Army pioneers, their missiles to be recognized

Their names are like a voice from the past — Sergeant, Hermes, Redstone, Jupiter. They were conceived at a time when relations between superpowers were at their coldest, and the words “defense” and “spending” could be used together without causing public outcry.

It was also a time when the Army was a leader in the race for space, before the days of a National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

For 20 years these missiles, once proud examples of American technology, have quietly deteriorated in a warehouse on the south arsenal. They were once part of an outdoor display which was dismantled when the Alabama Space and Rocket Center opened.

Over the years a few were given to museums or schools whose mascots were the “Rockets.” A few years back, ownership of the remainder of the collection was transferred to the Army’s Center for Military History, but the missiles and parts of missiles remained at Redstone, where paint peeled away from them, tires on the trailers they rested upon went flat, and dust covered everything.

But now some of the missiles have been rescued from their repository and moved to the Smithsonian Institution’s Garber Facility in Suitland, Md. They will be restored, hopefully to become part of a display which will be seen by millions of people.

Maj. Mark Rochlin of the Army Space Division wanted to give the Smithsonian something which would help tell the story of the Army’s role in the early space program. When he found out about the collection of old missiles, he made arrangements for the transfer.

The National Guard played a major role in the project, because they did the actual moving.

Members of the 1128th Transportation Company from Eufaula and Clayton wrapped the missiles, which included a Sergeant, Hermes and Hawk onto flatbed trailers, along with an RP76 drone and motors from Jupiter and Redstone missiles.

2nd Lt. Richard Pelham, who was in command of the soldiers doing the moving, said this load was a bit unusual for the unit.

“This is the first time since I’ve been in the unit that we’ve moved missiles,” he said. They usually move things like supplies or ammunition.

Command Historian Mike Baker, who helped coordinate the move on the MICOM side, said the transfer of the missiles and their eventual display will help ensure MICOM’s rightful place in history.

“Those missiles have been sitting in storage for years, but now they will be displayed at the Smithsonian, and people won’t forget the contributions the Army has made. Those are some of the systems that got the Army where it is today.

“It’s really important that people see what we’ve done here because we’ve made some accomplishments we should be awfully proud of,” he said.

Tonight the National Space Club is honoring the Army’s space pioneers at a reception at the Smithsonian’s National Air and Space Museum.

Scheduled participants in the program include

Secretary of the Army Michael P.W. Stone; Gen. Carl E. Vuono, chief of staff of the U.S. Army; and Lt. Gen. Gordon R. Sullivan, U.S. Army deputy chief of staff for operations.

Tonight, the Army’s first space workers will be presented with the Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris Award for Achievements in Space. Medaris himself will be the first recipient of the award, which will be accepted by his son, retired Lt. Col. John B. Medaris Jr., as Medaris is in poor health.

Medaris awards will be presented posthumously to Maj. Gen. Holger N. Toftoy and Maj. Gen. John A. Barclay. Also receiving an award as a group will be the Development Operations Division of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

High radon level successfully reduced in housing unit

Redstone Arsenal’s part of the Armywide radon detection program has had its first success story.

The highest radon level detected in a housing unit here was successfully reduced by a method called sub slab ventilation. Radon is a radioactive gas which occurs in nature from the natural breakdown of uranium. Army installations worldwide are to assess radon levels in their buildings and, when necessary, reduce those levels. The only known health effect associated with exposures to elevated levels of radon is an increased risk of developing lung cancer.

The Environmental Protection Agency has set a limit of 4 picoCuries per liter as a safe radon level. A picoCurie is a measure of radioactivity in the air, with a liter being a liter of air. The Army has determined anything in the level of 4-20 would be retested for one year. In the 90-day monitoring program at Redstone Arsenal, most of the 1,020 family housing units sampled tested below 4 picoCuries. About 240 quarters were slightly above that level and are being retested for one year. The level was found to exceed 20 picoCuries at one housing unit. Under Army guidelines, that level had to be lowered within six months.

“We were pleased to find out we could try a method of reducing a high radon level and successfully accomplish it,” said Dan Seaver, a general engineer in

the Environmental Office, who directs the radon assessment program for Redstone Arsenal.

Radon mitigation in quarters 402 was completed during the second week of April. Since quarters here are built on a slab, the mitigation technique used was sub slab ventilation. This involved the following: A hole was drilled in the floor of a hall linen closet; a 4-inch pipe was installed, running down through the floor and up into the attic where a fan system drew air up and out through the roof. Basically, this means pumping out air from under the slab before it can enter the house. An alarm system was installed to ensure the system was operating.

Results of before and after mitigation sampling, using three-day monitors, showed lower radon levels. On March 16, the levels were 7.4 in the living room, 9.8 in bedroom No. 2, and 9.7 in bedroom No. 3. On April 13, the levels were 1.1 in the living room, .5 in bedroom No. 2, and .6 in bedroom No. 3.

“It looks like we had a successful effort up there,” Seaver said. The system was installed by BAMS, the base support contractor.

Capt. Carolyn Shewmake, a staff nurse in the intensive care unit at Fox Army Community Hospital, has lived in quarters 402 about 13 months with her 2-year-old son, Benjamin. “It’s working real good right now,” she said, referring to the mitigation system used in her three-bedroom house on Hughes Drive.

“There’s a fan that goes all the time. That’s taking a little bit to get used to. But I feel safe with it right now. The noise of the fan is taking a little bit to get used to.”

A one-year monitor was placed in her house to ensure that the mitigation effort was a success. “Dan Seaver was really good about explaining what they were going to do and what else they would have to do if that did not work,” Shewmake said.

The approximately 240 quarters which showed radon levels of 4-20 are being retested for a year; and if those levels fail to come down below 4, those quarters will be mitigated to correct the problem within one to four years. The one-year detectors in the housing area will probably be retrieved by December. Radon levels are also being sampled in various office buildings on post; about 500 one-year monitors are already in place and another 500 will be placed. “We hope to be through with our radon sampling program by October of ‘91. That’s, I believe, the date the Army is shooting for worldwide to have their sampling programs completed by,” Seaver said.

“I think things have gone quite smoothly. We’ve had some good cooperation from the housing area community. We haven’t met too many problems so we’re pleased with the way the program’s been received,” he said.

I have been concerned for some time over the apparent conflict between the civilian work force (federal and contract) and military personnel; the most recent being the civilian employee concern about a gym and responsive letters thereto. This continued strife and negativism serves very little in improving morale and improving on the quality of services delivered.

As we move into the '90s, it will be imperative that we function as a cohesive team and discard the attitude of "us versus them." The 1990s will be very crucial years for the Army and will bring about numerous changes with the possibility of a reduction in force of employees, reduction of the Army, closing of bases/installations and the diminishing defense budget.

The '90s will also be a period of immense social and economic improvements for those who are willing to change and improve on their communication skills, especially the art of listening. If we are to survive as a viable nation, quality must be our goal. Employee and

customer feedback and participation will be the means through which quality will increase.

It is my firm belief that we in government, be it military, civilian or contractor, will need to find better ways to conduct business. This will require major changes on the part of management and a willingness on the part of employees to provide their expert input. The old saying "it is good enough for government work" can no longer be accepted as our measure of quality.

The mechanism for the beginning changes are already in place, driven by the defense budget. We are involved in the Army Community Excellence initiative and the process of Total Quality Management. The tools are available; we only need commitment and follow through to ensure our future success. This can happen only if we work as a team between the civilian work force and the military.

Attempts to artificially keep civilian and military personnel segregated from each other represent an artificial barrier and are counterproductive to our defense mission. There are some activities defined either by law or due to overcrowded conditions that military active duty have first priority for use. This is true as in the case of the gym where the facility is not nearly large enough or adequate to even take care of the active duty needs. Military, civilian and contractor employees are all a part of the "family" at Redstone Arsenal.

Soldier dies after truck accident

A Fort Knox, Ky., soldier died in Huntsville Monday from injuries sustained in an accident during a test at Redstone Arsenal.

Chris E. Zawadowski, 23, of E Troop, 1st Battalion, 12th Cavalry Regiment, was driving a five-ton Army truck as part of a test at an arsenal test range when the vehicle went out of control. It overturned and came to rest upside down, pinning Zawadowski underneath. He was one of a group of soldiers from Fort Knox on temporary duty here to participate in the test.

Range workers and other soldiers used a forklift to raise the front of the truck and free Zawadowski. He was flown by helicopter air ambulance to Huntsville Hospital where he died at 11:15 a.m., about an hour after the accident.

Zawadowski, whose home of record was Los Angeles, Calif., is survived by his mother, Barbara Madewell, of Panorama City, Calif.

The Army is continuing an investigation of the accident.

Pershing II missile set for museum

Soldiers from the Pershing Project Office and the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School were in Washington, D.C. Monday to prepare a Pershing II missile donated by the Army for display at the Smithsonian Institution National Air and Space Museum.

The missile is to become part of a display of arms eliminated under the provisions of the Intermediate Range Nuclear Forces Treaty. Three soldiers from Redstone assembled the missile in preparation for the display. They are CWO3 Wayne Shields of the Pershing Project Office and SSgt. Hector Centeno and

SSgt. Bruce Howard of the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School.

The Army sent another Pershing II to Moscow yesterday where it will be displayed alongside a Soviet SS-20 missile. In return, the Soviets are sending another SS-20 to the United States. It will be displayed with the Pershing II at the Smithsonian.

CWO4 John White of the Pershing Project Office accompanied the missile on the trip to Moscow in order to provide technical assistance during on- and off-loading and transport.

Bisch studies pre-med at the University of Alabama with a career goal of becoming a psychiatrist. O'Don-





Airborne optical sensor makes experimental flight

One of the world's most sophisticated missile-tracking sensors, the Airborne Optical Adjunct, took its maiden flight last Friday aboard a Boeing 767 aircraft.

This was the first flight of the Airborne Surveillance Testbed with the sensor on board. The specially modified Boeing 767 completed airworthiness tests in 1987. The AOA/AST experiment was developed by the Army for the Strategic Defense Initiative to test the feasibility of using an airborne long-wave infrared sensor that can identify objects by their heat signature to track enemy intercontinental ballistic missiles as they travel through space and reenter the atmosphere.

Managed by the Army Strategic Defense Command, this maiden flight was the culmination of six years of work by an Army-contractor team and the expenditure of \$600 million. Boeing Aerospace modified the aircraft and integrated the sensor and supporting equipment. The sensor was built by Hughes Aircraft of El Segundo, Calif. Honeywell Space and Strategic Electronics Division of Clearwater, Fla. built the data processing system.

"The AOA/AST aircraft, housing the sensor and its on board data processor, took off from Boeing Field in Seattle, Wash. and flew for over six hours," said Col. Gary Stewart, AOA project manager. "The flight met all the mission objectives to check the vibration and acoustic environment of the system and we're pleased with the results."

Following a three-month flight test program operating from Boeing Field, the AOA/AST system will go to the Kwajalein National Test Range in the mid-Pacific in late summer for flight tests against real test targets launched from Vandenberg AFB, Calif.

Redstone airfield takes team approach to safety

Redstone Army Airfield has maintained a record of mishap-free flying through a safety program which is a team effort.

The airfield received its latest Aviation Mishap Prevention Award of Merit, signed by Brig. Gen. C.A. Hennies, the director of Army safety, at a Missile Command staff meeting. The award was presented by Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of MICOM and Redstone Arsenal.

"The airfield has got safety awards dating back till June of 1972," said CWO 4 Jeff Cummins, safety officer for the Directorate of Flight Operations here. "The last mishap that was experienced by the directorate of flight operations was in July 1982. That was when the C-7 Caribou had an engine fire and landed in a cottonfield down south. Under the new criteria, it wouldn't have been charged to us as a mishap because it was a materiel failure. It would have been recordable, but it would not have been reported against the unit."

Aviation mishap prevention awards of merit are for mishap-free flying from July 30 through the following July 29. The award presented at the staff meeting May 2 was for 1987-88; another award for the following year is expected to arrive soon.

"The safety award says a lot for the people that have flown here and the people that maintain the aircraft," Cummins said. The airfield's four fixed-wing aircraft fly about 1,500 hours annually while its five UH-1H helicopters are in the air about 850 hours each year. The directorate's 48 people include 16 civilians and 32 military members. An additional four contract maintenance people work on the fixed wing aircraft.

"We have a system of involvement which includes the safety officer, instructor pilots, operations personnel and maintenance personnel that have input in every mission, the planning we go through," Cummins said. "It's a team effort, a team approach, to getting our missions done around here."

There are monthly safety classes, and monthly safety inspections of the operations at the airfield. In addition, the Missile Command inspects the airfield on a quarterly basis; and the Army Materiel Command does a comprehensive aviation resource management inspection annually. "For a safety program to work, it requires the effort of all those involved on the airfield; otherwise it will not work. And our safety program works very well," Cummins said. He pointed out that the airfield has not had a lost-time injury for the last year, an indication that the workers take their safety attitude home with them.

Lt. Col. Bob Kincaid, the director of flight operations, makes safety a priority. "It's not only important to the airfield. That's a part of our mission, just as flying is," Kincaid said.

"The command has recently hired some new

firemen and manned our airfield fire station 24 hours a day since January. That's just a tremendous plus for the overall airfield safety program, having that responsiveness out here," he said. Kincaid attributed this development to Fire Chief Bill Cross, Assistant Fire

Chief Willie Pope, and Col. Perry Butler, deputy post commander.

Doug Paddock, the airfield's assistant safety officer, and a flight mechanic, stresses the team effort involved in ensuring safety. "Everybody has to stick together; it's not a one-man job," he said.

Army space pioneers to receive national honor tonight

The National Space Club will salute pioneering Army achievements in space exploration tonight with a special event at the National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C.

A highlight of the program will be presentation of the Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris Award for Army Achievement in Space to several individuals including some Huntsville residents as well as others formerly involved in Army missile activities here.

The first award will go to Medaris, who commanded the Army Ballistic Missile Agency (ABMA) at Redstone Arsenal when that organization orbited the free world's first scientific earth satellite in January 1958 and accomplished many other of the nation's first achievements in space. Medaris is ill and cannot attend. His award will be accepted by his son Lt. Col. (Ret.) J.B. Medaris Jr.

Other honorees include the late Maj. Gen. Holger N. Toftoy, former commander of Redstone Arsenal and the patron of the Wernher Von Braun rocket team; the late Maj. Gen. John A. Barclay, Medaris' deputy and later commander of ABMA; and the Development Operations Division of ABMA. Dr. Eberhard Rees of Huntsville will accept that award for the technical team of ABMA.

Also to be honored are Dr. William H. Pickering, former director of the Jet Propulsion Lab of Cal Tech which built the Army Explorer I satellite and Dr.

James Van Allen who designed the scientific experiments in the satellite.

Brig. Gen. Robert L. Stewart, the Army's first astronaut and former deputy commander of the Strategic Defense Command (SDC) in Huntsville, will be honored.

Army efforts to protect the United States from attack from space will be recognized with two awards. Brig. Gen. (Ret.) Ivey O. Drewry of Huntsville, who headed the Army team which achieved the first intercept of an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) in 1962, and later commanded the Army Safeguard System Command based in Huntsville which fielded this nation's only ballistic missile defense system will

be honored. So will Cecil D. Richardson of Huntsville, former SDC official, who headed the technical team which performed the first non-nuclear intercept of an ICBM in 1984.

Secretary of the Army Michael P.W. Stone will be the primary speaker.

Others attending from Huntsville include Maj. Gen. William S. Chen, commander of the Army Missile Command; Brig. Gen. Morgan Jellet, program manager of the Anti Satellite Joint Program Office, and Dr. Walter Haeussermann, Dr. Helmut Hoelzer and Mr. Karl Heimbarg, who with Dr. Rees, are all former key members of the ABMA Development Operations Division.



Boeing gets go ahead for Avenger full scale production

The Army has exercised its fourth annual option with the Boeing Company of Huntsville for full scale production of the Avenger air defense system. The option is valued at about \$42 million.

Boeing now produces about four Avengers a month—a low rate production schedule—but will gradually increase that number to 12 per month by October 1991.

“Full scale production go-ahead for Avenger is a major milestone in our air defense efforts,” said Ross Dessert, Boeing Avenger program manager. “This means we’ve successfully met the criteria for introducing a new product into the Army inventory. We’ve delivered the Avenger systems ahead of schedule and within budget, and that’s something we’re very proud of.”

Avenger production at Boeing’s technology complex in Huntsville is ahead of contract schedule, with a total of 53 fire units delivered to the Missile Command.

Avenger will be the first system fielded in the Army’s five-element Forward Area Air Defense System (FAADS). It mounts eight ready-to-fire Stinger missiles on the Army’s high-mobility, multipurpose wheeled vehicle. It can operate day or night and in adverse weather conditions.

The system will provide air defense coverage for vital rear areas of Army divisions and will be fielded with all divisions, armored cavalry regiments, separate brigades and corps air defense battalions.

Boeing was awarded the initial production contract

for Avenger in August 1987. That contract, with five annual options, was valued at nearly \$190 million.

“Introducing a major new weapon into the Army’s active inventory is a team effort,” Dessert said. “Because the Army, Boeing at Huntsville and Oak Ridge, Tenn., and our suppliers worked together, this program has entered our country’s inventory in record time.”

Plaque dedicated to soldier who died in Vietnam

A soldier from Huntsville who died in Vietnam will be memorialized at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii May 25 when the 25th Infantry Division unveils a plaque honoring its staff judge advocates.

The plaque will be dedicated in memory of Capt. Howard R. Andrews Jr. who had been a civilian patent lawyer at MICOM before entering the Army.

In Vietnam he was a defense lawyer representing soldiers in courts martial and other legal proceedings. He had interviewed a witness in the Long Binh jail and was returning by helicopter to the Tropic Lighting Division at Cu Chi. Flying over the Saigon river, the UH-1 Huey struck power lines and crashed, killing Andrews and nine others.


He attended Butler High School and had an electrical engineering degree from Georgia Tech. He had been a student worker at Marshall Space Flight Center and joined MICOM as a patent attorney after graduating law school in 1968. He was 27 when he died and had been scheduled to return to the United States in another month.

Intending to serve a two-year hitch, he had entered the Army as a private with the 101st Airborne Division and served in Vietnam plotting grids for artillery fire before transferring to the Judge Advocate General Corps and receiving a promotion to Captain.

The local Federal Bar Association maintains a scholarship in his honor at the University of Alabama where he graduated.

He was the only electrical engineer serving in the Judge Advocate General Corps at the time of his death.

His father, Howard R. Andrews Sr., retired in 1972 as deputy chief of the plans and programs office in Procurement and Production Directorate. Mr. and Mrs. Andrews live in Huntsville and plan to go to Hawaii to attend the May 25 memorial observance for their son. "We have been told that he is the only staff judge advocate ever lost in all of our country's wars," the father said.

Quantum has contract work across the United States, as well as several areas around the world such as London, Paris, Rome, Munich, Tel Aviv, and various cities in Japan.

Pitts and his wife, Patricia, reside in Madison with their three daughters: Lauren, Natalie, and Darla.







Cheney extends building freeze, may cancel some projects

WASHINGTON — Citing uncertainty over future funding levels, defense secretary Dick Cheney extended a freeze on new military construction projects through June 15.

Cheney also ordered a review of more than 200 projects already approved by Congress for possible cancellation.

"In the light of the enormous uncertainty over the level...for the forthcoming defense budget, I have no choice but to extend the construction freeze," Cheney said.

Cheney's original order, issued Jan. 24, directed that no new construction contracts be awarded for projects financed under the military construction budget approved by Congress. The January order was effective through April 30.

Cheney also ordered a review of 207 lower-priority construction projects, valued at \$1.2 billion, as "candidates for rescission," indicating he may recommend Congress revoke the funding approved earlier for the projects.

Deputy secretary Don Atwood will review the plans for possible cancellation and submit a list to Cheney by June 1. Atwood will consider potential base clos-

ing, changes in force structure, budget limitations, and consolidations under the Defense Management Report in recommending which projects should be canceled.

"Some of these actions may not be popular with members of Congress who want to cut the defense budget even as they plead to save the projects in their states and districts. But when tight budgets force dedicated soldiers to turn in their uniforms and leave the service, I cannot put construction projects ahead of people," Cheney said.

The final rescission list sent to Congress may include other projects currently frozen but not on the list sent to Atwood for review.

Among items on the review list:

- The \$110 million large rocket test facility at Arnold, Tennessee
- \$60 million in improvements at Fort Hood and Red River Army Depot, Texas
- The \$37 million consolidated maintenance facility at Tooele, Utah.

In extending the freeze another 45 days, Cheney said exceptions could be considered to meet urgent requirements. (Arnews)



