Four individuals recognized for donating their time to this community





Four people have been selected as Redstone Arsenal's volunteers of the year for 1989-90.

The award recipients include Blanche Moore, for Redstone Arsenal military community sustained service; Maj. Arturo Sala, for youth service volunteer; Milagros Cruz, for community service involvement; and Jane Osterman, military community sustained service.

They were selected from among 16 nominees, according to Sue Paddock, the installation volunteer coordinator. Award presentations were set for 11:30 a.m. Monday, April 23 at the Officers Club.

National Volunteer Week is observed April 22-28.

Moore started volunteering at Redstone Arsenal in 1962. Sala has worked with the youth sports program here. Cruz is an Army Community Service volunteer and was one of the main organizers of the Hispanic Heritage Month observance this past year. Osterman has volunteered at the Thrift Shop for 29 years, Paddock said.

Other volunteers recognized include Atty Allred, Leah Amato, Donald Butler, Sharon Cantrell, Col. Dan Dalzell, Christa Devanney, Lillian Kawano, Victoria Morgan, Gisela Mullek, Mary Parrish, Keasta Sanders and Jeanette Worden.

Milagros Cruz

Cruz, a Redstone resident, donates her time to the information and referral program at Army Community Service. She does a lot of things at ACS including helping with reception, the lending closet, and the welcome packets. She works there about 15 hours a week.

"I enjoy it. I know that I'm working for a good cause and I enjoy it," said Cruz, a 33-year-old native of Santurce, Puerto Rico. She became an ACS volunteer when she arrived from Germany two years ago. She and her husband, SSgt. Gilberto Cruz of 515th Ordnance Company, have three sons: Gilberto Jr., 7, Erick, 6, and Emmanuel, 2 and a half.

"I think it's a great community. I enjoy working here with very nice people, very professional. They opened the doors to me and my family, especially the ACS program. They help me in everything that I need, too," she said. Cruz also does volunteer work at Ridgcrest School where her two oldest sons attend.

She serves as room mother for Sandra Tomlin, Gilberto's first grade teacher, and Deborah Nunez, Erick's kindergarten teacher. Her youngest son attends the Child Development Center on post.

Cruz manages to share her time with her family and the community. "I just try to be involved always. And I don't mean I don't take care of my house; I take care of my house, I take care of my family, too. I just love to do," she said. "I think everybody that knows me knows that I'm a hard worker, and I just love to do something constructive."

She received a bachelor's degree in labor relations from the University of Puerto Rico in 1980. "My husband decided to join the Army in 1983, and I followed him," she said. "I want to say thanks to my husband because of his support."

"I want to say thank you for the ACS staff; they really are nice to me, especially Mrs. Frances Howard (director of the information and referral program)," Cruz said.

"And I want to say to the military wives: Just don't stay at home; there is too much to do for this community," she said. "Even when I don't earn money, I get the satisfaction that I do something good for the community and for my family. This is a great community that needs a little bit from everyone, from everybody."

Blanche Moore

Moore represents the NCO Wives Club on the Space Camp board at Army Community Service, and also works with the Total Tots program. She attends monthly meetings for Total Tots, and quarterly meetings for the Space Camp board. Through the years, she has served in all the offices of the NCO Wives Club. "While I was president, the thing I was most proud of was we started the scholarship program; and we were the first of all military installations to give a scholarship," she recalls. "It wasn't much either, a hundred dollars. But that was back in what — 1964."

In 1962, Moore came to Huntsville from Fort Sill, Okla., where her husband, J.R., had retired from the Army as a master sergeant. J.R. went to work for Teledyne Brown, then Sperry, and then Unisys Corp. where he retired about a year and a half ago after 26 years. Moore, who grew up in Mobile, began her volunteer work at Redstone in '62 as director of the

catechetical program for Catholics. She served in that capacity for 11 years.

"There was a Mrs. Fields, who was a Marine officer, asked me if I'd be interested in taking over the Child Care Center. And I was interviewed by the board (of the center) and given the job. At that time, it was a private organization. I got that job in 1964; I made \$250 a month. As I say, it was a private organization," Moore said. She served as director of the child care center for 21 years, until retiring in 1985.

Her volunteer work is with children's programs. "It's very satisfying to me to be instrumental in helping a child because I think the youth are the secret to our country. If we don't do something for these kids, we're going to be in sad shape. I love children," Moore said.

She has a son, two daughters, and eight grandchildren. At 72 her hobbies include bowling, swimming and traveling.

"Of all the years that I've been here, I've truly enjoyed being a part of Redstone Arsenal. I've met some wonderful people. On the whole, this is a good place," Moore said.

"It gives me a lot of satisfaction to see a child being helped and maybe giving them that spark that'll help them later on in their life," she said.

Jane Osterman

Osterman, 77, has been a volunteer at the Thrift Shop ever since she arrived in Huntsville in 1961. Her husband, James, had retired from the Army as a colonel at Fort McPherson, Ga.; he came to work here in '61 and retired from civil service in '69.

The Thrift Shop is a place where military people and government workers can sell used items — just about everything except tires, shoes and hats. Anybody can buy the items. "We sell a lot of furniture, all kinds of furniture, and even big appliances sometimes, too," Osterman said. One of 25-30 volunteers at the shop, she works from three to four hours a week in the tag room. "We consign (items) in one room, and then tag them in the other, then they're put out on the floor," she explained.

"I like working with the people," Osterman said. "And it serves the community." People can buy good

Time accounting

Editor:

We are using this forum to report heretofore ignored and apparently officially sanctioned frequent instances of civilian payroll time accounting fraud, waste and abuse. Strong words, you bet, but the time has come for remedial action especially in light of the hiring freeze and austere funding. What I am referring to are the numerous duty day farewell and retirement luncheons held at off-post restaurants. Time accounting procedures require that annual leave be charged for time spent away from work in excess of the established meal period unless the commander has authorized administrative leave for the absence. A recent check of time accounting submissions for organizations sponsoring such events showed that administrative absence was not authorized nor was annual leave charged. Average time spent away from the cost center was 1:45 and some employees returned to work in less than optimum functioning condition after consuming alcoholic beverages at these luncheons. When that "extra" hour is multiplied by the grades of participants and their hourly rate, we are looking at a substantial sum of payroll dollars that is being paid in response to bogus time accounting submissions.

We are not suggesting that these luncheons be discontinued because they are obviously organizational cohesiveness and esprit developing events. Ideally, future event organizers will demonstrate more prudent judgment and minimize lost duty time by holding luncheons on-post. While there will probably still be an excessive lunch period involved, at least one half an hour of commute time will be eliminated and the alcoholic beverage factor will not surface. I would also imagine that the clubs could probably use the business from these semi-official events. So let's get with it, supervisors, and avoid the embarrassment of having to justify wasted productivity not accounted for on time cards.

We need you as a member to help finance the workload we must carry. We need the members to help out in Congress. Your job here is your life and we need to work together for improvements in all areas. We want your help.

(Editor's note — The Housing Management Division provided the following information: Letters were provided to occupants affected by the cracked combustion chambers in their furnaces as they were turned off. In the letters, each affected occupant was given the options to either stay in their quarters or stay elsewhere. Accommodations were provided in the Post Guest House or to a local motel for those who did not desire to remain in their quarters. For those that did remain in their quarters, it was suggested that they might use their stove tops during the waking hours and if needed, electric space heaters would be provided. The letter was informative and gave names and phone numbers to contact for occupant requirements. At the first notice that workmen would be turning off furnaces, Housing Management personnel handcarried to each affected quarters a letter of instructions as the furnaces were being turned off. After the second day, a supply of letters was given to the workmen who were actually inspecting the furnaces to make distribution. As the workman turned off each furnace, a copy of the letter was handed to the occupant. From this distribution, each affected quarters did receive a letter of instructions to ask for help as was the case when the furnace was actually replaced.)

New facility slated for AAWS-M full scale development

Martin Marietta Missile Systems and Texas Instruments will join with the Army Monday to dedicate a new facility on Redstone Arsenal to assemble, integrate and test full-up rounds for the AAWS-M full scale development program.

The facility, housed in building 7284, is located on Sheffield Road, just off Patton, near the Environmental Test Lab.

Participating in the program, scheduled to begin at 3:30 p.m. will be Maj. Gen. William Chen, MICOM commander; Col. Earl Finley, AAWS-M project

manager; Leonard Wroten, president of Martin Missile Systems; Lawrence Freeman, president of the TI/Martin AAWS-M joint venture; and Dean Clubb, senior vice president of TI's Missile Systems Division.

A reception and tour of the facility is scheduled for invited guests immediately following the ribbon cutting ceremony, according to Dennis Smith of Martin, the facility manager.

Smith said the facility will receive sub assemblies and components from TI, Martin and their subcontractors, and integrate the hardware into full-up rounds ready for testing.

Delivery of the first round to the Army is scheduled this June.

Completion of the full scale development program is scheduled in December 1991, to be followed by low rate initial production.

When fielded in the early 1990s, AAWS-M will allow Army and Marine infantrymen to attack and destroy the latest enemy tanks and armored vehicles with a one-man portable system.

Advanced Antitank Weapon System-Medium is lighter, more lethal and has a longer range than the Dragon it will replace and is easier to operate.

Fourteen graduate from new weapon system course

The Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School has graduated a class which was the first of its kind.

Fourteen students graduated from the seven-week Avenger Instructor and Key Personnel Course. OMMCS and Missile Command soldiers attended the course as well as civilian personnel.

"Since my military occupational skill was being deleted, I decided to take the course," said SSgt. Jerry Butler, course graduate. "It's a new system and therefore will provide excellent promotion opportunities."

Sgt. James Smith, another graduate, said, "I believe we got the best training for the course that anyone will

ever have because we were taught by the contractors. I liked the enthusiasm the contractors had in getting us the right tools; they weren't satisfied until we knew exactly what we were doing."

The three areas of training included organizational maintenance, intermediate maintenance, and direct support. Contractors from OMMCS, Boeing, and General Dynamics (California Valley Systems Divisions), trained the students on the Avenger system.

"I liked being in the first class to graduate because it will mean that I have a big part to play in changes and improvements that are made on the system," said Sgt. Norman Burgess, course graduate.

"I think the Avenger system was harder to work on

because you have a smaller area to work in," Smith said.

SFC Wilson Temean was an instructor for part of the course. "I liked the whole course and I never lost interest," Temean said. "A couple of things that need improving are: putting information on the system in military terminology to enable soldiers to better understand it, and obtaining more technical information. The system is something new that's really good."

Military justice system has roots in Constitution

Editor's note: The following article was submitted by the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.

As we celebrate the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights, it is appropriate for the military community to take this opportunity to celebrate another anniversary. In 1990, the Uniform Code of Military Justice will be 40 years old.

This article will attempt to provide the reader with an appreciation of the central role of the Supreme Court under the Constitution and the application of the Constitution to the military justice system.

The Constitution embodies two principles: our nation is one of laws and not men; and the military of our nation operates under civilian control. That we are a nation of laws and not men needs little explanation. No one is above the law; all officials must obey the law, no matter how urgent or important their mission. Civilian control of the military rests both with the president as commander in chief, and with the Congress, empowered to make laws governing the "land and naval forces."

These two principles merge in the system of justice created by the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). The men and women of the Army do not shed their rights under the Constitution and the Bill of Rights when they put on the uniform. The establishment of a system of justice that meets the needs of a disciplined Army while at the same time protecting the rights of the soldier has been an evolutionary process starting with the Articles of War adopted from the British by General of the Armies, George Washington and later enacted into law by the Continental Congress to the enactment of the UCMJ 40 years ago to the recent amendments permitting direct appeal of courts-martial to the Supreme Court.

Creating a new court system

In pre-revolutionary America, the specific responsibilities of the judges varied from colony to colony, but all judges generally served in two capacities: as intermediaries between colonial communities and the governor; and as leadership figures in the local areas. Judges often served at the will of the governor and were dismissed of their duties if they displeased the governor. The experience of the colonial period in relation to the tenure of judges was not forgotten by the members of the constitutional convention. The Declaration of Independence itself had indicted King George III for making judges dependent on his will. The founding fathers therefore agreed that federal judges had to be appointed to life tenures in order to escape the influences of government officials. This life tenure for judges has been a unique feature of the federal justice system. The founding fathers also agreed that one court must be superior to all other courts and must act as its own branch of government, separate from and equal to the executive and legislature. Article III of the Constitution sets out the requirement for this judicial branch. However, the

Constitution only provides for one mandatory court and that is the Supreme Court.

The early years of the Supreme Court were marked mainly by its inability to do anything. From 1789 to 1801, it decided only 55 cases. The justices rarely agreed on any one decision and often gave separate opinions on the cases it did hear. The appointment of John Marshall as the third Chief Justice in 1801 transformed the Court. This former captain in the Continental Army was an advocate of a strong central government. He is the primary creator of the unique institution we now recognize as the Supreme Court.

John Marshall

John Marshall was 19 years old when he volunteered for the Virginia militia shortly after the battles at Lexington and Concord. His leadership was immediately recognized and he fought as a lieutenant in the militia in the early days of the war. Eventually, he joined the Continental Army and fought as a captain in the battles of Germantown, Brandywine and Monmouth.

Marshall, as a company commander, shared the deprivations of his men in the winter quarters at Valley Forge. Selected junior officers would periodically be invited to dine with the commanding general; Marshall and other captains would borrow uniform items from each other to ensure they were in complete uniform while in the presence of George Washington.

It was in the Continental Army at Valley Forge that Marshall had his first legal experiences. In addition to his regular duties he was assigned as "judge advocate" to a number of courts-martial, with the duty to see that the proceedings were conducted in accordance to the Articles of War and in a just and fair manner.

Marshall himself, in a short autobiography, attributed much of his success in life to his experiences and the people he came in contact with while serving with the Continental Army. One of those people was George Washington. Marshall was greatly influenced by Washington's belief that the former colonies were in fact one nation, not a confederation of states. He later wrote a multi-volume biography of Washington.

During his term as chief justice of the Supreme Court, he transformed it from a disjointed collection of legal scholars into a branch of the federal government co-equal to the others and established it as the final interpreter of the Constitution. The power of the Supreme Court to interpret the Constitution was first established in the case of *Marbury vs. Madison*. William Marbury applied for a writ of mandamus — an order to compel a government official to do something — to compel the president to show cause

why Marbury's commission to federal office had not been delivered after its approval by Congress. This application for the writ was based on a 1789 act of Congress which gave the judiciary authority to issue writs of mandamus to "persons holding office under the authority of the United States," which would include the president. Marshall's decision had to settle a political dispute between the executive branch and the legislative branch. However, Marshall's decision did not actually settle this "political question" because he found that the Supreme Court lacked power to issue the writ of mandamus because the 1789 act violated Section III in the Constitution conferring original jurisdiction on the court. Thus in the process of construing U.S. law, Marshall decided that the Court had the authority to decide that acts of Congress violated the Constitution.

Courts and the military

The Constitution created a Supreme Court, and permitted Congress to establish other inferior courts and establish the jurisdiction of these courts. In 1789, the first Congress enacted the Judiciary Act, which provided for the establishment of inferior courts by establishing the United States district courts. An intermediate court, the U.S. circuit court, supervised these lower courts; and appellate jurisdiction from decisions of the circuit courts was vested in the Supreme Court, establishing three levels of federal courts. The establishment of the federal courts alongside the state courts was a unique experience in judicial history up to this period; for in no other country had a dual system been established.

The Constitution did not create any military courts. Again this was left to the Congress. Congress has created the Court of Military Appeals which is the highest military court answerable only to the decisions of the Supreme Court. The Court of Military Appeals consists entirely of civilian judges. All courts-martial convictions may be appealed to the Court of Military Appeals.

"Judges are not given the task of running the Army." "This Court has recognized that it is the primary business of armies and navies to fight or be ready to fight wars should the occasion arise. The responsibility for determining how best our Armed Forces should attend to that business rests with Congress and with the President." These two passages from Supreme Court decisions reflect the deference to legislative and executive judgments in the area of military affairs. This deference does not mean that Congress is free to disregard the Constitution when it acts in the area of military affairs. The Court has held that there are constitutional limits on the jurisdiction of courts-martial, even in wartime. Military officials cannot try civilians in military courts for offenses committed within the United States and its territories if civilian courts are operating. The Court has stated,

Quality of life issues explored at family symposium

More than 200 members of this community — active and retired military, civilian workers, and family members — participated in Redstone Arsenal's third annual Family Action Plan Symposium held Thursday.

Seven work groups discussed quality of life issues surfaced by a February-March survey and reported their recommendations that afternoon. The issues will be compiled into the Redstone Arsenal Family Action Plan to be published.

Those that cannot be answered locally are to be sent to Department of Army level. "Last year we had four issues that surfaced that needed to be addressed at the DA level and they are now included in the DA Family Action Plan," said Sue Paddock, symposium project manager. The family symposium project is under the Directorate of Community and Family Activities.

Work groups in the symposium held at the Challenger NCO Club included the following: medical and dental; morale, welfare and recreation; commissary and AAFES (Army and Air Force Exchange Service); youth education and family member employment; housing, traffic, and maintenance; transportation, personnel and finance; and single soldier. Subject matter experts were available to answer any questions.

"I think based on some of the things that we were able to achieve last year, people now see that we mean business — that we are looking at the concerns," said Bob Brown, director of the Directorate of Community and Family Activities. "It's not just a blow the smoke type thing. I think we've turned from years back a negative into a positive. I think we're making a lot of strides in that area.

"They see this as an avenue to get things done, so I think it's working well," Brown added.

The Army family action symposium will be held in November in Washington. "We really hope everybody goes in with the attitude to be realistic, because money's not there that's been there in the past," Brown said.

Winner of the pack-level competition was Eric Nobles. Runners-up were Zachary Kozatek and James Morrow.



MICOM worker distributes trees for Earth Day

Holly Harris wants to give you trees. She has plenty of them to give away. Thousands, as a matter of fact.

Harris, an engineer in the quantitative analysis branch of the Procurement Directorate, wanted to do something for Earth Day 1990, so she volunteered to direct the planting of 4,000 pine trees. She's being assisted in the effort by Don Holder and John Price.

"We were donated 4,000 trees by the Alabama Forestry Commission," she said. It's her responsibility to distribute them to anyone who will plant them.

So far, Harris has given away around 2,700 trees. Most have been distributed in conjunction with other Earth Day Activities, but Harris also held a neighborhood tree planting, during which she and other volunteers planted trees anywhere area residents requested.

"We went out with Earth Day volunteers to Huntsville, Owens Cross Roads, Meridianville and Ryland," she said. They planted 313 trees that day.

Groups are taking advantage of the opportunity to plant trees, too. Students at an elementary school in Athens plan to plant 100 trees, and the senior class of Lee High School plans to plant any trees that are left over after the giveaway.

The giving-away of trees is part of an Earth Day 1990 goal to plant a billion trees worldwide, Harris pointed out.

"It's important to plant trees because trees remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and store it until they die. Since carbon dioxide is the gas responsible for half of the greenhouse effect, trees act as a natural control against global warming," she said.

"Trees also help prevent flooding and help prevent soil erosion, not to mention providing us with wood, paper, fruit, nuts, shade, natural beauty and a buffer against noise," she said.

It's easy to plant the trees Harris is distributing. They're small — about a foot long, including the roots.

"Select a spot where nothing is overhanging, because the trees will get to be 50 or 60 feet tall. Dig a hole 10 to 12 inches deep and no less than three inches in diameter. When you insert the tree in the hole, make sure all the roots are pointing straight down in the ground. If a root is curled up, the tree will fall in a couple of years. Then, put enough dirt back around the tree to keep it standing straight up and water it," she

said. Everyone who takes trees can also have an instruction sheet on planting them.

The next public distribution of trees is set for April 28 at the Burritt Museum.

If you want some trees but can't make it to Saturday's giveaway, you can call 533-3323 to arrange to pick up as many as you need.

Exhibits will include an environmental science booth, a helicopter, a Red Cross disaster van, and a fire truck, among others.



Month of the Military Child activities will conclude with Saturday's block party and "Military Child Sunday" at all chapel services. The block party will be a communitywide effort whereas the other events during


the month have been sponsored "agency by agency," Mohler said. "But this one, we all get together."

This is the fifth year for the block party which was started by a community-active military policeman who called himself Officer Friendly. "And even just after he left, we continued it," Mohler said.

"Around 2,000" people are expected, she said. "That's our usual average, 2,000 to 2,500."



School safety

How protected do you feel your children are while they are attending school? I'm sure that you, like myself, would like to believe that nothing could happen to them there — after all, next to home, that is where our children spend the majority of their time. We blindly believe that if our children walk into the school in the morning then they will be there when school lets out.

Think again. Are you aware that anyone can walk into our schools and pick up our children? Obviously the schools recognize that this problem could arise because parents have to fill out an access card concerning who is authorized to pick our children up; however, the big flaw in this procedure is assuming that the school will verify the identity of the person picking them up in the first place.

At least two city schools (Westlawn and Morris) handed my children over without verifying who they were going with. In favor of Morris, the person I talked to had the humility to admit that that should not have happened. Perhaps having it pointed out will make them more aware, in the future, of who the children are going with. Westlawn's employee, however, must feel that she is above reproach. She claimed to never have had a child picked up by an unauthorized person. Perhaps, said I, that that was only through the Grace of God. She also made this comment to someone else behind the desk, "What does she think we should do, check everyone who comes in for a child?" I made her aware that I heard her and that yes, that is exactly what I expect.

With today's society as it is, only the most naive can pretend that this is not cause for alarm. Statistics show that children are often hurt by people known to them. I feel that schools should not rely solely on the child's familiarity with the person picking them up.

One of the most discouraging aspects of this all was when I talked to Dr. Greens' office of the Board of Education. Although he admitted that there is cause for concern, nothing is mandated through the Board of Education down to the schools to prevent something like this from happening.

We need to make our schools act more responsibly when it comes to our children. All someone needs to know is a child's name and at least two of our schools will just hand the child over. What about your child's school? Pick them up or send someone else to pick them up and you may be surprised.

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — A Fort Bragg NCO has been charged with premeditated murder and three counts of aggravated assault alleged to have occurred during Operation Just Cause in Panama in December 1989.

On April 10, 1st Sgt. Roberto Enrique Bryan from the 3rd Battalion, 504 Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division, was charged with:

- the murder of an unidentified Panamanian man by shooting him with an M16 rifle on or about December 23 at or near Madden Dam in Panama;
- the assault of an unidentified Panamanian man by striking him in the hand with the butt of an M16 rifle on or about December 20 at or near Madden Dam;

- the assault of an unidentified Panamanian man by striking him in the head with the butt of an M16 rifle on or about December 20 at or near Madden Dam; and,

- the assault of an unidentified Panamanian man by striking him in the back with a section of a rubber hose on or about December 21 at or near Madden Dam.

1st Sgt. Bryan was serving as first sergeant of D Company, 3rd Battalion, 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment at the time the incidents are alleged to have occurred.

Bryan was charged as a result of an investigation by the U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command. (Arnews)





According to Greenfield, components of a community of excellence program include facilities, services, environment, readiness, pride and people.


On the physical side of things, he suggested landscaping, reduced signage and clutter removal.

used clothing or toys, sell items for extra money, and prepare for moving, she said.

When Osterman became a volunteer, the Thrift Shop was a two-volunteer operation run by the Officers Wives Club. Now there are the volunteers and five paid employees at the shop which is under the financial management division, Community and Family Activities directorate, Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

Osterman also did volunteer work for the Red Cross at the Redstone hospital from 1961 to about '71. She and her husband celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary last October. Their daughter, Jenny Myrick, is among the other volunteers at the Thrift Shop.

A native of Chambersburg, Pa., Osterman likes to travel and play bridge. Redstone Arsenal and Huntsville are "great," she said.

"I enjoy it, that's the main reason I do it," Osterman said, referring to her volunteer work. "I enjoy the company of the girls I work with and the people who come in to shop and sell. It's fulfilling work. And we have a lot of fun.

"I think many of the other women here on the post are much more deserving of this award," she said, "because in the last 50 years I've done just Thrift Shop work, and many of the girls do much more than that. But I am grateful for it. I think I'm undeserving, but I appreciate it."

Maj. Arturo Sala

Sala, the head nurse of the operating room at Fox Army Community Hospital, got involved with the youth sports program in the fall of 1987. His son was playing on a soccer team here; and the coach asked Sala if he would like to help with coaching. Sala served as assistant coach, and coached a team himself the

following spring. Since then he coached his son's teams from 10 and under through 12 and under in soccer, baseball and basketball. Sala last coached 14 and under basketball for 1989-90.

"I coached my son through so many different sessions; he needs a break, he needs exposure to other coaches. So I'm thinking of taking a break (from coaching). I'll watch him play now from the stands," Sala said.

He served about 50 hours a week as a volunteer coach; practice and games would amount to about six hours a week for eight weeks per session. Sala gives credit to Ted Compoc, formerly of Youth Activities, and Missy Richards for their leadership of the youth sports program.

"Ted Compoc was the sports director when I started (as a volunteer coach). The only reason I'm receiving this award is because of him. Many times I wanted to quit because it takes a lot of time," Sala said.

His son, Rey, 12, is in the sixth grade at Westlawn Middle School. His daughter, Zoe, 10, is a fourth grader at Morris Elementary. Rey will be playing 14-and-under baseball here.

Sala, 35, was born in New York City and grew up in Puerto Rico. He received a bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of Puerto Rico in 1978. He has been an Army operating room nurse for 11 years. Sala was stationed at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C., 1979-82; Vicenza, Italy, from 1982-85; Fort Meade, Md., from 1985-87; and came to Redstone in July 1987. While in Italy, he earned a master's degree in education from Boston University in 1984 through the overseas program.

"There's no street on post I can't drive through and have a kid say, 'Hey, coach!' That's a great thing. I've seen them grow. The ones I coached in '87, they're teen-agers. They know I know them from way back," he said. "But that's not the main thing. I started (coaching) because of my son. It's nice to see them have fun at a game. Winning is great; they have to learn to lose, too. Our philosophy at that age is you're doing recreational-type sports. Winning is not the goal. It's mainly to show them sportsmanship, and the basic rules of each one of those sports they're involved in."

Mark Moe of Missile Logistics Center received an award last week for his 1989 suggestion which is credited with saving more than \$150,000 in its first year of implementation.



HONOREE — Moe holds the award certificate he received from Brig. Gen. Larry Capps, the deputy MICOM commander.



Justice

"Martial rule can never exist where courts are open, and in the proper and unobstructed exercise of their jurisdiction." There are very limited circumstances where the military may exercise criminal jurisdiction over civilians. However, courts-martial may exercise jurisdiction over members of the armed forces, even in peacetime, whether or not the crime is "service connected." In a decision rendered by the Court in 1987 concerning the court-martial of a member of the Coast Guard, the Court, after examining the history of military justice in this country and in England, concluded that courts-martial had jurisdiction over members of the armed forces no matter where the crime occurred, and regardless of the availability of civilian courts. This was an endorsement by the Supreme Court of the military justice system's ability to fairly operate a court system under the Constitution.

Establishment of military justice

The first truly federal courts were the courts-martial conducted by the Continental Army. Since they were established by the Continental Congress prior to the Declaration of Independence and well before the adoption of the Constitution, they are the oldest purely American system of justice existing under the federal government. From the beginning, all concerned accepted the fact that the military must have a

system of what we now call "military justice." The first of many codes regulating the military in America actually predated the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

In 1775, the Continental Congress enacted separate sets of regulations to govern the Army and the Navy, both based on the British system. The American Army's Articles of War were the work of a five-man committee, of which George Washington was a member. These articles did not remain intact very long, however. The next year another five-man committee consisting of John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Wilson, R.R. Livingston and John Rutledge suggested revisions to the Articles of War which were adopted on Sept. 20, 1776.

The first Congress expressly recognized the code of 1776; and it continued in effect, with only minor changes, until 1806. It was during the 1806 revision debates that the term "military justice" was first used in relation to the court-martial system. The Articles of War of 1806, consisting of 101 articles, lasted through the War of 1812, the Mexican War, and the Civil War. The next major revision occurred in 1874. This code remained unchanged during the 19th century.

The modern codes

The huge buildup of the military for World War I exposed many former civilians to the military justice system. The strain the armed forces experienced when

it expanded while trying to maintain discipline, and the exigencies of war, all shed a harsh light on the military justice system. Brig. Gen. Samuel T. Ansell, acting judge advocate general of the Army, became enraged when court-martial sentences, including death sentences, were executed in several controversial cases with legal review by the Office of the Judge Advocate General. Local commanders had complete autonomy to run their local systems. Maj. Gen. Enoch H. Crowder, the judge advocate general, who had been temporarily assigned to supervise the draft, returned to his post and defended autonomy for local commanders in matters of military justice.

The Crowder-Ansell dispute was a constitutional debate over whether Congress could establish a military justice system in which the commander's imposition of punishment was the final authority. In the early 1920s, Congress revised the Articles of War of 1874 but adopted very few of Ansell's views that the commander must be accountable to a system of laws and courts when imposing punishment pursuant to courts-martial.

The huge citizen-soldier Army that fought World War II was subject to the same discipline of the Articles of War that emerged virtually unchanged from the first world war. More than 2 million courts-martial were convened during the war, and more than 80,000 of these were the most serious, the general court-martial. This amounts to more than 60 general courts-martial a day during the war. After the war, Congress addressed the military justice system. Under the direction of Edmund Morgan, a noted professor of law from Harvard University, the Uniform Code of Military Justice Committee revised the Articles of War from top to bottom. Morgan had worked closely with Ansell during World War I and would incorporate many of his ideas into the new code. The idea that the commander should be held accountable to a system of laws enforced by an appellate court when imposing punishment at courts-martial became law. The establishment of the Court of Military Appeals and the lower appellate courts of review created this system of accountability. The Army and the Navy had been operating all this time under systems having pre-revolutionary origins. President Truman signed the bill enacting the UCMJ in May 1950.

Source for military justice

During this, the Bicentennial of the Constitution, it is significant to note that our system of military justice has its roots in the Constitution. Article I, Section 8 of the Constitution grants Congress the power "to make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces." For more than 200 years Congress has exercised such power by enacting the various Articles of War and the UCMJ.

Since 1950 the UCMJ has served as the source authority for the military justice system. Consisting of fewer than 150 sections called "Articles" (from the original Articles of War), the UCMJ provides for: the jurisdiction of the system; pretrial, trial and post-trial procedure; composition of the courts; offenses under the Code; and appellate review of courts-martials. The UCMJ also protects the rights of the soldier from any unfair and abusive exercise of power and punishment within the military justice system. This protection is established by the provisions which guarantee a soldier the right to counsel; the privilege against self-incrimination; the right to a trial of the facts; the right to a speedy trial; the right to compulsory process; and the protection against double jeopardy, to name a few. Congress felt that it would be impossible to provide every detail of the system and therefore conferred certain authority upon the president. The president has exercised this delegated authority by promulgating the Manual for Courts-Martial, and the courts have recognized the Manual as a valid exercise of the president's rule-making authority. Thus, where Congress has provided the skeleton of the military justice system by establishing the UCMJ, the president has provided the flesh by establishing the Manual for Courts-Martial.

Upon close examination, it is clear the principles underlying military justice have not differed since the establishment of the Continental Army. These principles are that members of the armed forces do not lose their rights when they join the military, and that military authority, in our democracy, is subservient to the elected civilian leadership of the nation.

Service members do enjoy broad rights. Sometimes they are broader than constitutionally required. Recognizing that discipline and justice in the military are essential and consistent, Congress and the president have protected the service member against unbridled discretion by a commander while establishing a system which allows a commander to maintain good order and discipline.





FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT (FONSI) FOR EXPANSION AND OPERATION OF TEST AREA 4 (TA-4) AT REDSTONE ARSENAL, ALABAMA

An Environmental Assessment (EA) has been written which evaluates the expanded operations of (TA-4).

Insensitive Munitions (IM) tests will be conducted at this site. These tests include dropping, burning, exploding and impacting munitions and propellants.

The tests are conducted on a scheduled but not continuous basis.

Archaeological/Historical surveys have been conducted and there are no significant sites in the area.

The test range is sited adjacent to the Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge and the safety fan extends into this area. The access to the area is controlled during actual testing.

Solid and hazardous waste generated during testing will be collected and controlled in accordance with MCOM regulations.

The project is sited in a flood plain but no permanently occupied structures are located in this area.

There are no endangered species in this area.

Operation of TA-4 has not caused any significant change to the environment in this area to either the flora or fauna nor has it affected the human environment or activities during this time. Future operations are not expected to change this environment.

There are no alternatives to this project which would minimize the action without impacting the MCOM mission. The EA concludes that this action will not have a significant impact on the environment and an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is not required.
