## Redstone plays big role in area Special Olympics

Soldiers from Redstone Arsenal will serve as escorts Friday as the Huntsville/Madison County Special Olympics begins its annual slate of sports events for youngsters with handicaps.

Seventy-seven soldiers from the 832nd Ordnance Battalion will participate in the opening ceremonies and motor activity event Friday morning at the Academy for Academics and Arts. Support Troops Battalion will be providing the color guard and logistical support for the opening ceremony.

Other Redstone organizations involved in the upcoming Special Olympics events include Army Community Service, Fox Army Community Hospital, Outdoor Recreation, and Recreation Services.

"There are a number of sports provided through Special Olympics: swimming, bowling, equestrian, track and field, ice skating, basketball, gymnastics, and motor activity," said Helen McAlpine, assistant superintendent for general services, Huntsville City Schools. "This for the special ed population. We have 554 athletes that are going to participate, and it's for ages 5 and above.

"If you've never attended a Special Olympics event, you ought to. It's just one of the most rewarding experiences I think in my life to see children who have handicaps really have a chance to be successful. Everybody is a winner with Special Olympics. They're just so

excited and the excitement just transcends the whole audience; everybody's excited," McAlpine said. A tentative calendar of events lists activities through March 1991: motor activity day, 9:30 a.m. Oct. 5 at Academy for Academics and Arts; Huntsville invitational swim meet, 10 a.m. Oct. 19 at Huntsville Natatorium; Huntsville invitational equestrian meet, 10 a.m. Nov. 3 at Flint Ridge Farm; Huntsville area bowling, slated for February at Pin Palace Bowling Lanes; and Huntsville area track/field meet, 9:30 a.m. March 14 (rain date 15th) at Milton Frank Stadium.

Both the city and county school systems are involved in Huntsville/Madison County Special Olympics which has been going on for 22 years. A number of other entities are involved including the Opportunity Center, Volunteers of America, and the Cerebral Palsy Association. "Special Olympics is designed to give children who have handicapping conditions the opportunity to participate in sports activities," McAlpine said. Participants include children considered trainable mentally retarded, educable mentally retarded, and severe profound (including those with cerebral palsy).

Frances Howard, family services program coordinator and Exceptional Family Member Program coordinator at Army Community Service, said

## Furlough becomes possibility once again for work force

The possibility of a furlough for Army employees resurfaced last week with a memorandum to the field by Secretary of the Army Michael P. W. Stone.

He advised that furloughs may be required in the absence of agreement on a deficit reduction plan. Reductions mandated by the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Act could take the Army 35 percent below its fiscal year 1990 funding levels.

If a furlough occurs, employees will not be paid for the days they're off. Office of Personnel Management provides the following answers to furlough-related questions:

**Do federal employees keep their health benefits while furloughed?**

Yes. The federal government continues to pay its portion of the premium (about 60 percent) while the employee is furloughed. If employees' pay is sufficient to cover their share of the premium, it will continue to be deducted from pay.

Employees whose pay is insufficient can pay the agency the difference directly or have the agency cover the shortage and deduct the total from pay upon return to duty. Employees should not discontinue their health benefit coverage while in a non-pay status, because they will have to wait until the next open season to enroll again. Quitting a plan could also affect the employee's right to carry coverage into retirement.

**Do furloughed workers keep their group life insurance?**

Yes. If the employees' salary is sufficient to cover the entire premium, the employee's share will be deducted. If the salary is insufficient, then life insurance continues free for up to 12 months in non-pay (furlough) status.

**Can employees work on a volunteer basis while on furlough?**

No. Furloughed employees are in a non-duty status and should stay away from the workplace. The law prohibits federal agencies from accepting voluntary services from employees, unless the safety of human life or protection of property is at stake. Furthermore, furloughed employees who come to work and are injured are ineligible for workers compensation.

**How does furlough affect retirement?**

Up to six months' furlough or non-pay time per calendar year is creditable toward retirement. It does not affect the "high three" pay for retirement purposes, since the base rate of pay is not changed. Retirement coverage continues at no cost to the employee in non-pay status.

**How does furlough affect promotions?**

For promotion purposes, there is no federal requirement to extend qualifying periods by the number of non-pay days. However, agencies may extend qualifying periods to meet training requirements. Non-pay status (such as furlough) does not affect time-in-grade requirements.

**Does furlough affect within-grade increases?**

Within-grade increases, merit increases and performance awards in which payment is required by law or agency regulations will be processed during a furlough but may be paid later. A lengthy furlough could delay within-grade increases for both general schedule and wage grade employees.

For example, general schedule employees with a one-year wait between increases could have their increases delayed by the number of days the furlough exceeds 10 working days. Employees with more seniority in a grade have longer waiting periods and won't be af-

fectured unless the furlough exceeds 20 days for general schedule steps 5, 6 and 7 or 30 days for steps 8, 9 and 10.

**Can an employee take annual or sick leave to substitute for furlough days?**

No, because employees are paid for annual and sick days, so the goal of saving the government money would not be accomplished. If the furlough would cause employees with "use-or-lose" leave to lose it, agencies should try to make some accommodation.

However, employees may request leave without pay as a substitute for scheduled furlough days. Leave without pay has the same effect on employee benefits and creditable service as a furlough, but provides employees and management with more scheduling flexibility and reduces documentation requirements.

**Are employees on furlough eligible for unemployment compensation?**

Depending on their particular state's laws, they may be. Some states provide unemployment compensation for as few as five consecutive days without pay.

The Civilian Personnel Office here has said employees would be furnished a Standard Form-8, Notice to Federal Employee About Unemployment Insurance, in order to apply for unemployment benefits with the local state employment office. At that point, that office would make a determination as to entitlements for unemployment benefits.

**Can employees decide which days they wish to take as furlough days?**

The agency decides which days, but may be required by local bargaining agreements to do so in conjunction with the bargaining unit. Agencies are encouraged to seek employees' views on how to handle the furlough.

*(Editor's note: AFGE Local 1858 has negotiated with management since October 1989 in an effort to get an Alternate Work Schedule for Missile Command employees. An agreement could not be reached and the parties met with a federal mediator July 20 and Aug. 17. The union had 30 days to pursue the issue further with the Federal Service Impasses Panel out of Washington, which it did, according to Vicki Fuller, the union's chief negotiator, and James Brothers, union president. The union is waiting for the panel to schedule a hearing. The panel will reach a final decision, and direct the parties to act one way or another. "It will be settled; we will get an agreement," Fuller said.*

*"We've worked real hard to try to get this off dead center and get AWS for the employees because we know they're interested," Brothers said. The union opened negotiations with a number of possible Alternate Work Schedules. During negotiations, the union settled on a 5-4-9 schedule but could not reach an agreement with management on flexible work hours.*

The 5-4-9 schedule would permit employees to work eight days at 9 hours, one day at 8 hours, and have the 10th day off during a two-week period. Fuller does point out that the union successfully negotiated an alternate work schedule for the Strategic Defense Command about five years ago, and that agreement remains in effect at SDC.

The MICOM non-professional and professional bargaining unit includes not only Missile Command workers but also employees of Information Systems Command, the Commissary, Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE) Support Group, and Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.)



# Printing plant supports Operation Desert Shield

When a 48-page Iraqi threat guide was put in the hands of Operation Desert Shield troops several days ago, 30 workers at the Missile Command had a right to feel proud.

The Information Systems Command-MICOM printing plant employees worked 12-hour days, seven-day weeks for 15 days to produce 250,000 pocket guides, "The Iraqi Threat and How They Fight."

Small enough to fit into a soldier's pocket, the guide illustrates how the Iraqi military conducts offensive and defense operations; unit structures; military equipment illustrations; Iraqi rank insignia; as well as tips on how to deal with the heat, poisonous animals to be aware of in that area of the world, road signs and a few common words of the Arabic language.

The information for the guide was compiled by the Army Intelligence Agency in Washington, D.C, parent organization of the Missile and Space Intelligence Center here at Redstone.

AIA was looking for someone who could handle the printing job, so Missile and Space Intelligence Center's visual arts and education branch asked Bob Payne, director of ISC, if his people could handle 250,000 copies in a relatively short time.

Clyde Morris, chief of the Operating Systems and Integration Division, told AIA his branch would "give it a shot."

The plant turned out the guides in batches of 50,000. After the first batch was completed in two and a half

days, the deputy director of AIA, Bennett Hart, came to Redstone to take copies back to Washington.

Each subsequent batch of 50,000 was to be completed in four days, but in every case was completed in three days or less, said Mary Jo Parton, plant supervisor.

The last batch was complete Sept. 19, and with the assistance of Redstone Arsenal Support Activity, copies were in the mail and headed for Saudi Arabia, Payne said.

The guide has already received national media

coverage; and it has been reported that allied country armies have liked the book so much they are making copies of it for their troops.

"Everyone in the printing plant was responsible for getting the job out. All 30 people involved made sacrifices," Morris said.

"Your fine support to Operation Desert Shield is a tribute to your dedication and professionalism," wrote Brig. Gen. John F. Stewart, AIA commander, to Payne and his group.

# Airborne defense sensor has successful flight test

Strategic Defense Command's Airborne Surveillance Testbed (AST) has completed its first flight test against ballistic targets at Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands.

AST project officials called the flight historic. "This was a successful test of the first sensor that has the characteristics you'd need for a strategic defense system," said Col. Gary Stewart, AST project manager.

The AST features what is perhaps the world's most sophisticated long-wave-infrared sensor, which is mounted in a specially constructed 86-foot long cupola atop a modified Boeing 767 jetliner.

The sensor collected infrared data on reentry vehicles from an intercontinental ballistic missile launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., and on the post-boost vehicle or "bus" that carried them into space.

Flying at 45,000 feet, the AST also collected data on a satellite and numerous stars during the mission, which lasted more than five hours.

All targets during the flight were acquired at the expected acquisition ranges; and the high-quality data, processed in real time, was consistent with expected values.

"AST represents the achievement of a capability we've been after for almost 20 years," said Bob Menotti, AST deputy project manager.

Strategic Defense Command manages the AST project for the Strategic Defense Initiative program, conducting measurements and experiments to address critical issues facing electro-optical sensors that would be employed for defense against ballistic missile attack.

## Variety of items can be mailed to soldiers in Saudi

The Defense Logistics Agency in Philadelphia has distributed a list of acceptable donations to service members involved in Operation Desert Shield. Should you have questions about donations, call the DLA hotline at (703) 274-3561.

**Games** — Hand-held computer games, electronic portable games, board/table games such as cards, darts, chess, Cribbage, checkers, bingo, Risk, Uno, Battleship, Pictionary, bumper pool, Scrabble, Scruples, air hockey, mini pingpong, Trivial Pursuit, Skittles, Abalone, backgammon, Monopoly.

**Music and Audio** — Video cameras, music videos and cassettes, blank video/audio tapes, sports video tapes, instruments, Arab language tapes, batteries, radios, battery televisions, portable VCRs.

**Reading** — Comics, USA Today, \*books, \*current magazines (\*beware of restrictions on women's clothing). (Army Materiel Command issued the following guidelines: For purposes of mail destined for Saudi Arabia, "pornography" is considered to include depictions of the nude or seminude human body and all sexually-oriented literature and materials. Con-

trary to widely circulating rumors, there is no ban on photographs showing women and girls dressed according to accepted American standards of good taste. Women depicted in photographs do not have to be dressed in conformity with Saudi standards of female attire.)

**Hobbies** — Model kits, remote control model kits, paint/drawing supplies, kite-making kits, string art, leathercraft, macrame, needlecraft kits, disposable cameras (35mm), film.

**Writing** — Stationery, pens, Christmas/holiday cards.

**Fitness equipment** — Life Cycle, Life Rower, weight benches, weight belts, weight plates, free weights, rowing machine, cross country ski machine, Stairmaster, jump ropes.

**Sports** — Baseballs, gloves, bats, portable basketball goals, softball equipment, soccer balls/free standing goals, rubber footballs, volleyballs (regular and mini), volleyball nets/standards, basketball/rubber basketballs, rubber kickball, horseshoes/stakes, air pumps, gear bags.

**Other** — Squirt guns, rubber balls, wiffle balls, sponge balls, frisbees, indoor golf, nerf balls.

**Personal** — Sun visors, sun block, insect repellent.

Remember, Saudi postal and customs regulations prohibit bringing or shipping into the kingdom alcoholic beverages of any kind, narcotics, weapons and explosives (without appropriate permits), pork and pork products, pornography, material contrary to the Islamic religion.

Material contrary to the Islamic religion includes religious literature intended for general distribution. No problems are envisioned with mailing religious items for the personal use of individual members of the U.S. armed forces, such as single copies of Bibles or prayer books.

There is no objection to greeting cards associated with religious holidays.

There is no truth to prior rumors of a prohibition on the use of stamps depicting the American flag or various other subjects. Any U.S. postage stamp is permissible.



# Missile school historian gets a better storage system

What has 17,000 linear feet in a 2,000 square foot space and is able to hold more than 34 million sheets of paper and yet allows easy access and search capability?

For the answer, all you have to do is visit the OMMCS Historian's Office in building 3338.

It's the new archive storage system which has been set up and readied for use. The system, consisting of five movable shelf units and one stationary bulk storage unit, is an archivist's dream. It has ample storage space; and its movability enables it to take up less room when access is not needed.

"Each movable section has a motor and a computer chip in it," said Valerie Curtis, 26, editorial assistant. "They can be moved singly, in pairs or all at one time, any combination needed to provide access."

"There are sensors in the floor and in the kickplates to prevent accidental closure on either documents or people. There is also a manual override; so if there is a loss of power, they can be moved by hand," Curtis said. She was the principal action officer in the search and selection of the system.

The real beneficiary of the system is William Stubno, 41, the assistant command historian. It's Stubno's job to identify, categorize and file materials into the

system. It's also his job to find materials for others to use.

"Customers will have limited physical access to the materials once they are put into the system," Stubno said. "This means that I will be the one getting the materials, and this system will make that job much easier."

Since the system only recently arrived, materials for archiving have not yet been put into it.

"There is about a year's worth of work ahead, getting things identified and categorized," Stubno said. "And even at the end of that year, the job will not be done; for as more materials are received, they have to be prepared for storage into the system." Preparation includes placing papers into acid-free folders and boxes, and putting acid-free labels on.

"This system gives us a tremendous capability to store and have easy access to historical material pertaining to OMMCS and the Ordnance Corps," said Dr. William T.T. Ward, the command historian for Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School.

The system has a multimedia capability; film, videotapes and other media will be stored along with printed matter. It can also be expanded, the only limitation being the space available for expansion.

For example, agencies may furlough employees one day every week or every other week to ease the hardship on employees.

**Will federal employees in the Reserves who are called to active duty during the Persian Gulf crisis be subject to furlough?**

No. The Office of Personnel Management asked agencies to exempt mobilized reservists from furloughs.

**Are members of the Senior Executive Service subject to the furlough?**

SES career employees are subject to furlough. SES non-career appointees can be furloughed at the discretion of the agency. Presidential appointees are not subject to furlough because, like military members, their pay is not tied to a particular number of work hours.

**Can employees take other jobs while on furlough?**

Yes, but they must get their agencies' permission and follow conflict of interest and Hatch Act provisions.

Oklahoma and Oklahoma State have a lot in common, but the current status of their football teams is not one of them.





# Logistics workers enhance their education at 'LogU'

"Logistics University" is the name of a new training program developed for Missile Logistics Center employees and other employees in the logistics career program.

Working with the local Civilian Personnel Office, the MLC arranged with three institutions of higher learning — University of Alabama-Huntsville, Alabama A&M University and Athens State College — to provide academic training for employees in the logistics field.

"The purpose of these classes is to offer college classes to enhance job performance in logistics," said Jim Wasson, chief of the Logistics Analysis and Automation Division and LogU coordinator.

Other goals are to increase levels of professionalism, provide insight into better management techniques and methods of delivering service, and countering work environment changes, Wasson said.

With the future promising increased work requirements brought on by the acquisition and fielding of new systems, expansion of technology and maintenance of existing systems, it is essential that employees be able to meet the challenge, Wasson said.

But while the future will bring more work, resources are expected to decrease, he said.

LogU classes are taught between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. in building 5675. Participants must re-

quest a change in tour of duty to accommodate the program, Wasson said.

In addition to the convenience employees have of attending day classes instead of interrupting family even-

ings, the tab for their class is picked up by the government.

In past cases, tuition cost has often been prohibitive for employees seeking to improve their education, Wasson said.

Employees applying for the college classes must meet preliminary requirements, i.e., the course taken must be job related, he said. The employee's supervisor must provide a justification.

If an employee doesn't make it into the classes on first try, he has the option of reapplying.

The LogU program will be formally launched in January; however the first three classes started earlier this month.

Wasson summed up the benefits of the LogU: It will enhance the professional skills of the logistics work force, and employees will benefit by the convenience of the class schedule and ultimate expansion of their knowledge.



# TRADOC experiences good year for fire safety

FORT MONROE, Va. — As the national Fire Prevention Week (Oct. 7-13) nears, Training and Doctrine Command has experienced its best fire safety record in four years.

So far in fiscal year 1990 there have been 248 fires with no loss of life, according to Don Waling, TRADOC's chief of fire protection. The fires cost \$702,400, but they had endangered \$394.2 million worth of property.

In fiscal 1989, one person was killed and almost \$18 million of TRADOC property had burned up. The worst year for fatalities of the last four was fiscal '87 when fires in TRADOC killed seven people.

"We're taking the theme of this week's observance serious ('Make Your Place Fire Safe'), and we're going to try to improve our record," Waling said.

"After the terrible year we had in '89, we conducted Fire Protection Operational Readiness Inspections throughout the command. We found some holes, but with the help of the installations we were able to plug a lot of those holes.

"We're not fooling ourselves into thinking everything's fine now; our record's good only when you compare it to past years. So we're going to put the same emphasis on our programs next year," he said.

The leading cause of the fires this year has been electrical short circuits. "The shorts were not in already installed wiring," Waling said, "but in wiring that occupants had rigged in their quarters."

The next two most common types of fires are caused by pyrotechnics in natural cover and fuel leaks in vehicles, primarily privately-owned vehicles. (TRADOC News Service)

# Local hunters' group does conservation projects

*Editor's note: Redstone chapter of Ducks Unlimited will have a fund-raising banquet at 6 p.m. Thursday at the Rustic Lodge.*

An eerie mist rises from the cold water of the pond. The hunters cramped into their blind, wait patiently, ever looking skyward. One blows a call and it drifts off into the gently moving reeds and grasses.

Suddenly they see them. Coming in from the north, their bodies silhouetted in the slowly brightening dawn sky. Closer and closer, they circle. The lead mallard decides that it's safe, and leads the flock into a steep dive for the pond and the decoys the hunters have put out.

When they are less than 50 yards from the blind, the hunters jump up, firing at the descending ducks, downing a few, while the rest frantically bank away and escape the trap.

This is the image that most people have about waterfowl hunters. But there is another side that most people just don't know about.

To most, the words hunter and conservationist just don't go together. But 30 hunters on Redstone Arsenal work year-round to prove that they are compatible and are in fact one and the same.

Redstone Arsenal Ducks Unlimited, a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of North American waterfowl, holds several events throughout

the year raising money for various waterfowl conservation programs. These programs, managed by the national headquarters of Ducks Unlimited, are active in all 50 states as well as Canada and Mexico.

The Redstone chapter will have a fund-raising banquet 6 p.m. Thursday at the Rustic Lodge. Cost of the banquet is \$30 which includes \$20 for annual membership in Ducks Unlimited and a subscription to the bi-monthly Ducks Unlimited magazine.

Following a prime rib dinner, there will be a raffle and an auction. Prizes include commemorative shotguns and outdoor equipment. Items to be auctioned include several Ducks Unlimited prints of waterfowl and a special collector's display of duck stamps.

All profits will be forwarded to the national headquarters for use in several conservation projects. One such project is located near Scottsboro on Raccoon Creek. It is a waterfowl habitat covering about 800 acres, providing needed wintering grounds and a stopover for migratory birds.

The Redstone Arsenal chapter began in 1987. Enjoying a steady growth since its inception, the chapter was second last year in the state for the percentage of money raised over the previous year.

Capt. Randy Beckmann, the chapter's chairman, says that the group is primarily a service organization with an emphasis on conservation.

"This is our biggest fund-raising event of the year," Beckmann said. "Eighty percent of all monies turned into the national headquarters are used directly in conservation programs."

Other fund-raising events throughout the year include a spring fun shoot and a fall "big buck" contest.

"We would like to invite the public to attend the banquet," said SSgt. William Knapp, a chapter member. "It should be a good time; and if you're in the market to buy or win outdoor equipment or art, it'll be well worth the time."

# Charity drive sets sights on another successful year

The chairman of the Huntsville area Combined Federal Campaign urged a repeat of last year's record-setting campaign at the CFC kickoff luncheon Monday.

"Let us all join together and make this a successful campaign, as successful as it was last year," said Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal. As head of the largest of the 31 Huntsville area federal agencies, the MICOM commander serves as chairman of the annual charity drive.

Last year's campaign raised \$1,019,587 which was 18 and a half percent more than the year before. The 1990 campaign, scheduled Oct. 1 through Nov. 2, has a goal of \$1,111,111.

"Our contributions benefit the elderly, the young,

the sick, the handicapped and the needy," Chen said. He pointed out that CFC agencies provided assistance after the Huntsville tornado last year.

Ralph Hood, a professional humorist who speaks at conventions and meetings around the country, donated his time to help kickoff the campaign. Known as "the flying humorist," Hood entertained the 325 attendees with his folksy style. On a more serious note, he equated the campaign to flying an airplane above the clouds. "It's clear on top," he said. The charity campaign is to "help other people get on top so they can look at the world from a different angle."

"There are two requirements I really don't joke about. If you could fly on top, live on top and run this campaign on top, you have to have a little bit of courage and a whole lot of faith," Hood said.

Jimmy Temple, this year's chairman of the Local Federal Coordinating Committee, served as master of ceremonies at the kickoff luncheon held at the Huntsville Hilton.

The 22,000 Huntsville area federal workers can designate their contributions to agencies they select from a list of 683 human health and welfare agencies. These include United Way organizations, national voluntary health agencies, international service agencies, and local unaffiliated voluntary agencies.

"Help today for a better tomorrow," reads the slogan for this year's campaign. "CFC — a great way to give."

## Defense enrollment eligibility policy changes

A new policy that impacts the payment of Champus claims went into effect Oct. 1.

The policy states that an automated Nonavailability Statement will be required for inpatient health care provided by a civilian hospital within a medical treatment facility's catchment area (generally a 40-mile radius).

The most important impact on beneficiaries is that beginning Oct. 1, Champus fiscal intermediaries will deny payment of non-emergency claims if a nonavailability statement has not been generated on DEERS by the appropriate military facility. DEERS is the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System.

As a word of caution to prospective parents or those with newborn infants: If an infant remains in the hospital continuously after the mother has been discharged, the mother's nonavailability statement is valid for the baby in the same hospital for up to 15 days after the mother is discharged. Beyond this limit, a nonavailability statement must be issued for the infant in order to have the claim paid by Champus.

In addition, if an active duty service member gives birth in a civilian hospital and there are charges for the care of the infant, a nonavailability statement will be required if the baby's stay is more than four days. After that time, infants are considered to be new patients in their own right.

Both of these circumstances require that all infants be enrolled in DEERS. This can be accomplished with a certificate of live birth, which unlike the official birth certificate, is available within a few days. Since this document is accepted as proof of birth, children less than 1 year old are no longer exempt from the requirement to be enrolled in DEERS.


To avoid potential problems in the payment of Champus claims, parents must enroll their children in DEERS. This is particularly important for members with children less than 1 year old who were exempt under previous policy.






