discovering that, to often service members were taking courses over and over again as they changed duty stations, the Service Members Opportunity Colleges Associate Degree Program (SOCAD), of which Calhoun is a member, was developed. Through SOCAD a student can establish a home base with a college such as Calhoun, and regardless of where the student is transferred, work on the same degree program at another SOCAD school sending those credits back to the home school to apply toward the original degree. Although there is a written agreement with the home school, the

student is under no obligation in any way.

Any person with a high school diploma or G.E.D. may attend classes at RSA or at Calhoun's other extension sites at Huntsville High School or Westlawn Middle School. At RSA, however, military personnel are given priority status and the guarantee of a place in class. Should the evening schedule prove to be inconvenient, Calhoun also offers morning classes at RSA; an added plus for military dependents or those working non-traditional shifts.

The Calhoun extension office is located in building 3222, the Army Continuing Education Center. It is open from 8:00 to 4:30 Monday through Thursday and until 3:00 on Friday. Counseling is available until 8:00 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays, with classes being held in buildings 3222, 3650 and 3305.

Many students enter college with very little idea of what their major course of study will be; taking a basic curriculum for several quarters, these students feel out and explore all career possibilities before making their final decision. Calhoun Community College offers over 100 programs of study specializing

in two-year associate degrees or in preparing the student for transfer to pursue a four-year bachelor's degree. The hardest step in starting back to school is the first one; it is also the most important one. Decide today that a brighter tomorrow is yours; then take that step to Calhoun Community College.







are matched to the various specializations, with an emphasis on higher analysis, operations research, statistics and probability, and computer-related subjects: Recognizing that many individuals need improvements in their mathematics ability before pursuing the advanced courses, Southeastern provides intermediate-level background courses for this purpose.

In computer applications, Southeastern has an outstanding selection of courses suitable for all types of programs and individual backgrounds. These include offerings in the areas of applications programming, software engineering, and intelligent systems. For persons with little or no background in this field, a high-level literacy course can be taken for non-graduate credit.

Most of the software applications courses involve the use of personal computers, and Southeastern has a laboratory for persons needing access to such machines.

### Library Given High Priority

Library work is an important part of continuing education, and it is vital for graduate degree programs. Although

the excellent facilities of the Redstone Scientific Information Center are available, Southeastern has given high priority to the development of its own library.

A book collection was started at the inauguration of SIT in 1976, and a reference library was opened several years ago. 




# U.S. defense secretary assesses Soviet reform

We should be aware of the limits of Soviet reform—and the limits on our own ability to control events.

That was the tone of Secretary of Defense Frank C. Carlucci's recent remarks on the Moscow summit to members of the National Press Club in Washington, D.C.

Carlucci noted that the summit awakened great interest in developments taking place within the Soviet Union and raised the hope that the process of internal change might have a positive impact on Soviet conduct in the international arena. He nonetheless advised a wary attitude.

"The key today in dealing with the Soviets is to keep change in perspective. The mere fact that change is taking place does not tell us where it will lead," he said.

Some significant changes are now taking place within the USSR. Under *glasnost*—openness—books long banned are now being published and policy disputes and public protests are making their way into the official press.

The other focal point of reform, *perestroika*—economic restructuring—was a topic of intense debate at the recent Soviet Communist Party conference.

There are limits to how far each of these elements of reform can go, Carlucci said.

In the area of Soviet economic reform, the cautious pace is not due to uncertainty about the course reform must take. "It is well understood by Soviet leaders that the leading cause of economic stagnation is state control, and the way to invigorate the economy is for the state to loosen its grip," he explained.

"There has been some loosening of central control, but nothing to indicate that *perestroika* means the dismantling of the system. How to reconcile economic imperatives with political reality is Gorbachev's problem—and it is not an easy one."

*Glasnost*, too, has its limits. It is a window that can be closed at any time. "We need to recognize the

distance between *glasnost* and Western-style freedom of speech. At present, *glasnost* is, in the strict sense, government-sponsored—and that is far different from our recognition of free speech and open debate as fundamental rights the government cannot abridge and must protect," Carlucci said.

"While we need to keep Soviet reform in perspective, we must also recognize the limits on our own ability to affect events," he warned. "The United States is being urged in some quarters to reformulate its policy to make the success of Soviet reform our goal. I cannot think of a more dangerous way to combine a policy of overreaching with wishful thinking about its outcome."

We need to be clear about what U.S. policy can and cannot achieve, he said. "We can hope for change; we can welcome it when it comes; but the plain truth is that our ability to influence change within the Soviet Union is marginal...The great danger in trying to act as a catalyst for change is this: We simply cannot predict what its consequences will be."

Carlucci gave examples of possible end results of Soviet reform: If the Soviet Union is less expansionist,

reduces resources it now devotes to the military, respects fundamental freedoms and human rights and is more open to dialogue with the West, then change will have been for the better.

On the other hand, if the end product of Soviet restructuring is nothing more than the development—perhaps even with Western assistance—of a stronger industrial engine to power the Soviet military machine, then the West faces a far more dangerous threat.

Carlucci's answer to the question about how to proceed in our relations with the Soviets is to hold steady to the course that put us on the path to the Moscow summit:

"We must maintain a clear sense of the differences that separate the American and Soviet systems—even as we try to narrow them.

"We must avoid confusing cause and effect, assuming that tensions exist because we are armed, when in fact we are armed because American and Soviet aims and interests are in tension.

"Above all, we and our allies must take our bearings from our own security needs."

## Civil engineer grads make Army first choice

WASHINGTON— College students graduating with degrees in civil engineering have picked the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as their first employment choice, according to a 1987 survey recently published in "Graduating Engineer" magazine.

The survey, the fourth in a biennial series conducted by the magazine and the recruiting advertising firm of Deutsch, Shea and Evans, received responses from 1,942 students representing 274 colleges and universities nationwide.

The Corps of Engineers has consistently ranked high among civil engineering graduates — third in 1983 and second in 1985. No other government agency received a number one rating in any discipline; the closest was

NASA, which ranked fourth among astro/aeronautical engineering graduates.

According to the survey, preferred employers were chosen largely on the basis of the nature of their work and their technical reputation.

"The perception of the Corps as a preferred employer is an indication that we can continue to be competitive with the private sector for the best and brightest of the new engineers," said Lt. Gen. H.J. Hatch, commanding general of the Corps.

Senior undergraduates — 72 percent — made up the largest number of those responding to the survey. Twenty-three percent were master's-level graduate students. (Arnews)

# Efforts continue to account for missing servicemen

There are still about 2,400 servicemen missing from the Vietnam War, something to remember well on POW/MIA Day, Sept. 16. Live sightings of Americans are constantly reported in the news, but nothing has come from them yet.

That doesn't mean efforts to account for American servicemen lost or otherwise unaccounted for in Southeast Asia aren't continuing, said Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs Richard L. Armitage.

They are. Teams from the Joint Casualty Resolution Center and the Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii scour sites in Vietnam and Laos. The Laotian and Vietnamese governments have repatriated about 250 sets of remains since the end of the war.

Since 1980, about 140 sets of remains have been turned over to the United States. The most recent was in July when 25 sets of remains were returned.

"At least for their families, the wait is over," Armitage said. "We will continue efforts for the return of more remains from Indochina."

Armitage said that retired Army Gen. John W. Vessey Jr., the former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and special presidential emissary on POW/MIA matters, recently held meetings with the Vietnamese foreign minister. "It was reaffirmed that this is a

humanitarian issue and that we will push ahead for resolution (of it)," he said.

The administration is calling for "full accounting" for those listed as missing or otherwise unaccounted for. Armitage said this does not mean that every serviceman lost in Indochina will be accounted for. "Some we know were lost over water, and it is extremely unlikely that we will recover those remains," he said.

"But there is no set number or percentage that we can point to. The fullest possible accounting will be when we feel in good conscience that we have fulfilled the debt to those servicemen and their families (and that we have accounted for as many as we can."

Two categories are of special concern to Armitage: the reports of live sightings and discrepancy cases. Live sightings come from several sources, but primarily by refugees from Indochina. Discrepancy cases are those of Americans for whom strong evidence exists that they survived the crash or action and were captured or otherwise came under enemy control or about whom the Indochinese authorities should have more information. "We must resolve these live sightings and discrepancy cases," Armitage said "For the families of these men, the wait must be unbearable."

Armitage spoke of accounting for these men as a debt owed them by the country. "It will remain for this administration— and I hope for any subsequent

administration— to work towards the fullest possible accounting of those still missing," he said. "We owe it to their families, to the servicemen and women of today, and we owe it to the service members of the future."



# Pentagon tour guides walk backwards 9,000 miles a year

*"The greatest exponent of reverse pedestrianism has been Plenni L. Wingo...who walked 8,000 miles from Santa Monica, Calif., to Istanbul, Turkey, from April 15, 1931, to Oct. 24, 1932. He celebrated the walk's 45th anniversary by walking backwards for 452 miles from Santa Monica to San Francisco, Calif., in 85 days when he was 81 years old. The longest distance recorded for walking backwards in 24 hours is 84 miles by Anthony Thorton, Minneapolis, Minn., on Dec. 31, 1985, through Jan. 1, 1986.— Guinness Book of World Records, 1987.*

If there was a *Guinness Book of World Records* category for groups of people walking backwards, soldier, sailor, airman and Marine Pentagon tour guides would trek away top honors every year. It took Wingo more than 18 months to walk backwards over 8,000 miles across two continents, with a little help over the ocean. These military trekkers walk backwards for more than 9,000 miles a year over a 1½-mile stretch of one building—the Pentagon.

As they shuttle up and down the highly polished corridors of the world's largest office building, the guides tell more than 100,000 visitors a year about significant displays along the way—the Hall of Heroes (for Medal of Honor winners); Prisoner of War Alcove; the Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, Army and Military Women's corridors; Coast Guard exhibit; Gen. Douglas MacArthur corridor; the Army's Time/Life Art Collection corridor; and much more.

Only the *creme de la creme* of each service is accepted as tour guides, most of them from honor-guard units. They must be militarily sharp, well-conditioned, quick-witted, highly articulate speakers with a flair for dealing with the public. Hand-picked by their service,

they must undergo the scrutiny of the Pentagon tour director, Navy Senior Chief Petty Officer George W. McShay. Marines normally come from their headquarters units.

"All of the guides have to exhibit a positive image of the Pentagon and the Department of Defense to visiting dignitaries and to the general public," said McShay, who holds the only permanent position in the tour office. In addition to tours for the general public, this office provides escort service for the secretary of defense, including visits by foreign dignitaries.

Being assigned to the tour office is the first chance for many of the young enlisted men and women to get a glimpse of how the military services work together. Likewise, many visitors get their first look at the inside of the Pentagon—one of the historical sites in the Washington metropolitan area—and a chance to meet a member of the armed forces—the tour guide.

"Guides must go through our charm school on how to deal with the public before we let them conduct tours," said McShay, who has four years experience with the Navy Honor Guard. "Even though we have a mandatory information package, we allow each guide to create a special style of giving the presentations along with trivia information."

Tour guides must memorize a 10-page manuscript about various exhibits and be able to ad lib other facts and trivia before conducting tours on their own. The training period includes following tours conducted by experienced guides.

"It's a two-week training program, but I started giving tours after four days," said Navy Airman Georgina L. Kanoff. She volunteered to get a break from what she was doing—firing the 21-gun salute and marching in ceremonies at the Pentagon and White House. Kanoff is a member of the Navy ceremonial guard at the Washington (D.C.) Navy Yard.

"I walked behind enough tours to do it in my sleep," she laughed. "I love it. I wish I could stay here the rest of my time in the Navy. I like working in a joint-service program."

Each service member normally spends six months with the tour office. "If we get one who has a bad attitude, is self-centered, lacks motivation or doesn't project a positive image, we send him or her back to their unit," McShay said. "But that doesn't happen too often. I've only released two in two years. If someone has a bad day, I take them off the guide roster and let them work in the office or run errands until they come back down to earth."

"Regardless of what tourists say to you or what names they call you, you have to respond positively," he emphasized.


McShay has a staff of seven soldiers, five airmen, five sailors and four Marines. Coast Guardsmen conduct tours on special occasions.

Pentagon visitors have increased nearly 25 percent this year to a monthly average of between 4,000 and 5,000 people.

The one hour, 15 minute tours are conducted from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. "We usually run tours every half hour, but I change that to every 15 minutes when it's busy," said McShay. "Everybody goes through security before being allowed to go on the tour. The tour guides walk backwards to make sure that no one strays away."

"It's very difficult to walk backwards in this building," said McShay. "We limit our tour guides to no more than three tours a day. Not only is it tiring to walk backwards for more than three miles a day on waxed floors, they lose their voices from talking so long."



# Qualitative Management Program procedures revised

**WASHINGTON**— In efforts to improve its quality of the enlisted force, the Army has begun to change its Qualitative Management Program appeal procedures.

Soldiers selected for QMP action will now have only 90 days from the completion of the option statement to appeal the action. In the past, soldiers were given up to one year to appeal the decision.

Soldiers with less than 90 days to their expiration term of service and who submit appeals may be extended until a decision is made by the commander of the Total Army Personnel Agency. Soldiers may also appeal the QMP action based on an error in their records and/or improved performance.

Lieutenant colonels and above may also appeal a QMP decision based on the soldiers improvement within 90 days of receipt of the action.

## QMP board

When a soldier is considered for QMP many factors are looked at by the board, according to Sgt. Maj. Shelby Meares, who serves as the QMP policy integrator in the Pentagon.

Results of skill qualification tests, Enlisted Evaluation Reports and Non-commissioned officer Evaluation Reports are considered. Overall performance of the soldier as measured by minimum performance standards, trends in efficiency, military education and

demonstration of a commitment to the professional Army ethic as well as NCO responsibilities are considered by the board. Has the soldier had a wide range of assignments and does he continually meet the height and weight standards and pass his semi-annual Army physical fitness test? The board looks at all these areas before making a decision, Meares said.

## Objectives of QMP

QMP procedures are based on the idea that reenlistment is a privilege for those whose performance, conduct, attitude and potential for advancement meet the Army standards, according to Meares.

Quality management is designed to enhance the quality of the career enlisted force. It denies reenlistment to nonproductive soldiers and encourages soldiers to maintain their eligibility for further service.

Actions taken under these procedures are not intended to be rehabilitative in nature, Meares said. They are designed to deny reenlistment to soldiers who are identified through the QMP board screening as failing to meet the standards.

Soldiers will be denied reenlistment when it is clear by the board that the soldier has not met minimum performance standards, or has exhibited moral and ethical conduct incompatible with the values of the NCO corps and the Army ethic. Soldiers will be denied reenlistment when they do not exhibit the potential to perform the duties of an NCO in their current grade.

## Set to retire


Soldiers who receive QMP notification and have 18 years of active federal service will not be involuntarily separated, according to Meares. These soldiers will however retire at the completion of 20 years. (Arnews)


