Worker here named among top federal engineers

A young Missile Command engineer is in Washington, D.C., today to receive recognition at higher headquarters as Army Materiel Command's "Engineer of the Year."

Dr. Jay Lilley, 30, is AMC's nominee for federal engineer of the year. The winner of that honor will be announced from 29 nominees tonight at a banquet of the National Society of Professional Engineers.

Lilley, a research aerospace engineer in Propulsion Directorate, said he was "pleased, surprised and honored" by the AMC recognition. He had been nominated by Dr. Walter Wharton, the propulsion director.

One of 10 members of the directorate's advanced propulsion engineering function, Lilley works in building 7120. Much of his time is spent in a nearby Army laboratory, performing research on propulsion technology.

"I enjoy my work," Lilley said. "It's a fun place to work. No problem coming to work in the morning, I enjoy it."


His major projects have included extensive research on side exhausting nozzles. He developed a nozzle design procedure that would minimize the overall length of a missile's propulsion system.

Another project was to develop a low cost, expendable turbojet engine for a missile. He served as technical manager of this laboratory demonstration program which involved many people in the Propulsion Directorate. "Typically, gas turbines are high performance devices," he said. "Their fuel efficiency, in terms of amounts of thrust developed per pound of fuel consumed, is 10 times better than that of a solid rocket. The problem is that gas turbine engines are typically very expensive. So therefore, they really want a cost-effective propulsion system for a low-cost tactical missile."

As a result of that program, he said, the Fiber Optic Guided Missile will be the Army's first turbojet powered missile.

Lilley is a native of Barre, Vt. He finished high school in Plymouth, Ind., where his parents still reside. Roderick and Beverly Lilley have another son, 28-year-old Todd, who is an office supply salesman in Laporte, Ind.

Maintaining a 3.66 grade point average on a 4-point scale, Lilley earned a degree in aeronautical and astronautical engineering from Purdue in 1980. He received his master's there the following year. In 1986,

he received a doctorate in mechanical engineering from the University of Alabama in Huntsville. His work in nozzles was the topic of his doctorate dissertation. This winter he is teaching a graduate-level course in propulsion at UAH.

Lilley began his career in the Propulsion Directorate

in January 1982. He and his wife, Nan, have a 2-year-old daughter, Sara. They are expecting their second child in May. Lilley's hobbies include radio-controlled sail planes and yardwork.

"It's a great place to work," he said, referring to the Propulsion Directorate. "And you're given a lot of freedom to pursue what interests you."

Promised car

Member of retiree community victimized by fraud scheme

Do you think you could never fall for a scam? Think you're safe from fly-by-night slick operators who try to trick you out of your money? Well, if you think you're wise to the ways of con artists, read on and see how even a person who thinks he or she knows better can be duped by a well-planned operation.

A member of Huntsville's military retiree community (she doesn't want her real name used, so we'll call her "Mary" in this article) fell victim to a scheme that was so smooth, so well-thought out, that she never suspected a thing until she had lost \$400.

It all started the morning of Jan. 18 when a man who identified himself as Paul Westmoreland called Mary to ask if she had received a Federal Express letter. She informed the man that she had moved recently and asked if it might have been sent to her old address.

He replied that was indeed the reason she had not received the letter and suggested that she drive to the airport to get the letter, since it was notification that

she had won a grand prize in the Publishers Clearing House Sweepstakes.

"He said the letter was signed by Ed McMahon, and that he was required by law to locate all prize winners. He said there was a runner-up winner in Birmingham, and that they had already received a consolation prize," Mary said.

Special treatment

From the very beginning, Westmoreland worked to win Mary's trust. While she was talking to him they became disconnected several times and he called back. Finally he gave her his number and asked her to call him back. He answered immediately. He also told her that the next day was the last her car could be delivered, but that he was making a special effort, and giving her special treatment so that she could receive the car. During the first phone call, the man never mentioned Mary paying anything to receive the car.

Mary drove to the airport to pick up the Federal Express package. It contained an envelope from LA Auto in Los Angeles, Calif. The letter itself bore a logo from American Family Publishers, and the Publishers Clearing House name. It was signed "Ed McMahon."


Later that evening Westmoreland called back to see if Mary had picked up the letter. He told her the car, a Volkswagen Jetta, was on its way.

At 9 the next morning, the man called again. "He told me he had been up all night doing the paperwork for the car. He told me about his four kids and that he had pictures of all the other prize winners on the walls of his office.

"He gave me a tax ID number, the badge number of the driver, so I could check it out, and other federal income tax numbers," she said.

He called again at 11 a.m. and told Mary that she would be required to send a \$400 delivery fee to him before she could accept delivery of the car. He even

Team wins contract for antitank weapon

The Army has announced the team of Texas Instruments and Martin Marietta as the winner of a competition to begin full scale development of the AAWS-M, a new man-portable missile system that can destroy enemy tanks and other armored targets.

AAWS-M, for Advanced Antitank Weapon System-Medium, will replace the Dragon in Army light and heavy divisions and selected Marine Corps units.

The Army will award a contract to the companies prior to April 28. Under the 36-month cost plus incentive fee contract, the team will develop and test the

AAWS-M. The team will then compete for future production contracts under a split-buy arrangement.

When fielded in the early 1990s, AAWS-M will allow Army and Marine infantrymen to attack and destroy the latest enemy tanks and armored vehicles with a one-man-portable system.

AAWS-M is lighter, more lethal and has a longer range than the Dragon and is easier to operate.

Col. Earl Finley is AAWS-M project manager and James Hughes is his civilian deputy. Lt. Col. Marvin Smith is AAWS-M product manager.

Army medical center offers dialysis technician course

WASHINGTON — If you're a sergeant or staff sergeant, possess the 91C military occupational specialty of practical nurse, believe you're among the best in your field and are looking for a career-enhancing move, then SFC Eddie Phelps has a deal for you—the Dialysis Technician Course.

"Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington admits only 12 soldiers to the course annually," Phelps says, "and it's the only place it's offered."

Phelps, the enlisted instructor of the course for the past three years, says becoming a dialysis tech helps soldiers become more competitive for promotions and enables them to acquire additional technical skills.

"Although there are about 4,100 soldiers serving in the Army today with the 91C MOS, only about 100 of them have the dialysis technician additional skill identifier," he adds. "Those selected to take this course are definitely considered the cream of the crop."

"Since it's one of only two courses offered past the basic 91C, successful completion of the course helps promotion potential," he emphasizes. "The other option is physician's assistant."

After successful completion of the course, students receive an additional skill identifier, M3. Then, they are assigned to one of the seven Army medical centers in the continental United States, Tripler Army Medical Center in Hawaii or the 2nd General Hospital in Germany.

"It's a nice career progression," Phelps says. "Soldiers in the 91C MOS can stay in the dialysis field through the rank of master sergeant — two E-8 dialysis slots exist in the Army. Some techs go on to become registered nurses or physician's assistants."

"A lot of high-quality people are interested in this field," he says.

"You'll find that a good number of first sergeants or sergeants major have been dialysis techs."

Academic requirements

Officially, some of the academics required for acceptance to the 20-week course include one year of high school or college algebra and chemistry or completion of the MED 803, general chemistry, correspondence course. Phelps says that most students have substantially more than that.

"Two years of college is about average," he advises. "Even so, many want to run out the door as soon as they see the chemical chart hanging on the classroom wall."

Phelps explains that the course's purpose is to give 91C's the knowledge and skills needed to perform hemodialysis and peritoneal dialysis. These two procedures are necessary when a patient's kidneys fail, and the body no longer has any way of cleansing itself of contaminants.

"Through the use of specialized dialysis equipment, which works as an artificial kidney, the patient's blood can be periodically filtered and cleaned," Phelps continues. "That's where the skills of the dialysis tech come into play."

The course is divided into more than 300 hours of classroom study and almost 500 hours of clinical work. In all, students earn 20 college credits by studying such subjects as the anatomy and physiology of the kidney, basic chemistry, pulmonary anatomy and physiology, renal disease, common problems in renal patients, the psychosocial aspects of renal disease and the use, maintenance and safety of various dialysis equipment.

"The course is very difficult and covers much information over a very short period of time. That doesn't mean, however, that it can't be done," Phelps says. "The average final grade is an 85. In fact, the class that graduated in November 1988 had a grade point average of 90. That says a lot about the caliber of the students."

In addition, he says, the course intensity sometimes means that a student has to spend four or five hours a night "hitting the books" — especially when the subjects are chemistry, anatomy and physiology.

Clinical training

A former student, SSgt. Johnny Niles who took the dialysis course in 1986, says that the clinical side represented the most challenging part of the course for him overall.

"It's really a good course because it is set up so that the classroom and clinical sides balance each other," Niles says. "For me, the hardest thing was learning to use the machines. The classroom hours, however, really prepare you for the clinical training. It's structured

to guide you along in learning all aspects of dialysis and the equipment."

Niles says he enjoys the dialysis field partially because it allows him to work with a variety of patients in all age groups— from teen-agers on up.

Niles also believes becoming a dialysis tech was a good career move for him since "it offered the opportunity to learn another skill. And, career-wise, it gives the Army a chance to see that I am exploring additional avenues and willing to go the extra mile to be an all-round technician." [Editor's note: Sgt. Shortcut costs \$100

A woman was charged with trespassing and fined \$100 when she attempted to cut across Redstone last week.

According to Capt. Wayne McGurk, chief of the Law Enforcement Branch of the Provost Marshal Office, a member of the civilian guard force became suspicious when the woman arrived at Gate 7 with no decal and said she was going to Fox Army Community Hospital. The military police have declined to identify the woman.

James Oody, who was working Gate 7, gave a visitor's pass to the woman, but called ahead to Gate 1 to alert them of a possible trespass, McGurk said. When the woman drove up to Gate 1, Judy Byrne, who was working the gate at the time, detained her and called military police.

When questioned, the woman admitted that she had fabricated the story about going to the hospital in order to take a shortcut across the arsenal, McGurk said.

gave her the name of the company in Huntsville which could wire money. He explained that since the car was on its way, and so close (the driver was supposedly near Nashville) that the only way to avoid losing out was to wire the money.

"It just sounded so up-and-up," Mary said. She wired the money.

At 1 p.m. Westmoreland called to let her know he received the money and that she should expect the car in about 45 minutes.

"Well, 2 o'clock came, and no car, and 2:30 came and no car, so I called the number he had given me. The man who answered the phone said he'd never heard of Paul Westmoreland and told me the number was for a pay phone at a hospital.

"I hung up and immediately went crazy. I called Mailbox International (the money wiring service) and tried to stop the money, but it had already been picked up. I called the Better Business Bureau here. They had no other complaints but I got the Publishers Clearing House number from them," she said.

The people at Publishers Clearing House told her they knew about the scam, said the FBI in California and the California Attorney General's office were investigating the case, and that she probably would never see her money again.

"I have never been a victim of a crime. For three days I was devastated. I didn't want to leave the house. I was embarrassed and I felt everyone knew what a dummy I was," Mary said.

She now knows what to do if anything like this happens again.

"If anybody does this, and asks for money— double check. Call the Better Business Bureau or get the number for the organization the person is supposed to represent."

Mary had told at least one of her friends about winning the car the very first night. That friend is also the Missile Command's inspector general.

"She called me the first night, and a little red flag

went up in my mind, and I remember thinking that I had never heard of any of these places giving away foreign cars," said Lt. Col. James Fagan.

According to Fagan, if you win something, the only money you should be required to pay is income tax on the capital gains from the item.

He suggested that Mary call the FBI, and they are now investigating the case.

"They played it to the hilt," Fagan said. "This is an educated lady. If they can convince her, they can certainly convince someone else."

David Sayers, director of advertising for Publishers Clearing House, had a few suggestions for people who have been told they've won a sweepstakes prize.

"Never send money for a sweepstakes prize. Don't send money orders or credit card numbers. And don't fall for something signed by a celebrity. We don't employ any celebrities," he said.

He added that all Publishers Clearing House sweepstakes winners are given the option of receiving cash in lieu of a prize, and most of them take the cash.

Office helps communities cope with base closings

One phrase best describes the mission of DoD's Office of Economic Adjustment: to pursue life after base closings.

"If a base closes, it's not the end of a community's economic life," said Robert M. Rauner, office director.

The office is DoD's focal point for helping communities transition from "military" to civilian economies. With the defense secretary's recent approval of base closings and realignments, the Office of Economic Adjustment is anticipating working closely with the communities affected.

The office started in the 1960s. "At that time, the Department of Defense closed upwards of 900 bases — 100 of them major bases," Rauner said. "The closures were primarily Korean War and World War II bases that had outlived their usefulness. We were formed in recognition of the economic impact these bases had on the surrounding communities and the need to get other industries or facilities in place to counteract the losses."

In the 1970s, in response to the winding down of American involvement in Vietnam, there was another wave of base closings. The experience from the closings in the 1960s and 1970s will stand communities in good stead during any closings they may experience now.

Representatives from the Office of Economic Adjustment speak with state and local officials to get a sense of how they wish to proceed. The office works with them to figure an approximate response to the base closure and works with them as the process continues. The office can sponsor studies for reuse planning, provide funds to hire "staff enhancement" for the communities for studies, among other services.

"We gather all players — federal, state, local and private industry — and we help work out a plan for the facilities," said Rauner. On the federal level alone, 18

departments and agencies can help communities losing bases.

The current round of closings and readjustments are different from earlier ones. "First, there are far fewer than we had," Rauner said. "Second, 1989 is not 1975. There is a budget crunch, and federal funds have been curtailed. Third, there is a wealth of experience that other communities — who went through the same process — have that the communities affected today can call upon."

Rauner said that more funding for planning to replace jobs lost due to base closures will have to come from the states.

That there is life after base closings has been documented. A total of 138,138 new jobs were created at 100 former bases since the 1960s to replace 93,424 DoD civilian jobs lost. Reuse of the military bases has generally broadened the industrial base of the communities.

Closures have been a boon to education. A total of 12 four-year colleges and 33 post-secondary vocational schools and community colleges are on former bases. In addition, vocational training at the high school level is provided for 15,974 students at former base sites.

Industrial and office parks occupy 75 former bases, and 42 are now used as municipal or general aviation airports.

"Another factor is that you just can't look at the jobs on the former bases themselves," Rauner said. "Other jobs to support the industries on the former bases are created within the communities. This extends well beyond the boundaries of the former bases."

Rauner said that there is shock, anger and grief when bases close. The communities that come to terms with that and work aggressively to reuse the facilities find it takes about three to four years to regain the jobs they lost. "There are problems — there's no getting around it," he said. "But they are not insurmountable, and there is help. A base closing — while serious — does not have to be a crisis to a community."

Re-ups top goal

WASHINGTON — The Army continues to exceed its re-enlistment goals, with more than 23,000 soldiers re-enlisted during the first quarter of FY 89.

Re-enlistments were running at 103.7 percent of the Army's stated goal. First-termers' re-enlistments were at 105.7 percent, mid-termers' at 104.7 percent and career soldiers' at 100.4 percent.

Personnel officials say the first and second quarters are traditionally the highest in re-enlistments, and they are hopeful of a similarly successful second quarter. (Arnews)





Less children today experience tooth decay

February 1989 marks the 41st National Children's Dental Health Month. The American Dental Association sponsors the annual observance and is using the slogan, "A Healthy Smile Shows Your Style."

According to the American Dental Association, four out of 10 children today have never had tooth decay. By contrast, in 1945, before flouride was added to most communities' drinking water, almost every child did.

Navy Capt. Tom McDavid, special assistant for dental affairs to the assistant secretary of defense for health affairs, said that in addition to flouride, other advances such as the use of sealants on children's permanent molars play a role.

Greater awareness of the importance of dental hygiene is also a factor. He said that the success of the Dependent Dental Program allows military dental facilities to focus on a program to increase that awareness during this month.

Here are some dental health tips from McDavid and the American Dental Association:

- Parents should take children to a dentist by the age of 12 months. This allows the dentist to detect potential problems when they can more easily be corrected and helps the child develop a positive attitude toward dental care.

- Parents need to help children brush their teeth until they're about 5 years old.

- Avoid "baby-bottle tooth-decay syndrome." Putting a baby to bed with a bottle of milk or juice may result in rampant decay and early loss of baby teeth. This can lead to toothaches and infection and even cause problems in eating and talking. There may be problems when the permanent teeth come in with

no baby teeth to guide them, which means expensive orthodontic treatment to correct the resulting misaligned teeth.

- Discourage your children from eating too many sugary snacks.

- If a pregnant woman takes the antibiotic tetracycline, her baby's teeth may come in stained. Therefore, if you think you may be pregnant, tell your doctor. Tetracycline may still be the drug of choice, but let your doctor make a fully informed decision.

Brush Up on Dental Health

Good dental health is what gives your smile its own unique style. Keeping your smile in shape takes just a few minutes each day. It's important to know that you are doing everything you can to keep your smile looking its best. Use the following checklist to make sure you're doing all you can for a super smile.

- I brush my teeth thoroughly every day to remove bacterial plaque.
- I floss my teeth at least once a day to clean between my teeth.
- I get a new toothbrush every two to three months.
- I check my gums regularly for redness, bleeding, or puffiness.
- I have no loose or missing permanent teeth.
- I eat balanced meals from the four food groups.
- I choose foods like cheese, popcorn, and vegetables when snacking.
- I use ADA accepted fluoride toothpastes and mouthrinses.
- I wear a mouthprotector when playing contact sports.
- I avoid clenching and grinding my teeth.
- I don't use cigarettes or smokeless tobacco.

- I check my jaw for "pops or cracks" when I yawn or chew.
- I check my mouth for signs of trouble like sores or bumps.
- I see my dentist at least once a year for a check-up and cleaning.

Wanted: new members for Redstone rifle team

If you're active duty military, permanently stationed here and interested in marksmanship, the Redstone Arsenal Rifle Team wants you.

The team is down to two members. Normally, at least four members are needed for team matches.

Matches are scheduled from February through July in the Southeast. The national trophy finals are conducted each August at Camp Perry, Ohio.

With the departure of two members from last year, both of whom were stationed elsewhere, SFC Arthur Patrick and Lt. Col. David Coombe are the post rifle team's only members.

"We compete against civilian and military teams; a large majority are National Guard and Reserve teams," Patrick said. Joining the post team means a good opportunity to make the Army shooting team which is based at Fort Benning, Ga., he said.

Patrick, who has been competing since 1972 between overseas assignments, made the Army shooting team in 1986. "It was a good experience, a lot of fun," he said.

The post rifle team uses a national match M14, .308-caliber rifle which is described as a very accurate, precision weapon. Equipment is provided by Support Troops. The Blue and Gray Rifle and Pistol Club helps by conducting local matches which are good training for the state and regional competitions.

Experience is helpful but not a necessity for prospective team members, according to Patrick. "We teach them (from) step one right on up," he said.

Patrick has "extensive training and experience in rifle team coaching," Coombe said. "They will be learning under the tutelage of a very experienced and capable coach."

Led by Patrick and Coombe, last year's team won several first and second place honors in area matches. "I'll be retiring 30 June of this year," said Patrick, 40, of Lucedale, Miss. "Colonel Coombe is also going to be retiring about that same time—I think he retires in July. With him and me both gone, there's nobody left to carry on."

Patrick hopes that won't happen. He hopes that at least six soldiers will step forward to carry on the post rifle team. Those interested can call him at 876-0804/2809 during duty hours.

"And we'll get them started on the road hopefully to national championships," Patrick added.

Drug test policy for recruits unchanged

WASHINGTON — The Army reiterated Feb. 8 that it will not allow into its ranks recruits who test positive for drugs and alcohol during inprocessing.

Reports had circulated recently in the civilian media that some recruits would be allowed to remain in the service after testing positive for drugs or alcohol use during inprocessing.

"Our policy isn't changing," declared Col. Walt Stowell, chief, Human Resources for the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel. "We aren't taking recruits who are drug and alcohol abusers. All recruits who test positive for drugs and alcohol during inprocessing will be discharged."

The site of Dept. of Defense's trainee testing program is being changed at the direction of Congress. In-

stead of being conducted at the Dept. of Defense' Military Entrance Processing Stations (MEPS), the testing will be done at the reception stations of the respective services. Details of how the change will be implemented within Dept. of Defense are being worked out.

Of Army recruits who were tested for drug and alcohol use during the last seven months of 1988, 4.1 percent were rejected for marijuana and cocaine use and .10 percent for alcohol use. About 100,000 were tested.

Recruits testing positive for marijuana or alcohol use can reapply to join the service after six months. Those testing positive for cocaine must wait a year before reapplying. (Arnews)

Idea earns big bucks for soldiers

WASHINGTON — A keen interest in computers and the guts to try something new have earned a soldier and a former soldier \$10,000 for a suggestion — and saved the Army more than \$30 million.

Spec. Richard Ford and former Sgt. Jeff Harrison of Headquarters Company, 8th Division Support Command, Germany, developed a software program for the Tactical Army Combat Computer System. The program simplifies the management of the division's \$1.25 billion worth of heavy equipment.

Ford, 27, and Harrison, 24, were presented the initial cash award by former defense secretary Frank C. Carlucci in a Pentagon ceremony in January.

The two could receive up to \$25,000, the maximum amount awarded under the Army's suggestion program. They are also now eligible to be nominated for the Presidential Incentive Award, which could bring them an additional \$10,000.

Although Harrison is out of the Army now, he is eligible for the awards because he was on active duty when he submitted the suggestion.

Ford and Harrison are proof that soldiers with ideas shouldn't overlook the Army Suggestion Program. The amounts awarded aren't usually as large as the sum they earned, since awards are based on the savings created by the suggestion. But new ways to save the Army money can be worth money to the people who have the ideas and the willingness to prove they work. (Arnews)

Catalog can be your key to PX

WASHINGTON — If you were stranded on a deserted island, there's one item of reading material you'd just as soon not have in your possession: the mail-order catalog published by the Army and Air Force Exchange Service.

Why so?

The frustration of seeing all those products displayed so near to you but ever so far, far away would simply add to your misery.

Of course, few soldiers or their families ever will find themselves beyond reach of their local post exchange or local post office — via which they may order copies of the catalog, and from which they can expect their mail orders to arrive promptly right at their doorsteps.

"When you're not near a post, when you need a novel gift item, or when you prefer the convenience of shopping from your barracks or living room, we provide the medium for your expression," say AAFES officials in Dallas.

They point out that the catalog features more than 16,000 items.

"These are carefully selected from around the world, conveniently presented in one edition for all PX patrons."

Besides being available by mail, copies of the catalog are available, at \$3 apiece, in the United States by dialing the AAFES toll-free number (1-800-527-2345). (Arnews)



NCO promotions looking good


WASHINGTON — The Army's year of "The NCO" will be very good to its honored namesakes in terms of promotions, according to Army personnel officials.


