Long-distance phone service here being replaced

Redstone Arsenal will get a new system for long-distance dialing beginning later this week.

The Ultra WATS service is to replace the current Wide Area Telecommunications Service here at 6:30 p.m. Friday. The change will affect Army activities at Redstone and at Research Park.

For official long-distance calls, workers will dial 7 (or 77 at Research Park) and then the area code and number. The area code must be used whether the long-distance call is in state or out of state.

"This Ultra WATS service is designed to provide a low cost, bulk rate for all your long-distance telephone service," said Sharon Miller, chief of requirements branch at logistics support division for Army Information Systems Command-MICOM.

The contract was awarded to U.S. Sprint Communications Company by 7th Signal Command, based at Fort Ritchie, Md.

With Ultra WATS, the cost for long-distance calls will be less, according to officials here. "It's a significant savings over the old FTS system plus a significant savings over the existing outgoing AT&T WATS and the Direct Distance Dial service," Miller said.

There will be only one access code—either 7 or 77—for long distance calling. This will replace Redstone's current long-distance system of dialing 7 for out of state and 4 for in state, and Research Park's system of dialing 7 plus 5 for out of state and 7 plus 0 for in state.

"This is strictly for long distance," said William Crye, chief of logistics division at Information Systems Command-MICOM. "If they're dialing a Huntsville number, they'll continue dialing just as they do now: dial 9 and then the number."

The new long-distance system is "to save money and provide better service," Crye said. "You can use one access code for all your (long-distance) dialing, you

see. Your international calls, (long-distance) Alabama calls, and continental U.S. calls will all be accessed from one access code."

For international calls, workers will dial the access code, plus 011 and the number. For toll-free 800 calls they will either dial 7 plus 800 plus the number, at Redstone, or 77 plus 1 plus 800 plus the number, at Research Park.

Sprint will replace AT&T and South Central Bell as Redstone's long-distance carrier. South Central Bell is the current carrier for in-state calls, and AT&T is providing the out-of-state service.

There are about 48 Ultra WATS circuits coming in. The \$3.445 million contract to U.S. Sprint Communications Company, based in Vienna, Va., is for three years with an option to renew.

"It's going to be simpler to dial—you'll only have one access code to remember" for long-distance calls, Miller said. "And it's going to save us a lot of money on our monthly WATS bill."

Though not in use, the current system will remain as a backup for a few days in case there is a problem implementing the new long-distance system. "So, if something happens and they could not connect it on the 17th we will not be out of service," Miller said.

Pipeline construction unearths mortar rounds

Explosive ordnance disposal experts from OM-MCS were called Saturday afternoon to a Redstone Arsenal construction site where buried mortar rounds had been unearthed.

The 4.2-inch rounds — seventeen containing an unidentified liquid that likely is a chemical warfare toxic and one that was empty — were in the path of a pipeline excavation near the test stand area west of Dodd Road. A small fire bomb was also found.

The EOD experts recovered the rounds uneventfully and removed them to safe storage pending identification of contents.

They were found in a World War II munitions disposal area that was reclaimed in the 1950s for rocket and missile test activities.

Redstone, at one time the biggest manufacturing arsenal for war chemicals in the world, occasionally is reminded of its past when World War II-era munitions that were disposed of by burial are inadvertently dug up.

The pipeline construction has been halted pending a determination whether work can safely continue.

Air defense

Patriot reaches milestone in deployment

Patriot has reached the halfway point in deployment with the addition just recently of three batteries—D, E and F—to the 3rd Battalion, 43rd Air Defense Artillery.

The three batteries each fired a Patriot missile to mark graduation ceremonies and successfully conclude 14 weeks of collective training at Fort Bliss, Texas. The 3/43 thus becomes the first full six battery Patriot battalion to be trained and deployed.


When deployment is completed in 1994, Patriot will have seven full battalions in the Federal Republic of Germany and three full battalions in the United States.

Patriot was first deployed at Fort Bliss in July 1983 with the 1st Battalion, 43rd ADA, and subsequently with the U.S. Army in Europe in March 1985.

Patriot is also being deployed by West Germany, the Netherlands, and Japan.

Patriot's total package fieldings are a model of success within the Army Materiel Command.

Not public property

Editor:

This letter is not intended to rebut Frank Hancock's letter, but to furnish some additional information that he is not aware of or has forgotten:

1. True— everything within the boundaries of Redstone Arsenal has been bought or built with taxpayers' money, but that makes it government property, not public property that is open to the public for the use of the public. If it were public property, there would be no need to have guards/MPs at the gates to determine whether you or I have a right to be on the arsenal.

As a member of the military establishment beginning in 1943 and as a civilian employee of the Army beginning in 1956, I have known very few military installations with access roads running through them for the benefit of civilians.

2. True— a major portion of Huntsville's traffic problems are arsenal related. When the arsenal was reactivated in 1947 to prepare a place for the German scientists to pursue their mission of building missiles, the population of Huntsville was about 18,000 and their traffic problems were about the same as those of any Southern cotton mill town of 18,000. Today the population of Huntsville is more than 160,000. That means that 142,000 people have immigrated to Huntsville to take the jobs that are here because the arsenal and related industries are here. That means that 142,000 immigrants have greatly complicated the municipal problems of traffic, water, sewerage, electricity, etc. That means that if you are not a direct descendant of those 18,000 people, you are part of the problems caused by those 142,000 immigrants.

3. True— there is a need for a thoroughfare of some type from south Huntsville to the airport area to Interstate 565, but the negotiations will not be based on reckless charges of the type expressed by Hancock in his letter, but rather on negotiations between civil and military authorities at least as high as the Department of Army. The same Army that owns Redstone

Arsenal, with which Hancock finds fault in traffic control, is Hancock's ultimate supervisor.

Physician additions exceed clerical support at hospital

Editor's note: The commander of Fox Army Community Hospital provides the following hospital update.

We are continuing to add health care providers to our staff at Fox Army Community Hospital.

Dr. Jacqueline Perry joined our Family Practice Clinic on Feb. 13. She will also provide family therapy services in the Community Mental Health Clinic. Dr. Rosalind Glenn also joined our staff under the "Partnership Program." She is a board-certified family practitioner who will be seeing Champus eligible beneficiaries in our Outpatient Clinic. Dr. Cobb Alexander, orthopedic surgeon, is seeing Champus eligible patients under the "Partnership Program." His hours are from 8 a.m. to noon each Thursday. Appointments with Alexander are on a consultation basis. Also, Jean Capowski has returned to provide social work services under the "Partnership Program."

Capt. John Mooney, our chief of optometry, is returning to civilian practice. We regret losing this outstanding officer. On the brighter side, Capt. Richard Pinelli, who was the previous chief, returned to us from Korea.

Appointments

Because of the effort of our community, our no-show rate (patients not keeping their appointment) continues to remain very low. As a result of you letting us know that you cannot make your appointment, other people were able to be treated. Thank you for your support.

The addition of new physicians has placed an additional burden on our appointment system. Also, we have several vacant clerical positions. In other words, we have more providers with significantly less clerical support. We have recently added a second receptionist in Family Practice. We are working to fill the other vacancies. This should eventually ease accessibility.

Some people also ask why our appointment time does not run from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each work day. The appointment system is computerized in all of our clinics. These systems must be loaded each morning as well as downloaded and stored at the end of the day. Reports and schedules are prepared daily to organize the clinics and have medical records available.

As with any automated system, occasional delays occur because of malfunction. Sometimes, computers break down. This causes delays in the appointment system. To help us, we are scheduled to install a faster integrated system next year.

If you are having difficulty making an appointment, please wait until a later time in the afternoon to make your call as mornings are our busiest. Also if you are on the arsenal, please feel free to come to our clinics and the appointment clerk will do whatever she can to schedule your appointment. Please remember, though, the constraints placed upon these excellent medical clerks and receptionists.

Radiology services

Patients who use the X-ray Department at Fox Army Community Hospital sometimes ask "why does it take so long" or "why was a patient seen first when I was here first." While there is no simple answer, there are several reasons this may occur.

Radiology services are not necessarily provided on a "first come, first served" basis. Different procedures are done in different rooms. Thus, someone getting a mammogram or ultrasound may have a different wait than someone else. Some require the radiologist to be

present during the whole study. Many of these are done by appointment. Our technicians also support scheduled and emergency needs in our Emergency Room and Operating Rooms, as well as provide evening coverage. Unexpected delays may result. Because of these variables patients may arrive after you, yet be seen before you.

The addition of several new staff members has increased the demand placed upon our X-ray department. To support this, we recently added a medical clerk and are recruiting additional X-ray technicians.

Please remember that while delays in the Radiology Department may occur, there are valid reasons. The next time you require our X-ray services, it may be you that needs to be seen before others. Thank you for your understanding and support.

Vietnam Era GI Bill benefits end soon

The most widely used GI Bill of all time is in its final year and the Veterans Administration is alerting thousands of Vietnam Era veterans that their eligibility period is about to end.

On Dec. 31, education benefits will expire for some 750,000 veterans the VA estimates are still potentially eligible, some of whom are enrolled in schools and receiving assistance.

Under the law, the VA will stop sending GI Bill payments to veterans attending school or in training programs resulting from qualifying active-duty service between Jan. 31, 1955, and Jan. 1, 1977.

Some 60,000 currently enrolled veterans will receive periodic reminders of the Dec. 31 deadline with their VA education checks this year.

The VA encourages veterans to take advantage of their remaining eligibility by enrolling in classes before the end of the year. However, all VA assistance will end on Dec. 31, the VA cautions.

Not affected by the expiration date are veterans enrolled in the VA's other current education programs, including those enrolled in the Veterans' Educational Assistance Program and the Montgomery GI Bill for active duty, reserve and national guard members who served after June 30, 1985.

Veterans in doubt about their eligibility for education benefits should contact the Montgomery VA Regional Office at (205) 832-7428.

The Vietnam Era GI Bill has so far provided benefits to some 8.1 million veterans, which exceeds the 7.8 million using the original World War II bill benefits. Korean Conflict veterans who participated in the GI Bill totaled 2.8 million.

Since 1944, the VA has delivered \$69.7 billion in educational and training assistance to more than 20 million veterans, dependents, active duty members and reservists.

Top-level women at Corps of Engineers discuss careers

Editor's note: March is Women's History Month. The author of this article interviewed five women at Huntsville Division, Army Corps of Engineers, who have reached the grade of GS/GM-13.

Alicia Allen came to the Division in 1984. A mechanical engineer in the project management office, engineering division, she has worked on a broad range of projects.

These range from third-party contracting and chemical demilitarization to her present assignment on the NASA Yellow Creek project.

Allen said the Division does well at "training our young people," an effort that she said is well worthwhile. "We have to take the time to broaden their experience," she said.

Her advice to others? "Take the extra steps to research applicable 'regs' and guidelines. Look for ways to broaden yourself." She did just that when she served as Federal Women's Program manager several years ago.

Allen's plans include "digging deeper into the Yellow Creek project" with a view toward getting "in-to more design work. There's just no substitute for hands-on design experience," she said.

Jimmie Davis

Huntsville Division's executive assistant, Jimmie Davis, has been with the division nearly all of her 29 years in government service.

"Automation has changed everything—the way we operate, the way we think," she said. "The workforce has changed. Twenty years ago there were few, if any, women in management."

Her advice to others comes from personal experience. "Always do more than your job description, go the extra mile. Take on things no one else wants, and you'll gain experience that will be invaluable when you have more responsibility."

What's next for Davis? "I want to be a (GM-)14. I don't think you should ever be satisfied to just stay where you are."

Emily Durham

Emily Durham has not only achieved the permanent rank of GM-13, she is temporarily a GM-14. She is serving as the deputy chief of contracting during the incumbent's training absence.

Durham's permanent job is chief of the contract services branch, contracting division.

Since joining Huntsville Division in 1969, she has noted significant changes in its contracting division. "Our entire mission has changed," she said. "Then we were an engineering group primarily devoted to engineering services. Our contracting mission was to support Safeguard."

Now, she said, "we're basically an independent organization, with our own customers." She notes that "most of these changes have been for the better."

Durham offers the following advice for others who wish to succeed:

"Work hard."

When asked about her plans, she pauses thoughtfully. "Somewhere out there is that super contract specialist job, where I can wheel and deal and negotiate and have a ball. That's the part I love."

Donna Rovere

The chief of the audit office, Donna Rovere, came to Huntsville Division from the Government Accounting Office in 1984. She is quick to admit that "it was different."

In the resource management office, where she was chief of the finance section of the finance and accounting branch, she recalls that she was the first woman supervisor.

"In some ways, I'm back where I started in the early 70s at GAO," she noted. There, "I was a 'pioneer'...when women first started moving into management."

"I'm back plowing that same field," she said. As for the future, "I always want to progress."

She tells others, "Find a mentor. And don't wait to be picked." Be direct, she advises. "You have to recruit (the mentor)."

Carol Youkey

Carol Youkey, civil engineer, is the first woman GS-13 in engineering division's project management branch. She said she has observed significant changes in Huntsville Division's workforce in the seven years she has been here.

"When I came in, the only women engineering professionals were Diana Chan in architecture and Glenda Hodges, who is an engineering technician. Maybe there were some others before me, but not that I heard. It seems hard to believe now, just seven years later."

Youkey said engineering is a good field for women. "I think it's the best," she said. "If you're going to invest the time and effort in a college education in a technical field, go for the best."

SDC opens new launch complex at White Sands

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. — On March 8, the Strategic Defense Command celebrated a landmark in its High Endoatmospheric Defense Interceptor project with a ribbon cutting for the new HEDI Launch Complex at White Sands.

HEDI is a high-acceleration ground-launched optical homing interceptor which will provide the first-ever demonstration of technology for non-nuclear kill of a reentry body in the high endoatmosphere at hypersonic velocities. The first test flight, known as Kinetic Kill Vehicle Integrated Technology Experiment, is scheduled for late July 1989.

HEDI technology is critical to strategic defense because there is a class of ballistic missile threats only HEDI could engage, which includes short-range submarine launched ballistic missiles. Although not a Strategic Defense Initiative Phase I program, the project has been directed to maintain pace with the other Phase I systems for possible Phase I inclusion.

During the ceremony Lt. Gen. Robert D. Hammond, SDC commander, praised White Sands' commander, Maj. Gen. Thomas J.P. Jones, and the professionals at the range for their hard work and their importance to national security efforts.

Alan Sherer, HEDI project manager, was enthusiastic about the spirit of cooperation and teamwork between government and industry.

"The Army demonstrated non-nuclear kill in the exoatmosphere with the Homing Overlay Experiment—we are trying to do the same thing in the endoatmosphere where the environment is tougher," Sherer said. He cited successes in the areas of sensor electronics and homing guidance and control technology making this advancement possible.

SDC began work on HEDI in January 1986, in support of the Strategic Defense Initiative and is now in the 39th month of its six-year effort with a contract value of approximately \$350 million.

The prime contractor for HEDI is McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Company. Subcontractors include Hughes Missile Systems Group and Aerojet TechSystems. Presidents from all three companies were on hand for the ribbon cutting event.

Gerry Johnston, McDonnell Douglas' first program manager for HEDI and now president of McDonnell Douglas Corporation said, "We will see HEDI technology impact in the future— its importance has not been realized yet." He, too, cited teamwork between government and industry as the key to the HEDI program's past and future success.

Strategic Defense Command is the single point of contact for the Army in SDI. With more than 30 years of experience in ballistic missile defense research, the Army contributes a wealth of knowledge to the SDI effort. The Army has been and is the largest player in SDI, with about 37 percent of the total SDI budget for fiscal year 1989.

Army Corps of Engineers does project for Marines

The Multi-Purpose Range Complex at Camp Pendleton Marine Base, Calif., will be complete in March.

This is a significant milestone in the Huntsville Division, Corps of Engineers, contributions to the Range Modernization program.

In addition to being the first in the program to be completed for the Marine Corps, there is another notable feature of this project.

Phil Loftis, project manager, said, "The unusual thing about this one is that we did the design in-house." Normally, the Division uses an architect-engineer firm for design, he said.

Loftis credits cooperation among Huntsville Division's technical branches and the Naval Facilities

Command, which did the construction, for the successful completion of the project.

"It's impossible to name all of the people who made significant contributions to this project, as well as to the program as a whole," he said.

Range modernization is a Department of the Army program. Its purpose is to increase the training value of range firing while decreasing the overall cost of range construction and maintenance.

Huntsville Division was named as the Corps of Engineers Mandatory Center of Expertise for the program in 1988.

Working closely with the Army's Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC), the Division provides the following:

- Technical support during initial planning documentation;
- Development of engineering criteria for ranges to be standardized;
- Technical expertise during design (reviews) and construction (inspections) of range facilities;
- Technical assistance to TRADOC in development of such requirements as range equipment, range targeting and technological advancement.

Poison prevention suggestions offered by experts

Army Dr. (Capt.) Peter Cellucci is an attending physician in the emergency room at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, D.C.

His experience echoes that of the claim made by the National Poison Prevention Week Council — for children under 5, the most common cause of accidental overdose is aspirin or acetaminophen. But not all of this is eaten by curious, exploring children.

"Sometimes parents give their children too much medicine because they don't read the instructions carefully, and they give a child more than a small body can handle," said Cellucci.

"Or they may give the child an appropriate dose, which lowers the fever a little, and then give the child more before the first dose has worn off. Over a period of days, this can build up to a potentially harmful level," he added.

Vitamin pills are another potential poison. "When I was at the hospital at Fort Hood (Texas), we treated overdoses of vitamin pills at least once a month," said Cellucci.

"The problem with vitamin pills is the industry has gone so far to make them pleasing to children—fruit flavors, cartoon shapes and candy coatings — that children will eat them if they aren't locked up and out of sight. It's good to teach children that vitamins are medicine, not candy, but don't rely on teaching alone to protect them," he said.

"Decongestants are also dangerous — an overdose overstimulate the heart to a potentially fatal level," said Cellucci.

He also said that asthma medication, while a less frequent cause of poisoning, is dangerous because it is difficult to treat — and requires the quick use of special equipment.

Accidental poisonings in children under 6 rarely result in death. Of the 500,000 poison exposures involving young children in 1984, only 31 resulted in death.

Many poison exposures can be treated at home after a call to the emergency room or poison control center for instructions. Walter Reed and some other military medical centers have recently acquired a computer

system that gives the staff fingertip access to advice on what to do for ingestion of a large number of substances. Regional poison control centers also have such information.

Poison control experts say you can get help more quickly if you keep the emergency room or poison control number on your phone. When you call, tell the expert the victim's age and weight, the poison involved (have the label ready if you have it) and whether it was ingested, inhaled, absorbed through skin contact or splashed into the eyes.

Of course, prevention is better than having to make a trip to the emergency room or call to the poison center. Here are some tips from the experts:

- Keep all household chemicals and medicines out of reach and sight of youngsters.
- Throw away bottles of medicine that have passed their expiration dates. The more bottles of medicine you keep around the house, the more likely a child is to

get into them. Also, medicines become less effective when they are old.

● Have a bottle of ipecac syrup available in case the poison expert advises you to induce vomiting. However, if you have HUMCO-brand ipecac, throw it away. Some HUMCO-brand eucalyptus oil — a deadly poison — was mistakenly labeled as ipecac.

- Close containers securely after use.
- Don't keep food on the same shelf as medicine or cleansers.
- Keep all poisons and medicines in their original containers.
- Never refer to medicine as candy.
- Avoid taking medicine in front of children, since they may imitate you.
- Take medicine in a well-lit room so you can see what you're taking.


Poison prevention subject of week

"Curious Minds Plus Busy Hands Equal Potential Poisoning" is the slogan for the 27th annual observance of National Poison Prevention Week, March 19-25.

In 1962, when the first National Poison Prevention Week was observed, there were almost 500 accidental poisoning deaths to children under 5. In 1986, there were only 59 deaths.

The Poison Prevention Week Council attributes this reduction to emergency first aid information from poison control centers, increased vigilance by parents, grandparents and other adults and child-resistant closures — all of which amount to greater awareness of the problem.

The council was organized to coordinate the annual prevention week. Its charter calls for local communities to use the week to raise awareness of the dangers of accidental poisonings and to take preventive measures as the dangers warrant.



Prescribed burning program

Fire serves as 'a cost effective tool for clearing an open area'

Where there's smoke there's fire but that fire may be a prescribed burn that benefits the environment and the Army.

This is the third year Redstone Arsenal has had a program of prescribed burning which means using fire for such purposes as hazard reduction, improvement of wildlife habitat, or site preparation.

The goal this year is to burn 2,549 acres of the more than 38,000 acres on post. But that's only a goal. The idea is to burn as prescribed to meet the mission, according to Jesse Horton, forester for Redstone Arsenal.

"It's a cost effective tool for clearing an open area," Horton said. "It's the skillful use of fire in a definite place for a specific purpose under certain weather conditions to achieve specific management objectives."

Starting in February, 250 acres were burned. They were located in three places: training area E-north site, the area of Martin and Toftoy intersection, and test area 3. "Each of those burns had a desired goal or objective, it was burned as prescribed," Horton said. At Martin and Toftoy, a site is being prepared for the planting of pine trees which will be done in March under contract. The other two burns were mainly for hazard reduction: reducing the chance of potential fires due to troop training at the training area E-north site, and reducing the risk of fire due to testing operations at TA 3.

"It's great, this is great," said MSgt. David Humiston, NCO-in-charge at training area E-north. "It's reduced the fire hazards of the pyrotechnics we use out here to enhance the training; it's reduced the likelihood of fires because of all the high grass we get out here."

Weather conditions have to be right for prescribed burning. Generally this means dry weather with low humidity, moderate wind and moderate temperature. Most of the prescribed burning occurs in winter and early spring but it can be done at other times.

"Last year we actually burned about 1,200 acres and

we had a program goal of about 2,000 acres," Horton said.

The fire department conducts the burning under direct supervision of the post forester. Troops and other volunteers help keep the fire contained within the fire lanes. "We have received quite a bit of assistance from troops at the training area north site," Horton said. "They've been very helpful." If interested in volunteering to help, call him at 876-3122.

Benefits listed for prescribed burning include hazard reduction, improvement of wildlife habitat, improvement of the timber stand, site preparation, reduction of potential buildup of insects and disease, aesthetics, accessibility for troops, timber management, and better grazing for cattle.

"Fire is a natural part of the ecosystem in most Southern forests," Horton said. "A large portion of the commercial timber in the South is fire climax—adapted to fire—pine species."

"Fire is nothing new to the South," he added. "We are using fire as a tool, a management tool."



Shoplifting conviction can mean costly penalties

The scenario is common and the results are harmful. You are an adult who decides that you must have that bottle of perfume from the Post Exchange and so you take it but do not pay. You are a teen-ager who has been encouraged by your peers to steal something from the PX for a dare. Shoplifting is a crime under federal law for which there may be not only criminal penalties but administrative punishments as well.

Title 18 of the United States Code Section 641 governs shoplifting in the Post Exchange. This section

provides in pertinent part that whoever steals or knowingly converts to his or her use a thing of value of the United States shall be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than 10 years or both. For persons who steal less than \$100, they will face fines of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment for not more than one year, or both. If the person is not a military member, the offender will face charges in either the Magistrate's Court if the offense is a misdemeanor or will be charged in the United States District Court if the offense is a felony. For military personnel, an action could be maintained under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Administrative sanctions will also occur. Both

adults and minors who are apprehended for shoplifting will have their Post Exchange cards overstamped which means that they may not enter the PX for a given period of time which at a minimum is six months. Such persons may also be barred from post and/or asked to vacate military quarters. Persons who shoplift and carry a security clearance will jeopardize their clearances.

If a person is found shoplifting, he or she will be detained at the PX until the military police arrive. The military police will question the individual and then take the person to the military police station for processing. The case will then be forwarded for administrative and judicial evaluation.

Jellett named manager of antisatellite program office

The Army was named interim lead service for development of a kinetic energy antisatellite last week in an announcement by the Department of Defense approving both kinetic energy and directed energy antisatellite programs.

The Army will also participate in the directed energy antisatellite effort, in what was described as "a multi-pronged approach to develop a national ASAT (antisatellite) capability."

Army Brig. Gen. J. Morgan Jellett has been named program manager for a 60- to 70-person ASAT Joint Program Office to develop the surface-based kinetic energy ASAT. The joint-service office is being located in Huntsville with Strategic Defense Command to take advantage of the existing Army organizational structure and the technical expertise available in the ongoing Ground Based Interceptor program. The Navy will provide the deputy program manager.

In December, the Department of Defense will conduct a Milestone I review of lead-service responsibility as well as options for sea and land based-kinetic energy ASAT versions. According to Jellett, a research and development program of around \$200 million is aimed at a possible deployment in the mid to late 1990s.

Prior to being assigned to head the joint program office, Jellett was a command director for the North American Aerospace Defense Command Combat Operations, Cheyenne Mountain Complex, Colo. Before being selected for brigadier general in July 1987, he had served for a few months as project manager for Strategic Defense Command's Airborne Optical Adjunct and, before that, as deputy program manager for integration in the Missile Command's Air Defense Programs Office.

No joint program office was created for directed energy ASAT, and the announcement described three aspects to the effort:

- Strategic Defense Command is including an ASAT capability in its design and development of the Free Electron Laser for the Strategic Defense Initiative at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., at least through fiscal 1991, when a Milestone I review of directed energy ASAT is planned.

- Because of high technical and programmatic risk in the Free Electron Laser project, the Air Force will continue to conduct a parallel directed energy technology development program designed to address critical technology issues, project costs associated with the effort, and prepare alternative concepts for a fiscal 1991 directed energy ASAT system selection.

- As a result of a previous ASAT-related decision, the Miracl/Sealite beam director ground-based laser will undergo an upgrade beginning in fiscal 1989 to provide a limited, inexpensive, and near-term ASAT capability.

The Air Force was named lead service for a single comprehensive space surveillance and battle management system to control all ASAT capabilities, and will coordinate the integration of those elements with the kinetic energy and directed energy ASAT weapons development efforts.

The decision announced Thursday followed a Defense Acquisition Board review on Jan. 9.



Annual banquet benefits historically black colleges

The Redstone community is invited to the 11th anniversary United Negro College Fund banquet, which is described as the largest annual sit-down dinner in Huntsville.

March 23 is the date for the event that benefits UNCF's 42 historically black colleges. "An Evening of Gold" will begin at 7 in the north hall of the Von Braun Civic Center.

"This is the largest annual sit-down event or banquet in Huntsville in terms of numbers," said Emmett Florence, a Redstone worker and member of the north Alabama UNCF committee. As many as 2,000 people have attended in past years.

"This is the 11th year so it has become kind of a tradition," Florence said. "In that this is the year of the state's homecoming (the Alabama Reunion), it works well with that."

Florence Griffith Joyner, "Flo-Jo," winner of three gold medals in the Olympics, is the scheduled speaker. She recently announced her retirement from track in

order to pursue other interests. Last week Flo-Jo was named winner of the Sullivan Award as the nation's best amateur athlete of 1988.

Also appearing at the special dinner will be Reva Rice Liddell of the Broadway musical "Starlight Express" and recording artist Whintley Phipps. Bob Baron, weather forecaster on local television station WAFF-48, will be master of ceremonies.

The 42 private, historically black schools include Huntsville's Oakwood College, Talladega (Ala.) College, and Birmingham's Miles College, among others.

"It's open to the public; you don't have to be a graduate of one of these schools," Florence said, referring to the banquet. "Their ticket is tax deductible and it goes 100 percent for education. It doesn't go to any one school in particular. It goes to the national committee which disperses funds to the various schools based on the national committee's criteria. So there is fair dispersion of funds to the various schools."

The ticket fee is a tax-deductible donation of \$35, \$25 for students. "We look forward to seeing as many members of the Redstone community as we can, especially the soldier that's here for training that can be classified as a student regardless of age," Florence said.





Smoking cessation may get paid for

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Office Of Personnel Management director Constance Horner has circulated a draft Federal Personnel Manual letter that, when finalized, would allow agencies to use available funds to pay for the costs of employee participation in smoking cessation programs.

"Smoking cessation programs, particularly for federal employees are long overdue. This is a positive step," Horner said.

The draft regulation is being issued in response to a recent ruling by the comptroller general of the U.S., which held that smoking is a major contributing cause of illnesses, such as cancer, coronary disease and emphysema. The regulation would require that employees

get approval in advance for employer reimbursement of the cost of smoking cessation classes.

In the Feb. 3 ruling, the comptroller general states that before agencies could incur costs associated with employee participation in smoking cessation programs, the U.S. Office of Personnel Management would have to amend the Federal Personnel Manual to add smoking cessation as a health prevention activity that agencies can include as part of the employee health services program.

A reformed smoker, Horner has been a leader in promoting health and fitness activities for federal employees.
