Redstone's Army civilian payroll

Workers get their share of more than \$8 million every two weeks

Imagine being responsible for paying as many as 11,000 Army civilian workers every two weeks.

It's not an easy job for the civilian payroll section of the pay and examination branch at Finance & Accounting — especially with all the phone calls and visitors. But the members of that section do want to hear from you. They're conducting a customer service survey to find out how they can do an even better job.

"We just would like to go out to the employees, we want to know how we can better serve them," said Carolyn Hames, chief of the civilian payroll section. "We are a service organization. They are our primary concern."

The number of civilian workers paid by the section ranges from 10,500 to 11,000, depending on the time of year — with summer hires and so forth. These include all Army civilian workers at Redstone as well as those who might be stationed elsewhere. "We pay Kwajalein (an atoll in the Marshall Islands) people, we have employees at Kuwait and Egypt," Hames said. "We pay all firefighters located here on the post."

F&A's accounting people provide the civilian payroll section with the accounting classifications — what funds the pay comes out of. The section then cites the appropriate fund. Any change concerning pay or leave, whether it comes from the civilian personnel office or the worker involved, is processed by the section. This could include a change in tax status, bonds, allotments, address or anything else connected with pay or leave.

"Anytime an employee wishes to make a change — for instance a tax change, he fills out a W4 that he obtains from his admin office and he can either forward it to us or handcarry it down. When we receive that, we would process it just as quick as we could to make that change effective," Hames said.

Form 50 actions from the personnel office — for such things as ingrade increases, change to lower grade, reassignment or for life insurance — have an effective date on them. "We try to process them by their effective date if we receive them on time," Hames

said. "If not, if the effective date has passed, then we would make it retroactive back to the effective date."

In March there were 5,483 permanent pay changes, 2,227 temporary changes, and 16,133 time and attendance exceptions (time cards for people who worked outside the normal 80 hour pay period). Forms received from the personnel office totaled 3,094. And the 21-member civilian payroll section received 2,300 phone calls and 230 visitors that month.

The section still managed to ensure workers took home their share of the \$8,560,714 for the biweekly pay period ending March 25.

Several changes have occurred over the last two years in the way the Army pays its civilian workers.

These include the Thrift Savings Plan which has been offered to workers whereby they can elect to have whatever percentage or dollar amount they wish to go into that savings account. There are now two retirement systems. The old Civil Service Retirement System has been joined by the Federal Employees Retirement System; new employees are covered under the FERS system. Whereas workers under the old CSRS system have 7 percent of their basic pay go toward retirement and 1.45 percent go toward Medicare; workers under the newer system have .94 percent of their pay go toward FERS and 7.51 percent of their pay go toward Social Security.

As of April 6, three weeks into the campaign, the total was \$28,559. The drive ends May 15.


"I think it's doing great," said Juanita Adams, the AER officer for Redstone Arsenal.

Ex-prisoners of war receive medals in ceremony here

Twenty-four residents of North Alabama have received the Prisoner of War Medal from the commandant of the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School.

Col. Jim Griffin made the presentations Monday morning in Toftoy Hall in a ceremony requested by the North Alabama Chapter of American Ex-Prisoners of War of Alabama. The recipients are former POW's of World War II and the Korean War.

A grateful nation has recognized ex-prisoners of war for their sacrifice in support of our country's involvement in the wars of this century. Former prisoners of war receive a medal honoring them for their service. Except for sacrificing their lives for the country they loved, no service member has given up more for their country than an ex-POW.

To qualify for the Prisoner of War Medal, a service member must have been taken prisoner during an armed conflict — World War I, World War II, Korea or Vietnam — and must have displayed honorable service during the period of captivity. It is estimated that 142,000 U.S. service members were captured during those armed conflicts. The medal may be awarded posthumously to the legal next of kin.

The U.S. Army's Institute of Heraldry was tasked to design the medal. Designs were solicited from the military services, veterans' organizations and private citizens, and more than 300 proposals were submitted. A Joint Service Panel reviewed all of the proposals and selected the design submitted by Jay C. Morris, a civilian employee of the Department of the Army.

The public law authorizing the Prisoner of War Medal specifies that the medal shall be accorded for individual heroism, meritorious achievement or service, and before any other service medal, campaign medal or service ribbon authorized to be displayed.

Constitution Walk dedicated at Botanical Gardens

The nation's first and only "Constitution Walk," memorializing the delegates of the 1787 U.S. Constitution Convention, was dedicated last week in Huntsville.

City, county and state dignitaries were on hand for the ceremony at the Huntsville-Madison County Botanical Gardens. Alabama Gov. Guy Hunt attended, along with Huntsville Mayor Steve Hettinger. Brig. Gen. Larry Capps, deputy commander of MICOM, represented the Army at the dedication ceremony.

Constitution Walk is a 1,087-foot long, six-foot wide concrete walkway around a man-made pond in the Huntsville-Madison County Botanical Gardens, located just south of Bob Wallace Avenue. The walk honors and memorializes the delegates to the 1787 Constitution Convention that adopted the United States Constitution on Sept. 23, 1787.

A touring exhibit, "Defending the Constitution," illustrating the role of the military in support of the Constitution, was brought to Huntsville by the Bicentennial Office at the Pentagon for the dedication ceremony. The exhibit began its tour of the country in Annapolis, Md., in September 1986 and has since been displayed in state capitals and at Bicentennial activities throughout America.

Officially recognized by the Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, the exhibit was accompanied to Huntsville by two members of the Army's "Old Guard" Regiment who were available to answer questions about the Constitution and its signers.


Albert Brewer, ex-governor of Alabama and professor of Constitution Law and Government at Samford University in Birmingham, in his dedication remarks called the United States Constitution the "greatest charter for freedom ever devised by man."

Following the ceremony, the American Legion Post 237 color guard led dignitaries and guests in the first walk on Constitution Walk. Imbedded in the pebbled walkway are bronze memorial tablets for each delegate to the Constitutional Convention. Adjacent to each tablet is planted a native American maple tree that will grow about 125 feet tall and have a lifespan of more than 100 years.


The Huntsville-Madison County Botanical Gardens is located on land the Army donated to the city of Huntsville who in turn leased it to the Botanical Gardens. The gardens opened to the public in May of last year.

Army goals soar for aircraft structure repairman

Many young men and women choose to enter the military for various reasons. Some want to travel, some are interested in the educational opportunities and some are looking for adventure.

For more than six years, Sgt. Ed Power has served in the Army as an aircraft structure repairman. He didn't choose the military for the travel or the educational opportunities nor was he looking for an adventure. His reasons were much closer to the heart. Pride, loyalty, a sense of patriotism and dedication led this 28-year-old to serve.

"I really felt serving in the Army was something I should do," Power said. "My parents came to the United States from Ireland in the 1940s. The United States gave them a lot of opportunities and helped them. This is my way of showing my gratitude."

The last five years, Power has worked at Redstone's Airfield performing a variety of duties.

"There really isn't a lot of major repair work at Redstone; we don't rack up our aircraft too often," he said. "Therefore, I have many other duties such as building fire warden and environmental NCOIC for the airfield."

Working at Redstone has been a good assignment because he has been able to work in areas of aviation maintenance which he might not have gotten elsewhere, he said.

Outside the airfield Power has performed extra duty as squad member, leader and NCO-in-charge of funeral details. "I take all my jobs in the Army very seriously but performing funeral details is one area where I'm a perfectionist," Power said.

A funeral is a very emotional time for families. "I don't take this detail lightly," he said.

Power believes if something is worth doing then it is worth doing right and if you are not going to do it right then don't do it.

That same philosophy contributed to his success in the Basic NCO course which he completed in mid March. At the end of the eight week course, Power was "Top Dog."

As distinguished honor graduate, from a course that teaches everything from drill and ceremony to structure repair of all Army aircraft, Power said he worked hard to gain as much knowledge as possible.

Knowledge was the reason Power chose to enter the service as an enlisted soldier opposed to coming in as an officer.

"I felt I could gain more knowledge of the Army and how it works if I had hands-on training and the only way I felt I could get the training and experience was to come in as an enlisted soldier."

He feels he has now gained that training and experience and wants to turn in a Aviation Warrant Officer Packet for Maintenance.

"When I signed up I was offered a commission but I wanted to come in under the enlisted program; I wanted to gain knowledge of the military and I have always known I could apply later if I wanted," Power said.

Cycling and running keep Power in shape physically while reading historical books and magazines help to keep him in shape mentally. He said he also enjoys photography in his spare time.

Power's plans include a move to Egypt in December. "I have both good and bad feelings about leaving," he said. "I'm sure there will be a lot for me to learn while assigned there."

Other changes have included the standard Army pay day which began in 1987. Civilian workers Armywide have the same legal pay day which is Thursday. A new process called leave sharing has begun. In this, the personnel office determines qualified leave recipients and then the paperwork goes to the civilian payroll section with the donors so that leave can be taken from the donors and given to the recipients. Another change is that the section is required to pay on-the-spot cash awards — not all cash awards, but on-the-spot ones — within two days after receipt of the award. If it cannot get those paid within two days, the section must make a supplemental payment which is a manual process from start to finish.

"How do you say overworked and underpaid," Hames said, laughing, when asked how her section has dealt with all the recent changes. "We have just absorbed the changes and still made payroll on time."

And now they want to hear from the people they serve. The survey questions are reprinted in today's

Rocket and forms should be available at building 8027.

"We want to know their suggestions and ideas so that we can better improve our service to them," Hames said. "You know the saying, 'if it ain't broke don't fix it'. If it's broke, we want to fix it. That's why we want to know about it."

Time again for spring cleanup week at Redstone

"Pride in Redstone is Picking Up. Make Redstone Beautiful" is the slogan for Annual Spring Cleanup Week on Redstone Arsenal.

Set for April 17 through 22, the event runs in conjunction with Huntsville and Madison County's campaigns which began in mid-March.

"This year we have a new emphasis in the campaign — to get rid of old equipment laying around," said Col. Perry Butler, commander of Redstone Arsenal Support Activity. "Also we have expanded our emphasis to include the work force and the entire arsenal, where in the past our efforts have been oriented toward the housing area."

Another goal in this year's campaign is getting rid of surplus supplies and unused or discarded equipment, "things that add clutter to our post and work areas," noted Dave Crockett, post coordinator for cleanup week. "Our goal is to get everyone at Redstone Arsenal involved to not only clean up but to get rid of junk."

The Directorate of Engineering and Housing is encouraging all Redstone elements to work with building custodians to make Redstone beautiful. To accommodate this effort, shrubbery, plants and landscaping materials will be available to family housing occupants, troop units and office workers beginning Friday, April 14, and continuing each workday through April 22.

"We feel that (offering landscaping materials) will give residents and users an added incentive to beautify the area in which they live or work," Crockett said. Pickup point is the enclosed area at the intersection of Gray and Vincent Roads, behind building 3610, across from the Post Craft Shop.

Other plans to promote spring cleanup include extra garbage pick ups in the family housing areas on April 17, 21 and 24, time for civilians to clean up their work areas, and one-half day off for military personnel to clean up on and off post, said Crockett.

An all out effort for beautification and cleanup will be made on April 15 and again on April 22, when the Directorate of Engineering and Housing will have roving teams in the housing areas to spot check progress in the landscaping effort. Additionally, they will distribute top soil, offer planting advice, and answer landscaping questions, according to Peggy Boyd, housing assistant manager.

In addition to the spring cleanup campaign, April opens competition for Yard-of-The-Month awards in both the family housing area and troop units. The first week of the contest is April 24 and will continue through August.

Four winners each month will be chosen in the family housing area. Winners receive a Yard-of-The-Month sign, a free meal at the Officers or NCO Club, a Certificate of Appreciation signed by Maj. Gen. Gus Cianciolo, commander of MICOM and Redstone







Program to provide safe houses for children

A crime prevention program for children in which certain residences are designated as safe places for youngsters to go to when frightened may get under way here in April.

It's called the "McGruff Safe House Program." Redstone residents can volunteer to be considered as a possible safe house member. They would go through the same background check that is conducted for family child care providers.

"This is not a new program. It's just one we have not implemented here before," said Ray Clift, chief of investigations branch at Provost Marshal Office. "We started back in December '87 trying to get things together. And we hope to have it in effect here in the near future."

Children outdoors who are in some form of distress — such as being approached by a stranger or frightened for some other reason — could run to a house with a "McGruff House" emblem in its window. These designated houses would be "a safe haven for them to go into," Clift explained. The program was originated by the Utah Council for Crime Prevention.

Safe house members must abide by certain rules. They are advised to be on the lookout for motorists

traveling in the housing area at low speeds, or suspicious-looking occupants of parked vehicles, or people loitering near schools or playgrounds. They cannot give the child food or drink, nor any type of medication, nor apply anything to a laceration or abrasion, nor transport a child in their personal car. Any aid given to a child must be reported to the program coordinator. They are advised to get as much information as they can from the child and to call the police.

Ten volunteers have applied for the program so far. Like family child care providers, volunteers for this program undergo a background check which includes the National Crime Information Center out of Baltimore, Clift said. Once the applicants are cleared, McGruff House emblems are to be issued at the child development center and the children told to look for a house with that emblem in times of trouble.

"We hope that this is a continuing program where people continue to volunteer their services," Clift said.

To volunteer, Redstone residents can call the child development center 876-7880.

"We hope that it (the program) will be in effect during the Month of the Military Child," Clift said.

Children's month events continue

An exercise program, free bowling and a puppet show are among this week's activities for the Month of the Military Child.

Child Development Services and Youth Services will offer a "Kindercize" exercise program for young children at 10 a.m. Friday at the Youth Center. The public is invited.

On Saturday from 3-6 p.m., children can bowl for free if accompanied by their parents at the Bowling Center, according to bowling center manager Billie Kuhn.

The Exceptional Family Member Program and Youth Services will offer the Kids of Huntsville puppet show this evening (April 12) at 6 at the Youth Center. The public is invited.

Also, Youth Services will present the Vagabond

Marionettes at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 18 at the Youth Center.

Redstone's Golf Course will offer a free bucket of balls to each child accompanied by a paid adult every Sunday in April.

Participants in Month of the Military Child include Child Development Services, American Junior Red Cross, Redstone Fire Department, Saddle Club, NCO and Officers Wives Clubs, Total Tots Program, the Scouts, Provost Marshal Office, Youth Services, Multicrafts Center, Bowling Center, Golf Course, Recreation Center, Outdoor Recreation, and Army Community Service.





"I'm proud to be able to represent Redstone at the trials," Johns said, "and I'm real excited about competing with the caliber of people that will be there. I feel it's a great honor to be selected to go and I'm proud to be able to go."


Both are enjoying probably their best bowling year ever. And Baier and Johns each planned on taking six of his own bowling balls with him to Fort Belvoir to give his best shot at making the All-Army team.

Baier, 23, is from Belvidere, Ill., which is about 75 miles west of Chicago. He began bowling at about age 8 in junior leagues. "Threw a straight ball just like most individuals who are starting out," he recalled. Baier joined the Army in July 1983 and came to Redstone from Germany in May 1988. From about 1983-87, he didn't bowl at all. "I just started bowling seriously last year," he said. Last year while stationed at Nuremberg, he bowled personal bests of a 269 game and 728 series and he also advanced from the community rolloff to the 7th Corps rolloff. This year he has improved from the 180 average he had in league play overseas and his 194 average in the community tournament there.

"It's a lot of fun to get together with other people who also enjoy bowling," said Baier, supply sergeant in Electronics and Technology Training Department at Toftoy Hall. "If I don't shoot 200, I don't get too upset about it. I just try to have fun every time I bowl."

Baier, whose wife's name is Petra, bowls about 12 games a week. "I think I have a better chance of shooting an 800 series than I do of shooting a 300 game," he said.

Johns, 36, is from Olustee, Fla., which is about 60 miles west of Jacksonville. Back when he was in high school, he would bowl every once in a while but he says he didn't really start bowling until 1984 while stationed in Augsburg, Germany. He didn't buy his first

bowling ball until 1985. "I started out with a 120 average," he said. Now, he probably has about 10 bowling balls at home and has more than a 200 average. Johns recommends having the right equipment and the right concentration. "Don't let little things distract you," he said. "And being consistent—if you can be consistent and shoot your high games and stay as close to your average as you can, you'll have a chance of making the All-Army team."

He joined the Army in 1977 and came to Redstone from Augsburg in November 1986. Johns finished fifth in the post rolloff in 1987, second in 1988 and second this year. He will be leaving for Korea this September. He and his wife, Julie, have a 12-year-old son, Brian, and 10-year-old daughter, Jennifer.

Johns, logistics supply NCO in the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle project office, bowls about 18 games a week and practices maybe 30. "I'm bowling the best I've ever bowled so far," he said. "I've had two 700 series in the last two weeks." The closest he has gotten to bowling a perfect 300 game was a 290 he shot last year in a tournament in Chattanooga.

"My main goal is to maintain a 200 average for two years so I can apply for my PBA (Professional Bowlers Association) card; and then once I retire from the Army, to try to get on the senior tour because I'll probably be too old to compete with all these young guys," Johns said.

"And I hope to shoot a 300 at Redstone Arsenal before I leave which is maybe, maybe not."

"You have a good chance," Baier told him.







Soldiers retain debt collection rights afforded civilians

The Fair Debt Collection Practices Act provides you with the assurance of fair and ethical treatment by debt collectors, regardless of whether or not you are serving on active duty.

The FDCPA applies to the collection of consumer oriented debts such as credit cards, installment loans, student loans, revolving accounts, and medical expenses. Because a soldier joins the military does not mean that he relinquishes the protections afforded by federal law. Soldiers are not required by Army regulation to pay any unjust debts in order to prevent creditors from contacting their commanders.

Soldiers should be aware that they have a right to challenge the validity of any debt within 30 days after they receive the first notice. At that time, the soldier should require verification of the debt from the creditor or collector. Debt collectors are prohibited from making threats of violence, using obscene language, and making harassing telephone calls to debtors. All collectors' phone calls must be made at reasonable times, and should not be inconvenient. Soldiers should be aware that a collector is specifically prohibited from discussing your debt with third parties such as your employer or your neighbor. To release information, the debt collector must first receive your written permission or the consent of a court. A debt collector cannot discuss your debt with your commander. The collector may discuss the debt problem with his attorney or your attorney. A debt collector can request that your commander provide him with your address and telephone number, but he cannot reveal the nature of his call. Soldiers should note that no creditor can be forced to accept a payment plan on defaulted debts. Most creditors are willing to work with soldiers who have a payment pattern that shows that they previously paid their debts promptly.

When a creditor contacts a commander requesting assistance in the collection of a debt, the commander must first ensure that the debt collector has complied

with the provisions of Army Regulation 600-15, Chapter 4. The commander should then contact the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate (Administrative Law section) for legal advice and send the soldier to see a legal assistance attorney. Although the commander may deem it necessary to contact the debtor regarding Army policy and procedures, he should refrain from making any further contact with the creditor on behalf of the soldier because this may prejudice the soldier's rights. Commanders should avoid mediating payment plans on behalf of the soldier. The soldier may be reluctant to make full disclosures to his command that may create unnecessary court delay.

Soldiers who dispute debts cannot be ordered to make payments, however, they are required to manage their personal affairs satisfactorily and pay their debts promptly. Failure to do so could damage their credit rating and also affect the Army's public image. The Army, however, has no legal authority to force soldiers to pay their debts. The Army cannot divert any part of a soldier's pay even though payment of a debt was decreed by a civil court. Only civil authorities can enforce the payment of private debts. The Army does have provisions for the garnishment of military pay in child support and alimony cases; therefore, a valid civil judgment must be satisfied from other assets of the military member. The Army does not try to judge, settle disputes, or deny whether claims are

valid. The Army, by regulation, bears the responsibility to protect the rights of the soldier and his family members.

Soldiers do not forfeit any constitutional protections afforded any other taxpaying citizen. Creditors cannot contact a soldier's commander and request that the soldier initiate payments by allotment or send sample copies of allotment forms to the soldier. Commanders should ensure that their subordinates exercise extreme care when discussing debt complaints with soldiers. In addition to the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, other states such as Florida, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New York, North Carolina and Wisconsin have passed laws that forbid creditors from contacting employers.

Creditors at a minimum should be required to provide a signed copy of the certificate of compliance with DoD Standards of Fairness showing compliance with:

- The Truth in Lending Act
- The Federal Reserve Board Regulations Z
- State Regulations
- A true copy of the signed contract before a commander is authorized to provide assistance.

When these provisions of the regulations are met, then we ensure that we are taking care of the soldier, and they realize that federal law protects them along with Army regulation.

Army people have recourse for damaged shipments

If you have recently made a permanent change of station, then you might have had your household goods or your privately owned vehicle shipped halfway around the world at government expense. Sometimes, the movers the government selects to move your goods do not handle your shipment with the same delicacy you would, and suddenly you find your brand new VCR or your beautiful sports car is no longer new or beautiful.

If this has happened to you, you might not have to suffer a total loss. You might be able to file a claim against the government to recover your losses or reasonable costs of repairs.

Who may present a claim for loss of or damage to household goods or vehicle? Only a member of the armed forces, a civilian employee of the Department of the Army, or a civilian employee of the Department of Defense who is not an employee of the Department of the Navy or the Department of the Air Force, may present household goods or vehicle claims to the Redstone Arsenal Claims Office. Claimants must have their household goods or vehicle shipped pursuant to government orders authorizing them to do so.

If you have private insurance covering the loss of or damage to your property, then you must file a claim with your insurance carrier prior to or concurrent with filing a claim against the government. The claims process is not intended to be a substitute for insurance covering your loss, but is purely gratuitous on the part of the government.

Claims procedure

The first thing you should do after the movers deliver your household goods is to file with the Claims Office the original DD 1840 form, which is the Notice of Loss or Damage at Delivery, that the movers left with you after they delivered your goods. The DD 1840 must be filed within 70 days of delivery, or you may not recover fully. All losses and damages should be noted on that form. If your mover did not leave an 1840 with you, then you should pick one up from the Inbound Section of the Transportation Office, building 112. When you file your 1840, the claims clerk will give you a household goods claims packet, with all the necessary forms and instructions.

Next, you should attend a claims briefing, covering the details of how to obtain estimates, what is and is not payable, and other pertinent information. These briefings are conducted by the claims examiner, James Friday, and are held each Friday at 9 a.m. in building 111, room G31. The briefing should last about 30 minutes.

If you have a privately-owned-vehicle claim for damages caused during shipment, then you should first pick up a POV packet from the Claims Office and then return the completed DD 788, which is the Pick up and Delivery Document, a DD 1840 and DD 1844, which you will find in your packet, and one estimate of repair from a reputable repair shop.

Schedule appointment

Once you have completed the necessary forms and obtained your estimates of repair, then you should call

876-9911 to make an appointment with the claims clerk, Pat Cross. Claims will be accepted from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., but *appointments are highly encouraged*. Appointments are scheduled for 30 minutes each from 7:30-11:30 a.m. Monday through Thursday. Appointments are encouraged to ensure your claims file is complete, to correct errors on the spot, and to explain the claims process to you. The Claims Office is located in building 111, room G40.

You have two years from the date your claim arose, usually the date of delivery of your goods or vehicle, to file a claim with the Army. Note, however, that filing the DD 1840 does not suffice. You must file with an Army claims office a written, signed demand for compensation; a completed and signed DD 1842 and DD 1844 will satisfy the demand requirement, both of which forms you will find in the claims packet you can pick up at the Claims Office.






