Redstone working overtime to support Desert Shield

People at the Missile Command are working around the clock in support of Operation Desert Shield in the Middle East.

Emergency operation centers have been established at MICOM headquarters, at the Missile Logistics Center, and in at least one project office, Patriot.

The center at the headquarters building is being run 24 hours a day, seven days a week by the Plans and Operations Office and representatives from other organizations. Briefings on the Middle East crisis are held there twice daily for management officials of the command.

"In general terms what we're doing is ensuring that the deploying units have the missile equipment that they require to perform their mission. Our mission is to provide missiles, missile equipment and missile system support to deploying units," said Mike Hicks, chief of the plans and operations office, Personnel and Training Directorate.


Forty people are working in shifts at the command's 24-hour "EOC" for the duration of the crisis. "All requests from headquarters Army Materiel Command or from deploying units for support come to us and then we farm them out to the appropriate primary organizational element for action," Hicks said.

"Working along with us the Missile Logistics Center has established a logistics operations center that has a 38 person dedicated staff, again working 24 hours a day seven days a week; and they're the ones who actually process the request for missiles and arrange for the transportation into the theater of operation," he said.

The command EOC also works closely with the program executive office for fire support, the program executive office for air defense, and their project management offices. Responses to data requests from the Army Materiel Command or Department of Army are coordinated with these offices.

"I would say that the average person is putting in about 60 hours a week but there are some people, selected people, that are probably putting in 90 hours a week — especially at first," Hicks said.

Col. James Amato, chief of staff, is serving as director of the emergency operation center. Ann Corum of Missile Logistics Center is the first shift chief; George Rudd, also of MLC, is second shift chief; and Faye

Jernigan of Readiness Directorate serves as chief of third shift. Others who have been heavily involved include Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of the Missile Command; Brig. Gen. Larry Capps, deputy commander; and Ernie Young, deputy for procurement and readiness. "In fact all of the MICOM directors and the project managers are playing a major role in this operation," Amato said.

The management briefings, held at 8 and 4 daily, are done by Maj. Randall Withrow of Security Assistance Management Directorate and by the shift chief. The 40-by-35-foot briefing room has a large map for tracking supported U.S. units, the forces of the 22 other nations involved in the operation, and the Iraqi forces. A large heading on the map identifies Aug. 7 as "C Day" or commencement day, the date that the U.S. began deploying forces to Saudi Arabia. There is a conference table for principal attendees at the briefings,

with many other chairs arranged throughout the room. "This is supposed to be a 60 person briefing room but we normally get about 80 folks in here," Hicks said.

Dwayne Seale, of the plans and operations office, serves as one of the mobilization planners. He receives the message traffic, determines what action is required by the Missile Command, and relays the messages to the administrative officer and the shift chief.

The administrative room in the EOC processes incoming requirements and sends out the responses. Each shift is averaging about 40 incoming requirements. Depending on the requirement, the response may be made in as little as one or two hours. "We get them out as soon as possible," said Sabrina Miller, management assistant in the plans and operations office. She has four administrative people on first shift, three on second shift, and three on third

Logistics workers tired, but enthusiastic about support

Signs inside the Missile Logistics Center at building 5681 lead to MLC's logistics operations center which has been established to support Operation Desert Shield.

"When we first set it up, no one knew where it was located," explained John Finafrock, deputy director of materiel management at MLC.

Located in the south end of the building, the logistics operations center is working 24 hours a day, seven days a week. "We've been operational since roughly the 7th of August," said Finafrock, who is in charge of the operations center.

"We set it up with a cross-section of people knowledgeable in supply and maintenance and ammunition and mobilization skills," he said. It reports directly to Jim Flinn, the MLC director.

Twenty-one people work inside the logistics operations center, and 17 others throughout MLC are assigned to it. The 21 located inside the operations center are working in three shifts: "They're coordinating all the taskers that come into the Logistics Center. They're coordinating the release of Class 5 ammunition requirements from the field — things like the missiles and rockets themselves. And they're working on special assignments like surge capability (possible increase in production rate) of the various contractors that manufacture our explosives. They are working on the reports we're required to put together, such as daily situation reports to Army Materiel Command and Department of Army. We put together daily status

Education services

In response to the concern from the PLATO basic skills student tutoring services for the BSEP program ("Mailbox," Aug. 22)...

As was so convincingly stated, a computer program can never take the place of a competent, caring tutor.

I have been the contracting officer's representative on Basic Skills Education Program (BSEP) contracts at the Redstone Arsenal Army Education Center since

1981. During the past nine years, BSEP has been delivered to Redstone Arsenal active duty military personnel under a succession of non-personal service contracts. During this period of time, the Army has adopted PLATO as their standard for the delivery of BSEP. With full understanding that a computer terminal can never achieve the rapport and effectiveness of a live tutor, I have carefully evaluated and designed a contract statement of work which delivers BSEP services utilizing both PLATO instructional and management capabilities and individual tutorial services. Cost savings was not the only driving force in this contract design decision.

Contract basic skill services, which utilize both PLATO capabilities and the use of a fully qualified live tutor, are in place. The basic skills tutor monitors, directs students and supplements the multimedia delivery of basic skills curriculum. Unfortunately, the award of a contract for tutorial services was delayed until Aug. 17. In the interim between Aug. 1 and Aug. 17, Army Learning Center and MOS Library Education Learning Center personnel tried to assist students with the BSEP program transition.

The Army Education Center remains totally committed to meeting the needs of each individual student. Please contact myself, Dr. Peake at 842-9703, with any further concerns regarding the Army Education Center's full range of services, to include the delivery of basic skills. We will make every effort to carefully evaluate and satisfactorily address your concerns and meet your needs, especially in this time of national crisis.

Amended RIF letters expected soon

Approximately 100 amended reduction in force letters changing offers or canceling initial RIF letters are expected to be delivered to employees by the end of this week.

The amended letters will cancel about 23 of the 146 job separation letters issued Aug. 9. The other amended letters will make better job offers to some of the 116 change-to-lower-grade letters and 197 letters of reassignment.

The Civilian Personnel Office will continue revising offers or making offers to affected employees as positions become available as a result of the voluntary early retirement authority, other retirements and other attrition between now and Oct. 12.

Some 37 employees opted the VERA which began Aug. 16, although the VERA may be cut off at any time, according to Carolyn Tripp, CPO Recruitment and Placement Branch.

RIF separation letters were delivered on Aug. 9 to 146 MICOM employees in the MICOM and RASA competitive areas, down from the original estimate of 245 workers who would lose their jobs. Also, 116 peo-

ple got letters advising of changes to lower grades and 197 employees got letters reassigning them to other jobs.

Toll-free line for returnees

Rising tension in the Middle East is forcing the early return/evacuation of military and Defense Department non-combatant civilian family members.

Unaccompanied spouses and children may be arriving at various installations, especially in the continental U.S., the Army said.

The U.S. Army Community and Family Support Center in Washington, D.C., has initiated a 24-hour toll-free telephone line to provide assistance to unaccompanied family members. The number is 1-800-542-9254.

shift. They represent various elements of the command including the Missile Logistics Center, Product Assurance, and the Research Development and Engineering Center. Various organizations are also represented in the EOC's functional representative area.

Organizations which are heavily involved include Personnel and Training, Resource Management, Weapon Systems Management Directorate, Missile Systems Readiness Directorate, and the Missile Logistics Center. "There's also involvement by the Redstone Arsenal Support Activity," Hicks said. "We're a mobilization site; should troops be

designated to mobilize here at Redstone, their (RASA's) part would greatly increase."

Jim Flinn, director of Missile Logistics Center, said his people are averaging 60-70 hour work weeks at either the command's EOC or the logistics operations center. "Basically everybody in the logistics center is touched in some way by what's going on in Desert Shield," Flinn said.

"I think the people that are working Operation Desert Shield are doing the very best job that they know how," Hicks said. "The attitude is just great. I haven't heard a disparaging word from anyone. It seems like everyone here at Redstone Arsenal is 100 percent behind the effort, everyone that I've come in contact with."

E-Systems agrees to plead guilty to fraud charge

Editor's note: The following is a Department of Justice news release. The investigation was conducted by Special Agent David McClure of the Huntsville Fraud Team, 3rd Region, CID.

The Department of Justice announced Monday that E-Systems Inc., Dallas, has agreed to plead guilty to conspiracy to defraud the government on contracts for Army field radios by falsifying test results. The nation's 58th largest defense contractor will pay a total of \$4.65 million to settle criminal and civil charges.

The plea, filed Monday in federal court in the Middle District of Florida, calls for E-Systems, and its Memcor Division, Bushnell, Fla., to plead guilty to a three-count criminal information charging that the company and others conspired to falsify records and test results of tactical field radios supplied to the Army. The company also agreed to plead guilty to filing for and receiving payments based on the submission of false information.

E-Systems will pay a \$2 million criminal fine and \$1.8 million in restitution. The plea agreement also calls for the company to drop its pending \$38 million lawsuits against the government.

The statement of facts filed in support of the guilty plea alleges that the testing practices themselves were defective, that test and performance records were repeatedly altered, and that the company concealed repairs and defects in test radios in order to ensure that the Army would accept and pay for them.

The Department also announced that E-Systems has entered into a civil settlement and will pay \$850,000. This settlement covers the false claims submitted as supporting information.

This case resulted from an investigation by the Justice Department, the Army's Criminal Investigation Command (CID) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The investigation began after the 1985 termination of two E-Systems contracts to build field radios for the Army's Communications and Electronics Command through its Memcor Division. The company had been building the AN/VRC-12 radios, the Army's principal vehicular-borne tactical communications system used by soldiers and commanders in the field, since 1969.

E-Systems appealed the termination decision to the Armed Services Board of Contract Appeal (ASBCA) and the testing program irregularities were noticed at that time. The company later sued the government over the termination.

Earlier this month, three former managers and a former supervisor at E-Systems, Memcor Division, were charged by a federal grand jury with repeatedly falsifying records and test results to conceal failures and defects in radios supplied to the Army.

The indictment, returned in the federal district court for the Middle District of Florida, charged former plant manager, Howard DeWight Rader, Ridge Manor, Fla., former quality assurance manager, Harley W. Hopson, Brooksville, Fla., former manager of test production, Houston Stanley Burke, Webster, Fla., and former quality assurance supervisor, Paul R. Procton Jr., Clearwater, Fla., with one count of conspiracy to defraud the U.S. and five counts of making false claims against the U.S. in connection with the manufacture and supply of the AN/VRC-12 radio.

The indictment charges that the defendants and others conspired to make false statements to, and make false claims against the U.S. by repeatedly falsifying records and test results to conceal failures and defects in the radios.

According to the indictment, employees disregarded requirements that repairs and test failures be reported, switched test records between radios to conceal failures, created documents for untested radios while

working evenings and weekends to conceal their activities from the Department of Defense.

On Jan. 31, 1990, a front-line supervisor of production, Sadonna S. Hobbs, was convicted of perjury relating to her denials of this activity in connection with suits filed by E-Systems before the ASBCA. She is serving a 16-month sentence at the federal correctional facility in Marianna, Fla.

In addition, the four named in the indictment were each charged with five counts of causing false claims to be filed with the Department of Defense for claims which were supported by the false and incomplete records.

Each defendant is subject to a maximum penalty upon conviction of 30 years imprisonment and a \$3.75 million fine. A trial date has been set for October.

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ACS providing support to families of deployed soldiers

Military families left behind by the Middle East deployment have a friend in Army Community Service.

ACS along with the units, the chaplains and family support groups are working to ease the pain and uncertainty caused by the departure of many soldiers due to Operation Desert Shield.

"This is a difficult time for families and our job is to assist in smoothing their way through these difficulties, these hard times when they have to make difficult choices and say goodbye for now," said Virginia Dempsey, outreach program manager at ACS.

Programs at Army Community Service providing support to families of deployed soldiers include Army Emergency Relief, information and referral, Total Tots, outreach program, consumer affairs and financial assistance, relocation, and family advocacy. ACS is also supporting the Waiting Wives Group with the chapel.

When the troops are deployed, Juanita Adams of ACS is part of the deployment team that they see. As the community service's representative for deployment, she gives them information on the ACS programs. "We have a form that states all of our programs, and if they have a need for a certain program they check the appropriate block for it," said Adams, the Army Emergency Relief officer. Some 58 Army families affected by the deployment had been helped by ACS as of Aug. 21.

"Army Community Service is here to act as support to the family through any situation. If we can't provide it here, we have an information and referral service," Adams said.

Frances Howard, family service program coordinator at ACS, is the person to see for information and referral. "I can provide that as needed," Howard said. Some spouses opt to return to their families while their soldiers are away, and she can provide relocation information for them.

As outreach program manager, Dempsey works with the chapel's Waiting Wives Group and is encouraging spouses to get involved with such family support groups. "It's important when family members are left behind for whatever reason, that they're not isolated," Dempsey said. The Total Tots program can provide child care for military families in need.

"For the little ones, sometimes you need someone to take care of them," said Dempsey, Total Tots coordinator. "They need to call us if there is a need. We're talking about younger troops with smaller children who are just not prepared for this type situation and need the help."

Help can also come in the form of financial assistance. Dan Kelly is program manager for consumer affairs and financial assistance at ACS. "We're once again reminded that soldiers need to manage their finances differently than does the civilian family," Kelly said. "A soldier needs to plan his finances in such a way that it can be managed from a distance, and also that the spouse has access to the funds and can conduct the business while he or she's away."

Army Emergency Relief can provide on-the-spot financial help for military families, said Adams, the AER officer.

Staff members at Army Community Service have been working overtime because of the need to support families of deployed soldiers. ACS has a contingency plan to operate 24 hours a day if necessary. Those designated for emergency call include Adams; Dr. William Resha, chief of ACS; and Sal Riccardi, family

advocacy program manager. The family advocacy program offers stress management classes and parenting classes.

"We are working very closely with the units, with the various support groups and with the chaplains. We are part of the whole system. Everybody's working together," Dempsey said. "The units are doing a fantastic job; and the chaplains and Army Community Service are supporting their efforts. One thing we'll be needing is volunteers that would help make phone calls, possibly, help with transportation and help take care of some of the needs."

More than 600 people attended the Women's Equality Day luncheon Friday at the Challenger NCO Club.

Dr. Jan Davis, NASA astronaut and mission specialist on Spacelab-J which is scheduled for launch late in 1991, was guest speaker.

"Work, persevere and follow your dreams," Davis told the audience.

"There are always people along the way willing to help you" achieve your career goals, Davis said.

She credited the Marshall Space Flight Center, where she worked as an aerospace engineer prior to selection as an astronaut, for supporting her in receiving a doctorate in mechanical engineering from the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

She lauded groups such as the Federal Women's Program as an outlet for women to establish contacts to help them pursue career goals.

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Longtime union president decides to step aside

The man who helped organize the local union for federal employees in 1958 and served as its longtime president has decided to step aside and retire.

Dennis Garrison, 68, retired Aug. 15 from Local 1858 of the American Federation of Government Employees after 32 years of service.

"I guess I stayed long enough," he said. After helping to organize the local union, he served about three terms as its president excluding one term when he stepped down to serve as a PTA president. He was elected the union's national vice president for district five in 1964 and served in that capacity until 1972; then he went to Washington and served five years as executive vice president and one year as national president.

Garrison then retired and returned home where he continued to assist with the local union. He agreed to come back as local president in 1986 and served in that capacity until retiring again this month.

"I really meant to stay about a couple of years and

try to get the thing back on the ground, and step aside. But I stayed a little longer than that," Garrison said.

James Brothers, an engineer at Strategic Defense Command, who was the local's executive vice president, has succeeded him as president. "He was second in command. So according to our constitution, he would become president when I left," Garrison said. "He is a very capable individual and he's real interested in the people.

"I think he'll do a great job out there. Maybe he'll do a better job than I did. I sure hope so," Garrison added. Brothers will be working with Vickie Fuller who is the union's chief of labor relations.


After holding national union offices, Garrison returned from Washington in 1979. "When I came back I stayed in touch (with the local) and helped them out some until finally they put the pressure on me to take over," he said.

"You know there comes a time to try to get somebody else to do it after awhile. We didn't do all that we wanted but we tried. We did a pretty good job of stabilizing the local and the membership before I left. I think the local is in pretty good shape," Garrison said.

He and his wife, Eleanor, have two sons: Carl, 42, of Houston, and Billy, 39, of Atlanta.

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
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History repeats itself in troop softball tournament

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Army learning centers can help displaced workers

Workers affected by the reduction in force can make themselves more marketable through courses offered at the Army learning centers.

The CPO Training Center in Madison and the four Army Learning Center sites have about 2,000 free self-paced courses which include general education, computer courses, clerical skills, electronics, and management. The centers are open to government employees, military people, and their family members.

"We have a wide variety of skill development training and that's very important in this day and age because when you're in a certain job, traditionally you think in terms of 'this is a career' then all of a sudden you're RIF'd. It's more important to know your skills," said Joan McWilliams, the Army learning center manager.

Courses are available through everything from videotapes to computer-based instruction. "It's all self-paced," said McWilliams, who works in training and career management at Civilian Personnel Office. "If you know a little bit about the subject, you may fly through it. If you know nothing about the subject, you can take your time and move slowly till you master it."

Besides courses designed to develop skills in particular areas, there are curriculums in which courses are put together to develop a broader category: a professional secretary curriculum, for example. The centers also offer the basic skills curriculum designed to help those with weaknesses in reading, writing and arithmetic. "Employers are really interested in basic skills," McWilliams said. "They want you to have the basic skills so they know that you can handle the job." Certificates are awarded for completion of any of the courses so people will have proof of their accomplishment.

"For an employee facing a job change, it's really important that they keep their self-esteem up and that they recognize they're in a period of stress — they need to realize that that's normal," McWilliams said. "We have courses on stress: how to manage stress, how to recognize it and how to deal with it. We have courses on how to build high self-esteem. You have to maintain a positive approach to change and realize that you can turn this into something good."

For those who choose to return to school, the centers have many courses that can be taken for college credit. People looking for a new career can take the Guidance Information System which analyzes per-

sonal interests and values. There are books on how to do a resume and how to hunt for a job.

The interactive video disc systems, which connect a laser disc player with a personal computer, provide instruction on the skills of WordPerfect and Lotus 1-2-3. WordPerfect is a word processing package which does graphics, letters, manuscripts, and desk-top publishing. Lotus 1-2-3 does formulas, makes calculations and puts out advanced charts. These skills — WordPerfect and Lotus 1-2-3 — are "the latest in technology" and are in demand in private industry as well as government, McWilliams said.

Donna Givens, an employee development assistant at CPO, plans to take advantage of the courses available at the learning centers. A government employee for three years, she was among those Missile Command workers who received a reduction-in-force notice. Ironically, part of her job is announcing the learning center courses.


"I'm thinking positive; it may be a step in the right direction as far as my career is concerned. I'm not taking it personal," Givens said, referring to her RIF notice. Givens is among those affected by the RIF who already have a college degree. She is taking refresher courses to enhance her chances for future employment.

"I want to take advantage of the opportunities that are available as far as training is concerned, to make myself marketable," Givens said.

Some of the learning center courses are available on cassette tapes and videotapes which can be checked out of the centers for use elsewhere. The CPO Training Center is located in Madison at 9580 Putman Plaza, Highway 20 west. The four learning center sites include the south learning center at building 7446 next to CPO; north learning center, building 3349 in the missile school area; Research Park learning center in the Strategic Defense Command annex; and Fox Army Community Hospital learning center. The south center is open 7-5 daily; the north center is open 7 a.m. to 7

p.m. daily, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, and noon to 4 Sunday; Research Park center, 8-4:30 daily; and the Fox Hospital center, 11-3 daily.

"We're giving priority to anyone being impacted by the RIF," McWilliams said. "The afternoons are a good time to come down; and weekends are wide open." For an appointment, call 876-1061/9416.


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Ammunition surveillance chief retires after 40 years

Ralston was commended by Col. Perry Butler, RASA commander, for his work and dedication to the ammunition surveillance program.



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

of missile asset posture. They are tracking our critical items. They serve to task the remainder of Missile Logistics Center on other Desert Shield business, other issues such as financial implications," Finafrock said.

The other 17 people assigned to the logistics operations center are providing related support. "We have about a half a dozen of those working in transportation and traffic management; they're responsible for scheduling and coordinating the movement of missiles, rockets and spare parts from our depots and contractors to our customers — that is, those units that are deploying to Saudi Arabia. Right now we're using truck, rail, and ships and airplanes to move the cargo," Finafrock said.

Weapon systems being supported include Patriot, Hawk, Chaparral/FAAR, Stinger (plus the Avenger and air-to-air Stinger), Redeye, Multiple Launch Rocket System, OH58D Mast Mounted Sight, Cobra, M65 System, Apache/Hellfire, TOW, Bradley Fighting Vehicle System, Dragon, and Shillelagh.

Shift leaders include Bill Reyer on days; Bobby McDonald, second shift; and Jerry Wiemers, third shift. "Some of the other key players are J. T. Artis, Danny Ogle, and Deborah Smith," Finafrock said.

The MLC people are putting in some long hours. "Deborah, for example, at one point worked 30 straight hours. Folks are working anywhere from eight to 14 hours a day. Yesterday I worked 19 and a half myself," Finafrock said.

"I'm really encouraged by it. Their attitude is fantastic. Many people are doing things they've never done before, and they're quite willing to learn those things and do them well. We have people volunteering to become involved — in volunteering for night shift. While some of the people are very tired, I've never seen the morale better in the directorate. That's after eight years of experience," he said.

Before the conversion, the 20-by-30-foot room now serving as the logistics operations center was used by Resource Management Directorate as an Army Materiel Plan modernization room. Telephones and computer terminals have been installed.

"The support of the MICOM family has been tremendous," Finafrock said. "For example, Bob Payne and his people in the Information Management Directorate by dedicating six programmers to a task force that developed a program in less than 48 hours; and many of his programmers stayed well into the night to complete the assignment."

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
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
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
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Youth reading program gets donation from NCO wives
