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Missile Command involved in Operation Desert Storm

United Nation allies wage war on the Iraqi forces of Saddam Hussein

The desert shield became the storm Jan. 16 as war erupted in the Middle East.

The United States and its allies attacked Iraq after months of economic sanctions and diplomatic efforts free Kuwait had failed. The Iraqi forces of Saddam Hussein had invaded and occupied Kuwait last August.

Initial reports indicated a successful opening bombing attack of key Iraqi sites in both Iraq and Kuwait. The air attacks were expected to continue for some time. Ground attacks — many involving weapon systems managed by the Missile Command — remained a strong possibility.

The assault began with more than 1 million troops massed on opposite sides. Some 425,000 Americans made up the bulk of an international coalition of forces facing 550,000 Iraqis.

By Jan. 16, the number of soldiers here processed for possible duty in Saudi Arabia — "processed for overseas replacement" — was up to 225. Some 167

had actually departed Redstone, 14 were pending departure, and the rest were on stand-by status.

"That number (of PORs) is going to start mushrooming astronomically," said Maj. Thurman "Skip" Sharples, the adjutant general for the Missile Command. Plans are to process every graduate of advanced individual training on a week to week basis. With graduation ceremonies every Wednesday and Friday at the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School and an average of 40 people per graduation, this means at least 80 soldiers per week could be processed here for overseas replacement.

Many of the first departing graduates were ammunition specialists, 55 Bravos. Sharples expects emphasis to also be placed on the missile system repair field.

Besides military people, Redstone Arsenal is also represented in Saudi by civilian Logistic Assistance Representatives. As of Jan. 17, the Missile Command has 36 LARs and two supervisors on site in Saudi Arabia, according to the Missile Systems Readiness Directorate.

Most of the systems managed by the Missile Command are involved in the operation. Maj. Gen. William Chen, the commander of MICOM and Redstone Arsenal, described the wide scope of this involvement in a recent interview with *Redstone Rocket*. "Beginning in August this past year, we here at MICOM have seen the deployment of virtually all our missile systems to Saudi Arabia; exceptions are Pershing and Lance. And so this has been the largest deployment of missile systems in our history, and some of the systems are our newest such as Patriot PAC-2, Avenger, ATACMS, Air-to-Air Stinger; and we're intimately involved in the support of those systems," Chen said.

Patriot system successfully intercepts Iraqi missile

Editor's note: Scud missile attacks against Saudi Arabia occurred over the weekend with continued successful intercepts by Patriot.

A computer-paper sign taped over the entrance inside the lobby at Patriot Project Office on Friday proudly proclaimed "Patriot 1, Scud 0."

The newest version of the Patriot air defense missile successfully intercepted a Scud missile launched by Iraq against Saudi Arabia on Thursday night. This marked Patriot's first combat use ever in its 25-year history.

"I'm not surprised. We had a lot of confidence in the system. We're gratified that it performed so well," said Col. Bruce Garnett, the Patriot project manager.

Work on Patriot's newest version, the PAC-2, was accelerated so that it could be deployed in Saudi Arabia. The PAC-2, which stands for Patriot Anti-missile Capability second phase, performed as designed in its first use.

"I wish we hadn't had to do this at all," Garnett said. "Given the fact that it was needed, we are pleased Patriot did as well as it did."

Brig. Gen. Robert Drolet, the program executive officer for air defense, said "We had hoped it would not be needed, but it was and we are extremely gratified that the Patriot system and the soldiers who operate it performed in combat just as we expected and knew they would."

Officials at the project office were still getting information from the brigade Friday morning. The operational commanders were said to be very pleased.

The officer in charge of the unit which fired the missile said it was "just like a training mission — smooth as silk."

An incoming Scud missile was detected and then destroyed in the air by a PAC-2 missile over Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, according to A.Q. Oldacre, the deputy project manager.

"I'm extremely pleased that the system performed as it was designed to perform, and it performed that way in its test activity out at White Sands; and of course this is the first combat use of Patriot in either its anti-aircraft role or its missile role," Oldacre said. "So for the first time it's been used in combat and we're extremely pleased that it worked as it was supposed to."

"This is the first use of the PAC-2 missile that we here at Redstone accelerated work on and production get it to Saudi Arabia," he said. "If we had not had a PAC-2 missile there, if we just had the standard

Patriot, we might've knocked it off the target but it would've fallen somewhere else in the area and done damage. But we apparently killed it; we killed the warhead before it hit the ground so there was no damage that we know of. If that missile had not been intercepted and killed in the air and it had come in and hit the ground, hit its target, it could've killed a number of people — either our own troops or innocent civilians. So I think all the efforts we've gone through to get Patriot there have paid off already. Hopefully the fact that we've showed how effective it is will be a deterrent to further uses of Scuds against U.S. forces."

PAC-2 is the second phase of anti-missile capability. The first phase was a ground software change only. The second phase has a new fuze and warhead designed specifically to defeat tactical missiles.

The Patriot Project Office, located in Huntsville's Research Park, has about 115 people — including its matrix support people.

"I think this (successful use) is a result of not only our folks here but folks all over the command at support us as well. So I think this is something the entire command can be proud of," Oldacre said.

"And I hope we just don't have to use any more of them, but if we do I feel confident it'll do its job."

Savings bond sales seen increasing

Americans purchased \$735 million worth of Series EE U.S. Savings Bonds in December, a 24 percent increase from the \$593 million sold in December 1989. December's total was the most for any month since January 1990, and the most for any December since 1986.

December's sales brought total bond purchases for calendar year 1990 to \$8.07 billion, 6 percent above the \$7.64 billion sold in calendar 1989. For the first quarter of fiscal year 1991, sales of \$2.03 billion are 18 percent higher than the \$1.72 billion sold during the same period last year.

Treasurer of the United States Catalina V. Villalpando hailed the month's results as "a continuing indication that more Americans are returning to the savings ethic which our country's economy needs today. This is a great way to lead into the Bond Program's 50th anniversary year."

With December's sales results, the total value of savings bonds held by Americans on Dec. 31 increased to

\$126.2 billion, a one-year increase of 7 percent from \$117.7 billion at the end of 1989. (News release from U.S. savings bond division, Department of the Treasury)



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Champus updates home health care test project

Civilian firms that process Champus claims for 26 states began handling requests for care under Champus' home health care test project on Jan. 1.

The project, which is for the families of active-duty service members and the survivors of deceased active-duty members, began in July 1986. It provides individualized case management of a patient's health care, and offers home health care as a less expensive

alternative to inpatient hospital care. It's in operation in the continental U.S., Alaska and Hawaii.

Redstone takes precautionary steps for security

As the situation in the Persian Gulf intensified, Redstone Arsenal has taken precautionary steps to enhance security.

These measures include increased random checks at the installation gates and the return of civilian guards to the Missile Command headquarters building. Changes have been implemented gradually in recent weeks.

"We are taking some precautionary steps. Primarily right now it's enhanced awareness on the part of all of our security personnel and military police," said Lt. Col. Ray Stephenson, the provost marshal for Redstone. "And most people have probably noticed the increased attention paid to vehicles at installation gates."

The increased checks of vehicles are occurring at every gate. "We will be throughout the week providing more people at various gates on a random basis to ensure every vehicle is checked during certain times," Stephenson said. "And we're doing this both during rush-hour and during non-rush-hour traffic, duty and non-duty hours. We will randomly do such things as asking for second identification at the gates in addition to (vehicle) decals. In the evenings, we're asking for a picture ID (identification that has a photograph)."


Security reminders are being circulated by the Provost Marshal Office along with the Intelligence and Security Directorate. These remind managers and their workers about security responsibilities and what they can do to enhance security of their organizations. "And we've been working hard scrubbing our plans on actions we might take if the security posture has to be increased anymore," Stephenson added.

The actions taken have all been precautionary. Security has become a worldwide concern because of the Middle East crisis.

"Everyone has been listening and watching the news and knows the threats that Iraq has made. We haven't been doing this because of any threat peculiar to Redstone Arsenal or because of any particular

knowledge about such a threat. These have been strictly local initiatives at this time and precautionary," Stephenson said.

The gates and MICOM headquarters building have not been the only places affected by the changes. "We've also increased surveillance and security of our more critical or vulnerable areas on the Arsenal," Stephenson said. "This surveillance includes not only mission-related areas but also some of our community areas such as the PX-Commissary Mall and housing areas."

Feedback from the workforce has been positive, according to the provost marshal. "We appreciate the support we've received from the Arsenal workforce," he said. "We want to say thank you for their thank you."

He does advise, however, that if threats arise, more stringent procedures may be necessary. These could include even more protection of critical areas on post, and tighter controls on visitors to the Arsenal.

All Redstone workers are reminded to check work areas and incoming mail for strange parcels; report suspicious persons or activities; challenge unbadged or improperly badged personnel; validate maintenance personnel; and do not discuss Arsenal operations with strangers or those without a need to know. Redstone residents are also reminded to secure their vehicles; be inquisitive about strangers, especially those carrying suitcases or other containers; and be aware of and report strangers asking questions about Arsenal operations. Report unusual or suspicious activities to 876-2222.

"Another way people can lessen inconvenience to themselves and make things more convenient for us is: If you're authorized to have a decal (by MICOM regulation 210-2), by all means get a decal," Stephenson said.

"This event is to honor people that are coming to MICOM as a part of the workforce and to say farewell to those that are departing MICOM," said Bracy, coordinator for the event. He stressed that the entire workforce is invited to give the honorees a welcome or send-off.

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Strategic defense has its first female senior exec

Dr. Shelba Proffitt has joined an elite group of federal employees by becoming the first female member of the senior executive service at the U.S. Army Strategic Defense Command.

As new director of the advanced technology directorate, Proffitt leads her work force in assessing and helping resolve issues in essentially all disciplines required for the strategic defense initiative program in the future.

Members of the senior executive service hold top career management and policy jobs in the federal government, outranked only by the highest level of presidential appointees.

Fifteen top managers at USASDC are members of the SES. Not only is Proffitt the first woman, she is one of only 19 women, slightly over five percent, of the 352 senior executives in Department of the Army.

The Kentucky native gained extensive experience as a chemist and chemical engineer in private industry prior to her government career. Since 1966 she has held key positions with the Army, Tennessee Valley Authority and NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center.

For the past 11 years Proffitt has worked on various strategic defense technologies. A recognized expert in active and passive sensors, signal processors and space surveillance technologies, she is also SDI's designated expert in high temperature superconductivity.

According to Proffitt, her most significant accomplishment has been helping establish USASDC's advanced technology directorate. Under her leadership, a highly qualified staff pursues high risk, high payoff advanced technologies that continue to evolve and push state of the art forward, making today's challenges tomorrow's capabilities.

The research includes development of sensors that

can acquire and identify enemy missiles, kinetic energy interceptors such as missiles and hypervelocity guns, innovative computer processing technologies and high risk, high payoff areas of advanced infrared and radar sensors.

"USASDC is the most dynamic R&D environment I have ever seen," she said. "There's a positive can-do atmosphere here that allows people to be creative and seek solutions to problems."

She sees her role in helping develop infrared sensors for exoatmospheric discrimination as the most challenging research effort in her career. As deputy program manager for the designating optical tracker experiments, Proffitt was a key contributor to the five successful DOT flights. This program explored the use of optical sensors to identify and track intercontinental ballistic missile targets and established passive sensors as the technology of choice for this task.

In response to Army needs, Proffitt and her staff originated the Army tactical surveillance satellite concept, a part of the USASDC mission to transfer leading edge technologies to counter the cruise missile threat. In addition, the SDI midcourse data center was established and continues to evolve under her leadership.

Proffitt holds a bachelor's degree in chemistry and physics from Centre College, Danville, Ky., a master's degree in management from the University of Alabama in Huntsville and a doctorate in research and development management from the Southeastern Institute of Technology in Huntsville.

During her 31 years of managing basic and applied research, Proffitt has published more than 25 technical papers and she holds two patents. She has also received numerous awards, including second place for outstanding woman in the Department of the Army, the state of Kentucky's outstanding young woman of America award and outstanding performance awards from NASA and the Missile Command.

Even with the challenges and demands that come with her new status, Proffitt still finds the time for various outdoor sports and activities, including use of her private pilot license.

"There is nothing that I enjoy more than my work at SDC," Proffitt said. "The challenges and the almost unlimited opportunities to be creative are very rewarding. I don't even mind the long hours!"

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MICOM conducts its annual forum for businesses

An estimated 450 representatives of small businesses and other agencies took advantage of an annual capabilities forum provided by the Missile Command.

The "MICOM Capability Introduction" offers small businesses and small disadvantaged businesses a chance to pursue contracting opportunities. The third annual event was held Jan. 14-15 in the exhibit hall of the Von Braun Civic Center.

"This is to provide a forum whereby small businesses, small disadvantaged businesses, can avail themselves greater opportunities for doing business: both with the government, with each other and with large contractors. We attempt to get a good mix of all groups," said Lee Ford of the Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization Office (SADBU) at the Missile Command.

More than 160 exhibitors, from industry as well as the federal government, participated. Business representatives stopped at various booths to view products on display, to talk, ask questions and exchange business cards.

Attendance was down from previous years; and Ford speculated world events may have had something to do with that. "I don't know if Desert Shield was a factor or not, it's quite possible," he said.

Some of the high-tech contractors have only a limited market for their products, and probably suffered the most because of the lighter than usual turnout. "When the numbers are not as great as in previous years, accordingly the benefit is not as great," said Ford, a SADBU specialist. Several representatives of large contractors did tell him they were interested in pursuing small business sources and in improving their subcontracting efforts.

"We think it's very beneficial to the attendees and to the small business community. We appreciate all that did attend. This is part of the MICOM outreach efforts to the small business community, which we are required to do by mission and by charter. Of course the SADBU office spearheads that effort," Ford said.

Large businesses, which are required by law to place at least 20 percent of their subcontracting with small businesses on all government contracts that exceed \$500,000, were invited to the event to give small businesses an opportunity to expand into the subcontracting field. Many federal agencies were also represented to assist businesses in learning how to bid on their agency's products or services. Each procuring agency has its own procedure.

"I thought the show was very good," said Bob Biss, a MICOM retiree who now does consulting work in Huntsville for various firms. "I enjoyed it. And there were any number of retired MICOM people who attended, too. This is one of the shows I really enjoy coming to." Biss retired from the TOW Project Office in December 1986; he has a consulting agreement with the Marquardt Company which is based in Van Nuys, Calif.

Among the exhibitors was Murray Boggs, vice president for marketing with Opto Mechanik Inc. (OMI) of Melbourne, Fla. His company, a small business of 250 people, builds electro-mechanical and electro-optical assemblies. Various items related to the TOW missile system were displayed on the table at his booth. The company also builds most of the optical assemblies for the Bradley Fighting Vehicle, the Fire Support Team Vehicle and the Improved TOW vehicle. The company does more than \$25 million worth of business on Missile Command related projects each year, both directly to MICOM and as subcontractor to some of

Retired officers group offers scholarships

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — The Retired Officers Association scholarship loan program provides \$1,500 annual, no-interest loans to unmarried undergraduate students, under the age of 24, who are dependent children of active, reserve, and retired service personnel. The loans are awarded for up to five years of undergraduate study.

This current school year, 680 students were awarded loans, totaling more than \$1 million. From this group, based upon their academic records, participation in extracurricular and community activities, 106 students received special \$500 grants in addition to the loans. All those who apply for the loans are automatically considered for the grants.

The TROA Scholarship Program was established in 1948 for the sons and daughters of retired officers and their widows. It has expanded to include the children of active duty, reserve and retired officers, warrant of-

ficers and non-commissioned officers of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, U.S. Public Health Service and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Since this program was initiated, over 3,700 students have received interest-free loans, totaling more than \$8 million.

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Hazardous devices division celebrates its 25th year

The hazardous devices division which trains bomb technicians celebrated its 20th anniversary Friday.

The division is part of the Explosive Ordnance Center for Training and Technology. Jointly operated by the Army and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the division has been training civilian public safety people to be bomb technicians ever since Jan. 18, 1971.

Hazardous devices division, also called hazardous devices school, conducts a four-week basic course and a weeklong refresher course. Over the years, there have been 4,293 graduates of the basic course and 2,987 graduates of the refresher course.

"This school and its graduates have greatly reduced the peacetime mission of Army EOD," said Col. James Boddie, commandant of the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School. The mission of civilian bomb technicians is especially important at this time when most of the Army EOD units are deployed in Southwest Asia, he said.

An open house and ceremony were held Friday at the division's two buildings located in the missile school area. The guest speaker was John W. Hicks, assistant director in charge of FBI Laboratory in Washington, D.C.

"As we're seeing the events take place in the Middle East and the military response to aggressive acts in the Middle East, of course in this country we're very aware of the possibility of terrorism," Hicks said. "We believe we're prepared to address those kinds of situations if it does occur."

Hicks congratulated the hazardous devices division on its 20-year milestone. "It's a very important event, and best wishes for years to come," he said.

Capt. David Seely, chief of the division which consists of 18 members including instructors, recognized members of the original group of military people and instructors which conducted hazardous devices training.

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

Martin Luther King remembered for important impact

A tribute to dreamers keynoted a special program honoring the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. last week at the U.S. Army Strategic Defense Command cafeteria.

The Rev. Dr. Nelson H. Smith Jr., pastor of the New Pilgrim Baptist Church in Birmingham and former Southern Christian Leadership Conference colleague of King, was the primary speaker at the hour-long observance.

The program was jointly sponsored by USASDC and Huntsville Division, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Black Employment Program on King's Jan. 15 birthday.

"Dreamers allow themselves to be used for purposes that benefit the whole of mankind," Smith said.

"A dreamer sees what others do not see, carries the hope of the race, and salvation of the nation, the freedom of humankind."

Smith characterized his own community, Birmingham, as "once being the most segregated city in the nation," but now having a black mayor.

"Once across the South there were no blacks in meaningful jobs in city halls or county courthouses. (No black) policemen, deputies, secretaries, commissioners, inspectors, bank tellers or board members," Smith said.

"Martin dismantled everybody's world in the political arena, academe, the judiciary, the church, transportation, banking, careers of all kinds."

Smith went on to compare King to other "misfits" who have had an important impact for the good of society; biblical figures such as Moses, Joseph, Daniel and Paul; and historical and modern-day figures like Milton, Gandhi, Solzhenitsyn, Nelson Mandela and Malcolm X.

More than 200 employees were welcomed to the birthday observance by Col. Philip L. Hall, commander of U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Huntsville Division.

Mary Peoples, manager of the USASDC Black Employment Program, gave a brief recount of King's life.

Following Smith's remarks, Edna Sheridan, HND Black Employment Program manager, concluded the program by acknowledging all participants.

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Redstone crew rescues boy in Bessemer plane crash

A Redstone helicopter crew rescued a 15-year-old boy, the only survivor among five occupants of a light plane that crashed while attempting to land in dense fog in Bessemer Saturday.

The Army Huey helicopter with Redstone crew members CWO 4 Loren Dethlefs, pilot, CWO 4 Jeffery Cummins, co-pilot and Sgt. Jeffrey McKinney, crew chief, rescued Patrick McRee from the wreckage of a Rockwell Aerocommander about nine hours after the crash near the Bessemer airport.

The single-engine plane was cleared for landing at 6:06 p.m. and about six minutes later disappeared from the radar, said Ed Blount of the Federal Aviation Administration.

Hampered by bad weather, authorities were unable to launch a search of the densely-wooded crash area so they requested assistance through air search control headquarters at Scott Air Force Base, Ill., according to co-pilot Cummins.

"This was not a standard mission, but we do support emergency requests for assistance when asked to do so," Cummins said.

Dethlefs worked out arrangements for the military aircraft and personnel to participate in the operation and pulled together the crew, McKinney said. About 90 minutes after the call for help came, the crew left the airfield amid low clouds, wind and rain, at 3 a.m.

"The weather was so bad, we followed I-65 down to Birmingham. At times we were only 150 to 200 feet above the interstate," Cummins said.

After arrival at Bessemer at 4:10 a.m., the crew was briefed by the Civil Air Patrol, who had narrowed down the location of the downed aircraft to a two-square mile area.

Joined by two police officers with night vision devices, the Army crew searched the area, hovering about 150 feet above the dense growth of trees, Cummins said.

"This was not a standard mission, but we do support emergency requests for assistance when asked to do so."

They flew as long as the fuel supply held out, returning to the airfield at approximately 5:40 a.m. to get updated information from the Civil Air Patrol, who had been going door to door in an attempt to get information about the crash.

The Huey took off again at 6:30 a.m. accompanied by medical personnel. When daylight broke, Cummins said they spotted damaged trees and saw someone on the ground signaling for help.

"At that time we weren't sure if the person on the ground was a survivor or someone who had walked onto the scene."

The helicopter couldn't land because of the trees, so it flew to a clearing where a rescue team accompanying the Redstone crew got out and the Huey led them back to the scene, Cummins said.

The helicopter then dropped a stretcher down by rope to the rescuers, while McKinney dropped to the ground and chopped down trees so the helicopter could land, Cummins said.

The Redstone crew took the injured teen-ager to a Birmingham hospital where he was listed in stable condition Sunday.

The dead were identified as Francis A. Cox Jr., 33; Randall Frank, 35; Scott Frank, 11; and Don Roberts, 28, according to the Jefferson County coroner's office.

All four lived in the Bessemer area, a Birmingham suburb, according to Lt. Col. Dennis Flowers of the civil air patrol.

The five were returning from a Florida-Mississippi State basketball game Saturday when the plane crashed in dense fog about 6 p.m. while attempting to land at the Bessemer airport, Blount said.

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
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Officers wives plan annual art auction Feb. 2

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New law bans most honorariums for federal employees

A new law which took effect Jan. 1 will keep federal employees from receiving compensation from personal appearances, speeches or written articles, even if the subject is not job-related.

Previously, Department of Army employees were prohibited from receiving compensation if they wrote or spoke on topics which were job related, according to David Points, an attorney adviser for MICOM Legal Services.

Those restrictions still apply. Furthermore, the Ethics Reform Act of 1989, which just took effect, prohibits compensation for any appearance, speech or article, regardless of subject matter, according to Points.

There are exceptions.

"The honoraria ban does not apply to the following: the recitation of scripted material as for a live or recorded theatrical production; engagements to perform or provide entertainment using an artistic or other such skill or talent; books; and works of fiction, poetry, lyrics and scripts," he stated.

Other exceptions include compensation for teaching a course for a program of education or training funded by state or local government or as part of the regular curriculum of an accredited institute of higher education, according to Points.

The honoraria ban applies to civilians and military officers, including warrant officers. It does not apply to military enlisted personnel and noncommissioned officers.

At least one government employee group is fighting the new law. The National Treasury Employees Union (NTEU) filed an emergency request to the U.S.

Supreme Court to prevent the enforcement of the law until a federal appellate court can decide its constitutionality. The Supreme Court denied the request.

However, a federal appeals court petition seeking a

determination of constitutionality is scheduled to begin Jan. 29 and hearings are planned early in the new session of Congress in an attempt to legislatively repeal or soften the ban.

File now for federal tax extension

Taxpayers who are out of the country at tax time may qualify for a four-month extension to file, but any federal taxes owed still have to be paid by April 15.

Interest and possible penalties will be added to any taxes not paid in full.

To request an extension, use Internal Revenue Service Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return." When the form is completed, file it with any taxes owed by April 15.

With the four-month extension, tax returns must be filed by Aug. 15. If filing Form 1040, list any payment made on line 58. Using Form 1040A, write "Form 4868" and any payment made on Line 28d.

U.S. service members, citizens and resident aliens living outside the United States or Puerto Rico can qualify for an automatic two-month extension. A statement explaining how the taxpayer qualified for the extension must be attached to the tax return.

Interest must be paid on any tax owed from the tax due date until the tax is paid.

IRS Publication 17, *Your Federal Income Tax*, explains how tax filing extensions work. To receive

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Joint Chief's chairman reviews desert operations

Operation Desert Shield has been a superb effort by a dedicated and professional force. And neither friend nor foe should doubt the commitment of that force to the successful completion of its mission.

That was the bottom line of Army Gen. Colin Powell's prepared statement to the Senate Armed Services Committee in December.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff reviewed deployment efforts, multinational support, the coalition and Iraq and U.S. force assessments associated with Desert Shield operations.

There is no doubt, said Powell, that this has been one of the largest and most successful deployment operations in our nation's history. "No other country could have attempted or even contemplated doing what we have accomplished," he said.

Powell said the task airlift had accomplished since the beginning of operations was equivalent to moving the entire city of Richmond, Va., a distance of 8,000 miles.

In addressing the level of multinational support, Powell recalled the words of President George Bush: "This is not the United States vs. Iraq; it is the world against Iraq." He said that by the time all committed forces arrive, over 35 nations will have provided ground, naval and air personnel and equipment, as well as economic aid to the region's countries.

"With over 200,000 allied troops en route or in place alongside U.S. forces, a credible collective security force stands ready to defeat Saddam's aggression," declared Powell.

Iraq's current threat is backed by conventional armed forces that represent the world's sixth largest army, explained Powell. He said Iraq also has a substantial chemical weapons capability and the means to deliver them — artillery, rockets, missiles and aircraft.

But, noted Powell, Iraq's missiles are relatively inac-

curate. Coupled with the significant defensive measures coalition forces have taken, he raised doubts about the true threat of Iraq's chemical weapons against military forces. Instead, they may be primarily useful only as a terror weapon against innocent civilians, Powell said.

Another threat to friendly forces, the general noted: "Iraq is also developing biological weapons agents and working feverishly to obtain a nuclear capability."

That U.S. equipment readiness has exceeded expectations — and the worldwide DoD standard — must be considered exceptional, given the harsh demands of the desert environment, Powell said. In many cases, aircraft and ground equipment readiness rates exceed those of units in the continental United States, he added.

The Joints Chiefs chairman discussed the contributions of the Guard and Reserve. "The success of the Guard and Reserve participation in Desert Shield cannot be over-emphasized," said the chairman. "Their participation has been a significant factor in affording us flexibility and balance and reinforces the policies and decisions made over the last 10 years to strengthen the Total Force concept."

He concluded his statement to the committee by observing, "The rebuilding of our military forces that has occurred over the past decade, with the emphasis on modernization of aging combat equipment, training and readiness, has paid off."

"The speed and precision of the U.S. response to Iraq's aggression, when requested by our friends in need, has awed the world."

Hotline answers hazardous material questions

The answers to questions on how to properly identify, handle or dispose of hazardous materials are only a phone call away.

The Hazardous Technical Information Service in Richmond, Va., (1-800-848-HTIS) — provides "live" responses between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Eastern time, Monday through Friday. At other times, an answering machine fields inquiries, which are answered at the start of the next duty day.

While geared to users of hazardous material, the service will respond to anyone in DoD.

"If you have something in front of you and don't know what it is and what the hazard might be, we can help you answer that question if it's an item supplied by DoD," said Jan deGast, program manager for the service. "If you want to know something about the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act or pending

legislation, our service should help you immensely."

Linwood Gilman, hazardous materials manager for the Defense General Supply Center in Richmond, which provides the service, said the program tries to solve long term problems by furnishing answers to immediate needs. Another objective is to build a database of questions to show problem areas and where more work is needed to clarify misunderstanding. The service also publishes a quarterly technical bulletin, available at the hotline number, containing critical reviews and technology assessments.

Fred Tramontin, who handles and oversees technical inquiries, explained that professionals in chemistry and chemical engineering, environmental specialists and industrial hygienists comprise his staff. "We are the procuring activity and primary managers of hazardous materials for the Defense Logistics Agency. When we don't have the answer, we can get to the right person considerably faster than others who are not sure whom to go to."

Tramontin said the information service self-imposes a requirement that it must answer all questions — even the most complex ones — within 10 working days. Also, if an answer involved an interpretation or clarification of a regulation, the response will be followed up in writing, he said.

The hotline is another example of efforts to comply with Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's goal to establish DoD as the federal leader in agency environmental compliance and protection, said Gilman.

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
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
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Two annual road races set for Redstone in February

IRS wants you to know your rights as a taxpayer

The Taxpayer Bill of Rights, signed into law as part of the Technical and Miscellaneous Revenue Act on Nov. 10, 1988, clarifies and extends the rights of taxpayers.

Internal Revenue Service officials say highlights of the Bill of Rights section include:

- Personal and financial information will be kept confidential;
- Interest will be paid on delayed refunds;
- Right to appeal examiner's audit findings; and
- Free assistance in preparing returns by providing publications, and telephone and walk-in service.

Under the act, a taxpayer can request that penalties be dropped if the advice given by IRS employees is erroneous. However, the interest due will not be canceled.

According to the IRS, a person has to show that reliance on the advice was reasonable and that the tax return was filed after receiving the information from the IRS. To determine if there is reasonable cause, the IRS needs the date and time of the call; name of the IRS employee; the question asked and the specific facts given to the employee; the answer given by the IRS; and if the taxpayer tried to find the answer in any IRS publication.

A taxpayer is liable for the least amount of tax due under the law. If the tax return is questioned, the IRS must send a letter requesting more information or explaining why a change needs to be made to the return.

If additional taxes are owed, the IRS will send a bill describing the tax and how much is owed. If the taxpayer is unable to pay the bill, the IRS may agree to payment by installments.

Either before or at an interview, the IRS must explain the audit system and how it works. The taxpayer has the right to ask that the time and place for the audit be convenient. The taxpayer also has the right to have an attorney, certified public accountant or other authorized individual accompany or represent him at the audit.

If a taxpayer is successful in a court action against the IRS, the court may decide that the government will pay reasonable litigation and administrative costs.

A taxpayer may bring court action against the federal government to recover the lesser of actual damages up to \$100,000 or actual economic damages plus costs of the court action if an IRS employee recklessly or intentionally violates the Internal Revenue Code or regulations.

The IRS must wait 30 days before seizing property after notifying the taxpayer of the seizure action. Also, after a bank levy is served, there is a 21-day hold period before the funds will be sent to the IRS. The levy takes effect on the day the bank receives it.

A complete summary of a taxpayer's rights is in IRS Publication 1, *Your Rights as a Taxpayer*. Copies are available by calling 1-800-829-3676.

Child care costs could cut taxes

Child or dependent care expenses may qualify as a credit on federal tax returns. Based on the taxpayer's adjusted gross income, the credit could be as much as \$720 for one qualifying person or \$1,440 for two or more.

The qualifying dependent must be the taxpayer's child, disabled dependent or disabled spouse. The tax return must be filed using Form 1040 or 1040A. The taxpayer — and spouse, if married — must work or be looking for work. Married couples must file a joint return.

Social Security numbers are required on the tax return for dependents aged 2 and older. If the number has been requested but not received by the time the

return is filed, write "Applied for" in the space provided for that dependent's number.

The name, address and Social Security number for the dependent care provider must also be listed on the tax return. If some information is unavailable, the taxpayer must be able to show that an effort was made to get it.

Calculation of the care credit, requirements and limits are explained in the Internal Revenue Service Publication 503, *Child and Dependent Care Expenses*. Call 1-800-829-3676 for a copy of the publication.
