## Families of deployed logistic reps receive thanks

Red, white and blue ribbons with a special message from the Missile Command commander are being sent worldwide to families of deployed Logistic Assistance Representatives.

At least 18 civilian LARs are in Saudi Arabia for Operation Desert Shield with the units they support.

The ribbons were the idea of the Missile Logistics Center and were done by MLC workers. On Oct. 12

Jim Flinn, the center director, and his staff delivered to Missile Systems Readiness Directorate the first 18 ribbons. The technical and supply support branch, logistic assistance division, of Missile Systems Readiness Directorate in turn sent the ribbons and letters from the commander to families of the logistic assistance representatives.

The families reside at various places including Germany; Fort Bliss, Texas, Fort Bragg, N.C., Fort

Stewart, Ga., and Fort Polk, La., among other installations.

"These (ribbons) are going to wives of LARs who are deployed in Southwest Asia, along with a letter from Maj. Gen. Chen," said Stan Reid, acting chief of logistic assistance division. This is in recognition of the family members' "contribution in supporting U.S. forces in Southwest Asia," he said.

## Worker returns here after being kept hostage by Iraq

A Missile Command worker taken hostage by the Iraqis after their invasion of Kuwait in August was released last week and has returned to the U.S.

William H. Hollingsworth, 64, a logistic assistance representative for Missile Systems Readiness Directorate, has been reunited with his family. His wife, Nancy, had been with him during his assignment in Kuwait and was released in late August after being detained by the Iraqis.

The Hollingsworths had gone to Kuwait a year ago for what would have been a two-year tour. Hollingsworth, a GS-13 equipment specialist, is an MSRDR worker who was detailed to the Security Assistance Management Directorate. Nancy had retired from the Army Audit Agency before the Huntsville couple went to Kuwait.

"When the invasion occurred the 2nd of August they were notified by the State Department to stand

fast" but were detained against their will by the Iraqis, according to Pat Hill, an MSRDR worker and family friend. On Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 23, she and Nancy called the hotel in Jordan where Hollingsworth was staying after his release. John Jones, from Security Assistance Management Directorate, was on assignment in Jordan and happened to be staying in the same hotel.

"He (Hollingsworth) was doing great. I saw him on CNN, he was just beaming from ear to ear. He said he was doing fine. He did say to us: It's bad, because when there's a knock at your door you don't know who'll be there," Hill said.

Nancy, 62, was in a happy mood when reached by telephone by the *Redstone Rocket* at her daughter's home in Carrollton, Ga., Oct. 24. "I saw him on CNN this morning and he looked great," Nancy said. She

# MPs hoping for safer Halloween than last year

Military police encourage Redstone Arsenal residents to have a safe Halloween this year.

Last year, a boy was injured when struck by a car while riding a bicycle during the allotted trick-or-treat time on post. "It wasn't a serious injury, but it was potentially serious," said SFC Kenny Renew, Provost Marshal's operations sergeant. The child was treated and released at the hospital.

"We're going to be putting extra MP patrols out" during the trick-or-treating hours on post which are 6 to 8 tonight, Renew said. "I will have MPs out there walking and roving — motorized and walking patrols."

People should wear reflectorized clothing, if possible, while out treat-or-treating and should avoid dark costumes that might be hard to see, he advised.

Department of Defense safety officials provide the following additional tips for having a safe Halloween:

- Tell children not to eat any goodies until parents inspect them. Throw away unwrapped candy. Check fruit, candy and other treats for inserted foreign objects, including pins and razor blades. Report any tampering to military or local authorities so they can warn others.

- Make sure costumes are made of flame-retardant materials. The outfit should be short enough and footwear the right shoe size so youngsters won't trip.

- Costumes should be bright enough to be seen by drivers. A little reflective tape, added as part of the costume's design, will take care of the visibility problem. A flashlight or glow tube will help the child see where he is going and provide an added safety measure for motorists.

- Make-up is better than a mask for vision and breathing. If a mask is worn, make sure it fits well and does not interfere with the child's sight or breathing.

- Trick-or-treaters should be told to stay in their own neighborhood and to be home by a specific time. Tell them not to go to unlit houses.

- An adult or responsible teen-ager should accompany young children as they make the rounds of the neighborhood. Older children not accompanied by adults should travel in a group. Go over basic traffic rules with them, such as crossing at intersections and walking on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, they should walk close to the curb and face the traffic.

- Tell children to stay away from dogs and other animals. A costume may frighten an animal into attacking.

- And for adults on their way from a costume party: Don't drink and drive, say DoD safety officials. Even sober, drive more slowly than usual and expect trick-or-treaters to do the unexpected.



# Charity campaign reaches 67 percent of goal

The Huntsville area Combined Federal Campaign reported Friday it had collected \$748,097 or 67 percent of its \$1,111,111 goal.

The campaign was originally scheduled to end Nov. 2 but will be extended one week to Nov. 9, according to Jimmy Temple, chairman of the Local Federal Coordinating Committee. "It appeared as though some people were waiting to find out how the budget would be resolved before they gave a contribution; now that's been taken care of," he said.

"It looks like we still could make the goal. I mean it's not a shoo-in by any means, but we're within striking distance," Temple said.

Workers at the Missile Command, the largest of the 31 federal agencies in this area, had contributed \$206,134 or 60 percent of its \$341,000 goal. This was \$8,000 ahead of last year's pace, but only 36 percent of MICOM's work force had contributed.

"For the total campaign last year, MICOM had 71 percent so we still have some employees that participated last year that haven't participated yet this year," Temple said.

Last year's record-setting CFC campaign raised \$1,019,587 which was 18 and a half percent more than the year before. Friday's total is about \$52,000 ahead of last year's pace. "The conclusion I draw from that is we're doing pretty well with the total CFC, but MICOM is running a little behind," Temple said.

Some 38 percent of the approximately 22,000 federal workers in this area have contributed so far.

"Actually MICOM isn't far off from that," Temple added.

"In the overall (campaign), we have some of the agencies that started later so they're going to be reporting in later; and we're hoping that will help make up the difference in where we are now and the total goal," he said.

Managers are encouraged to allow their key workers enough time to solicit employees for contributions. "We want the solicitors to have sufficient time to contact all employees so that all employees have an opportunity to make a voluntary contribution," Temple said. # Investigator seeks crime-solving help

Provost Marshal investigators are requesting assistance in solving a number of unusual thefts which occurred during October in the post housing area.

"We suspect that these larcenies have been committed by the same persons because of the closeness of the locations and their unusual nature," said investigator Don Wilson of the Investigations Branch.

"As in the past, with incidents of this nature, we depend heavily on information supplied by area residents, who have provided valuable assistance in the past," he said. The nature of the recent thefts are: an automobile black front-end cover (car bra) taken from Lance Court; a second black car bra taken from Jupiter Street; a lawn chair and a number of blue and red seat cushions taken from Jupiter Court; and various weight exercising equipment, to include dumbbells, a tricep bar, and assorted other weights, taken from Jupiter Court. A number of these weightlifting items are silver colored.

Anyone with knowledge of the whereabouts of the stolen property is requested to call the Investigations Branch 876-2090/3449 or the "Crime Hotline" 876-1502.

"Information provided confidentially will be treated as same," Wilson said. "We think that these incidents will continue and increase until the persons responsible are identified."

Those of you who have been to our Pharmacy lately have probably seen a change in the way that we serve you. The Pharmacy staff spent many hours implementing Total Quality Management ideas that have resulted in faster service to our patients extending hours from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Saturdays, from 9 a.m. to noon, the Pharmacy is open for pick-ups only. There is now a "refill only" window and two full service windows. For your convenience, prescriptions may be dropped off and picked up from the same window now.

Our call-in for prescription refill program continues to work well. Please call 842-7337 for the call-in service. Prescription refills using mail-in cards are now available and should be especially beneficial for those living outside the Huntsville area. Please allow two working days for call-ins and five working days for mail-ins. All other prescription refills will be filled through the refill prescription turn-in window. Complete information on the use of these refill services is available at the Pharmacy.

## Flu immunizations

The flu season is here. This year the vaccine has arrived a little later than usual. This was due to the manufacturers concentrating on support requirements for Operation Desert Shield. The tentative start date for the immunization program is Nov. 12. Additional information will be forthcoming.

## Saturday clinic

We have begun a Saturday Urgent Care Clinic. "Partnership" Champus physicians staff this clinic from noon to 5 p.m. Champus eligible beneficiaries may make an appointment or get seen on a walk-in basis. For appointments call the Outpatient Clinic at 876-3659. As full pharmacy and laboratory support is not available, this service is directed to urgent illnesses. Routine lab work or prescriptions will need to return to the hospital Monday through Friday.

## Operation Desert Shield

Desert Shield has placed some demands on us but your hospital has met every operational requirement placed upon it while striving to meet the Redstone Arsenal community's needs. The staff, as well as myself, extend our appreciation for your continued support throughout this period. Our Troop Medical Clinic and Emergency Room physicians have both been deployed with the 101st Airborne Division.

Several other personnel have also been reassigned to various units. These personnel changes caused a shift in physicians from Family Practice and other areas to ensure that adequate coverage remains available.

## Hospital services

Fox Army Community Hospital provided the following services to the community during September: admitted 169 for inpatient care; provided outpatient treatment to 12,146 patients; treated 1,616 patients in the Emergency Room; performed 524 radiological procedures for a total of 5,570 exposures; filled 12,962 new prescriptions and refilled 6,105. Some 242 patients missed appointments in September which could have been used by other patients. Please let us know if you cannot keep your scheduled appointment by calling the clinic or the Patient Representative Office at 876-2857.

Patients sometimes say they have a hard time getting through to make a clinic appointment, that the line is always busy. If you have a hard time making an appointment, please wait until a later time in the afternoon to make your call. Early mornings are the busiest, and therefore the hardest time to get through to make your appointment. If you are on the Arsenal, please feel free to come in to the clinics, and the ap-

pointment clerk will do everything possible to schedule you an appointment. Most clinics only have one appointment clerk available, so please be patient with us. We will help you as soon as we can.

We want to keep our community informed of our work and the health care services available to you. The following are available to assist you in your health care: the Hospital Information Booklet; Medical Advisory Pamphlet; Pediatric Advisory Pamphlet; Telephone Directory; Champus Handbook; and the Patient Bill of Rights. If you need any of these pamphlets, please ask the patient representative or health benefits adviser at the hospital or call us at 876-8621, and we will send you copies.

My staff's goals are to provide you and the community with the best quality health care available within the resources we have available to provide that care in a courteous and compassionate manner, and to keep you regularly informed of where we are and where we are going in an attempt to provide you these services. The other, "Hussein's Halloween," featured Iraq's outline carved onto a pumpkin with a battle in the sand nearby. A miniature camel rested in the background.


"The purpose of the contest was to encourage office teamwork and cooperation. No one person can do everything, but together each can do what he does best," Clements said.

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# Paint, repair or fabricate at auto shop on post

One of the best kept secrets at Redstone is the shop on post where military and civilian people can fix up their cars or other machinery.

The Auto Crafts Shop in building 3617 is also a machine and welding shop. It's located on Entac Circle, two buildings south of Military Finance.


"The biggest problem is the civilians don't know they're eligible to use the shop; and the second thing is they don't know where to find us," said Mark Poole, the shop manager and lead instructor.

The shop is open to active duty or retired military, their family members, Defense Department or Marshall Space Flight Center civilians, and contractor workers. It has a full range of equipment: a "top of the line" paint booth for painting cars, welders, tire machines, tire balancers, four hydraulic lifts for changing the oil, a sandblaster, a glass bead blaster, an air-conditioning servicing machine, a hot dip vat or hot tank, a 25-ton press, brake lathe, and valve grinding equipment. The shop includes an engine area where engines can be rebuilt.

"We basically do anything from an oil change to a complete restoration — everything in between," Poole said. People sometimes bring their cars in, strip them down and completely restore them with new parts. Some bring in broken lawn furniture so it can be welded back together. "A guy back there now is fabricating some lifting blocks," Poole said.

It has 20 indoor work bays, 10 outdoor covered work bays, and 20 outdoor storage bays. Cars are not the only types of vehicles that have found their way into the shop. "We've done airplanes, motorcycles, cars, boats; anything dealing with metal, basically," Poole said. About four years ago, a man brought in an airplane in parts so it could be painted; he brought part of the wing one day, part of the fuselage the next day, and so on, and painted it part by part in the paint booth. "I guess he took it home and put it back together," Poole added.

Boyce James is the other instructor at the shop; James Kite is the full-time tool room attendant; and MSgt. Richard Mahan is the part-time tool room attendant. The shop has a complete library of

maintenance manuals for foreign and domestic cars and trucks.



"It's first come, first serve. There is a safety orientation briefing they have to attend before they can use

the facility and that is given Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights at 7, and Sunday afternoons at 2. And it takes about 20 minutes," Poole said. "It's a real quick, basic safety briefing and there's no charge for it but you have to attend that before you can use the shop."

The large one-floor building that houses the shop probably dates back to the World War II era. The shop has occupied it since about 1964. Poole hopes more people will find their way there to use the facility. "We're eager to serve them," he said.

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

## Learn more about dental plan at upcoming briefing here

Military family members can brush up on their family's dental care by attending a briefing on the Active Duty Dependents Dental Plan Nov. 13-14 at the Post Theater.

The Active Duty Dependents Dental Plan, operated by Delta Dental Plan of California (also known as DDP-Delta), is a voluntary program that covers or shares the cost of basic dental care for eligible family members of active-duty members of all seven uniformed services. These sponsors may enroll family members who live in the U.S., Puerto Rico, or the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Briefing sessions are scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 13 and 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 14 at the Post Theater. The sessions will be conducted by a DDP-Delta representative. Free toothbrushes and dental health information will be provided.

The DDP-Delta program began its fourth year of operation Aug. 1. Effective that date, three new benefits were added and two existing benefits were expanded.

The new benefits include: sealants on permanent molars for patients

under age 14; partial payment toward some cast crowns for permanent teeth (also called the "alternative treatment allowance"); and prefabricated resin crowns for baby front teeth.

Expanded benefits include: space maintainers, now covered for premature loss of baby eye teeth, as well as for baby back teeth on patients under age 14; examinations and X-rays, which are now paid for in connection with both covered and non-covered dental services.

Services that are fully covered under the Active Duty Dependents Dental Plan include dental exams, teeth cleanings, fluoride treatments and X-rays. Restorative and repair services that are cost-shared include fillings, stainless steel crowns on baby teeth, and repairs to dentures.

All covered benefits are subject to some limitations.

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# Unmanned ground vehicles to provide battlefield info

*Editor's note: The following news release was provided by the Unmanned Ground Vehicle Joint Project Office at the Missile Command.*

Current military thought is that the geometry of the future battlefield will be much less defined than that envisioned by the Air Land Battle Doctrine. Rather, the future battlefield will likely be characterized by widely separated groups of forces — the "non-linear battlefield." Here, the focus is on the opposing forces rather than the terrain.

The key to success in such an environment is the ability of commanders to "see the battlefield" as never before. An important tool to accomplish that mission is the Tactical Unmanned Ground Vehicle (TUGV).

Like its cousin, the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV), this Unmanned Ground Vehicle (UGV) will initially focus on performing the reconnaissance mission for the battlefield commander. UAVs and UGVs complement each other in the same way that air and ground cavalry units complement each other. Like their manned counterparts, UGVs can remain on station almost indefinitely, are relatively impervious to adverse weather conditions, are able to provide precise location data, and can carry a wide array of sensors including visual and acoustic.

The Unmanned Ground Vehicle Joint Project Office is now in the process of awarding a contract that will place teleoperated ground vehicles in the hands of U.S. forces for the first time. These systems will be employed by infantry units to enhance reconnaissance, surveillance and target acquisition capabilities.

These first TUGVs will consist of a manportable Operator's Control Unit, a Mobile Base Unit, a surveillance mission module — video cameras, microphones, forward looking infrared radars, laser systems, etc. — and a wide-band communication link. These Surrogate Teleoperated Vehicles will be pro-

It's showdown time in the Atlantic Coast Conference.



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

"As long as they're there, we're here; and they have our support. And this is just one little indication of that," Flinn said.



The reception will allow the ROTC cadets to talk with active duty officers and learn about the daily challenges of being an officer.



and her daughter would leave for Washington, D.C., the following morning to meet Hollingsworth when his plane arrives from London. Hollingsworth spent the night of Oct. 24 in England before departing for the states.

Nancy was kept in Kuwait until Aug. 23 and was in Baghdad for three days, Aug. 23-26, before being granted her freedom. She recalled the Kuwait she saw after the invasion. "We would see buildings that had been bombed or burned, but not that many. We would see tanks. We would see Iraqi troops; they were very courteous to us. Other than that it was nothing like the scenes we'd see in other wars. They took the whole country in four hours. The destruction has been since we left — the burning and destruction of buildings took place after we left," she said.

During the first three days of the invasion, Iraqi troops surrounded the American compound in Kuwait. "We would leave the embassy every day and we would go to our apartment and go back to the embassy at night," Nancy said. "There was never any threat or any remarks or anything, other than they were just very courteous to us." The accommodations were comfortable, she said.

"Ambassador (Nathaniel) Howell, he was something else," Nancy said. "He's still in the embassy in Kuwait. He's a real professional."

She and her husband had arrived in Kuwait Oct. 1, 1989. They have three children, all of whom are grown up and married. Their oldest son, William, is an Army warrant officer who has been deployed to Saudi Arabia for Operation Desert Shield along with his wife, Wanda, who is also an Army warrant officer. William, 35, a graduate of Huntsville's Johnson High School, is a helicopter repair crew chief; Wanda, whose parents reside in Florida, is a helicopter pilot. "Billy was among the first graduating class from Johnson, and he had joined the Army on the delayed entry program so that's all he'd ever wanted," his mother said. She returned home Aug. 28 so she was able to have dinner with her son and daughter-in-law that evening before they departed for Saudi Arabia early the next morning. The Hollingsworths' other son, Ron, 32, resides in Huntsville; their daughter, Peggy Walker, lives in Carrollton, Ga.

Nancy expects that she and her husband will be remaining in Huntsville where they have a house, which they were leasing while in Kuwait, and Hollingsworth has his Redstone job.

"The whole family appreciates the support we have been provided by MICOM, (commanding) Gen. Chen, and SAMD," Nancy said. "All the employees have been helpful and supportive to the entire family. They have just been marvelous. Col. Noll there at Missile Systems Readiness Directorate, he's been marvelous. And of course we just couldn't have made it without

Mr. Stan Reid (acting chief of logistic assistance division at MSRD). They really treat us like family, not just as employees, I tell you."




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
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# Soldier seer says Chicago a cinch in NBA this season

Experience and a healthy Larry Bird are the strengths of perennial contender Boston. The Celtics are getting old and have a questionable backcourt, however.

The Washington Bullets boast Bernard King and some good young talent. But they have so-so shooting and a questionable offensive concept. They should finish no better than fourth in the division. If Pervis Ellison plays to expectations, however, the Bullets could make the playoffs.

New Jersey has good young talent, sharpshooting Reggie Theus and too many weaknesses to list. The Nets might finish ahead of the Miami Heat.

A good attitude and developing frontcourt is the best you can say about Miami. The Heat lacks experience and defense, but may be able to escape the division cellar.

The **Central Division** order of finish should be Chicago Bulls, Detroit Pistons, Indiana Pacers, Cleveland Cavaliers, Milwaukee Bucks, Atlanta Hawks and Charlotte Hornets.

Chicago has Michael Jordan, the best player in the NBA. The Bulls also have strong starters and reserves, but an inconsistent frontcourt. They should wind up celebrating with champagne after winning it all this season.

Detroit, the defending champion, has the best guard rotation in the NBA and a tough defense. The Pistons' weakness is their frontcourt scoring, but they should be a contender once again.

Indiana has potential and topnotch scorers, but is inconsistent; and Chuck Person's attitude is suspect. The Pacers are my pick to be a strong sleeper.

Cleveland's strengths include coaching, youth and

outside shooting. The Cavaliers are also injury prone and have a history of playoff choking. For the Cavaliers to reach the top, Danny Ferry has to do for them what he did for Duke in college.

Height, starting guards and promising youth are Milwaukee's keys for success this season. The Bucks lack team speed, however, and have trouble scoring in the fourth period. They should make the playoffs.

Atlanta has Dominique Wilkins and Moses Malone. Trouble spots include outside shooting, coaching and the signing of Jon Koncak last season. The Bucks should finish up a lowly lottery team.

Charlotte is caught in a web of low home attendance with no expectations for improvement on the court. The Hornets didn't help themselves in the draft and their shooting is suspect. They should wind up in the division cellar.

## Wild wild West

In the Western Conference, the San Antonio Spurs should finish atop the Midwest Division and the Portland Trailblazers should outdo the competition in the Pacific Division. San Antonio is my pick as Western Conference champion.

The **Midwest Division** order of finish should be San Antonio Spurs, Houston Rockets, Utah Jazz, Dallas Mavericks, Denver Nuggets, Minnesota Timberwolves and Orlando Magic.

David Robinson will spur on the Spurs to the conference championship. San Antonio has the best talent in the wild wild West, but it lacks a good backup point guard.

Houston has a strong frontcourt and the best center in the NBA, Akeem "The Dream" Olajuwon. The Rockets' backcourt is up and down, however, and the team has a history of underachieving. They should make a big turnaround this season and place a strong second in the division. Former Florida star Vernon Maxwell will help the Rockets blast off.

Utah has a good power forward, a good point guard and all that jazz. Its weaknesses include a tradition of playoff failures and a lack of strong reserves. The Jazz looks like it's slipping.

Guards, a fine team concept and Roy Tarpley's potential are strengths for Dallas. Weaknesses include Tarpley's drug problem and the scoring production of the reserves. The Mavericks should make the playoffs.

Denver has offense, offense and more offense. But the Nuggets lack defense, defense, defense. They'll be a lottery team, no doubt.

Tony Campbell paces the lowly Minnesota Timberwolves. The team is strong defensively but weak on both offense and rebounding. It looks like a long season for the 'Wolves.

Dennis Scott should help add magic to Orlando. The Magic needs a lot more than that, however. Some

divine intervention wouldn't hurt this cellar dweller.

In the **Pacific Division**, it will be the Portland Trailblazers followed by the Los Angeles Lakers, Phoenix Suns, Seattle SuperSonics, Los Angeles Clippers, Golden State Warriors and Sacramento Kings.

Portland has the best backcourt in the conference and is strong at rebounding. The Trailblazers will be dangerous despite a weak half-court offense.

The Lakers of La-La Land have Magic Johnson, a potent fastbreak and the pretty Laker Girls. Who can lose with a combination like that? Question marks at center and on half-court offense do hurt this contender, however.

Phoenix has good team speed and the one-two scoring punch of Tom Chambers and Kevin Johnson. The Suns are prone to lapses and lack a strong reserve point guard. They should be right there in the hunt this season.

Seattle's strengths include Dale Ellis, Xavier McDaniel and coaching. A suspect overall team offense and overrated talent will keep the SuperSonics from being super although they should make the playoffs.

The Los Angeles Clippers have some of the best young talent in the NBA. A healthy Gary Grant should help this possible playoff contender.

Chris Mullin leads a high-powered Golden State offense. But the Warriors are weak at defense and inside scoring, and appear to be sinking in the division.

Sacramento can boast Wayman Tisdale and a fine 1990 draft, but has plenty of weaknesses. Ralph Sampson says he has it together this year; if he does, the Kings will crown a few opponents. They still look like a lowly lottery team.

Here are my preseason top 10 NCAA teams: UNLV, Arkansas, Oklahoma, North Carolina, Georgetown, Arizona, Michigan State, Connecticut, Duke and Louisiana State.

UNLV, the defending champion, is without question the best team in the country. Larry Johnson and Stacey Augmon lead a bunch of NBA prospects who will enjoy a banner year despite NCAA sanctions placed on the Runnin' Rebels.

No. 2 Arkansas will again be in the Final Four. National championship is definitely on the Razorbacks' mind. The hogs are led by long-range bomber Todd Day, Lee Mayberry and Oliver Miller.

The Oklahoma Sooners are missing a couple of top scorers from last season but coach Billy Tubbs has reloaded this top three team. Returning double-figure scorers include Jackie Jones, Damon Patterson and Smokey McCovery.
